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PREFATORY NOTE.

This reprint of the "Sundry Book of 1677-1678" has been undertaken in accordance with the decision of the Government of Madras to publish the records of Fort St. George of the seventeenth and the eighteenth centuries in extenso, as explained in the prefatory note to the "Diary and Consultation Book" for 1672-1678.

This is the earliest existing volume of the series of records styled "Sundries," It would, however, appear from the entry "No. 2" beneath the heading on page 1 that it was the second volume of a series.

The volume purports to be a transcript of the register of letters sent to all the subordinate factories from the 15th August 1677 to the 30th November 1678. The original is in a dilapidated condition; but the pages, though loose, are in a fair state of preservation.

As observed by Talboys Wheeler in his "Handbook to the Madras Records", these Sundry Books are "chiefly curious from their age. The correspondence is "generally of a commercial character, though some information may be obtained, "illustrative of the attitude of the Factories towards the Native Powers, and towards "French and English interlopers."

It haveing pleased Almighty God to take M^r Walter Clavell from among us (he dying after 4 daies sickness of a violent feaver) and the business of these parts according to the Hon^{ble} Companies Settlement devolving on Matt⁸ Vincent we thought it our duties to Joyne with him, in adviseing to y^e Severall Inland ffactories thereby as much as in us lies to Continue the well proceeding of our Masters business in each of them.

And therefore in the first place we doe Confirm what orders you have already received from Said M* Clavell &c* Councell we desire and order you not to draw any money on this factory but that what our Masters business requires for the present that you take Soe much money at interest to carry it on, and we request you to Spare noe paines that the quantity of Peter required may this yeare be procured ready to be Sent home as enordered, assoon as Treasure arrives wee Shall be Sending up your proportion in Specie to b[e] there Sold or Coyned as you Shall find most advantagious.

By our last hence we Sent you Copie of the Honoble: Companies letter to the Cheif and Councell of Bengall your exact Complyance as far as you possibly can, to which we earnestly recommend to you desireing and ordering to make it your rule (as we Shall here allow) for your proceedings both in ye latter investments of this yearc and those with you to make your Investments there we expect Sudden[ly] from you it being ordered by the Cheif &ca ere he dyed.

Wee desire your Opinions P the next of ye manner how best to procure this Kings Phirmaund &ca therein requisite, also what you Can doe with this new Prince hee's now expected as Soone as the Raines are over in Bengall how true know not but desire to be informed.

Our Masters you will perceive have enordered 50 Tunns of Pegu Sticklack which if you can procure (or what of it you can) pray buy the rest let be Supplyed with the best and blackest lack you can get and let it be bagged according to their orders.

The treble refined Petre will alsoe be acceptable if not ordered which we recommend unto you being uncertaine whither Mr Charnock may be able this yeare to-procure the quantity of fine Peter required.

Wee desire M' Edmund Bugdens Speedy repaire to Hugly and you may Send your Bookes and papers aforementioned along with him by Land M' Vincent intending God willing to be in Hugly by the end of this or y' beginning of next month we leave it to you as you Shall Judge most Convenient to Send these bookes and papers either by the way of Kindoa or all the way by land if you Send them by Kendoa we will write to M' Reade that he Send a good boate thither to Carry M' Bugden and them up, we recommend to you in all your Contracts to put off goods as well as money provided you buy the goods noe dearer then if for ready money.

The Honble Companies Sloopes as they arrive from Hugly with you dispatch againe thither with all Convenient Speed and with a Suitable Ladeing of Treasure and Goods we Call not elec to mind at present remaine

Wee are very Sensible of Boremulls good inclinations to our Nation as haveing Some of us knowne him many yeares but in Considering the great distance of Cateck the wildness of ye Country in ye way thither as alsoe unsetledness in ye Service now Committed to him ye Prince being at Bolchund and all people hereabouts Say ordered to Bengall and expected after the raines at Rajamaul on all which we know not well how to order the mintage of anything there though doe not absolutely forbid it but rather order you to be very Cautious how to proceed in it and we had rather you Sold it to Some able Shroffe, though you let him Coyne Cateck in our Name.

The Neshawn of Sultan Shujahs we note you have received, and alsoe onely Bengall and Orixa may be Named yet it was alwaies estemed to Comprehend his whole Government (of which yo Subaship of Biurra was a part) and did Soe pass in those daies, if you think any inconveniences may arrive thereby you may forbear Shewing it but haveing obtained the Cleareing these boates you will doe well as occation offers to proceed in procureing this Princes Neshawne for our trade under his Government which may be of great use to us. Tis here wholly reported that he will after yo Raines Come downe into Bengall of which if any Certainety let us be advised.

Wee greatly differ from you in your Opinion about Custome for though the Honbie: Company be at a great Charge in presents &ca in Carrying on their trade in these parts yet if rightly Examined it will be found far Shorter of what ye Custome inwards and outwards if paid amount to, and besides then we Should pay Custome yet we should not be able to Cleare our Selves from ye same Charges in presents &ca that hitherto we have been at, instance may be of our Neighbours whose trouble and presents are as great at all times as ours, which makes ye priviledge we hitherto have had (and hope may yet be Continued to us) to be of ye high Esteeme with us.

You will Shortly be Supplyed with a Beame and other Necessaries for your factory your bookes must be made up to ye 30th: of Aprill observing those directions given by Mr Master &ca Councell, Coppy of ye Honourable Companies letter to Bengall hath been Sent you the other when we are at more leisure to have them transcribed you Shall receive.

The Honble: Company never received your Bookes letter Q: beginning Septemb, 1673 and Septemb 1674 therefore let them be transcribed and Sent us that they may be transcribed home this yeare, your this years bookes let them be Sent assoon as they can, that Soe our Complaint may not Stay for them, we Shall expect your D[i]ary in tribble Coppies to ye end of November as alsoe your Accot: of Cash at that time &ca, Europe Goods by you then you will See by the Honble

Campanies Generall that they doe enorder a greater quantity of Peter then formerly therefore doe recommend and enorder you to provide what more you can to be at Hugly at ye end of December or Sooner.

recommend to your prudentiall Manage, we have Sent for ye bookes of Accots: Registers &ca from Ballasore assoon as they arrive and we Can put them into a due Method Shall Send you the invoice you mention in the interim leave in a blanck and Ballance your Accots to ye end of Aprill last and them 28 \$\P\$ ye first.

Wee are Sorry you Shall be able to Supply us with noe more then 4000 ps of Cloth of all Sorts our Masters requireing peices 13000 of Cassaes and Mullmulls pray advise us what quantities of those you hope to Send will be Cossaes and what Mullmulls, for your Succeeding yeares Stock we Shall allot you your proportion of money and goods in due time.

The Phirwanna for Cleareing our Peter boates at Rajamaul will be very expedent, though hitherto the Princes duan at Pattana will not Suffer any Dusticks to Send them thence till pay Custome being exasperated by y° Dutch Complaineing (as they did to the Nabob against Reynundelol) to y° Prince y' he Stopped their boates.

Our goods on Accot Custome we have received and hope yo Englishmen will follow, Mellick Zendy being afraid to Send them to Dacca they haveing openly declared by meanes used here that they will Complaine against him there that he tooke them out of yo English factory by force, and by force detained the [m].

The Cossas &ca from your parts we Shall Chest here below Since you Shall not be Soe well able to doe it there.

The Wax figures W F we have received.

Wee are glad that the Chest of Gold [is] Safe arrived, what difference in ye Invoice you must advise to Cassumbazar it being Charged hence thither and thence to Decca we looke on Ludhorrams talke and bestowes, and he being poore when to impossibility but wee Conceive Shall Suddenly have a new Crowry or buxbundur.

Wee understand that one Richard Wilson and James Warden are at Decca with you and that they have this yeare brought a Ship to Chatigaune where they have Contrary to our Masters priviledges paid Custome &c*, for which reason as alsoe theire haveing Come Complaints from the Coast that this Same Wilson hath run away w*h: y* Estate of Some of y* Honb*: Companies Servants on y* Coast who are indebted to y* Company and Cheifly (as they have Said before good Witnesses) occationed by the Said Wilsons running away with their money, we are further informed that the Said Wilson and Warden hath openly declared, that assoon as they can get to Sea they will Seize on any Moores vessell or Junck they Shall first meet withall to make themselves amends for what wrongs they pretend they have Received from y* Moores at Chitagaune the which if they Should doe and it Should be Complained off at Decca, you very well know what bad Consequence it may prove to our Masters affaires too much already embroyled in these parts, on all which premises we order you if you find it feasable to Send the Said Wilson or Warden (or which of them you can) well Secured downe unto us that we may returne him to y* Worp*! Agent and Councell at Madrass to answer for all his Misdemeanours and to make what Satisfaction he Can to his Creditors if y* Vessell Could be Sent into y* Roade too it would be very well Wee Call not elee to mind Soe Rest

Wee have Received yours of ye 20th: August to Mr Reade &ca alsoe yours of the 1st and 10th Currant the Latter yesterday to all Materiall in which Shall answer as they ly the boates of Lead &ca which were Stopped at Bangulpore we understand are Cleared, that Scarlet and Broadcloth Sent you up is as well Conditioned it Seemes as was then here in ye warehouse assoon as the Generall papers arrive from Ballasore which hath been much retarded (though ordered Severall times) to be Sent thence by the Death of Mr Marshall and Henry Carpenter and ye Sickness of Mr Bugden we Shall Send you as well as to other factories what Invoices they as well as you have not yet received.

As we Advised you from Cassumbazar wee are of Opinion that if our Masters are in Cash Sufficient in any of their factories that it is more adviseable and for their advantage that money be remitted where wanted then tha [t] it should be taken up at Interest, But if Pattana and ye other factories both want money we Judge it reasonable ye money if to be had Should rather be taken up at Interest in ye place where it must be invested then in any other factory to be Sent thither the Charge being the Same to our Masters whither they pay interest in Pattana or any other place when ye interest is at the Same Rate as in the Present Case it is.

You have found that the Hon^{blo}: Comp^{as}: Generall to Bengall went as we advised you in ours of yo 15th: August which we recommend againe as then unto your observance for your Stock we Shall take Care that you be timely Supplyed with it to yo amount you mention.

Wee are of Opinion with you that it will then be ye fittest time to Stir about getting the Kings Phirmaund when heare what Shausteh Cauns Auzdars has or can doe for us in the meane time it will ly on you to be putting things in a posture in referrence to Sending and goeing aloft about it through ye manner of it as you may Peceive is referred to your Experience and prudence wee are Sorry to heare of Soe bad a Character of the Prince we hope if he Stayes that when his Government Comes to be Setled that he will prove a better Governour then now he gives hopes off, ShaShuja was bad enough when he Came first to Bengall but grew better as his Coffers filled, paper assoone as Comes up Shall Send your proportion off, haveing writ for it up.

Wee are very much troubled to find by yours of ye 10th: September that the Pattana Duan hath given you a positive answer as well as to yo Dutch that without paying of Custome our Masters Peter boates Should not Stir from Pattana we Cannot. find that we have any power without order from ye Worp' Agent &ca to give you any possitive order in it Conceiving as you writely observe for yourselfe that if we Should Say pay not Custome that we Should be extreamly blamed in Case yo peter Cannot Come downe without it which will be an exceeding loss to our Masters all that we Can Say Since you have not written your owne Opinion in this Case is yt we Judge it may not be Safe to pay Custome without possitive orders from our Superiors. Soe to doe, but we Conceive that if the full amount of the Custome or more were p[ri]vately offered to the Duan there that he would not refuse it but be very glad to Cleare our boates to get Soe much money Cleared to himselfe or in Case it Should be Soe that he will not take a bribe (which is rare) yet the Prince himselfe we think would not much Stand upon it whither he recd from us yo amot of the Custome in another Name we recommend this affaire wholly unto you being very ready to Consent to what you Shall find most reasonable to doe therein, we would have written to Madrass about this affaire but ere an answer Could arrive the Peter must Come too late thence for ye business of this Moonsoone Soe that you See how much it imports you to worke through it and we hope a Round bribe may doe what we desire with ye Duan at last.

The bookes 167\(^3\) hope Suddenly to arrive from you as alsoe your this yeares bookes of Acco¹⁸ &c⁸ as formerly desired, M^r Masters Pattern Shall Send assoone as have leisure from business and Sickness at Ballasore where it hath pleased God to take away M^r Marshall M^r Carpenter and Abraham Rutton as aforesaid and y^e rest according to y^e last advices thence Sick which we feare will alsoe prove a great hindrance to our Masters business in that factory.

Wee Shall not dispute whither Treasure fetch better at Cassumbazar or Pattana but can Say this what ye Merchants buy at ye former place they Generally Send away to ye latter which we Imagine they would not doe to their Loss, Calling not elce to mind at present Wee Remaine

ffor y° 7047 & 1090 Rup* you mention paid by Mr Bugden to Mr Marshall Since January last we Suppose he did it not without order and if it was for our Masters Acco* we Suppose he kept y° Cash booke and we question not but if Mr Marshall received it for Same Acco*, but that he gave their Credit in his Cash booke likewise when we Shall have time to examine and reconcile all acco* we doubt not but to adjust this and all other differences of this Nature.

Our last to you was dated ye 19 last month wherein answered your Severalls of ye 24: 29 August and 7th Currant and had done it Sooner but of late your letters arrive not under 18 or 20 daies thence but hope now the freshes are abated, we Shall thence forward receive them in fewer daies, we have received yours of ye 20 & 28 last month the which were the first 17 and the latter 15 daies on ye way hither, we note what you write touching the Emperors Calling Nabob Shausteh Caun out of Bengall and with you must awaite ye [e] vent though as things Seeme now to Stand with us in these parts Suppose it would be better he Continued till we Could bring our Masters business to Some Certainty which now is far from us, we hope the King will give a favourable answer to ye Nabobs Auzdars in our behalfes any alteration be made.

Wee hope the Gold is now disposed off it being more vendible with you in Decca and beares a better price then in any place in Bengall which was the reason we Sent it thither, the time of ye yeare begins now to be late and therefore it imports you to be getting our Master Cloth ready assoone as possible, that if it may be we may have time to dispatch goods bence ere any order Comes from aloft we much feareing the worst and if a Sloope Should Come it would be See late that ere we Could possibly worke out a remedy the time for Sending goods for England would be elapsed.

Concerning Mosely and Norton we Can add noe more then what you will see the Accompt Generall which we intended according to its date but have kept to this day by reason they tooke them out of yo boate againe and have kept them prisoners ever Since, we Suppose they will be Soe detained till Mellick Cassum arrives and then tis like Some accommodation may be made which we are the rather inclined unto in respect of yo present great uncertainety and unsettledness of things in Bengall.

If Mr Fytch Nedham as Mr Vincent wrote him in his Pticuler of ye 10 Currant Can Come to Hugly Soe as to be back against to take Charge of Decca factory by the time limited by the late Cheif and Councell for Mr Hervys stay there we give him

leave to repaire hither but it Cannot be late in November in that M^r Hervy is positively ordered to deliver up all to Said M^r Fytch Nedham and to be in November in Ballasore to answer a Charge prefenced sic to y^e Hon^{ble}: Company against him by M^r Smith &c^a

Your bookes of Accots and Charges Generall have received and Shall want two Coppies more of them and your Diary must be Continued (to goe whome) till the end of Novemb. What you have been forced to leave in Blanck in those bookes pray take Care to bring orderly into your next and assoon as leisure will permitt we Shall endeavour to fill up and rectify all Accompts, Wee Call not elee to mind at \$\Psi\$ sent Save that it Should please God an order Should Come from ye Emperor that we must pay Custome that in Such Case you keep Soe well with ye Mutsuddies that you may have Soe early notice of it that if possible you may Send us advice of it 4 or 5 daies ere the Nabobs \$\Psi\$ wanna Shall arrive hither about it we remaine

Our last to you was dated y° 24 August to wch: we have onely to add that the Confusion at Ballasore is or has been Soe great through the Sickness and Mortallity there that we Cannot to this day receive the most pertinent papers of our Masters affaires Soe that we Shall not be able to Send Invoices written for (both by you and other factories) till after the departure of this yeares Shipping when Shall goe in hand to put every thing in a due Method.

Yesterday in the afternoone we received yours of ye 3d Currant and are glad the Peter boates at last are Cleared and that you are like to Cleare the goods and Treasure Sent up the Conditions are hard but Such as we might expect in Such times of uncertainety as these are we hope you have taken ('are to write aloft about this business, that we may be understood and that noe Custome was ever paid by us in Puttana but what dutics we did pay has been alwaies in Hugly &ca, what you have thought Convenient, if you have not yet written we desire you now to doe it and that effectually, Shausteh Caun is Called away to Come up to Hindostand by the King which though we think by meanes of his money he will never doe yett at present it Startles him & unfitts him and his Duan who are taken off with matters of this great moment to attend to any proposition we Can make to him Soe that we feare it would be but labour lost to apply ourselves at present to him in this matter nor are we unapprehensive that we may Soe Soone put him in mind of the favour he did us the last yeare in writeing to the King in our behalfe, when our whole business was Stopped from which he hath only repreived us till ye answer Comes, and that he may now he is Called away Stop all our business againe out of a designe to gett what he can out of us though noe order Should Come from ye King, and it [is] very likely it may not in these times of great trouble in Hindostan Besides to apply our Selves for a remedy against the Prince to Shausteh Caun Seems not Soe likely to produce any good effect except ve Prince or his Duan Should on result on ye Kings answer write as Waurist Caune did to him by which time our application will be both necessary and more Seasonable for your applications, therefore in the Companies affaires behoves ye Frince and the Court aloft, we refer it to you to doe it Soe as may be most for the quiett Carriage of our Masters affaires [in] these parts without awaiting our Advices in every Exigency of this Nature, least thereby you Slip those Opertunityes which by that time you can possibly have an answer Since may prove irrecoverable. The Custome which the King enordered us to pay the last yeare was but 2 P Cent as it is at Surrat Soe that in Shauge the Duan Should demand 5 and at the lowest 3 P Ct; at Pattana but ve answer from ye King to his letter will we hope put a peaceable period to this affaire.

Wee have not yet got a receipt of this Governour for ye 3000 Rups piscash pthere this yeare nor had we any at all by reason of the Stop last yeare all the others are with you in former yeares in a few daies we hope to gett the writ for this yeares present aforesaid when Shall Send it you by a Couple of Cossids on purpose which will be time enough ere the date of your Mochelkiee will be out we Shall not Send any more boates up till heare further from you in it.

Your Journall and Leiger for last yeares and bookes of Charges Generall have received and expect the other two Coppies as you mention the Surrat bookes had we assistance you Should not be put to write Soe often for but our Number is Soe diminished that feare till after the Ships departure we Shall not be able to get them Coppied out to Send you Beames and Scales: pen inke and paper you Shall be furnished with assoone as Mr Vincent goes to Ballasore we hence haveing written for them but hitherto it Seemes they are omitted to be Sent us we Call not elec to mind at present Save that we Remaine

Our last to you was dated the [6]th: Currant yesterday Came to hand yours of the 12th: present the Sloope Arrivall Came before y° factory yesterday but we understand [not] why if there were noe more goods on board the London that you Could not Supply a full Ladeing for her out of the Cœsar but that She is Come up almost in her Ballast when wee wrote you to Send the treasure and goods that Came in y° London in y° Arrivall we really Supposed (as you might have Chested by Comparcing ours of the 18 and 25 of last month) that the Ship Cæzar which Came before the London Should have first been discharged of her Treasure and what Goods the Ganges Could Carry which Since you did Supply as it Seemes from y° Shoare and the London yet we think you ought not on a new [lacuna in the original] (which you were y° Occation off) for want of an Order to have Sent up the Arrivall Soe empty as you did, Leave Treasure and Severall Goods fitting for this place on board the Cæzar in y° Roade, now th[ou]gh this we hope may be noe great dammage to our Masters yett we Cannot but think our resentments of it to you to prevent the like in the future Since it probably may at an other time prove more disadvantagious then at present wee hope it has.

Wee are glad the Ships got noe more hurt in the late Storme though Cannot be too Confident that the moosoone [sic] is broken up but that yo next month we may have another Such as this was yo Companies papers you Sent we find very imperfect as well as the Bookes noe Registers of letters of late date Soe that for want of assistance Shall not be able to send Coppies of them home this yeare.

Tis strange that you Should wonder that we Send Ballasore bookes to Ballasore for we think it their propper place and Since you understand them Soe well as you mention we desire and order you to Ballance them which you Say is the onely thing that is wanting to \$\Phi\text{feet}\$ them to effect which you need noe Such great assistance though you have as much for your little business there as we have here, as for your acting as three \$\Phi\sin \text{sons}\$ there if it were Soe, it has been others Cases Sometimes as well as yours though never wanted of it and that in a factor where the business is more then in Ballasore it need to be, Soe that if those bookes be not finished wanting as you Say onely to be Ballanced we have hopes we Shall not be blamed.

If Mr Smith can prevaile with our Governour here to let loose John Norton which we notwithstanding many endeavours Cannot yet do[e] he Shall Come to Ballasore and for the future we would have all propositions which immediately Concernes not our Masters b[usiness] Sent us from the proposers themselves that Soe when we come to proceed on Examination we may ground Somewhat on y° desires of the Severall &Fsons under their own bands.

The Cash bookes Coppies we have received and refer all business of that Nature till our busy times are over, it will not be amiss to turne away all those Villianes that you find had Cognisa[nee] of the theft in Ballasore it being intollera[ble] they Certainely thought that all would dye elee they would never have dared we thinke to have ventured on Soe much at once.

What you wrote about y° Lack was grounded on Mr Master whilst at Cassumbazar, he Saying that he apprehended it not agreeing with y° Companies orders to Send them lack without Sticks when they order it with Sticks or the Sticklack for he absolutely Said he would not take it but turne it on the hands of those that bought it, if Mr Master after Sight allowed the Sending of it home we approve of it likewise it requires not much Experience to understand that lack on the Stick and the Same beaten off are the Same though not Soe in respect of Tonnage where we thought the ground of the order lay.

The Ground or reason of your Protest against Cap^t Erwin for the mistake of his mate we doe not Soe well now understand as possible may when Come to Ballasore for you never desired nor had order to take those Chests of Treasure on board yo London on Shoare but we are not able as before noted to Judge of this business here as Shall be hereafter.

The paper Inke and ffactors provisions we understand you Sent of on board of Cap¹ Goldsboroughs Ship Bengall Merchant the which the Master of the Arrivall Saw and demanded but was answered they would not deliver any wanting orders for their Soc doeing from you we Shall not be able to doe any thing without this paper wherefor order you to Send it on Mr Reades Sloope which is ordered to Come from Ballasore after the full moone.

On Receipt of this we order that George Perrin fitt himselfe to goe of into the Roade there to remaine on board one of y° English Ships which you Shall find most Convenient and take Some Sheets of paper together makeing Six Small paper bookes upon 3 of which he is to inscribe Hugly goods and underneath the name, of one of each of the three Ships the other must be entitled Ballasore Goods and underneath the like Manner the Names of y° Ships, what Goods we Shall Send downe hence he is punctually to follow our Orders (which Shall Come with each vessell) as to the ladeing them on board any or all of the Ships for y° which when #formed according to Said Orders he must draw out a receipt in the bookes inscribed Hugly Goods and haveing Conveyed with the Boatswaines make them Signe in those bookes which he is to keep by him and advise hither that he has received and delivered, and take the Severall Boatswaines receipts for the Said Goods what Goods you Send of from Ballasore he is exactly to follow your orders in the Same manner in Ladeing aboard the

Sev¹¹: Ships and to take receipts for the Pticulers in the Bookes intitled Ballasore Goods adviseing you accordingly as how as before directed, Wee Call not elec to mind at Psent but earnestly recommend our Masters Investment in that place to your Care and Dilligence and Soe rest

Our last to you was dated the 16 Currant in answer to all yours to that date received, Since we have received yours of y° 11th present and understand as you advise that the Phirwanna you got out to their Stops at Ragamaul our friends at Cassumbazar had received and Sent thither we wish we Could be Cleare of Gaubarre

at Cassumb as we understand the Dutch are we Should be glad to have a #Pwanna for our paying noe Custome at yo Mint for at present yo Country is at that Suspence that we Can neither Mint nor Sell our Masters Treasure [Lacuna in the original] in the Case of yo mint you may Safely give [lacuna in the original]

Wee are Sorry your Cloth at Decca is likely to Come Short of, what you advised but hope you may yet get the weavers better to Comply which Musters agreed on as that we Shall yet have at least the quantity you formerly wrote us Concerning.

As for Wilson you must doe what you Conveniently Can wthout Embroyling our Masters affaires thereby for it will be better to let him take his Course rather then by medling with him to hazard the emplunging their business deeper, your Diary for mo Septemb have received Mellick Cassum hath been long expected here but yet not Come in the meane time his Sonn hinders us what he Can, nor has he yet delivered Norton and Mosely to us though we think he dares not Send them to Decca least they both Should Complaine against him we understand he is now formeing an Auzdars against us that we trade very high that we have 10 or 12 Ships or Sloopes Come this yeare to Hugly (more then ever was) that we thereon bring up Merchants goods Cheating the King of his Subjects Customes not being Content to be Custome free onely our Selves, that we pay but Rup's 3000 P annum that if we had paid Custome it would have amounted to more then 20,000 Rup's ere now, you must therefore to meet and answer these accusations preferred against us keep an Exact Correspondence in the Raies Durbar though at a Small Charge (wherein desire you to be as frugall as possible the case will beare) that you may have notice of it where you may offer this or Such like in defence, that our trade is not Soe high as formerly we haveing had for Some yeares last past from 4 to 6 Ships and Sometimes more Sent from Europe hither and this yeare in all but three that tis time we had Severall Vessells of 1000 and 1100 to 2000 Maunds each Come to Hugly but that all of them (except 2 or 3 as usuall) Came in their ballast onely to Carry our Saltpeter the Goods from Hugly to Ballasore there being great danger in respect of the great Seas below which make us afraid to venture our goods on open boates of their Country, that we Carry Merchants goods, Steale Custome &ca you may Say an accusation Mellick Zendy would have fixed on us but never yet Could make any Such thing appeare nor that ever we doe any Such thing it being against the principalls and honour of our Nation.

ffor the last that our 2000 Rup* piscash Comes not nigh wha[t] y Custome will amount unto, you may answer that by the Kings and Nabobs favour we trade hither but that it if be but well Considered how Small our trade hath alwaies been and that we have alwaies (when forceable yeares together by reason of our Warrs with the Dutch we have had noe Traffique at all) paid the Said Summe yearly in Hugly beside presents to y Nabob &c it Cannot we hope be thought we Trade in these parts without paying what an acknowledgement Shall by himselfe on full Consideration of the whole manner be found reasonable to Con[elu]de you must urge that our accuser is our great Enimy that he hath broken open our ffactory gates and by force after a most unpresidented way tooke two Englishmen who were the Hon^{ble}: Companies prisoners there and has all along Continually abused us, and that though this and

last yeare we have been forced [b]efore the time to pay in here ye 3000 yearly piscash yet we Cannot to this day get a paper as usuall for it, this and the like you may argue but we recommend it to your Caution how you use these offencive arguments, but as that you Consider Mellick Cassum how like to fall in his Government here & at Ballasor whither for Continuance or not &ea as you Shall find there but what we have limited in defence pray Manage with your best Skill that Soe if possible we may get our Masters goods off these here how far at least this Shipping ere any Sloopes Comes, this Govern here being a head Strong fellow noe waies to be won and endeavoring it what we Can we remaine

Wee note that y° Dutch troubles are greater then ours & what they have paid for onely getting their Ophium from Pattana, we hope ere this arrives that y° King will have ordered the remaineing part of y° 1200 Rup' you paid y° Princes Duan, to gett y° Saltpeter thence to be repaid you, Wee had followed your Advise in applying our Selves to Shausteh Caun about our troubles in Pattana but he being turned out and wholly taken up about his own affaires we Could never meet a good Oportunity for that or any other business we had depending at Decca, the Duan at Decca telling us at last before the Nabobs Duans face, that till we gett the Kings Phirmaund that we must pay y° Custome of 5 \$\Phi\$ Cent at the Mint though y° new Nabob Comeing So Suddenly downe, there is nothing done about that or our other maine question whither we must pay Custome in Bengall or not, onely Reynundelol y° Nabobs Duan advises us that to y° time the old Nabob Set out off Decca w°: was in y° beginning of last month there was noe answer Come from y° Emperor about us.

Wee are very glad you have gott y° Duans Dustick to trade there that you may be giveing out on Peter we Conceive it may be good Since Azzum Caun the New Nabob is Come into his Government being doubtless now in Decca that we first see what may be done with him on presenting him when if can gett his Phirwanna as of former Nabobs for our free trade we Shall if it be thought fitt be able y° more Calmely to endeavour to gett all Confirmed by y° Nabobs Phirmaund but if he Stopps all till that be gotten then Shall we haveing nothing to doe till that be procured, God ordrs all for the best.

Our last to you was dated you 16 ultimo Since which we have reed: yours of you 24th: ffeb wherein note what time Shasteh Caun Arrived into Pattana and departed thence towards Dilly & wish a Vaqueel had been ready to have proceeded with his luskur in reference to our present designe of Procureing the Emperors #maund about which we admire you Should thinke we are noe more in earnest but that if we find rubbs in its procury we would give off the Honble Company and Agent and Councells orders are possitive in it and in reference to them ours have been see to you and Coppies of their letters in Said Concerne have been duely transmitted you whereupon we hoped noe doubt as you Seeme to entertaine Could have insued, but Since you doe Scruple we hereby assure you that our resolutions are firme to endeavour to our utmost to procure a Phirmaund and we order you vigorously to proceed in it accordingly, all ye favour we Can hope from this is to let us enjoy our priviledges as formerly till he write to ye Emperor and have his answer about us, wth: what it may prove except we endeavour to make it Sure our Selves we are much doubtfull in, wherefore account it yo Securest way to begin (now there are Sufficient orders) at yo root and lay Such a foundation as God willing may not Suddenly be Shaken or discomposed, we are getting things ready for Presents as you desire and if they be not Stopped at Rajamaul we Shall get them we hope (notwithstanding all our trade is at Wesent embarqued in this Port) free out of this place however we would not have you delay Sending the Vaqueel to Court that he may be there to Strike while ve Iron is hott, Shausteh Caun being likely to be in most favour at his first Comeing and thereby best able to bring our business to pass he is an old man alsoe and may dye &ca, our Ships alsoe may be expected in July and it is absolutely Necessary that this business be Cleared if possible by that time one way or other, this thing being of Soe great weight (as in yours you well observe) we are yours earnest in it that noe time be lost, what things we Send for Presents may be transmitted up after the Vaqueel to Dilly. We have noe Certaine notice what the Dutch have done at Dilly but there is a report here that they have gott a hushbull hookum from yo King to call M: Cassum (who now is in great disgrace at Decca) to accot: for makeing them Soc unjustly pay So great a Summe of money on yo Death of their Brokers wife & their Vaqueel is gone to Decca as tis Said by Some about that, but we are rather inclined to beleive that tis onely about 36000 Rup, which was their Brokers debt to ye Said Governour for rents of townes by him held weh: Directore Ranst paid on Mellick Cassums keeping ye Dutch Second Prisoner at his house which now is alleaged to be a force used on them Contrary to their priviledges.

Wee are of Opinion that Shasteh Caun may have ye na me and Honour of the Visier at least at his first Comeing to Court though another for Soe long a time as ye King Sees good may be Subsitude to undergoe the trouble as you mention we wish by his or any other good meanes we had a Phirmaund wen notwithstanding the present unsetledness of this Court would fix our Masters affaires and Should this King dye never So Soone after it twould be noe great Expence on Sight of his Phirmaund to get one of ye Same tenour of his Successor.

Sha Shujahs Neshawn and y° receipt of Rup' 3000 paid in Hugly we have received and are now Sending the former to Decca whence as soone as they have done with it, & we Can have it Shall returne it you again if you Shall find a want of it which pray advise us, though we are of Opinion that one better worded might be drawn out #ticulerly where there is mentioned according to y° Kings Phirmaund it might be altered and made according to y° Englishes use and Custome in these parts this wee recommend to you ordering if it may be done that you would get it effected.

The newes of Bahadur Caun and Buctaur Caun is Strange this King if lives much longer will See the graves of all his old Umbraws and of his Sonns too if they have not a Care, by Sultaun Mozzums feare to appeare before his father in Dilly may be Seen that ye old man keeps Still ye reines in his own hands.

Wee are glad you have got back your Mochelkee againe and hope in due time you will also receive back yo deposited money and when this is backed with yo Kings Phirmaund (which God Graunt our Masters business will be better Setled in this Country then ever your Care and endeavours about which we doe not question.)

Clause of entries at y° Ports the Vaqueel at Dilly has full advices what we are & have been in doeing in Bengall there haveing been nothing Come to knowledge necessary for him to be acquainted with but we have immediately to Mr Charnock by him to be handed forward.

As touching a \psi wanna for Dacca or any other place in Bengall or Orixa apart for y° Gen": #Wanna for w°h: you Seeme Soe much to plead we have well Considered what you have alleaged therein & upon mature deliberation are of y° Same mind as before & doe hope that we well understand ye nature of ye thing fearing its bad Consequence on our Masters affaires we were never questioned at Dacca till yt unhappy Pmaund for ye Danes when in Dacca Ballasore & hughly ye Nabob Shasteh Caun according to ye Kings Comaund ordered Custome to be taken of us wen madeit necessary when he was againe Pswaded to favour us yt his Pwannaes for our free trade Should be issued out to all those places whither his prohibition had been formerly Sent but all this argues not y' when it Shall please God we have got ye Kings Pmaund and on it this Princes Neshaun for our Masters trade in Bengall & Orixa yt we must Still have #ticuler orders for any or all parts within said Kingdomes & we may further note to you yt any Such order will hold good but while ye Sent Governour Superintends for upon Change or removeall you must have another from ye next Comer weh: may be inconvenient & as Chargeable as ye sevil: wangees or verball orders you mention where Governours remove often as in Hugly & Ballasore & if ye Prince Should dwell (as we are Certainly informed he will) in Rajamaul ye future Dacca Governour will be as subject to Change as those of any other Government in ye whole province.

Wee are Sorry you have mett wth: Soe many disappointm^{ts}: in getting downe y^e last #cell of 3000^{Mds}: peter by y^e Seizure of y^e boates &c^a Soe y^t to y^e day of y^e date of yours you had not gott boates (though money was given out for them) to bring it downe alsoe y^t you feared Should be Stopped by your Nabob, we hope they are long ere now on their way though we have not heard of them & y^t your Nabob when he Comes to be a little better acquainted wth: y^e nature of y^e Governm^t: of y^t place by w^{ch}: time alsoe his belly will be better filled he will be more favorable.
