### GENERAL LETTER FROM ENGLAND.

DATED 24<sup>TH</sup>. FEB<sup>Y</sup>. 1786.

- Para. 1, 2 Advise of Dispatches received by Swallow which will be answered the earliest opportunity.
- 3, 4 Owing to the total Loss of the Halsewell the Consignment of the Bales is altered to Coast and Bay.
- 5 The Contents of all Chests of private Trade of Commanders & officers must be specified in the mark of it.
- 6 Of no consequence.
- 7 Very few private letters to be sent in the overland Despatches.
- 8 Mr. Henry Crawford returns to his rank in the Civil service.
- 9 Col<sup>l</sup>. Geo. : Campbell permitted to proceed to & remain in India for 2 years.
- 10 Free Mariners licensed.
- 11, 12 Excepting the last all former Indents for Mily. Stores have been inaccurate.
- 13 The Quantity of each article to be kept up annually should be ascertained.
- 14 And professional Men at every Presidency should determine on the necessary proportions of General Stores.
- 15 Enclosing Copy of a proposed Establishment of Field Pieces by Sir Archibald Campbell.
- 16 As the Indent for Military Stores was so late received it cannot be completely furnished for this Year's Ships.
- 17 The Court comply with the request for round shot for French 20 pounders.
- 18, 19 It is hoped in future soldiers accoutrements will be made at Madras as at Bengal—new kinds of Cartridge Pouches and Hats are sent this season.
- 20, 21 Concerning Troopers swords and some small arms new Construction sent, the quality of which are to be reported on.
- 22 Enclosing Directions to Bengal to inform the Holders of Company's Bonds that no expence is to fall on them in the liquidation of the debts by bills of Exchange.
- 23 Concerning Recruits to be sent to Bengal.
- 24 Mr. Tenier's request to be admitted on the Military Fund cannot be complied with.

- Para. 25, 26** Certain Officers return to their Rank.  
**27** Respecting the many Debts due to the Company in the Settlement of Masulipatam.  
**28, 29** But in Vizagapatam the Exertions and Arrangements of Mr. Casamajor in 1781; succeeded by the honest and able execution of Mr. Russell the Balance of that Circar has been reduced more than 2/3.  
**30, 31** Every Assistance to be given to the Servants in China, a Cargo of Coast Piece Goods to be provided for that Market.

## GENERAL LETTER FROM ENGLAND.

DATED 8<sup>TH</sup>. MARCH 1786.

- Para. 1** Advise of last dispatches sent.  
**2** Lord Cornwallis appointed Governor Gen<sup>l</sup>. of Bengal.  
**3** The Losses sustained by the Chief in Council at Vizagapatam in the Mutiny of 1780 will not be restored by the Company—approving the whole Conduct of Government in that Affair.  
**4-6** Highly gratified that the several accusations brot. against Mr. Dent were unfounded; but are sorry to observe how frequent mention of the Trial on the late Proceedings—the Records of the Quarter Sessions for 1783, and of the Mayors Court for 1782 to be transmitted—more regularity to be observed in sending them in future.  
**7** The Allowance of 1,000 Pags. £ month to Mr. Thos. Lewin approved of.  
**8** The generous Conduct of Seid Mahomed Cawn to the Prisoners at Bangalore to be acknowledged by a handsome Present to him and Ramiah by whose Agency his Country was distributed.  
**9** The Consultations of every Department to be correctly transcribed, and to be certified as examined by the Secretary or his Assistants before the Council sign them.  
**10** The Consignment of Ship Contractor changed from Coast and China to China direct.  
**11** Free Mariners licensed.  
**12-14** Enclosing a letter from the Rajah of Tanjore written in a decisive and explicit manner owing to the supercilious style of his late Correspondence it is expected his Balance of Arrears to the Company will soon be discharged as he is not to be called upon for a proportion of the War Expences, and if he has already paid any on that account, the Sum must be carried to the Credit of his Arrears; the whole of which must be received according to the State of his Finances.  
**15, 16** In a letter from the Rajah in 1783 he says that Negapatam has hitherto paid him an annual peishcush and that since the Company have been in Possession of that place his people's Trade with the Dutch has declined. The truth of this must be enquired into.  
**17** Messrs. Fenning and Fyson may receive the Redress they applied for.

- Para. 18 Other ships taken up.  
19, 20 Particular Agreements with the Owners of the Ravensworth and Lansdown.  
21 Admit the necessity of purchasing two houses at Ingeram.

DATED 14<sup>TH</sup>. MARCH 1786.

- Para. 1 10 Copies of a Memoir concerning the Chagos and Adjacent Islands are sent.  
2 Enclosing Copy of a proposed Establishment of a Fund for maintaining officers Orphans in Bengal, which is recommended to this Presidency.  
3 Approving the Conduct of the Governor General &c. in restoring Sadras and Pulicat to the Dutch under certain restrictions.

DATED 12<sup>TH</sup>. APRIL 1786.

- Para. 1 Letter of the 4<sup>th</sup>. March last sent ♢ Wm. Pitt.  
2, 3 The Dispatches ♢ Intelligence are received and speedily will be answered.  
4 Free Mariners licensed.  
5-21 The Claims of Sir Henry Cosby, Coll. Campbell and Captain Jourdan upon the Nabob on account of a Contract for feeding the Horses being thought just, the Court recommend him to place them among the Creditors in the Cavalry Loan.  
22, 23 The Sum of 20,500 Porta Nova Pags. claimed by Mr. Dott from the Nabob advanced to him on public Exigencies, appearing due, the same relief to be afforded him as the other Creditors and his Claim for Grain advanced to the Provincial Battalion and Sibbendies to be examined and adjusted.  
24 In every case of Claims on the Nabob to wait the final decision of the Court.  
25 Information to be sent if the obsolete Claims of Periah Eyah Town Conicoply, have been satisfied by the allowance of 20 Pags. ♢ month.  
26 Some plan to be devised for the watering of a squadron in Madras Roads without sending on Shore.  
27 The Recommendation of Mr. George Mackay for an appointment in the Civil Service cannot be complied with.  
28 A Select Committee of Supra Cargoes in China appointed.  
29 The reward of 1000 Pags. to Capt. Anderson of the Greyhound acquiesced in.  
30 Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Dormieux and Vymoot cannot be relieved in the form they seek for.  
31 The particulars of Col. Fullarton's disbursements have been applied for, as recommended.

- Para. 32 The Resolution of the 10<sup>th</sup>. Septr. 1783 respecting Civil and Military Servants returning on account of Ill health being reconsidered the attestation of only one Surgeon is now required.
- 33 Regular Accounts to be sent of the Death, removal or resignation of any Company's Servant.
- 34 Enclosing Copies of the opinion of Council on the illegal Conduct in China of Captain McLary Commander of a Country Ship—Regulation to prevent any future offences.
- 35 Every Book and Account to be transmitted to the latest period possible.
- 36 A Bill to be drawn in favor of Ens<sup>n</sup>. Cartwright.
- 37, 38 Enclosing several Copies of an Act of Parliament to explain and amend that passed for the better regulation of the Company's Affairs; by which the Powers of the Governors in India are much enlarged.
- 39 Enclosing Copy of a Memorial from Sir George Ramsay and other Gentlemen soliciting the Aid of the Company in the liquidation of Debts due to themselves and other British Subjects from the Rajah of Tan-jore.
- 40 Which states that previous to the War in 1780, 3 Lacks and a half of pagodas were due from the Rajah to his Creditors for sums bonâ fide lent to him.
- 41, 42 In 1781 the Debts to Individuals are found to have amounted to 6 Lacks for the payment of which in 1781 tho' the Revenues of the Shaveram District were agreed to be assigned yet they have lately been set aside for liquidation of his Arrears to the Company.
- 43, 44 The Court therefore recommend some plan to be arranged with the Rajah for discharging his private debts, if any be justly contracted and that the Creditors are to receive the money only thro' the Channel of the Governor and Council.
- 45 An Account of all Debts justly contracted with reasons for allowing them; and of those supposed false to be transmitted home.
- 46 Simple Interest only to be made upon the Debts.
- 47 The demands of Mr. Contenceau of the Tunkaws of Waldore in behalf of the French Nation and every other to be resisted.
- 48 Enclosing Copy of a letter From Sir George Ramsay lately received stating that the Revenues of the District of Shaveram were assigned by the Rajah in favor of his Private Creditors but that they from the representation of Lord Macartney did not avail themselves of the Assignment.
- 49 Approving the appointment of a Board of Accounts.
- 50, 51 Approving the appointments of several Cadets; but express orders that none shall be hereafter appointed but by the authority of the Court of Directors.
- 52 The 7 minor Cadets recommended, disapproved.
- 53 Application to be made to Bengal for the Balance due from Capt. Hearsay.
- 54 Certain Claims of Capt. Hearsay recommended by the Governor General &c. cannot be complied with.

- Para. 55 Mr. Robert Barclay returns with an Ensign's Commission.
- 56 Colonel Brathwaite is to have the Management of the Toddy Farm at Ellore; and is allowed one half of the Produce.
- 57 The appointments of Mr. Jno. Maxtone and Mr. Geo: Fooke to be supernumerary Lieut : Fireworkers are not to be precedents for future irregularities.
- 58 The History of the War to September 1782 by Major W<sup>m</sup>. Sydenham the Court are desirous of having concluded.
- 59 The request Dalling to draw the additional 5000 pagodas cannot be complied with as he was not in the Field—the setting apart this Sum was highly improper.
- 60 Major Maule returns to his rank under Lieutenant Col. Ross.
- 61 The Company having been lately authorized by Parliament to Unite the Governor and Commander-in-Chief in one person, Lord Cornwallis is appointed Governor &c. in Bengal and Sir A. Campbell of Madras—Sir John Dalling to return on an Annuity of £ 1,000.
- 62 The Appointment of Ensign Lalor confirmed his rank.
- 63, 64 Mr. Fallofield's Letter on the State of the Districts of Nagore and Negapatam highly approved, his account of the Loans not having been noticed by the Board the Court direct that some encouragement be held out to Weavers in that District.
- 65 And from his Account of the Daricotah Farm all the Zeal and abilities of Mr. Foyer will be called for in restoring it to its former value his progressive success to be constantly transmitted to the Court.
- 66 The Cheif of each Subordinancy must annually prepare a clear and distinct Account of the State of his District.
- 67 If Mr. Fallofields allowances be as he represents inadequate to his services, a commission in proportion to his encrease of the Revenues must be granted him.
- 68–73 The perpetual Grant of Chickerri Cotah to Veera Permaul revoked—1<sup>st</sup>. because it is perpetual and therefore contrary to all Precedents 2<sup>dly</sup>. tho' the Agreement was made at a low rate for procuring a cheap abundance of Provisions; yet the quantity quality or price of no one Article has been ascertained.
- 74 A short Lease renewable at Pleasure ought to be made with a Stipulation as to the quantity, Quality and Price of Provisions to be supplied by Veera Parmaul.
- 75–77 Transmitting Copies of certain Letters in which the Nabob accuses Veera Parmaul of Bribery Lord Macartney whose Character the Court beleive uncontaminated by Corruption, and therefore his Highness must be applied to for the original Letters that future calumnious imputations may be prevented.
- 78 Allowance of 250 Pags. ⠼ month to the Secretary instead of Cowles approved.
- 79, 80 The attention shewn to commercial Concerns highly commended, upon a judicious management of which much reliance is placed as well for future success as for relief under the present Difficulties.

- Para.** 81 The Commercial Board to be particular in the choice of their Investments.  
 82 Heads under which remarks are to be addressed.  
 83 Exports of the season.  
 84 The Indents for Woollens to be sent by the first ships of the season.  
 85 Forwarding ♫ Valentine a new kind of Manufacture which must be reported upon.  
 86 And different Colours from several Manufactures those prefer'd must be specified.  
 87 And a set of Medly patterns to be reported on.  
 88, 89 A Warehouse for the sale of Copper and Broad cloth to be established at Tanjore and these articles to be sent to the northern Circars.  
 90 An accurate list of European articles received sold and remaining each season to be sent annually with opinions upon those likely to prove most profitable.  
 91 Transmitting Cards of patterns and different manufactures to be reported on.  
 92 Duplicates of which are numbered and marked the same at home for reference.  
 93-95 List of imports to be sent for 1787, a supply to be provided from the Tinnevelly Country which is to be conducted by a senior Civil servant.  
 96, 97 The mode to be used in framing the list of Investments which if neglected to be sent by the last ship of each season will be attended with the severest marks of displeasure.  
 98 Concerning marks to be made on certain Packages.  
 99 Cards of Patterns of Indian Goods to be sent as from Manchester, a duplicate to be kept by the Export Warehouse Keeper for reference.  
 100 Transmitting an advertisement to be made public in all the Settlements in India prohibiting the smuggling of Diamonds &c.  
 101 A statement to be sent in duplicate of the Exported manufacture of each Factory.  
 102 Transmitting samples of Muslins fabricated at home to obtain a preference over them, greatest attention must be paid to the Weavers.  
 103 Upon the arrival of any ship at Madras the greatest care must be to accelerate her dispatch.  
 104 Enclosing a printed price Current of English Goods.  
 105, 106 Certain Books not yet received by the Court to be forwarded immediately.

DATED 28<sup>TH</sup>. APRIL 1786.

- Para.** 1 Triplicate of the letter of the 12<sup>th</sup>. Instant is forwarded ♫ Swallow.  
 2 Transmitting Copies of an Act of Parliament empowering the Company to appoint Sir A. Campbell Governor & Commander in Chief in the Carnatic & Messrs. A. Davidson, J<sup>s</sup>. Daniel & J<sup>s</sup>. Casamajor Council.

- Para. 3 Enclosing the Commission of Governor and Council.
- 4 And an Instrument revoking the Commission of Sir Jno. Dalling Bart. as Commander in Chief in the Carnatic.
- 5 The salary granted to the Commander in Chief to cease immediately.
- 6 Clergymen appointed to proceed to India.
- 7 Free Mariners licensed.
- 8 An account of Stationary issued to each office to be sent annually.
- 9 The attention of the Board is recommended to the political Survey of the Northern Circars by Mr. Js. Grant.
- 10 An Attorney General for the Company to be appointed at Madras : Mr. Benj'n. Sulivan to fill that Office with the Salary of 300 Pags. P month.
- 11 John Michie Esqr. Chairman and John Motteux Esqr. Deputy who with others compose a Committee for Company's Shipping.
- 12 Certain Directors composing a Secret Committee for the Season.
- 13 Mr. Dent to be reimbursed the extraordinary Expences incurred by him during his Residence at Cuddalore.
- 14 The Board to give their opinion on the respective limits of the Civil and Mily. authority at the Presidency and Subordinates.
- 15 Respecting the suit in Chancery brought against the Company by Videnadod Moodaly and Negapah Chitty relative to the annulment of the Cowle granted to them 15<sup>th</sup>. March 1781 of Tobacco, Beetle and Ganjee Farms.
- 16 The Loan proposed to be made by Mr. Porcher to the Nabob highly improper.
- 17 As the statement of the Affairs at Madras was made prior to the Aid received from Bengal, prior to the knowledge of the new Military Establishment and before the measures taken for the liquidation of the Company's Debts in India, when the Effects of these measures are felt another to be prepared.
- 18, 19 & 20 Approving the Security demanded on the Surrender of the Assignment of the Nabob's Country and the arrangement for the payment of the Kists and Current Charges; which are considered as merely preparatory to the final agreement mentioned in the former orders of the 9<sup>th</sup>. December.
- 21 The first vacant residency or Factory to be filled by Mr. Oakes.
- 22 An Account to be made out half yearly of all Military Stores at the Presidency and its subordinates.
- 23 Enclosing Copy of a letter to the Governor General &c. concerning the Bengal Revenues.
- 24 The President and Council to appoint a person to superintend the Warehouse at Tanjore.

DATED 21<sup>ST</sup>. JULY 1786.

- Para. 1, 2** Advise of last Dispatches received which will be answered the earliest opportunity.
- 3** Transmitting his Majesty's pardon to Mr. Thos. Wells.
- 4** Copies of Act of Parliament entitled "An Act for the further regulation of the Trial of persons accused of certain Offences committed in the East Indies" &c. &c.
- 5** And Copies of an Act of Parliament to enable the Company to raise money by a sale of Annuities.
- 6** John Dannett licensed Free Mariner.
- 7** Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Jones and Willis Civilians, return to their Rank.
- 8** Bills drawn.
- 9** Concerning a Bill drawn on the Bengal Government by the late Sir Jno. Burgoyne.
- 10** Again recommending Mr. Robert George Latham.
- 11-13** Reprehending the mode of proceeding in the enquiry ordered to be made on the subject of the French Ship Elizabeth.
- 14** No menace or threat to be used in bringing forward Witnesses, but all fair and open means to be pursued and the business to be again investigated.
- 15** Concerning the succession of Members to Council.
- 16, 17** The Rank between Civil and Military Servants determined.
- 18** To define the extent of the Jurisdiction of the Court of Justice at Madras, reference must be made to 30<sup>th</sup>. Clause of an Act of Parliament now transmitted.
- 19** Copies of the proceedings of the Commissions for peace with Tippoo Sultaun to be sent the first opportunity.
- 20** Those Bond holders who from being in England have not had an opportunity of applying for money within the time prescribed; the period for them is enlarged but they are not to receive any superior advantage to the holders.
- 21** American Ships to be treated like Ships of every other foreign Nation.
- 22** The Governor &c. to express the Court's dissatisfaction to the Country Powers at their having Agents to convey their letters to them in England.
- 23** All letters sent from the different Princes thro' the Channel of the Governor &c. or to them must be duly noticed.
- 24** Lieut. Francis Capper returns to his Rank.
- 25, 26** Lord Cornwallis being employed on a plan for settling the Rank of King's and Company's Officers; Sir A. Campbell is to communicate his Ideas to his Lordship on the Subject.

- Para. 6 Robert Brooke Esqr. appointed Governor and Francis Robson Esq Lieut. Governor of St. Helena.  
7, 8 Honble Basil Cochrane is dismiss'd the service and to be tried for the Crimes he is accused of.  
9 Application to be made to the Nabob for payment of the arrears due on the annuity settled by him on Gen<sup>t</sup>. Joseph Smith.  
10 Enclosing Copy of a memorial from the Executors of Jno. Maxwell Stone praying payment of a Bond due to them from the Nabob.  
11 A Select Committee of Supra Cargoes appointed in China.  
12 List of Supra Cargoes under them.  
13 A report to be made on the efficacy of Ruspini's Styptic.  
14 Mr. James West permitted to accompany his daughters to Fort St. George and remain there two years.  
15 Mr. C. W. Turner licensed Free Mariner.  
16 Every species of Silver and Copper Coin on the Coromandel Coast to be transmitted home in Triplicate.  
17, 18 A new kind of Slate to be proved on the first building erected of the Company's and to be reported on.  
19 Certain Officers return to their Ranks.  
20 The number of Recruits for the season.  
21, 22 King's Officers returning to Europe to be accommodated in Company's Ships, in preference to persons not in the Company's Service.  
23 List of Ships taken up for the season 1787.  
24 Copies of their respective Charter parties enclosed in these packets.  
25 Consignments for India and China this Season.  
26–28 The Contract for Madeira nearly on the same terms as that of last Season. Copy of the Agreement enclosed will determine the Disposal of it.  
29 Six pipes laden on the Fitzwilliam are consigned to China.  
30, 31 The Madeira in future to be put up to public auction at 30 ™ Cent gain inclusive of all loss from leakage, ill Stowage, or embezzlement; to ascertain if there be any, a capable person must be sent on board to gauge the leaks in presence of the Commanders.  
32 The Court to be informed of the quantity of Wine consumed on the Coromandel Coast.  
33 The Current prices of Goods on the Coast to be sent to the Supra Cargoes at China that they may indent for those most likely to sell advantageously.  
34 Advise the quantity of Woollens to be sent the first opportunity.

DATED 10<sup>TH</sup>. JANUARY 1787.

- Para. 1 The payment of Cash to the Commanders of Indiamen to be made regularly; if the Treasury be exhausted bills of Exchange must be drawn on the Company.  
2 The Current Rupee to be 2<sup>s</sup>. the Current Star Pagoda 8<sup>s</sup>.

- Para. 3** The new form of a Bill transmitted in a former letter to be adopted.
- 4** Two Certificates, one payable at 90 the other at 365 Days to be kept separate in the advices.

GENERAL LETTER FROM ENGLAND.

DATED 16<sup>TH</sup>. FEB<sup>Y</sup>. 1787.

- Para. 1, 2** List of Ships taken up to carry Convicts to Botany Bay, three of which take in a Cargo of Tea at China.
- 3** A Chest of Wine put on board each Ship carrying eighty Recruits for their use in the Voyage, the remainder if there be any to serve for the Hospitals.
- 4** Concerning some Barrels of Beef and Pork laden on the ships for Fort St. George.
- 5** Mr. James Grant licensed Free Mariner.
- 6** The Claims set up by persons senior to those actually holding the appointments, must cease by the Act of Parliament lately transmitted.
- 7** Which Act prohibits all persons out of the Service holding appointments in it.
- 8** Enclosing Copies of a memorial and letter from the late Administrator of the French Revenue at Karical praying to be reimburs'd a Sum paid the Rajah of Tanjore, to receive a quantity of paddy from the Inhabitants of the four Magans of Caricaul.
- 9** A set of Bills have been granted payable to Lieut. B. Muret value received.
- 10** The Commanders must be strictly enjoined to be careful of the seeds and plants to be sent from Madras to St. Helena.
- 11, 12** The Prosecution against Mr. G. Proctor late Receiver in the Tinnevelly Country for defrauding the Company to be brought to a Speedy decision.
- 13, 14** The Institution of Schools for teaching the English Language made by Messrs. Sulivan and Schwartz demands the highest encomiums—To encourage the prosecution of it the Court will give to every School 250 Pags. £ Annum.


