PRESIDENT & GOVE. &CA. COUNCIL OF FORT ST. GEORGE.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have received your favours of the 15th, and 20th, with a supply of

twenty thousand (20,000) Pagodas.

We now transmit you two Indents for Civil and Military Stores which we are much in want of particularly the Angelee and Mango Plank and Redwood Piles, the Works being at a stand for the latter, and the former to build three new Massoolahs, being reduced to one which will much distress the squadron if we do not get more ready against their arrival.

Enclosed is copy of a Letter we have reced from our Military Storekr in relation to his employ. We concur with him in opinion of the necessity of the Officers keeping a Diary of their Expence of Stores and of a method to make the seapoys more carefull of their Arms, We therefore request your Orders on these Heads, as also whether we shall charge the stores &ca. deliver'd the seapoys to the Nabob's account.

We have now 253 Bales on hand for which we have no other Conveyance but the Dragon sloop who cannot carry above 80 Bales. We therefore request

your Honr. &ca. will think of one in time.

Our Warehousekeeper has delivered in the accompanying List of several sorts of Goods remaining in the Import Warehouse, for which there is little or no demand at the place and they have already lain by so long as to be a good deal damaged. We therefore request your Honour &ca. directions in

what manner to dispose of them. The Coloured Broad Cloth, Velvets, Culjeed Flannels and Imbossed Cloth, if you think proper may be sold at Outery but the stuffs We hear will not go off.

WORSHLL. SIR & SIRS

Upon the perusal of the Genl. Letter from the Honble the President & Council accompanying the Remarks of the Committee of Accounts, I thoughtit would not be improper to explain those articles relating to the Storekeeper before the Committee sat here & communicate a few Observations that have occurr'd to me I hope therefore you will excuse my giving you this trouble.

Their 1st. remark is That no Diary has been kept which has prevented their coming at an explanation of the disbursements. A Diary has been regularly kept ever since I have had the employs for proof of which I now lay it before you, and I have directed one to be added to the Accounts immediately altho, I am not order'd to do it till May next when the new method of keeping the Books is to commence, it should have been done before but that I found it was not customary in the present method.

The 2^d is That in the month of June last there is a purchase of 140 ps. of Wax Cloth at 3 Pas. Piece amounting to Pas. 420 which they observe is both in price and quantity very Extraordinary. As to the price it is the same as has been charged for many Years both in Storehouse and Warehouse but to convince you it cannot be deem'd Extravagant I flatter myself you will pardon my adding an exact Account of the Cost of making that parcel of Wax Cloth.

however as the Honble the President and Council do not approve of that rate you will please to observe in the month of December I have charged 48 Ps.

made up before the order arrived at 2.27 \$\mathbb{P}^s\$. the same it is charged at Madrass & I submit it to your Worship &ca. Judgement who know the price Wax has bore all this year at this place, whether I shall not be a loser by it. As to the Quantity's being large it was not sufficient for the supply of Garrison Camp & Trichonopoly so far from it that since June there has been more Expended, the lessening that is not in my Power.

The 3^d is in regard to Vouchers. The Indents for stores are my vouchers & shall always accompany the Accounts to the Committee and I am ready to produce the same for all Accounts already pass'd, but I can give no Account how they are disposed of after I deliver them.

The 4th. is that I had no Advance of Fanams to defray the Charges General in the month of June, this I own was a neglect for which I can plead no other Excuse but that I followed an old practice, but as that is now disapproved, I am ready to account for the difference for those months that I have received no fanams, which the Cash accounts will shew are very few, in future an exact account of the Receits, Issues, and Ballance of fanams shall be added to the foot of the Account Current.

As the Storekeeper's Diary can consist of nothing but the Indents he receives, which can give no light how the Stores are expended, If I might presume to advise the officers who receive them should keep a Diary of their Issues, you will then be able to judge how far necessary the large consumption of stores may be in this Garrison and what may be retrenched with safety.

As the greatest part of the Charges General arise from the great number of Artificers continually employed repairing arms, particularly those of the seapoys who daily bring fifteen or twenty firelooks to be mended, which plainly shews they are very careless of them, it would therefore save a great charge if some method could be fixed upon to make them more carefull either by punishing or making them pay for all that are damaged through Neglect.

As great part of the charges & Expence of stores are by the Seapoys who are all now paid by the Nabob, I should be glad of your directions whether that also should be carried to his account.

There is an European Armourer charged on the Military Storekeeper's Books at five Pags. Month who has been disabled at Camp and can be of no further use in that Business, I therefore request he may be put upon the Pension List.

This waits on your Honr. &ca. by the Fortune Snow by whom I have sent 101 Bales of Cloth as # Invoice & Bill of Lading enclosed. You were pleased to order some time since a Bale of the different sorts of Goods made here to be sent you; Beteellas there are none; Fine Long Cloths you excepted against, therefore I cannot find anything that can I think answer the Company's purpose except Percauls a small Bale of which comes herewith. If your Honr. &ca. approve them you may have any quantity made and as Fine as you please. Herewith comes an Indent for sundry stores which you will be pleased to send by the return of the vessel; The Gunpowder is most part of it for Jaggerpet Rauze who will pay for it, and whom Vizaram Rauze has desired me to supply; I would willingly oblige him at this time for many Reasons. The Tar is likewise for sale. Enclosed comes the account of Quick Stock, Annual Report and Muster Roll, Fine scarlet having been sent last Year instead of common Scarlet is the Occasion of our wanting that article for the annual Presents. An early supply of cash would forward the Investment of the ensuing year. The remainder of the cloth shall be sent by the Sloop next month.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Having now made some progress in my Examination into the Accounts and state of this Settlem[†]. I take leave to lay the same before you. In the course of my report many things will be represented which your Hon^r. &c^a. were before fully acquainted with by the Committee of Accounts, yet, that nothing may be left out which has come to my knowledge wherein I think the Honble Companys Interest is concerned, hope you will excuse the repetition. I shall begin with the Accounts of this settlement from the month of January 1755 for tho the Committee has taken notice no further back than June, before that time-many Irregularities and over charges have been made worthy your Hon^r. &c^{as}. notice.

Mr. Hopkins as MILITARY STOREKEEPER has himself provided great quantitys of stores such as Cordage, Catridge Boxes, Hammers, Pickers &ca. most of which are sold to the Company at exorbitant prices. I know not better how to explain this than by inserting the price charged, compared with the prime cost, which with a trifling difference are as follows.

Your Honr. &ca. are the Judges how far the above Profit is reasonable in consideration of Mr. Hopkins being sometimes obliged to advance his own money for the purchase, I shall only remark that he broke several old Gun Carriages to Pieces and appropriated the Iron to his own use. The Lascars were employed to make his Cordage till my arrival here and several candies of loose coir, used in package of Stores sent to Camp and in the Garrison service are indifferently with the Cordage charged at 18 Pagodas P Candy.

The foregoing are the material Articles of stores provided by Mr. Hopkins. I shall now give you some accot. in what manner they have been expended, tho' this is the most difficult task I have to perform, for at this settlement have been kept neither Diary of Stores expended, Day Book, or indeed any other Account that should properly furnish me the means of doing it. I hope therefore if I am not so particular as your Hon^r. &ca. might have expected, I shall stand excused.

The monthly Expences of Candles for this Garrison are two Maunds.

In the month of October are charged 33 Pieces of Wax Cloth to cover the Locks of the Military & sepoys.

In the month of August are charged 17 Ps. of Wax cloth for packing of Stores. By the best information I can get, only $12\frac{1}{2}$ Ps. were used. Difference in this Account is $4\frac{1}{2}$ Pieces or Pags. 14 18.

The monthly Garrison charge only of Wax Cloth this year has been about 4 Pieces, a small part of which was expended in covering Letters, the rest, as I am informed, for the private use of the Chief, Officers &c^a. But as a proof to your Hon^r. &c^a. that M^r. Hopkins has overcharged the Company in the quantity of Wax Cloth, I beg leave to make the following observation. There is no such Head as Purchase of Stores in the Deve Cotah Books till May 1754, from which time is charged to the Company 397 Pieces, and M^r. Hopkins purchased only 310 P^s., therefore the difference in that account plainly appears to be 87 P^s. or Pag^s. 261.

It has likewise been a custom in this place for the Gentlemen to receive small quantitys of Gunpowder & other articles out of the Company's magazine for their own private use. Tho' the Expence has not yet been very great it may in time grow larger, and then perhaps, what at first was an Indulgence may be look'd upon as a perquisite.

I endeavour'd to get an explanation of those articles specifyed under the Head of Charges Merchandize but was told both by Mr. Hopkins and the Conicoplies that there had been no particular account kept of them. A most surprizing negligence in conicoplies, and what no one could have expected to find among a people known to be so carefull in keeping their Vouchers and Accounts by them. But that mistery was afterwards unravell'd when the Company's Conicoply before Mr. Hopkins declared they had been order'd by him to burn their Accounts and desired his Writer might be called as a Witness of it, who the next day, before Mr. Brickenden own'd he did hear Mr. Hopkins order the conicoply Narrain, to destroy any Accounts that might discover the overcharges that had been made, or Words to that purpose.

The above being the most material charges made by Mr. Hopkins, as Military Storekeeper, I now come to those under the Head of Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn. In the month of April is charged 12 days hire to 244 Coolys carrying Stores to Camp Ps. 244. By the Conicoply's Account who went with the Stores there was only 10 days Batta paid to those coolys amounting to Pas. 131–19–20 the difference in that article is Ps. 112–16–60.

The Batta to Seapoys, that escorted those Stores to Camp is charged Ps. 33-22, the same conicoply gives an account of only Ps. 22, the difference is Ps. 11-22.

In the month of June is charged 6 Days Batta to 1 Subidar, 2 Jemmidars, 4 Havildars, & 89 Sepoys escorting Col¹. Heron to Fort S^t. David amounting

to Ps. 53-36. The Subidar gives me an account of only 1 Subidar, 1 Jemmidar, 5 Havildars, and Naikes, and 53 Sepoys, which amount to Ps. 28-6. The difference is Ps. 24-30-36.

In the month of August is charged 9 days hire to 315 Coolys carrying Stores to Camp amounting \bowtie P^s . 236–9. The Conicoply that went with them gives an account of only 8 days hire to 185 Coolys amounting to P^s . 123–12, the difference in that Account is P^s . 112–33.

The Batta to Seapoys that escorted those stores to camp is charged 18 days Batta to 6 Havildars & Naickes & 30 Seapoys amounting to P^s. 52–9. The Subidar gives an account of only 15 days Batta to 4 Havildars and 20 Seapoys amounting to P^s. 27–6, the difference is P^s. 25–3.

There are 4 Peon's Wages and Batta charged to the Nabob Ps. 6–24. Those Peons are also charged to the Company on the Peon Roll.

The above I took leave to mention to your Honr. &ca. as a few Instances of Overcharge may have been made at this Settlement. In its proper place I shall sum up the whole amount; for the truth of which I have very good authority.

I now come to the Head of Charges Extraordinary In which I shall mention this Instance.

In the month of May is charged P⁵. 112–8 twenty days Batta to 1 Subidar, 2 Jemmedars, 15 Havildars & 45 Seapoys, going with Mr. Hopkins into the country. Is it not most Extraordinary that he should enter such a charge on the Books when there did not alltogether go with him 10 sepoys? and here I think it may not be improper to acquaint your Honr. &ca. that in February last Comrapah, the Company's Conicoply, went to Combiconum Feast, and took to attend him 2 Subidars, 4 Jemmidars, 8 Havildars, 4 Colour Men, 5 Trumpets, and Tom Toms, and 114 Sepoys, Had he been permitted to take ten or a dozen sepoys to go with him, it would have been no great matter; But such a number I think is prostituting the service and doing him an honour that little became him. Mr. Hopkins says he knew nothing of it. Camrapah has Farm'd or let a great deal of money out on Mortgage of the Countrys, and I assure your Honr. &ca. the Sepoys have been often employ'd by him to manage his private business there, not much to the credit of the Honble Company.

I now come to the Head of Charges General in which are the following Overcharges.

Two Cattamarans for carrying Notes to Vessels Ps. 6.30 the Cattamaran fellows ran away in May & have reced. no Wages till December which is 9 Months amounting to Ps. 61–18, I think 1 Cattamaran in constant pay will be, sufficient.

Country Musick Ps. 2-24 which are 2 Peons charged in the Peon Roll. Wages to 2 Tom Tom fellows & 2 Crooked Horn fellows Ps. 2-24 charged also in the Peon Roll.

Under this Head and Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn are charged Ps. 5–18 for the hire of one Boat & 2 Cattamarans which amount to Yearly Ps. 66. Those Boats & Cattamarans may be made for Ps. 45 which turns out cheaper than hiring them. It is necessary a Boat should be at the Fort River, where there is now only a Cattamaran; The difference in Expence is but a Trifle.

Under the Head of Charges Garrison I take leave to remark that there have been great abuses in the payment of seapoys. Almost all Capt. Spear's Servants were upon the Rolls, with Mr. Hopkins's Baker, Iron Man and Washerman. The last of which I think is very Extraordinary, for under the Head of Peon's and Servant's Wages is charged 1 Washerman 1 Pagoda.

On the Lascar's Roll, including Pentioners are 63 Persons; If your Honr. &ca. have occasion for Lascars at Madrass 20 might be spar'd from the service of this Garrison.

Fs. Ca.

The Oil is charged at 1-60 \$\ Seer; At the dearest time it does not cost above one fanam \$\ Seer.

Under the Head of Fortifications & Repairs I have to remark to your Honr. &ca. notice that the Company this year were put to the expence of above Ps. 150 for new Bricks when at the same time many Lacks of Old lay neglected like Rubbish about the Fort. As to the number of Bricklayers and Coolys employed, it is impossible for me to Judge of the over charge, for no particular Account can be produced.

I now come to Peon's and Servants Wages. In regard to which I take leave to acquaint you that on any arrival here Kistna, the Chief Peon took in 9 new ones to make the real number equal to the Compliment charged. I have by dismissing those & some others reduced that Expence Ps. 39 monthly. I hope your Hon^r. will Excuse the mistake I made in saying 20 were sufficient for the service of this Settlem^t. I meant 20 for the service of the Fort, besides the mettoe Peons.

I shall now say something regarding that material Head Batta, On which I must make this General remark that Mr. Hopkins has disbursed no sum of money on the Company's Account where Batta could be got, but he has done it. It is extraordinary that he should erect a Head of Batta on Rupees, where the loss was only imaginary, and not do it on fanams, by which there has been a difference to the Company of some thousands of Pagodas, and notwithstanding it was at first so plainly pointed out to him from the Presidency, he has never received but one advance of fanams, which was Ps. 500—worth from Fort St. David in April 1754, and again tho' he has erected a Head of Batta for the difference of the Deve Cotah Exchange of Rupees from the Company's price yet, in Expence, some months he has charged them at the latter.

I shall now without troubling your Hon^r. &c^a. with more calculations close with this general one, That M^r. Hopkins has got from the 1st. Jan^{ry}. to 31st. Octo^r. 1755 by the best information I can procure,

On the purchase of Stores ... Pags. 1150 0 0 On the overcharges of Sepoys, Bullock & Cooly hire, Batta to Sepoys & Coolys, Batta on Fanams, &ca 2350 0 0 Pagodas ... 3500 0 0

In the year 1754 the accounts have been kept in the same manner, with this difference only, That, as the charge of Stores Batta and Cooly hire were then more than this year, the Company were then more defrauded.

Having finished the remarks I have been able to make on the Irregularities & Overcharges in the Accounts of this Settlement. I shall acquaint your Hon^r. &c^a. with some other Affairs I think as material and worthy your notice; tho' it is with concern that I am therein obliged to speak of some Actions done by M^r. Hopkins much to his discredit.

Here is a Man named Latchmiah Reddee who after the loss of Madrass came to our assistance with 300 Peons went with Col. Lawrence to the taking Deve Cotah and was left there by him. Mr. Hopkins has turn'd this man out of the service on the Complaint of a single Person, that he had done something amiss in the country. It is true a Chief ought to be the best Judge and have power to promote or disgrace those under him nor should I have taken this notice of it, if he had not put his Servant into that Post. I think if this man had done amiss he should have endeavoured to find a better and not put in his servant, a Boy. Besides the Chief Peon has a good deal of authority in the Bounds and if the same Person is Dubbash, What Oppressions has he not in his Power to be Guilty of? Mr. Hopkins indeed acknowledges he did not know the Merit of the old Peon, that he had served the Company so many

years. As I had before a knowledge of him & hear he stills [sic] bear a good character, I have put him to act as Chief Peon till I receive your Orders; I Beg leave to recommend him to your Hon^r. &c^a. Favour.

Some time ago Mr. Hopkins was order'd to assist the Phousdar of Pollam Cotah which he did. But he overcharged him or suffer'd his servants to do it, as far as 100 Pagodas in Batta to the Sepoys. It's true the sum is no great matter for the Phousdar to lose or Mr. Hopkins to gain but this ill consequence may arise, What opinion must he have of the English? When a Man, Chief of one of their Settlements shall make him such an Overcharge. It is in some measure sacrificing the Publick Credit to private Interest.

On my arrival here a complaint was made to me by the Inhabitants that they were not permitted to bring any Goods into Deve Cotah to sell, but that all were engross'd by Mootiah, M^r . Hopkins's Dubash, That the Tom Tom about twelve months ago had beat forbidding any Person to bring in Beetle, Beetle Nut, Tobacco, Sugar, Tamerin and some other Goods, but must buy them of M^r . Hopkins. This upon Enquiry, by confirmed to me by all the Mettoe Peons and many of the Inhabitants, and I have instances to produce some of those Googs being seiz'd & confiscated; M^r . Hopkins says he knew nothing of the Matter. Strange that such a remarkable Transaction should pass without his knowledge! Mootiah lays the blame on his master, and says that what was bought or sold was by his Order and he got the Profit. I shall instance in this one Article. Mootiah bought, that is, obliged Coopah Chitty, to sell him Beetle Nut at P^s . $5\frac{1}{2}$ P Ominum and he sold the same Beetle Nut to the Buzar people for P^s . 10 P Ominum. Who got the Profit? So far it may be said, the Buying price is not a standard for the selling Price, but in this case I think that Argument out of the question, for why should not the Buzar people as well buy of Coopah Chitty at P^s . $5\frac{1}{2}$ as of Mootiah at Pagodas Ten?

Here used to be kept about 19 Garce of Paddy for the use of the Garrison; In the Account Remains for April 1752 is 800 Pas. worth of Grain. As the Company are out of their money for the Purchase of this Grain, it is reasonable if any profit arises they should have it; This Year a Profit of 105 Pags. was got, which Mr. Hopkins took to himself. On my arrival there was not one Grain of Paddy in the Magazine.

It has been the Custom here for the Company's Conicoply to have so much influence as to turn out & to make Sepoy Officers at his pleasure. I hear it is the method at Trichenopoly and some other Garrisons for the sepoys to hold Courts Martial for the punishment of their Officers or sepoys, to be approv'd of by the Cmomanding Officer. I beg leave to recomemnd the same practice here. This might in some Measure prevent that discouraging method of taking Entrance money for the promoting Sepoys to a higher rank, which has been so notoriously practiced at this Place.

The Sepoys in September were cloathed by Cap^t. Spear and I think makes them look extremely well, besides it is an advantage by vending so much of the Company's Broad Cloth and Perpetuanoes; but this too requires your Hon^r. &c^a notice to regulate. For the price at first fix'd on the cloathing which consisted of nothing else than a short Jacket was six Rupees both Broad Cloth and Perpetuanoes, but after my arrival was lower'd to Rupees 5½ the Broad Cloth & Rupees 3½ the Perpetuanoes.

Notwithstanding Mr. Hopkins was in October last positively forbid to fill up any Vacancys in the sepoys, several have since been taken in. I have by dismissing some of those and many others who were only servants in the Garrison reduced that Expence AR^s. 643 monthly.

Comrapah and Mootiah have both used great Oppressions towards the Inhabitants, even so far as to place sepoy centries over them. I shall not here give a detail of the particular Facts, but wait till I have the Honour of paying my respects to you in Madrass; I have confined them and hope your Hon.

&ca. will believe I should not have taken this step without good reason for so doing.

We find greatly the Inconvenience of having different measures in the Bounds, for the same which are used at Nelloor, are not used at Coilady & those again not at the Fort. If your Honr. &ca. would please to order the measures to be regulated here as they are at Madrass, it would prove of benefit to the place.

Mr. Hopkins seem'd in some of his Letters very strongly to recommend the having an investment at this place. Tho' the Cloth might cost something less in Cooly hire bringing here, than to carry it to Fort St. David, yet I think it would not answer the Expence of Building Warehouses, Beating Godowns, Washing Godowns and charge of Conicoplys. In case of any disturbances happening in this part of the country, the cloth may be carried to Deve Cotah as a Magazine till a proper Conveyance can be got to Transport it to St. David or the Presidency.

The Fortifications of this place are greatly out of repair. The Lascars who before were Idle or at least little employed in the Company's Business now assist in mending the inside of the Rampart. We have dug round most parts of the Fort and Find the old Foundation of the retaining Wall is still remaining, and vast quantitys of Bricks laying about the Fort sufficient to build up above half the Wall. I have in this been obliged to employ a few Bricklayers, but as Experience is the most Infallable method to know the cost of Building, I hope your Honr. &ca. will not take amiss my having laid out a few Pagodas in Experiment. In which I have rebuilt in Brick and Mud $4\frac{1}{3}$ yards in height, 134 Yards in length and $2\frac{3}{4}$ yards in thickness, which has cost in Bricklayers Work, and Drams to the Lascars once a Week Ps. 21.20 I hope to be able before I leave the place to make a Calculate of how much the Expence will amount, to carry the Work round the Fort. Some money laid out in repairing the place would not be ill bestowed, the chief Advantage of this settlement being its situation. A Key to the Tanjore country and Trichenopoly? Which, were an Enemy in possession of, would prove of great diservice to us and if the French had this place as well as Chellumbrum, we should find it a difficult matter to supply our armies to the Southward.

The Extent of these Bounds are about 29 miles round; most of which is good ground & capable of producing a large quantity of Grain, and as Fine Paddy grows here as any where on the Coast. But then it lies at present under some Inconveniences. First being so liable to be overflown by the Freshes from the country, to prevent which 'its necessary to raise a Bank high enough to keep the Water back. Secondly, in the dry season for Want of a supply of Water quantitys of Grain are parch'd up and near half the Bounds lie uncultivated, to remedy this defect Channels should be cut from the Colleroon & other rivers to supply the Bounds with Water, But as this must be attended with Expence it will hardly be done whilst the Farm is let out for one Year, for it would take near that time to do it, and the succeeding Person would reap the Fruits of the Labour.

I have now given your Honr. &ca. the best information of the state of this Settlement, I could procure during my six Week's residence here. Whatever mistakes I may have made in my representation thereof, hope you will look upon, entirely as such & not proceeding from an ill intention, for I assure you I have taken some pains to get at the Truth; In which if I should have so far succeeded as to gain your Approbation I shall think myself well

rewarded for my Labour.

We have two others, but as they are from the Secret Committee & We expect a Sea Conveyance, will shortly offer, we defer sending them by this Pattamar.

On the 30th. Ulto. we were favour'd with your Honr. &ca. Letter of the 23^d. Novr. and hope by this time, the Doddington is arrived with you.

We with great pleasure observe the prospect your Hon^r. &c^a. have in assisting the Tonnage from Bengal which with the ship we have desired may be sent round to Tellicherry, the President & Council advise us, will enable them to return home all those on your side India, We are now preparing to dispatch the Pelham Captⁿ. George Lindsay to be fill'd up on the Malabar Coast & imagine she will sail hence by the 20th. Instant.

We are obliged to your Hon^r. &c^a. for advising us of the London & Anson's safe arrival at Culpee, and request you will forward the accompanying Packet to the President & Council at Fort William by the first Conveyance as it contains 2^d. Bills of Exchange for a Remittance. We lately made them & your Hon^r. &c^a. may depend on our Embracing the first Opportunity to reimburse you for the silver consign'd the Supra Cargoes of the Warren at Canton.

Lieut^t. Hugh M^c.Kie & Ensign David Black have requested us to pay them as Quarter Master & Adjutant to Cap^t. Forbes's Detachment till their arrival here, but as we observe your Hon^r. &c^a. advanced them nothing on Account their passage for acting in those Capacities, and imagine you design'd their commissions should stand in Force, during their continuance on your Coast only, We shall not comply with their requests unless your Hon^r. &c^a. judge them entitled thereto, but Cap^t. Alex^r. Zeigler having represented that notwithstanding your advices of the 9th. October, himself and two voluntiers, were depriv'd of an Opportunity of applying to your Hon^r. &c^a. for two month's Batta on account their passage which was allow'd all Our other Officers. We have paid them seven hundred & twenty (720) Rupees and debited your Presidency for it.

Honble Sir & Sirs

By the ship Denham Cap^t. Meard we have addressed you under date 23^d.

Ulto. by the way of Bengal advising you of the detention of the Honble Company's Snow Arcot Cap^t. Jackson at Syrian by the Peguers, who by force have put men upon her, but since then we have received no Advices or Country put men upon her, but since then we have proceeded there.

The Copper Cash which we have reced. Pthe Arcot Snow on Freight on the London Sloop Capt. Karr has fallen considerably short of the Invoice which we have reced. from you being only seventy four thousand seven hundred and forty cash, which ought to have been one hundred forty four thousand, but from whence this Error of sixty nine thousand two hundred & fifty six proceeds We cannot determine, but beg leave to refer that Enquiry to your Honours.

Mr. John Agey Adjutant having been wilfully Guilty of a Breach in his Military duty, has obliged us to hold a Court of enquiry upon him, in consequence of which we now send him to you under Confinement together with the Proceedings of the Court for your perusal and full satisfaction, and John Drury centinel being also Guilty of the like, We now transmit him to you under the same Circumstances.

Mr. John Whitehill having enjoy'd very indifferent state of Health, since his Residing on this Island has desir'd Permission to return to Fort St. George which was accordingly complied with, and he now takes his passage on the Sloop Cuddalore for that place for the recovery of his Health, if it will permit he purposes to return to this Establishment.

Our last Year's Indents to Bengal for Rice, Doll, Ghee &c³. Stores & Provisions for the support & maintenance of the Honble Company's Servants, Artificers & Labourers upon this Establishment being those only calculated for twelve Month's Subsistence which time is expired since the 30th. October last makes us with great reason apprehend unless we are speedily releived we shall be drove to such short Allowances as will not be very satisfactory, especially as the Prince George's complement of men is a very heavy burthen upon us, together with a great number of Refugee Burmahs and Peguers, who have fled hither for Protection with their Wifes and Families having no other existance but from our Stores, makes our monthly consumption very great. We therefore humbly beg leave thus simply to represent our circumstances that you may take it into your consideration to forward advices to Bengal for our speedy Relief, on which we entirely rely, This Country in its present distracted state producing nothing for the support of Nature.

We purposed to have dispatched the Sloop Cuddalore to you in the beginning of this Month, but thro' my extreme ill state of Health, We were not able to forward her to you sooner, being but just recovering Strength from the fourth Attack of a Fever which has swept off many of our Europeans & as this weakness of constitution deprives me of the means of executing my Duty with that Assiduity which this station requires makes me very desirous you will be Graciously pleased to grant me permission to return to the Coast by the first Conveyance from hence, as the only prospect I have of saving my Life, is by flying from the Obnoxious air of this Island.

If you will think proper to send the Cuddalore to us with Expedition & load on her some Bags of Salt which are much wanted here, We have a Loading of Teak & Timbers ready for her to take in, which are now receiving damage by lying on the Beach, and she may return to your place in April.

Inclosed we send you the Cash Account with occurrences & Transactions with sundry Papers &ca. as # List of the Packet, to which we beg leave to refer you.

We now forward to you sundry Bills of Exch^a. Viz^t. one in favour of Cap^t. Maskelyne for the Arrears of the Offreckonings due to the Military of this place from May 1753 to Octo^r. 1755 being thirty months & amounting to A. R^s. 2989–3–7 and also a second in favour of Captⁿ. Brohier for Arrears of offreckonings due to the Train of Artillery for the same time amounting to A. R^s. 1070–11–4, a third in favour of Cap^t. George Baker for A. R^s. 2000

and a fourth in favour of Messrs. Du Pre' & Alexander for A. Rs. 4000, all which Bills we hope you will be pleased to Honour having reced. value here in Cash on Accot. and use of the Honble Company.

Mr. William Anderson Surgeon having had many severe fits of sickness since on this Expedition, has requested me to address Your Hon. &ca. in his behalf for permission to return to the Coast, I have also address'd you under date the 7th. Decr. on the same account on behalf of Ensign John Dyer which request for his reurn to Fort St. George he desires I would renew by this Conveyance, & as he has since the confinemt. of Mr. John Agey performed the Duty of an acting Adjutant by exercising & well disciplining the Soldiers I have granted him from the date hereof, the usual allowances in such cases, untill your pleasure is further known & which I hope you will please to comply with.

Mr. John Whitehill who now returns to your place being very well acquainted with all particular circumstances relating to this Island and Capt. George Baker with the Customs, Manners, and Genius both of the Peguers & Burmahs together with the Produce, situation & Trafick of the Country, having resided a long time at Persaim Factory, We beg leave to refer you to these Gentlemen for all further Enquirys which you may please to make regarding this Establishment for your further knowledge and satisfaction.

Agreable to the direction of the President and Council, we now lay before you our Report of the Accounts of this Settlement for the month of December but as this is only the first meeting the Committee have had it cannot be expected every particular should be pointed out that may merit your attention, that must be a Work of time, in the mean while we present you with our General Observations.

CASH ACCOUNT.

As we do not fully comprehend the President & Council's Intentions in regard to the difference of Rupees & Pagodas and the keeping a seperate Account for each therefore think it necessary to request the favour of a further Explanation.

EXPORT WAREHOUSE.

The Wax Cloth in this Account is charged at Pas. 3 ? Piece which we think ought to be reduced to the Madrass Price of Pas. 2.27 or Indented for thither.

STOREKEEPER & MILITARY STOREKEEPER.

The Diarys being annexed to the Journal Parcels of each of these Accounts. and the Vouchers of the letter produced and compared with that Account are found right.

We observe that the present method of drawing the Allowances to the Train and Military Picquets for working in the Elaboratory is by their respective Officers monthly, but think it would be a better method for the Storekeeper's Conicoply to take a daily Account of the people employed in that service & pay them accordingly.

The Artificers under the Head of Charges General are to a considerable

Amount which we would recommend to be retrenched if possible.

Wax Cloth and several other Articles in this Months Account are reduced to the Madrass Prices & in order to adjust the rest it would be proper to apply for a List of Prices from thence.

PAYMASTER.

All Disbursements in fanams to be particularly specify'd in an inner column.

CHARGES GARRISON.

Expences of Oil, Water &ca. to be enquired into & to be reduced if possible, under this Head we observe also there are charged several Artificers, as Head Bricklayers, Carpenters &ca. which would be more properly brought to Account under the Head Charges General.

CHARGES HOSPITAL.

The Salary and Allowances to the Surgeons & their Assistants are charged under several different Heads in the Paymaster's Accounts which we judge to be a bad, method & that the whole would be properly collected under this article as well as all other Disbursements relating to the Hospital, Diet money to the Surgeons Excepted.

Mess^{rs}. Wilson, Keir and Hinchley being employed at other places, whether they should not be struck off our Books.

PEON'S AND SERVANT'S WAGES.

We are of opinion that the number of Peons may admit of a deduction but at the same time observe that under that Denomination are included the Tappys and Country Musick

CHARGES EXTRAORDINARY.

Under this Head is a considerable charge for Intelligence of the necessity of which Expence the Deputy Gov^r. as one of the Secret Committee being the most competent Judge, we think it proper he should draw for the same monthly and then his note will be a voucher to the Paymaster for disbursing it.

Pension to Austapa Chitty &ca. amounting to Pas. 11–13, their Allowances are of a long standing, whether they are to be continued is referr'd to the Board.

FORTIFICATIONS & REPAIRS.

The Engineer, his Writers, Conicoplys &ca. like wise the Master Brick-layer to the amount of Ps. 102–33–40 are all charged under these Heads, the propriety of this method we refer to your Worship &ca.

No material Repairs ought to be undertaken till a report be made to the Board for their Appropriation, which may possibly be a means of retrenching that article.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Conformable to the Annual practice We beg leave to address you under the usual Heads.

FIRST OF INVESTMENT.

We were in great hopes that the tranquility that has in a great measure reign'd in the Country all last Year, would have afforded us the pleasure of acquainting you that our earnest Endeavours to reestablish this important Branch had been attended with some success, but we are under the painfull necessity of once more troubling you with a repetition of our disappointments, both as to Encreasing the number of Bales & improving the Manufacture, the Merchants having been worse in every respect this Year than the preceeding.

Agreable to your directions we began the Investm^t. with calling all the Merchants before us the 21st. April & gave them a very severe reprimand for their past conduct with an assurance of being treated with the utmost rigour if they did not behave better in future which they all promis'd faithfully to do, but with how little sincerity their conduct soon made too Evident, for on the 6th. May Nagore Kistnah and Ramiah acquainted us they could not contract for any more Salem Cloth without we would advance the price three Pagodas & Corge which being refused they paid in their Ballance and could never since be prevailed on to intermeddle with the Investment. The 19th. May Irshippa Chitty and Paupa Rauze produced Musters of the Sortments they intended to provide, which being examined & found excessively bad, was rejected, when they likewise refused to contract for better without an increase of three Pagodas & Corge, all this convinced us there was a Combination formed amongst them to reduce us to their own Terms, of which we Acquainted you in our Letter of the 29th. May upon which your Hon. &ca. thought proper to introduce Nella Chitty into the Investment, this had so far a good Effect on them that they appear'd before the 20th. Type & agreed to contract the third that they appear'd before the 30th. June & agreed to contract at the usual prices and even gave in a List of the Quantity of each Sortment they would provide for the January dispatch amounting to 900 Bales, 200 of which were to be ready by September, this encouraged us to advance them five thousand Pagodas each. Nella Chitty arrived here the 21st. July and promised to be very active in bringing in cloth, but so far were any of them from keeping their promises, that by the middle of September the whole quantity brought in by all amounted but to seventeen Bales and that so very bad that the Gentlemen Sorters declared they were afraid to take it in, upon which the Board met at the Godown & finding it to be true we advised your Hon. &ca. of it, as likewise with the Merchants reasons (which were that it was the best the Country afforded, and that other European Nations particularly the French took in much worse and at a higher price) and requested your positive orders how to conduct ourselves, Your reply was that our small progress was occasioned by the Quantity of Cloth rejected, & that perhaps we sorted too strictly, if so we must relax a little as the times must be complied with to prevent the Investment being transferr'd to the French, These directions we have paid all the regard to that prudence would admit of, notwithstanding which it will appear by our sorting Book that frequently half, and sometimes two thirds have been turn'd out, by which means the number of Bales is reduced to 250 and we are very sorry to observe of that little, that as in general so bad (particularly the Worriarpollam and Colombor and that no other consideration but that of being whell-Salempores midling) that no other consideration but that of being wholly useless in the Investment could induce us to tolerate it. We can assert with great Truth that our Attention to this Branch of our Honble Master's Affairs

has been adequate to its importance tho' the success is by no means answerable. We have not been wanting in the most pressing and earnest exhortations to our merchants to endeavour at amending the manufacture, and were in hopes that the quantity turn'd out, would have induced them to pay some regard to our Remonstrances, but all these methods have been attended with no sort of Effect, they still persist to supply us with the same & we can now think of no other step but that of wholly rejecting it, which seems to be the only remedy that is left, and this we fear we must have recourse to, unless your Hon. &ca. can point out to us a more salutary method of putting a stop to this growing Evil. Some of our Bales will wait on you by the Dragon Sloop which we beg the favour you will Inspect into and give us your sentiments thereon.

Persheram Pillah's Conduct having been for a long time very Suspicious, in June last a trusty Person was sent to Salem to enquire how his Affairs stood there, who Acquainted us he had about 400 Pieces of Cloth ready but could not find he had any at the Weavers, or even the least Credit amongst them; Upon this we put him under a Guard as we informed you in our Letter of the 30th. June in which state he still remains not having been able to procure any Security. The beforementioned 400 Pieces is all we have reced. from him this Year and we are much afraid it is all we shall ever see of his Ballance.

The new Salem Merchant Bowania not having been advanced till the 26th. November did not bring in his first parcel of Cloth till three or four days ago when it was too late to insert it in the Accounts that now wait on you, the Quantity is 520 Pieces and turns out very tolerable, he promises another parcel in a few Days.

Govindah Chitty has brought in but 16 Corge of Salempores, having always pleaded when called upon that great part of the Ballance was in the Hands of his Partner Tonneveroy Pillah who has been all this Year at Madrass

settling Accounts with Andiapah Moodelair.

Our Merchants Accounts and List of the Investment wait on you in this Packet, by them you will observe the several Ballances outstanding amount to Pas. 54571–29–7 of which 13073–18–14 lays with Irshippa Chitty, and Paupa Rauze, 5000 with Bowania 9947–14–14, with Nella Chitty 3914–4–22, with Persheram Pillah, Govinda Chitty & Tonneveroy Pillah remain pretty much as last year, as does Andiapah Moodelair.

SECONDLY OF CUSTOMS & REVENUES.

By the Abstracts of the Customs Collected at this Settlement for the last Year compared with the former which wait on you in this Packet, your Honr. &ca. will be informed of the Increase & decrease of them the several reasons assigned for the same are annexed thereto.

All the Farms have been duly Collected, a List of which now waits on you.

THIRDLY OF DEBTS.

In this Packet we transmit you a List of Debts outstanding in last Books.

FOURTHLY OF EXPENCES.

A Calculate of them comes in this Packet and we have only to observe that in general they are decreased considerably altho' they appear encreased by the large sum paid his Majesty's Forces.

FIFTHLY OF BUILDINGS & REPAIRS.

Mr. John Call who has continued the direction of this Business has been constantly employed in forwarding the new Works which we flatter ourselves will appear to be greatly forwarded considering it was the beginning of April before it was possible to proceed with the Fortifications, for the Repairs at the Garden House for accommodating His Majesty's Regiment and the quantity of Carriages making for the Royal Artillery wholly employed the Workmen of every kind till that time.

The Batterdiau to the Eastward is finished with its Sluice and Communication Gallery from the False Bray to the cover'd way, the Earth is also cleared away and Wells sunk & a vast quantity of Piles drove for a Foundation on which the Revetement of the Demi Counter Guard before the S. E. Bastion has been raised to the Height of ten feet from the Angle of the Junction of the Batterdiau to the Rentring Angle of the Flank where it joins the new Curtain measuring in length about one hundred and Ninety (190) Feet in which condition it was left before the last Monsoon and still remains.

The Bridge of Communication from the False Bray to the West Ravelin is entirely compleated.

To secure Patches Battery or more properly the S. W. Counter Guard as far as possible in future against the violence of the Current in the River & also to repair the damage done by the Monsoon in Nov. 1754 there has been drove a row of large Redwood Piles round the three Salient Angles at the distance of twenty feet from the Facing, between which and the redwood Piles there is drove another row, and from them Land ties carried to the outermost Piles which bind the whole together & prevent the Piles from flying off at the Top by the weight of the large Stones & Burs of Brickwork which are closely laid between the Piles & the Wall as well to secure the foundation from being undermind by the Water as to counterballance the pressure of the Parapet & the Rampart from within & for the further security of this Counter Guard a channel of 550 Feet long 75 Broad & 5 feet deep has been cut across the Island which lays on the West side by the means of which and a Dam across the old channel the Water which comes from the Panniar River by Tevenapatam is carried in a direct course into the River which runs on the south side of the Fort, instead of falling with a great Rapidity on the West Side of the Counter Guard and by its whirling motion carrying away the Bank which secures the foot of the Wall so that it is with great reason to be hoped these precautions will secure the work from any further damage.

That the Bricklayers might not be Idle any longer than the heavy rains absolutely prevented their working about the end of October the Parapet of the East Front of the Fort was pull'd down, which was so ill construct'd and built of such Rubbish that it was in a manner useless and in a very improper condition to cover either Men or Guns. I was for these reasons and in consideration of the Fort being as yet uncover'd on that side that the Parapet was taken down, and the Revetement too where it was necessary as far as the old Moratta Wall which is within fourteen feet of the Level of the False Bray where the work is fourteen feet thick and by age of a prodiguous hardness. On this old Wall is raised a Facing of Eight Feet thick at Bottom, which by its slope diminishes & forms a solid Brick Parapet of seven feet for the Faces of the Bastions and six feet for the Curtain. The Platforms are also new laid and lengthen'd and the whole finished from the Salient Angle of the North East to the Salient Angle of the South East Bastion which compleates the East Front of the Fort.

The Foundation for the new curtain (which will be in length 410 Feet from the South East to the South West Counter Guard) is begun and the Earth clear'd away above half the length, some Wells are also sunk & we are in hopesere the next monsoon to have the whole Foundation rais'd which is six feet under to three feet above the Level of the Water, and no Endeavours shall be wanting on our part to make a greater Progress.

The repairs have been chiefly at the Garden House, Chemundulum and the Horse Stables but none have been made either their or to any other of the Honble Company's Buildings but such as were very necessary for the Preservation of the whole or for the Accommodation of the Inhabitants.

The Carpenters & Smiths in the Yard have been employed as necessity required either in preparing the Timber and Iron Work for the use of the Fortifications and Repairs or in making and repairing carriages Tumbrills &ca. for the use of the Camp or His Majesty's Artillery & we beg leave to assure your Hon^r. &ca. that in every Branch the greatest care has been taken to conduct it with Dispatch, Convenience, strength & æconomy.

SIXTHLY OF COVENANTED SERVANTS.

M^r. Richard Cooke arrived here the 6th. June and is station'd under the Secretary M^r. Geo: Dawson and M^r. Edward Raddon also arriv'd here the 31st. July, the latter is under the Accountant & the former under the Paymaster.

Agreable to your directions of the 13th. October M^r. John Call executed his Covenants & took the usual Oath of Fidelity as a Writer in the Honble Companys service.

The Indents for Wax Candles appear to be Extravagant, but as that, and several other particulars that might be pointed out, have been already taken notice of and regulations made in consequence a repetition here is unnecessary, we shall only remark further that the Adjutants monthly Draughts must have exceeded his Expence because in Septr. there is a credit given to charges General of Ps. 339–18–30 for sundry Stores return'd back from him to compleat an Indent from Trichenopoly.

We a few days ago received your favour of the 24th. Jan^{ry}. and agreable to our Advices under the 4th. of that Month, We now enclose your Hon^r. &c^a. five Bills of Exchange for Eighty thousand (80000) Arcot Rupees on Acco^t. the Foreign Silver you consigned the Supra Cargoes of the Warren at Canton, being all drawn by Arzunjee Nathjee of Surat, on Amboidass Narsindass at your place at the rate of 98½ Bombay Rupees for 100 Arcot, three of which Bills amounting to thirty five thousand (35000) Arcot Rupees are payable the 24th. of next month and the rest the 10th. of May, the Ballance shall be remitted as soon as we can procure another draft in your Hon^r. &c^a. favour.

It is with much concern we observe the Doddington was not arrived with you, and that we learn by private advices from Surat she had not been at Batavia the 10th. Octor. however we are not without hopes she may have been obliged to touch on the West Coast after the date of your Honr. &ca. last Advices from thence.

We dispatched our Honble Masters ship Pelham to Tellicherry the 1st. Ulto. with orders to the Gentlemen there to lade two hundred (200) Tons of Saltpetre on her, which we expected they would have reced. by the Duke of Dorset from Bengal, and to compleat her Charterparty Tonnage with Pepper for Europe, but they had not heard of the Duke of Dorset's Arrival on the Coast the 18th. Ulto. which obliged them to detain the Pelham; We likewise dispatched the Stretham for England the 15th. Instt. having compleated her Cargoe here, but were only able to put on board one hundred & fifteen (115) Tons of Saltpetre, having none left for making Gunpowder, or any other service.

Yesterday imported His Majestys Ship Kent Rear Admiral Watson from Gheriah, and the Cumberland is now in sight, which place We have the pleasure to advise your Honr. &ca. surrender'd to the forces under his Command on the 13th. Ulto. after an Attack of two days, with but few killed & Wounded on our side, but the Enemies loss is not known; The Tyger and Bridgewater Men of War sustained some damage in their Masts, as also one of the Honble Compys. Cruizers, but Angriahs whole Fleet consisting of eight Ketch Grabs and two large three Mast Grabs on the Stocks ready for launching with all his Gallivats and great part of his Town was consumed by our Bombs; Toolajee left the Command to his Brother in Law, in order to treat with the Morattas and still remains with them, but all his Family became our Prisoners and a large Amount in Treasure, Goods &ca. has been found, which will be all divided between the King's and Company's Forces employ'd on the Expedition.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Your favours of the 11th. Febry. 24th. & 30th. Ulto. have all duly been received, with the Treasure consign'd us # George and Stores for the Arcot Snow, as also the Gunpowder # Beverly and we return your Hon. &ca. thanks for the supplies forwarded.

The George arriving here the 30th. last Month, Capt. Newton Address'd us to have a survey on the ship before he proceeded for the Negrais, as she was found to be somewhat Leaky in her passage down from Madrass in consequence of which we desired Capt. Jackson and Mr. Heriot the Companys Carpenter with the Chief Officer of the Arcot Snow, to repair on board her immediately for that intent, and to report her condition to us by delivering their Opinions in writing, and having since declared the same by their report given in to be absolutely necessary, for bringing the Vessel into the River in order to stop her Leaks, she accordingly came over the Bar the next day, and is now repairing. Copys of the Letter from Capt. Newton and the Certificate sign'd by the above are herewith accompanying.

Agreable to your Hon^r. &c^a. Orders a Cargo of Paddy shall be shipp'd on board the George for the Negrais as soon as she is ready to receive it, which we hope will be before the Middle of the Month, and the Commander Acquainted with your directions for his future proceedings.

The Arcot Snow is taken in hand towards her Repairs as contracted for, and we shall strictly observe your Commands with regard to any other necessary Work found absolutely wanted to her, not included in the Estimate as well as what further relates to the dispatch of that Vessel.

Cap^t. Jackson was supplied wih the Anchor left behind by the Cuddalore Sloop on his arrival here, and that of the Arcots shall be sent up the first Opportunity.

We are sorry to have omitted in our Address at the beginning of the year; what your Honr. &ca. are pleased to direct in future in your Letter now under reply, for informs, you particularly of the State of the Settlement in the several different branches mentioned, and as we were Ignorant of this practice before for being so circumstantial, We hope this late Omission will be the readier excused, and your Commands in it shall punctually be attended to hereafter.

The Accounts are now taking of all the Wares, Stores and Military Stores remaining in the Settlement and as soon as they are compleated, the same shall be transmitted you, with the reasons assign'd for such as are deficient or otherwise have suffer'd thro' any unavoidable decay of Rust breaking &ca for your directions thereon.

We shall conform precisely to put in execution your Hon^r. &c^a. orders in general of the Committee's remarks in your separate Letter and intend shortly to send you the proposals offer'd for undertaking the package of a Bale at a certain fixed price. The exact Account of the charges of packing to this time as you have desir'd is inclosed.

It is a great satisfaction to us to advise your Hon. &ca. a very plentifull Investment may be made this Year in these parts from the present favourable aspect of Affairs, if money is not wanted to starve the Cause, and we compute to be able of furnishing at least in the course of the Season twelve or thirteen hundred Bales, wherefore we are to entreat a supply of forty five thousand Madrass Pagodas, and seventy or Eighty thousand Rupees more than what

has hitherto been received to serve for the Investment and the current charges of the Settlement till next Year. Our Merchants have had all the Cash we were Masters of and are daily pressing for more, & we humbly refer the Consideration of our demands to your superior Judgements.

All Arrears of Wages due to the Arcot Snow amounts. to A. Rupees 4776 has been paid off from the $17^{\rm th}$. July last to $17^{\rm th}$. Inst. from the Accounts deliver'd in by Capt. Jackson & the same are now forwarded.

Our Indents as usual for what Wares & Stores may be wanted, shall wait on your Hon^r. &c^a. as soon as the Account Remains are finished of such as we have already here.

We have reced. your several favours of the 25th. & 27th. Ulto and 9th. Inst. with a supply of twenty thousand (20000) Pagodas and three thousand & one (3001) Pags. to make up the deficiency in the Chest reced. Fanny. The three Bags of fanams shall be carried to the Head of Fines & Forfeitures conformable to your directions.

Agreable to your Orders we have purchased the Elizabeth's Cargo of Rice Amounting to about four thousand (4000) Bags at eighty (80) Pagodas & Garce which we are now landing with all possible expedition.

In consequence of your direction for M^r . Robert Dowset to repair to Fort S^t . George he proceeded thither a few days ago on the Canterbury Snow.

The Export Wareho.kr. will deliver his Answer in a few days in regard to undertaking the packing the Company's Bales on the Terms you have prescribed.

We have made a diligent Enquiry both to the Northward & Southward for Angelee Plank to build Musoolahs but have not been able to procure any. We must therefore request your Hon. &ca. will sent us at leat two immediately as the squadron is daily expected and we are now reduced to one Mussoolah and that so much out of repair that it is dangerous to venture her over the Surf. The Admiral when he was here last made great complaints that he was not properly supplied with those kind of Boats & lost two or three of the Squadron's Boats by being obliged to make use of them in passing the Surf.

As our Ballance of Cash is reduced very low by the purchasing of Grain we beg you will send us a supply as soon as possible.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I am obliged with your Honr. &ca. favour of the 30th. March and have duly received the five thousand (5000) Pagodas sent by the Sloop George which I hope may be of some Service in carrying on the Investment, which I am sorry to say the other sent by the Fortune Snow has not yet been, the Gold being so much inferior to what these kind of Pagodas have always been that the Country wil not take them, As I am sensible how great a discredit it must be to our Mint to have these Pagodas returned I have been at some pains and expence with the Soucars & Country Government to get them pass'd and wish I may be successfull, my Vakeel is now out upon that Business.

I shall bring the Cloth Godown to Account this month and particularize the Expence. I have herewith sent an Estimate of the charge of Building a Wall round the Factory if you shall think proper to have it done as also an Account of the cost and Charge of packing a hundred Bales White and Brown the former I am willing to undertake at $2\frac{1}{4}$ Pags. the latter at 18 fanams Bale if your Honr. &ca. shall approve of it. The reason why the present charge of packing does not agree with our Books, is because the Allowance for Brown Bales is far short of what the Gunnies, Ropes, &ca. cost.

I shall obey your Hon. &ca. Orders in regard to the Pagodas after the Expiration of the month by Crediting your account 1100 for every 1000 Pagodas and Debting the Merchants the same, as the Washers have always been paid in Madrass Pagodas 10 \$\mathbb{R}\$ Cent must be added to that charge or they cannot go on with their Business, they very hardly getting a livelihood now, and as the Servants here have also received Madrass Pagodas for their pay I doubt not but your Hon. &ca. will allow the 10 \$\mathbb{R}\$ Cent upon that Article. As to the Invoice of Goods you are pleased to say that by the prices sent you have made it come near to the usual Charge upon the three Numbers, but if your Hon. &ca. will be pleased to compare it with the Calculate now sent you will find the difference to be considerable, particularly in the Midling Cloth, which if nor alter'd it will be impossible to provide that Article.

I should be glad to have a further supply of 30000 Pagodas for the Investment this Year and the greatest part of it sent as soon as possible. The Dutch have received large sums I myself saw 25000 Pags. paid into the Cash at Palicol a few days past and I am well assured that any sum of money is as safe here as there.

As I have ever been scrupulous of putting the Company to any unnecessary Expence so when any Work has been undertaken I have been as carefull to see it done in the most frugal manner, as the Buildings here by all who have yet seen them will evince, but I shall not undertake my thing new without first giving your Hon^r. &c^z. an Estimate and receiving your Orders.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Your Commands of the 24th, were deliver'd me a few days past with a supply of five thousand (5000) Pags. Ship George. The Merchants desire I will Acquaint your Honr. &ca that if they receive further supplys soon they shall be able to Invest this year thirty or forty thousand more. In this place shall be gleave to lay before you their complaints of the Pagodas lately sent, I must beg leave to lay before you that I made them take those reced. in December as it was with great difficulty that I made them take those reced. in December last, they alledging the Soucars did not chuse to take them and it was with

some trouble and Expence that I could prevail on them to let them pass, complaining they were deficient in the Touch. In those received by the George there are some of the same sort which I am afraid I shall find hard to make the Merchts. receive, but as I am not a Judge myself otherwise than by the looks I have taken the liberty to send you ten (10) for your Honor &ca. Inspection.

Your separate Letter with the Committee's remarks on the Accounts of this settlement with your Orders relating thereto I now reply thereto.

In the 8th. Para of their report they mention there is inserted 138 Pieces of Wax Cloth as expended in the month of Sept^r. but on looking over that month's Account I fancy they have made a mistake as it is inserted there as purchased not expended and was then bought for the packing of the Bales consign'd your Hon^r. &c^a. in regard to your Orders of sending a Calculate of the Expence of Packing I now enclose you an exact account of packing 100 White as also 100 Brown Bales, and will undertake the packing of the Company's Bales at (2½) two Pagodas and a Quarter each White Bale and (18) Eighteen fanams for Brown if it meets with your Hon^r. &c^a. Approbation.

Para. 9th. of the report the Committee remarks my having charged Pas. 10–12 for cloathing three Europeans and one Topass which they say is an Extraordinary charge, as the Captains are to cloath the Military out of the stoppages of their pay; In order to explain this agreable to your Honr. &ca. Orders, I am to inform you that the above people were deserters from Mons. Bussy's camp and as all such when I was to the Southward were given their first cloathing (if I remember right) by the Company, I imagined they were entitled to the same Allowance here.

The Committee in the Para. 11 remarks my having charged the Building of a Washing and Beating Godown in June and Horse Stables and Choultry in September and that I have wrote them off instead of keeping them under proper Heads in the Books. As there was the same Buildings standing on my Arrival here and not the least mention made of any such thing in the Books and they being old and unfit for use I pull'd them down & erected the aforementioned in their room, writing them off as I imagined the others were done when first built, but I shall now agreable to your Orders write them off to proper Heads. In future I shall not set about any Buildings however urgent the Occasion may be, without previous Acquainting your Hon^r. &ca. and giving in a Calculate of the Expence &ca. for your Approbation.

It is remarked in Para. 12 of the Committee's report of a charge of Ps. 24.31.49 for my going into the Country and your Honr. &ca. observe that if it was on the Company's Business, I should have expressed in my account for what purpose it was undertaken. As I never charged any thing to the Company's Account but what I really expended for their service, I should not have presumed to have made the aforementioned charge, if not on their Account; it is very necessary sometimes to go into the Country among the Weavers to make an enquiry amongst them of the price of their Goods, for to be a check on the Merchants, and to give them some small Encouragemt to mend their Manufacture when you observe it to be bad: This method I remember Mr. Prince when Chief of Vizagapatam follow'd and met with good success therein and I imagined my following his steps in the same thing would meet with the like fortune.

In the 13th. Para. of the Committee's Report they remark that there are several Articles under the Head of the Account Repairs which ought to be carried to other Heads; of this I have been sensible ever since of my taking charge of this Factory, but as the Accounts have been carried on in this manner ever since the Establishm^t. of this settlement, I could not make any alterations therein without an Order, and was the reason of my pursuing the same tract.

In the month of May if agreable to your Honr. &ca. the alterations shall be made and if it meets with your approbation the Servants that are now scatter'd under different Heads shall be brought under the General Head of Servants Wages and in future every Bricklayer, Cooley &ca. employed shall be mentioned & the Quantity of materials Expended particularized.

My not having particularized on what service the packing Stuff used in the months of June, July, August & Septem^r. was Issued, proceeds from the many different services that calls for those Commodities and some so small as will be difficult to bring to Account the in future as near as possible they shall be laid before your Hon^r. &ca.

I have made the Merchants acquainted with your Hon^r. &c^a. Orders regarding the advancing them the Madrass Pagodas at 10 ? Cent advance to bring them into Current, which they very readily agree to, but desire I will acquaint your Hon^r. &c^a. that the prices you have affixed to the Cloth do not agree to that calculation, especially the Midling in which there is a great difference and without an Alteration they cannot undertake to provide any, I have therefore sent enclosed their Calculation from the former Invoice Prices turned into the Current at 10 ? Cent. as also the prices set down by your Hon^r. &c^a. with the difference and shall be glad of your Orders concerning it as soon as possible.

We have already addressed you by these several conveyances from hence under date 17th. Octor. It the Fatua Galley, 7th. Decr. It the Boneta Sloop & 23d. We have communicated your Qrders to Capt. D'Illens & shall regulate

his Company according to your Instructions.

Our Wareho.kr. is willing to undertake the packing of the Company's

Bales on the Terms prescribed by your Honr. &ca.

Enclosed is an Indent for Stores we received from Cap^t. Calliaud which cannot be furnished from hence, we therefore thought it proper to forward it to you as he is in immediate want of those Articles.

We shall follow your directions relating to any Europe ships that may

touch here, but as the Squadron reced. no Madeira Wine here last Year, we are at a loss to know what Quantity to land on their Account.

We have call'd upon Capt. Schaub's Officers for the Rolls of the Swiss Detachment and List of the English Prisoners which where [sic] at Pondichery, their Answer is that it is customary in their Corps to keep a regular Journal of all Occurrences which they suppose Capt. Schaub has done, but they were prevented from doing it by his Ordering the Serjeant Major never to make them any Reports of the Detachment, that they never saw any Rolls, he having always made them privately by Night and in every Respect kept them in Ignorance of all Transactions relating to his Company. We then demanded an Explanation from their Memorys in relation to the Detachments decreasing but by three Persons in 14 Months, and in October 1752 being reduced from 89 to 49 Men and the Prisoners in like manner. They declare that as they were kept so much in the dark they can say nothing positive, but that they never remember'd any remarkable sickness among the men or desertion except about thirty men that run away to Golcondah in August 1753 for which reason they think the sudden reduction in October 1752 to be impossible, that Serjeant Heim who always made out the Rolls for Captn. Schaub could no doubt give perfect Information of the affair if he were in the place, but that two days before the Captain set out last for Madrass he went away to Pondicherry, where Captain Schaub's Dubash informed them he had seen his Master pay him thirty Pagodas. Mr. Freshman has further acquainted

us that neither he or Mr. Huibert had ever reced pay as volunteers tho' they had often asked for it as they understood they were charged in Capt. Schaub's Rolls at five Pagodas & Month. We have Examined the Dubash who informs us that a few days before his master went to Madrass he sent Serjeant Heim to Pondicherry under charge of two Seapoys, that accompanying his Master thither, he saw him pay the Serjeant thirty Pagodas and heard him say he had the Captain's leave to go to Bengal and this is all the Information we have been able to procure but we shall use our Endeavours to bring Serjeant Heim from Pondicherry in hopes of Learning more of the Affair.

AT FORT ST. GEORGE

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Your favour of the 11th. Current came to hand Yesterday by which i am sorry to find the Peons I dispatched the 15th. of the last month with my reply to your Hon^r. &ca. commands of the 24th. March were not at that time received.

I shall be very Circumspect in regard to the French hereabouts & should they attempt any Hostilities shall not fail to give you immediate Notice thereof, but as I am apprehensive in such case (they being possess'd of the country thro' which our Peons must pass in their way to Madrass) they will take sufficient care no Advices shall reach you; I should think myself greatly deficient in the Trust reposed in me, if I do not make use of this Opportunity of Acquainting your Hon. &c. with the Condition of this place that you may take the proper Methods for the security of the same should you judge it necessary to keep a Garrison here. In my Letter to the Board under date the 28th, Jan. 1755 I laid before you the then situation of it and requested your Permission for repairing the damage it had reced, in the preceding Monsoon, to which you wrote in Reply that if the Treaty took place the Works at Nellepille must be demolished; since which the last Rains we have had has greatly enlarged those damages, the Works are also much settled since they were first erected and will require a good deal to raise them to their proper heighth. The Garrison also consists for the most part of Topasses and sepoys and some of the former so old as to be scarcely capable of doing their Duty. The Europeans we have amount (including Serjeants and Corporals) to thirteen, all Foreigners and Deserters from the Dutch, besides which we have not amongst them one able to Level a Gun or throw a shell if occasion should require it. The amount of the repairs and other Additions necessary will I

imagine come to about 1000 Pagodas which should your Hon^r. &c^a. think of doing I should be glad of [sic] a Person for carrying on such things may be sent to have the Inspection of it.

The supply your Honr. &ca. shortly purpose to send to Vizagapm. will be very acceptable to the Merchants as also for my Expences.

We think it ought to specify not only what stores are received and Expended, but how & the quantity of each sort remaining.

I am obliged by your Hon^r. &c^a. favour of the 11th. May and observe what you say with regard to the present situation of Affairs should the Enemy attempt anything this way, I shall make the best stand I am able which I think they will not do till they are pretty sure of success, and before that time they must be Masters of all the Roads so that let the consequence be what it will, I believe it will out of my power to give your Hon^r. &c^a. any Advice, as this place is surrounded by the River on one side, and thick Woods and Muddy

Creeks on the other, and no way of coming to it but by the common passage Places, which are four. A Battery thrown up at each of those Places would greatly strengthen us, if you think proper to be at that Expence. I shall likewise in case of any danger have a Vessel in Readiness to secure the Company's Effects.

In your Honr. &cas. favour of the 30th. March you are pleased to Intimate that your dependance was greatly on the Northern Settlements, and directed me to apply for what sums I might want. I accordingly did and Contracted with some indisputable People here for 700 Bales of Cloth and promised them a large and speedy supply not doubting but I should have been enabled to fulfill it, when I spoke of this Place in compari[s]on with Palicol it was in regard to its situation and present strength in both which Respects it is greatly superior abstracted from any Views of a War (in which possibly the Dutch might be Neuter) and of which I could have no certain knowledge at that time.

By the account of Cloth at foot hereof your Hon^r. &c^a. will observe I have continued to provide the Midling Cloths not doubting but you will comply with the former price, if not I shall be glad to be advised soon, for as I am under Contract with the Merchants & cannot recede from that, the Loss would fall heavy on me, it is possible it may have been provided for that price at Vizagapatam, but then your Hon^r. &c^a. will be pleased to consider that in general the necessaries of Life are at least 50 % Cent cheaper there than here which will make Cooly Workmanship and all Manufacturers cheaper in proportion. I have likewise some reason to believe that the Fine Cloths provided that way are inferiour to those made in this part of the Country.

Your Commands Accompanying a supply of five thousand (5000) Madrass Pagodas have been reced. as also Mr. Edward's report to the Board in reply to the Complaint of the Pagodas. I am sorry to find your Honr. &ca. should imagine I had not sufficiently explain'd myself when I said the Pagodas were complained of as deficient in Touch by which was meant that they did not come up to the true Standard of the Coin, in which sense I always understood that word. In reply to what Mr. Edwards says their being of their true Standard but only Allayed with Copper instead of Silver. The Soukars and Merchants hereabouts aver the Contrary they having assayed them and find them worse 5 \Re Cent.

When I desired your Hon^r. &c^a. Approbation of having all the servants belonging to this Factory put under the General Head of Servants Wages, I did not by that mean to have a fresh Head open'd in the Books for that purpose there being one already of that Import.

To what your Hon^r. &c^a. have said concerning my last Years Investment permit me to say in reply that the complaint you have now made of the Ordinary being inferior to that of Vizagapatam has been the case ever since this place has been settled and it is absolutely not to be avoided, for in a Country where Fine Goods are properly the manufacture by which the Weavers are greater Gainers than by Ordinary it will be found very difficult to make them pay that Attention to the improvem^t of this Branch, as can be done in that Country where none but those sorts of Goods are made, which is the case of Vizagapatam, however as I have often already assured your Hon^r. &c^a. no care shall be wanting to improve that Branch of the Companys Business under my Direction, and presume that my Fine equall'd if not surpassed that of Vizagapatam.

The Prices your Hon^r. &ca. affixed to the Package of the White Bales I agree to, tho' from the present price of Wax am afraid I shall be a loser.

The officer here has been Acquainted with your orders of his Cloathing all Recruits from the stoppages.

By Accounts daily reced. from Metchlepatam the French there are making warlike preparations with all expedition and Mons^r. Bussy is shortly expected at Rajahmundrum from Golcondah.

Edwards you were pleased to send me and am very sorry to find that Gentleman expressing himself with so much warmth, I never Imagined that either he did, or that your Hon^r. &c^a. would suffer him to Corrupt the Coin, so far from it that as soon as I was appraized that the Soukars and Government refused to receive them I sent my Vakeel to Peddipore, Rajahmundrum and all the Principal Places to insist upon the Goodness of the money & their taking it and threaten'd to Whip any Banyan in my Districts who should refuse to take them and at the same rate with the others, as to the Redness I imagined it to proceed from the Allay, as to the Touch it was out of my power to Assay it, nor did I melt any tho' some other people did.

I should be very sorry if I could not carry on the Compys business as cheap as any other Person, the difficulty with me in regard to Packing does not Lie in the Gunnys Ropes &ca. but in the Wax which I buy here at 77 Cur. Pas. the Candy of 480 lbs. however I shall nevertheless undertake it at your Price and shall so soon as the Books are closed give you Credit for the amount of Goods for Packing remaining May the 1st. and take the whole upon my Account.

I observe what your Hon^r. &c^a. are pleas'd to remark in regard to the Investment, my utmost care shall be employed to improve the Manufacture and I think the goods are considerably better than they were three or four Years ago.

The Arcot Snow is not yet compleated in her repairs and as soon as she will be ready to receive her Cargo we shall have one of Rice to put on board her and your directions shall be particularly attended to in discharging all arrears of wages due to the time of dispatch, as well as the advancing four months Impress for the further use of that Vessel and this leads us to acquaint your Hon. &ca. that by defraying these Expences & providing a Cargo of Rice for her necessarily takes off so much of our Cash here from the service of our Investment to lessen it greatly, and entreat your Consideration of it in a larger supply.

Your orders concerning the price of the Middling Cloth the Merchants have been acquainted with, and they are contented therewith, I have also talked with them concerning the Quantity of cloth they will be able to bring in by the latter end of August, and they desire me to inform your Honour &ct. that they are in expectation of making up (300) Three hundred Bales if no unforeseen accident intervenes. The French have been for some time past repairing their Factory at Yanam, and have now appointed a proper Resident to be there to carry on their Investment.

The Account Sortment of Cloth has been Received, and my Books shall be closed and sent as soon as the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam send me their Account Current.

I shall pay due regard to what your Honour &ct. says in your Postscript regarding the Fortifications here.

Your Honr. &ca. will observe a difference of Seventy five Pagodas between the Ballance of the Cash in our Books in April and the Ballance of the Cash Account for that Month as sent You from hence, which is owing to an Error in Casting up the Credit of the Cash in January last of Twenty five Pagodas and an Omission of Fifty Pagodas to the Credit of the Cash in February 1754, the books are right and agreable to them we have now adjusted our Running Cash.

The Ship George imported here the second Instant with the Sundry Stores freighted on her for the use of this Settlement, we have mounted some Guns on her, and she now lies here as a Guard Ship in the place of the Ship Prince George which in pursuance to your Directions we have this Day dispatched to Bengall in order to the being repaired and have paid off her wages and Disbursements to the end of last month.

The Chief Use made of the Ship George is as a Magazine and Granary for some part of our Ammunition and Grain it not being adviseable to keep all our stores on shore where our thatched Godowns are every day liable to fire either by Villany or Accident, when we shall be able after the Rainy months to build a Magazine and Granary with Bricks, the Expence of a Guard ship may be saved, and I shall then discharge her from the Company's service, and advise you of the time of my doing so that the Demurrage may be settled.

Seventeen of the Thirty Military Received here from on board the Ship George were immediately conveyed to the Hospitall so that the probable Death of some of those men is not wholly to be attributed to the unholsomeness [sic] of this Island.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have received your favours of the 13th. April & 11th. Instant and shall take care to have the Prince George thoroughly repaired on her Arrival here.

The Treasure your Hon^r. &cta. Consigned us on the Fortune Ketch has been landed and turns out right.

Conformable to your Request we shall direct our Resident at Balramgurry to station Peons between that place and Ganjam for expediting any advices it may be necessary to send to or receive from your Hon. &cta., we shall likewise give him Orders to forward every intelligence that may be material of all Vessels appearing in Ballasore Road to the Chief at Vizagapatam.

From the advices transmitted us by our Honble Masters 🔁 Delawar, there is great reason to apprehend a War between the Crowns of Great Britain and France is unavoidable, and we are directed (in consequence of the present situation of affairs in Europe) to be strongly on our guard and in constant readiness in every respect to defend their Estates Rights and Priviledges. We think it therefore incumbent [on] us to inform your Hon^r. &c^a. how defective we are of Europeans in our Garrison at present owing chiefly to the detention of the Recruits designed for some years past for this Presidency. A List whereof we now enclose for your observation Amounting in the whole to 663 private men which we have not objected to hitherto, as the troubles upon your Coast made such a measure necessary, and we had no immediate occasion for them at this place. But the present appearances of a War with France, and the little reliance there can be put in black Portuguese Soldiers in case of our being attacked prompts us to request your Honr. &ca. will supply us with as large a Reinforcement of Military as you can possibly spare, should the War be actually declared, that we may have it our power to make a vigorous defence, which We flatter ourselves you will not omit as the safety of this settlement your Honr. &cta. are sensible must be of the utmost importance to [our] Employers.

We are likewise in great want of Musquets having very few in our stores and most of those but indifferent.

By the Mermaid and Syren Sloops we Consigned your Hon. &cta. 1350 bags of Salt Petre agreable to your Request for sending you two of our Sloops laden with that article. What quantity you may have occasion for We shall supply you with upon receiving your Indent.

Nabob Ally Ver de Cawn demised the 10th. of last month, and has been succeeded in the Government of these Provinces by his adopted Son, Sur Rajah Dowlat, who is in quiet possession of the Subaship.

We request your Hon. &cta. will forward the enclosed Packet for the President and Council of Bombay by the first Pattamar you may dispatch thither.

TO THE HONBLE GEORGE PIGOT ESQR.

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE &CTA. COUNCIL.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We wrote you under date the 25th. Ultimo Duplicate of which letter we now enclose.

Since the date of that address we have been involved in a dispute with the country Government the event of which remains undetermined as yet, and as we esteem our present situation extremely critical from the capricious disposition of our Nabob, We shall trouble your Hon^r. &c^a. with the occasion of the dispute between us, with our Sentiments upon his Conduct, and what we conceive proper for the Securit[i]es of the Honble Company's Estates Settlements Rights and priviledges in those provinces.

In consequence of the Intelligence your Hon^r. &c. gave us in your Letter of the 13th. April we ordered our line of guns next the River to be repaired and strengthened, that we might be as well prepared in case of a rupture with

France as our present works would admit of, this was accordingly begun upon, immediately, and is now very near compleated, sometime after the President receiv'd a Perwannan from the Nabob giving him to understand that he had heard from good authorites [sic] that we were enclosing the town of Calcutta with a strong Wall and a Ditch, which he by no means approved of, and therefore insisted that We immediately destroy'd the Works we had begun and fill up the Ditch we were digging. In reply to this Perwannan the President acquainted him that he had been very much misinformed in relation to the works we were carrying on, having dug no Ditch since the Invasion of the Marrottoes and that we were only repairing our Wharf towards the River which was much damaged and in a bad condition. We were in hopes this answer would have proved satisfactious [sic], but contrary to our expectation, Mr. Watts and his Council at Cossimbuzar on the 25th. of last month Informed us the Nabob had taken great offence at the Reply, and had ordered a party of Horsemen to be stationed on their Factory. Upon the Receipt of this advice the President has a second time addressed the Nabob (as well as several of the Durbar Officers) upon this proceeding of his, what effect it will have we do not as yet know, nor are we able to Judge but from the purport of three Letters (copy's of which we transmit enclosed for your observation) receiv'd from the gentlemen at Cossimbuzar within these two days, we are very apprehensive matters will be carry'd to extremeties there, unless we comply with his peremptuous orders for destroying our works; But as such a Condescension would subject our Flag to the greatest contempt, and render it impossible for us to Transact the Business of our Employers with any safety we are determined not to submit to such arbitrary terms, which if once complyed with we must ever after expect continual trouble upon every frivulous pretence. In order to maintain this Resolution and repel force by force should we be attacked (pursuant to our Honble Masters Commands) We are necessitated to Demand of your Honr. &ca. by the first Conveyances that offer the Recruits detained at your Presidency and intended for this settlement or at least a reinforcement of 500 European soldiers well trained and Disciplined with a proportionable quantity of arms and stores.

We hope your Honr. &ca. will not on any Account, neglect to supply us with the Troops we have demanded, the known temerity of our present Nabobs character making it absolutely necessary, to be always on our guard, and in a capacity to resent any Insult or Injury that may be offered us as well as to preserve the property of our Employers from Plunder, These Considerations induce us to Repeat our Demand, on behalf of the Honble Company, for a strong Body of Military by the first conveyances that offer for this place and as the consequence of either omitting or even delaying to send us such a reinforcement as we have demanded may be very fatal to our Honble Masters Affairs in these provinces We shall not deem ourselves Responsible for what may happen should your Honr. &ca. Refuse, neglect or Defer complying with

our above request.

For our further security we think it adviseable that your Honr. &ca. would

make Admiral Watson acquainted with the purport of this Letter.

The Prince George imported here a few days since and we have directed our Master Attendant to give her a compleat Repair after which (If we do not in the interim receive any Orders from you in regard to her destination) We shall consign her to Mr. Howes, with Stores and Artificers for the Use of the Negrais with orders to proceed from thence to your Presidency.

The Owners of the Fortune Ketch have relinquished the Freight your Honr. &c. had agreed to pay for the treasure consigned us on that Vessel, and as the Honble Company give their servants a permission to send money and necessaries upon their ships Freight free, we imagine you may always forward any supplies for this place without paying Freight upon a proper tender of it to the Commanders of any Vessels belonging to our Settlement.

We purpose to address your Honr. &ca. again the latter end of this month with a Packett for our Honble Masters to be forwarded home by the Delawar.

Enclosed we transmit you a Letter from Captain John Howes, which we received by the Prince George & are

Yesterday Golaum Hossein Cawn sent for our Vaqueel and shew'd him a Letter which his son Golaum Alli Cawn the Nabobs Arisbeggy wrote him from his Camp the Purport of which was as follows, that the Nabob receiving a Letter from the Governour & at the same time one from the French Director was extreamly angry and immedia[tely] sent orders to Roy Doolob to stop our Business at Cossimbuzar and to Mohunlol to write to the Nabob at Docca to stop our Business there, and likewise ordered Cossim Alli Cawn with a Body of Forces to March to Tannahs Fort and has advanced them two Months Pay, since writing the above We have receiv'd a Message from Hunichoudry Huckembegs Duan acquainting us that 400 Horse are arrived upon the Factory, As We have a very weak Garrison at present We Request your Hon. &ca. will send us a Party with a supply of Ammunition. We wrote your Hon^r. &c. the 25th. Instant, that Evening Aumee Beg & Asmult Cawn Jemidaus came upon the Factory with their forces, and have ever since been very troublesome in preventing provisions and other necessaries being brought into the Factory, we are informed orders are gone to Daccu and all the Aurungs, to stop the Honble Company's Business.

We have certain advices that Hackembeg, and his Duan Hurrischowdree have been the occasion of this stoppage by their false representations and Insinuations Relating to our Digging a Ditch and raising Fortifications in Calcutta, We leave to your Honour &c. Judgement wether it would not be adviseable to represent this to the Nabob, and that Hackembeg had under various pretences for many years past, Extorted large sums from us, and impeded our Business by Erecting of Chowkeys, in different places of the Bivor and exacting large sums from all Boats that pass and has also occasioned River and exacting large sums from all Boats that pass and has also occasioned. a great loss to the Company by his Duans, Thessendel and Hurrischowdree, taking up and fleecing our Merchants by which many of them are rendered incapable of paying their Ballances, by which oppressive means on us and other Merchants Thessendel on his Death was possessed of near 8 Lack of Rupees which Hackembeg we are informed seized to his own Use.

We here $\lceil sic \rceil$ the Nabob is near Rajamaul and it is very uncertain when he will return and what his Schemes are.

Since our last Yesterday another Considerable Body of Forces are come upon the Factory under the Command of 4 Jemmidars & more are expected this Evening. There is also a party & Tents on the other side the River opposite to the Factory where we hear they intend to place their Cannon, The Nabob is expected in the City the Day after Tomorrow, we have information by some People that the Nabob intends attacking us & from others that they only threaten us in order that your Hon. &ca. may the sooner Comply with their demand in filling up the Ditch & pulling down what Works you have beginn upon in which he sooms peremptory. We therefore degine your Hores. begun upon in which he seems peremptory. We therefore desire your Honrs. &ca. will either send us up a Body of Men that we may be able to defend ourselves or write to the Nabob that you will immediately Comply with his demand.

Our Doctor having been sent to Kessore Cawn & Cossumally Cawn two of the Principal Jummadars who came upon the Factory this Morning they inform'd him that the Nabob was angry with us, on no other account than upon your Honour &ca. building a draw Bridge at Perrins & the Octagon at Mr. Kelsals Gardens weh. was blown down 2 years ago in the storm & now made larger wch. they have taken for a new fortification & they say that in Case you will break down the Draw Bridge & the Octagon The Forces will be immediately withdrawn if not We must stand to the Consequence.

Since writing the above We have reced. the Inclos'd Letter from one Vacqueel who is at the City.

By the best Intelligence we can get, we have about 2 or 3 Thousand Forces station'd about the Factory.

If your Hon^r. &c^a. will write an Arasdass to the Nabob that you will immediately obey his Orders, We are in hopes he will put an End to this troublesome Affair.

Our Factory has been Invested by the Nabobs whole Force & a large Train of Artillery with repeated orders to attack us unless the Chief went in Person to the Nabob wch. he complied wth. as the only method we thought of to prevent the Compy. being involv'd in War and loosing all the Compy. Effects at the subordinates as our Garrison was very weak both in Men and Ammunition & the Gun Carriages mostly rotten & a scarcity of Provisions, since wch. Messrs. Collet & Batson were likewise sent for in order as they said to accommodate matters upon wch. they thought it was not advisable to go, a perivannah coming at the same time to take of all the Forces from the Factory except Omubeg & his People.

This morning the Chief & Second & Mr. Batson were accompanying Roydullul on his March is said to Calcutta when they stopt us & told us there was an order come from the Nabob for the Second to return to the Fort & deliver up all the Cannon & Ammunition wch. we was oblig'd to comply wth. & are now delivering, The Nabob is said to March Tomorrow to Calcutta wth. all his Forces wch. is computed to be about 50,000 Men.

The Chief & Mr. Batson are still with Roydullul the Nabob's Vanguard.

As we have been in hourly Expectation for these 2 days past of an attack from the Nabob's Army now reckon'd to consist of upwards of 50000 Men besides a Train of Artillery Mr. Watts & the Council have been trying all Methods to accomodate matters rather than go to Extremitys they after writing several Arasadasses to the Nabob & also applying to such persons whom

they thought might represent our Case in a proper manner all wch. Efforts have not hitherto had any success. However the 2^d. Ins^t. Meer Hossein Alli Hussembeg's son came into the Factory & inform'd the Gentlemen that the Nabob wanted to talk to the Chief upon wch. it was thought adviseable for him to go immediately wth. our Doctor accompanied with Meer Hassein Alli who promis'd him to introduce him to the Nabob, I do not as yet hear this has had the Effect expected. They oblig'd Mr. Watts to sign a Machuteka wch. to the best of my remembrance signifies as follows. 1st. No Protection is to be given in Calcutta to any of the Nabobs subjects. 2d. The Draw Bridge at Perrings & the new Fortifications are to be demolish'd & 3d. no Dusticks to be given to any of the Black Merchts. & upon Mr. Watt's wanting to come to Coss^r. again they prevented him saying they understood his signing any Paper wou'd be of no validity except all the Gentⁿ. in Council sign'd it & that he shou'd remain till the rest came upon wch. Messrs. Collet & Batson went in expectation to sign it but when they arriv'd a Perivannah came from the Nabob as the Gentlemen write me with orders for the second to return & deliver up all our Guns & Ammunitions & for Omerbeg to remain at the Factory only. Since writing the above Mr. Collet arriv'd here who agreable to the Nabobs orders has deliver'd up the Cannon Powder &ca. The Nabob is marching to Calcutta with 50,000 Men takes Messrs. Batson & Watts along wth. him, what the Nabob's Intentions are we at present cannot learn but imagine by most that he is going to Calcutta.

My last address was to acknowledge the receipt of your Favour by the Sloop Syren and the supply of (10,000) Ten thousand Madrass Pagodas by that Vessel.

This waits on you wth. the usual Papers for the last Month; my books shall be sent by the next Conveyance.

The 18th. of last month one of this Garrison Deserted to Yanam, as soon I had notice thereof I sent to the Gentleman that was then on the Spot and demanded his being deliver'd to me agreable to Treaty, who sent me for answer that as he was no way concern'd in the Care of that Settlement he cou'd not do it without an order from Mr. Pannon who was Chief and was at Narsipore, but he shou'd immediately acquaint that Gentlemer therewith; that Night the Man was sent away to Rajahmundrum wth. A French Peon as a Guide, being met by one of the Inhabitants of this Place on the Road wth. the said Peon wth. him soon after Mr. Bury (who has the Charge of the Settlement in absence [of] the Chief) arriv'd having been in the Country during this affair, of whom I immediately demanded the Deserter, but he told me it was out of his Power as he was not in the place, for more particular Account threof I beg leave to referr you to the Copys of our Letters now inclos'd that pass'd between that Gentleman & me on the subject where you will perceive what subterfuges he makes use of to decline Acting agreable to Treaty.

In Obedience to your Orders I have admitted Christnah Row's Agents to the Management of the Deve Cotah Farm and promis'd them all reasonable assistance they might stand in need of.

The New Fortifications are already in great Forwardness, and Nothing shall be wanting to get them as speedily compleated as possible, hitherto no obstacles have arose to prevent it, when there does will not fail to advise you of it.

TO MR. DRAKE.

SIR

As by all advice from Chellumbrum Porto Novo & Karikall, we find the French are in motion, and continually Reinforcing those Garrisons by detachments of Europeans from Pondicherry & by raising new Companys of Seapoys. The Proximity of those places & the facility with which different partys may join to Invest Deve Cotah (to which they may be allur'd by its present situation) oblige me to represent to you that for our security whilst Carrying on our works & better defending such as will soon be finish'd we ought to have a Reinforcement as on the other side.

As the Hon. Council may at this present Juncture think such a demand unreasonable, I beg leave with all submission to Communicate my reasons; First the Europeans are necessary as we have not any more than 42 Men in all, out of which there are generally 9 or 10 sick, as to our Artilery besides a deficiency in number, out of what we have, there is 1 absolutely unfit for any service, and another who can only do Garrison duty. We may depend upon our Passes to retard the too high approach of an Enemy, as those passes are 5 in number they will require as many partys as for their defence and some of those partys pretty Considerable, to those add the Numbers necessary to Man our Extensive Ramparts. I believe the Number requested will appear scarcely sufficient; I mention the Gun Carriages in a particular manner, because as there is no occasion for larger Cannon than 12 Pounders & some of our best Carriages are for Pieces above that Caliber, & those under are such as have unweildy Field Trains requiring many People to work them they may be pronounced useless. We may be said not to have any Cannon for service except those for the Field.

I am thoroughly sensible of the Honour done me by the Hon. Council in committing to my charge the Command of this Garrison and the direction of the intended works it shall always spur me on to do my Duty in both stations to the utmost of my power and it is with the greatest submission to their better judgments, that I lay before them the reasons why the Ditch about this place may be the work we might first go about. For as the Place is very large there cannot be spar'd a large Garrison sufficient to assure it from a surprize by Escalade from an Enemy vastly superiour to the Defendants (and none but such as are will ever undertake it). To such the greatest obstacle you must present is such a Ditch as is projected & which the sooner it is gone on the safer you are from such an attempt, nor need the Execution of it, retard the rest, since the Men who are to work on it are absolutely useless Elsewhere, & to it add that the Earth which comes from the Excavation of this Ditch, is to form the Rampart, Parapet, & Glacis to the intended Counterguards & Body of the Place.

To this I add the Indents for Stores wanting in this Garrison & request your acquainting the Hon. Council that as to the returns of small stores it is almost impossible to make a just one of them, till such a time as I can arrange them in their proper order, and places now prepar'd for them. Inclos'd are triplicates of what we have wrote you within these few days, & Coppies of the Letters we have receiv'd from the Gentlemen at Cossimbuzar with an Account of the delivering up that Place to the Nabob the 4 Instant.

From those advices your Honour &ca. will observe He is determined to march against this Settlement, and we have receiv'd Authentick Advices that his Artillery and a Considerable Body of his Forces are already on their way down. We are preparing every thing in our Power to make as vigorous a defence as possible. But as our Garrison is extreamly weak we shall endeavour to amuse him and avoid coming to Hostillities as long as we can in hopes of your sending us a sufficient reinforcement (when you know our situation) not only to repel those Troops he may bring against this Place, But to recover the Honble Company's Factory at Cossimbuzar.

As our safety and honour must therefore depend chiefly on the relief you are to send us, We are again to request in the most Earnest manner, as you tender the Interest of our Employers so deeply concern'd in this Settlement as you regard the lives & propertys of the Inhabitants, And as you value the Honour of our Nation all of which are now at stake, That you do not on any motive whatsoever neglect to supply us with the number of Men we have demanded, Which is the only means left Us to recover Cossimbuzar, to defend ourselves, and to transact the Company's Affairs on any footing of security, should you after all we have said and urged upon this Head either refuse or delay, the reinforcement we have demanded, We hope your Honour &ca. will excuse us, if We exculpate ourselves by protesting against you in Behalf of our Honble Employers, for all the Damages and ill consequences of such Default.

We are likewise extreamly deficient in Musquets, Shot Bayonets, small Field Peices Mortars and most kind of Military Stores a proportionable quantity of which we shall likewise Expect from Your Honours &ca.

Mr. Hume's Opinion of the necessity of carrying into execution as speedily as possible the new works plann'd out by that Gentleman it will be needless for me to trouble you with a repetition of it, but shall wait your further Directions on that Head, and if consented to, Your Honr. &ca. may be persuaded they shall be forwarded wth. the utmost alacrity.

Your favour of the 12 May came to hand the 27th, following and we are

much obliged for the advices you have been pleased to Communicate.

On the 21st. Ulto. at Midnight the 3d. King of Nelleaseram took a Fort named Mollaly from the French situated a few Leagues to the Northward of Us, and which maintain'd the Communication of their Forts of Ramdilly & Nelleaseram, both adjacent thereto & are part of the Possessions they acquir'd from the late unhappy troubles this settlement was involv'd in with the Prince of Cherrica. It was surrounded with Cheval de Frezes, mounted twenty two Guns many of them eighteen Pounders, was commanded by a Lieutenant with forty three soldiers (of whom twenty four were Europeans) and some Seapoys. The Number of Nairs who went against it did not exceed one Hundred and Fifty with no other Arms than swords and Targets, of whom only nine first scaled the Walls, who watching till the two Rounds with Lanthorns met, fell upon them and Cut them to Pieces, after which a further number of Nairs, making in all about Thirty five coming to their assistance, they with that number surprized the whole Garrison, whom they put to the sword, except the Gunner who promising to point their Guns in case they spared his Life, was saved for that purpose; Besides the twenty two Guns this Fort mounted; it had one Mortar with about Two hundred Musquets and Warlike ammunition of all sorts; This Loss has greatly alarmed the French, who have been obliged to apply to several of the Powers hereabouts for succour, and the Prince of Cherrica has afforded them upwards of one Thousand Men, notwithstanding with it is doubted whether they will be able to maintain their Possessions to the Northward untill a Reinforcement may arrive from your Side. Nothing at present offers further to add but that We remain

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

It is with the Utmost Concern We now inform you that Fort William was taken by the Moors the 20th. Ulto. the rise of these Troubles are as follows.

The Nabob under various pretences sent a Guard upon our Factory at Cossimbuzar to stop our Business as is customary in this Country when they have any demand on the Europeans and dayly increased the Force till the Factory was surrounded by his whole army which by the most moderate computation consisted of 10,000 Horse 20,000 Ragepout Gun Men and a large Train of Artillery and then demanded Mr. Watts to go out and see him; the Nabob's Duan who commanded the Van of the army Writing Mr. Watts a Letter that He might go out with great safety that no Harm shou'd happen and that he wou'd introduce him to the Nabob, upon this We thought proper to send the Surgeon of the Factory to the Duan and he gave him the same assurances, and sent him back with a considerable Person & a present of Beetle (wch. is esteemed a pledge of Faith) to accompany the Chief to the Nabob accordingly agreable to the Unanimous Opinion of the Gentlemen of the Factory and officer of the Garrison, the Chief went and was introduced to the Nabob who immediately order'd him into Confinement and insisted on

his giving an obligation that in Fifteen Days Time the Gentlemen of Calcutta shou'd level what new works they had raised, deliver up the Nabobs Tenants who had fled for protection there and that if it cou'd be proved that we had falsified the Company's Dusticks by giving them to those that had no right

to them. We shou'd pay back what the Government had suffered by Loss of Dustics, the Chief being in their hands was obliged to sign this, they then told Him that his signing was of no consequence without the rest of the Council, accordingly upon the surgeons returning to the Factory and acquainting Messrs. Collet & Batson that it was necessary they shou'd go to the Chief in order to make an End of the Affair they went and were detained Prisoners nothing more being said about the obligation the Chief had signed (the Chief solemnly asserts that he told the surgeon to let Messrs. Collet & Batson know He did not think it adviseable for them to quit the Factory) the next day We were order'd to deliver up our Cannon & ammunition weh. we complied with. in hopes entirely to pacify the Nabob, the Army then drew off from the Factory Mr. Batson was sent back to the Factory & Messrs. Watts & Collet kept prisoners in the Camp wch. then bent its March towards Calcutta. We have since heard all the Godowns at Cossimbuzar were sealed up wth. the Nabobs seal and the Soldiers remains, in the Factory carried Prisoners to Muxadabad.

As the Chiefs going out of the Factory may perhaps appear extraordinary We think it necessary to give our Reasons for taking such a step, it has been always Customary in Bengal for the Chiefs of the Subordinates to visit the Nabobs of the Province and we had great reason to believe that on paying this visit We shou'd be able to accommodate Matters and prevent his March to Calcutta. If we had refused our Factory must inevitably have fallen into their hands with. all the Company's Effects outsanding in Bengall. Our Garrison being in no condition to make a defence against so large a Force Our Factory being surrounded on Three sides by Houses which overlooked our Bastions & some not thirty yards from the Bastion most of our Guns were Honey Combed & Carriages rotten though we had repeatedly Indented to Calcutta for new ones, our Garrison consisted of about 50 Soldiers most of whch. [sic] were Black Portegueze. We had about 80 Maunds of Powder but few or no shot or Granades, We might possibly with this Force have held out 3 or 4 Days, which wou'd not have prevented the Consequence that have since happen'd and We undoubtedly shou'd have been blamed for having commenced a War with. the Government and we are very sensible had the Gentlemen of Calcutta thought proper to treat Affairs might have been accommodated even when the Nabob was on his March.

We can give no certain account how Calcutta was taken We being then Prisoners in the Camp, but We have since heard the Governour Commandant and several other Gentlemen of the Council with, part of the Garrison quitted the Fort and retired on Board their Ships wch. flung the rest into Panick & Confusion, weh. occasion'd the Fort to be surrendered to the Moors. We hear Mr. Holwell was taken Prisoner in the Fort and is in Irons We have no certain News of the Fate of the other subordinates but it is reported they are Plundered, most of the Company's servants that remained when the Governour &ca. went away were either killed or have since died by ill usage.

We shall address your Honour &ca. again when we can do it with. more

certainty.

We were released about four days ago & agreable to our desire were delivered to the Care of the French who has the Nabobs orders to send Us safe to Madrass, inclos'd is a Coppy of a Letter from the Nabob to the Director of Chandenagore as also one to the Governour of Fort St. George. The Civilitys that we and all the English have received from this settlement requires the greatest acknowledgments, lest any false reports shou'd reach your Honour &ca. We can assure you that to the best of our knowledge the French have given no assistance to the Country Government but have suffer'd greatly themselves having been obliged to pay 400,000 Rupees and the Dutch as much or more.

We beg the favour of your Honour &ca. to represent to our Honble Masters our distress'd situation by the first Conveyance and we hope from their Candour that the part we have acted will not be disapprov'd of as we are conscious to ourselves that had the Governour & Council made any proposals to the Government affairs might have been accommodated. Fort William subsisted and their Effects at the subordinates and the Arungs safe, but by all accounts they were as averse to any Terms of Peace as they were incapable of War.

We have given Receipts, as these Notes will be tendered to your Honour &ca. from Pondicherry for payment We beg the favour of your Honour &ca. to Honour them and in Case the Company do not think proper to make Us any allowance we shall with pleasure repay the Sum advanced. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Since our last We have receiv'd a letter from the Gentlemen on Board of the ships at Fulta Copy of wch. We enclose as also Copy of a Letter they desire to be translated into Persians and sent to the several great Mén about the Nabob for permission to reestablish the Settlement.

We must beg leave to observe to your Honour &ca. that We wrote to the Governour & Council of Calcutta when we were at Houghly (which was the

first opportunity We had) that if they wou'd send a proper person or Empower Us We flatter'd ourselves that We shou'd be able even then to accommodate Matters for a sum of Money. We are not certain but are inform'd that That Letter was receiv'd and an answer wrote Importing that after the Affront the Nabob had given of sealing up the Company's Effects and Confining their servants at Cossimbuzar they cou'd not think of coming to any Terms of accommodation. We are inform'd likewise by Cossenaut one of the Company's Banyans that Ommichund & some of the Principal Merchants offered to contribute considerably towards making up affairs, Coja Wazeed, the greatest Merchant in Bengal who resides at Houghley and has great influence with the Nabob, His Duan told us that He went four Times to Calcutta in order to persuade the Gentlemen to make up Matters with the Nabob but was threatened to be ill used if he came again on the same Errand.

We shall do all in our Power to get Permission to reestablish the Settlement but are without any hopes of obtaining during the Life of the present Nabob. We therefore know of no other method, but that of a Military Force, which We hope your Honour &ca. will be able to send sufficient to attack the Nabob even in his Metropolis as we hear a Peace is confirm'd with France.

There are 79 of our Serjeants Soldiers & others in the Hospital here who escaped from Calcutta and are provided with provisions & Cloaths by the French Governour & Council who have been extreamly Humane to us All and now mantain by Charrty [sic] near 3000 Poor, Portuguese Men, Women, & Children who were Inhabitants of Calcutta.

Inclos'd you have Duplicate of our last and we persuade ourselves your Honor &ca. will pardon us for reminding you how essential it is to send us an immediate supply of Cash, otherwise our Investment will be much retarded and we greatly distress'd for Money for the Expences of our Garrison.

Our utmost Efforts have been employ'd to dispatch to you sooner the Intelligence of the Capture of Calcutta by the Moors acting under orders of

Souragge Dowlat the New Nabob which Account we doubt not ill have reached you before this can possibly arrive by means of Pattamars from the Shrooffs or Foreign Nations. A Narrative of this unhappy Event will be in our opinion faithfully related to you by Mr. Charles Manningham which we have not time to commit at present to writing. The above Gentlemen we depute to your Honour &ca. on the United East India Companys behalf & Require from his Representation that you will support us with the whole force you can obtain on your Coast Military and Marine together with a sufficient quantity of Ammunition Cannon and all other Warlike Stores Military and Marine which may enable us to reestablish Ourselves in these Provinces which we esteem of the most Essential Consequence to the East India Company and Trade of India in gene-It is highly proper to represent to your Honour &ca. that the English here were establish'd by Patent from the Grand Mogull under whose Orders all Subahs shou'd be dependant, But as your Honour &ca. are well acquainted that this province was overcome by Ally Wer de Cawn, who ma[i]ntained his Conquest by force of arms so was it possessed by his Grandson who assumed the Title of Sourage Doulat, wherefore further to favour our Cause and just Complaints for Restitution & Right to the Priviledges granted us by the Royal Phirmaund, We are to request you will without delay set forth to the Grand Mogull the Enormities committed by the present Nabob on a Nation that has always paid due Obedience to the Tenor of his Phirmaund nor infringed on its Priviledges, requiring and entreating by his authority to Reestablish us in all our Rights and that the loss sustain'd by the Company & Inhabitants of the Settlemt. may be made good. We are at present endeavouring to open a Correspondence with the Principal Men whom we are inform'd the Nabob attends to in hopes to bring on a Treaty untill we can obtain succour and that we may in some measure be relieved from our present Distress being in the utmost want of all necessarys of Life, and strict orders issued by the Government not to supply us with any provisions The Dutch and French are also prohibited giving us any assistance, Their Situation appears very precarious, and we are told the French have wrote for a large Reinforcement from Pondicherry. Our Determination is to keep the River untill We are inform'd of your Honour &ca. Resolutions and in case we are not able to procure any favour from the Government or shou'd be persecuted by the Enemy so as to be oblig'd to stand out to Sea we shall proceed to Vizagapatam, this we think proper to mention as it may be necessary that the ships in their way to the Bay call there for Intelligence which we shall lodge there if we are able to procure any Conveyances, for the Ingratitude of our immediate servants has been such, that we are drove to the necessity of doing every individual office for Ourselves nor have we been able to procure a Pattamar or a Persian Writer and it is with the utmost difficulty we have hitherto kept together a sufficient number of Lascars to work our ships and are dayly apprehensive they will quit us the first Occasion. We have desired the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam to provide & hold in readiness what provisions of every kind they are able to procure to be put on Board the Vessels coming down hither. We request your Honour &ca. to represent a full state of all the Occurrences to Rear Admiral Watson the Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Squadron and entreat his Aid & Assistance with the Fleet which We hope may be able to proceed hither.

Monsieur Le Bon (who had command of one of our advanc'd Batteries, & defended the same very gallantly) accompanys Mr. Manningham, and will in Case of Accident happening to Mr. Manningham, deliver you these advices, we esteeming Mr. Le Bon qualified to give you a Circumstantial detail of our Military proceedings, as also inform you of the various Stores We are in want of.

As we imagine the news of this Capture will produce very bad Consequences in England to the Honble Company's Affairs if they receive it without being

inform'd at the same time of there being a Prospect of our resetling in Bengal. We are to request your Honour &ca. will alter your Resolution for sending the Delawar to Europe till you know the Success of the Forces you may be able to assist us with. We are

October, Duplicates of which are forwarded in this Ships Packet. We have since received your Commands of the 7th. March last & Hartop Snow, to which and those brought us by the Brittania in May 1755 and Prince Edward Snow importing here in March last we shall now reply and give a Detail of our Transactions in the management of our Honble Masters concerns here since the Prince George's dispatch from hence in February 1755 Though to the time of the Exeter's dispatch for England in April last we must beg leave to refer you in general to our Advices to the Honble the Court of Directors by that ship and the Anson which come numbers in this Packet: what further has occurred worthy Notice we shall communicate under the following Establish'd Heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

- 2. Our Letters above referred to will acquaint you with the time of the Elizabeths dispatch from Manna last year and that of the Anson, from the same Place, this with the quantity of Pepper shipped on Board of each, as well as our proceedings relating to the dispatch of the Exeter, which shipsailed from hence for England the 6th. of April last with a full loading of Pepper on Board her, and we hope (notwithstanding the lateness of season) will be in time to gain her Passage round the Cape.
- 3. . . The Marlbró Hoy & two unserviceable Long Boats were sold at Publick Outcry to the best bidders, the former for a mere triffle in comparison to the vast Sum she stood at on our Books, but as the Expence of navigating herwas considerable and but little Service to be expected from her, we thought it wou'd be a saving to Our Masters to get rid of her on any Terms. The other and only Long Boat we had fit for Service was lost coming up from Pooloo with Timbers for our new Bridge; we therefore purchased another of Captⁿ. Fernell for \$ 125 . . and as Boats of this kind wou'd be of great use to us in loading & unloading our Storeship & other of the Companys Vessels we request that we may be furnished with the three promis'd us in your Letter by the Prince George as opportunities may offer, that the heavy Expence of Boat hire which our Honble Masters are now at may be as much as possible reduced.
- 4. . We are concerned to find a misconstruction of our Letter to your Honour &ca. by the Orange Tree Sloop shou'd have drawn on us your Censure; Our address to the Gentlemen at Bengall by that Conveyance which is entered in our Book of Letters sent now transmitted you will however we hope sufficiently acquit us of any design of deviating from the Obedience our Honble Masters have so strictly enjoined us to pay to You as our Superiours, and shew that the Intent of it was only to guard against having a ship sent us from thence again in the like Circumstances with the Elizabeth, as our Masters are by that means made accountable for Accidents not in our Power to prevent.
- The Mary Sloop has been ever since June 1755 and still station'd at Nattall where She must now remain (being the only Vesselle we have left and she extreamly out of Repair) till your Honour &ca. send us some Sloops for the Service of this Coast. For it is not but with the utmost Concern we are to acquaint you, that the Sloop Swallow the 6th. of May about two o'Clock in the afternoon just as she was about to Sail for Nattall with supplies of Stores for that Place and Mr. Randh. Marriott Resident on board, sunk in the Road without the least bad Weather or any other apparent reason that we can yet learn & with the Cargo she had in her notwithstanding all the assistance possible was immediately sent off to her entirely lost; The Lives of the People were however saved and Mr. Mariott who first left the Vessell was we find the first Person on Board who discovered the Perilous situation she was in, and had not they cut the Cable instantly & run the vessell nearer in, it's highly probable most of the People on Board her must have perish'd. The Master & Mate were confin'd immediately on coming ashore, as we apprehended the accident might have been owing to bad management in them and on the 8th. of May they were called before the Board & seperately examined concerning it, but neither of them cou'd give any distinct accot. of the matter from whence it seems most likely that she must have started a Plank; But to admit of such a supposition it must be allow'd that the time she was on shore under the Carpenters hands and the Expence of repairing her have been very ill bestowed, to which we have only to observe in answer That as we are in a great measure obliged to rely on our Workmen in Cases of this nature not being ourselves Competent Judges in such matters and the most Capable People we had were employed on her, we flatter ourselves this unfortunate

accident will not be imputed to any neglect in us particularly as the prodigious Expence this Vessell has run Our Masters to in Repairs ever since the first purchase of her is a convincing Proof that she must have been originally little worth; We are the more concern'd at this misfortune as our want of vessels is now extreamly pressing as well on account of supplying the Settlement of Nattall with stores or Men on any Emergency and to station there to protect its Trade from the Atcheneese & Dutch Cruizers, as to transport hither the Pepper from the Southern Settlements considerably augmented this last season, as we flatter ourselves it will now continue to do annually, and as we are at present under a necessity of Employing Country Boats to bring it up at the heavy rate of four Dollars Bahar and at a great risque we must earnestly request that the two Sloops of about Fifty Tons wrote for some time ago by the Supravisors & another of about Eighty of some Force to be station'd at Nattall in the room of the Swallow intended for that service, may be sent us as soon as possible, for without them Our Honble Masters Concerns must be extreamly prejudiced as private vessels are seldom to be hired for either of the above purposes that are trustworthy and the owners of them will make their own Terms shou'd an Emergent necessity of any kind oblige us to employ them Lascars sufficient to Navigate them & the Long Boats will be highly necessary likewise as they cannot be procured here on any Terms.

- Madrass arrived on this Coast sometime in May last loaded with Opium, Iron, & Salt, the Detriment this must be of to the sale of those Articles on Accot. the Company has been already so often treated on and is so very Evident that it is needless here enlarging on the subject. We cannot however help observing that while the Company's Servants on this Establishment are debarred the Dismission from the service, it cannot but be a very sensible Mortification to benefits which the Trade of this Coast wou'd afford them, under Penalty of them to see those benefits enjoy'd by others who they are far from thinking have so good a right to them. We shall wave saying any thing further on this matter here but beg leave to submit our present Circumscribed Trade and Priviledges to your Consideration.
- 7. . . The adventure Snow a Private Vessell which was sent to Croee in February last for Pepper and by our Letter to the Honble Court of Directors P Exeter your Honour &ca. will perceive we had given over for lost, with much difficulty and in great Distress got to Batavia from whence after refitting she returned the beginning of last month but with only Ten Bahars of Pepper in her, the rest having been thrown overboard when she sprung a Leak.
- . . As the last Seasons Pepper at Manna, was late in receiving we had only ready for the Anson on her arrival about the Quantity necessary to Compleat her Charter party Tonnage reckoning the Ninety Tons of Salt Petre put on board her at Bengall as part, before her Departure however we cou'd have compleated the Two Hundred and Fifty Tons we desired room for but as in such case we must have taken her Salt Petre out we chose rather to load on her no more than was barely sufficient to fill her up, reserving what was left on Hand for any ship that might be sent us for China this year, but the season is now too far advanced to expect one, we are nevertheless in hopes it will prove more beneficial to our Employers than if it had been sent to that Market; For as we have now on Hand near three Hundred Tons of Pepper at this Place and the several southern subordinates, two Hundred and Fifty Tons of which at least will be in readiness for shipping off by the latter end of February, and as we make no doubt this seasons Crop will rather exceed than fall short of the preceeding years (none of which is yet receiv'd) we think we may safely reckon on having a Compleat Loading of Four Hundred and Twenty four Tons on Hand (exclusive of that quantity for our annual Ship) by the latter End of February for any ship or ships that may be destin'd

hither to take it in, wch. we doubt not your Honour &ca. will therefore give such Directions about as to you may seem most conducive to the Interest of our Honole Masters.

9. . . The middle of last Month arrived here in a Sloop of his own the Dutch Governour of Macassar having designedly passed by Batavia intending to proceed from hence to Europe on acco^t, some private affairs of his as far as we can learn, depending in one of the Courts of Justice at Batavia. He has disposed of his Sloop & purposes remaining here till the Dispatch of our Store Ships.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OF ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSE'D OF AT ANOTHER.

- of Infinite service to us, and the rice received from Bengall by the Anson came very opportunely. The Salt by this Vessell came very seasonably likewise as our Stock was very nearly exhaust[ed], we were oblig'd to restrain the Issues of it to reserve even the little we had left, This however ought by all means to be avoided as it gives great disgust to the Inhabitants & sets them about making it themselves to the detriment of the Investment and as the settlement of Nattall only if properly supplied wou'd take off all we have now on hand (where there is at present a very great want of it) exclusive of the great demand for it at Moco Moco & the other subordinates, we shall be able to dispense with as much more in about four or five Months, indeed if we are not supplied again by that time we shall be distress'd for want of it.
- 11. . . We have now in store of Rice about sufficient for six Months and therefore request your Honour &ca. will give the necessary Directions for our being supplyed with that article by the ship which may be sent us for our Surplus Pepper.
- 12. . . The Gunpowder sent us from Bengal by the Elizabeth Captain Wills proves so excessively bad [as] to be utterly unfit for use. We sent a Chest of it to Our Honble Masters by the Anson for their Inspection and Notice and now send one for the same purpose to your Honour &ca.
- We are now in the utmost Distress possible for Military stores of all kinds; Our Guns are the greatest part of them so much Honey Combed as not to be fit for service, and the Carriages they are mounted on are so extreamly decayed & Rotten as to be insufficient to support their Weight. Survey whereof and an Indent for new were transmitted to your Honour &ca. by the Prince George in February 1754 which we had hopes we shou'd have long since been supplied with. The vast Expence of Cooley hire & tediousness of our Workmen, deterred us from setting about making Carriages here, but the wretched Condition those we have are now in has at length obliged us to give directions for doing it. We must however, wait the arrival of the storeship from Batavia before this work can be taken in hand not being able to procure proper Plank for them here wch. we have therefore given orders to the Captⁿ. of the ship outward bound for this Place in a letter lodged for him at Batavia to purchase for us there; but as our being supplied from thence with Plank is a matter of doubt, and as we cou'd not even in that Case with the Workmen we have here expect to make any great progress in that work for many Months, we must request to be supplyed as well with them & Cannon as the several other Military stores inserted in the accompanying Indent, as soon as possible for the settlement now is in a most wretched defenceless state even against a Country Enemy for want of ammunition; not having above ten Barrels of Powder fit for service in our magazine, We thought it proper by this opportunity to advise you of this our situation and therefore gave directions of the Military of the state of t tions to the Commanding Officers of the Military & Train to take a survey as

well of the Fortifications as Stores and give us their Opinions in writing concerning them, specifying such stores as we were in want of, which the above mention'd Indent is an Extract from, Their Letter to us on this occasion being entered after Consultation of the 5th. Ins^t.

- 14. . . The Salt, Wares &ca. consign'd us by this Vessell have been all safely Landed & turned out right except the Salt, the deficiency in which after deducting the usual allowance of Six P Cent for wastage has been made good by the Captain.
- 15. . . The five Pipes of Madeira Wine you have been pleased to send us were all disposed of as soon as Landed at an advance of 25 P Cent on the Invoice price, and we return Your Honour &ca. many thanks for this supply hoping the like Indulgence from you annually.
- 16. . . The Long Cloth white brought us by this Vessell was sent a few days ago to Moco Moco where there is an annual demand for near Forty Bales, so that the Quantity we have now receiv'd will not be near sufficient for this years Consumption, and we cannot depend on being furnish'd again from Private Hands and as the Planters without it will be much disatisfied and it is highly proper to have always a years stock on hand least we shou'd by any Accident be disappointed of the supplys intended us, we desire a further Quantity of at least sixty Bales may be sent us in time to be here by the latter End of November next which the Vessell that brings it may be order'd to land at Moco Moco as the northerly winds that constantly blow at the time of year and for the two or three succeeding Months wou'd not admit of its being transported thither from hence in time for answering this years demand, It wou'd be likewise saving both Risque & Expence was the vessell destin'd for this service ordered first to Nattall to land there about Thirty Coyan of the Salt she may have on board for this place.
- 17. . . The Ophium brought us from Bengall by the Anson and that purchased from Captain Norway last Year is great part of it still on hand, there is a great demand for it now at Nattall but we have no vessells for sending thither or indeed any where else supplies of any kind. There were ten Chests on Board the Swallow Sloop intended thither which were all lost except three, & those have sustained so much Damage as to be little worth. By a Private Vessell which sailed for that Place a few days ago we sent a small supply of six Chests wch. we hope is a safely arriv'd and will be sufficient to prevent the Merchants from purchasing at other Hands till we can furnish that Market more fully.
- 18. . . Our Arrack, and Sugar Works are in a very flourishing State, a Survey whereof has been taken for your more particular Information, which is entered on our Consultations; The demand we have for these articles at this Place & the several subordinates has taken off a Considerable part of what brought in by the undertakers since the Prince George's departure, the Remainder being about 36 Leaguers of Arrack and 146 Peculs of Sugar we now consign to your Honour &ca. by this vessell reserving only six Leaguers of Arrack for answering the Expence at Marlbró & the call there may be for it from the Outsettlements.
- 19. . . The supply of Copper Cash sent us by this vessell was very seasonable as the Inhabitants have been for some time past put to great Inconveniences for want of small Money but as there is a great demand for Fanams as well here as at the outsettlements for paying the Pepper Customs we request we may be furnished with about Four Thousand Dollars worth by the first Conveyance.
- 20. . The Resident of Nattall having sent us up some Gold on account the Honble Company being what receiv'd in part for Ophium sold there we have consign'd it to your Honour &ca. by this ship as specified in the accompanying Invoice.

- 21. . In this Packet we have forwarded our several Indents for the supplies we are in want of which we request your complyance with.
- 22. . . The number of Male Slaves at present here being very insufficient for the necessary Business of the Settlement and for sending to the Out residencys to accompany the Residents on the surveys, we must request to be supplied by any Opportunities that offer with One hundred more who are capable of enduring hard Labour.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS.

Our Letter to England by the Anson will give a Circumstantial Account of the then State of what relates to this Head, Copies of the several Papers therein referred to come numbers in this Packet for the Inspection of your Honour &ca. The survey of Marlbró districts has been taken again this year by Mr. Henry Gregory, but the Business attending this Dispatch wou'd not admit of his Compleating the Sillebar Survey till after her departure, so that no report thereof has as yet been laid before Us. The Residents of Moco Moco & Cattown are we imagine set out by this time on a review of their respective Districts. Those of Laye & Manna will proceed on the like Service in a few days, but the Resident of Saloomah must wait sometime longer before he sets out as he is busily employ'd at present in receiving & carting up the last season's Pepper that it may be in readiness either for the storeship or the ship that may be sent us for our surplus. The Resident of Cawoor is lately arrived from his Residency where there appears to have been lately a large increase, we shall send Vessells thither shortly to transport from thence the Pepper on hand when he will return to survey his District again. Resident of Croee is in too infirm a State of Health to undertake a Task of that kind but one of the Military there has been lately Employed on that Business which we hear is nearly Compleated, but we have as yet receiv'd no particular account of the state of the Plantations. The Resident however gives us assurances of a considerable Increase in the Investment this season of which indeed there is a most favourable Prospect on the whole Coast, your Honour &ca. will observe by the abstract of Pepper now transmitted you that we had remaining the last of May about Two Hundred & Thirty Tons at this Place and its Subordinates, but by the Letters receiv'd since from the several Outsettlements we find there is now near three Hundred Tons on hand the greatest part of which will we can safely promise be collected in Time for the February Ship and therefore with the promising Prospect we have of an Increase in our Investment this year, we may venture to reckon on having a full Loading (exclusive of what our Storeship, annually takes away) for any ship that may be sent us for it by the latter End of February next, an Abstract of the last years surveys compared with those of the Preceding comes a Number in the Packet whereby the Salutary Effects of sending Company's Servants on this service, will Conspicuously be shewn, and we beg your Honour &ca. will be assured, no pains shall be wanting in us to further this Valuable Branch of our Honble Master's Concerns.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

24. . . By our advices to the Honble the Court of Directors dated in February last Your Honour &ca. will observe that we had sent the Exeter to Nattall with a Reinforcement of Men & Supplies of Stores & had given orders to Mr. Carter to establish a Settlement at Tappanaouly which by our Letter to them in April P Exeter you will find was accordingly Executed without much difficulty. The Dutch however will we are apprehensive endeavour to render our situation there as troublesome as possible at least by assisting the Atchineese and Bugginda Maharaja Lello's party with Money & Arms, if they do not act as principals, having in a most serious manner and with the utmost Impertinence in a Letter received from them summoned us to withdraw

from thence immediately on pain of the Consequences, as being a Place under the Jurisdiction of their Company, founding their principal right theretoon a Contract they pretend was concluded between the Dutch Company and the Chiefs there in December, last; But this Contract is proved beyond all dispute to have been imposed on one Dattoo Proas (a Person of no influence or authority there after they had intoxicated him with Liquor on Board a Dutch Sloop) for a Pass to Padang, who signed his name to it as such, and took upon him to sign likewise the name of one of the Principal Men of that place without his Privity or consent which he declared in a publick manner before Mr. Carter & other witnesses; The leading Men there declaring at the same time that they never were in any shape consenting or Privy to what Dattoa Proas had done and that he had no Power or authority either of his own or from them, to enter into any such Contract. This we thought sufficient to invalidate Pretensions so slightly founded and therefore determined, on considering this matter at the Board to maintain the Settlement established at Tappanaouly as long as we are able, against any attempts that might be made to dislodge us, unless we should receive your Orders to the Contrary; and this our Resolution we have communicated to the General & Council of Batavia in answer to their abovementioned Letter. The several Papers relating to this Transaction are entered in our Book of Letters receiv'd after Mr. Carter's Letter to us on the Subject, to which we beg leave to refer you for further particulars remarks. only here that shou'd we Evacuate the Bay of Tappanaouly & the Dutch make themselves Masters of it which wou'd inevitably be the Consequence Our Settlement of Nattall would not be long worth maintaining.

Your Honour &ca. will observe in our Letter to England Anson the Representations made by us to Our Masters of the unwarrantable proceedings of the Dutch Gentlemen at Padang in seizing a Praw belonging to this Place, bound for Nattall, (which being in want of Water & Provisions had put in at Batang Capas a place within the Dutch Company's Jurisdiction) under pretence that she was come there to carry on an illicite trade requesting their Interposition in behalf of the Owners in Case the General & Council of Batavia to whom we had made application shou'd refuse making them proper satisfaction which indeed we then judged wou'd be the Case, the Letter since receiv'd from them in answer to our demand proves our Doubts to have been well grounded, for notwithstanding Mr. Peter Garden was furnish'd with full and ample Power from the owners to act for them and applied to the General & Council for Restitution yet because the names of the Owners & the Person they had nominated to transact that affair for them were not inserted in our Letter (although they cou'd not be unacquainted with both) they made use of that as an Evasion for not giving the satisfaction we had requir'd of them, briefly telling us that the Gentlemen at Padang had acted in that affair by their Orders, and that they shoud treat in the same manner all Vessells of ours whether with or without Passes, that shou'd put in at any places under their Jurisdiction for Wood, Water or on any other Accot. whatever. Their Conduct since indeed proves such to be their Intentions, for a Praw belonging to the Deputy Governour that left this Place in April last bound to Sinkell having touched at Jeecow a place not far from Padang for water, was immediately seized and carryed thither, the Praw and Goods sold & the Noquedah and three or four of the Principal People belongs. to her made Prisoners where they still continue such. As we do not consider Concerns of this kind as of a private but publick nature, wherein not only the Honour of the Nation but the Rights & Priviledges of our Honble Masters and those of every Englishman are nearly concern'd, as People living under protection of the English Flag, furnished with English Passes & navigating Vessells English Flag, furnished with English Passes & navigating Vessells solely belonging to the English, ought, we conceive to be look'd upon in the same light as English subjects and treated as such and as we have acquainted the General & Council of Batavia in our late Letter to them, that we shall apply (Through the English East India Company) to his Brittanick Majesty for Justice for the Gross Injuries & Insults we have so publickly and unwarrantably received at their Hands, we do not purpose applying for, or accepting any other satisfaction than what shall in a publick manner be adjudged adequate to the Damages & losses we have sustain'd and consistent with the Honour of the Nation, which we shall therefore submit to our Honble Masters & request that your Honour &ca. will back our Remonstrances to that End in your next General advices to Europe.

- 26. . . Mass Pangee Dupatty of Carrang Wharroo formerly a Subjest of the Sultan of Pullembong a Person of very Indifferent Character and who had been often suspected of seducing away the slaves belonging to the Chinese & other Inhabitants about Marlbro, being come down from the Country contrary to the Deputy Governour's Orders and as was imagin'd with no good design, on being sent for by him refused to come, whereupon he ordered the Ensign of the Arabs with some of his People to go & bring him by force, and a scuffle ensuing on the Occasion, Mass Pangee, in attempting to Creize [sic] the Arab Ensign was killed; His Dependants are fled to the Hills, of whom there is no great loss as they were a sett of troublesome Fellows and we believe no other bad Consequences will attend this accident, as he was a Person rather detested than Esteemed by the whole Country.
- The Proateens of the Twelve Doosoons up Polley River who have been so frequently represented for their refractory behaviour and disregard of orders, were sent for down by a Party of Bugguesses & called before the Board to know their Reasons for not having made Plantations according to their Contracts with the Company, who alledged in Excuse for it that the Ground about the Parts where they were settled was not fit for Pepper, we then insisted on their removing lower down the river (as indeed they had often promis'd) but they urged against that, the many Inconveniences that would attend it, we were determin'd however to accept of no other Terms which we at length brought them to agree to, and (though not without some difficulty) prevailed on them to deposit their Creizes [sic] in our hands as earnest of their Compliance. We sent a Party of Bugguesses to remain at their Doosoons till they were removed not thinking the Pledges they had left with us a sufficient security, the Bugguesses returned a few days after & brought us accounts that they found the Doosoons entirely abandoned, the Inhabitants of them on their approach, being fled either to the Woods or the Hills; We sent directions immediately to the Resident of Laye to get what Information he cou'd of their Motions, who acquaints us that they are all returned again to their Habitations and many of them removing lower down according to their promise but that he is of opinion most of them will still continue in their Doosoons if Bugguesses are not sent to oblige them to a removal: We shall take this matter into Consideration after the Dispatch of this vessell and oblige them either to comply with our Terms or retire again to the Hills.
- 28. . . There have lately happen'd at Croee two unfortunate accidents occasion'd by attempts to seize two or three People who have been troublesome there, one of which we have given a circumstantial accot. of in our Letter to England Anson, the other we beg leave to refer you to No. 66 of Letters receiv'd for the Particulars of, We have the satisfaction however to acquaint you that there is no prospect of any Disturbance from either.
- 29. . . We have had no advices of Moment from Nattall since the Exeters departure.
- 30. . . We have augmented the number of Bugguesses stipulated by the Supervisors at most of the Outsettlements and shall be under a necessity of doing so at the Rest, as the Residents complain they cannot take the proper care of their Districts with the present Establishment and we are very sensible that if a proper use is made of them, they must be extreamly serviceable in promoting the Investment.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS REPAIRS & REVENUES.

- We have done nothing to any of the Buildings at this Place or at any of the Subordinates since our last advices to England. In the Letter we wrote you Via Batavia your Honour &ca. will observe we have represented those at Marlbro to be in a very bad condition & that a late severe Earthquake had done considerable damage to them, particularly to Cumberland House and other Buildings within the Fort, a Report whereof from the Paymaster Superintendant of the Works & Bricklayer is entered on our Consultations. A General state of our Godowns Storehouses &ca. was transmitted by the Supravisors in 1754 since when nothing has been done to any of them, so that we leave your Honour &ca. to judge of their present Condition, shattered and shaken too as they have lately been by Earthquakes. We therefore must again take the liberty of representing to you the absolute necessity there is for setting about new as we cannot take upon us to answer for the bad Consequences that may ensue and the loss our Honble Masters may sustain by continuing their Concerns in such insecure and ruined Warehouses, neither do we think we have any Person here qualified to carry on the Works there is occasion for in a proper manner or to judge where it wou'd be most adviseable to pull down or only repair and therefore as the Expence will be heavy and in a manner thrown away if the Work is not well executed, we request a skillfull Person may be sent us to superintend and direct and a few Coast Bricklayers to assist as well as instruct those we have of the Company's in carrying on the Work, in this Case the Male Slaves we requested in a foregoing part of this Letter will be absolutely necessary for collecting Chunam Stone to supply the Kiln while the Works are carrying on.
- 32. . . We have been long in Expectation of your favourable Consideration & Determination on the representations made to Our Honble Masters by the Grantham, in January 1755 & to your Honour &ca. by the Prince George in the February following relating to the Heavy Taxes our Trade here was burthened with, which added to the present indifferent standard of the Goods we are supplied with from the Coast (and to which we are by the late regulations peremptorily confined to) will not yield us any Profit. We cannot but think our present Circumstances too burthensome, we shall however decline entering into particulars & remark only that were the abovementioned regulations strictly to be put in force, we shou'd find it difficult to procure the common necessarys of Life. We beg leave to refer you to Consultation of the 15th. May last, for an Explanation of our meaning, where your Honour &ca. will find we have made some Orders relating to the Price Currt. of Goods here by way of Limitation till we cou'd receive your further Directions concerning these matters which we cannot but earnestly recommend to your Consideration.
- 33. . . The Ophium Licences for the Current Year were sold at publick Outcry on nearly the same terms as last except Moco Moco which no one wou'd give more than Ninety Dollars Month for; The Arrack Licence we have continued in the Hands of the Arrack & Sugar Undertakers on the same Terms, it was let to them by the Supravisors which are better than any one else wou'd be willing to give.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, MILITARY OFFICERS & THEIR ACCOUNTS.

- 34. . . Mr. Combes took passage for England on the Anson in February and Mr. Carter on the Exeter in April last so that we are left in the utmost Distress for Servants, our utmost care however shall not be wanting to keep Affairs in the best Order the few hands we have will admit of.
- 35. . M^r . Marriott sailed from hence in June last for Nattall in order to take upon him the Charge of that Settlement where we hear he is safely arrived, M^r . Gunn succeeded him as Paymaster and we were obliged to appoint M^r . Darvall to the Employ of Accountant in the room of M^r Gunn having

no one else qualified for it; Both he and Mr. Wyatt who succeeds him in the charge of Manna Residency are now there employ'd in taking the Remains where Mr. Darvall will continue till Mr. Wyatt has finish'd the survey, Mr. Preston succeeded Mr. Wyatt as Storekeeper & Mr. Dutton was appointed to the Charge of Croee Residency in Mr. Prestons Stead, but as he is now nominated to the Vaccant Seat at the Board occasioned by Mr. Carter's departure we shall think on a proper Person to suply his Place shortly.

- 36. . . The unsettled Situation of Affairs at Nattall and the Umbrage the Dutch seem to have taken at our settling at Tappanaouly renders it highly probable that we shall not long remain undisturbed there in which Case the present Military fforce at those places will we fear be barely sufficient to maintain our Ground and as our Garrison at Marlbro' has been already so much reduced by Deathe, Desertions & Detachments as to put it out of our power to send thither any further Reinforcements shou'd they be wanted on any Emergency, or to Croee or Moco Moco in case of disturbance, we thought it not prudent to send any Military on this Vessell particularly as our being supplied by the Storeship is very uncertain, which we hope your Honour &ca. will not disapprove.
- 37. . Ensign John Lambe who we advised in our Letter & Orange Tree Sloop had our Permission for proceeding on that Vessell to the Coast takes passage by this Opportunity: He has receiv'd his arrears to Ulto. September 1756.
- 38. . . Thos. Fletcher one of our Military here having been for a long time in a very declining way and as there is no appearance of his growing better here, we have given Captain Savage an Order to receive him on Board as a change of Air may probably reestablish his Health.
- 39. . . Mr. John Massey departed this Life the 4th. May last, he left a will but the Executors declining the Administration we were under a necessity of appointing a Committee from the Board to take upon them the management of his Affairs as his Concerns with the Company remain'd unsettled.
- 40. . . Mr. Daniel Tottie of whose dismission from our Masters service we acquainted your Honour &c³. in our Letter by the Prince George remains here at an allowance of \$ 15 \$\mathbb{P}\$ Month till your pleasure can be known.
- 41. . Mr. John Beach your Honour &c*. will perceive by our Letter to England & Exeter is dismissed the Service. His Disposition & manners have ever been such as to render him the Contempt of the Settlement, we therefore can on no Accot. recommend him for favour, & hope your Honour &c*. will not disapprove of the resentment we have shewn to his late Extravagant Conduct.
- 42. . . The Allowance of £ 10 % Month to Jacob Spears whom we degraded from the Rank of Ensign has been discontinued as he turned out so worthless a Fellow as not to deserve such Favour any longer.

SEVENTHLY TOUCHING ACCOUNTS.

43. . Nothing material that falls under this Head has occured since our last Advices to England except that we have receiv'd into Cash from the Committee apointed to the management of Mr. Massey's Affairs the sum of \$ 1975. 1. 50 on account his estate which will be applied to the Discharge of his Debt to the Company.

44. . . The Ballance of our Honble Master's Cash here this Day is in Dollars, Sooca's & Cash; One Hundred Twenty Thousand three hundred & seventy five Dollars & Thirty Cash (120,375—30). We are very respectfully

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The Accompanying is an Additional Address intended you by the Orange Tree Sloop in Consequence of advices just then receiv'd from Nattall, but the Master wou'd not wait for it, we have since found it necessary to establish a Settlement at Tappanooly which we apprehend will raise new Jealousies in the Dutch, afford matter for fresh Disputes and consequently call for a larger Force to frustrate their Intrigues, maintain our Honble Master's right and protect their Trade, We do not think this a proper opportunity to treat so fully on this subject as we wou'd choose, and shall therefore only repeat our Request for leave to detain the Military brought us from England by the Prince George and that a Vessell of some force may be sent us.

We shall be shortly in great want of Salt unless we receive a large supply by the Prince George or some other Conveyance. Rice we were furnished from Bengall but we shall be able to dispense with as much more when Your Honour &c^a. have an opportunity of supplying us Long Cloth White for the Moco Moco consumption we have a large call for, as well as a quantity of Cloth for slaves Cloathing. Fanams & Copper Cash we have been greatly distressed for want of and we take the liberty of reminding your Honour &c^a. of our Indent for Military Stores by the Prince George in February 1754 and to request your compliance therewith as we are in the utmost Distress possible for the Gun Carriages in particular and shall in prudence & Duty be under a necessity of putting our Honble Masters to a heavy Charge on that account if not speedily supplied; Gun Powder too we shall want at least two hundred Barrells of as that sent us by the Gentlemen of Bengall & Elizabeth is utterly unfit for service: Our Buildings will many of them we are very apprehensive not stand much longer being so decay'd, A Report whereof was transmitted you in 1754 and we have since been in hopes of receiving some directions concerning them. A skillfull person to survey them is more particularly necessary at present, as a late severe shock of an Earthquake has not only greatly prejudiced the old Buildings but done considerable damage to the Fort House, which on being examined by the Paymaster, Superintendant of the works & Bricklayer has been reported by them as irrepairable. We did not however think it proper to do any thing in a work of such Moment ourselves, but take the liberty of recommending it as a matter deserving your particular notice, as the utmost bad Consequences are to be apprehended from its fall owing to the Inconvenience of its situation and which is an Event to be looked for in its present condition should it be put to such another Tryal.

Mr. John Fabry whom your Honour &ca. sent here with a Breviate Commission as Ensign died the day he landed, his Effects were sold at Publick Outcry and their produce remitted to England by Bill agreable to his Direction.

The Anson Captⁿ. Debuke which imported here the 29th. Decem^r. last

Tons. \P qrs. lb. from Bengall to fill up took on board 196 5 2 11 of Pepper being all she wanted to compleat her Tonnage and sailed for England from Manna the 14th. February, she met with a long Detention at that place from the badness of the Weather.

The Exeter Storeship returnd from the Expedition she was sent on to Nattall the 11th. Ulto. and was dispatch'd to England with a full Loading of Pepper the 5th. Inst. we hope notwithstanding the lateness of the season that she will save her Passage round the Cape.

Mess^{rs}. Combes & Carter have taken passage for England the former on the Anson the latter on the Exeter.

The Residents of the several Outsettlements will set out on the survey of their Respective Districts shortly and we flatter ourselves with hope of an increase in the Investment this year, and can therefore venture to promise a surplus of 250 Tons for any ship which may be sent Us from Bengall to fill up, shou'd we have reason hereafter to apprehend a Disappointment we will be carefull to give timely notice.

Our Annual Books Papers and Advices shall be duly transmitted by the first proper Conveyance which offers. We are

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The Orange Tree Sloop being detained here by Contrary Winds we take the opportunity of communicating some advices from Nattall receiv'd since our Letter under date the 30th. Ulto. wherein we have given you a short account of the situation of Affairs here.

By Letters receiv'd yesterday from Mr. Carter Resident of Nattall, we find and it is with concern we acquaint you that the troubles are again broke out with more violence than ever there in which the Atchineese are the Principal Actors have joined Bugginda Maharaja Lello & his Party which we are apprehensive will greatly endanger the security of the Settlement, under these Circumstances we came to a resolution to send thither the storeship with a further reinforcement of 50 Men & a large supply of ammunition of which last Mr. Carter advises they are in great want, & we are in hopes that with this Additional force they will be able to Dislodge the Enemy & restore Tranquility for a longer time than we cou'd otherwise expect and here we think it highly necessary to represent to your Honour &ca. that the Atchineese if encouraged & supported by their King will we apprehend be an Enemy too powerfull for us to oppose with our small Force, we submit it therefore to your Honour &ca's.

Determination whether or no representations from you to their King on this subject might not be the most Effectual means for putting an end to the present Commotions, and we apprehend that if one of the King's Sloops or small ships cou'd be spared to send to Nattall, it wou'd be attended with very good Effects not only with regard to the People of those Countries but with our Rivals the Dutch who we have much reason to think are assists, our Enemies under hand but this also we leave to your better Judgement.

As we are under some apprehensions for the Prince George on which Ship we Chiefly rely on for a Supply of Rice and as M^r. Carter has wrote very pressingly for a supply of that Article which we are not able to furnish him with. We hope your Honour &c^a. will not be unmindfull to take the first opportunity of furnishing us.

As Lieutenant Frith whom we order'd to Nattall some time ago, has behav'd there much to our satisfaction & is an Old Experienced Officer we thought it proper that the Military Command shou'd be continued in his hands & have therefore given him a Breviate Commission as Captain, as he cou'd not otherwise act in that Capacity. Lieutenant Stodart whom we send on this Detachment being a Senior Officer on this Establishment as we think his Merit sufficiently entitles him to your Honour's favour we recommend him to you for a Confirmation of the same.

Ensign John Lambe whom we acquainted you in our Letter of the 30th. Ulto had taken his Passage to the Coast by this Vessell we have been obliged to detain on Account of these Disturbances, and send him to Nattall with this Detachment from whence he will take his Passage to the Coast if a Conveyance offers as soon as the Troubles there are over.

We have receiv'd your Favour of the 6th Instant from on Board the Daddalay off Fultah and are obliged to you for your Congratulations for our safety, as we were Prisoners all the time of our stay in the Camp it was little we cou'd learn of the Nabob's intentions concerning the English, only we heard from all quarters that he was greatly irritated against your Honour &ca. particularly the Governour against whom since the taking of the Place his Expressions have been very harsh and he has threatned both French & Dutch with Extirpation if they assist you with any Provisions. Therefore we are without any hopes that an application to the great Men will have any Effect at present though

had your Honour &ca. thought proper to treat before the Nabob reached Calcutta we are pretty certain a sum of Money wou'd have made all easy prevented the Loss of the Settlement & the Ruin of many Thousands & We wrote to your Honour &ca. to that Purpose when we were off Houghley the only opportunity we had while in the Camp & are informed the Letter came to hand and a Proof that the Nabobs intent was to Accommodate Matters, was that he touched none of the Company's Effects at Cossimbuzar except the Warlike Stores, shou'd the Nabob think fit to permit the English to return & resettle we are affraid it wou'd be not only with the Loss of all their Priviledges but on such shamefull Terms that English men we hope will never consent to and we likewise think that after your Honour & the Majority of you had quitted Fort William which still held out your Power as a Governour & Council from that Moment ceased and we are of Opinion that you have no authority to indemnify us for acting by your Orders in Case your future measures shou'd not be approved of by Our Honble Masters, for the above Reasons we have declined delivering the Letters you sent us.

We hope you will on serious Consideration excuse us for being so cautious

in an Affair of such Consequence.

We have receiv'd your Letter or Protest dated the 13th. of July 1756 and are surprised you should Protest against Us for all the Damages & Wrongs

which may ensue by the Deprivation of our Priviledges contain'd in the royal Phirmaund when we think We can with more propriety say that the Majority of you Gentlemen deprived our Honble Masters of their Priviledges as contain'd in the royal Phirmaund when you incensed the Nabob to come against Calcutta and then deserted the Place & fled on Board your ships, which in all probability & by all Accounts was the occasion of the Loss of the Place which might have been defended if you had staid, and by which step We are of opinion you abdicated your several stations and are now no longer to be deemed Servants of the Company, But setting the above aside if we thought it had been for our Honble Masters Interest we shou'd not have hesitated a Moment getting the Letters Translated & Delivered but if you at this time look on yourselves as a Governour & Council you must of Course allow us our stations, in consequence of which We are persuaded We have a right to Dissent and make our representations against any of your measures which we think contrary to the Interest of our Employers as an Application at present We are of opinion is and that it wou'd be more advisable to wait to see what steps the Governour & Council of Madrass may be able to take to reestablish the Company's Affairs and Credit in Bengall. We having advised them of the taking of Calcutta the 3d. Instant by express Cossids therefore we think an application will be more Efficacious and made with a better Grace when any Force arrives from thence than it can at present whereas shou'd the Nabob now permit you to return into a ruined and Defenceless Town it may be with an Intent to Replunder the Place and secure your Persons for we are of opinion the Nabob is not to be trusted after Things have gone the length they have and as a further reason to imagine that your return may be attended with a risque, is, the harsh and inveterate manner in which the Nabob has express'd himself against Mr. Drake.

We are credibly informed that when you wrote us you made application to those who had more Interest and Power to give weight to your Proposals than We who by great Intercession had but just obtain'd our Liberty. On our coming to the knowledge of this our Intermedling We thought might have been rather hurtfull than any ways of service, however if after the reasons We have given you are still of opinion that the Letters you sent us ought to be translated and delivered we shall agreable to your Desire get them done and send them to the respective Persons directed except Golam Hossein Cawn who is turned out of the Province. We see no reason to doubt the authenticity of it more especially as every material Circumstance is confirmed by the Moors who have from the beginning assur'd us that the Cause of the Nabob's anger against the English proceeded from the Governour & Council having given Protection to one Kissendoss who had been the Naib of this City, he retired to Calcutta in March last with great riches part of which are said to belong to the Widow of Nowagies Mawmud Khan who died in November last & whose riches Seir Rajah Dowlot claimed on his coming to the Subahship of Bengall, when the Nabob sent a Perwannah to demand him, Mr. Drake tore the Perwannah & threw it into the Face of his Messenger, this Insult provoked Seerajah Dowlot to such a Degree that they say he took an Oath to drive the English out of Bengall which he very soon put in Execution as you'll observe Cossimbuzar was delivered without Firing a Gun & Fort William only resisted him three Days, We take the Liberty to enclose your Honour &ca. copies of our Consultations of the 27th. & 28th. Ultimo when we were obliged to surrender our Factory & ourselves Prisoners to Seerajah Dowlot from whom we are in hopes soon to obtain our Liberty as he has already released Mess^{rs}. Watts & Collet &c^a. If we are so happy as to get our Liberty our Present Design is to proceed to Madrass where we shall depend on your Honour &ca. Councils protection & kind assistance having lost every Thing we had in the World except a few Cloaths. We wou'd have sent you Copies of our Consultations & Letters from the Beginning of the Dispute but as this goes by a Pattamar it wou'd make too large a Packet. We design by a French ship bound to Europe which is to leave Chardanagore next month to address ourselves to the Honble Court of Directors & give them the best account we are able of the miserable state of their Affairs in Bengall, as we flatter ourselves your Honour &ca. Council will not think us any way to blame in delivering up our Factory after the surrender of Fort William we are to request your kind representation of our Case shou'd you have an opportunity of writing the Court of Directors before we have the Pleasure to see you as by all accounts the Riches Mr. Drake &ca. have carried off with them are immense, we hope our Honble Employers will be in some measure indemnified for the great loss they must have suffer'd by the taking their Settlements in Bengall.

We have examined the Accounts of this settlem^t. for the Month of July, the Calculations Additions & Statements of which are Right, & the few observations that Occur on them are as follows.

EXPORT WAREHOUSE.

Agreable to the recommendation of the Fort St. George Committee the Allowances of Wax and Rosewater which used to be charged Monthly in this Account are now omitted and transfer'd to the Paymasters Charges General.

PAYMASTER.

Peons and Servants Wages. Charges General Charges Cattle. Charges Diet.

These Articles in the Paymaster's Accounts are considerably swell'd this Month by the Allowances paid Robert Clive Esq^r. as Deputy Governour from the time of his arrival at Bombay in Consequence of the President & Councils Order & the Charges Extraordinary are likewise encreas'd by Travelling Charges to him & M^r. Starke and a quantity of Table Linnen made up for the use of the Deputy Governour.

MILITARY STOREKEEPER.

The Disbursements to the Garrison in this Account under the Head of Charges General is Pag^s. 425–35–63 which seems to be considerably higher than has been for some Months past but on Inspecting the Dyary it appears that upwards of two hundred & fifty Pagodas of the Amount are in stores and Materials Delivered the Laboratory for making and repairing of Grape Shot, for which when compleated the Charges General will be credited back again.

What the Committee of Accounts at Madrass observe regarding the Entrys in the Military Storehouse not Corresponding is very just & Cannot be prevented Whilst the Accounts are kept in the Way they are at present, as many of the stores that are delivered out in the Month are not worked up till a Considerable time after & then brought to Account, the Military Storekeeper keeping a Memoradum of them during that time; As this is irregular we submit it to you whether it wou'd not be better that they shou'd all be charged Monthly in the Paymasters Books & he have credit by the proper Heads when they are finish'd, but this We shall give you Our opinion on more fully in our next report.

In respect to the Import Warehouse, Storehouse, Military Paymaster & Customers Accounts we have nothing material to remark & therefore shall only add that it is our opinion they may be pass'd.

Mr. Brickenden having long labour'd under an ill state of Health and is at present so much Indispos'd that he is incapable of giving that attention to the Company's Business that is requir'd of him obliges me to request your Honr. &cas. permission to entertain a Monthly Writer in the service. I must also desire that you will appoint some Person here as the Company's head Conicoply. I have only one at present and he not endued with the most alert Faculties, indeed was he ever so able a person it wou'd be impossible for him to manage every different Branch, of Business in this settlement, wherefore I hope your Honour &ca. will be persuaded of the reasonableness of my request & be readily induced to comply with it.

Mr. John Darke whom you Honour &ca. have been pleased to promote to the rank of Ensign, has demanded of me the Difference of Pay due to him since the Date of his Commission, He has hitherto only receiv'd Allowance as Volunteer. This I have deferr'd complying with till I have your Directions.

As I am frequently under a necessity of indenting to your Honour &ca. for supplies of stores for the use of this Garrison the transportg, of which are attended with an Expence of Cooley hire, beside a considerable risk of miscarriage in Case of Disturbances in the Country induces me to make a proposal to Your Honour &ca. of providing those Articles here which I find can be furnish'd at the same Rates as stipulated at Madrass. This will be a saving to the Company of the abovementioned Cooley hire & risk, and will be also convenient for the supplying Trichinopoly with whatever quantity of stores may be wanted there. The French had not made a formal Declaration of War but We hourly expect it.

The English had Taken upwards of four hundred Sail of French, which were ordered to be sold.

I have just Notice of this Najab so can't enlarge but must Desire the Gentleman that opens this to communicate it to the Gentlemen of the Different Factorys that Our Ships may be on their Guard.

The Treasure, Wares & Stores consign'd us by the former were immediately Landed and prov'd agreable to the Invoice, The Cordage &c^a. sent on the latter for the service of Bengall We thought expedient to forward Thither on the said Sloop, as the Gentlemen there had some time ago apply'd to Us for Necessaries of this kind which they acquainted Us they were in the utmost Want off.

We take this first Opportunity of Returning Your Honour &ca. Our most gratefull thanks for this Seasonable Supply of Cash &ca. which We dont doubt of being not only able immediately to Invest but from the Quantity of Cloth now actually provided as appears by the List annex'd and the promises of Our Merchants We cant avoid representing to Your Honour &ca. that We cou'd employ a much more considerable sum by January, a further supply

therefore both of Rupees and Pagodas wou'd be the certain means of greatly encreasing our Investment and therefore doubt not but Your Honour &ca. will furnish Us with another Supply by the first Conveyance.

The Cash Intended for Ingeram and Madapollam Factory's We have advis'd the Gentlemen at those places off, and have already forwarded them part of their several Quota's.

We are sorry to acquaint Your Honour &ca. that the Arcot Snow is still here, they have attempted to carry her out, but there being Water barely sufficient she struck on the Barr, so were forc'd to bring her again in the River; she making some Water tho' received no considerable Damage, We have therefore yet Hopes in a few Days when the Northerly Winds set in a little Stronger our Bar will deepen & that We shall be able to get her out, When We shall immediately Dispatch her, the Three Long Boats Your Honour &ca. ordered us to contract for, We have agreed with Mr. John Heriot to build Them for Eight Hundred Arcot Rupees each (without Masts none being procurable here) and have directed Him to commence Them immediately, in order for their being finish'd by January. Copy of his Proposals come herewith.

Your Honour &ca's Deductions in Captain Smith's Bill shall be made agreable thereto.

We observe the Report of the Committee of Accounts and shall strictly conform in future to their Regulations, their Remark on Our Cash Account for April, that our Sea and River Customer's Ballance was not enter'd as paid into Cash we believe has slipt their Observation owing to its being improperly enter'd under the Head of Vizagapatam Town Kistees, which was the usual Method, of entering it, and the head it was formerly brought under in the General Books, tho now it is brought under it's own proper head, as will appear in the Books now sent You, The Omission of the five Thousand Pagodas not enter'd in May Cash Account was a Mistake in Copying over for which we Beg Your Honour &ca's Excuse and will be more exact in future.

Our Garrison has suffer'd lately more than usual by Desertion, but at length We have been lucky enough to retake Two of Our Military who had deserted and now send Them Prisoners on the Hartop with some Serjeants and Seapoys, who took Them, as Evidences against Them, as their desertion is attended with agravating circumstances which appear by the Minutes of a Court of Enquiry held on Them copy of which is Transmitted herewith, We therefore doubt not but they will be brought to Condign Punishment. On this occasion We think it proper to represent to Your Honour &ca. that our Garrison is so weaken'd by the abovementioned Desertion the Number of Invalids and Sick among the remaining with the decrease of our Train of Artillery by several being discharg'd having serv'd their Contracted Time &ca. that We have scarcely able Men sufficient to carry on in a proper manner the necessary Duty of our Garrison, a Reinforcement therefore of Military and some of the Train we humbly recommend as very essential among which some good Serjeants wou'd be of particular service having few We can depend on.

We now dispatch the Hartop Snow with 611 Bales Account of Our Honble Masters amounting as # Invoices to Pagodas 42647-21-10 which with Bills of Lading are inclos'd, the Hartop not being able to take in all our Bales we propose dispatching in Two or Three Days more the Neptune Sloop with the Remainder.

Your Honour &ca. will observe the Cloth is invoiced at different prices, one Invoice being the Cloth provided with the Cash advanced our Merchants before your Orders relating to the Batta to be charged on the Madrass Pagodas were received and therefore are Invoiced at the old Prices, the Cloth since

We have examined the Accts. for the Month of September in looking over which nothing has occurr'd to lay before You, We shall therefore only observe that the Calculations &ca. are all right.

In our Report for the Month of July We took Notice of the Inconveniency arising by the Storekeepers keeping on Memorandum the Account of his Disbursements for making Military Stores, by which means the Ballance in his Hands generally appears to be considerably more than it is in reality; the reason of which is, That the Military Stores, for making of which those Disbursements are Outstanding, are often a long time in hand, & till they are finish'd he cannot give himself Credit, To remedy this, Our first Thoughts as We then hinted, were that the Paymaster should make all the necessary Advances & Charge Them Monthly in his Accounts under a particular head, to be credited by counter Entries in the Military Storekeeper's Books, but on further Consideration we have Rejected this Method as too complicated, & are of Opinion that the whole Transaction may be more easily & properly conducted by the Military Storekeeper Himself, We therefore recommend that he pay both for the Materials & Workmanship, the particulars of which must be exactly specified in his Diary distinguishing what is on Account of making & what on Account of repairing, & for the amount of each he is to Debt Monthly one of the following Heads, to be erected in his Books for that purpose Vizt. Making Military Stores & Repairing Military Stores, the former of which will have Credit by the Stores when compleated, the latter by Charges General, & as in following this Method the Materials will be delivered to & work'd up under the Direction of the Engineer & the dayly Account of Cooley Certified by him, We apprehend the Business will be as effectually check'd as by any other Method than can be thought of. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

By the Sloop Cuddalore Captⁿ. Baker who put in here for Wood & Water the Sixth Instant I send the Melancholy News of the death of Captain Howes late Chief of this Island, he dyed here the twenty sixth of last Month of a violent Feaver, I was then at Persaim with the Ship George having on board four Nine Pounders, Two field Pieces and a Quantity of Ammunition and stores &cⁿ. designed for the use of a New Settlement, to be fixed there, according to a late Agreement made between Captⁿ. Howes and the Prince of Persaim.

Captain Howes went up with the Ship to Persaim, where We arrived the 18th. of July and he continued there till the fifth of August; during his stay he prevail'd on the Prince to grant to the Honble Compys servants full & free Liberty to build a Fortification, houses &ca. on the high Spot of Ground that is at old Persaim and known by the Name of the Pagoda Hill, a place that is by Nature defensible and capable of being made by Art almost Impregnable, We according to Agreement hoisted our Flagg there the 5th. of August in the presence of the Prince of Persaim and several Principal Burmahs, at the same time the Place was Christen'd by Capt. Howes Fort Augustus. Capt. Howes set out the same Evening for Negrais in the Mary Schooner and left Me the Command with Eighteen Soldiers, and between Twenty & thirty Lascars, besides Carpenters, to go forward with the new Settlement; He likewise appointed Me to act as Sub Engineer for carrying on such Works as would be thought necessary for our immediate Defence.

We began very Chearfully with Our Work being assisted at first by the Burmahs and went forward for a little Time, as well as the Season would possibly admit of, but We soon met with great Difficuties to struggle under. The Burmahs, after the Prince departed for Dagon, did all that lay in their power to hinder our Works from going forward, they prevented the Carrianas from bringing Us Provisions as they had usually done, and were continually throwing some Obstacle or other in our Way, to prevent if possible our Settling on that Spot; Notwithstanding as I had some good Lascars with Me, I proceeded on with the intended Work, & in about two Months We secured Ourselves on One side of the Pagoda Hill, strong enough to defend Us against a much superior Number, especially a sett of People who are armed chiefly with Rusty Lances. But Our Soldiers proved very sickly and fresh Provisions being not easily procured, I advised Captⁿ. Howes of Our situation who, in his Letter dated the Twenty fourth of September, desires Me to quit the place with the Ship and Stores, leaving only two or three Soldiers to take charge of the Buildings with a few Lascars who formerly continued there, He likewise advises Me to write to the Prince and Antonio, which I shall be as speedy in Complying with as the Nature & Circumstances of Things will admit of, and shall neglect no measures that shall be judged proper to be taken for the Honour &

Interest of Our Honble Masters. Copys of my two Letters to Captⁿ. Howes with his Letters to Me while at Persaim I herewith enclose for your Honour's perusal & Satisfaction, likewise Copys of Two Letters, from Lieutenant Keith One advising Me of the Death of Captⁿ. Howes and the other acquainting Me with the Arrival of the Cuddalore Sloop.

I left Persaim the 9th, and arriv'd here the 12th. Instant in the Mary Schooner and have left Orders for the Ship George to take on board the Field Pieces & Stores &ca. with the Military except a Corporal & Three Men, and to Repair with all possible Expedition to Negrais.

All the Timbers & Plank that have been brought this Season to Persaim I have purchas'd on the Honble Company's Account and have left Orders for them to be sent down here before the Ship leaves Persaim, A Particular Account of which I shall send to Your Honours by the next Conveyance.

Upon my Arrival here and examining the Honble Company's Accounts do find them made up to July and no farther, as it will require some considerable Time to compleat them to this Month and Captⁿ. Baker proposing only to stay 'till I have fisish'd my Letters it will be impossible for Me to get Them settled to go on the Cuddalore. Captⁿ. Howes's private Affairs are likewise so intricate that it will require a considerable Time for to settle them properly, and to separate Them from what is belonging to the Honble Company. The greatest Care imaginable shall be taken of his Effects, and Inventories made out of what is here belonging to his Estate, to be sent to the Coast the first proper Opportunity.

I have enclosed to Your Honours the Copys of Two Letters which Captⁿ. Howes wrote and sent to the Honourable the Governour and Presidency of Fort William with the Copy of an Indent sent at the same time for such Stores as Captain Howes judged necessary for the service of the Honourable Company, and are such as will be much wanted here; As we have some reason to apprehend a Disappointment from that Quarter hope Your honours will please to take it into Consideration and order such supplies to be sent Us from the Coast as may be judged necessary.

Inclosed is a general Return of the Military, and Train to the fifteenth of October with a List of such Soldiers as are sent on the Cuddalore, their Time of service being expired, and were promised by Captn. Howes to be sent to the Coast the very first Opportunity that offer'd.

Mr. Archibald Swinton has paid into the Honourable Company's Cash Two Thousand Arcot Rupees and William Meredith Serjeant whose time of Service is expired and is permitted to go on the Cuddalore has paid into the Honble Company's Cash One Thousand Three hundred Arcot Rupees, and Captn. George Baker has paid into the Honble Company's Cash One Thousand two hundred Arcot Rupees for which sums I have given Bills of Exchange in their favour and I hope they will meet with your Honour's Acceptance.

I humbly beg leave to assure Your Honours that I shall make it my whole Business to study the Interest & Credit of the Honourable Company, and shall while I continue in Command here endeavour to pursue such Steps as shall appear to be most beneficial to the Settlement. I shall humbly hope for the most favourable Construction of my Actions; and

The Peons at Porto Novo have represented that the Godown belonging to Andeapah in which the Materials belonging to the Company's House are, is in a very ruinous Condition & must shortly fall to the great damage of

Them, We must therefore request Your directions whether You will have Them removed when the Monsoon changes, as several of Them will be very usefull here.

At the request of several of the Inhabitants We transmit You a Petition relating to the Beetle & Tobacco Farm.

Mr. Wynch lays the foregoing Letters from Captain D'Illens to him, and his Answer to the first, before the Board, and acquaints Them that in two long Conversations He had with Captain D'Illens at one of which Col. Lawrence & Mr. Call were present & at the other Mr. Turner, He said there were great Abuses in the management to several Branches of the Company's Affairs, which he could make appear greatly to their Advantage to which He answered, that if he had any Thing to alledge against any Person, or any Proposals to make for the good of the service, to do it in Writing, tho' he thought it an improper Time when Harmony should if possible be kept up. Extract of the Consultation of the 11th. Dec^r. 1756.

The two foregoing Letters being read & finding Captⁿ. D'Illens persists in accusing M^r. Wynch of hindering his Complaints, The Board think proper to request Colonel Lawrence's Company, who being seated, and asked what pass'd before Him between M^r. Wynch & Captⁿ. D'Illens, Answers that Captⁿ. D'Illens had a long Conversation with him and M^r. Wynch at the Time he mentions, when he spoke of several Irregularitys tending to the Company's Prejudice in this Garrison and that M^r. Wynch in answer told him that this was not a proper Time to enter into such Affairs when Harmony should if possible be kept up in the Place, but that if He had any Thing to alledge against any Person to deliver it in Writing. Colonel Lawrence also says that he told Captⁿ. D'Illens this was not a proper time, but to stay 'till Colonel Clive arriv'd when he would see he had a proper hearing, to which he objected, saying he had not receiv'd good Usage from Colonel Clive, that he then told him to lay his Complaints in writing before this Board.

M^r. Turner being also ask'd what pass'd when he was present, says That he did hear M^r. Wynch speak some Words to the Effect Captⁿ. D'Illens mentions, but that he understood they related only to a Complaint, He, Mr. Turner, had made to M^r. Wynch, regarding some Irregularities in Captⁿ.

D'Illens management of the Lascars, and he further declares that he heard Mr. Wynch tell him, if he had any Thing to represent for the good of the service to do it in writing.

Although the Board are of Opinion Captⁿ. D'Illen's Letter, and refusal of complying with their Orders is highly deserving of being taken due Notice of, Yet that it may not appear they are precipitate, It's Agreed that the Secretary write him a further Order, positively demanding his Answer before the Council breaks up whether he will obey their Orders or not, and in case of his Refusal, It is further agreed that he be put under an Arrest for Disobedience of Orders, and the whole Affair be transmitted to the President & Council and to request they will take Cognizance of his Extraordinary Behaviour, as if it is let to pass unnoticed they are of Opinion it will be possible for Them to conduct the Affairs of the Settlement as they should be.

Letter from Captⁿ. D'Illens in answer to that just now wrote him by the Secretary, informing the Board that he will comply with their Orders, and deliver some part of his Complaint in Writing on Monday next.

The Secretary is ordered to prepare a General Letter to the Presidency to forward the foregoing Proceedings.

Orders of entertaining any of the Inhabitants of Calcutta should they come this Way, As there was no House proper for their Reception at this Place, or indeed is the House I reside in Myself safe, being apprehensive daily of One of it's sides falling out, occasioned by the late violent Rains, which has caus'd One of the Walls to part from the Cross Walls upwards of Three Inches, which if not soon repaired may endanger the whole; Your Honour &ca's, will be pleas'd to observe that this House was formerly a Godown, built by Mr. Saundarson in the Year 1752 for the reception of the Cleth from the by Mr. Saunderson in the Year 1752 for the reception of the Cloth from the Washers, and which on my being obliged to leave the Factory at Suncrapollam in the Year 1751, I repair'd to by Order of the President & Council to carry on the Business of this Settlement, and had their permission to Repair the Roof, which I accordingly did, and then imagined the Walls to be good; The Expence of pulling the said Wall down, and building it up in a proper Manner will amount to Pags. 150 it being upward of 90 Feet long 2 feet through & 15 high. The Repairs I have made at Suncrapollam is no more than was immediately necessary to make it habitable. The Damages the Moors did to it & the two other Houses (appropriated to the use of the Assistants at this Place) having never been repair'd since that Time, there wants many Things to be done to put Them in thorough Repair. The Walls that surround the Factory having not a Coat Chunam on Them the Bricks are daily mouldering away, the

further Repairs necessary to the Factory and Buildings at that place will amount to Pags. 300 which I shall be glad of Your Honour &ca's. Orders concerning as also about those wanting to the House I now live in.

He never take an exact Account himself of all the Powder which was in different Magazine since he was made Storekeeper, nor examined what Powder was good, Reparable, or Unserviceable nor he never [sic] keep an Exact Account & Journal of what Powder was receiv'd in and expended from the different Magazine, & also he never keeps an Acct. of the different Sorts of Powder in the Garrison; which might be of a great prejudice to the Company as I can make appear.

2. He never made since he is Storekeeper an Exact Survey of all the Company's Stores given to his Charges to see if there was any deficient from the Number He mentioned in his Books or if, they was all in a good Condition.

3. He has receiv'd from the Laboratory before Captⁿ. D'Illen's time different Stores entirely wrong made, as 24 Pounders & 18 Pounders, Grape with 12 Pounders Bottoms, Portfires mixt with Oil &ca. and was his duty to examine the Quality of those, and if they was not good to make Complaint against the Director of the Laboratory.

4. At Captⁿ. D'Illen's Arrival at Fort S^t. David some time He would not permit him to have the Keys of the Magazine in his own Custody, but sooner

over to Cuddalore with M^r. Fairfield knowledge & comit the Keys to his Servant, a Black fellow, in his Absence, Captⁿ. D'Illens complained several Times to M^r. Starke of such a great Abuse without Redress, and at last he was obliged to take them Keys by Force.

- 5. Since Captn. D'Illens has taken to his Possession for the good of the Service, the Magazine and Artillery Stores M^r . - 8. Perhaps it will appear when both our Accounts are compared together that he has charged to the Company more Stores to the Use of the Artillery at Fort S^t. David than he deliver'd out.
- 9. It will perhaps appear by the Examination of the above Account that he has charged to the Company several new Barrels (more than 300) the staves & heads thereof Captain D'Illens has return [sic] to the Coopers which was made up afresh and so charge as New Ones.
- 10. He has never ask [sic] the Governor to Call the Commanding Officers of the different Companys to give an [sic] Monthly Acc^t. of the Arms and A Coutrements [sic] given to their Charge Especifieng [sic] what was received, delivered, Expended and remains, whereby he puts it in the Power of such Commanding Officers (if they was so inclined) to prejudice the Company to a vast Sum.
- 11. He makes no distinction between the different Sizes of Guns, Shot, Grape, Catridges, &c^a. whereby he puts it in the Power of the Commanding Officer of Artillery (if he was so inclined) to prejudice the Company to vast sum.
- 12. He lost or suffer to be lost or spoiled a great many of the Company's Stores of a great Value by his neglect of duty and not understands, his Business committed to his Charge.
- 13. He sells to the People of the Garrison by Drams the Arrack mix'd with Salt Water and also an extravagant a Price as 8 fanams ₱ Bottle which amount to near 100 Pagodas Pr. Leaguer which Arrack so mixt Operates upon the Men in such manner as causes them to commit the many disorders which are committed, which would not be if the Arrack was sold Neat as Imported, and We should not have so many Men fall sick and send to the Hospital as We have which I compute is a great deal owing to the badness of the Arrack which he sell to Them.

The many charges I lay before you against Mr. John Call Engineer of this place you may Gentlemen if you think proper Examine him upon the several head, of the aforesaid charge; but I insist Gentlemen that he may be brought before a general Court Martial to make his diffence against the several articles it being usual in his Majestys service for Engineer to be tryed here by in such Cases as Concerns Martial Law.

To the Gentlemen of the Council of Fort St. David.

CHARGES AGAINST MR. JOHN CALL ENGINEER OF FORT ST. DAVID.

- 1. If we are in wanting of any Carriages at Fort St. David or Cuddallore it is Intirely owing to his own fault.
- 2. If the Carriages are not repaired and we should chance to suffer any prejudice from their not being repaired, it will be intirely owing to his own fault.
- 3. If we should suffer any prejudice in wanting a great many Stone platforms to a great many Embrazures in the Fort and in the outworks it will be intirely owing to his own fault.
- 4. That most of all the works he has done here is wrong and besides of a great deal more Expence then there was occasion for.
- 5. That he has neglected to put in a good manner of deffence little, but necessary works Around the Fort.
- 6. That if there happen any Accident to the grand magazine it will be his own fault.
- 7. That he dont no [sic] the way to make carriages for Guns and Beds for Mortars to the best advantage.
- 8. That those large Gun platforms that he made by Mr. Clive's Order; and also those that he made for Captain D'Illens was Intirely wrong made; the beams & Planks being put the Contrary way to what they ought to have been.
- 9. That he would never Consult upon any thing for the good of the service with Captain D'Illens; who was in Capacity and willing to give him very good Instruction, altho' Captain D'Illens don't presume to be himself an Engineer; yet nevertheless Qualified enough to give Mr. Call Instruction.

10. Perhaps it will appear that upon Examining his Account Monthly that he hath charge the Company for making the Carriages a great deal more than what they can be made for.

11. That he made at different time Complaint to Mr. Starke that Captⁿ. D'Illens did not furnish him with a sufficient number of Lascars for carrying the work on; when at the same time out of the Lascars he had to carry the Work on; he Employ'd a great many Every day, in Transporting of Timber &c. out of the Artificers yard to the House he was building, and to other particular business.

- 12. That he never knowed the way till lately how to compleat a Mine having lately said before Colonel Lawrence in the present of Captⁿ. D'Illens that a Sauzage should be filled with some particular Composition which he was desirous that Captain D'Illens should prepare in his Laboratory; at which Colonel Lawrence laugh and Explained to M^r. Call the right way to compleat a Mine and how can such a person be Qualified for an Engineer.
- 13. That Mr. Call did suffer a House to be Enlarged at the Foot of the Glassis, which will take several days to be razed; the Consequence is such that in Case the French had come unexpected before the Fort they would have placed a body of Men equal to the strength of the Garrison behind the Dutch Factory Established in the same place different Mortars and advance behind Captain Linns House a party with some Guns and Mortars; by which disposition it would have put the Garrison in a good distress.

Trevengoddam late Conicobler of the Lascars, and still remains Head Concicobler of the Artificers and Cooleys, the next Complaints which I shall let appear before you Gentlemen, as soon as my health will permit will be against Captain Gardner Commanding officer of this place.

CHARGES AGAINST IRSHISLAPUDY CIVIL AND MILITARY PAYMR. BRAMINY.

- 1. That he never gives to the Military Pensioner but 19 little Fanams to half a Pagoda, and to the Train of Artillery Pensioners he never gives but 18 little Fanams for half a Pagoda; now I think it is a great Imposition to Men that have lost their Limbs in the Honourable Company's Service to be defraud in such a manner by a black fellow. But why should he make a distinction between the Artillery and Military Pensioners of one Fanams in half a Pagoda; that Article alone shew him to be a villain, and the said Pensioners have made Complaint to the Paymaster several times without Redress.
- 2. That he sell Rice to the Pensioners at an Extravagant Rate, and when he gives them a note to receive it, the Conicobler at the Godown where they serve the Rice did buy the said note often times from the Pensioners and for a Pagoda note or Pagoda worth of rice he did give them betwixt 30 or 36 fanams and no more, which I think a great Imposition.
- 3. That before Captain D'Illens took the trouble to see the Lascars paid, they never received but 18 little fanams for the half Paga. but since Captain D'Illens have took the trouble to see them pd.

they always receive the full fanams for the half Pagoda accords, as the Pagoda changes in the Buzar; but whether it is the Braminy fault or the Paymaster that will appear upon Examination.

Charges against Trevengoddam late Conicobler of the Lascars, & still remains head Conicobler of the Artificers and Cooleys.

- 1st. That when the Lascars was sent aboard His Majesty's Ships they left their subsistence for their Familys; which the said Trevengoddom received & Expended the same for his own use; when the above mentioned Lascars familys was in great distress for want of the said money, and almost starving, but the Lascars when they came ashoar Complaining to Captain D'Illens of the same; he Ordered him to be confined in his Room in the Fort for two days before he could get him to pay the Money.
- 2. That in March 1752 when Colonel Lawrence went up to Trisnopoly he took a hundred Lascars with him, which Lascars left their pay to be pay Monthly to their Familys, which the said Trevengoddom Received and Expended for his own use; but when Colonel Lawrence came to Baur Camp, the Lascars complaining to him in what a villanous manner the said Trevengoddam had behav'd to their familys in cheating them out of the above Subsistance, Col. Lawrence on his Examining the case in finding it to be true sent for the said Trevengoddom Prisoner, and had him brought Prisnr. to Baur Camp where he condemned him to be hang for a villain and was under sentence of Death; but upon Captain Lieut. Shaw Intercession Colonel Lawrence was pleased to pardon him on his repaying the Money back again; but Ordered him never to be Entertained again in the Service; yet nevertheless he hath continued Conicobler of the Lascars and also of the Artificers and Cooleys in the yard.
- 3d. When the Lascars received ½ or ¾ of a Pagoda worth of Rice from the Braminy, the Lascars Conicobler when he paid 'em Instead of gives them the Remainder of the Pagoda, kept always a double fanams for himself. In the payment of Septr. the Braminy declared to the Lascars that he keep that fan^m. in his hand, and would give it to them, yet nevertheless has not.
- 4. That when the Lascars Conicobler was paying the Lascars Pensioners to one Pagoda each, he has Hoped from every one of them a double fanam each Month; but since the Braminy pay the Pensioners he pays them the whole Pagoda.
- 5. It will appear by the Examination of all the Artificers & Cooleys in the yard that the said Conicobler never paid the most part of them their full wagers as was allow [sic] them by the Company; by which Consequently we have lost a great many of Our best Artificers, who runs to Pondicherry where they have a better method of Paying the Artificers.
- 6. That Captain D'Illens hath several times caught him in his Knavish Tricks, and has made Complaints thereof to the different deputy Governors of this place without Redress, the said Conicobler being protected by several persons in power and principally Mr. Call but lately Captain D'Illens complaining to Mr. Wynch of some 1756—24A

new villany that the said Conicobler had committed, Mr. Wynch give leave to Captain D'Illens to turn him out of the Lascars Service; which accordingly he did.

TO ALEXANDER WYNCH ESQR. &C. AND COUNCIL OF FORT ST. DAVID.

[Charges against Captain Gardner Commanding Officer of Fort St.

1. That he would consent that Captain D'Illens should represent to the Deputy Governor any things for the good of the Artillery and when Captain D'Illens for the benefit of Peace did desire Captain Gardner speak himself to the Deputy Governour about some matter, he generally forgot the next day what Captain D'Illens had told him the day before, upon which Captain D'Illens would no more comply with Captⁿ. Gardner Request but went himself to the Deputy Governour whenever he had any Representation to make him for the good of the Artillery service.

2. That Captain Gardner would never consent that Captain D'Illens should keep with his Officers Regimental Court martials for the Trial of his People, altho' Captain Gardner should knows [sic] the 2nd. Article of the 14th. Section of the Articles of War, and also the 37th. Paragraph of the general Letter of the 17th. June 1748 Confirm'd by the 22^d. Paragraph of the General Letter of the 26th. March 1755, some time after M^r. Clive's arrival at Fort S^t. David Captain D'Illens went to Him and made his Complaint against Captⁿ. Gardner of the said Article upon which Mr. Clive ordered Captain Gardner to let Captain D'Illens have the Tryal of his own People with his own Officers; But a little after Mr. Clive went to Bengal Capta. Gardner followed his own former Way and lately Ordered a Court of Enquiry composed of Military Officers for examining a Mottross of the Artillery which was confined on suspicion of Desertion.

3. That Captain Gardner did oblige Captain D'Illens when Presideent of a Court Martial to deliver to Him the proceeding and sentence of the said Court Martial before the Governour had approved or disapproved it which proceeding of Captain Gardner was entirely contrary to the use practic'd in the Kings Service where it is not in the Power of a President of any Court Martial to shew the proceeding and sentence of such Court Martial to any Person whatsoever before he has shew it to the Person who has the Authority to approve or disapprove it, when Colonel Adlercron was here the President of the Companys Regimental Court Martial carried the proceeding first to the Colonel, then to the Governour and afterwards to the Commanding Officer of the Fort.

4. That Captain Gardner world not suffer Captain D'Illens to order any of his own People upon the Pickett for small Offence nor worth troubling a Court Martial with all the Captain D'Illens represented to him different time that it was practised in the King's Service where any Commanding Officers of Artillery has that Priviledge, which can be certified by Captain Hyslop and all his Officers.

- 5. That Captain Gardner would not suffer that Captⁿ. D'Illens should have any of his own People confin'd to the Artillery Barracks without being reported to the Officer of the Main Guard, altho' Captⁿ. Gardner should be acquainted that in the King's Service any Officer Captⁿ. Lieut^t. or Ensign Commanding a Company of part of a Company, has the Power to confine any of his own People in their Barracks for small Offence without being obliged to report them to the Officer of the Main Guard.
- 6. That Captain Gardner has lately ordered in the black hole a Bombardier who being found by Captⁿ. D'Illens a little in Liquor was confin'd in the Train Barrack till further Order, and Captain Gardner give an Order at the same time that in future no person of the Artillery should be confin'd in the Artillery Barrack, but should be sent immediately to the Main Guard and in default of such order he would put the Officer of Artillery under Arest.
- 7. That when Captain D'Illens did send to the Main Guard or the Black hole any Men with their Crimes Captain Gardner did several times release those Men without being acquitted by a Court Martial or Captain D'Illens desisting from the Charge against Them.
- 8 That Captain Gardner would not suffer that Captⁿ. D'Illens should have the same Command of the Artillery at Cuddalore as he had at Fort St. David, he having given Orders to Lieut^t. Davies Commanding Officer of Cuddalore to pay no regard to Captⁿ. D'Illens concerning the Artillery of that Place, but upon several Representation that Captain D'Illens made to Captain Gardner of the bad Consequence of such an order, Captain Gardner promised to send to Lieut^t. Davies to countermand that Order, But when Col. Lawrence arriv'd at Fort S^t. David both him and M^r. Wynch having ordered Captain D'Illens to send to Cuddalore for the best Gun Carriages that was in that Place, Captain D'Illens in executing that Order send a Gunner, 40 Lascars, and some large Cattamarans with a Letter to Lieut^t. Davies, supposing Captain Gardner had perform'd his Promise, but Lieut^t. Davies would not comply with Captain D'Illens Letter saying he had receiv'd an Order from Captain Gardner to let Captain D'Illens have what he would out of the Magazine but had no Order to let him have any Guns or Carriages, Captain D'Illens being acquainted therewith went immediately to Captain Gardner and made Complaint against Lieutt. Davies without any Redress, except Captain Gardner promising to write again to Lieut^t. Davies; some days after Captain D'Illens receiving an Order from Col. Lawrence to send two 4 Pounders Guns with proper Ammunition and One Gunner to Bandepolum Fort, and as Captain D'Illens could not spare any Men from Fort St. David he sent an Order to a Mattross at Cuddalore to go to the Fort abovementioned having first acquainted Lieut^t. Davies thereof, but he refused to let the said Mattross go, saying as before that he had no Order from Captain Gardner to let Him goe, Captain D'Illens being acquainted thereof went and made fresh Complaint to Captⁿ. Gardner against Lieut^t. Davies without any Redress and that Mattross is still remaining at Cuddalore tho' Captain D'Illens sent that Order several Days past.
- 9. That Captain Gardner would not allow that Captain D'Illens should have any Command or Inspiction over the Artillery Pensioners, by which means those Men could not make their Complaint to Captain D'Illens against the Paymaster or his Braminy for defrauding them out of part of their Pension.
- 10. That lately when four Prisoners of the Military (of which their wounds were pretty well Cicatriz'd) desiring for the good of the Service to enter into the Artillery, applied to Captain Gardner to have his leave for it,

But Captain Gardner Ordered Them to enter into the Military again, althor those 4 Men being examined by Doctor Hancock, in the presence of Captain D'Illens, He found them only capable of light Business, consequently not fit for duty in the Military where they must carry heavy Arms, Cartouch Box filled with 24 Rounds at least &ca. But fit for to do duty in the Artillery in several Stations. If We don't allow the Pensioner when they find themselves a little capable of duty to enter in the Artillery they will never make known when they are fit for Duty, which will be very prejudicial to the Service.

- 11. That two of those Men having represented to Captⁿ. Gardner that their contracted time was expired and that they was [sic] desirous to renews [sic] their time afresh in the Artillery, but Captain Gardner ordered those two Men to do duty in the Battallion as well as the other two Men abovementioned and told 'em that they should not have a Cash of Bounty Money.
- 12. That since We have receiv'd Order to make Ourselves ready in this Place. Captain Gardner never called Captⁿ. D'Illens to consult with him about the best disposition of Guns & Mortars round the Body of the Place and to the Outworks, which Captⁿ. D'Illens would be extreamly glad to do, but seeing that Captⁿ. Gardner was not troubling himself about it, Captain D'Illens upon an Order from M^r. Wynch disposed the Guns and Mortars to the proper Places, to the best of his Judgement.
- 13. That since We have receiv'd an Order to make Ourselves realy in this Place Captain Gardner has never shew to the Officers and soldiers of the Garrison what Post they should repair to in case the Enemy should come unexpected before this Place, contenting himself with giving the following Orders the 24 November.

In case of an Alarm in the night Captain Gardner Company is to take Post on the Flagstaff Bastion, Captⁿ. Paschals on the Cuddalore Bastion, Captain Calinders on the North West Bastion, Captain Schaubs on the South West Bastion.

which Order was intirely wrong and Incomplete as Captⁿ. D'Illens will let appear at a proper Time.

14. That Captain D'Illens is firmly assured that Captain Gardner is intirely uncapable of defending as Commanding Officer a Place besieg'd in a regular manner, as the French would do if they come before this Place, Captain D'Illens will make this appear in asking Captⁿ. Gardner in Open Court different Questions to which he will not be able to answer as an Officer.

Abuses, But as the Council of this Place has forced Me to put every thing in Writing without allowing Me an Assistant, among the Company's Writers; I was obliged to employ my Portugue Writer, and some other of my People to help Me in the Business, by which those Things are so publick here, that they want absolutely to be publickly decided. What concerns Messrs. Fairfield & Call it will appear by their Examination that they are very much guilty, and also I beg the favour you will not oppose my desire to have them try'd before a General Court Martial; As for those two Black Cony Coplers they deserve to be treated Criminally. But as for what concerns Captain Gardiner as he is a very good and honest Man full of good Intentions, only wanting of understanding the service a little better, I would' not hurt him if I cou'd, and I should be satisfyed for my part if You please to send an order here concerning the first Eleven Articles of my Charge against Him, And about the three last Articles I would leave to your own Judgement. As soon as my Health will permit I shall continue to let appear some more irregular things that may happen here, But before I communicate it to you I shall let it appear before the Council of this Place,
