

Since our [. . .] has occur'd for the [.]

We have [. . .] write us [. . .] Buddy [. . .] up in RECD. YIL.

Octobr. 1703 with part of Rupees. 14000 as our Cash book shows to be advanced to 1707. them on the Unit'd Compa. accott. the Septembr. preceeding and Mr. Holcombe &ca. refusing to take them for the Comp^a. they lay in pawn at Ganjam till the last year about 2 months before we sent them when Paddy Narrain &c^a. Comp^a. by recovery of some Debts in those parts found means to redeem them, so that according to your Hoñ. &ca. orders under the 16th. April 1706 we carried their amount to the unit'd Comp*. Debt in our Books which we are now about finishing in order to be sent your Hon. &ca. next month or by the beginning of August at farthest.

With the Stores &ca. by the Samuell we [recd] 5 Tarpawlins and a small box of flint [. . .] re not mention'd in the Invoice, so are at a [loss to] know their amount and to whom they [were . . .] which we desire may be advis'd in

[...] 11 private Letters we hear of the [... fr]igat's arrivall and that some [...] ma [...] rs ships came out in [...] we hope are safe wth.
[...] 11 have in a few days [...] promise to carry [...] comes an acco^{tt}. [...] Washers [...]ith account cash [...] at Diary's and Paymasters acco^{tt}. to the last of [...].

We have now drawn two bills on [your] Hoñ &c*. the one for Rup*. 12,000 payable to [the] Honble. Thos. Pitt Esqr. & the other for R. [. . .] Payable to the Honble. Thos. Pitt Esqr. & Mr. Raworth with both we desire your [P . . .] complyance.

Annumturaz is the most pow[erful] Rajah in these Parts and Lords it from [one] place to another; whereto he is encourag'd by [...] from Rustumdell Cawn or Quondam [...] who gives him Assurance of getting the [...] by Assum shaws Phirmaund for his ow[n].

Meida Cawn nevertheless is incre[asing] his Forces to the Norward of Chicacull a [. . .] turn'd out by Assumshaw will (it's generally beleiv'd) hold the Country for Cawn [Bahawdir] whose Serv^t. he is.

The troubles in these [parts are . . .] the same as before the Kings D[eparture] we continue to hold a good correspondence with the Nabob and Rajahs [. . .] at Present apprehend any [. . .] as [. . .] Comp^{n's}. Affairs so [. . .] ever [. . .] con [. . .] shall guide [. . .] 6 Days [. . .] pat^m. [. . .] with copper Spice &c. and we are Informed they intend to make a large Investm^t, they have also by the Sloop a Serjeant with about 20 soldiers some Guns and Amunition and we are told design'd to fortifye at Brimlepat^m.

We Condole the Loss our Masters have mett with in the Queen and Dover being taken out of S^t. Helena by 2 french men of Warr and return our humble thanks for the List the Hon^{ble}. Gov^r. was pleas'd to send of what other Ships were arriv'd there with which we most respectfully subscribe.

Since the foregoing is $[\ .\ .\]$ with us Ship Sarum from York $[\ Fort.\ .\ .\]$ West Coast without a grain of R $[\ ice\ .\ .\ .\]$ with some by which $[\ .\ .\ .\]$ Gen $^{\rm II}$. Letters from them of $[\ .\ .\ .\]$ with some Damage putt back the first time, they tell us the Ship was leaky too large and chargeable for their occasions; wherefore they return'd her to us and desir'd us to send a Vessell of about 70 or 80 Tons with which Vessell to send them 40 Tons of rice which wou'd be of great Service to them having bin (sic) dissapoint'd from

RECD. 5

[. . .] (from whence they were us'd to be supply'd) ever since the warr they also desir'd a Number of Slaves with what Millitary Assistance we can spare them people being very sickly there.

We wonder they shou'd send the ship to us since we have nothing to doe with them no further then to supply you with Petre and Stores but being the Compas. ship we are willing to doe what may be most for their Interest, which Consideration made us detain our advise till now to let you know what we design to doe with her on her arrivall before this place. We sent on Board to have her surveyed to know what she might want to be refitt'd in order to send her you in Augt. with rice and stores; but by the report given in; she will cost so much money (besides the great sum they charge her at to us which is ps. 7980) and still be a Crazy ship not fit to encounter hard weather. We therefore concluded to lay her up till Augt. when to sell her for the most we can get of which shall advise you and them and bring the next amount to the creditt We thought this more adviseable.

... Compas. Interest rather then to be three or four thousand Rups. at least on an old Crazy tatter'd Ship and for supplying them with a Vessell. We shall hear from your Hon. &ca. before Augt. what you design to doo with the Presidt. who is such a Vessell as they request.

They want severall other stores which they desir'd, Copy of their List comes herewith least your Hon. &ca. may have an opportunity to supply them therewith; we have no further to add but subscribe

HONBILE, SE. &CA.

By the Callicutta Sloop ye. 23 ulto. came to hand your Honro. &ca. of ye. 4th. RECD. Dtto. and 15 Instant came to hand yours of ye. 29th. March P Dolben by which are 5 July. glad to find the severall ships with our advices Goods and stores sent this season are arriv'd and hope in good time the Ketch Friendship Presidt. and Bengall Merchts. will arrive with you by which sent a considerable Supply of Petre & Stores Copys of what wrote by them comes here-with.

The Redwood & Tankerville being charg'd 3 & md. in the Invoice which you advise, must be a mistake in transcribing for we find by our Registers 'tis but 2rs. & maund and the amount is cast up and carried out so; therefore there will not be occasion for a return'd charge on the Presidency what is charg'd more then prime cost is for boat hire &ca. from the ship.

Copy of the Survey ship Loy¹. Merch^{tt}. by Cap^t. Newnham & Hudson wth. severall Europe Carpenters to assist them [...] Inclos'd and [our] Warehouse Keep^r. [...] her the same day being y^e. 18 Nov^r. 1706. This we shou'd have sent [with] her to you but was omitt'd; We have advis'd the Court of Mannagers thereof \(\psi\) said Ship and Frederick of the 31 Decem^r. so will be no hindrance in adjust[ing] her acco^{tts}. at home.

We Rec^d. ye. severall Europe N[ews] papers &ca. enclos'd and return your Honour &ca. thanks for them. We had much the same from Suratt; and do think the truth not to be doubted, 'tis said the French here have mostly the same, God send an Hon^{ble}. & lasting Peace to our Country.

We can't but be concern'd to hear of the Loss of the Dorothy; Elizabeth, Diamond &ca. our Country shipping by Pyrats; and heartily wish a true course was taken for the quelling them, God send no more [again] into their hands nor meet with Mour. Bonneau in his return from Donmas[ca]reena. We are sorry to find he is so soon moun[...] again for 'tis said of him he will use all endeavours not to return empty handed

We have had much the same acco^{tt}. of [the] Dutch makeing up their business at Surratt your Hoñ &c^a. was pleas'd to send us: but [...] sent circumstances of affairs in the Co[untry] may putt a stop to it and occasion [the...] to Batavia.

As for the armenians [...] certify any thing they say or [...] you the Narrative Cojah [...] for [...] tion he does not [...] Jurisdiction but the Moors and it wou'd not be adviseable or warrantable for us to seize and send him away by force when he comes into our Town least the Comp^a. might be called to an acco^{tt}. to answer the Demands there may be upon him in Bengall to the Mogulls subject; for there has been an instance of this Kind to the Comp^{as}. prejudice.

The 29th last month we were advis'd by severall Shroffs of the Death of Aurenzeeb and some time after we had advis'd from Mess¹⁵. Loyd in Patna and Bugden and Feake in Cassimbuzar of the same after which from all parts & hands confirm'd; occasion'd us thereon to recall Messr⁵. Darell and Spencer going to Patna wth the Comp^{as}. Treasure and Goods who were got about half way on their Journey and are since arriv'd safe with us; We have also order'd them from Cassimbuzar with the Companys Effects to secure what we can here beleiving the Kings Death may cause Revolutions in the Country particularly since the Prince has so long since left Patna leaving one of his son's there and another in Dacca with a small Guard and not knowing how things may succeed in Indostan the two Eldest Brothers being with their Forces marching towards Dilly, and tis generally said here as with you that Azzeem Terra will carry the day; We hear they are each acknowledged as King in their own Camps.

Here [is] disturbance yet but all people apprehensive of it, securing what they have in the best method they can; no one buying any Impor[t] Goods nor adventure any money abroad but makeing money of what they have; bringing their affairs in as Narrow a Compass as they can; which occasion'd us to break off the Contracts we had made wth our Merchts for Goods of the most remotest au[z...]gs till we see how matters will goe with the Government; but the Goods that are made about us of a of a (sic) Day or two Journeys off we have contract'd for with the most substantiall men, so as to make wt. secure provision we can for the next years shipping we have also bought up what Petre we can gett in Hugly to help out the Tonnage though at a dearer rate beleiving, we may not have a supply from Patna in season which with wt. we had lately come down we hope to supply all necessary occasion on the ensuing season; the Princes son is at Dacca & the King's [son] at Cassimbuzar and all things as they were at present but little Trade, 'tis said the Princes [.......] Patna and

the Duan for Burdwan but no certainty thereof. We shall as we hear any alteration or anything else worth writing be sure to advise you constantly how affairs [are].

If you send the Nathaniel or at [...] ship down shall supply her with the gra[in] having made provision thereof bele [...] this Juneture a store no sore.

Rup's are now scarce and it [.....] be more ere Long; Wherefore must [...] Hon's &c's will please to coin [...] come to your Port consign'd this Presidency from England or otherwise.

We have rec^d, the sundry Household necessaries P Dolben as P Invoice which are very ordinary and ill perform'd not near so good as might be expected.

We have recommended this to Mr. Hastings at Vizagapat^m, to be forwarded to you and hope it will arrive safe we call not else to mind at present but remain

We are glad to hear the President &c. Parr arriv'd safe with the Paddy on ye. 20th, the past month we dispatch'd Narrains Puttys Parr with 25 Garce more and by her sent Invoice of that and what sent by the former which hope you have recd.

As yet we have no news of the Yatch when she arrives shall loade her with what Bales we have remaining of the last Investment and fill her with some Brown Cloth of this now made to be wash'd by your Washers, who we must own washes better than ours, tho' cannot imagine the reason said cloth shall he chopped on each peice with the Number; it is sorted too; to prevent its [being] mix'd by your Washers; who we are sensible will make it appear then ours if one Tryall we find can equally sort the Long Cloth Brown shall send the whole to be washed at your Place; which we shall have rec^a faster than the Yatch can fetch it; so [shall] forbear ordering any Firewood to be [. . .] for her except you are pleas'd to di[. . .] carries up that in the room of the [. . . .] Persuant to your Hon'. & c^a orders [. . . .] take possession of M^r. GENTLEMEN

16 JULY.

We imparted to you our thoughts concerning Mr. Garidner in a particular Lettr.

This serves only to advise you that we Judge you will do the Hon^{ble}. Comp^a. a good peice of service in procuring and forwarding for this their Settlem^t. as many Artificers of your place as you can spare or find willing to come hither: Bricklayers & Plaisterers cheifly and the usuall pay for such here is from \$ 6 to \$[...] \$\mathbb{P}\$ mensem and find themselves a D[iam]ond cutter and most other Mech[ani]cks cannot but be usefull here so we must recommend their procuring also for the service of the place we are;

Your Honr &ca. of the 24 & 27 Janry. Last by Mr. Cary we received the 3 March following with the two Slaves and pay their Passage as therein mentioned.

- 2. The Gov^r, design'd by the Hon^{ble}. Company is not yet arriv'd which makes us believe the News the Dutch Ships brought to Batavia y^s. year be true viz^t, that ships Edward and Dover were taken at anchor in S^t. Helena road by three French ships from India; the Gov^r, his [Lady] and Cap^t. Garraway being a shore and the [...] & of the Edw^d. & Dudly being kill'd.
- 3. There is no money belonging to the Widda . . .] Eaton in Cash nor know we of a farthing the R^t. Hon^{ble}. Company is indebted [to] the Deceased [. .] but if any shall appear on the Ballance of [the] Generall Bookes shall remitt as your Ho[ñ . .] directs neither has there been any money [. . .] into the Cash here on M^r. Joseph Marshall's Estate the Trustees acquaint they rem[itt] now P Bill the full amount of what [. . . .] as also does M^r. John De lapie his full amount] due to M^r. Chardin.
- 4. The yearly a [.] the Orphans we now remitt to [.] & Church Wardens by Bill of [. . . .] & as [.] left by M^r. [.] to the [. . .] of your pla [.] left by M^r. [.] For the discharging of our Bills by the Ketch Huglyana return our thanks as also for those \$\psi\$ sloop success and were it not for your Hon^r. &cⁿ favourable acceptance of our Bills shou'd not tell how to maintain the Garrison. We kept going on with our Fortifications till March last at which we discharged all our Cooleys beleiving a ship from Europe might arrive us; and what is done since is by our Slaves only, we cou'd not any ways propose to lay out such a sum wholy in a Pepper since for these two years last have not had any Comfortable subsistance; but what we were forc'd [to] procure from Batavia and out of [vessels.] that touched here and glad to gett them at any prises and opportunity offred (sic); We have now by us in Godown Pepper Black Bahars three hundred; besides what at our Nothern (sic) Paggers and cou'd we have been supplyed with Doll's. proper for purchase of Pepper might have had more than as many Tuns.

Mr. Wallis does not as yet appear we wish for the speedy arrivall of the Hugliana with what soldiers and Stores procurable as advis'd in your Honrs. &ca. Inclos'd comes our Warehouse Keeprs. List of necessarys as also of proper Goods for the Company of the which intreat a supply \$\mathscr{P}\$ first [. .].

Cap^t. Wilfrid Hart & M^r. Robert Ingram arriv'd here the 7th. Instant from Batavia and haveing on board them some Mexico Dollars we requested of them to spare us 8000 & to take Bills on your Hon^r. &c^a. allowing them 7 P lb to which they agreed and in return desir'd us to spare them 70 Bahars Pepper they paying for the same in good money with the usuall custom of a halfe penny P pound which dureing their stay here we purchas'd without lessening the Quantity aforementioned in the Godowne; we not being willing to let slip such an opportunity of supplying our selves, and dispairing of any from Europe on acco^{tt}. y^c. Edward and Dudly's miscarriage which together with many pressing from our datteies Panlimia and Sangrans to take money out of this ship, they alledging that the Natives were uneasy in keeping their Pepper by them and the [R^t.] Hon^{ble}. Comp^a. having none to purchase it wou'd induce them to send it by prow's too [. . .] Places are the Reasons that we comply'd [with their request and accordingly spar'd them [. . .] Bahars Pepper which hope will g[ive . . .] no reasons for any disgust from our [R.] Hon^{ble}. Masters, Since for months be fore we were lost able to purchase one grain and [. . . .] as cou'd do by borrowing to main [tain them] selves and pay our Soldiers w [. . .] longer delay'd might have been [. . . .]

Con[...] that it wou'd [......] Honble. Compa. to no small Charge to have quieted the Natives being of such a Fickle Temper that those that are our Friends to day, tomorrow will be our Enemys; as the Compa. has woefully experienced. On the foregoing have presumed to draw largely on your Honr. &ca. it being no way possible to have avoided it and hope your Honr. &ca. will be pleased to favour them with your kind acceptance assureing your Honr. &ca. we shall at all times be as Cautious as possible in drawing it being for our Credit to make this place as easy to our Honble. Masters as may be of whom received and to whom payable is as follows viz:

MECD. 12 MAY. The 19th of May happen'd a fire in this Town to the No.ward burnt down 1050 houses; the Inhabitants lost in Graine & Goods to the amount of 25000 Rups.

The Dutch haveing rec^d from Pollicat 120 Oxen Ladeing Long Cloth and Sallampores from Datcheerone 130 Oxen Ladeing with white cloth the Boat that went for Pettipolla bro^t. 14 Oxen ladeing of choy Goods; more Goods being ready Rajas comeing to Pettepp[olla] seiz'd the Phowsdar took 10000 Rup^s. of the Kings Money; frighted the Merch^t for bringing their Goods they are now going [to] send a Boate for the remains and oth[er . . .] Goods being ready.

The primo of June arr[ived ye.] Dutch parr from Nagapatam [. . .] and 13 Souldiers having unloaded [. . . .] Brass Guns about 100 lb. a peice [. . .] of [. . .] ten thousand [. . . .] powder with shott 12 Chests said to be spice 200 plancks with small Cask, the 2 Curt. order'd a Boat aboard the Parr to transport the other Goods from the Parr and lade them on board ye. sloop which was done; being Gunns, Powder Shott and small armes, and from this Factory send some Copper, in a few days more expect the arrivall of two Sloops and a Parr from Nagapatam with 100 Soulders 50 of them to be Grenadeers, ten Souldiers for Pollicatt 15 Souldiers for Dattacherone Factory the other two stay here the occasion of these Souldiers they discourse two ways Vizt. haveing received so many affronts at all [their] Factorys forceing presents more then customary; stopping their Goods, seizing [the] Merchts. entring their Town of Pollicott, takeing money from the Inhabitants haveing kept a just accott will now force them to return the money and make them content with Customary Presents formerly given in the King of Golcondah's time; if not they will seize the country before they had great troubles in Java & Batavia, they cou'd not move in it; those troubles in Surrat, being over, the Mogull dead, they have a fair prospect to proceed Kingdom void of Governmt haveing kept a fair Correspondance with [those] Rajahs that have great Power, Constant advices running between them [. . .] kept private this makes them move in their [. . .]

Then they [. . .] the abuses from the Governm*. are great, by this meanes [. . . .] bring them to a Complyance, now they have reduced Java and all about Batavia to their former Obedience, there will come from Batavia 12 Large ships well mann'd first to Brimlepat^m. meddle of July will rectifie the abuses there; from thence to Datcherrone & Pollicott then for this Porte all Difference compleated all Souldiers goes aboard saile for Pollicatt and from thence to Pollichery intending to seize the Place.

The 5th. Currtt the Dutch sloope sailed for Brimlepat^m. with the Souldiers, seven of them being Granadeers intending to make a small Fort at Brimlepat^m. as I am inform'd.

There good Success at Surratt gives them encouragement as they relate, their former Customes paid in Surrat being now abated one third, which is great in their Commerce and hope in a small time to gett that clear; the Dutch have taken a new method in rectifying their affairs and will prosecute it which I understood [. . .] their Cheif they are very inquisitive abo[ut] our Settlement in these Factorys; why [. . .] not People to the Factory's saying if our P[eople] were here both together could make the [m. . .] comply; these Souldiers are drawn [. . .] zealous that come hither [. . .] Guns that are mounted up [. . .] town being the Lance [. . .] was [. . .] at Corrango wh [. . .] gave to Thom's. Keerolcoe.

In few days; they will Lade the parr with Bale Goods being to saile for Pollicatt haveing Goods now in the Factory ready embail'd about 600 Bailes about ten Bales at the Washerman.

The Duan is return'd from Datcherone being now at Elloare in 15 days more expected here none of the Rajahs paying any thing to him, Just now came Dutch Peons from Golcondah informes us Rustome Dill hath taken Vast summs of money from all the Inhabitants entertaining all that comes for Souldiers Peons relate this wh[. . .] now in their Letters that cannot come to our Knowledge presently.

The ground renters entreat your Hon^r, to order the paym^t, of their money due to them please to remitt some money for the People Sallarie being now six months I humbly crave Leave

Affairs here then are at present our having not had a ship this last year from you nor one these two years from Europe occasions a great many jealousies, and it is as much as we can doe from hindring the Subjects cutting off their Kings; which if they once attain beleive will not stop at acting any mischeif against the R^t. Hon^{ble}. Comp^a. althô their many protestations that they have no dislike to them yet as our present Circumstances are cannot give much Creditt.

We are heartily sorry for the Loss of the Comp^a. Settlem^t. at Benjarr; God preserve us from the like here for should they offer any such Erruption we cou'd not be able to defend our selves being in want of every thing ex[cept] Great Guns small armse Powder & shot we wou'd have sent a List of what wanting but having sent so many formerly l[ong] your Hon^r. &c^a. to supply us with what y[ou . . .] think convenient, a Quantity of Guns [. . .] wou'd be very acceptable mo[st of what we] have being old and damaged, [yet . . .] supply of Souldiers p^r. the H[uglyana will] be very [wellcome] having since [. . .] two [. . .] mist out of our small Number.

By your first you take notice of Aurenzeb the great Mogulls death as we did to your Hon. &c. in ours of the 23d. of the same month which was as soon as we had confirmation of it and you likewise make some proposition in order to gett the Comp. privilidges confirm'd and obtaining what new may be necessary we shall be very ready to comply in such case or any that may add to the Companys benefitt; we apprehend what priviledge the Comp. enjoys at present in Bengall may be confirm'd and procured without the sending of any person to Court through the Interest of the present Duan and Nabob that is or may be for they seem now to be very fond as formerly of our resetling the subordinations but of this we shall be better able to judge when things are intirely setled; the accor. we have of the Government

RECD. Hill ever tooke notice to us that she was the Cos. own ship we have had abundance of trouble with her sea men for their pay due to them web, we promis'd on the Capt. coming down; but cou'd not keep them at work on their ships for want of it; notwithstanding we were forced to Im pri son some of them on that Score but now you advise us of the Cap^t. death and sent us down y^e. . Herewith comes our Diarys Consultations & Paymasters acco^{tts}. [. . .] acc^{ts}. Cash for the months of July and August by which you will see we have no money uninvested but what serves for our Charges and further more we are in arrears near twelve months rents to the Duan besides Pyroes money for which M^r. Shipping, nor will the supply you intend us be sufficient; since most part of it will be due to the Merch^{ts}. before its arrival therefore hope you will send a Larger or the Investment [will] be Impeaded, Thirty of our Peons have lain at Conimeer by order this fifteen days to meet the mony which is a great charge.

Persuant to your Honour &ca. order We endeavoured all possible to persuade our Merchis. to augment the Investment thirty or forty Thousand Pagodas; but they assured us what they had already Engaged would be as much as they could compleat in soe short a time, since the rainy season was comeing on; so yesterday we discoursed severall particular Merchants of Coodalore; who after a long Debate, agreed to undertake the Provision of Goods to the amount of between Thirty & forty Thousand Pagodas which are proportioned according to the former Investment & by that we presumed is ment a Proportionable Quantity of Brown and blew Cloth; We wish you would please to approve of a greater; fearing the Washers we have will not be sufficient; This Contract is made at the same prizes and on the same terms, as that agreed with the Joynt Stock Merchants, at the conclusion of which they declared, that if we made any Delays in their Payments, they should not be able to bring in these Goods for the January Ships, but, We promised them the Contrary, therefore request you will enable us to comply therwith.

All the blew Cloth can be gott ready shall be sent by Cap^t. Hart, who, we expect from Porto Novo in a Day or two.

Inst. we have recd. acknowledging the Receipt of [yours] Rec. the dated the 30th past month and 2d present; we [. .] wrote you the 6th which 19 Octobe inclosed Invoice and [bill] of Loading for one hundred thirty and [. . ,] Bales Loaden on the Resolution [. . .] is arrived in safety.

With great [. . .] observe [. . . between the Casts, and that the Deserters are returned to their habitations, the hardships they have suffred whilst abroad, we hope will deterr them from attempting the like, for the future and occasion their discovering the Ring Leaders and promoters of their divisions in order to their having their deserved reward.

We have signified to the Particular Merchants your Hon. &cas. approvall of the Contract we have made with them to the amount of between thirty and forty thous. Pagods; who we have strictly Charged to procure all the Washers they possibly could in order not to exceed (if possibly to be avoided) [a gr] eater quantity of browne and blew Cloth in this Contract, then in proportion to what agreed for with the Joint Stock Merchants; both which have possitively declared (as they also did on signeing the Contracts) that if we are not supply'd with money to pay them for the Cloth as fast as they bring it in, and according to agreement we must not expect they can bring soe great a quantity of Cloth as Contracted for; we must acknowledge have allways found them very willing to assist the Company to the Utmost of yr. power, and readily to Concurr in advancing all the Stock they have for carrying on their Investments; but, we cannot imagine how our Merchants can be Esteem'd men of sufficient Estates, to provide Goods to the amount of [. . . but] one hundred and forty thousand [. . .] with fifty thousand, or we [are] able to drill them into impossibilitys; need not much persuasion to doe all they can, an Instance of which, they have lately given, [. . .] is your Hon^r. &c^a. insensible, that the greatest part of their stock must be advanced to the Weavours in the Country, or a stop will be made of their makeing Cloth; which never is received from them till the close of the Investment, from the whole we presume you will Conclude it impossible for these Investments to be compleated for the January Shipping except you supply us with money; which we [. . .] often write for, then absloute Necessity in the Companys affairs require, in order to have these Investments compleated by the time you expect them.

The Ship Dutchess arrived at Vizagapatam Y^e. 12th, and was dispatch'd y^e. 16th. Inst. from thence, M^r. Hastings advises they took the Treasure ashore; which Doubtless they will be able to Invest and give you an Account thereof.

We are heartily glad yº. St. George is arrived with you; We hope she may be suddenly down here.

We take notice of the Tonnage you are able to provide for this Year's shipping and We have no reason to believe that the Government will have any further Change at present, We [. . . .] news as what you sent us from Patna and other places, We see nothing to the contrary, but that we shall be able to Load the Howland and St. George both directly for England the One in November and the other by the latter end of January which will be all We can pretend to and as We advised you in our last, you must not depend on us for any Bales for the Kent, for we shall have Enough to do to dispatch these ships with tolerable Cargoes and in time little or no freight will be procurable for Persia, or Mocho, occasioned by the stop of tradefrom Patna and Wee have too great a stock in the Country to think of letting any of our ships [. . .] freight this year; We shall be obliged to give these two ships half their Loading in Saltpetre as P Agreement in Charterparty, Therefore can't justly tell what Quantity Wee shall send you up by the Dutchess, for We have now in the house about 600 Tons, at Patna our Honbie. Masters by coining their Silver, but silver is now come near it's old price, for Pillar Dollars before the Kings death Wee sold for 208 Siccas for 240 Sicca weight and now Wee sell for 207 Batta at 11\$\top Cent. The mint is kept at Cassimbuzar.

Wee here inclose you one Rupee of Shaw Allum's Stamp, which was coined since his coming to the Throne by his own order and We send it for a Sample to make by and desire that what Siccas you send us for the future may be of this Inscription for these new Rupees pass more currently in payments into the Treasury.

Wee note your detaining M^r. Benn, Writer designed for this place with you; being disappointed of Two the Comp_o promised to send you this year; The money you mention belonging to the young Gentleman is in one of the Comp^{as}, chests of Treasure on board the s^t. George. The Company advise us thereof in their Generall Letter, so soon as the Ship arrives the Silver shall be delivered to M^r. Sheldon as you direct.

The Pacq^{tt}, by the Dutchess Wee rec^d, being a Duplicat of what Rec^d.

On the 25 Inst. Wee did according to our [. . .] ship Nathaniel with 40 Tons of Saltpetre 600 baggs wheat and filled up with Rice, they returning Sev¹¹. hundred baggs from the Ship; not being able to take them in, when Cap¹. Dennis to our great Surprise sent us in his Petition for boats to unload his ship proving leaky and not able to proceed to Madrass; They say the Leak is in her bows, which happen'd by not being well caulked, and the Officers report that she will be in a Condition to take in Goods in less then a months time, the ship being thus disabled from proceeding, Wee did resolve to discharge her from the Service of the Hon^{ble}. Company and that her Demorage ceased from the 25th. Inst. a Copy of the Commanders Petition to us and our declaration to him, putting the ship out of the [. . . .] vice comes enclosed and when she is refitted & on a survey capable of Ca rying the Comp^{as}. Wee wrote your Honour &c^a. Y^c. 26th. Aug^t. by the Ship Metapollam, Who in No. 77 her going down on the long sand struck and sprung a leak, so forced up the river to Rec^b. 27 refitt; which Letter comes herewith to which referr you.

Since which Wee have been favoured with three of yours dated y^e. 12th. Ins^{tt}. & y^e. 9th. August & 3^d. September Rec^d. y^e. 3^d. & 24th. ult^o. & primo Inst. to which Wee reply.

Abdull Hameedee that came Passenger on the S⁵. George has been with us & Wee shall be very ready to do him any Service that lays in our power; and he shall have his passage up to Madrass again on any of the Company's Ships when he requires it and directions shall be given to the Comander to treat him with civility and respect.

Wee Rec^d. the Bill of Loading and Invoice amounting to Pagod^s. 106068. 29 ship Howland; which Treasure & Goods Wee have Rec^d. and have given your Presidency due creditt [for] the same.

Wee do send you [. . .] this ship and [. . . .] send you more by the Dutchess, & Wee desire you would be pleased for the time to come to let us know in the beginning of the Season what Stores and Packing stuff you may have Occasion for; that Wee may be a providing the same early so that you may have them the best in their Kinds.

Wee are very much concern'd for the ill news you advise us, that our Factory in Banjarr is cutt of by the Natives; which will be a great Dissapointment to the Company, as yet the Blenheim is not arrived nor any other Ships from those parts, Wee have sent down our Sloops & Pilots to await their arrivall and if they come in time Wee will endeavour to freight one Ship for Persia and another we will load with what Bales, Saltpetre &c. Goods Wee can procure, & send them to you to take in those Bales you advised us you can sp[are] and should there be a third, Wee should be putt to our shifts to know how to Dispose of her; However Wee will use our utmost Endeavours to find out some way or other that she may not lie wholy idle, of which shall advise you so soon as any of those ships arrived with us.

The Country Government here [. . .] stand, nor do wee know very well what to [make] of it; for since Shaw Allum's coming to [the] Thorne here are no Vice Kings [. . .] Emperors two sons are still with him & Wee are told that he has ordered one to your parts & the other to Cobull, which Governments they both refuse, for what reason wee know not; most people are of Opinion that there is no good Understanding between the two Brothers and that new troubles will arise, nor as yet has the New Emperor entred the City of Agra, but remains in his Camp without the City; But now the Rains are over; Wee beleive a small time will show us what they are a working out, which Wee will be sure to advise you from Time to Time

what comes to our Knowledge relating to the Country Government and Wee desire the same from you.

Wee are very much concern'd that yo. Right and Left hand Casts have given you so much trouble and uneasyness, Wee doubt not but by your prudent management, you have over come that difficulty and that all the Inhabitants are returned again to their own habitations.

There came no Medicines out by this years shipping either for your Presidency or This; which Wee are in great want off; Had your Doctor sent us a List of what you might have occasion for, Wee would have Endeavour'd to have Purchased some out of the Europe ships for the use of your Presidency.

Wee [.] the Sea Customers List of [...] take ca [...] receive accordingly.

• Cap^t. Hamilton is arrivd here and since M^r. Maxwell has Ended [his] buisyness by reference, Wee have Delivered him up his Ship S^t. George, which was under arrest on Account of M^r. Maxwels Debt.

The ship Nathaniel being refitted & surveyed by two Europe Comanders & Two ship wrights; and They giving it in from under their hands, that she is in a fitt Condition to carry the Companys goods, and being now Loaden as she was; when this misfortune befell her, Wee have taken her into Demo[rage] this Eighth Day of October, Copy of the [. . . .] as also of Cap^t. Dennis's Letter comes in the Packett to which referr you.

Wee have Laden on this Ship [. . .] were [. . .] goods and Stores to the amount of [. . .] Rupees 9887.1 6 as # Invoice and Bill of Loading inclosed.

The Hon^{ole}. Tis but highly reasonable but your Honr. &ca. should consign your Goods here to whom you think convenient and your supr. Cargoes are better treated then they treat us or our Broakers, and whenever they find the want of the Companys House and our assistance they will confess itt, and not before and this their Discreet Discourses and Publishing their own Circumstances will bring on them and our Masters and instead of having a Seat in the Custome House wee and they and our Goods are in a very fair way to dwell there and this in a year or two more, and since wee are so often told and threatned and that without reason that they will carry your Goods to the Custome house wee hope you wont be dissatisf[ied . . .] that wee are before hand in that M[. . .] doe not belong to [. . .] secure our Masters Privilidges and by this way both parties will be content One in giving to the Custome house and having the Shauband [er] for their Protector and wee in seing your Honrs. affairs thrive after this modell of your Factors own framing. The English Affairs are wove after a strange Contexture; att Bandar every Supr. Cargoe and Capt. shall runn up & down declaring he has brought a Cargoe of Goods and are not the Companys but his and is at Liberty to doe what he will with them, and wee at Spaha[n] are obliged to swear'tis all Lyes and malice of the Shaubanders and that they are all the[se your] own Goods; and more then this Wee are always [...] forced to spend vast sums on this very accot. to keep the Compt. free from custome in fine till the Compt. does as the Dutch has done already and take their trade into their own hands 'twill be impossible one face and mannagement sha appear in these affairs and when you duly consider itt wee presume you will be of the same Opinion.

Four french Ships that attackt the Dutch three Ships under the Line as they were coming out Sunck one took another and the third gott to Battavia and in their returne home to Brest they took two ships from under y. Cannon of St. Hellena which the french Prints call the Dover and the Queen but wee don't know what Ships they are Compas., Private, or men of Warr.

Prince Eugene joined the Duke of Savoy, and beat the French from before Turiwne with great Loss and have wonne the Citty of Millan the Dukedome thereof and in Flanders after a Glorious Campaign the Forces are returned into good Winter Quarters, but King Char[les] after marching within 6 Leagues of Madrid was forced by Phi[?] into with the army Superior, so our farther then Portugall by the last Intelligence some distant Propositions of peace are made & thrown up and down but nothing appears near a Conclusion and this is the Substance of the Europe News wee have the Prints coming enclosed wee referr to them.

The King of Persia being guided by women and Eunucks is also turned Merchant having ordered by the high stewards application 4000 Tomans to be paid out of his Treasury to Mizza Montiza to buy goods att Bandar and sell them againd [sic] 2/3 of the Proffit for the King and 1/3 for himself and the Kogom mentions but 4000 yet this Instrument of the stewards, want permitt the Mists to buy without giving him 10 \$\psi\$ Cent and being afraid of the Stewards [...] who is also an Eunuch in highest authority with the King they desist from buying and your Supra. Cargo's intend to come here with their Goods which if they do we shall not be wanting on our Parts to give them all the assistance wee can and help them to the best Prises for their Goods and shall endeavour by next season to gett this Obstacle removed which we cannot doe now the King being att Mushatt 40 Journeys off.

The French Envoy Extraordinary and his Retinue which have made noise for these 20 months with his Presents and Charracter is gone back again without any [...]ience el [. . . .] of the King or [. . . .] and is sent back without any [...] Kodomanta does [...] Constantinople and the Consull att [...] he ntended to doe
