up to 19th May 1693 on page 23 infra.]

TO MR : PHILIP NODEN

MERCH<sup>t</sup> : ATT MADDAPOLLAM

The R<sup>t</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>a</sup> : haveing long since Ordered the withdrawing of Metchlepatam Factory, and Maddapollam Factory in Order to the better resettlem<sup>t</sup> : when occasion shall serve there has notwithstanding remained in each Factory sev<sup>ll</sup> : Goods & household stuffs, and a considerable yearly charge of Serv<sup>ts</sup> : wages and reperation has been continued contrary to their order and it being not thought expedient to make any present settlement at either of those Factorys at least untill the Mogulls own Phirmaund be obtained, we have therefore thought fitt to write Letters to the Bramine & Dubash att each Factory (copy whereof comes inclosed) ordering them to send hither forthwith by hired boats all the Goods and household stuff belonging to the R<sup>t</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>a</sup> : whereof Mr. Brough has left a List w<sup>th</sup> : you in w<sup>ch</sup> : wee observe there is a good quantity of Brimstone w<sup>ch</sup> : take care to send, wee desire you to lett y<sup>m</sup> : have a Copy of said list for their directions and furnish y<sup>m</sup> : w<sup>th</sup> : w<sup>t</sup> : money shall bee requisite for Paym<sup>t</sup> : of Cooley and boat hire out of y<sup>e</sup> : money left in your hands by Mr. Brough w<sup>ch</sup> : by the ballance of his Acco<sup>t</sup> : delivered in, is Pago<sup>ds</sup> : 109 : 34; Fanams.

Wee have written to Sanco Narso about y<sup>e</sup> : difference in Acco<sup>ts</sup> : between you and him as you will perceive by y<sup>r</sup> : inclosed Copy w<sup>ch</sup> : wee hope will prevent his Giveing you any trouble w<sup>th</sup> : y<sup>e</sup> : Countrey Govern<sup>t</sup> : And wee doe hereby requier you, as you Expect any favour protection from the R<sup>t</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>a</sup> : y<sup>t</sup> : by the first oppertunity you repair hither w<sup>th</sup> : y<sup>r</sup> : family, for while the Govern<sup>t</sup> : of those parts continues so unsettled it will not be safe for you to continue there, and If you shall by your non observance of our Order bring yo<sup>r</sup> : selfe & Family into any trouble, you cannot reasonably expect any assistance from us.

Mr. Brough gives us an Acco<sup>t</sup> : y<sup>t</sup> : there is due for rent at Metchlepatam as Follows viz<sup>t</sup> : To Burze Meo for 4 years 7 months end : 25<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>ry</sup> : 1691 at 12 Pag<sup>ds</sup> : per month, 55 : To Mustapha for 4 years 8 months end : 29<sup>th</sup> : Feb<sup>ry</sup> : 1691-2 at Pag<sup>ds</sup> : 3 per month : 14 : 00 : To Mahomud Hussen 5 years 4 months ending 29<sup>th</sup> : Feb<sup>ry</sup> : 1691-2 : Pago<sup>ds</sup> : 15 : [4] mens : 80 : 00 : and y<sup>t</sup> : he has cleared the debt of Pag<sup>ds</sup> : 80 : to Mahomud Hussen for halfe and y<sup>t</sup> : y<sup>e</sup> : rent due to y<sup>e</sup> : other two is to be cleared after the same manner w<sup>ch</sup> : wee desire you to doe accordingly, and y<sup>e</sup> : remainder of the R<sup>t</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>as</sup> : Cash If any be left, send to us by y<sup>e</sup> : first oppertunity, There being no occasion for any further charges either of reperation or Wages at either of y<sup>e</sup> : Factorys for the Present.

The matter herein recommended to you is of noe small importance & deserves Good consideration &c<sup>a</sup>: prudent managem<sup>t</sup>: both in the begining of y<sup>e</sup>: Goods &c<sup>a</sup>: of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: and yo<sup>r</sup>: selfe and family.

If you find the Govern<sup>t</sup>: either at Metchlepatam or Maddapollam oppose make no disturbance but only cause a List to be written of the things in the Factory and Lett y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Key of y<sup>e</sup>: Factory to be left w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Gov<sup>r</sup>: and as to yo<sup>r</sup>: own removeall you must give those Persons Good words w<sup>th</sup>: whome you have a difference in Acco<sup>ts</sup>: to perswade y<sup>m</sup>: rather to deferr the determination of yo<sup>r</sup>: Acco<sup>ts</sup>: to us, then to the Countrey Govern<sup>t</sup>: there, who will abuse you both, & wee urge this necessary caution to you because wee would very willingly prevent those mischiefs w<sup>ch</sup>: may probably happen to you, if either the good likeing you may have of y<sup>e</sup>: place or any other consideration whatsoever should prevaile w<sup>th</sup>: you to continué there against our Expresse Ord<sup>r</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: will put it out of our Power to doe you any kindnesse, If you should thereby bring yo<sup>r</sup>: selfe into any future trouble.

If y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>t</sup>: will not permitt y<sup>e</sup>: Carrying of of y<sup>e</sup>: Goods &c<sup>a</sup>: from Metchlepatam, there is no reason y<sup>t</sup>: wee should pay y<sup>e</sup>: rent demanded by Burze Meo &c<sup>a</sup>: but If they doe permitt, y<sup>n</sup>: clear the Acco<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>m</sup>: as well as you can & If y<sup>e</sup>: money in yo<sup>r</sup>: hands be not sufficient to discharge y<sup>t</sup>: & the whole boat hire you may agree w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: boat men to receive their hire or halfe of it here, or Draw a bill upon us for any small summe y<sup>t</sup>: shall be necessary for the executing of our Order wee are

Upon receipt of this Lfe you must Act according to y<sup>e</sup>: contents hereof w<sup>th</sup>: things belonging to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: in their Factory as chears, Tables, cotts, Musters, Guñs, Musquetts, Anchors, Timbers, & all manner of Moveables, According to a list, w<sup>ch</sup>: Mr. Noden will dd: you also w<sup>th</sup>: things belonging to particuler persons you must clear the Factory of, you must not loose y<sup>e</sup>: Oppertunity of sending them up this Moonsoon by boats and send me a List of y<sup>e</sup>: Goods you send on her, as also y<sup>e</sup>: Key of y<sup>e</sup>: Factory by y<sup>s</sup>: bearer, If any of y<sup>e</sup>: Duans People come to molest you from Acting according to my order, then leave y<sup>e</sup>: Factory & all things therein, to them & do not concern yo<sup>r</sup>: selfe further w<sup>th</sup>: itt, I have ordered M<sup>r</sup>. I have heard y<sup>t</sup>: between M<sup>r</sup>. Noden & yo<sup>r</sup>: selfe there is some Acco<sup>ts</sup>: depending betwixt him & you, both belonging to us therefore you must not Goe to doe him any Injury, you may bring yo<sup>r</sup>: Acco<sup>ts</sup>: here & Proofs with you, & I will take care to doe you right you may without being doubtfull come hither



therefore obey my Commands & if there be any other person who have any difference w<sup>th</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>. Noden Acquaint them with this my order.

Our last was y<sup>e</sup>: 28<sup>th</sup>: past This Gives answer to severall rec<sup>d</sup>: from you, dated y<sup>e</sup>: 5<sup>th</sup>: 8<sup>th</sup>: 13<sup>th</sup>: & 30<sup>th</sup>: past & 2<sup>d</sup>: Instant.

Forgett not to demand your merch<sup>ts</sup>: Answer concerning the Neckcloths & If they can be had cheap wee may enlarge y<sup>e</sup>: Investm<sup>t</sup>: therein, being a good commodity in Europe.

Take y<sup>e</sup>: 1<sup>st</sup> opportunity of a ship or Deckt vessell comeing this way for sending us y<sup>e</sup>: bales you have in readynesse, wee expect y<sup>e</sup>: Briganteen from Vizagapatam, & a ship from Bengall long before now & intended to have sent one down to you but since wee are disappointed wee depend upon you Freightin<sup>g</sup> y<sup>e</sup>: Goods upon some of y<sup>e</sup>: Countrey ships w<sup>ch</sup>: are in your river and bound hither.

Pray make further Enquiering into y<sup>e</sup>: Matt of yo<sup>r</sup>: fanams because Ezam Rauze & those w<sup>th</sup>: him doe give a different Acco<sup>t</sup>: from w<sup>th</sup>: you write us in yours of y<sup>e</sup>: 13<sup>th</sup>: past.

Wee have paid y<sup>e</sup>: two bills you mention to have drawn upon us in yo<sup>r</sup>: Generall L<sup>r</sup>e: dated y<sup>e</sup>: 5<sup>th</sup>: for Pago<sup>da</sup>: 2000 & in yo<sup>r</sup>: Generall dat: 13<sup>th</sup>: Do: for Pago<sup>da</sup>: 750 for w<sup>ch</sup>: you are to Give us credit.

Wee have accepted your bill drawn for Pago<sup>da</sup>: 500: mentioned in yours of y<sup>e</sup>: 2<sup>d</sup>: Instant.

Wee are glad you have rec<sup>d</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: two thousand Pago<sup>da</sup>: sent you by Dr. Blackwall Concerning w<sup>ch</sup>: wee heard some doubtfull reports, & y<sup>e</sup>: Passage by land uncertain, you must loose no opportunitys of Drawing bills upon us till you are furnished w<sup>th</sup>: Enough to comply w<sup>th</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: contracts but draw no more than necessary.

Wee want y<sup>e</sup>: Copy of yo<sup>r</sup>: Paymasters Acco<sup>ts</sup>: concerning w<sup>ch</sup>: you write y<sup>t</sup>: you want assistants to Copy y<sup>m</sup>: If your meaning be y<sup>t</sup>: they Cannot be Copied till more Assistants come to you from hence, lett us know it, y<sup>t</sup>: wee may noe Longer depend upon y<sup>m</sup>: in vain.

If you have a markett for the Allum sell it as well as you can, wee haveing more here then wee can dispose of; Pag<sup>da</sup>: 27: per halfe peece Broad cloth is a better price then wee can gett here, for damaged broad Cloth, and If you can sell y<sup>e</sup>: 9 peeices at an Abatement proportionable to the damage lett itt Goe, wee have none to send you neither good nor damaged.

The 5 Fanams sent us is under Assay whereof wee shall advise you the report, continue you to send us 5 monthly If you write.

Wee have rec<sup>d</sup>: the 4 percills of Musters of Blue Clóth, repair yo<sup>r</sup>: Cuddalore Fortification so far as is necessary especially y<sup>e</sup>: Northernmost point, w<sup>ch</sup>: Mr. Hatsell informs us was designed before he came, and as soon as you have gott a stock of bricks, & Chinam enough, goe on w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: reperation of yo<sup>r</sup>: curtain upon y<sup>e</sup>: old foundation & hasten it w<sup>th</sup>: all Expedition.

By every Gen<sup>l</sup>: Letter give us an Acco<sup>t</sup>: (as you have done in yo<sup>rs</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 13<sup>th</sup>: past) of y<sup>e</sup>: Quantity of Cloth mesured Embaled & at whitening to w<sup>ch</sup>: add an acco<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: quantity turned out as short cloth. And wee strictly require y<sup>t</sup>: you take care y<sup>t</sup>: none of y<sup>e</sup>: Cloth w<sup>ch</sup>: is turned out be disposed of to any but y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & it is high time to begin (if you have not already) to take it in for y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: use at such abatements for y<sup>e</sup>: shortnesse & badness as may discourage y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: from bringin<sup>g</sup> in Cloth below muster.

Wee have here agreed w<sup>th</sup>: our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: to abate 5 per cent on y<sup>e</sup>: short Cloth, besides a proportion in y<sup>e</sup>: respective prices for w<sup>th</sup>: each peece falls short in Length and Breadth.

Our Fort St. George Merch<sup>ts</sup>: have about 1700: Pago<sup>as</sup>: at and near Cuddalore to be invested in Cloth, lett not yo<sup>r</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: give them any



obstructions in y<sup>e</sup>: Investm<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>t</sup>., & o<sup>r</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: have promised to send no more; Wee are

Since the foregoeing wee rec<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>rs</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 5<sup>th</sup>: & 6<sup>th</sup>: Inst<sup>t</sup>: each Accompany'd w<sup>th</sup>: a L<sup>re</sup>: from Gov<sup>r</sup>: Pitt, Wee haveing wholly removed from Conimeer Factory it is not convenient to be at any charge for y<sup>e</sup>: defending it from y<sup>e</sup>: Acceptance of y<sup>e</sup>: Moors, & Morattas, & you did well in forbearing to send men thither, who would be driven out w<sup>th</sup>: disgrace unlesse you sent enough to maintain, & y<sup>t</sup>: wo<sup>d</sup>: be too great & needlesse Expence.

Wee have sent you by these Peons 2 parcells q<sup>t</sup>: 5 Quier of Paper royall, 3 Quier 2<sup>d</sup>: sort, & 4 Quier of y<sup>e</sup>: 3<sup>d</sup>: sort for yo<sup>r</sup>: present supply, wee shall furnish you w<sup>th</sup>: Factors Provisions & stores Garrison by y<sup>e</sup>: first Oppertunity.

To MR. JOHN HAYNES SECOND & C<sup>A</sup>:  
COUNCILL ATT FORT ST DAVID.

Our last was dat: y<sup>e</sup>: 9<sup>th</sup>: Inst<sup>t</sup>: wee have rec<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>rs</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 1<sup>th</sup>: & 6<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: Coppys of yo<sup>r</sup>: Paymasters Account. This incloses invoice & bill of Ladeing for Lead and stores sent you by the Brigantine Robert Atkinson Master Amo<sup>cs</sup>: to Pago<sup>ds</sup>: 1398: 19: 02: for w<sup>ch</sup>: you are to give us Creditt, hasten y<sup>e</sup>: unladeing of y<sup>e</sup>: Brigantine & dispatch her to us againe as soon as possible w<sup>th</sup>: as many bales as she will take in, & send us y<sup>e</sup>: rest of yo<sup>r</sup>: bales by y<sup>e</sup>: first oppertunity, Wee intend to send you more stores by a sloop of Moedum Nino's w<sup>ch</sup>: wee have hired & hope to dispatch to you in two days.

Give the Master order to [*lacuna*] the Brigantine for preservation of the bales from damage.

Haveing two Ministers here, wee can spare Mr. Brideoak to Officiate at Fort St David where he may continue till our further order.

By this Brigantine come Thomas Walton who came out a writer on y<sup>e</sup>: Sampson arrived y<sup>e</sup>: 1<sup>st</sup>: October last, and Charles Bugden who came out a writer on y<sup>e</sup>: Charles y<sup>e</sup>: 2<sup>d</sup>: arrived in Ballasore y<sup>e</sup>: 31<sup>st</sup> October & from thence took passage on y<sup>e</sup>: Berkley Castle arrived here y<sup>e</sup>: 23<sup>th</sup>: November but whether his sallary commences from y<sup>e</sup>: time of arriveall at Bengall, or Fort St. George, you must determine by his Indentures w<sup>ch</sup>: cause him to produce, and enter y<sup>e</sup>: same in your Consultation Booke.

Inclosed is an order made here concerning all ships and cargoes to Bengall being Consigned to the Agent, whereof the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>r</sup>: doe Expect a strict observance.

Allso our order concerning the Exportation of Powder & saltpetre w<sup>ch</sup>: you are to Publish wording it as may be agreeable to your place and Execute due Compliance wherein you are particularly to take care y<sup>t</sup>: noe saltpetre be sold or conveyed directly or indirectly to or for y<sup>e</sup>: use of the French, but you are not to lett it be known that the said order is so intended, wee are

Wee have rec<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>rs</sup>: of 7<sup>th</sup>: Ins<sup>t</sup>: as to y<sup>e</sup>: Morattas it is probable y<sup>t</sup>: they will improve all oppertunity of Quarrilling with you when freed from their enemy y<sup>t</sup>: they may have some pretence to obstruct yo<sup>r</sup>: businesse & force money from you for clearing it, and this has been y<sup>e</sup>: Constant practice of y<sup>e</sup>: Countrey Govern<sup>t</sup>: & is y<sup>e</sup>: reason why wee are not to Give y<sup>m</sup>: just occasion, as wee shall doe by harbouring & protecting y<sup>e</sup>: Duans servants & Debtors against their Masters demands. If a servant & Debtor to y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: should run away from us & shelter himselfe under y<sup>e</sup>: protection of Countrey Gov<sup>rs</sup>: wee then should thinke it very hard y<sup>t</sup>: they should detain & protect him, & bid us come to their Court and make our demands, Have wee more reason or Authority to detain & protect Rama Rajas Servants & Debtors and bid him send his Attornys into our Courts & prove his demands & wee will doe him justice. By w<sup>th</sup>: Authority doe wee pretend to sett up Courts of Justice in his Countrey to deside Causes & Acco<sup>ts</sup>: depending between him & y<sup>e</sup>: farmers of his revenues, but if you doe erect such Court doe any of you understand how to adjust & give a true judgment in such matters, or if you did it is rationable to thinke y<sup>t</sup>: Rama Raja will not submit to your Judgement if it be given against him it is not our businesse or interest to assume or aime at such a jurisdiction & Dominion over Princesse, It is enough for us if wee can protect & governe our own servants, Merch<sup>ts</sup>: & Inhabitants, who thô they are originally his subjects yet are by vertue of our Cowle become ours & wee must clame & maintain our right to protect y<sup>m</sup>: & so long as he permits us to enjoy y<sup>t</sup>: wee may very well allow him to Governe his owne servants & Subjects whome wee are not concerned w<sup>th</sup>: our maine designe is trade w<sup>ch</sup>: cannot be managed within our own bounds wee must be obliged to Rama Raja for permitting our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: to buy Cloth for y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: out of our wall & therefore it is our interest to keep peece w<sup>th</sup>: him as long as wee can, you have a Garrison to defend you when he invards [sic] you y<sup>n</sup>: will be yo<sup>r</sup>: time to bring y<sup>m</sup>: into better manners, But there is no occasion to invite him or provoke him to invade you for the sake of y<sup>e</sup>: Renters, for you cannot by their assistance or your own forces carry on a trade in his Countrey whether he will or no, If you thinke you can, pray lett us know it, and we will consider further thereof it.



You say y<sup>e</sup>: Renters were promised protection from all unjust pretences Mr. Hatsell says they were promised protection from Rama Rajas Enimys who were y<sup>n</sup>: overrunning those parts w<sup>ch</sup>: was just & Hon<sup>ble</sup>: but if you mean y<sup>e</sup>: unjust pretences of Rama Raja, y<sup>n</sup>: question still returns, how can you understand or determine Rama Rajas Pretences upon y<sup>m</sup>: are just or no, you add, y<sup>t</sup>: these Rent<sup>rs</sup>: will build a wall & be further usefull, But would not a warr w<sup>th</sup>: Rama Raja be more prejudicall & will you give him an occasion when you are sencible he is lakeing one.

You doe well to advise us y<sup>t</sup>: intelligence or apprehensions of y<sup>e</sup>: Morattas or French designes Goe on w<sup>th</sup>: Repairing your Fortifications and keep yourselves in a Posture of Defence, If you apprehend any dainger of Invasion, Tho wee hope the French ships will not trouble you there being 10 Dutch ships at Ballasore & a Fleet at Zealon to watch their motions.

You express yourselves very wittily and sharply about y<sup>e</sup>: Timbers sent you hence y<sup>t</sup>: they seem to be old refuse of many years standing in Madrass, They never were ashoare in Madrass, but rec<sup>d</sup>: and bought in the boat y<sup>t</sup>: brot them, and they being but of 12 or 15 foot long were not designed to make beams of 21 foot long w<sup>ch</sup>: are intended to be sent you as soon as wee can gett a conveyance, the Countrey boats cannot take y<sup>m</sup>: in, & these were thought a good Pennyworth, Considering y<sup>e</sup>: Freight & c<sup>a</sup>: Charges saved, & wee know not how to send you any so cheape, 'tis true they are old Maddapollam Timbers, but the better for use, and those of 15 foot long if not rotten worth about 4 Pago<sup>ds</sup>: in Madrass w<sup>ch</sup>: makes amends for the rest, wee are.

I enjoy good health and am glad to hear of yo<sup>rs</sup>: I received yo<sup>r</sup>: Lett<sup>r</sup>: by w<sup>ch</sup>: I understand y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: His Excell<sup>cy</sup>: Arsamanaigue has Confered on you in the Govern<sup>t</sup>: of Pullamulle, wee are become neighbours & therefore should be friends, and as you write very freindly and plainly to mee to I will give you a plain answer and y<sup>t</sup>: is the best way for us to understand one another ar<sup>t</sup>: and to keep freindship I am a Merchant that trades for my Masters, and drive a trade in all parts of India with all sorts of Nations indifferently and therefore must keep



peace with all men and Give strict orders to my Servants that noe stranger suffer any abuse in my Govern<sup>t</sup>: under the Colour of Merch<sup>ts</sup>: and Buzarmen I understand there have come severall people into this town of late because all adjacent parts are troubled with Armyes and soldiers sometimes those that belong to Arsuma Nague and sometimes those that belong to Rama Raja and when they are afraid they come hither, I dont know nor consider who they are, and while they live quietly and peaceably all strangers are alike wellcome, being not concerned in any warr and if anybody makes a disturbance hereabouts, I dont care for their company, and therefore many days agoe gave strict order never to suffer Gopall Naranda to returne hither, who it seems came in privately and went out againe, and has made a nois in the Countrey, y<sup>t</sup>: I have not the good fortune to know you but my servants all tell me y<sup>t</sup>: you are a very wise man and doe very well understand all this Countrey, you know our customs and manner of liveing that wee always give a free liberty for all men to come and goe and buy and sell as they please and dont inquier who they are and whence they come and whether they goe, and how can I act otherwise, If you were in my place what would you doe, Pray give me your advice and Continue our old freindship for this place and to mee.

1<sup>st</sup>: By Cap<sup>t</sup>: Howell in y<sup>e</sup>: Diamond on y<sup>e</sup>: 24<sup>th</sup>: Dec<sup>r</sup>: wee rec<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>rs</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 12<sup>th</sup>: of Sept<sup>r</sup>: last by w<sup>ch</sup>: you drew a bill upon us for 6498: P<sup>s</sup>: for y<sup>e</sup>: vallew rec<sup>d</sup>: but doe not give us the perticulers thereof as you ought to have done, & w<sup>ch</sup>: wee requier you hereafter to doe in the like case, nor doe you give us such ample advices of all things as you should, but referr us to the coming of the Sattisfaction for them, who is not come yet, Just as if you were not at Leasure once in a Quarter or  $\frac{1}{2}$  a year to write anything to us but y<sup>e</sup>: Covert & advice of a bill of exchange drawne upon us which Certainly is not to be suffer'd or indured, but wee hope for the future you will be lesse Negligent & not Omitt writeing to us by every oppertunity y<sup>e</sup>: state of your Affairs and not when one ship is Coming send us word you will write by the next.

2<sup>d</sup>: Wee are glad to hear you are in peace w<sup>th</sup>: all yo<sup>r</sup>: Neighbours and desire you to doe your utmost Indeavors to Continue it w<sup>th</sup>: them, for our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters Interest there is not warr, unlesse forced thereto.

3<sup>d</sup>: Wee have laden the Maddapollam with Provisions and stores from England and Bengall w<sup>th</sup>: armes and Amunition Treasure &c<sup>a</sup>: Amo<sup>ts</sup>: as per invoice and bill of Ladeing Pago<sup>ds</sup>: [*lacuna*] and allso sent upon her an Ensigne a Serjant & 12 soldiers, and Mr. Willson who was sent out to be Second to the Gov<sup>r</sup>: at Bencoolen whome wee require you to receive accordingly and Mr. Butterfeild is to returne to us hither by y<sup>e</sup>: 1st ship if Mr. Fleetwood and Mr. Samuel Wilson shall be then liveing, Wee have allso sent Mr. John Vere who came out a writer for your place, and because wee know not w<sup>th</sup>: want of writers you may have, and knowing how hard it is to gett any out of England wee have entertained Robert Henderson and David Davis, as writers haveing taken their owne bonds and Comended them as such home, who you may make use of till our Masters pleasure is known concerning them and they have given security in England for their trust.

4<sup>th</sup>: By y<sup>e</sup>: Invoice you will see wee have supplied you w<sup>th</sup>: 19680  $\frac{5}{8}$  of Mexicoe Dollars for to buy pepper to send hither the Sampson being now in Bengall and thought cannot be laden thence in March, therefore wee have ordered the Agent and Councill to. send her away in March to you and would have you when she arrives w<sup>th</sup>: you if you can fill her up w<sup>th</sup>: pepper to the saltpetre she brings, to Compleat her ladeing and send her home to England from



thence, but if you cannot procure pepper enough to compleat her ladeing y<sup>r</sup>: send her to us to Madrasse w<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: pepper you can get w<sup>ch</sup>: if you doe wee charge you not to keep her their nor the Maddapolam neither beyond the middle or at the utmost the 20<sup>th</sup> July next.

5. Mr. Wilson brings w<sup>th</sup>: him y<sup>e</sup>: Copys of all things necessary for the Examining and settleing yo<sup>r</sup>: Acco<sup>ts</sup>: to rights w<sup>ch</sup>: have been long behind hand & wee desire he may have all the assistance therein that can bee given him the Invoices you write for, he hath amongst the rest, and be sure to put all things into the best method and order you can against y<sup>e</sup>: Commissarys coming to you who intends to be there the first opportunity he can find leisure.

6. The R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: in their Generall Letter w<sup>ch</sup>: came by y<sup>e</sup>: Barkely Castle and are inclosed herewith doe very often expresse how much the Nations Interest as well as their own is Concerned in the securing and flourishing of your settlem<sup>t</sup>: and w<sup>th</sup>: a value they put upon those who serve them Faithfully and dilligently therein, The Encomium they give of Mr. Bloome, and y<sup>e</sup>: rew<sup>d</sup>: intended him if he had been liveing, may bee a just Incuragem<sup>t</sup>: to yourselves, besides y<sup>e</sup>: large allowanc and priviledges w<sup>ch</sup>: are indulged to you above others of their servants the said Generall Lett<sup>rs</sup>: give you a very particular directions for y<sup>e</sup>: managem<sup>t</sup>: of their businesse, the perusall whereof gives us Occasion to recommend to you the Following rules & proposealls.

7. Their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: doe take notice of two Errors in Mr. Bloome viz<sup>t</sup>: Engrosetting the trade to himselfe and Setting to high a price on Coast Goods w<sup>ch</sup>: made y<sup>e</sup>: Natives chuse rather to carry their pepper to y<sup>e</sup> Dutch, these two things be sure to observe & remedy by letting all persons that desire it have w<sup>th</sup>: liberty of trade y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: have allowed, & sett not above 50 per cent Profit on Coast Goods w<sup>ch</sup>: being duely observed must needs draw y<sup>e</sup>: trade of pepper more to you & lower the price thereof, & wee hope noe private interest will sett up against this Publique Good.

8. Wee requier you to be very frugall in all sorts of your expences both in y<sup>e</sup>: Garrison and otherwise, for it is a vast expence and all out of Pockett whilst the warr in Europe hinders y<sup>t</sup>: trade y<sup>t</sup>: should bear it, & allso wee recommend to yo<sup>r</sup>: great care the dilligent promoteing and raseing y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: revenues in all things reasonable that may be lade without prejudice to the Good of the place, and the Commissary hopes you will so effectually performe it y<sup>t</sup>: he may find nothing at his Coming thither to add to itt.

9. By the Pearle you rec<sup>d</sup>: 10 Maddagascar slaves by y<sup>e</sup>: Tonqueen Merch<sup>t</sup>: 100 & by y<sup>e</sup>: Little Josia 100, a great Number w<sup>ch</sup>: have cost y<sup>e</sup>: Company a great Sum & y<sup>t</sup>: they may be employ'd & Gov<sup>rd</sup>: to advantage, wee recommend to you the Following Rules viz<sup>t</sup>: The Slaves are to be constantly employed in some worke or other, according as they are fitt for it viz<sup>t</sup>:

Some under Carpenters, Bricklayers, Smiths, Sawyers, &c<sup>a</sup>: in making Bricks & Chinam In carrying Pepper &c<sup>a</sup>: Goods, & in y<sup>e</sup>: Cookröom to keep y<sup>e</sup>: Factory and Lodgeing roomes clean & sweet. In planting and gardening y<sup>e</sup>: ground being reported so fertile as to bare almost anything w<sup>th</sup>: little tillage, for w<sup>ch</sup>: purpose certain peices of Ground to be lade out for the maintenance of y<sup>m</sup>: selves & y<sup>e</sup>: rest of the slaves. Cutting or draining the swamp or Moorish ground under the Fort Hill.

Twenty or thirty as soldiers, but to be kept under very sevear and strict discipline & Comãd, & never to have armes in their own keeping but when they are in Exercise or upon duty.

10. Those that are perverse, surly and lazy or theivish or Comitt any other crime to be punisht w<sup>th</sup>: severity but without cruelty, But those that are dilligent willing to worke or doe any signall service, to be rewarded w<sup>th</sup>: some allowance of Wages, or better Cloths or Lodging &c<sup>a</sup>:

11. To have all their full allowance of victualls fitt for them.

12. To be all lodged in a brick Compound built so as being divided in the middle by a wall may make 2 equall squares Compounds each haveing Lodgeings



built all y<sup>e</sup>: sides of the square, Tarast at Topp w<sup>th</sup>: severall partitions sufficient to hold tenn each, w<sup>th</sup>: Locks and barrs to y<sup>e</sup>: door, and other smaller partitions for those that are marryed, and all to be compelled to repair to their severall Lodgings from their worke by 6 a clock at night (Except such as are upon duty as Centinalls) and by 7 or 8 a clock at furthest the doors of the Larger partition to be lock't & bard & y<sup>e</sup>: Gates of y<sup>e</sup>: Compound y<sup>e</sup>: Keys whereof to be lodged w<sup>th</sup>: the Governor & in the morning to be Lett out to their appoynted worke.

13. A discreet man to be appointed w<sup>th</sup>: an assistant to be overseer of their Lodgings, Dyet, worke, &c<sup>a</sup>: who is to take a list of their names, & muster y<sup>m</sup>: dayley at their severall works & at night and morning.

14. If any of y<sup>m</sup>: prove troublesome & Quarrellsome or if you find you have to many, send them to Fort St George, (in Irons if you see cause) either by the Comp<sup>as</sup>: or private shipping, and if any private ship refuses to take y<sup>m</sup>: in or a Convenient number, for two Pago<sup>ds</sup>: a head you furnishing their Provisions and water lett y<sup>m</sup>: have noe Pepper, not trade w<sup>th</sup>: you nor on the West Coast of Sumatra and advise us theoreof.

15. Send some to Indrapore, but not to many for the Number of English there, for fear of mischief.

16. Buy & keep in store as much Pepper as you can & send some to Fort St. George by every ship of y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: C: w<sup>n</sup>: you have store enough for the dispatch of an Europe ship.

17. The R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: doe allow y<sup>e</sup>: private ships to trade in pepper & to buy it at your ports paying a halfe Penny per pound towards their Charges Garrison &c<sup>a</sup>: but there are two things to be considered 1<sup>st</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: you have not y<sup>e</sup>: liberty of Gratifying y<sup>e</sup>: freinds as you please w<sup>th</sup>: Pepper out of y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: stores, to y<sup>e</sup>: prejudice of their own occasions, and never but in case of an overplush of pepper or necessity of money for Charges &c<sup>a</sup>: as wee suppose y<sup>t</sup>: was y<sup>e</sup>: occasion w<sup>n</sup>: you furnished Cap<sup>t</sup>: Howell in the Diamond w<sup>th</sup>: a large quantity. But rather supply y<sup>e</sup>: Private ships w<sup>th</sup>: Pepper by assisting y<sup>m</sup>: to procure it w<sup>th</sup>: their own stock. 2<sup>d</sup>. Not to furnish any private ship w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: stores of pepper at so low rate as y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: should loose their charges Merchandize Wast & Interest w<sup>ch</sup>: they may very well allow to pay (besides y<sup>e</sup>: halfe Penny per pound) for the Convenience of a supply & dispatch.

18. Make your Fortifications as strong as you can, & in Generall lett all buildings be made of Good Materialls & dureable.

19. Lodgings for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Servants & y<sup>e</sup>: soldiers & slaves convenient & of sufficeint defence against the weather, the Ground floor to be raised 3 or 4 foot w<sup>th</sup>: Corall rock fitted up w<sup>th</sup>: sand well washed & dryed & lay a floor of bricks upon it, w<sup>th</sup>: Chinam for wee have heard y<sup>t</sup>: way has done much good in such unhealthy places.

20. Godowns large enough to contain 500 or 1000 Tons Pepper divided by parti[t]ion Walls into severall Godowns to be made all of brick & Tarrast & y<sup>e</sup>: sides of y<sup>e</sup>: walls well bound by timbers of about 70 foot long & double as in y<sup>e</sup>: Margint placed in y<sup>e</sup>: North East Corner of Godown compound to run along y<sup>e</sup>: river side & y<sup>t</sup>: end next y<sup>e</sup>: town lett be strong enough to bear 2 or 3 small Gunns, w<sup>ch</sup>: will both command the river & y<sup>e</sup>: Town.

21. The cover of all your buildings to be Tarrast & y<sup>t</sup>: it may y<sup>e</sup>: better carry of Great rains w<sup>th</sup>: out receiveing damage lett it be a little rased in y<sup>e</sup>: middle so as to cause a desent to each side of about  $\frac{1}{4}$  Inch for every foot.

22. Mr. Sowden built an upper story for his own Lodging on a building w<sup>ch</sup>: was at first not intended to be built higher, and above y<sup>t</sup>: has built another room. Its very probable y<sup>e</sup>: foundation y<sup>t</sup>: was designed at 1<sup>st</sup>: for one room only will not bear two superstructures If so you had better pull down the upper room then hazard the whole building.

23. If the Ditch w<sup>ch</sup>: Mr Bloome began be not deep Enough for draining y<sup>e</sup>: swamp, lett it be cutt deeper and at y<sup>e</sup>: outlett into y<sup>e</sup>: River, lett a sluice be made to lett up and downe, to Comand y<sup>e</sup>: Passage of y<sup>e</sup>: Water from the Great river in



the time of  $y^e$ : Freshes or Great Raines or consider whether the curreant of  $y^e$ : Water may not more conveniently bee turned to run from the river thro' the Ditch to be continued round the Fort Hill into the Sea. If that be feaseable the Entrance of  $y^e$ : Water from the River into the Ditch must be governed by a sluice just  $w^{th}$ : out  $w^{ch}$ : drive stakes pretty near one to another  $y^t$ :  $y^e$ : Water may drain thro' them and no Rubbish or nastinesse enter into  $y^e$ : Ditch & at  $y^e$ : end of  $y^e$ : Ditch to  $y^e$ : Sea  $y^e$ : outlett of  $y^e$ : Water must be governed by a sluice without such greater  $y^t$ : if any Rubbish goes in from  $y^e$ : River it may Passe freely out. But before you undertake it you must consider well & be assured  $y^t$ :  $y^e$ : Seashore is not higher then  $y^e$ : Swamp & consider whether a Ditch may not be cut on  $y^t$ : side of  $y^e$ : swamp  $w^{ch}$ : is towards  $y^e$ : great Hill to convey  $y^e$ : Water  $y^t$ : falls from it into  $y^e$ : River and so prevent its running into the Swamp.

24. Herewith wee send you  $y^e$ : bonds of Robert Henderson & David Davis for serving  $y^e$ :  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: as Writers for 5 years, &  $y^e$ : bond of Gilhis Mina for serving as a Mallay & Java Linguist for 4 years or in any other businesse at 10 Dollars per Mensem he is to take place next to  $y^e$ : Factors & to eat at the Generall Table and If he prove serviceable as a Linguist is to be treated in such manner as to have some respect among  $y^e$ : Mallays. Wee have advanced in part of sallary comencing from  $y^e$ : 20<sup>th</sup>: Ins<sup>t</sup>: viz<sup>t</sup>: to Mr John Vear, Robert Henderson & David Davis each Pago<sup>ds</sup>: 20 and to Gilhis Mina Pago<sup>ds</sup>: 30. Inclosed is a List of the soldiers & Gun crew all paid to the end of Aprill next.

25. The  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: have often recomended the Encouragem<sup>t</sup>: of  $y^e$ : Chines to settle at Bencoolen the most likely Instrument to promote Building planting Manufactoris and trade & If any of  $y^m$ : are come among you lett them have Ground to build on and that their Buildings range the more regularly and all stand at a convenient distance from  $y^e$ : Fort, lay out the streets and divisions by Lines and greatify them in all their reasonable requests.

26. If Hogs are offensive to the Malays lett them be kept in Compounds to prevent their runing into the Malay Town.

27. Among the soldiers, Willis who came out a Serjant from England pretends to be a Carpenter & therefore wee have sent him, tho otherwise not so fitt for your place being troublesome  $w^a$ : in Drinke he has promised Reformation & if he proves sober, make use of his Carpenters art as you have occasion, but if he proves troublesome return him to us. The rest have all behaved themselves soberly here, and wee have chosen them for that reason. There is allso John Cooper & John Heady bred a joyner & Gardener, Young men who may be usefull in their trades. Edward Tayler has a Comission of Ensigne & is to be continued such so long as he continues sober & dilligent.

28. Wee hear Mr Fleetwood has learned something of the Malay Language, Hee would doe well to Cause it to be discoursed att  $y^e$ : Generall Table wherein  $y^e$ : Linguist will be of use & may promote the Teaching of that usefull Language to  $y^e$ :  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companys servants.

29. The  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: C: in their Gen<sup>l</sup>: Lr<sup>e</sup> of Feb<sup>r</sup>: 1691-2 give you Orders concerning Sillebar, their Customs of 5 per cent & making white Pepper, whereunto wee need not add only give us an acco<sup>t</sup>: what you doe therein.

30. Send us a Platt or draught of your Fortification & compound & take in the Fort Hill,  $y^e$ : great Hill, & the Swamp between  $w^{th}$ :  $y^e$ : River and lett  $y^e$ : Compasse lines be drawn upon it,  $w^{th}$ : such remarques as you thinke fitt for our information.

31. Send us an acco<sup>t</sup>: of our reall Stock & stores, a List of  $w^{th}$ : you want. A List of  $y^e$ :  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: servants & their stations & of  $y^e$ : soldiers and  $y^e$ : slaves and how Employ'd.

32. Send us Copys of yo<sup>r</sup> Diarys Consultations and Letters rec<sup>d</sup>: and sent to remain here besides those for Europe.

33. The  $R^t$ : Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: have frequently urged  $y^e$ : promoteing of  $y^e$ : healthnesse of  $y^e$ : place & are willing to allow any reasonable charge for  $y^t$ :



purpose. There are two things w<sup>ch</sup>: have been very destructive to the soldiers and will always be soe till they are remedied one is y<sup>t</sup>: they sleep wett either abroad in y<sup>e</sup>: Dues and Foggs, or in lodgings y<sup>t</sup>: are not built tite enough to keep y<sup>m</sup>: dry Another is a Custome w<sup>ch</sup>: has been to much practised by y<sup>e</sup>: Cheifs or some under y<sup>m</sup>: viz<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Engroseing of Liquors & retailing of it to y<sup>e</sup>: soldiers at more y<sup>n</sup>: double y<sup>e</sup>: cost, w<sup>ch</sup>: eats out y<sup>e</sup>: greatest part of their pay so y<sup>t</sup>: they have not enough left to buy victualls & they drinke to much, To prevent w<sup>ch</sup>: for the future, make a Tryall of this method. an oppertunity of doing services for y<sup>e</sup> : European Na<sup>cons</sup> who have been mis-

By y<sup>e</sup>: enclosed copy of Paragraphs of Fort St. David Gen<sup>l</sup>: Letters your Excell<sup>ty</sup> will understand y<sup>e</sup>: proceedings of y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch against Pullicherry to y<sup>s</sup>: day.

Wee send your Excell<sup>ty</sup> copy of our contract w<sup>th</sup>: Fort St. George Merch<sup>ts</sup>: for 27000 pa: upon w<sup>ch</sup>: wee have paid them 10000 pa: in part whereof they rec<sup>d</sup>: pa: 2000 in dollars borrowed at interest at 16 $\frac{1}{2}$  for 10 pa: wee have rec<sup>d</sup>: 3 gen<sup>l</sup>: Lr<sup>s</sup> from Vizagapatam dated 17: 19 & 27 July whereof y<sup>e</sup>: letter advices y<sup>t</sup>: they have contracted w<sup>th</sup>: Budde Narrain & c<sup>a</sup>: Marchants for 20000 pag<sup>ds</sup>: ddble in Xber next viz<sup>t</sup>: longcloth, Sallampore, Sailcloth & Beetelaes in equall parts whereof they hope to receive  $\frac{1}{3}$  part by y<sup>e</sup>: 25 September next haveing 70 bales ready wee have now ordered them to advise your Excell<sup>ty</sup> by y<sup>s</sup>: conveyance w<sup>t</sup>: Progress they make y<sup>t</sup>: your Excell<sup>ty</sup> may y<sup>e</sup>: better know how to give order for y<sup>e</sup>: disposall of their bales, wee haveing no other way to gett them hither but by y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: shipping as thay pass from Bengall or by hired Countrey vessells.

The late Instances of Pullicherry & Indapoora are a warning to us to provide ag<sup>st</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Worst especially in case of a rupture in Europe between y<sup>e</sup>: English & Dutch Nations. Their underhand practises at Indapoora in time of Peace may probably convert into open Hostility at Bencoolen in time of Warr & ffort S<sup>t</sup>: David standing under like circumstances w<sup>th</sup>: Pullicherry Wee may very reasonably suppose will be exposed to y<sup>e</sup>: like Hazards unless better defended therefore Wee cannot but express o<sup>r</sup>: apprehensions to yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>ty</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: well

This accompanyes one L<sup>r</sup>e directed to his Excell<sup>t</sup> the Commissary Gen<sup>l</sup>: at Vizagap[a]tam w<sup>ch</sup>: keep by you till hee comes. Another directed to him in Bengall w<sup>ch</sup>: send forward by fresh Peons, together w<sup>th</sup>: our L<sup>r</sup>e to y<sup>e</sup>: Agent & c<sup>a</sup>: order yo<sup>r</sup>: Peons to deliver both to M<sup>r</sup>: Henry Stanley Cheife at Ballisore.

Send us a seamer, or large fishing nett, for y<sup>e</sup>: Ma[i]ntenance of our River [lacuna in the original] factory long & [lacuna in the original] broad.

In answer to yo<sup>rs</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 12 Septem<sup>r</sup>: wherein you hertily wish y<sup>t</sup>: wee had sent you more money & we as hertily wish y<sup>t</sup>: we could have done it but we y<sup>n</sup>: had it not & have writ to his Excell<sup>t</sup>: the Commissary Generall in Bengal to provide a farther supply for you.

w<sup>th</sup>: them a Packett from y<sup>e</sup>: Gov<sup>r</sup>: & Counc<sup>l</sup>: & another from M<sup>r</sup>: Willson y<sup>e</sup>: List whereof goes [inclosed] their Gen<sup>l</sup>: Letter dat. 11 Sept<sup>r</sup>: last is very large q<sup>t</sup>: 7 Sheets of Paper & gives a P<sup>t</sup>icular answer to y<sup>e</sup>: Fort St George Gen<sup>l</sup>: from w<sup>th</sup>: & their Consultation Cash books &c<sup>a</sup>: wee observe y<sup>e</sup>: following.

That y<sup>e</sup>: bill wee paid here to Cap<sup>t</sup>: Howell of 6493 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: & y<sup>e</sup>: Doll<sup>rs</sup>: sent them by y<sup>e</sup>: Maddapollam 19680 together w<sup>th</sup>: a bought 8000 Doll<sup>rs</sup> rec<sup>d</sup>: there for goods and Pepper Sold & does make a sune of about 34000 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: actually rec<sup>d</sup>: by M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwood &c<sup>a</sup>: from y<sup>e</sup>: 1 Jan<sup>ry</sup>: 9<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> to y<sup>e</sup> last of Aug<sup>t</sup>: 1693 of w<sup>ch</sup>: great sums has been in y<sup>t</sup>: time paid for Pepper no more y<sup>n</sup>: 2267 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: and y<sup>e</sup>: rest all expended for debts & charges except 4000 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: sent to [P]riamong 6786 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: [Ba<sup>ll</sup>] of Cash y<sup>e</sup>: last of Aug<sup>t</sup>: besides w<sup>ch</sup>: [Ba<sup>ll</sup>:] they have drawne upon us bills for about 7000 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: So y<sup>t</sup>: their Quick Stock was at y<sup>e</sup>: departure of y<sup>e</sup> Ship about 13000 & yet they write y<sup>t</sup>: if y<sup>e</sup>: Sampson comes she must bring [a] stock w<sup>th</sup>: her otherwise they cant provide Pepper for want of mony, The charges of y<sup>e</sup>: Garrison are large but they have sent no Pursers acco<sup>t</sup>: and therefore can say nothing to it.

That they have deferred y<sup>e</sup>: execution of y<sup>e</sup>: order for receiveing 5 p<sup>er</sup> Cent Custome because y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch would thereby take an advantage against them & China men who are comeing from Battavia would thereby be [discouraged] y<sup>t</sup>: 15 Coffrees now employed as Souldiers y<sup>t</sup>: some of them carry goods &c<sup>a</sup>: as occasion require thô otherwise they are not employed at all not so much as planting y<sup>o</sup>: [Batteries] &c<sup>a</sup>: for their own victualls but are wholly suply[ed] out of y<sup>e</sup>: stores.

That their Godowns had been latly burnt and Severall goods lost thereby & they have built another again one for Present use they can make [of] bricks.

That y<sup>e</sup> Cheneymen have made 50 or 100000 Bricks twelve months agoe but refuse to burne them so they lye, but y<sup>e</sup>: Coffrees were never used to y<sup>t</sup>: Service.

That they have employed David Davis as Secretary & Robert Henderson as doct<sup>r</sup>: but cannot imploy Wady as a Gardiner for want of seeds.

That of y<sup>t</sup>: 10 Butts of Bengall Arrack sent them by y<sup>e</sup>: Maddapollam some were expended among y<sup>e</sup>: Souldiers by a dayly allowance as was directed for 6 weeks only, and then la[i]d aside.

That y<sup>e</sup>: Silver fanams will not pass but Copper Cash will & they have enough of them till farther advice.

As to Indrapore they are of a oppinion from y<sup>e</sup>: acco<sup>t</sup>: given them by English &c<sup>a</sup>: who went to York ffort y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons left it w<sup>n</sup>: there was no occasion for it & y<sup>t</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Lane at Padang offerd M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbon a passage for York ffort but he refus'd it & chose to goe for Battavia & they farther comp[ain] y<sup>t</sup>: they have not rec<sup>d</sup>: acc<sup>tt</sup>: from Ind[r]apore.

That no Covenant servant has recd: Sallary since M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwoods first Goeing.

That y<sup>e</sup> silver sent to Tonqueen was weighed in Baggs by AvverDup<sup>r</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: of 112<sup>lb</sup>: & y<sup>e</sup>: put in y<sup>e</sup>: [chest] in presence of [y<sup>e</sup>] Master & Purser notw<sup>th</sup>: stand- ing the Bills of Ladeing were takeing a side & contents unknowne they are of a Oppinion y<sup>t</sup>: now Indrapora is lost y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch will goe on to destroy Pepper and undermine all our Settle<sup>ts</sup>: on y<sup>e</sup>: west coast if not prevented by a farther Supply of Strenth or means used in Europe, they propound y<sup>t</sup>: 2 Sloops may be yearly sent thither one in March, & y<sup>e</sup>: other in Oct<sup>r</sup>: and both Return laden w<sup>th</sup>: pepper.

That plenty of Pepper is to be had at [P]riamong they desire 20 Tope[ss]es to bee sent them to serve in y<sup>e</sup>: room of B[u]ggesses.

The Gen<sup>l</sup>: Lfe fro M<sup>r</sup>: Willson & y<sup>e</sup>: papers in his Packett doe Cheifly complaine against M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwoods Gov<sup>tt</sup>: some whereof are mentioned in y<sup>e</sup>: Gen<sup>l</sup>: Books & others in y<sup>e</sup>: Consulltation & y<sup>e</sup>: papers mention'd in M<sup>r</sup>: Willsons List.

The Chinamen complain y<sup>t</sup>: they have sold him goods & gold to a Considerable am<sup>t</sup>: for ready Dollers but he forced them to Stay a long time & at last paid them in Coast Cloth at so dear a rate y<sup>t</sup>: they lost about 25<sup>p</sup> C<sup>t</sup>: by them by w<sup>ch</sup>: means they are discouraged from settleing.

That M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwood had omitted Severall sums amo<sup>t</sup>: to about 7000 Dollers w<sup>ch</sup>: he ought to have charged in his acco<sup>t</sup>: Cash whereof 3000 Dollers is for y<sup>e</sup>: profit of y<sup>e</sup>: goods w<sup>ch</sup>: he rec<sup>d</sup>: from Cap<sup>t</sup>: [Howell] upon y<sup>e</sup>: bill of 6498 Dollers w<sup>ch</sup>: bill was drawne in September 1692 & his acco<sup>t</sup>: Cash is debted to acc<sup>tt</sup>: Currant ffort St: George in Jan<sup>ry</sup>: 169<sup>3</sup> in all w<sup>ch</sup>: time he appears by his Cash to have lent so much money to y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: the Remander is for dead mens estates 900 Doll<sup>s</sup>: goods Sold out of y<sup>e</sup>: Godowne 1158 Dollers Custome on Pepper Sold 1050 Doll<sup>s</sup>: & 215 Baker [Bahar?] of Pepper Sold out of y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Godown to Cap<sup>t</sup>: Howell for 2365 Dollers of all w<sup>ch</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwood had entered nothing till M<sup>r</sup>: Willson arrivall & hath Since charged y<sup>e</sup>: great part thereof except y<sup>e</sup>: 3000 Dollers profit on Howells goods whereof he still refuseth to make acco<sup>t</sup>: to y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: It is also complained y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Fleetwood doth reserve to himself y<sup>e</sup>: overplus measure of y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: pepper & Keeping y<sup>e</sup>: Godown in his own hands doth refuse to give an acco<sup>t</sup>: thereof y<sup>t</sup>: he maintains a familiarity w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: of their Buggesses their Malay Linguest and Sultan Indy who are all suspected by others and that he doth neglect y<sup>e</sup>: necessary reparations of the Garrison.

M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons pretending indisposition has not yet deliverd all y<sup>e</sup>: acco<sup>ts</sup>: & Papers w<sup>ch</sup>: he promised we Still want y<sup>e</sup>: narrati[v]es of y<sup>e</sup>: occasion & reasons of his leaveing Indrapore factory, Consultations & y<sup>e</sup>: acco<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: remains in their Godowns &c<sup>a</sup>: but he hath deliverd us an acco<sup>t</sup>: of Cash by w<sup>ch</sup>: there is due to him for Ball: 23132 Doll<sup>s</sup>: & a pursers acco<sup>t</sup>: of charges by w<sup>ch</sup>: there is due to D<sup>o</sup>: Purser 1064 Dollers but he Sayes they have no Gen<sup>l</sup>: Books for want of assistance of paper &c<sup>a</sup>: concerning w<sup>ch</sup>: wee need say no more at present y<sup>n</sup>: to assure yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>y</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: acco<sup>t</sup>: will be examined before the Ball: is paid.

Wee have paid our Merch<sup>t</sup>: 15000 Pa: upon y<sup>e</sup>: last contract & shall be forced to borrow money to discharge y<sup>e</sup>: Bills drawn on us from y<sup>e</sup>: West coast otherwise must put a stop to y<sup>e</sup>: Investm<sup>t</sup>:

Wee have now in our Godowns 59 bales of Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David Goods & hope by y<sup>e</sup>: latter end of Decemb<sup>r</sup>: to have [lacuna in the original] bales of our own ready by y<sup>e</sup>: advises from Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David wee conclude they will have as many or more ready there.

Wee rec<sup>d</sup>: from York Fort by y<sup>e</sup>: Maddapollam 38 Candy of Pepper and daly expect 40 more by y<sup>e</sup>: Satisfaction and this is all except Redwood that we can



depend upon here for y<sup>e</sup>: filling up of y<sup>e</sup>: Sampson in Decem<sup>r</sup>: but in the month of Jan<sup>ry</sup>: Cloth will come in much faster.

If yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>y</sup>: does dispatch y<sup>e</sup>: Samuell directly from Bengall to York Fort [well] kentilag[ed] w<sup>th</sup>: Saltpetre and redwood it is probable there may be a sufficient quantity of Pepper to fill her up there being in y<sup>e</sup>: Godowns at M<sup>r</sup>: Butterfields coming away [*Lacuna in the original*] Ba[h]ar of Pepper & a prospect of getting as much more as they can spare mony to buy.

After y<sup>e</sup>: Maddapollam was unladen, we sent her to Fort S<sup>t</sup>: David, & ordered her to be carried into y<sup>e</sup>: River as well to secure her from y<sup>e</sup>: Monsoon or to give her y<sup>e</sup>: repair necessary for another voyage & for y<sup>e</sup>: better dispatch have sent an English Carpenter w<sup>th</sup>: her, after w<sup>ch</sup>: She will be fitt for a voyage either to y<sup>e</sup>: West coast or Rhetorah as yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>y</sup>: shall think fitt all y<sup>e</sup>: acco<sup>t</sup>: wee have of y<sup>e</sup>: Satisfaction is y<sup>t</sup>: she [is] very weak & out of repair y<sup>t</sup>: she was almost ready to Sail w<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Maddapollam came away for this place & brings w<sup>th</sup>: her 40 Ba[hars] of Pepper & one Charles Ryley who is Sent hither for misde[mean]ors w<sup>th</sup>: 10 of y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Coffrees to Supply y<sup>e</sup>: place of Lascarrs; w<sup>n</sup>: she comes she will hardly be fitt for any farther Service wee have long expected but have not heard any farther Europe news from Gov<sup>r</sup>: Pitt, nor by any other means.

We have Sent a Duplicate of this L<sup>re</sup> one to Bengall & another to Vizagapatam.

The Yorke Fort Gen<sup>l</sup>: mentions nothing of Cap<sup>t</sup>: Decrow but y<sup>t</sup>: they were forced to [take] Capt. Howells Pepper to gett money to pay him for y<sup>e</sup>: slaves and M<sup>rs</sup>: Butterfield [Sayer] y<sup>t</sup>: hee sailed from thence in January last for Europe not full laden, wee are.

Yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>y</sup>: very humble & [a]fect<sup>e</sup>: Servants
