The Director of Museums also servel as Liais on Officer in connection with the visit of Miss Edith Toth, Curator of the Museum of Eastern Asiatic Art, Budapest, Hungary, and arranged for her visits to the monuments in Mahabalipuram and Kancheepuram in addition to the Museum and other places of interest in the city.

Lectures and demonstrations.—As in the previous years, demonstrations to the teachers of the local High Schools were conducted during the months of November and December 1964 and January 1965 for the benefit of the 22 teachers of the various local High Schools in the Museum Galleries on Saturdays. These demonstrations enable the teachers in their turn to guide the pupils round the galleries intelligently.

During the year, the Director of Museums delivered a series of three lectures on methods of museum display, cataloguing, card-indexing, etc., to the students of the M.A. degree course in Archæology of the Madras University, a lecture on "Museums of Science and Industry in Western Countries" at a meeting of the Royal Institute of Chemistry, Madras and at the A.C. College of Technology, Guindy. The Director of Museums also delivered a Radio Talk on "Indian Butterflies" in the External Services of the All-India Radio.

International Campaign for the protection of historical monuments sponsored by the UNESCO.—The Museum arranged a Special Exhibition of photographs, sculptures, etc., for a fortnight from 2nd to 14th November 1964 at the Centenary Hall to mark the campaign. A series of lectures on topics connected with the care and preservation of monuments by emment scholars were also arranged during this period in connection with the campaign. The Director of Museums delivered a lecture on 'Monuments in Museum' in the above series.

Audio visual aids.—Sale of the miniature bronze replicas of Rama and Sita and Nataraja, and the electroplated metal casts of coins were continued as usual, during the year. Sale of picture post cards, photographs and photographic albums was also continued.

Reorganization and development of the museum.-Under the Centrally-sponsored scheme for the Reorganization and Development of the Museum for the Third Live-Year Plan period, the modernization of the Ethnology, Kathakali, Bird and Geology Galleries were continued during the year. The second Ethnology Gallery and the Gallery containing Kathakali figures and objects relating to mythology, folklore, etc., in the first floor of the front building were completely modernized by installing a series of built-in, internally illuminated cases and the display of the exhibits in these cases was completed. Similarly the modernization of the Bird Gallery was continued and four more large units consisting of systematic cases alternating with dioramas were built with concealed fluorescent lighting and the bills displayed therein. Three new dioramas comprising the Horned owl, Flamingos and Demoiselle cranes were constructed. In the Geology Gallery a long series of illuminated modernized cases were built and installed along the centre of the gallery. A new gallery of Buddhist Antiquities was organized and thrown open, in the Archæological section. A hall for the Numismatics Gallery was constructed at a cost of Rs. 22,000. The Chemical Conservation Laboratory was better equipped by acquiring an X-ray apparatus, Spectrophotometer and other apparatus.

Central Advisory Board of Museums.—The Director of Museums attended the meetings of the Central Advisory Board of Museums and the Standing Committee of the Central Advisory Board of Museums at Patna in December 1964 as a representative of this State.

The Museums Association of India.—The Director of Museums attended the Annual Meeting of the Museums Association and participated in the Seminar held in connection with it by reading a paper on "Children's Museums and their role in Education" at Patna in December 1964. He also presided over the Sectional Meeting of the Museums Association arranged for those interested in Natural History and read a paper on "Natural History in Indian Museums".

Essay competition.—An essay competition on the subject "The importance of a School Museum as an aid to Education" for the "Dr B. Sundararaj Prize" was held in December 1964 for the students of the XI standard of schools in the Madras State. Sri T. S. Chandrasekharan, a student of the Municipal High School, Mayuram, was adjudgen the winner and he was awarded the prize.

Museums camp on Indian painting.—Sri N. Harinarayana, Curator, Chemical Conservation Section, Government Museum, Madras, and Sri M. Raghupathy, Curator, Government Museum, Pudukkottai were deputed to attend the Museums camp on Indian Painting organized by the Ministry of Education, Government of India at Varanasi, in October 1964.

Improvements to Galleries—Coral Gallery.—The enlarged model of Paramecium which was provided with, painted labels pasted over cork bits and painted indicators, was exhibited in this gallery. The centre case containing the large sponge (Petrosia sp) was distempered.

'nvertebrate Gallery.—Eight sloping cases were distempered and the shell specimens were rearranged inside them. Indian ink diagrams of the Spiny Lobster, Apus and Scorpion were drawn on photographic prints and after bleaching them they were exhibited in this gallery. Ten more smaller Indian ink diagrams were drawn and exhibited to replace the old discoloured ones. All the large shell specimens such as the Helmet shells, Begger bowl shells, etc., were mounted vertically on wooden pedestals

and re-exhibited in this Gallery. New labels for the shell specimens were got printed on ledger paper and they were fixed on to the pedestals over which the shell specimens are mounted and then the shells were re-exhibited inside two of the sloping cases in this gallery. Indian ink diagrams illustrating the orders Trichoptera and Strepsiptera (not represented previously in this gallery) were drawn and exhibited along with the other innsect groups. The old disfigured specimen of Bornella digitate exhibited in this gallery was replaced by a good one selected from the reserve collection.

Fish Gallery.—The jaws of the shark were mounted in a newly made wooden pedestal in the normal posture and re-exhibited in the Fish gallery. The thin cracks noticed at the anterior part of the Whale Shark were filled up with 'compo' and touched up with suitable colour paints. Re-arrangement of Fishes as per the latest classification was taken up and completed during the year. Two specimens of Rays were renovated and re-exhibited in this gallery.

Amphibian Gallery.—The photograph of a toad was fixed on a mount and after rebinding with calico it was again exhibited in this gallery. Clamps were provided to one of the centre cases showing the habitat group of the Green Frog so as to keep it in proper position.

Reptile Gallery.—Two of the wax casts of snakes were renovated and re-exhibited inside a wall-case in this gallery.

Bird Gallery.—Four units of modernised show-cases were newly constructed and installed in continuation with the existing ones in this gallery during the year. Fixing of bird specimens inside eight of the newly added systematic modernised show cases was started and completed. The dioramas of the Owls, Flamingoes and the Demioselle Cranes were completed in this gallery. The old Seagull specimen exhibited inside the diorama was replaced by a fresh one collected at Mahabalipuram. Wooden pelmets for the windows and the main entrance were provided in the Bird Gallery in the new Natural History Block. All the brass brackets with which the bird specimens were fixed inside all the modernised show cases were painted with suitable green colour to match with the background. The beaks of the two Pelicans were painted suitably to give a natural appearance. Eighteen of the modernised show cases were provided with both English and Tamil labels made of wooden painted cutout letters. The White Peacock and four Macaw Parrots were exhibited inside the two remodelled show-cases in the new Bird Gallery. Re-arrangement of the Passerine birds, was taken up and completed in the new Bird Gallery during this year. The small diorama of the African crowned crane which was arranged as special exhibition was transferred to the Bird Gallery in the new Natural History Block.

Mammal Gallery.—The Bear, the Common Hare, the Porcupine, the Wild Boar, the Mouse Deer, the Sambar, the old Madras Langur and a skeleton of the Bandicoot were renovated and re-exhibited in the Mammal Gallery. The old large wall case inside which the African Lion was exhibited was remodelled and the same specimen was re-exhibited inside this case after providing it with artificial illumination and a single large glass pane in front. Old show cases containing the civets and mongooses were remodelled and after providing them with artificial lighting and glass door made of a single glass pane, the same specimens were exhibited again. The heavy wooden door of the large show-case containing the Sambar specimen was replaced by another one made of light wood. The interior of the show case containing the specimens of the Mouse Dear was repainted.

General galleries.—The specimen of the Orang-utan was renovated and re-exhibited in the Foreign Animals Gallery. The flooring in the Foreign Animals Gallery was repaired and after this work was completed the show-cases were re-arranged. The specimen of the Tapir exhibited in this gallery was renovated and re-exhibited. The background lining cloth of the large wall case containing the specimen of the bat and its skeleton in the "Flight in Animals" Gallery was painted light cream colour. The wall cases containing the Deadleaf Butterfly Flying Frog and the Flying Lizard in the "Flight in Animals" gallery were provided with new labels fixed inside the wooden

frames. The dislocated Zygomatic arches of one of the Indian Elephant skulls exhibited in the skeleton gallery were remounted in the proper positions. The two centre cases contaming the foot and the skeleton of the foot of the Indian Elephant were painted with surface primer paint.

The routine weekly gallery checking of the galleries by the Curator, dusting of the interior of show-cases, cleaning of glass panes of show-cases, provision of naphthlene balls, replacement of broken glass panes by goods ones, rectifying minor defects, refilling, bladdering and painting of the gallery specimen jars and provision of lysol and camphor plugs and powdered naphthalene for the gallery insect cabinets and exhibition boxes, were continued during the year as usual.

Labelling.—The replacement of old discoloured labels by newly printed ones was continued in different galleries as usual. The shell specimens exhibited inside two of the sloping cases were provided with new labels printed on the ledger paper. Touching up of the old painted labels fixed on to the show-cases was continued as usual in different galleries. About two hundred boxes containing the reserve collections of shells were provided with new labels and to preserve them from insect attack they were also covered with a layer of wax containing naphthalene.

Preservation of reserve collection.—Personal attention was given by the Curator to the thorough cleaning and replanishing with fresh preservatives (rectified sprit or formalin, as the case may be), of the large number of reserve collection jars. Old washers of the Kilner jars were replaced by new ones. The labels written in Indian ink were pasted on the jars wherever the old labels were found defaced discoloured and moth-eaten. The cabinet drawers and boxes containing reserve collections of dry preserved insects, crabs shells, etc. were systematically provided with fresh lysol and camphor plugs and all the glass panes of the Insect drawers were thoroughly cleaned while giving the preservatory treatments to the specimens. Provision of naphtalene balls and spray of 'tik-20' was carried out systematically for the cup-boards and drawers containing reserve collection boxes of dry pre erved shells, corals, etc. The reserve collection of Bird skins was examined periodically and provided with naphthalene powder and spray of 'tik-20'

Research and publications .-

Educational work—A special exhibition of the Macaw Parrots was arranged during October and November 1964—Another special exhibition of the African crowned crane was arranged during the months of February and March 1965. The Museum demonstration for High School teachers was conducted on 28th November 1964. Two students of museology from Baroda University were given training for fifteen days in the section. Mr. Rowshan Akhtar, Technical Assistant, Central Marine Fisheries, Tuticorin, was given training in the section for fifteen days. Mrs. Kumerasan from the Corporation High School, Vepery, Madras, was given training in preparing the plaster casts and model of some of the organs of human body. Mr. Thivari from Raipur Museum was given training in the section for fifteen days. Selected specimens were given on lean to the Queen Mary's College, Madras, for arranging an exhibition in connection with their Golden Jubilee celebrations. Dr. Gerhard Nenweiler, a German Research Scholar from the Madras University was afforded, facilities to examine the specimens of bate in the reserve collection in connection with his research work. Mr. George M. Davis, Associated Researcher (Malacology,) Museum of Zoology, University of Michigan, was

Allowed to examine the shell collections of this Museum in connection with his research work. Dr. C. T. Cornelius was provided with the photographic prints of two Food fishes. Mr. Chokkalingam, Research Assistant, Madras University, was allowed to see the reserve collection of crabs. Prof. Uschmann, University of Jena, Germany, delivered a lecture to the Curators when he visited this Museum. Three M. A. (Fine Arts) students were given training for one week in the section. Mr. Vaideeswaran, a writer of Tamil books for children, was given necessary information about the common birds of South India to help him in writing a Tamil book for children about the interesting habits of birds. Prof. Davis, Indian Statistical Institute, New Delhi, was furnished with the measurements of the different parts of the Coconut crab exhibited in the Invertebrate gallery in connection with his research work. The shell specimens sent by Dr. A. P. Mathew Mar Ivanois College, Trivandrum, were identified and returned to him. Dr. Manzo Chiji, Curator of the Museum of Natura History, Osaka, Japan, visited the Museum and studied the display of Zoological specimens in this Museum. Photographic enlargements (8 inches by 6 inches) illustrating specimens of fishes were prepared and sent to the Government Museum, Pudukkottai for exhibition in its galleries.

Photographs added during the year.—Sixty-two shotographs were added during the year. The relevant particulars are furnished in Appendix V.

Plans for the year 1965-66.—Fixing of labels made of wooden painted cutout letters for the rest of the modernised show cases will be completed in the Bird Gallery. Plans and estimates will be prepared for the modernisation of the Skeleton and Reptile Galleries. The worn out rimlocks of the show cases in different galleries will be replaced by new ones. The arches above the windows in the Bird Gallery will be covered by means of asbestos sheets to make the Gallery free from glare and reflections. Provision of new lables to the reserve collection boxes containing shell specimens will be continued. Fresh photographs illustrating the natural surroundings of the Indian Elephant will be prepared and put up in the skeleton Gallery replacing the old and discoloured ones. Printing of a set of picture post cards illustrating the different colourful butter flies will be prepared. Modernisation in the Bird Gallery will be continued during the year.

BOTANY SECTION.

New additions to the collections (including reserves).—Roots of Derris scandens and Acorus calamus, root bark of Ventilago maderaspatana, seeds of Psoralia corylifolia and Madhuca longifolia and three charts of life-cycles of ferns, clubmosses and horsetails. were the new additions during the year.

New additions to the galleries.—Herbarium exhibits in the Systematic Botany gallery were supplemented with nineteen additions from the reserve collections.

Improvements to the galleries.—In the Systematic Botany, Gallery, four exhibits of mosses and lichens were given special mounts and displayed vertically. The display of herbarium specimens and charts was improved. The cornices in the gallery were regained and rendered safer.

In the Economic Products Gallery, the exhibits of fibres were re-arranger so at to reduce their congestion. The spray-painting in three built-in-wall show-cases, was renewed. Minor repairs were carried out to the ceiling. Plans were drawn up and estimates were obtained for modernising the central part of this gallery.

Labelling and preservation.—Sheets of two herbarium exhibits of Derris and Pyrethrum in the Economic Products Gallery, were renewed. Attractive wooden railings were erected in front of the modernised cases in this gallery, as a measure of protection for the costly front glass panes of the show-cases.

In the reserve collections, sheets of two old herbarium specimens were renewed-Forty-five herbarium specimens were poisoned, and sixteen were neatly mounted for display. Seeds of Fsoralia corglifolia, leaves of Azadirachta indica, roots of Dernis scindens, leaves of Maahuca longifolia flowers of Pyrethrum sp., leaves of Solonum tabacum, roots of Acorus calanus, seeds of Madhuca longifolia, and roots of Ventilago manderaspalana were preserved dry and mounted. The state of preservation of five specimens of cotton was improved. Three charts of Pteridophytes were mounted for display.

The labels of two herbarium exhibits in the Systematic Botany Gallery, and of two exhibits of vegetable oils in the Economics Products Gallery, were renewed. Sixteen herbarium specimens in the reserve collections were provided with neat hand-written labels. Ninety-four impressions obtained from printing blocks and twenty-five photographs were supplied with legends.

One-hundred-and-sixty-one photographic negatives and 118 printing blocks were indexed.

Index cards were prepared for 116 exhibits in the Systematic Botany Gallery, and for 168 herbarium specimens in the reserve collections.

The Botany Galleries had to be kept closed, however, for over 5 months, for facilitating the construction of a new hall on an adjacent terrace, during the year under review.

Research.—A study-tour to the Madras Christian College Herbarium was undertaken by the Curator. The collections there and in the Presidency College Herbarium were studied, and consequently two of the ferns in the research-collections were re-identified Preparation of synonyms of the general and species in the Curator's work, was taken up.

Results obtained from the study of distribution of heat inside modernised show cases with internal tube-lighting, were consolidated together.

A paper entitled "The Cinderella of the Natural History Museums" was contributed to the seminar on Natural History Museums, that was conducted by the Museums Association of India.

The Garden was surveyed and sketched and schemes for $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) =\left(1\right)$ its improvements were prepared.

 $\ensuremath{\mathcal{L}}$ register for the printing blocks in the section, was opened and $\ensuremath{\,\,^{\circ}}$ 118 blocks were registered in it.

Publications.—The pinning of the Guide to the Principal Exhibits in the Government Museum Pudukkottai, made slow progress in the Press. A paper on the distribution of heat inside show-cases with internal tube-lighting, was prepared for publication in the Bulletin of the West Bengal Museums Association.

Publications added to the Sectional Library during the year, were Niels Feged's "Freshwater Diatoms from Spusbergen", Ph. Guinet's "Pollens D' Asie Tropicale", A H. Smiths's. "The Muchroom Hunter's Field Guide", S. T. Satyamurti's "Haudbook of the Madrus Government Museum". and the Royal Society's "General Notes on Preparation of Scientific Papers".

Special exhibitions.—A special exhibition of vegetable insecticides was conducted for over two months. The Section participated also in the Vanamahotsava this year.

Lectures.—Lectures on Phyto-musec'ogy were delivered to a couple of post-graduate students from the Baroda University. Lectures were also delivered on preservation and display of botanical objects when required for art purposes, to a party of art students from the Stella Maris College, Madras. Demonstration lectures were given in the public galleries to a batch of teachers from the High Schools in the City.

Facilities afforded to research workers and others.—Facilities were afforded as usual to research workers and others, some of the beneficiaries being Sri Thanigai Mani of the French Institute, Pondicherry; Sri Appasami and Sri Haneef, practitioners of indigenous medicine. Wandiwash; Sri Reddiappa Naidu of the All-India Handloom Board: Sri V. N. Tiwari of the M. G. M. Museum, Madhya Pradesh; Prof. Grummer of Germany (now in Calcutta), and Prof. M. Ekambaranatha Iyer, Gopalapuram, Madras.

Photographs added.—Two photographic sketches of air-tight Aluminium cabinets in use for the herbarium in the Budapest Natural History Museum, Hungary, were produced free from the Director of the Museum, and added. Broad structural details of a built-in-wall show-case in the Economic Products Gallery, were sketched and photographed, Impressions of 69 old printing blocks were prepared and 88 such impressions were pasted in the Album opened for the purpose.

Plans for the year 1965-66.—Specimens for the herbarium and for a few proposed dioramas will be collected.

The Systematic Botany Gallery will be enlivened with additions of select models. Samples of green manures will be added to the exhibits in the Economic Products Gallery.

The rim-locks of all the show-cases in the Systematic Botany Gallery will be renewed. The central part of the Economic Products Gallery will be modernised.

A bulletin on ferns will be got ready for the Press. The manuscripts of a brief guide to the Economic Products Gallery will be prepared with illustrations.

The printing of the Guide to the Pudukkottai Museum, will be speeded up. A setof six coloured picture post-cards on betanical topics will be prepared.

A special exhibition of vegetable dyes will be conducted.

Photographs of select plants in their natural environs will be prepared, for facilitating the preposed construction of dioramas work in the galleries.

GEOLOGY SECTION.

Additions to the collections.—Cores containing coal and ores of lead, zinc and copper were received from the Superintending Geologist, Geological Survey of India, Mylapore.

Specimens of metallurgical coke, coking coal, non-coking coal, weakly coking coal and lignite were received from the Director, Central Fuel Research Institute. Bihar.

A specimen of ball clay was received from the Andhra Pradesh Mining Corporation.

Specimens of amethyst, banded agate, banded agate with amethyst crystals, banded chart with quartz, green apophyllite, stilbite and zeolites (4) were purchased from Sri F. Makki of Friend's Agency, Dehu Road Cantonment, Bombay-Poona line.

Additions to the galleries.—A specimen of dunite was added to igneous rocks.

Sixty-nine specimens pertaining to Building stones were exhibited in the galleries.

Improvements to the galleries.—Modermsed built-in-show-cases were being set up in the Central portion of the Geology Hall. Wall show-cases were made and fixed in the galleries and 60 specimens of building stones in the reserve collections were exhibited in them. Teak-wood beedings in place of putty were provided for 20 glass panes in the sloping cases in the Economic Geology Gallery. The sloping cases pertaining to Pottery. Pencil Manufacture and South Arcot Lignite were re-varnished. The wooden trays on which the mineral specimens pyrope and lapis lazuli were mounted were removed and the specimens were mounted on plaster pedestals and re-exhibited in the gallery. The plaster pedestals for 5 mineral specimens were renewed. The wooden trays in which specimens of meerschaum clay and garnet pieces were exhibited were glass bound afterproviding a decent background for each. The photograph of Triceratops was bound with-

a bigger glass pane. Four plant fossil charts, one photograph of the wooly mammoth and one of an iron factory were re-bound with black calico cloth. This was done in order to effect uniformity and to improve the dsiplay.

Labelling and preservation.—Bilingual labels were provided for the specimens of building stones exhibited in the newly made wall show-cases. The tri-lingual label for Potteres was changed into a bilingual one. The index labels for Stratagraphy were replaced by new ones for fossils and taimil equivalents were provided for each. The bilingual labels for Hornblende Rock and Pencil Manufacture were re-painted. The tamil label for serpentinous stones was properly translated and re-painted. Its English label was also re-painted. The index for the model of the earth was renewed. Two hundred and twenty-five old and faded labels in the Economic Geology galleries were renewed. Tamil equivalents were provided for some of them. Twenty-eight old labels for the Economic Geology specimens in the reserve collections were renewed. The small rock salt specimens belonging to Minerals and Fertilizers and the cubial rork salt specimen in the gallery were preserved and re-exhibited. The specimen of saltpetre in the reserve collections was also preserved. Index cards were prepared for 441 rock specimens. 239 fossil specimens, 114 Economic Geology specimens and 80 mineral specimens.

Research.—Eight mineral specimens, four fossil specimens and one rock specimen in the reserve collections were identified and labelled.

Some of the haphazardly kept rocks in the reserve collections were classified and arrangel in an orderly manner.

Some of the Economic Geology specimens in $\,$ the reserve collections $\,$ were similarly arranged.

The rock type of a sculpture sent by the Curator, Archaeology Section, was identified and the same was returned to him.

Specimens brought by Sri T. R. N. Kumaraswamy from Madurai were identified.

Plans were being drawn up for modernising the left and right wings in the Geology

Hall.

Photographs added.—Photographs of artificial fulgarites and a cluster of siderite crystals were added to the album maintained in the section.

Plans for the year 1965-66.—The modernised built-in-show-cases in the Central portion of the Geology Hall will be completed and it is proposed to display the Economic Geology exhibits in them. Litorits will be made to panel up the bottom portion of the new wall show-cases in which building stones are exhibited to improve the appearance. A specimen of leptynite will be collected and exhibited in the gallery. It is proposed to have curtains for all the windows in the Geology Gallery in order to avoid the glare and the reflections on the glass panes in the modernised show-cases in the central portion of the hall. Cores containing coal and ores of lead, zinc and copper are expected to be exhibited in the mezzanine floor in the Geology Gallery. Efforts will be made to import ultra-violet bulbs for re-working the fluorescent unit.

ANTHROPOLOGY SECTION.

Additions to the collections.—1. The following Ethnographic material was added to the collections—

Work in the galleries.—The Ethnology Gallery II and the Kathakali gallery were modernised by built in wall cases and concealed internal flourescent lights with fully panelled front. The door ways behind the new Ethnology and the Physical Anthropology galleries were covered with plywood sheets. A screen was erected behind the Meriah-Sacrifice post to improve the display and to avoid light coming in, and causing glare from the Prehistory gallery. Charts depicting the physical characters of human races, i.e., eye, skin, lip and hair were displayed in a vertical case in the Physical Anthropology gallery. The Meriah Sacrifice Post base was repainted with a pleasing colour scheme and provided with a prominent wooden label.

The Prehistoric and the Adichanallur galleries were rearranged on modern lines. Some vertical cases in the Prehistory gallery were lined with plywood sheets. The burial urns cases were freshly repainted and pedestals and panelled bases were varnished. The lime strains on the burial unto were removed with the aid of acetic acid. Study collections of the Prehistoric potteries of Adichanallur and Perumban were stored up neatly in the Prehistoric reserve collection room. One vertical case was put up to exhibit foreign and Indian stone tools in the Prehistory gallery. A descriptive bilingual label for the potteries was put up in the Prehistory gallery.

Two chain shot pedestals which were eaten by white ants were completely renovated and freshly painted.

Some sloping cases in the Musical Instruments gallery were distempered in order to remove strains. All the insect damaged labels were replaced by new ones. Cases were dusted periodically and kept clean.

Preservation of reserve collection.—Two bamboo vessels of Kadar, a shoe of Madigas, two Japanese swords, one sword of the East India Company, a dozen long human bones a hand axe and five musical instruments were chemically treated and preserved.

Research.—The work on Kodikkaraı was continued, but no field work was done during this year.

Training and lectures.—The Curator was deputed to Kalibangain, Rajasthan State for a period of three months for training in methods of archeaeological excavation. The students of the School of Archaeology, New Delhi; Department of Fine Arts, Stella Maris College, Madras; Department of Anthropology, Deccan College, Poona; Department of Anthropology, Utkal University, Orissa; Department of Museology, M. S. University Baroda and Sri V. N. Tiwari, Raipur Museum. Madhya Pradesh were given training in Anthropology.

The Curator delivered twelve lectures to the students of the Diploma course in Anthropology, Madras University and one lecture to the students of M.A. degree course in Ancient History and Archaeology during the course of this year.

Work in the galleries.—A new gallery of Buddhist Antiquities was organized and thrown open to the public by the Chief Minister of Madras on 2nd November 1964. Antiquities from Amaravati, Sankaram, Peddamudiyam and reduced scale models of excavated site from Nagarjunakonda have been displaced in this gallery for the first time.

Immovable triangular wooden reapers were provided for the labels in the Jain Sculpture Gallery. The two sculptures hitherto lying on the floor in the mezzanine floor of New Extension Gallery were provided with two pedestals. The lacquer works case sandalwood carvings case and ivory carvings case were repainted and the exhibits were rearranged in a more attractive manner. The glass windows in the Bronze Gallery were provided with suitable curtains to prevent direct sunlight and glare from entering the gallery. A neat, painted wooden partition was erected across the Centenary Exhibition Hall in the centre separating the main hall from the new Buddhi-t Antiquities Gallery.

Labelling.—The faded aluminium labels in New Extension Gallery and Hindu Sculpture Gallery were replaced by new framed labels. The system of giving dates for the bronzes, in the lebels was commenced and is nearing completion.

Card indexing of the specimens in New Extension Gallery, the second Sculpture Gallery and Jain Gallery has been completed.

Special exhibition.—A special exhibition was organized from 2nd to 15th November 1964 in connection with International Campaign for Historical Monuments. The exhibition included representative collections in bronze, stone sculptures, copper plates, wood-carvings and paintings.

One metal image and thirteen copper plates were loaned to Vyasa Bhakta Kaladi Sadas .Samajam, Kanchipuram, for an exhibition.

Research.—The Curator continued his research on "Copper plates in the Madras Museum". The catalogue on "Wood carvings" is being continued. The bulletin on "Jain Sculptures in the Madras Museum" by Sri P. R. Srinivasan is in the manuscript stage and is expected to be received from the author shortly. The Curator gave a talk in the All-India Radio on "Copper plates" in Tamil. An article on "Amaravati Sculptures in the Madras Museum" has been sent to a cultural magazine for publication. Another article by the Curator entitled "Heritage in clay" was published in the "Hindu" in January 1965.

Plans for the year 1965-66-

- 1. Maintaining a separate $% \left(1\right) =0$ photo album containing $% \left(1\right) =0$ photos of the exhibits in National Art Gallery.
 - 2. Providing fresh curtains for the windows in the Central Hall.
 - 3. Providing flourescent lighting for rooms I and II.

Publications.—The printing of the guide to the National Art Gallery, will be completed.

CHEMICAL CONSERVATION SECTION.

Four bronze images were electrolytically restored and were given subsequently approtection coating. One big Nataraja image was chemically treated and restored. One small bronze image was also chemically restored and preserved. Six bronze images are under treatment. One ivory image was cleaned and its artistic details were revealed.

Two of the linestone sculptures in the Amaravathi gallery were given chemical treatment and wer, preserved with a protective coating. Three other sculptures are under treatment. A silver banglet which was covered with corrosion crusts was cleaned to reveal its ornamental details. Fourteen pottery pieces, 9 musical instruments, two Malavi: sorcery figures and two bamboo vessels were chemically conserved.

Four swords were chemically restored and subsequently preserved with a protective coating. A stone axe and twelve long bones were chemically preserved.

An X-ray apparatus supplied by Messrs. Phillips (India) Limited was installed in the Laboratory and experimental radiog upns of pannings were taken for study. One Spectro photometer equipment supplied by Messrs. Gordhandas Desai Limited was also installed in the Laboratory. Ultra violet and Infra-red lamps have also been acquired. A recording Thermohygrograph was acquired and temperature and humidity readings in the laboratory rooms, in the Ethnology gallery (inside and outside the show cases) and in the Birl Gallery have been taken for study purposes. This is being continued.

An order for microfilming 13,000 pages was received from an American Research-Scholar and the work was taken up and continued.

Facilities for training in Chemical Conservation were provided for Mr. Tiwari from the Museum at Raipur during October 1964. Lectures on chemical conservation were given to students of Archæology in the University of Madras and students of Anthropology from the Utkal University.

The Curator of the section gave two lectures on "The Problems in the conservation of Indian sculptures" during February 1964, as visiting lecturer in the Department of Muscology of the University of Baroda.

A Hungarian visitor. Miss Edith Toth, Curator of the Art Museum at Budabest-visited the laboratory on 31st March 1965.

CHILDREN'S SECTION.

Additions to the collections.—The following $% \left(1\right) =0$ were added to the collection in the Children's section—

- 1. Six dolls dressed in the regional costumes of West Germany which were presented to the Museum by the children of Marienschule, Saarbruchen, West Germany.
- 2. Two dolls in the traditional costume of the district of Marburg in Hessen, West Germany, presented by the Soroptimist clubs of Frankfurt.
- 3. Fifteen small costume dolls of India for the doll's house exhibited in the-gallery.

- 4. Furniture for the dolls house-20 Nos.
- 5. Two Japanese costume dolls (1) A Japanese Flower girl and (2) A Japanese girl with a parasol.
 - 6. Eight Indian costume dolls.

Work in the gallery.—The doll's house in the section was renovated, furnished and exhibited in the gallery. In addition to the routine work of cleaning the cases and exhibits in the gallery, 20 old discoloured explanatory labels were replaced with new printed ones. The background of the Early Man case was repainted and new labels were provided.

Publication and educational work.—The Guide to the Children's Gallery by the Assistant Curator in charge of the Children's section is in its final stages of publication.

A special exhibition of the German costume dolls which were got with the help of the Director, Max Muller Bhavan, was arranged during the month of August. Special guided tours of the children's gallery were arranged for school parties.

Special training in the preparation and display of exhibits for school children wasgiven to the following persons:—

- 1. Sri Tiwari from the Raipur Museum.
- 2. Three students of M.A. Fine Arts from Stella Mary's College.
- 3. Two students of Museology from Baroda.
- 4. Mrs. Kumaresan from the Corporation High School, Vepery, Madras.
- 5. Twenty Balasevika trainees from the Indian Council of Child Welfare.

Plans for the year 1965-66—Gallery.—(1) Changing the lighting in all the show cases to flourescent tubes.

- (2) Renovation of some of dioramas.
- (3) Exhibition of German or Japanese dolls in the place of the Yugoslav dolls.
- (4) Special guided lectures for school parties.
- (5) Acquisition of specimens of child art and exhibiting them.
- (6) Quiz Board to be got ready and installed in the gallery.

Publication .- Guide to the Children's Gallery will be brought out.

GOVERNMENT MUSEUM, PUDUKKOTTAI.

General working hours.—The Government Museum, Pudukkottai, works on all-days except Sundays and declared Government holidays. The working hours of the Museum galleries are from 8 a.m. to 11-30 a.m. and 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

In the official year 1964-65 this institution has worked for 285 days.

Visitors.—The total number of visitors during the year 1964-65 was 140,430 with a daily average of 493, which includes both males and females, literates and illiterates (Appendix A).

Distinguished visitors.—Most of the distinguished visitors who happen to pass through Pudukkottai, never fail to visit the Museum and were pleased to pass appreciative remarks in the visitor's book (Appendix B).

Administration.—The Curator was in charge of the Museum, assisted by a Technical Assistant. a Junior Taxidermist, two lower division clerks. Besides this, the Museum galleries are guarded by nine guards and two watchmen, with one gardener.

The Director of Museums, Madras, who is the controlling authority, inspected this museum from 5th August to 13th August 1964 and made valuable suggestions for the improvements of the galleries on modern lines, which were carried out as and when funds permitted.

The inspection of the office of the Government Museum by the office Superintendent of the Government Museum, Madras, lasted for three days from 15th October 1964 to 17th. June 1965. All his valuable suggestions and instructions were properly carried out immediately.

The annual budget of this museum in 1964-65 was Rs. 27,596 (Appendix C).

Galleries.—There was a regular and proper rearrangement of the existing show cases in all the galleries according to the available space whenever any new specimen came for display. The display and improvement of the galleries engaged the prime attention of the staff. All the show cases were kept clean and tidy and some of them were rendered insect proof. The old and colour faded labels were renewed by new ones.

Improvements in the galleries—Geology.—This gallery was furnished with a slopping case on one side to balance the existing one on other side for the minerals and rocks:

Three frames containing geological maps of India so far fixed in the Central show case vertical panel were removed and fixed on the wall. The vertical panels were fixed with glass panes to exhibit photographs of geological interest.

Zoological reserve collections.—A number of rolled bird skins and other Zoological glass-doored modernised show cases by the Pudukkottan Co-operative Timber Works Society Limited. Due to the conversion of these almirah-type cases into modernised show cases the whole birds gallery was rearranged, to enable the exhibits to be seen in proper sequence by the visitors. This has considerably improved the display arrangements in the gallery.

Fishes.—The empty wooden frames above the sloping case containing the specimens of eels, etc., were suitably utilised for exhibiting a selected series of enlarged photographs of interesting species of South Indian Fishes received from the Madras Museum.

Zoological reserve collections.—A number of rolled bird skins and other Zoological specimens kept in the cupboards in the Taxidermist's room as reserve collections were identified and entered in a separate register.

Mammals.—Six bureau-type, multi-glass doored show cases were converted intosingle-glass doored show cases. This conversion resulted in more space which was followed by a rearrangement of the Mammals Gallery. This rearrangement considerably improved the display and afforded ample space to move about for the visiting public.

Anthropology.—Twelve fresh photographs of South Indian Tribes received from the Madras Museum have been mounted and exhibited in this gallery.

Bronze.—The Bronze section has been completely rearranged. The overcrowdingbronzes have been removed to the reserve collection, and the remaining were rearranged according to their 'conographic sequence. The entire bronze gallery register has been rewritten according to the present arrangement.

Library.—About 17 books were added to the library making up the total volumes to 1,186. It embraces all the sections pertaining to a general museum. It contained to-serve the curator and his staff and the interested public with the same usefulness and importance as before (list of books added is furnished in Appendix D).

Equipments including furniture and fittings.—The work of gradually remodelling the old and out-of-date bureau type show cases was further pushed through. Two bureau type multi-glass-doored show cases in Birds Gallery were provided with four single-glass-paned.

doors and six show cases of similar pattern in the Mammals gallery were also provided with single-glass-paned doors. This enabled the visitor to view the exhibits without any hindrance by wooden beadings.

The 12-bore double barrel breach gun and a 12-bore single barrel muzzle loading guns are being maintained in good condition and put into use for enriching the collections of zoological specimens. Besides these, an "Air Rifle gun" (177, B.S.A. Trade mark, England make) was purchased from Messrs. P. Orr and Sons for collections of smaller birds.

Accessories for shooting, such as leather cartridge belt, cartridge leather case and a torch light were also purchased. At present, to meet the requirements of a refrigerator for preserving the shot birds until skinning, a vacuum flask was purchased to store we for the minimum period of 24 hours.

Two Kardex cabinets were purchased from Messrs. Remington Rand of India Limited, Madras, for the library section of this museum.

Tours.—In the month of September shooting tours were undertaken to Sittannavasal and Tiruvarankulam with the Director of Museums, Madras. In the month of November, a tour to Varanasi was officially undertaken by the Curator, Government Museum, Pudnkottai, as a representative of the Madras State to attend the Museum Camp on Paintings, conducted by the Central Ministry of Education and Cultural affairs.

Extra-mural activities and assistance to the educational institutions.—The assistance to organise museums in schools and in and around Pudukkottai was afforded as usual. About 56 schools were the beneficiaries thereof (Appendix E).

In the month of August at the request of the Collector, the Curator accompanied Srimathi Lakshmi N. Menon, Minister of State in the Ministry of External Affairs, New Delhi, to Sittannavasal.

In the month of November 1964, the Curator inaugurated the History Association of the Training College, Pudukkottai and spoke on the "Monuments of South India with special reference to Pudukkottai".

In the month of December 1964, the Curator, participated in the celebrations of the Family Planning, sponsored by the Government and delivered two lectures on the importance of Family Planning in India at Tiruvappur, a suburb of Pudukkottai, and at the Townhall, Pudukkottai.

The Treasure Trove articles (eight in number) sent in the month of April 1965 by the District Revenue Officer, Truchtrappalli, were examined, identified and valued.

Research and publications.—Some ornaments in the Epigraphy gallery, so far not identified were identified and labelled.

Stores and chemicals.—All essential articles for stores have been purchased and issued. All the chemicals required for the taxidermy work have been purchased from Messrs. Scientific Chemical Industries. Madras and stocked for use. Besides, the required quantity of glass jars for wet preservation was purchased and utilised for the purpose.

Buildings.—A list of urgent structural alterations and repairs needed for the safety and strength of the present museum building was sent to the Public Works Department, Tiruchirappalli, in 1968 and the estimates are still awaited.

- 1. The urgent items are—
 - (!) Providing iron bars for the windows in the Curator's office room.
- (2) Protecting the verandahs containing the exhibits of wood carvings and the
- (3) Converting the present tiffin shed into a regular room for accommodation the museum office.

The colour-washing of the walls in most of the galleries has peeled away and tlaked off badly. The Public Works Department has been requested to take up the work of -colour-washing the entire interior of the galleries immediately.

Garden—This has been considerably improved and made attractive. The plants and flower beds are being maintained in good condition.

Plans for the year 1965-66—Geology.—Adding 30 more photographs of geological interest in the still remaining three empty frames of the slopping cases.

Zoology insects.—Removing completely the old, colour faded, cracked and bulged paraffin coated cork sheets and replacing by fresh ones covered with ivory board.

Birds.—Converting the old type bureau show-cases into single glass paned show-cases. Fixing more tube lights for better lighting and display.

It is proposed to provide brief descriptive labels in English and Tamil for some of the large and more outstanding specimens of birds, such as the Hornbill, the Demoiselle crane, Flamingo, short-toed Eagle, Peafowl, etc.

Invertebrates, dry specimens of Molluscs.—Mounting only two or three specimens of shells on glass plates, the remaining duplicate specimens being removed to the reserve collection.

Wet specimens of Mollusco.—In the present multi-glassed double-doored glass bureau, the specimens are not properly visible. Therefore the show-cases has to be demodelled with a single glass pane in the front and panelled base at the bottom.

 $\it Economic\ Botony.$ —Converting the present herbarium cases into a semi-vertical, modern show-case with panelled bases.

Archaeology.—The background green distemper on the plaster-casts models, which is peeling off will be scraped thoroughly and re-distempered with pale green.

General.—As Pudukkottai is noted for its high temperature in the hot season between February and September it is proposed to install a water-cooler for the convenience of the visiting public and school students.

Staff.—The Government ordered that the nomenclature of the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent in the Government Museum, Madras, be changed as Director of Museums and Assistant Director of Museums in the G.O. Ms. No. 223, Education, dated 23rd February 1965.

One temporary post of Gallery Guard was sanctioned in G.O. Ms. No. 1284, Education, dated 20th November 1964.

The permanent retention of the temporary posts of Artist Modeller and Carpenter was sanctioned with effect from 7th April 1964 in G.O. Ms. No. 502, Education, dated 7th April 1965.

Photographic work.—The Photographer was engaged taking prints for record and sale to the public. A sum of Rs. 997.75 P. was realised by sale of prints and enlargements as against Rs. 853.15 P. in the previous year. During the year under report 363 negatives and 1,766 prints and enlargements were prepared.

Museum Theatre.—The Museum Theatre was used for 200 engagements during the year of which 160 were for dramatic performances, etc., and the rest for rohearsals and meetings. A sum of Rs. 7,004 was realised as rent as against Rs. 6,944 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 993 has in addition been credited to Government towards overtime fee for the Caretaker's overtime attendance.
