The following extracts of the proceedings of a Native General Court Martial assembled at *Bangalore* on the 17th June 1811, by virtue of a warrant from Major General Pater Commanding the Army, and continued by several adjournments, till the 22d day of the same month, and of which Subadar Moodeen Saib of the 2d Native Regiment, is President, are published to the Army.

CRIME.

CRIME.—Subadar Shaik Mahomed of the 2d Company 2d Battalion 17th Regiment, ordered in arrest by me on the 19th of March 1811, on the following charge.

For conduct irregular, unmilitary and unbecoming the character of a Native Officer, in directing and inducing, when pay was issued to the 2d Battalion Company at Lieutenant M'Cormick's quarters in March 1811, the majority of the non-commissioned rank and file of that company, to pay money for purposes altogether unconnected with the public service, and which was paid under his (Subadar Shaik Mahomed's) influence and authority, without the knowledge and sanction either of the Commanding Officer of the Battalion, or of the Officer in charge of that company.

CHARGES.—Subadar Rymi Khan of the 3d Company of a detachment from the 2d Battalion 13th Regiment N. I. placed under arrest by my orders, on complaint of Jemadar Ramsamy of the said detachment and Battalion.

1st.—For making use of abusive and scurrilous language to the said Jemadar on the evening of the 12th instant, in the presence of a Guard of the 1st Battalion 13th Regiment N. I.

2d.—For evil and malicious conduct towards Jemadar Ramsamy in giving to him a poisonous draught on the evening of the 13th instant, and thereby endangering the life of the said Jemadar.

3d.—For excusing Arnachellum Sepoy of the 3d company, from all garrison duty for the space of five months, and employing him as a servant about his house.

4th.—For speaking to a Prisoner placed in the main guard by my orders, and telling him not to fear (or words to that effect) that all would be over in a day or two, thereby creating a spirit of obstinacy and incontinence.

SENTENCE.—The Court having maturely considered the evidence in support of the prosecution, as well as what the Prisoner Subadar Rymi Khan has urged in his defence, are of opinion, that he is guilty of the 1st charge preferred against him.

The Court are further of opinion, that the Prisoner is not guilty of the second charge and do therefore acquit him of the same.

The Court are of opinion the Prisoner is guilty of the third charge, but acquit him of the 4th charge preferred against him.

The Court having found the Prisoner guilty of the first and third charges preferred against him, which are a breach of the articles of war, and contrary to good discipline, do sentence him, Subadar Rymi Khan, to be suspended from rank and pay for the space of three calendar months.

1st.—For conduct highly subversive of military discipline, in allowing, on, or about the 25th of May 1811, two Sepoys (Sied Bauer No. 34 in the Grenadier Company, and Sied Homed No. 49 in the Light Company, the former being asleep and the latter for absents himself when placed as Sentries over the Colours of the 1st Battalion 13th Regiment N. 1.) to escape the punishment awarded by the articles of war for such gross neglect of duty.

2d.—For contempt of the standing orders of the 1st Battalion 13th Regiment N. 1, as specified in the 3d paragraph of the 2d Section.

3d.—For conduct highly unmilitary in allowing the Colours of the 1st Battalion 13th Regiment to be so far deserted, as not to have a Sentry over them, and further shewing a disgraceful example to the men placed under his charge, whilst Native Officer of the day, in pardoning Sied Bauer Sepoy No. 34 in the Grenadier Company 1st Battalion 13th Regiment, and Sied Homed Sepoy No. 49 in the Light Company 1st Battalion 13th Regiment, knowing it was his duty to report the same to the European Officer of the day. Para. 1. We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 5th instant, constituting us a Committee for Examining Officers, Gentlemen Cadets, and Assistant Surgeons who may become candidates for the reward held out by Government, to promote the study of the Hindoostanee language; and to acquaint you that we have in conformity to the orders conveyed therein proceeded to examine Cornet Macnaghton, and beg leave to report the result, for the consideration of the Honorable the Governor in Council.

2. Mr. Macnaghton was required to translate from English into Hindoostanee, and from Hindoostanee into English without having recourse to a Dictionary, Grammar, or other book of reference whatever.

3. The specimens selected for translation into Hindoostanee consisted of a Tale from the College Exerciser at Fort William, and a number of English Sentences compiled, with a view to the prevailing idioms in respect to kindred and relationship, marriage, sale and purchase, and other common occurrences of life—a Hindoostanee Story from the Exerciser abovementioned, was given for translation into English.

4. The

4. The uncommon degree of proficiency evinced by Mr. Macnaghten, renders it unnecessary for us to enter into further detail of this examination than to state, that his translations of the specimens abovementioned, were executed with a facility, dispatch and correctness which could alone be the result of a most accurate, extensive and well grounded knowledge in Hindoostanee. He is critically versed in the idioms of the language, reads with fluency, and has a correct pronunciation.

5. On a review of these several circumstances; and considering the comparatively short period of Mr. Macnaghten's studies, we have the greatest satisfaction in reporting to the Governor in Council the very extraordinary extent of that Gentleman's acquirements in Hindoostanee, and can with confidence recommend him, as fully deserving the reward, which Government have been pleased to announce it to be their intention to bestow on the successful exertions of the Junior Officers of the Army, in acquiring a knowledge of the Hindoostanee language.

In conformity to the directions contained in your letter of the 1st instant, we have completed the examination of Cornet Macnaghten in the Persian language, and beg leave to report for the information of the Honorable the Governor in Council, that we consider his attainments in this language, of nearly equal extent to the degree of proficiency manifested by him in the Hindoostanee at the examination he underwent before us some few days since.

The specimens selected for translation into Persian consisted of a number of sentences on various subjects; those for translation

lation into English, were an extract from the Jushai Ab-ool Fuziel and a short original letter in Persian, which latter was required Cornet Macnaghton to read and translate on the spot.—The translations were executed with considerable accuracy, and a large choice of Persian terms made use of by that Gentleman in his translations from English, shewed, that he possessed a knowledge in that language beyond the bounds of ordinary acquirement: The letter he read off and translated at sight with facility.

In concluding this succinct report of Cornet Macnaghton's progress, it may be permitted us to express our regret, that the regulations of the service will not in this instance allow of our recommending a reward being bestowed on that Officer for his proficiency in the Persian language, similar to that, which his acquirements in Hindoostan have already obtained for him.

SENTENCE.—The Court having well and maturely deliberated upon the whole of the evidence produced before them, both in support of the prosecution and of the defence, are of the following opinion.

Upon the 1st charge, for falsely accusing Jemadar Mootoo Sawmy of having beaten, abused, and ill-treated his nephew Maree Mootoo son of the late Chokerlingum Havildar, deceased, the Court find the Prisoner, Subadar Chungleroyah, guilty.

Upon the 2d charge, in having falsely and maliciously charged and accused Mootoo Sawmy Jemadar, of having obtained his commission by a bribe, the Court are of opinion, that the prisoner is guilty of having made use of expressions to that effect during the heat of the quarrel in which they were engaged, that such accusation was false, but made without any malicious intention.—The Court are of opinion, that the prisoner is guilty of the latter part of the second charge, for grossly and shamefully abusing Mootoo Sawmy Jemadar, on the night of the 7th instant without provocation, having been pre-informed by Jemadar J'apah that Jemadar Mootoo Sawmy had neither ill-treated, nor abused his nephew.

Upon the 3d and last charge, for infamously, falsely, and maliciously accusing Subadars Ramdoo and Shaik Ally, and Jemadars J'apah and Mootoo Sawmy, of having been in a most disgraceful and shameful state of intoxication on the evening of the 7th instant, the Court are of opinion, that the Prisoner is not guilty of that part of the charge

charge which applies to his having accused Subedars Ramdoo and Shaika Ally and Jemadar J'apah, but find him guilty of having accused Jemadar Mootoo Sawmy, which accusation the Court consider to have been infamous, false and malicious.

The Court find the Prisoner in the instances abovementioned guilty, of irregular, disorderly and un-officer-like conduct, and do therefore sentence him, Subadar Chugleroyah, to be suspended from rank and pay for six calendar months from the date of the confirmation of this sentence, by the Officer Commanding the Army in Chief.

Tho' the Officer Commanding the Army, hath confirmed the sentences appertaining to the Subadar Chungleroyah and Jemadar Mootoo Sawmy of the 1st Battalion 14th Regiment Native Infantry, he, nevertheless feels impressed with a conviction, that the censurable example they both disreputably exhibited, by the most disgraceful and un-officer-like conduct to each other, merits a much more severe punishment than what the above sentences have awarded,—and under that conviction, he thinks it his duty, in support of that good order he is determined to maintain, to warn the Subadar Chungleroyah and Jemadar Mootoo Sawmy against the like shameful conduct in future, on pain of meeting with a result, more applicable to the like offence.

2dly.—For presuming to discuss the propriety of my orders, and for making use of gross and abusive language to Subadar Rangapah, the acting Native Adjutant, while in execution of his duty, explaining to the prisoner the nature and purport of my orders, agreeably to my desire.

3dly.—For having gone to the houses of Takoo Sing Drill Havildar, and of Rangapah Subadar, between the hours of eleven and twelve o'clock, on the night of the

16th instant in a riotous, disorderly manner, and for falsely asserting he had been sent for by Subadar Rangapah.

4thly. — For disrespect to a Court of Enquiry, consisting of European Officers, and of which Captain Moore was President, assembled by my orders, to investigate into the grounds of a complaint made by Subadar Rangapah, of the prisoner's improper conduct.

And lastly, for falsely accusing (before the Court of Enquiry) Subadar Rangapah of suborning false evidence, and of retaining a Sepoy (viz. Rungiah of the light company) about his house, for the purpose of employing him as a menial servant.

SIR,

Having had the honor to lay before the King the proceedings of a General Court Martial held at *Trichinopoly, East Indies*, on the 9th March 1810 and subsequent days, for the trial of Mr. Assistant Surgeon Griffin of the 30th Regiment of foot, who was arraigned upon the undermentioned charge, preferred on complaint of R. H. Lathom, Esquire. His Majesty's Justice of the Peace of the Zillah of *Trichinopoly*,
 "For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in the following instances, viz.

"1st.—For having on the night of the 19th February 1810, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock, armed with a sword and bamboo, or stick, entered the private bed room of the house of the said R. H. Lathom, Esquire, while in bed, and for refusing to quit it when desired by him to do so."

"2d.—For having made use of opprobrious and insulting language to the said R. H. Lathom, Esquire, and otherwise menacing him with an assault."

Upou

Upon which charges the Court came to the following decision.

"The Court having maturely considered all the evidence in support of the prosecution, as well as what the Prisoner has urged in his defence, is of opinion that the Prisoner, Mr. Assistant Surgeon Griffin, is guilty of both the charges exhibited against him.

"The Court having found the Prisoner *guilty* of both the charges; it doth sentence and adjudge the said Mr. Assistant Surgeon Griffin to be cashiered."—While the Court passes the above sentence, it feels itself called upon from the character given of the Prisoner, from his having tendered an apology, and from his length of service, to recommend him in the strongest manner to mercy."

I am to acquaint you, that His Majesty approved and confirmed the finding and sentence of the Court; but in consideration of all the circumstances of the case, as they appear on the face of the proceedings and particularly of the strong recommendation of the Court in favor of the Prisoner, His Majesty was pleased to extend his most gracious pardon to Assistant Surgeon Griffin, and to command that he should be restored to the functions of his Commission, after having been most severely reprimanded by the General Officer under whose command the 30th Regiment is placed, and admonished of the consequences which may follow a repetition of such intemperate conduct.

For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman, in having stated in a conversation which he held with certain Officers of the Madras Establishment, on, or about the 2d of October 1810, when serving at the island of *Banda*, that as he had not said or done any thing which could justify the arrest under which he had been placed by Captain Foote of His Majesty's Ship *Piedmontaise*, it was his fixed determination to stand his trial, and for having afterwards made an acknowledgment of improper conduct to Captain Foote, in consequence of which, he was released from arrest.

2d.—For conduct subversive of good order, prejudicial to military discipline and highly injurious to the public service, in having made an apology to Captain Foote, by which he consented, that he was not to do any duty under the command of the said Captain Foote, then Commanding at *Banda*, thereby abdicating the military character and stipulating that he should not exercise the functions, with which he was invested by his commission.

GENERAL ORDERS, 15th May 1810.

The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to authorize the Collectors of Revenue, and the Paymasters and Deputy Paymasters of this Presidency to whom the application may be made, to pay monthly, during the term of their leave of absence, to Native Commissioned and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates, belonging to either of the Presidencies of *Fort St. George* or *Bombay*, such portion of their pay as shall be specified to be admissible, to them, during their furlough, upon a certificate according to the annexed form, with which they will be furnished for that purpose.

The Collector or Paymaster to whom the application for payment may be made, will note upon the certificate, the payment for what month and when disbursed, transmitting a copy of the pay certificate above described with the receipt of the party for the payment made to the office of the Military Auditor General for audit, and in order that the sums so disbursed may be duly charged to the Presidency, to which the party belongs.

Should the bearer of a certificate of the nature abovementioned after having arrived at *Fort William*, be desirous of proceeding for the remainder of his furlough to an inland station, payment of such arrears as are due may be made by the Paymaster at the Presidency, who will note upon the pay certificate the payments he may have issued for the guidance of the Collector or Paymaster, in the future issues to be made upon such certificate.

When the party shall cease to draw pay in *Bengal*, his original certificate shall be returned to him, care being taken, that the several payments are distinctly specified thereon, as well

well as the dates on which they have been made, under the official signature of the Collector or Paymaster.

In conformity with the orders of the Honorable the Court of Directors, contained in the 90th, 91st, and 92d paragraphs of their general letter to *Bengal*, dated the 31st May 1809, for equalizing the allowances of the Field Officers and Captains of His Majesty's Regiments of Dragoons and Infantry, with the allowances of Officers of corresponding ranks in the Honorable Company's service, and which have been found to exceed the latter, in consequence of the non-effective and contingent allowances drawn by Field Officers and Captains in His Majesty's service, as appears by the annexed comparative statements, Nos. 1 and 2; the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to pass the following regulations to take effect at this Presidency from the 25th June last.

1st.—The non-effective and contingent allowances hitherto drawn for Field Officers and Captains half yearly, shall from the 25th June last be drawn by the Regimental Paymaster in his monthly distribution of subsistence, according to the correct proportion for each month for the number of Officers entitled to such allowances, actually present in *India*.

2d.—That corresponding deductions shall be made by the Regimental Paymaster in his monthly regimental abstract for the Honorable Company's allowances, on account of the Officers for whom the non-effective and contingent allowances shall have been drawn in the subsistence abstracts.

2.—The following are the rates at which the non-effective and contingent allowances are to be drawn monthly for the different ranks, and as the excess in the pay and allowances between the King's and Company's Officers is owing entirely to the non-effective and contingent allowances drawn by the former, the deductions from the monthly abstracts for the Company's allowances are to be made at precisely the same rates, viz.

3.—The allowance established by His Majesty's Regulations for a riding house, being granted for purposes unconnected with personal emolument is continued, but to be drawn in the monthly subsistence abstract, in the same manner, as the contingent and non-effective allowances are directed to be drawn.

4.—In cases however, when by vacancy or the absence in Europe of the Captain of a company, a Subaltern or other Officer takes upon himself the command and payment of such company, the contingent allowance only, viz. £. 36 10 per annum, or Pagodas 7 25 30 per month is to be drawn, the difference, being the non-effective allowance of £. 20 per annum can only be received (according to His Majesty's Regulations) by the Captain of the company.

5.—The Officers in command of regiments of Dragoons and Foot having returns, reports, &c. to prepare for the Deputy Adjutant General, of the King's Troops, as well as of the Company's Army, and being consequently exposed to a greater expense, the allowance at present granted for stationary for the Commanding Officer, Paymaster and Staff of each Regiment, viz. £. 30 per annum, to be continued.

6.—The Governor in Council has also been pleased to resolve, that a Pay Serjeant at one Pagoda per month, and 30 Fanams per month for stationary, shall be drawn for each troop or company in His Majesty's service, as allowed for companies of European Infantry in the Honorable Company's service, and that the regulations of 1789, whereby it is ordered that "Every Soldier, whether of European Infantry, Cavalry, or Artillery, who may die on or before the 15th of the month shall be struck off the pay rolls at the end of the month, but if he dies after the 15th of the month, he shall

"shall be continued on the pay rolls for the next month only, to defray his funeral expenses," shall be extended to the Soldiers in His Majesty's service.

The following further extracts from the confirmed proceedings of a General Court Martial held in Fort St. George on the 1st of June 1811, by order of Major General Pater Commanding the Army, and continued by several adjournments until the 31st day of August 1811, and of which Major General Trapaud of the corps of Engineers, is President, are published to the Army.

Lieutenant Cocil of the Madras European Regiment, late in Command of the Fort and Garrison of Condapilly, ordered under arrest, upon the following charges.

1st.—For violent and oppressive conduct, in having, on or about 16th of August, confined under a guard at Condapilly, Naugarauze Curnum of Cottoor, to which place he sent him back on the following day under charge of two Sepoys, and for having forcibly caused the pits containing grain in the said village to be opened, a part of which grain he ordered the inhabitants to convey to Condapilly upon their own bullocks, at 9 o'clock on that evening.

2d.—For having maltreated Veerauze brother to Naugarauze Curnum of Cottoor, whose house he forcibly entered and took therefrom a carpet, without having received permission so to do, from the owner of it.

3d.—For having beat with a horse whip, and otherwise maltreated, Unoomolee Parental, a Kop in the village of Cottoor.

4th.—For

4th.—For having obtained supplies of different kinds from the Kops and Curnums of *Roynepaudoo* without paying for the same and for sending the Sepoys of the garrison under his command with dustucks to the several villages, for the purpose of procuring supplies, without payment.

5th.—For conduct subversive of good order and unbecoming an Officer, in having, on or about 30th of August last, ordered five Sepoys together with other persons to surround the house of Gollapooddy Narsiah, a resident at *Condapilly*, by which means the inhabitants of that house were prevented from going out, and others were not permitted to enter, and for having himself entered the house of the above named person, and directed several things the property of the said Gollapooddy Narsiah to be taken therefrom.

6th.—For conduct derogatory to the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in having sold to the zemindar of *Condapilly* a quantity of Lead, which was discovered in the Fort, and appropriating to his own benefit the money which was paid for that Lead, the property of the Honorable Company.

SENTENCE.—The Court are of opinion, on a full consideration of the evidence, which has been brought before them, that the Prisoner Lieutenant Cecil is guilty of the first charge preferred against him, that he is guilty of having maltreated Veeranza the brother of Naugarauze Curnum of *Coltoor*; but the Court acquit him fully of all and every other part of the 2d charge. The Court are of opinion, that he is guilty of having maltreated Unoomolee Parental as stated in the 3d charge, and that he is guilty of having obtained supplies of different kinds from the Kops and Curnums of *Roynepaudoo* without payment, but they acquit him of having sent the Sepoys with dustucks to the several villages; The Court think it necessary to remark in their sentence, that it has appeared by the evidence before them, that the prisoner Lieutenant Cecil only obtained the same supplies which it had been customary at *Condapilly* (however irregular the custom) for many years past, for the inhabitants to furnish the Officers in Command at that station, and that the custom is continued to the present day. On the 5th charge the Court are of opinion that the prisoner is guilty of having employed Sepoys improperly in surrounding the house of a Native Inhabitant at *Condapilly*, but they acquit him of all and every

every other part of that charge. With respect to the 6th and last charge, the Court are of opinion that the prisoner is guilty of having disposed of a quantity of Lead which was discovered in the Fort of Condapilly, and that he appropriated the money arising from the sale of it to his own benefit; the Court however are of opinion, that Lieutenant Cecil, in disposing of the Lead, acted under the erroneous impression, that it was his own property, and that the Honorable Company had no claim to it. The Court having found the Prisoner guilty in the several instances above stated, do sentence him, the said Lieutenant Cecil, to be suspended from rank and pay for the space of six calendar months, and further, that he shall refund, the sum of Rupees 298½ two hundred, and ninety eight and a half, the amount which it appears he received for the Lead. The suspension to take effect from the date of the publication of this sentence.

Regulations and Allowances, in cases where Officers lose an Eye or a Limb, or are killed in action.

1.—If a wound shall be received in action, by any Commissioned Officer which shall occasion the loss of an Eye, or a Limb, or the total loss of the use of a Limb, he shall receive a gratuity in money, of one year's full pay or subsistence (according to his regimental commission) on the production of a certificate from the Surgeon of the corps stating the loss of the Eye, or Limb,

2.—When

2.—When any Commissioned Officer shall lose an Eye or a Limb as aforesaid, the Commanding Officer of the corps in which he serves, shall deliver to him a certificate in addition to the Surgeon's certificate abovementioned, specifying the time when, and the place where, the said accident happened; a duplicate of which certificate shall likewise be transmitted with the next monthly return.

3.—When any Commissioned Officer shall be killed in action, his Widow and Orphan Children (if he leaves any) shall be allowed as follows.

To the Widow, a full year's pay or subsistence, according to her Husband's regimental commission.

To each Child, under age, and unmarried, one third of what is allowed to the Widow.

Posthumous Children to be included.

4.—All persons dying of their wound's within six months after the battle, shall be considered as having been killed in action.

5.—The Commanding Officer of the corps in which the deceased Officer served, shall, on demand, give a certificate of his being killed in action to his surviving Wife and Orphans respectively, specifying the time when, and the place where, the said accident happened; a duplicate of which certificate shall likewise be transmitted by the next monthly return.

Para. 307.—Lieutenant George H. Isaacke, of your establishment who has returned to *England* in consequence of having been cashiered by sentence of a Court Martial, has laid before us a memorial, praying to be restored to the service, to which he has annexed copy of a letter addressed to Major General Gowdie by the Court Martial which tried him, recommending him in the most earnest manner to the clemency of the Commander in Chief.

308.—We have not received any notification of such a letter from you in the duplicate copy received per Sarah Christiansa of the proceedings of the Court Martial which sat on Lieutenant Isaacke, and the original proceedings of the Court have not yet reached us.

309.—It appears however from the proceedings of the Court Martial, that the prosecutor Captain Vicq desired to withdraw the original charge against Lieutenant Isaacke, upon Lieutenant Isaacke's offering an apology for the conduct which had given offence, and that Lieutenant Isaacke, was mistakenly led to suppose, that the rigour of his arrest had been, in consequence removed.

310.—But the Court Martial which sat on Lieutenant Isaacke, very properly in compliance with the regulations of the articles of war, sentenced him to be cashiered for breaking his arrest.

311.—Under these circumstances, and adverting to Lieutenant Isaacke's youth and inexperience, we cannot doubt that the Commander in Chief will be disposed to view the recommendation of the Court Martial, in a favorable light.

312.—We are induced therefore to restore Lieutenant Isaacke to the service, from the date of his dismissal, provided that the Commander in Chief shall not see any strong objection to it.

Mr. Isaacke late Lieutenant in the 8th Regiment Native Infantry, who was by the sentence of a General Court Martial which was held at *Secunderabad*, sentenced to be cashiered, and which sentence was confirmed by Major General Gowdie, having reported to this office his return to *India*, and produced the enclosed certificate of the permission of the Honorable the Court of Directors to resume his "Rank on the establishment provided the Commander in Chief sees no strong objection." Extract of a General Letter from the Honorable Court of Directors in the Military Department, dated 2d November 1810.

Para. 3.—“We observe by a copy of General Orders sent a number in one of the last packets, that on the 18th August 1809, you appointed Messrs. Arthur King, John West, Thomas Bampton, and John Chadwick, of the Corps of Artillery, to be Lieutenant Fireworkers, in that corps, the date of their rank to be settled hereafter, and that you at the same time promoted Mr. Thomas Edwards, Acting Adjutant to the Extra Squadron of Horse Artillery, to the rank of Lieutenant Fireworker in the corps of Artillery, to take rank next below Lieutenant Fireworker Arthur King; we also observe, that by the General Orders of the 8th September

ber

ber 1809, Mr. Gleadow O'Connell was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Fireworker in the Corps of Artillery, to take rank next below Lieutenant Fireworker Derville.

4.—“ In our letter in this department dated 4th May 1810, (Para. 7 to 11) we informed you of our having established a Seminary at *Addiscombe*, under our own immediate superintendence, for the purpose of educating young men for the Engineer and Artillery branches of our service, and you must be aware, that the appointment to commissions in these branches of service, of other persons than those thus educated and qualified is inconsistent with our views in forming the expensive establishment, above alluded to.”

5.—“ Whatever therefore may have been the urgency of the motives which induced you to appoint Officers from the inferior ranks in the Artillery to commissions in that corps, we must as well in consistency with our own regulations, as in justice to the young men educated at our College at *Addiscombe*, direct all such appointments to be immediately cancelled and revoked.”

Extract of a General Letter from the Honorable Court of Directors in the Military Department, dated 23d January 1811.

313.—“ In our Military Letter of the 2d November 1810; we transmitted to you directions to cancel the appointments which you had made of Messrs. Arthur King, John West, Thomas Brunton, John Chadwick, Thomas Edwards, and Gleadow O'Connell to be Lieutenant Fireworkers in your Artillery.”

314.—“ We have no doubt of the urgency of the occasion which induced you to make these appointments, nor of the merits and qualifications of the persons appointed, and although, for the reasons stated in those paragraphs, we cannot permit the appointment to remain valid, we shall yet not be displeased to find, that you have been able to make some provision for the persons in question, other than that of granting them commissions in our service, in compensation of the disappointment which they must necessarily suffer by the revocation of their respective appointments.”

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that in obedience to the orders of the Honorable the Court of Directors, the appointments of Messrs. Arthur King, John West, Thomas Brunton, John Chadwick, Thomas Edwards and Gleadow O'Connell, to be Lieutenant Fireworkers, shall be cancelled from this date.

2.—“ We have permitted the following Military Officers to return to their rank on your establishment, viz.”

7.—“ We have resolved this season, 1810-11, to appoint forty-three Cadets for the Infantry, and seventeen for the Cavalry, on your establishment.”

8.—“ We shall also appoint thirteen Assistant Surgeons for your Presidency this season.”

11.—“ Being satisfied that Major Francis A. Daniell of your establishment, has been prevented by illness, from returning to India, within the period prescribed by the act of Parliament, we have permitted him to return to his rank at Fort St. George by the ships which are appointed to be in the Downs on the 1st March next; such permission having received the approbation and consent of the Right Honorable the Board of Commissioners for the affairs of India, agreeably to the act of the 33d of His present Majesty, Cap. 52. Sect. 70.”

12.—“ Having deemed it proper before we enter into a detailed review of the circumstances attending the case of each individual Officer whose suspension from the service was announced in your letter to the Secret Committee of the 13th May 1809, and of Lieutenant Colonel Martin, to come to some decision upon the case of Major Boles, we shall now proceed to state to you our opinion upon it.”

13.—After an attentive perusal of all the documents which you have transmitted to us, and paying due attention also to the further explanations which have been given by Major Boles, we are compelled to declare, that the impression conveyed to us by your original statements, of the reasons which induced you to suspend that Officer and the Adjutant General from our service, and which impression we described in general terms in our letter to you of the 15th September 1809 has not been removed, and accordingly we still think that those Officers ought not to have been suspended.—We must also state, that when in our letter to you

“ you of the 29th September 1809, we confirmed the sus-
 “ pension of Major Boles, we came to that resolution on the
 “ authority of Sir George Barlow's Minute of the 1st May
 “ 1809, and Major General Gowdie's circular letter of the
 “ which is referred to in that Minute,
 “ and considering the difficult and dangerous situation in
 “ which your Government was then placed, we thought it
 “ our duty to discountenance by a strong mark of our displea-
 “ sure, any conduct which appeared at that critical period to
 “ encourage discontent, and to weaken authority, reserving to
 “ ourselves of course, the ultimate decision respecting the
 “ future situation of Major Boles, till the receipt of further
 “ information.”

14.—“ It appears that you suspended Major Boles from the
 “ service, because having authenticated by his signature and
 “ circulated to the Army in his official capacity, an order
 “ from his Commanding Officer, Lieutenant General Mac-
 “ dowall, which you consider to be an *illegal* order, and to
 “ which therefore in your intimation Major Boles did not owe
 “ obedience, you viewed him in the light of an accomplice
 “ with Lieutenant General Macdowall in his attempt to insult
 “ the Government and resist its authority.”

15.—“ It is not necessary for us on the present occasion to
 “ discuss the propriety of Lieutenant General Macdowall's
 “ conduct, in taking measures to bring the Quarter Master
 “ General to trial before a Court Martial, and in issuing the
 “ order of the 29th January 1809.”

16.—“ Our opinion on those points has already been stated
 “ to you in our letter of the 15th September in that year,
 “ and we see no reason to depart from it; we consider the order
 “ to have been a flagrant abuse of his authority and violation of
 “ his duty, but we cannot discover in it any such inherent
 “ and obvious *illegality* as could justify the Adjutant, or De-
 “ puty Adjutant, General in refusing to obey the command
 “ they had received from Lieutenant General Macdowall that
 “ the said order should be circulated to the Army, we do not
 “ mean to dispute that cases may occur in which an inferior
 “ Officer would be justified in declining to obey an order of
 “ his superior; but those cases are very rare, and must be
 “ strong indeed which can warrant the former in taking upon
 “ himself the severe and perilous responsibility of judging the
 “ acts of his superior and debating with himself, whether he
 “ will yield obedience to the orders of that superior; and
 “ though we concur entirely in most of the principles incul-
 “ cated in the very able letter which the Governor General in

“ Council

“ Council addressed to you on the 27th May 1809, we cannot by any means coincide in all the sentiments expressed in that letter on the subject, which we are now discussing. It is equally impossible for us to concur in the opinion of the Judge Advocate General on the same subject, and we have not been convinced by the numerous legal authorities which he has cited in support of his doctrine, as applicable to the case now under consideration. We therefore continue of opinion, that Major Boles ought not to have been suspended from the service; although it might have been proper to remove from so confidential a situation, a person in whom, consistently with the opinions you entertained respecting his conduct, you could no longer place your confidence.”

17.—“ Having thus stated to you the reasons which induce us to think that you ought not to have suspended Major Boles from the service, we shall next advert to your proceedings in regard to him subsequently to his suspension; we allude particularly to Major General Gowdie's communication with him, and your refusal to permit his proceeding to *England* on the *Lushington*.”

18.—“ Thinking that Major Boles did not act culpably in being merely the ministerial instrument of circulating the General Order of the 28th January, in obedience to the commands which he received to that effect, we must confess that we are not surprized at his having declined to apologize for his conduct on that occasion, in any manner which might imply an admission that he was conscious of its criminality, and we consider his explanation on that part of the subject, to be satisfactory.”

19.—“ Major Boles has complained of your refusal to allow of his proceeding to *England* on the *Lushington*, you probably had some strong reason for that determination on your part; but you do not assign any special cause, except the nature of the service, on which that ship was to be employed: We are not aware however, that there could have been any objection to his being allowed to take his passage in the *Lushington*, and we think this refusal imposed upon him an unnecessary hardship.”

20.—“ It only remains for us now to advert to the conduct of Major Boles himself, subsequently to the period of his suspension.”

21.—“ It would have been very satisfactory to us, if, with the view which we have taken of this case, we could have expressed our sense of the propriety of his subsequent conduct.”

duct ; but, although the account which he has given of his behaviour previously to, his departure from *India* removed from our minds the impression that he had become, with his own consent, one of the rallying points for systematic resistance, we are compelled to notice with considerable disapprobation, other permanent circumstances in his case."

22.—" It is almost unnecessary for us to declare our entire concurrence in the sentiments contained in Sir George Barlow's Minute of the 1st May 1809, with reference to the address to Major Boles, and the criminality of any military combination with a view to controul and censure the acts of the Government, and to give a general indemnity to those persons whose conduct, in the opinion of that Government, may be deserving of punishment. It makes no difference, in our estimation, whether the conduct of the Government, has, or has not been such as we can entirely approve. They are responsible only to us for their actions, and we feel it to be our bounden duty to uphold their legitimate authority. If any one of our servants conceives himself aggrieved by an act of the Government in which he is personally interested, we are at all times ready to afford redress, when the circumstances of the case appear to us to require it; but the case must rest on its own merits, and any attempt to strengthen it by military combination, must be decidedly resisted."

23.—" It does not appear from any of your proceedings, that Major Boles took any part in promoting the address and subscription in his favour, and in a memorial which he addressed to us on the 19th November last, he positively denies any such interference; admitting the truth of this statement (and we see no reason to doubt it) he certainly is not responsible for the criminality of that proceeding in others, and if the whole of his conduct had been regulated by the same unqualified forbearance, he would have been entitled to the full benefit of it, when his case came finally to be decided. In the memorial however, there is no denial of his having accepted the subscription; on the contrary, we presume from the statement contained in it, that he has actually enjoyed the benefit of that most unmilitary proceeding."

24.—" We cannot suppose it possible, that our meaning can be so far understood, as that we condemn, or would be disposed to censure in the slightest degree, every pecuniary assistance which individual Officers may be inclined to afford to a Brother Officer in circumstances of embarrassment and
" misfortune ;

" misfortune; but when that assistance is offered and accepted on such principles and from such motives as were publicly promulgated in a paper so reprehensible as the address of Major Boles, the person consenting to receive it makes himself in a great degree a party to the act."

25 — "We have already referred to Major Boles' memorial of the 19th November last, and we have allowed him the full benefit of every thing contained in it; but there are several passages in that paper which it has been impossible for us to refuse without considerable dissatisfaction, and we regret, that in defending himself, and in pleading his own cause, Major Boles should have thought himself at liberty to advert in offensive terms to the conduct, not only of his superior Officer Major General Gowdie, but also of the Governor General. We cannot admit that there existed the least necessity for his adopting language of the description and his conduct in that particular has contributed to produce an unfavorable impression on our minds."

26. — "Having thus explained to you the view which we have taken of Major Boles' case, we have now to signify to you, that we have resolved that his suspension from that service imposed by our letter of the 29th September 1809, be removed, but that he is not to be permitted to return to India, till he shall have received our special permission so to do."

34 — "By this conveyance we take the opportunity of transmitting you the order of rank for such Cadets who appear to have been omitted in former lists under the circumstances before stated, viz.:"

General Orders by His Excellency the Vice President in Council.

FORT WILLIAM, 10th September 1811.

On the occasion of the approaching return from the late French Islands of the Volunteers of *Bengal*, *Fort St. George*, and *Bombay*, to the Presidencies to which they respectively belong; His Excellency the Vice President in Council considers it to be no less an act of justice, than of indispensable public duty to record the high sense he entertains of the services performed by the Native Soldiery who were employed in concert with His Majesty's and the Honorable Company's European Troops, in the reduction of the Islands of *Rodriguez*, *Bourbon* and *Mauritius*.

His Excellency in Council is pleased to signify his approbation, of the distinguished merits of the Volunteers from the three Presidencies, by conferring Honorary Medals on all the Native Commissioned and Non-Commissioned Officers, Troopers and Sepoys, Golundauze and Gun Lascars employed on that service from this Presidency; and by suggesting for the consideration of the Governments of *Fort St. George* and *Bombay*, that corresponding Medals shall be conferred on the Native Troops, from those establishments, as a public mark, and honorable testimony of their individual exertions and praise-worthy conduct.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief is requested to cause the subject of this Order, to be explained to the Volunteers on their return to *Bengal*.

I am at the same time to acquaint you that it is the duty of Officers who have the charge of detachments, either proceeding to, or returning from *India*, to take care that the great coats are used only when the weather renders them necessary, or when it is considered advisable that any men from sickness should wear them.

SENTENCE.—The Court having maturely considered the whole of the evidence in support of the prosecution, as well as that produced by the prisoner Jemadar Shaik Hussian 1st Battalion 12th Regiment N. I. in support of his defence, is of opinion, that he is not guilty of the 1st crime laid to his charge, viz. "For being in a shameful state of intoxication whilst on regimental duty, on the 10th instant," and do therefore fully acquit him of the same.

The Court doth further adjudge and find the said prisoner, Jemadar Shaik Hussian, guilty of the second charge above preferred against him, viz. "For grossly abusing Jemadar Shaik Emaum of the 1st Battalion 12th Regiment on the 10th instant," but is of opinion, that the prisoner had received most unwarrantable provocation, but who should (especially as Regimental Native Officer of the day) have reported such provocation to the Officer Commanding or Adjutant of the corps, instead of entering into a public controversy, disgraceful in the extreme, with the character of a Native Officer; it doth therefore sentence him, Jemadar Shaik Hussian to be reprimanded, in such manner as the Officer commanding the sentence, may be pleased to direct.

SENTENCE.—The Court having maturely weighed the nature of the charge exhibited against the prisoner, Jemadar Abram Beg, and the evidence in support of it, as also what the prisoner has brought forward in his defence, is of the following opinion, viz. That Jemadar Abram Beg is guilty of part of the first part of the charge, viz. " In having without due authority on, or about the 15th June 1811, when detached on duty from *St. Benoit* on the *Island of Bourbon* to *St. Denis*, for Treasure, for the use of the detachment Madras Volunteer Battalion, directed the writer of his company to take from the treasure, two months pay in cash," but the Court acquit the prisoner of the remainder of the first part, viz. " For un-officer-like conduct," and likewise of that part, which sets forth that the cash " was for his own use."

The

The Court is further of opinion, that the prisoner Jemadar Abram Beg is not guilty of the 2d part of the charge, viz. For, "also having directed the writer of the 1st company to pay two months pay to two Sepoys," and he is hereby acquitted of the same.

The part of the crime preferred against the prisoner Jemadar Abram Beg, of which he has been found guilty, being contrary to the usage of the service and subversive of good order, the Court doth sentence him to be suspended from rank and pay for the space of one calendar month, from such period as the Officer Commanding the Army in Chief may please to direct, and he is hereby sentenced accordingly.

From the evidence recorded on these proceedings, it appears, that the prisoner received authority, from necessity, to take a sum equal to one Rupee per man in his detachment and that he only took the amount of the pay which was due to himself, which he distributed among the men under his command; under the circumstances therefore, that this was done, I cannot attach any criminality to his conduct, and in consequence remit the punishment awarded him by the sentence of the Court.

3d.—For having behaved in a most disrespectful and insolent manner before a Court of Enquiry, which was investigating a complaint made by him against Lieutenant Smith.

SENTENCE.—The Court having attentively considered the evidence in support of the prosecution, as well as what the prisoner has urged in his defence, are of opinion that he John Clements, is guilty of the first charge preferred against him.

The Court are further of opinion in respect to the second charge, that the letters were caused to be written by the prisoner, but do not find them to be of a most dangerous and insolent tendency, and do therefore acquit him of the same.

The Court are moreover of opinion that the third charge preferred against the prisoner is not proved in the full extent, but that he is guilty of having behaved with disrespect only before the Court of Enquiry, for which it appears he has already been admonished by that Court.

The Court having found the prisoner guilty as above-mentioned, do sentence him John Clements, Private His Majesty's 84th Regiment, to receive (500) five hundred lashes on the bare back with a cat of nine tails, at such time and place as the Officer Commanding the Army may please to direct. The Court beg leave also to recommend that the prisoner be sent to serve on board one of His Majesty's Ships of war.

CHARGE 2d.—For disgraceful and un-officer-like conduct on the 5th instant, in grossly insulting and using the most scurrilous and abusive language to the said Syrang Shaik Survoir, his (the prisoner's) superior Officer, when employed on duty in paying the 7th Company.

“ The Court after mature deliberation on the matter before it, is of opinion that the prisoner, Lieutenant Steele of H. M. 25th Light Dragoons, is guilty in part of the 1st original charge, viz. of playing with Captain M'Gregor from the evening of the 27th June, till between 3 or 4 o'clock the following morning, but acquits him of the rest of the charge.”

“ On the 2d original charge, the Court is of opinion that
 “ the prisoner is guilty in part, viz. For fighting a duel with
 “ Captain M’Gregor in consequence of a dispute which
 “ arose relative to the transactions of the night of the 27th
 “ June, but under the greatest provocation, and the Court
 “ acquits the prisoner of the rest of the charge for want of
 “ evidence.”

“ On the additional charge, the Court is of opinion that

CHARGE 2d.—For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman (on the same evening) in endeavouring to provoke Lieutenant Horn to fight a duel with him.

“ Particularly so, of Lieutenant and Adjutant Anderson, and in saying, “ he had often sought an opportunity to fight a duel with him,” or words to that effect.” The Court are also of opinion, that the prisoner is guilty of the second charge, viz.

“ For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman, (on the same evening), in endeavouring to provoke Lieutenant Horn to fight a duel with him without the slightest cause or provocation whatever, which being a breach of the articles of war.”

The Court having found the prisoner guilty in the above instances, which being in breach of the articles of war for the better government of Officers and Soldiers in the service of the Honorable Company, do therefore sentence him, Ensign T. H. Travis, 1st Battalion 5th Regiment N. I. to be suspended from rank and pay for the space of six (6) calendar months.

"For taking the whole of the pay in such coins received from the Pay Office in which there was no loss in the bazar," but do acquit him of the second part of the third charge, viz. "Changing money of his own for the same to the injury of the men of the 8th Company."

Fourthly.—That he is guilty of lending money on interest to a Sepoy of the 8th Company named Vanketachelum, but that it does not appear to this Court he

he had lent money for interest, to any of the other men.

Fifthly.—That the Court doth acquit the said Subadar Vanketachelum, of the 5th charge.

The whole of which said charges and the parts of them of which he has been found guilty, being contrary to good order, military discipline and of the rules and articles of war, the Court doth therefore sentence the said Subadar Vanketachelum of the 2d Battalion 7th Regiment N. I. to be suspended from rank and pay, for the space of five (5) calendar months.

For conduct prejudicial to good order and subversive of Military discipline, in having, under date the 6th and 8th of May last, addressed two letters to Lieutenant Colonel Hall Commanding the *Travancore* Subsidiary Force, expressed in the most insubordinate, unofficer-like and disrespectful terms, charging his Commanding Officer Captain Crompton with *injustice, un-officer-like, and un-gentleman-like conduct*, and with having joined in a conspiracy against him, Lieutenant Wigan, which he, with many other insulting disrespectful expressions and insinuations, terms a foul and malicious conspiracy against him, Lieutenant Wigan.

317. " We have to call your particular attention to the principles we have adopted in ranking the Artillery or Engineer Cadets for your Presidency, during the last year, as also the line of conduct we shall pursue hereafter, respecting this subject."

318. " Since December 1809, several young men have been permitted to embark for *India*, who had received their education at our own Military Seminary at *Addiscombe*, and had passed a highly creditable public examination, and we likewise sent you several from the Royal Academy at *Woolwich*, who had been educated there for two years, as

" also some Cadets who had qualified themselves under Private Tutors."

319. " In arranging the rank of the above Cadets under the several regulations to which their original appointments were applicable, we have to observe, that we have ranked them; 1st—According to the date of their being reported qualified from our Seminary. 2d—As to the date when others educated at *Woolwich*, were actually discharged from thence; and lastly, with reference to the date when those educated under Private Tutors, were eligible by age to rank; the following therefore is the order in which we direct, the several Cadets alluded to, should now rank."

" Having thus determined the rank of those who have actually sailed for your Presidency, with the exception of Mr. Charles Claude Nattes we have now to acquaint you, that we shall hereafter look solely to our own establishment for a sufficient number of well educated young men, for our corps of Engineers, and Artillery, and we have resolved, that in future, there shall be two public examinations, during the year, viz. One in the month of October; the 2d in the month of April following. By this arrangement, those who are found qualified for the Artillery at the public examination in October, will be enabled to proceed to *India*, by the early ships of the season, and

" those

those reported qualified in April, by the latter ships."

321. "With the view to encourage genius and superior talents, and to stimulate our young men to exertion, close application, and good behaviour during their residence in the institution, we have further resolved, to select, from the most promising among those who are reported qualified at the public examinations before mentioned, a certain proportion expressly for the corps of Engineers, and we have determined, that they shall be permitted to remain at our Seminary (without prejudice to their rank) a further time beyond the said examination, to render them more eminently qualified for that particular line of service, and which according to all experience, requires more time for instruction than the Artillery service; It is therefore our express desire that, you should in no case, fill up from the inferior ranks of the Artillery, or from the Cavalry, or Infantry, the vacancies which may occur among the commissioned Officers, either in your Artillery or Engineer corps, but that upon the receipt of the list of Cadets intended for the latter service, you do immediately post them to such vacancies, as shall appear to have existed at the time when the said list was dated."

322. "This regulation we have resolved shall commence its operation from the public examination in October last, with the exception of Mr. Charles Claude Nattes, who was reported qualified on the 29th December 1809, but was permitted to remain in *England* until the sailing of the ships of the present season without prejudice to his rank, we accordingly attached him to the corps of Engineers, and we direct, that in the event of your having posted any of the Cadets beforementioned to that corps, you will upon the arrival of Mr. Charles Claude Nattes give him the precedence as pointed out in the former part of this letter."

323. "We have further to acquaint you, that in consequence of the very gratifying report which we have received of the talents, industry, and exemplary conduct of Mr. William John Nattes and William Wotherspoon, we attach them at once to our corps of Engineers at your Presidency, but have allowed Mr. Wotherspoon to remain at our Seminary a short time, without prejudice to his rank as before stated, in order to qualify himself still further for that branch of the service."

G. O. BY THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

The following extracts from the Orders of His Excellency
Lieutenant General Sir Samuel Auchmuty, issued whilst on
the

the Expedition against *Java*, under the authority of the Right Honorable the Governor General, making appointments and sanctioning expenses, are published to the Army, for general information.

Head Quarters of the Army: Malacca, 2d June 1811.

The Engineer Corps to be under the general command of Lieutenant Colonel McKenzie, Chief Engineer on the present service.

Head Quarters of the Army: Malacca, 8th June 1811.

In attention to the health of the European Troops employed on the present service, a considerable quantity of Rum Shrub has been embarked from Bengal for their use. The Commissary is directed to divide it in proportion to the number of Troops on the Transports allotted for Europeans, and it will be occasionally issued in lieu of a part of the Spirits usually served to the Troops; one Dram and a half of Shrub being issued in place of one Dram of Rum or Arrack, when the Officer Commanding the Troops on board may deem it proper.

The Native Sick of the corps, employed on the present service who have been placed in hospital at *Malacca*, to be supplied with rations from the Garrison Stores agreeably to the regulations established for the supply of the Native Troops at that station, and at the same rates of payment.

Head Quarters of the Army: on Board H. M. S. Akbar, 8th July 1811.

Mr. Surgeon Loftie to take charge of the Vaccinating establishment lately under Mr. Assistant Surgeon Anderson, who will deliver over to him that establishment, and all papers and instructions he may have received connected with that duty, as soon as possible.

Serjeant Woolvin, of His Majesty's 78th Regiment, is appointed Provost Martial to the Army, on a Salary of twenty Star Pagodas monthly, and the batta of an Ensign. The further allowance for the establishment of his office, will be fixed hereafter.

Head Quarters of the Army: H. M. S. Akbar, at Anchor off Rendezvous Island, 19th July 1811.

The Commander in Chief having received reports that in some of the Transports, Officers Commanding on board have directed issues of provisions considerably exceeding the allowed proportions of particular articles, thinks proper to mark in public orders his disapprobation of such very inconsiderate proceeding. He is persuaded, that in the particular instance alluded to, the order was given from the best intentions—but

Officers

Officers should recollect, that provisions are furnished to last a certain time on calculations formed from the supposed expenditure of specified quantities, and that every deviation from those calculations, must be productive of inconvenience, if not distress. He does not disapprove in particular occasions, when the quantities on board will allow it, of the substitution of one article for another, but the proportion must always be observed, and the regular ration of what is issued must not be exceeded. Such irregularities may also have the effect of creating discontent in those, who have received in other Ships only the regulated rations, or regular equivalents. The Commissary is hereby directed to charge against the personal account of the Officers who have authorized, or may hereafter order such irregular issues, the amount of the surplus expense thereby incurred, and to report the names of such Officers to Head Quarters—and the Paymaster is directed to pay such bills, deducting their amount from the several Officers against whom such charges may be made.

Until provisions can be regularly obtained from the country after the landing of the Army, the Commissary is authorized to issue to such European Officers as desire to be supplied, one ration of European provisions daily, which will be charged at the rate of one Rupee per ration. The demand to be made in a separate indent, from each corps or detachment daily. The indent particularizing the names and rank of the Officers, and to be presented to the Commissary at the fixed hours for the issue of provisions to the European Troops. This indulgence to cease when the markets shall be regularly supplied.

Provisions for the Private Followers, and Horses of Staff Officers, to the extent allowed to be embarked for each by regulation, will also be issued on, and after the landing of the Troops till further orders; to be paid for in the usual manner by the individuals to whom the Followers and Horses are attached.

Head Quarters of the Army: H. M. S. Akbar, at Anchor off Rendezvous Island, 23d July 1811.

An Adjutant and a Serjeant Major will be allowed to each of the Flank Battalions formed from the Line and Reserve of the Army. The following Officers are appointed Adjutants and the appointments to date from the 2d of June 1811, when those Battalions were formed.

Lieutenant Maxwell of H. M. 14th Regiment, to be Adjutant of the Right Flank Battalion.

Lieutenant Macpherson of the 78th Regiment, to be Adjutant of the Left Flank Battalion. Lieutenant

Lieutenant Matheun of the 20th Regiment, to be Adjutant to the Flank Battalion of the Reserve.

A Serjeant Major will also be allowed to each Flank Battalion, and the Officers Commanding those Battalions will recommend proper persons for that situation, the appointments to take place from this date.

Serjeant Alexander M'Donald, of H. M. 78th, to be Serjeant Major of the Left Flank Battalion.

Head Quarters of the Army : on Board H. M. S. Akbar, 26th July 1811.

Lieutenants Baily and Dalgairns of the H. C. Service, doing duty with H. M. 14th Regiment, are attached to the department of the Quarter Master General—and will immediately report to him, and receive his orders.

In addition to the Staff already ordered for the Flank Battalions, a Quarter Master Serjeant for each is to be recommended.

Head Quarters of the Army : H. M. S. Akbar, 1st August 1811.

The Battalion of the Royal Marines, while landed and on duty, with the Army, to be placed on the same footing of field allowances, with the other European Infantry corps on the present service.

Head Quarters of the Army : Chillingching, 5th August 1811.

Captain Durand of the 5th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, is appointed Superintendent of Bazaars with the Army on a salary of 100 Pagodas per mensem. His establishment will be fixed after he shall have ascertained what number of servants will be required, and can be procured to aid him in the discharge of the Bazar duties.

Head Quarters of the Army : Chillingching, 6th August 1811.

Captain Mears of the Madras Native Infantry, is appointed to act as an Assistant Commissary, under the orders of Major Campbell, and to join that department immediately.

Head Quarters of the Army : Chillingching, 7th August 1811.

The Commander in Chief authorizes Officers Commanding Corps of European Troops, to purchase Buffaloes at a rate not exceeding ten Spanish Dollars each, drawing on Major Campbell, Commissary, for the amount. The Meat to be issued at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb. per day per man, and every exertion made to procure it.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 11th August 1811.

Lieutenant Mackintosh of Horse Artillery, will resume his duties as Quarter Master of that corps, and will also act until Lieutenant Driffield's recovery from his wound, as Adjutant to the detachment, employed on the present service.

Serjeant Rose of the Madras European Regiment, is attached to the Provost Martial's department on a salary of Ten Pagodas per month, and to be stationed for the present in Batavia.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 12th August 1811.

Mr. Surgeon Stewart is appointed to the charge of the Field Hospital. Doctor Hunter will allot to him such Assistant Surgeons as he deems necessary.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 13th August 1811.

The Cavalry and Horse Artillery are authorized to entertain Grass Cutters to the full extent allowed by the regulations, at rates not exceeding two dollars per month each man—and Officers Commanding those corps are required to use every exertion to procure these followers.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 15th August 1811.

Serjeant Arundall of H. M. 69th Regiment, is appointed Hospital Serjeant in the Field Hospital at Weltevreden.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 18th August 1811.

The good conduct of the Troops having merited every practicable indulgence, the Commander in Chief has directed one ounce and a half of Coffee and two ounces of Sugar per Man, to be added to the daily ration of the European Troops, and this is to be indented for accordingly.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 22d August 1811.

Rations of Grain will only be issued by the Commissary General for the Horses allowed by the regulation to mounted Officers, and no Grain will be supplied but for Horses actually brought from India—Paddy or Rice to be issued for such allowed Horses as may have been procured in this Island, or at Peang and Malacca.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 28th August 1811.

Bills for working money to the Troops employed on working parties to be made out by Commanding Officers at the regulated

regulated rates, to be countersigned by the Chief Engineer, and then transmitted to the Military Secretary of the Commander in Chief, for His Excellency's authority for their payment.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 29th August 1811.

Abstracts for pay and allowances due to the Troops to the 1st August inclusive, to be sent to the Paymaster for examination and payment as soon as possible.—The amount due to Officers and corps of the Madras Establishment to be drawn in the usual form of abstracts, but these abstracts to be accompanied by a receipt of their amount as an advance on account of the abstracts delivered, which abstracts are only to be considered as a specification of the claims for which the advance is granted, to estimate its amount. The necessary deductions to be made in the abstracts on account of the family payments to corps and individuals, and the advances which they may have already received, and the Paymaster is authorized and directed to grant bills for the amount of deductions for family payments agreeably to the regulations of the several Presidencies.

Mr. Surgeon Stewart having been reported incapacitated by illness for the discharge of the duties of the Field Hospital; Mr. Surgeon Annesly acting Surgeon of H. M. 78th Regiment, will as soon as possible relieve him in that duty.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 30th August 1811.

In order to mount in the most expeditious manner the dismounted Cavalry of the Army, Major Travers commanding H. M. 22d Light Dragoons, and Captain Gall commanding the Governor General's Body Guard, have been authorized to grant receipts on the public account for all Horses they may receive which are fit for the service, to the extent required to mount their corps, and to receive on their strength the Horses so obtained—also to entertain the necessary followers, agreeably to the regulations of the service.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 31st August 1811.

The companies forming the several Flank Battalions to join their respective Regiments, those now in cantonment immediately, the remainder on their return from detachment. The staff appointments to these Battalions, to cease from this date.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 1st Sept. 1811.

Captain Bethune Brigade Major of the left Brigade of the
Line,

Line, has permission to accompany his corps, the 78th Regiment. Captain Phillips of the Madras European Regiment, acting during his absence as Brigade Major to the left Brigade.

Serjeant Charles Anderson of H. M. 14th Regiment, is appointed Provost Martial from this date, vice Woolvin deceased, and will immediately take charge of that office.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 2d September 1811.

Captain Phillips of the Madras European Regiment (acting Major of Brigade,) is authorized to enlist Europeans from the Prisoners for that corps, agreeably to instructions he has received.

The detachments of Royal Marines lately on duty with the Army, will draw full batta from the date of their being ordered for that service, and such parties of the corps as were not two months employed, will draw batta for two months.

The following rates of exchange fixing the relative value of Coins in circulation on Java, having been determined by the Right Honorable the Governor General, are published for the information and guidance of the Army.

" Notice is hereby given, that from and after this date, Sicca Rupees shall be given and taken in exchange for Spanish Dollars at the rate of two Sicca Rupees and 1 Stiver for 1 Spanish Dollar Silver—the value of the Sicca Rupees being fixed at 31 Stivers and a half, and the Batavian, Surat, and Arcot Rupee continuing to circulate as heretofore at the value of 30 Stivers only."

" This order is not intended to affect any previous existing contracts or arrangements, but solely to apply to the circulation of Sicca Rupees, after this date."

" The following Table shewing the current value of the different Coins circulating on Java, is published for general information."

As in all Madras payments 350 Arcot Rupees are equal by the regulations of Government to 100 Pagodas, the payments to the Madras Troops are to be regulated by this exchange, and when made in Sicca Rupees to be converted from Arcot Rupees to Siccas at the fixed exchange of these coins by the Bengal Regulations.

The rations of Sugar, and Coffee, ordered to be issued to the European Troops being considered as no longer necessary in their present situation, they are to be discontinued from this date.

Captain Limond Commissary of Stores, is authorized to employ daily 150 Malay Coolies, from the 16th August inclusive, and to pay them at the rate of 1 Spanish Dollar between ten mer per day.

Captain Limond Commissary of Stores, is authorized to draw the allowances of that appointment from the date of his quitting Madras.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 3d Sept. 1811.

Captain Mears of the 17th Regiment of Madras Native Infantry, Commanding Batavia, is appointed to command the corps he has been instructed to raise.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 4th Sept 1811.

Cornet Chase of the Madras Cavalry, is appointed to act as Military Secretary to the Commander in Chief vice Tylden.

Two Assistant Surveyors attached by authority of the Madras Government to Lieutenant Colonel M'Kenzie, to be provisioned as Europeans, and included in his abstracts for the pay and allowances of his establishment, from the date of their embarkation from Fort St. George.

Head Quarters of the Army: Samarang, 19th Sept. 1811.

Captain Bethune of H.M. 78th Regiment, Brigade Major to the Left Brigade of the Line, will return to his duty at Batavia.

Colonel

Colonel Gibbs of H. M. 59th Regiment, is appointed to the Command of *Soorabaya*.

Head Quarters of the Army: Samarang, 20th September 1811.

Colonel Wood having requested, and obtained permission, to relinquish the Command of the Division of *Samarang*, Lieutenant Colonel Watson of His Majesty's 14th Regiment, is appointed to succeed him in that charge.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 28th September 1811.

The surrender by Capitulation of the Island of *Java*, and its dependencies, having completed the object for which this Army was equipped, it is the intention of the Commander in Chief to return to the Coast of *Coromandel*, and to order to their respective Presidencies by the earliest opportunity such corps of the Army, formed for the Expedition, which has so happily terminated, as are not required for the security of the captured countries.

The functions therefore of the Officers of the General and Brigade Staff, Heads of Departments, and Personal Staff, who may not be required to remain on the Staff to be constituted for the duties of *Java*, and its dependencies, by the Government of the Island, are to cease, as far as relates to the duties of this colony on the 30th instant, or as soon after as this order may be received at the several stations in which such Officers may be employed; and after being relieved in their respective duties by the Officers who may be appointed for the local duties of their several departments, they will return to their Regiments, or the Presidencies to which they respectively belong, where, on their arrival their allowances and appointments on the Staff of the Expedition will cease.

Head Quarters of the Army: Weltevreden, 2d October 1811.

The Commander in Chief directs that the Officers of Horse Artillery and of His Majesty's 22d Dragoons, who are not ordered to prepare for embarkation, shall complete themselves with the number of Horses they are required by the regulations to provide, and of a proper description for the duties of their stations. The departure of a great portion of the Dragoons will enable them to supply themselves by purchase from Officers embarking, and such Officers of the division for embarkation, as may dispose of their Chargers to Officers of the division of Cavalry or Horse Artillery remaining on *Java*, will be allowed the indulgence of supplying themselves on the Coast from the remount lots on the usual terms, and

the

the muster of their Chargers will not be considered as necessary until three months after the arrival of the detachment on the Coast of *Coromandel* without prejudice to their Horse allowance. Each Officer of Horse, Artillery or Cavalry on ~~Leave~~ will be required on the 31st October, to muster his regulated number of Chargers, of a proper description, which the Officer Commanding the detachments of those corps respectively, are held responsible to enforce.

As an indulgence to Cavalry Officers returning to the continent of *India*, who may not dispose of their Chargers to Officers of the Horse Artillery or Dragoons, such of their Chargers as are after inspection by a Committee, pronounced and reported by such Committee to be perfectly sound and fit for the service, may be received into the ranks of their respective corps at the regulated price of Remount Officers Chargers.

The Puckallys attached to corps of the Madras Establishment; those of the Pioneers, and Gun Lascars excepted, who form parts of the companies in which they are placed; to be returned to the department of the Quarter Master General, and sent back to *Fort St. George*, all their accounts of Pay &c. being adjusted to the 30th September inclusive.—Natives of this island or others who may be engaged here to be entertained in their place, to supply corps and departments with water, on such system as may be preferred by the local authorities on the Island, the expense to be incurred being limited, so as not to exceed the amount allowed by the Madras regulations, either in garrison, in cantonment, or in the field, as the case may be, for the supply of Puckallies, Beasties, or other carriage of water to such regiments, detachment, or department, as this order may affect. The Quarter Master General to make the arrangement for which his department will be held responsible.

The Captains, Lieutenants, Warrant Officers, Petty Officers, and Seamen of the Royal Navy, landed from the Squadron on the recent service on this Island, and its dependencies, to co-operate with the Army, are to draw batta, of the Military Ranks corresponding with their Rank in the Navy, in the same manner as was directed regarding the Royal Marines when employed on shore—that is to say, *two Months Batta* for all who were not employed for a longer period, such of them whose period of service on shore may have exceeded that time, are to draw for the number of days they served on shore. The Paymaster is directed to furnish on application a statement of the Batta of the various Military Ranks.

Head Quarters of the Army : Weltevreden, 4th October 1811.

Colonel Agnew Adjutant General, having been ordered to proceed to *England* with despatches, he will immediately transfer the duties of his department to Major Agnew Deputy Adjutant General, to whom all reports intended for the former Officer are to be transmitted.—Colonel Agnew will immediately close his accounts with the Pay department to the end of the present month. . . .

It appearing by a report from the Commissariat that the Madras Troops are supposed to pay for the rations issued on board Ship to their Horses and allowed Followers, while no charge of that kind is directed to be enforced against any other part of the Army—on these grounds the Commander in Chief is pleased to direct, that the production of any charge on this account, shall be suspended, till the pleasure of the Government of *Ferd St. George* is known.

G. O. BY THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

Major Otto is to be considered in charge of the Quarter Master General's Office at the Presidency, and Captain Balmain in charge of the Adjutant General's Office, during the absence of the Adjutant General and Quarter Master General of the Army, on duty with the Commander in Chief.

The Commander in Chief is pleased to direct, that, in conducting the correspondence of the Army, it is to be observed as a general rule, in every department, that each letter is to be confined to one subject.

The Commander in Chief having had occasion to observe, that, notwithstanding the regulations, prescribed in Para. 4th of the 18th Section of the Code of Military regulations, many Commanding Officers have enrolled *Children* on the Sepoy Recruit establishment of Native corps, in defiance of these orders, and to the detriment of the service, as well as to the injury of individuals, is pleased to direct, that every Sepoy Recruit, now on the strength of corps, whether of Cavalry, Artillery, or Infantry, under the age of 11 years, shall be forthwith discharged; and that, if any case of a peculiar nature, shall appear to any Commanding Officer to require His Excellency's further consideration, with reference to the spirit of the regulations, it is to be fully reported for the Commander in Chief's information, and decision.

Officers Commanding His Majesty's Regiments of Cavalry, and

and Infantry, serving under this Presidency, will immediately transmit to the Office of the Adjutant General of the Army, detailed returns of the arms, accoutrements, and appointments, now in use with their respective regiments, describing their numbers, actual state, when received into use with the corps, by whom supplied, or from what store received, whether they are, or are not, of the muster ordered by the King's Regulations, and generally every information regarding the state, and mode of supply established by the Colonel of the corps, for keeping up such equipments as are furnished by him by contract.

The Commander in Chief is also pleased to direct, that, previously to any indent being submitted for Stores for the use of regiments of His Majesty's service, of the above description, it shall be transmitted to His Excellency for approval and sanction, through the channel of the Adjutant General of the Army.

SENTENCE.—The Court having well and maturely deliberated upon the evidence produced in support of the charges against the prisoner, as well as what has been urged and brought forward on the defence, are of opinion, that the 1st charge has not been fully proved, and do therefore acquit the prisoner of the same.

The Court find the prisoner guilty of so much of the second charge, as having gone to Captain Nixon's quarters in a very disrespectful manner to deliver his report, requesting at the same time to speak to him privately, and acquainting him with his intention of preparing charges against him, but not in consequence

of Captain Nixon's conduct towards him that morning on the General Parade.

Upon the additional charge, the Court is of opinion, that the prisoner is guilty of so much of it, as un-officer-like conduct in calling Venkattachellum Syrang of the Store department to his quarters on the 20th instant, for the purpose of obtaining information against Captain Nixon, but do not find the other parts of this charge proven.

In the instances in which the Court have pronounced the prisoner Lieutenant A. Crawford to be guilty, the Court do adjudge him to be suspended from rank and pay for six calendar months, from the date of the confirmation of this sentence and further, to be reprimanded in such manner as His Excellency the Commander in Chief may be pleased to direct.

The Commander in Chief having approved and confirmed the sentence passed upon you, I am directed to express the Commander in Chief's regret, that the disrespectful and insubordinate conduct which you adopted towards your Commanding Officer, should necessarily prevent him from remitting any part of that punishment which must ever result to those, who permit themselves, even for a moment, to forget the first principles of their profession.

It is not enough for a Soldier to be brave, that virtue natural to every Briton, must in an Army be directed by discipline, and the first principles of discipline are obedience and respect for authority, as you have however in so early a stage of your military career (the Commander in Chief hopes unpremeditatedly) departed from those principles, by which alone its character and honor can be maintained, he recommends, that the term for which you have been suspended from rank, &c. may be devoted to reflection, and the cultivation of principles which will hereafter give you a claim to participate

icipate in the credit, which invariably results to those Armies which are directed upon these immutable principles.

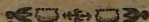
