



Museum Demonstration.—As in the previous year, demonstrations to the teachers of local high schools were conducted. The object of the demonstration was to enable the teachers to guide their pupils intelligently round the galleries when the pupils visit the Museum under the guidance of the teachers.

Audio-visual aids.—Sale of the miniature bronze replicas of Rama and Sita, Nataraja and Ardhanariswara and of the electroplated metal casts of coins was continued as usual during the year. Sale of picture post cards, photographs and photographic albums was also continued.

"Tamil Nadu—Anrum Inrum"—The Museum participated in the Tamil Nadu—Anrum Inrum Exhibition that was organized by the Social Welfare (Information and Publicity) Department, and depicted the role of the Museum activities in modern education.

Stock verification.—The Museum was inspected for the first time in its known history, by the Stock Verification Party, and their verification work was not over, when the period under review drew to a close.

Museum camp.—The Curator, Zoology Section and the Curator, Geology Section of the Madras Government Museum, were deputed to attend and participate in the Museum camp held at Baroda from 16th to 31st January 1970. The Director of Museums Madra, who was invited as a Guest Speaker at the Museum Camp, delivered two lecturers (one on the "Organization of Natural History Museums" and the other on the "Need for a National Museum of Natural History in India" to the participants of the Museum Camp on 27th and 28th January 1970 at Baroda.

Government Museum, Pudukkottai.—The Director inspected the Government Museum, Pudukkottai, during August 1969, and submitted the inspection report to Government embodying his suggestions for improvement, etc. (in his letter No. 3994/69-A5, dated 16th August 1969).

Padmanabhapuram Palace and Museum of Antiquities.—The Director inspected the Padmanabhapuram Palace and Museum of Antiquities in February 1969, and submitted his inspection report to Government, embodying his suggestions for improvement, etc., and his remarks (in his letter No. 3071/61-E, dated 23rd February 1970).

The Director continued his systematic studies on the Littoral Echinoderms of the South Indian coasts and commenced the preparation of his manuscript on the subject for publication as a Museum Bulletin.

Seminar on Museums of Science and Technology.—The Director attended and participated (as an Observer) in the Meetings and Seminar of the International Committee on Museums of Science and Technology of the International Council of Museums held at Bangalore in November 1969.

ZOOLOGY.

Additions to collections.—1. The Chank (Dextral) cut vertically into two equal sections (Xanchus rapa).

Work in the galleries:

Invertebrate galleries .- Two exhibition boxes containing the enlarged scale models of Amoeba and two foraminiferan specimens were exhibited in the Goral gallery after they were provided with black paper lining and labels. An Indian ink illustration showing the growth of corals has been drawn and after providing a cutout mount it was bound and exhibited in the same gailery. The sloping case containing the dry specimens of sponges was re-painted with suitable cream colour. Six Exhibition boxes containing the dry preserved crab specimens were provided with fresh calico binding, after renovating and cleaning the specimens inside, and they were exhibited again in the respective sloping case in the invertebrate gallery. Thirty wooden background planks used for mounting the shell specimens were re-varnished and after writing labels with black and white paint were re-exhibited inside the respective show-cases. The old and discoloured specimen of crab (Neptureus pelgicus) was replaced by a new and freshly mounted dry specimen in this gallery. One specimen of chank cut into two vertical sections suitably mounted and labelled was exhibited in this gallery. Five old and discoloured Indian ink drawings were replaced by treshly drawn ones in the two galleties. Two wall cases were repainted with cream colour in the Invertebrate gallery.

Fish gallery.—About ven old specimens were renovated and re-exhibited inside the respective show-cases in the Fish gallery. Numbers were provided inside each sloping case denoting the number of specimens exhibited therein.

Reptiles, Amphibians and Birds gallery.—The old and discoloured wax cast of seasnake was renovated and re-exhibited in the Reptile Gallery. The glass doors of all the wallcases in the Reptile and Amphibians Galleries were provided with clamps and screws to ensure better safety measures. One old and discoloured specimen of Flamingo exhibited inside the diorama was replaced by a newly stuffed and mounted one.

Mammal gallery.—The specimens of the large Fruit Bat, the Dolphin and the Sea-lion were renovated and re-exhibited in the Mammal Gallery. Three large wall cases containing the porcupine, the rats, the squirrels, the dogs, the foxes, etc., were repainted with suitable grey colour in this gallery. The wooden shield along with the Bison skull which fell down from the wall in the Mammal gallery was renovated, re-mounted and refixed on to the wall in the same position after fixing the wooden plugs firmly. One of the detached digit bones of the large elephant skeleton was refixed in the proper position. Distribution maps were added to the show-cases containing the langurs in this gallery.

the plumage of a bird was prepared and exhibited in the Skeleton gallery. The mosaic plastering to the lower portions of the pillars (i.e.) up to a height of 8 ft. was taken up and completed by the Public Works Department. The large wooden pedestals over which the skeletons of horse and man, elephant, skulls of Indian elephant, the skull of Sperm-whale were varnished. The wooden portions of the centre cases containing the scooped out foot of elephant and the bones of the foot of elephant were also re-varnished. Twenty-five skulls of goats and sheep showing the variations in the horns were firmly fixed with metal wires to ensure better safety in this gallery. The varnishing of the wooden railings surrounding the skulls of Indian elephant, the skeletons of horse and man, the elephant, skull of the Sperm whale, the mirror with two elephant tusks mounted on a table made of rose wood was done in the Skeleton gallery. The large wall cases containing the integumentary structures of birds were re-painted with proper shade of cream colour paint.

Other routine items of work such as refilling of specimen jars (both in the galleries and reserve collection), provision of naphthalene balls and other insecticides to show-cases and reserve collection almirahs, replacing the broken glass panes of show-cases by new ones, replacing the old discoloured labels by the newly printed ones cleaning the inner fogged surfaces of glass panes of show-cases, replacing the fused incandescent and fluorescent lamps by new ones, dusting and cleaning of the interior of the show-cases in different galleries, etc., were continued during this period.

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Educational activities.—(1) One hundred and thirteen shell specimens received from Goa fisheries department, were identified and returned to them after packing them very carefully.

- (2) Sixteen shell specimens received from Sri D. S. Srikanta, Lecturer, National contege, Bangalore, were identified and returned to him.
- (3) A short-term training course in Taxidermy for college attenders was conducted from 20th to 30th May 1969.
- (4) The participants of the Summer Institute in Biology were taken round the galleries of the Zoology section. The practical classes on the preservation of some Zoological specimens were also conducted by the Curator, with the help of the Taxidermists at the Madras Christian College, Tambaram.
- (5) Facilities were extended to Dr. Gopinath Pillai, Senior Research Assistant, Central Marine Fisheries Institute, Mandapam Camp, regarding his research work on corals.
- (6) Government Films Institute was assisted while taking shorts of the objects in the Zoology galleries.
- (7) Dr. Clyde T. Williams, University of California, Berkley, California, U.S.A., was afforded necessary facilities while studying and taking photographs of the skeletons of the animals belonging to the Family—Carnivora regarding his research work.
- (8) Mr. D. B. James, Senior Research Scholar from Central Marine Eisheries Institute, Madapam Camp, was also afforded facilities regarding his research work on Echinoderms.
- (9) On 11th February 1970, a lecture was delivered by the Curator, during the valedictory function arranged by the Zoological Association of Pachaiyappa's College, Madras, at their request.
- (10) Mr. Murugesan, a Research scholar, was afforded facilities regarding the identification of a rat specimen.

Research and publications.—(1) The Curator continued his research work on Grass-hoppers.

(2) The Guide to the Bird gallery is under publication.

Photographs added.—Twenty-two items of photographis negatives were added during the year under report.

Plans for 1970-71.—(1) The enlarged scale model of the Dogtick will be exhibited in the Invertebrate Gallery.

- (2) The plastic letter captions for the show cases in the Foreign animals and the Mammal gallery will be provided.
- (3) The specimen of tiger which was recently got stuffed will be added to the Mammal gallery after making a showcase.
- (4) Descriptive labels in long narrow frames will be provided to the dioramas in the modernized Bird Gallery.
- (5) One of the plastic relief models will be exhibited in the Reptile Gallery after making a suitable showcase.

The research work on Grosshoppers will be continued during the next year. The research work on South Indian Echindernis will be continued and completed by the Director. The printing of the Guide to the Bird Gallery will be completed.

BOTANY.

New additions to the collections (including reserve).—A bunch of fruits of the cane (Calamus sp.) collected at Sisupalagarh by the Director of Museums was added to the collections. A few species in each of Bryophyto, Pteridophyta and Orchids and a few fruits of the Teak (Tectona grands) of the Kuttalam Hills and two clumpy mushrooms, one of a pale brown colour and the other of a yellow colour from the Museum Garden, were also collected and added. Two specimens of Aponogeton sp. were procured from Thiru Rajendra Babu of the atural History Museum, Trivandrum. Six colour-charles, three depicting the influence of plants on climate and three others the various phases of protected water supply, were prepared in the Section.

Additions to the galleries.—One specimen of Solanum aanthocarpum and one bunch of fruits of calamus sp. were added to the Solanaceae Family and Palmaceae Family respectively in the Systematic Botany gallery. The old exhibit of seedling of the Lablab (Dolichos sp.) showing the typical parts, was renewed in the same gallery. Five photographs pertaining to the Bamboo Grass were mounted and added to the "Rayon" series in the Economic Products Gallery. A sub-section of "Green Manures" was organised in this gallery. Preparation of a fresh Tea Map of India for replacing the old and faded exhibit, was also attended to.

Improvements to the gallery.—The wooden knobs of 123 herbarium drawers in the Systematic Botany gallery were replaced with metallic ones. Two vertical stands were slightly altered, re-painted, rendered more presentable and provided with naphthalene boxes for the presentation of "Green Manures" in the Economic products gallery. Schemes for constructing new types of cases for the presentation of aquatic vegetation, sand vegetation, morphological models and south Indian timbers were drawn up. As a security measure, lists of exhibits were prepared case. War and hung up in the galleries.

Twenty saplings of the Drooping Asoka were planted in the Museum Garden for the Vanamahotsava Special Week.

Labelling and preservation-In the Systmatic Botany gallery, fresh napthalene balls were provided for all the exhibits, and the exhibit of fertilization repainted. The sheets of herbarium specimens of Anisopogon and Darwinia the Ecology gallery were renewed. In the Economic products gallery the case was given ante-ant-treatment. Four fluid-preserved exhibits of sea-weeds. two exhibits of paddy and rice (TKM2 and "Jeeraga chamba") were renovated. One photograph of "Rayon" series was remounted. A chess-bard prepared was and provided for the exhibits of chess-men. Two exhibits of nieable-fibre cloth and plantain-fibre cloth were provided with struts and better presented. Two exhibits of pennisetum typhoides and one photo of "Drying Rubber" were also remounted and better presented. The unsteady exhibits of toddy-tappers' tools were rendered more stable Six photographic exhibits in the Ecology gallery, were remounted and better presented. In the Reserve collections, one hunch of fruits of the cane was treated with formalin and then preserved dry, one herbarium specimen of the Lablab was repoisoned, and preservation of two specimens of Aponogeton sp. for the herbarium was attended to. Preservation of specimens collected on the Kuttalam Hills and of the clumpy mushrooms collected in the Museum Garden, was also attended to. Thirty-one fluid-preserved specimens of seaweeds were renovated.

Six individual labels were printed for the exhibits in the Systematic Botany Gallery. Four individual labels and one descriptive label were printed for the "Green Manure" plants. Twenty-four individual labels and one descriptive label for "Oil Seeds" and "Rayon" series, were also printed. Sixty-seven printed labels of the "Oil Seeds" series were renewed. Four wooden labels were painted for the "Green Manures". Seventeen newly printed labels were mounted for the gallery. Nine sets of new labels were printed for the Museum Week Exhibition. Four sketch-labels were renewed for the plastic. relief models. Index cards were prepared for thirty specimens of "Green Manures".

Research and publications.—Tanul equivalents where they existed for the different ferns, and suitable suggestions where they did not exist, were introduced into the Bulletin on "Ferns". Schelpe's "Revised list of Fteridophytes of S. Africa", and Pamgrahi and Dixit's paper on Indian Pteridophytes, were compared with the typescript of this Bulletin which was then revised in the light of the recent observations of Option glossaceae, and the badly-corrected pages of which were retyped. A beginning was made to study the textile designs and sort out ther blocks lesign-war. Two specimens of seaweeds in the gallery were re-identified and labelled afresh. Identification of two clumpy mushrooms collected in the Museum Garden, was attended to and given up as the specimens were imperfect. Selection and collection of literature on Bryophytes for the Curator's work on mosses was attended to. The Curator undertook a tour to the Kuttalam Hills and made a beginning in photographing and collecting the Bryophytes there.

The Curator's lectures on "Botany in Indian Museums" was published by the M.S. University of Baroda in their publications series. Estimates of paper requirements for printing the Bulletin on Ferns, were worked out, and the paper was drawn from the Stationery stores, and supplied to the Janatha Printing and Publishing Company (Private) Limited, together with 25 printing blocks that were got manufactured at the Government Press. Ten galley proofs, as fell as machine prooms of pages 13—28 of this Bulletin were also received and corrected. The Assistant Curator's Guide to the Economic Products gallery was revised and changes in the botanical names were carried out in it; preparation of illustrations for the same were under way.

Additions to the Sectional Library during the year, were Phycologia Indica (Icones. of Indian Marine Algae) by K. S. Srinivasan; Incones, Roxburghianae, Fascicle II, 1968 and Fascicle III 1969; Fungi by Lillian E. Hawker; The Structure and Life of Bryophtes by E. V. Watson; Records of the Botanical Survey of India, Vol. VI, No. 3, 1914; Vol. VI, No. 5, 1914 and Vol. IX, No. 5, 1926; Ramifying and Twristing Stems of Palmyrah Palm by T.A. Davis; Field Investigation of Crop Water Requirements in Syria by Koopman, Swan and Gassel; Cashew Growing by Oheir; and Sme aspects of Isolation of Sugar from Ceratonia siliquia by Loo.

Demonstration lectures were given in the public galleries to two batches of students of the Central School, Tambaram, and to a batch of thirty teachers.

Facilities afforded to research-workers and others.—Facilities were afforded to research workers and others, the principal beneficiaries being the Exports Promotion Council; Gujarati Vidya Mandir High School, Madras-1; the Exhibition Officer of the Social Welfare (I and P) Deptt., Madras; the Tractors and Farming Equipments Ltd., Madras; Thiru Rajendra Babu of the Natural History Museum, Trivandrum; Dr. P. N Rao, Curator of the Andhra University Harbarium, Waltair and Thiru T. S. Sundaram, (Retd.) Assi. Superintendent, Government Museum, Madras.

Photographs added.—Protographs pertaining to three aspects of the plants of the Kuttalam Hills, were added.

Plans for 1970-71.—Efforts will be made to collect more specimens and to present Aponogetoa sp. in the Systematic Botany gaery and three colour-charts depicting the influence of vegetation on climate in the Sociology gallery. All the old water-colour diagrams in the gallery will be renewed. Replacement of the wooden knobs of the herdinagrams in the gallery will be renewed. Bystematic Botany gallery, will be continued. berium drawers with metallic ones in the Systematic Botany gallery, will be continued. Modernized cass for a proper preentation of "South Indian Timbers", "Plant Morphology" "Aquatic vegetation "and" Sand Vengetation" will be procured. The oldish exhibit of the "Tea-map of India" will be replaced with a fresh one.

The Curator will proceed with the collection of literature for his work on mosses. He will also prepare a guide book for the Ecology sries. The publication of his work on ferns which is in the press, will be pushed through, made press-ready and, sent to the press.

GEOLOGY.

Additions to the collections.—A specimen of uraninite with allanite was received from the Atomic Energy Department, New Delhi. A specimen of Iceland spear was purchased from Thiru Durai Elumalai. A specimen of Steatite was received from Thiru M. S. Chandrasekhar.

Additions to the galleries.—Three photographs pertaining to iron manufacture were added to the exhibits under Iron in the central modernised show case.

Improvements to the galleries.—The interiors of four vertical cases for Minerals and one for Fossils, together with their pedestals and planks which were badly stained by rain water, were painted and the specimens were re-exhibited in them. Preparations for painting the second vertical show-case for Fossils were in progress. The interior or a show case for Mohs' scale, which was also stained by rain water, was painted and the specimens were re-exhibited in it. The old and stained diagrams for the double surface condenser, universal pattern filter pump and soxhlets apparatus were replaced by fresh ones prepared in the section. Bullnus sp. and Echinolampas sp. which had fallen off from their planks were re-mounted and re-exhibited in the gallery.

Labelling and preservation.—Nine index labels and fourteen sub-index labels in the various galleries were replaced with Tamil equilvalents. All the hand-written labels for Meteorites were replaced by printed ones. Ten unbound, hand-written labels were replaced by printed, glass-bound ones. The old and stained labels for corundum, carnelian and mica (descriptive labels) in the Minerals gallery were renewed. Billingual descriptive labels for Folds and Faults were printed and were being framed for fixing them in the gallery. The exhibit of the Mineral map of Madras which was stained and attached by fungus growth was renovated, protected against future leakages of rain water and re-exhibited in the gallery. Two specimens of rock salt and one of marcasite were preserved.

Publications.- Fifteen books including maps were added to the sectional library.

Facilities to research workers and others.-Information on ammonite fossils was furnished to Mr. John Fleagle of Yale University, U. S. A. Facilities were afforded to Selvi Mollu Pullan, NCERT study group, University of Madras for preparing plaster casts from the fossil specimens Atrypa reticularis and Acanthoceras mantelli. Information on laterite was furnished to the Director, Zoological Survey of India, Tamilnadu Circle, Madras. Some of the laterite specimens in the reserve collections were also shown to him. Facilities were afforded to Thiru K. Badrianarayanan for studying some of the rock specimens in the gallery and in the reserve collections. Specimens of minerals and rocks brought by Thiruvalargal P. N. Palaniappan, J. Joseph, P. Alfred, M. A. Alim and Durai Elumalai and the Director of Zoological Survey of India, Madras, were identified and their uses were also explained to them. Nineteen specimens of rocks and minerals were loaned to Wesley High School, Madras, for an exhibition. Fourteen mineral specimens were loaned to Shri A. B. Parekh Gujarati Vidyamantir High School, Madras, for an exhibition. Four photographs of dinosaurs were loaned to the Exhibition Officer, Government of Tamil Nadu for an exhibition on "Tamil Nadu Then and Now" organised by him. Facilities were afforded to the officials from the Film Institute. Advar for filming some of the exhibits in the Geology Gallery for preparing documentary to the Government Museum, Madras.

Photographs added.—Three photographs pertaining to iron manufacture were added to the exhibits in the Economic Geology gallery (modernised show case.)

Plans for 1970-71.—A specimen of vermiculite mica in the form of a book will be collected and added to the collections. All the stained sloping cases on the mezzanine floor will be distempered. Efforts will be made to pursue further action on the import of the ultra-violet bulbs for re-installing the fluorescent minerals case and to have the cubical building stones identified and labelled. Efforts will also be made to get the Geological column case completed.

ANTHROPOLOGY.

Additions to the collection:—The following materials were added to the collection:

(a) One unexploded shell as a gift from Thiru S. S. T. Chari, Madras.

- (b) Seventy-two leather shadow play figures from Tamil Nadu were purchased from Thiru Kodur Ramamurthy, Madras for Rs. 782.
- (c) One gold tali, one gold pipe and another gold pipe in two bits as treasure trove objects from Keelasethi village, Mayuram taluk, Thanjavur district.
- (d) Two fox teeth, fox nails and one gold nose screw with a red stone as treasure trove items from Kalamanallur village, Mayuram taluk, Thanjavur district.
- (e) One gold pendant as treasure trove item from Madoor village, Dindugal taluk, Madurai district.

Work in the galleries.—Kathakali and Malabar sorcery figures were provided with new descriptive labels. Two descriptive labels for the "Face types" cases were reprinted. Newly prepared "Ice Age" colour chart was displayed in the Physical Anthropology gallery. Six Kathakali dolls were photographed in colour transparencies for preparing picture postcards. Two exhaust fans were installed in the Ethnology galleries I and II. Five fresh labels for the shadow play figures case were prepared.

A cannon iron pillar of the sign board was refixed with cement by the Public Works Department. A neolithic stone implement was got identified at the Office of the Geological Survey of India, Madras. Nine miscellaneous arms were re-exhibited in a sloping case in the Arms gallery. Three new sign boards to the cannons in the compound were freshly prepared and fixed up. Nine vertical cases in the Arms gallery II and all the show cases in the Mohenjadaro gallery were numbered. Two fluorescent lamps fittings and one Benjamin spot light fittings were installed respectively in the puppets and the Neil statue galleries. Descriptive lebels for the cage gallows and the Dutch inscribed stone slab were bound for display in the Arms gallery.

The walls in the Prehistory and the Arms galleries were repainted by the Public Works Department up to a height of three feet. Two weldmesh partitions were provided by the Public Works Department to the window gaps in the Prehistory store rooms.

Plan and sketches for the proposed new cases for the Musical Instruments gallery were prepared and submitted to the Wood Working Unit, Madras. A few musical instruments were selected and repaired by Thiru B. Damodharan, Madras.

Preservation of objects:—82 Ethnographic objects, 4 arms and 2 musical instruments were chemically treated and preserved.

Lectures:—The Curator delivered twelve lecturies on material culture ad prehistory to the certificate and diploma students in Anthropology Madras University. The practical examination for the Diploma students in Anthropology was conducted. One demonstration-cum-gallery talk on the 'African tribal type' to a batch of students and trainees from the Balar Kalvi Nilayam, Vepery, Madras was delivered by the Curator. The talk was followed by a film show. Another demonstration-cum-gallery talk on the "Madras Paloeoliths" was delivered by the Curator to a batch of students from the Christ Church High School, Mount Road, Madras. The lecture was followed by a film show.

Facilities to research workers and others:—A parcel containing six stone implements and a few publications was sent to the Director, University Centre for Palaeo Hominid Studies. North Carolina, U.S.A. in exchange for a few American tribal materials. Five prehistoric objects were loaned to the Wesley High School, Royapettah, Madras for the school exhibition. Six palaeolithic tools were loaned for the Gujarathi High School, Mylapore, Madras for exhibition purposes.

NUMISMATICS

New additions to the section.—Eleven gold coins belonging to the Konguchera Eruva and Hoysa's dynastics from Chidambaram, South Arcot District, two hundred and eleven silver punch marked coins from Nedumangalam village, Manamadurai taluk, Ramanathapuram district, two gold Venetian coins from Pollachi, Coimbatore, eighty nine silver Mugal coins of Shah Alam II were received as treasure trove coins. Two coins of Tibet and one Ghaznavid cons were received as gift. Three gold cons, two Mughul and one Mysore Sultan were purchased from Government of India, Mint, Bombay.

Work in the section.—The treasure trove coins received during the year were examined classified into dynasties and kings, accessioned and transferred to respective Stock registers. All the stamps which were purchased were entered in the stock register after calsifying them countrywise.

Research and publication—The different types and varieties of symbols on punch marked coins were studied in order to trace the similarities in the symbols on coins found in different parts of the country. The Curator has also undertaken the study of Vijayanagar coinage with a view to prepare a catalogue on Vijayanagar coins in the Madras Government Museum.

Facilities to research workers and others.—Prof. T. Balakrishnan Nayar was given all facilities to examine the coins and for referring books from the Section Library for his proposed bulletin on Roman and Byzantine coins in the Museum. The Curator explained about the Indian coinage to teachers and students of the Central school, Tambaram with the aid of electroplated metal cast of coins.

Plans for 1970-71—It is proposed to have periodical exhibitions of metal casts belonging to different dynasties with enlarged photographs and descriptive labels. The exhibition may be changed each time to represent important dynasties and periods. It is also planned to purchase a new iron safe with wooden drawers for the strong rooms.

Efforts are being made to bring some publication on coins. The Assistant Director's university lectures under the Sankara Parvati Endownment n South Indian coins will be brought out as a museum publication. Apart from this Prof. Admatullah's paper on Arab coins is almost ready. It is also planned to have the catalogue on Venetian coins reprinted. The Curator of Numismatic section has taken up the study of Vijayanagar coins in the museum coin cabinet, n order to bring out a catalogue of Vijayanagar coins in the Madras Government Museum.

CHEMICAL CONSERVATION SECTION.

Museum objects given treatment and preserved.

Art and Archaeology.—Six bronzes were given suitable treatment and preserved. Twenty wood carryings were given chemical treatment and preserved suitably. The chunnam stains present on stone sculptures were removed. Stains present on Caitya stable (Amaravati sculpture) were removed.

Anthropology.—The Meriah Sacrifice Post was given "ascu" coating and preserved. Treatment was given to the Gaunlet sword and the Yantra and then suitably preserved. Three Malabar Sorcery figures and two ceremonial staff were given treatment and suitably preserved. The Mysore Puppet was sterlized with suitable chemical and the holes present on it were plugged with wooden putty. Fifty-three ethnographic materials were given treatment and suitably preserved. The Nagara was given treatment and suitably preserved. Two wheel traps were given suitable treatment and preserved. The cannon sign-board was given treatment and preserved. The conch with metal frame was given treatment and preserved. The linen account note book was fumigated with suitably chemical. Twenty items of reeds, straw and matting were given treatment and suitably preserved.

Numismatics .- - Eighteen historical documents were sterilized with suitable insecti-

New Addition of equipments, improvements, etc.—The Microscope Stand for the examination of paintings was acquired and installed. The four fume cupboards were provided with fume ducts in the new block of th Chemical Conservation Laboratory.

During the period under report large number of microfilming orders were received and executed.

The two polythene covers were stitched for covering the Single Pan Analytical Balance and the Stereo-microscope. The leakage portions on the roof of the old block were repaired. The cracks found on the walls of the old block, Gas Plant Room and the stair case were repaired.

Bound the two instruction books relating to the operation of Spectrophotometer. The instruction sheet for the operation of Air Oven was printed, glass bound and displayed.

The routine items of work such as cleaning the exhibits and the interior of the show cases, replacing the burnt-out lamps inside the showcases with new ones, provision of new printed lamels, and naphthalene balls to show-cases, etc., were attended to in the Children's Gallery.

Educational activities.—Special guided tours for about 25 schools were arranged. A demonstration lecture and guided tour of Children's Gallery was arranged for a group of 60 Balasevika trainees.

The handing-over function of two working models of trains received as a gift from Vice-Consul, Trade Representation of the G. D. R., Madras was arranged in the Centenary Exhibition Hall on 4th March 1970.

GOVERNMENT MUSEUM, PUDUKKOTTAI.

GENERAL.

Working Hours.—The Government Museum, Pudukkottai, works on all days except Mondays and declared Gazetted Government Holidays. The working hours of the Museum Office are from 10.30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and the galleries from 8.00 to 11.36 a.m. and from 2.00 p.m. to 5.00 p.m.

The Weekly holiday is every Monday and admission is free to all. During this year, this Museum has worked for 284 days and Office for 280 days.

Visitors.—The total number of visitors during this year is 98,471 with a daily average of 347 which includes both males and females, literates and illiterates and students and and staff from educational institutions (Appendix A).

Distinguished visitors.—Some of the distinguished visitors who happen to visit or stay in Pudukottai find it a pleasure to pay a visit to this Museum. (Appendix B)

Administration.—The Curstor is the head of the Office, assisted by an Assistant Curator, two Junior Assistants, a Taxidermist and a technical assistant, and the Museum galleries are looked after by nine gallery guards in the day time and two watchmen in the night time. The garden is being maintained by one full time gardener.

Extra-mural activities.—The required assistance to build up school museums was afforded to schools as usual at their request by supplying the relevant information about, the methods or collection, preservation and display. The teachers accompanying the school students have been given training in the method of explaining the museum exhibits to the school children. About 74 schools are the beneficiaries therefor. (Appendx D).

Galleries General.—The main attention of the Museum technical staff was concerntrated on the preservation and improvement of the Museum specimens and galleries. All the specimens, show-cases and the building were always kept clean and tidy. The specimens were given preservative treatment as and when required. The labels were always kept neat and in readable positions.

The show-cases have been arranged according to the sequence of the subject matter as far as possible, besides taking into consideration of more space for easy movement of the visiting public in the galleries.

Improvements to the Galleries—Geology.—The dark blue colour in the interior of the six double-sided sloping cases has been completely changed into light yellow colour to get good relief of the specimens in the show case. The eight cases of box-type sloping cases on either side of the gallery are also painted in the same light yellow colour to match with the central show-cases.

About 45 photographs in full size, dealing with the granite and laterite quarry in Pudukkottai area as Economic Geology have been displayed in the empty places of the vertical frame in the middle of the show-cases with descriptive and caption labels both in Tamil and English.

A four feet tube light has been provided to the eastern dark corner for better lighting.

The Specimen Register of this section has been written up neatly as per the arrangement of the specimens in the show-cases.

The front-side of the sloping table show cases at the two ends of the gallery have been panelled up with masonite sheets.

The interiors of the sloping cases on either side of the gallery have been repainted to match the colour of the centre show-cases. Invertebrates.—The invertebrate specimens collected at Kilakarai-Rafeswaram are being separated, classified and preserved separately. The suitable and attractive good specimens are being both in dry and wet conditions, according to the nature of specimen exhibited.

Among the collections brought from Kilakarai, Appa Islands and Rameswaram the good specimens of star fishes, sea urchina have been exhibited both in the dry and wet preservation in the show-case.

Birds—All the birds that are now exhibited in the show-cases are being identified with reference books as a first step before entering them into the Accession Register. The wooden shelves have been provided in two modernised wooden show-case to a suitable height to see the specimus and the labels of the hand-row suitably.

Some of the colour-faded and slightly damaged specimens in the diorama show-cases have been removed and replaced by fresh ones from the reserve collection.

Fishes.—The excess of varnish coating given previously on the fishes has changed its criginal colour. Hence the excess varnish has been carefully removed by using rectified spirit and the original colour was brought to some of the specimens. The process is being continued to other specimens in this section.

A long wall case has been provided to accommodate the glass jars containing the wet specimens of fishes, and typewritten glass bound labels have been provided.

Amphibia —The wall show-case containing the skeleton of frog had some cracks in the background. The cracks have been covered by a plywood sheet, painted in light green colour to match the original painting and again mounted the same skeleton of frog in good condition.

Reptiles.—The yellow colour stain that deposited in the bottom of the rectangular glass jars containing the wet specimens of Russel's Viper and Rat snake has been cleaned and re-exhibited with the white background to enhance the better display.

The skin of a Monitor Lizard prepared and preserved in this Museum was mounted in a stretched position in a glass topped vertical wall-case, specially made for it.

The colour-faded and completely damaged specimen of the sea-snake was condemned and thrown away. In its place, a freshly fetched sea-snake from Rameswaram has been exhibited suitably in wet preservation.

In the turtle show-case, newly purchased turtle eggs (6 wet and 6 dry) have been exhibited.

Mammals.—The old and damaged specimen of a Civet Cat was removed from the Diorama show-case, and it was replaced by a new specimen shot near Tiruvarnkulam forest at Pudukkottai.

The Panther specimen, so far exhibited without show-case has now been displayed inside the show-case which was specially made by the Carpentry Unit at Mannargudi.

The barred window was covered with a plywood panel and painted up suitably to provide a suitable background for the show-case containing freak specimens.

Anthropology.—A plywood screen about 8'×4' was prepared and fitted in between the pillar space available between this section and Botany Section to display picture frames of Anthropology Section and Botany Section in their respective sides. In this frame about eight colour pictures—two depicting the facial features of a Naga and a girl from Madya Pradesh—two depicting the Spring festival of Rajasthan and Jaipur—and four depicting the brides of Kerala, Kashmir, Maharashtra and Manipur have been mounted, framed and exhibited.

Economic Botany.—The discoloured and stained wooden pedastals of some common Indian timbers have been repainted, and the iron clamps used for fixing the timber specimens have been also painted from rusting.

Epigraphy.-Some of the shaky wooden brackets holding the copper plate inscriptions have been fixed firmly with iron brackets.

Skeletons.—The wooden pedestals of all the specimens have been repainted afterfilling up the gaps developed due to cracks

Archaeology.—A Siva about 9" in height with a broken peedam, and two peedams (big) made of bronze, collected by the Taluk Office, Tiruchirappalli under Treasure Trove Act have been given free of cost to the Pudukkottai Museum and they were registered and added to the collections.

Library.—About 27 books were added (Appendix V) to the library making up the total number of volumes to 1332. It embraces all the sections pertaining to a general museum. It continues to serve the Curator and his staff on administrative, technical and research sides and also the general public and scholars in their respective fields as reference records. Annual subscriptions are being regularly made to useful journals like Marg. Man in India, Journal of Bombay Natural History Society, Animals, Cultural Forum and Museology.

General.—A special exhibition on Biological Collections' and 'the Wax and Dye Textile of Tiruvannur' was arranged from 17th November 1969 to 6th December 1969 in the Centre Hall of Mammals Gallery, in connection with the Museum Week Celebrations.
