WAR OFFICE, 20TH JUNE 1812.

SIR,

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having taken into his consideration the cases of those Officers of the Army who have sustained serious and permanent injury in action with the enemy, and being desirous of marking his

sense

sense of their services, by extending to them a permanent provision in addition to those allowances which are given under the existing regulations, has been graciously pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that Pensions shall be granted to such Officers, according to the Regulation and Scale herewith transmitted: and I have the satisfaction to add, that Parliament having by their vote, given effect to His Royal Highness's liberal and beneficent views, these Pensions will commence from 25th December 1811, in all cases in which the injury may have been sustained previously to the 25th December 1810, and from the expiration of a year and a day, in the instances of wounds received subsequently to that date.

In executing these His Royal Highness's Commands I beg to assure you, that it gives me much gratification to communicate to you this additional and striking proof of His Royal Highness's most gracious attention to the merits and services of the British Army: and I request that you will use the earliest means of making the same known to the Officers of the Regiment under your command.

REGULATION for granting PENSIONS to OFFICERS of His Majesty's Land Forces, losing an Eye or a Limb on Service.

If an Officer shall be wounded in action, and it shall appear upon an inspection made of him by the Army Medical Board, at any period not sooner than a year and a day after the time when he was wounded, that he has in consequence of his wound lost a limb or an eye, or has totally lost the use of a limb, or that his wound has been equally prejudicial to his habit of body with the loss of a limb, such Officer shall be entitled to a Pension, commencing from the expiration of a year and a day after the time when he was wounded, and depending as to its amount upon the rank he held at that period, according to the Scale annexed; this Pension, being granted as a compensation for the injury sustained, is to be held together with any other pay and allowances to which such Officer may be otherwise entitled, without any deduction on account thereof.

Officers who shall have lost more than one limb or eye, shall be entitled to the Pension for each eye or limb so lost.

And as the Pension is not to commence till the expiration of

of a year and a day from the date of the wound, it is to be independent of the allowance of a year's pay, or the expenses attending the cure of wounds, granted under the existing regulations.

Applications for this Pension are to be in the same manner in which claims for the year's pay are now made to the Secretary at War, and must always be accompanied by the certificate of the Army Medical Board, if the Officer applying is at home; and by that of the principal Medical Officer on the Station where he is, if the Officer is abroad.

In the latter case, however, the Officer must, as soon as he returns home, be inspected by the Army Medical Board, and transmit their certificate to the Secretary at War.

All Officers who may have sustained such an injury as would entitle them to this Pension, by any wounds received since the commencement of hostilities in the year 1793, will, upon the production of the proper certificate from the Army Medical Board, be allowed a Pension proportioned, according to the scale, to the rank they held at the time when wounded, and commencing from 25th December 1811.

This allowance will be granted in general according to Regimental Rank, but in cases in which, in consequence of their Brevet Rank, Officers shall have been employed at the time when they were wounded, in discharge of duties superior to those attached to their Regimental Commissions, it will be given by the Brevet Rank.

The following extracts of the confirmed proceedings of a Native General Court Martial assembled at Quilon on the 11th of June 1813, by order of the Officer Commanding in Travancore, under authority of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, and continued by adjournments till the 17th day of the same month, and of which Syrang Shaik Nutter of the 2d Battalion Artillery, is President, are published to the Army.

CHARGES—Jemadar Ramahsawmy of H. or Lieutenant Wright's Company, 2d Battalion 19th Regiment N. I. placed in arrest by me on the following charges, viz.

For scandalous and disgraceful conduct, highly unbecoming a Native Officer, in the following instances, viz

1st. In appearing in a most beastly state of intoxication in company with a Private, also drunk, and behaving in a most riotous manner in the Bazar of Oadagberry on the night of the 1st of May.

2d. For having then and there beat the Naigue of the Bazar Guard without provocation or cause, and having attacked and attempted to seize the Arms of the Sentry and otherwise mal treated him.

3d. For having treated with contempt, and positively refused to obey my orders conveyed to him by the Native Officer of the day, directing him (Jemadar Ramahsawmy) to go to his quarters.

4th. For having during the night of the 1st of May most unwarrantably and grossly abused the Sentry at the Main Guard, in the execution of his duty, and afterwards having uttered most abusive and shameful language, regarding

regarding Subadar Shaik Ally of H. Company in presence of several men of the Detachment.

SENTENCE.—The Court finds the Prisoner guilty of the 1st charge. On the 2d charge the Court finds the Prisoner guilty "of having near to the Bazar beat the Naigue of the Bazar Guard without provocation or cause, and "of having attacked and attempted to seize the Arms "of the Sentry and otherwise mal-treated him."

The Court finds the Prisoner guilty of the 3d and 4th charges, and the Court finds the Prisoner guilty on the additional charge, "Of shameful conduct in "speaking to four Sepoys of the Detachment between "the 2d and 6th of May and requesting them separately "and individually to give false evidence for him."

The Court having found the Prisoner guilty in the above instances, to the prejudice of good order and Military discipline, the Court does therefore, by virtue of the Articles of War sentence and adjudge the Prisoner Jemadar Ramahsawmy 2d Battalion 19th Regiment N. I. to be "Dismissed the Honorable Company's Service."

SIR,

So many instances have occurred in which No. 38, 805. Regimental Pay Lists and other documents have been forwarded to the Superintendents of Military Accounts, with the certificates and affidavits signed by the respective Officers, although the particulars to which the certificates referred were not inserted in the blank spaces left for that purpose; I have the honor to request that you will intimate to Commanding Officers of Corps under your command, the necessity of their being particularly attentive in seeing that the certificates and documents alluded to, are complete and correct before they affix their signatures to them, apprising them that the 2d Article of the 4th Section of the Articles of War was expressly framed with a view of impressing upon the minds of Officers the importance of this duty, and of making them aware of the consequences that would attach to the neglect of it.

CIRCULAR, No. 127.**WAR OFFICE, 23^d JULY 1812.**

Sir,

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been graciously pleased to grant an allowance, not exceeding five Shillings a day, to Regimental Paymasters, absent with leave from Corps on foreign service, on account of ill health, and required to remunerate the Officers performing their duty; I have the honor to acquaint you therewith, and to inform you, that all applications for the issue of the said allowance, should be made to this department, accompanied in the first instance, by a certificate from the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, and senior Medical Officer on the Station, that the health of the Paymaster is such, that he cannot continue personally to discharge his duty, and that change of climate is absolutely necessary for the re-establishment of his health; and also by a statement of the sum intended to be allowed by the Paymaster to the Officer who is to perform his duty; I am, however, to apprise you, that no more than two months allowance will be issued at one time, and that at the expiration of every two months the application should be renewed, and the Paymaster should produce a certificate from a Physician, or other proper Medical Officer, of the continuance of his incapacity to join his Regiment.

I am to add, that this allowance is not in any case to be extended beyond the period of twelve months.

As cases may eventually occur, in which separate tonnage will be required for regimental stores the property of Government, of the Colonel, (as in the case of His Majesty's Regiments,) or of the Mess ; Commanding Officers on these occasions are directed to address to the Quarter Master General of the Army, their application for the same, in order that it may be forwarded under the Commander in Chief's orders to the proper authority for its provision.

These applications will contain a specific list of the articles and quantities for which tonnage may be required ; and in no case will attention be given to the application, unless the particular information above required be transmitted with it.

HONORABLE SIR,

Para. 1st. We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the letter from the Secretary to Government in the Military Department, dated the 18th ultimo, and in conformity with the instructions therein contained, to report the result of our examination of the proficiency made in the Hindoostanee Language by Lieutenant and Adjutant Willock of the 2d Battalion of Artillery.

2d. Lieutenant Willock was required to perform the usual exercises; and we have much pleasure in reporting, that the result is in every respect satisfactory.

3d. Lieutenant Willock's translation from Hindoostanee was executed with great correctness, but two or three passages might perhaps have been more happily rendered.

4th. In his translation into Hindoostanee, Lieutenant Willock was particularly successful; on a careful review of this exercise we cannot find that it contains a single word mis-spelt, or a single sentence which is not strictly idiomatical while, independently of its accuracy as a translation, it displays a remarkable ease and elegance of diction.

5th. To the attainment of facility in the colloquial use of the Hindoostanee, Lieutenant Willock appears to have paid particular attention.—He converses with fluency, and his pronunciation is correct.

6th. In consideration of the high degree of proficiency attained by Lieutenant Willock, we are persuaded that your Excellency in Council will feel great satisfaction in conferring upon him the usual honorary reward.

The attention of the Commander in Chief having recently been attracted, by a circumstance of resistance to the constituted authority of the Civil Power, in the refusal of a Military Officer to admit of the attendance, as evidences on a criminal prosecution, of certain Native Officers and Soldiers under his command, although legally summoned by a Magistrate for that purpose; His Excellency finds himself called upon, thus publicly, to apprise the Army at large, of the consequences which may result, from an erroneous impression on this subject, and to express his determination to take serious cognizance of any future irregularity of a similar nature.

The Commander in Chief, under the orders of Government, at the same time explains to the Army, that on the issuing of summonses for the appearance of Native Officers or Soldiers as evidences, as well as warrants for their apprehension, a notification will in future be made to the Commanding Officer by the Civil Magistrate to that effect; but, it is nevertheless to be distinctly understood, that although such notification should *not* be given, an omission for which the Magistrate will be responsible to the Government, a compliance with his warrant or summons must be equally rendered.

The Commander in Chief is pleased to direct, that all Officers *dismounted* wearing *Helmets, Caps or Turbans*, are to salute in the same manner as practised by Officers of Flank Companies, and with a view of establishing one uniform mode, the following directions are to be strictly adhered to.

METHOD OF CARRYING THE SWORD.

AT CLOSE ORDER.—The Officer will slope his Sword, the right hand will be lowered with the Sword; just so far on the right side as to admit of the hand keeping a firm grasp of the hilt, and being brought well square to the front the blade will fall upon the right shoulder, where it will be held steady and firm.

AT OPEN ORDER.—The Sword will be extended diagonally across the body from the right side to the point of the left shoulder, the right arm being straightened perpendicularly down the right side, the left arm will be bent so that the left hand may take the blade of the Sword, edgeways (the edge downwards) between the fingers and thumb and be opposite to the point of the shoulder.

MODE OF SALUTING.

STANDING.—1st. Raise the Sword to the front of the face with a graceful motion till the bottom of

2 MOTIONS. the Guard is in line with the chin.

2d. Drop the Sword smartly to point about 12 inches in front of the toe, the Sword brought down to the side, so that the Guard will touch the seam of the Breeches, the point consequently held in a straight line about 3 inches on the right of the right foot, the Officer looking to the front and standing perfectly steady—at the moment the Sword is dropped, the left hand is by a graceful motion (moving in unison with the Sword) to be brought up above the peak of the Helmet, Cap, or Turband, keeping the little finger to the front.

MARCHING.—The Officer must be careful to look direct at the Officer saluted,

- 2 Motions.** 1st. The Sword to be recovered as directed in the foregoing paragraph, and beginning the motion with the *right Leg*, then waiting one step and dropping the Sword with the *right Leg*
- 2d Motion.** exactly in the same position as when saluting standing and raising the left hand to the Helmet, Cap or Turband when dropping the Sword.

In like manner the Sword is to be *recovered* with the *right Leg*, wait one step, then with the *right Leg*, bring it to the position across the body as directed for an Officer at open Order.

Every attention should be given to uniformity in the Dress and Appointments of Officers as well in the mode of putting them on, as in the make and description of them.

The Helmet or Cap is never to be taken off the head in paying personal Compliments to those entitled to them, whether on or off a Parade.

The Governor in Council having approved the measures recommended by the Medical Board, for rendering more efficient the establishment of Dressers with the Native branch of the Army, is pleased to order and direct.

That in future, a First and Second Dresser be attached to each Battalion, the former upon a monthly pay of Ten, and the latter on a monthly pay of Seven Star Pagodas.

That First Dressers shall be selected from the Medical Pupils educated at the Asylum or Fort School; and that no person shall be considered eligible to that situation, until he shall have acquired a knowledge of compounding accurately and administering medicines, with the other inferior duties of an Hospital, and it is specially enjoined, that he shall be able to read and write English distinctly.

That Pupils reported by the Surgeons, under whose care they have been instructed, to be qualified for the duties of First Dressers, shall in the Centre Division attend at the Medical Board for examination. In the other Divisions of the Army they shall in like manner attend the Superintending Surgeons, to whom instructions shall be given, to make the necessary enquiries regarding the progress they have made, and their competency to be First Dressers.

That to encourage diligence and undeviating attention, the higher situations of Sub-Assistant Surgeons shall be selected by seniority, from those Dressers who have uniformly conducted themselves so as to merit the continued approbation of their Superior Officers.

As the Service does not at present furnish an adequate number of young men sufficiently educated to qualify them for the situation of First Dressers to all the Corps, it is directed that the most deserving Natives now with Battalions shall continue to fill those situations, until persons properly instructed can be supplied from the Medical Pupils.

Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for the information of the Army, the following Extract from a Letter, from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 12th March 1813.

Para. 2.—In our Military Letter dated 5th July 1811, we informed you paras. 8th and 9th, that we had for the present, suspended our judgment, on the case of Colonel The Honorable Arthur Sentleger; we also informed you para. 32 of the same Letter, that we should hereafter take into consideration the cases of the Officers who had accepted the Governor General's option of being dismissed from the Service, or have been dismissed by the Sentences of Courts Martial, as described in the Governor General's Letter of the 15th April 1810.

3.—Having taken the case of Colonel The Honorable Arthur Sentleger, as well as the cases of several of the Officers mentioned in the 32d paragraph of our Letter dated 5th July 1811, into our most serious consideration, and having maturely weighed the evidence brought forward against them, as well as, what they have respectively stated to us in their defence, having adverted also to the sentiments contained in paras. 14th and 15th of the same Letter, which disposed us to the lenient judgment then passed on Major De Morgan and other Officers, and which are in great measure applicable to the cases now under review, we have come to the following resolutions.

Although the conduct of Colonel The Honorable Arthur Sentleger has been such as would in our opinion, have justified his removal from the Company's Service, yet adverting to the long period of his suspension, and likewise to his past services, we have resolved to remove the suspension imposed upon that Officer.

Para. 1st.—In conformity with the instructions conveyed to us in the letter from the Secretary to Government in the Military Department, dated the 20th ultimo, we have examined Cornet W. Hamilton of the 4th Regiment Native Cavalry, as to the proficiency which he has made in the Hindoostanee language, and we have now the honor to report the result, for the information of your Excellency in Council.

2d.—Mr. Hamilton's translation from Hindoostanee into English was executed with the utmost readiness. It is not entirely free from error, but its inaccuracies are too few and too trifling to deserve any notice.

3d.—In his translation from English into Hindoostanee, Mr. Hamilton was, equally successful. This exercise, however, was not performed with the same readiness as the former, but its correctness and its elegance fully compensate for the attention and care bestowed upon it.

4th.—In the oral part of the examination, Mr. Hamilton appeared to us to be somewhat embarrassed, but his embarrassment, we are persuaded, arose more from diffidence in his own power than from any deficiency of skill in the colloquial use of the language.

5th.—Upon the whole, we consider Mr. Hamilton to have attained a superior degree of proficiency in the Hindoostanee language, and we have much satisfaction in recommending

mending that your Excellency in Council may be pleased to bestow upon him the usual honorary reward.

Extract from the proceedings of a European General Court Martial assembled by order of Major General Dyson Marshall Commanding the 2d and 3d Divisions of the Field Army (in pursuance of Field Army Orders by Lieutenant General Champagne Commanding the Troops in the Field) at Meerut, on Saturday the nineteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred & thirteen, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of Thomas

Thomas Holdrich or Holdrige Private in His Majesty's twenty-fourth Regiment of Light Dragoons, and such other Prisoners as shall be brought before it:—And continued adjournments until Tuesday the twenty-ninth day of June 1813.

CHARGE FIRST.—Mutinous conduct at Meerut, on the 27th of May last, in the Barrack of the Troop to which he was attached, in having addressed grossly abusive language to Quarter Master Chick of the same Corps, in violation of good order and discipline and in breach of the Articles of War.

CHARGE SECOND.—Mutiny in having on the 27th of May last, when in the Barrack aforesaid, presented and snapped a pistol loaded with a ball cartridge at Quarter Master Chick, he being in the execution of his duty.

CHARGE THIRD.—For having subsequently to presenting and snapping the pistol as aforesaid, uttered mutinous language expressive of regret that the pistol had not gone off and blown out the said Quarter Master's brains and declaring, that though he had not shot him then he would do so on some other opportunity, such language being subversive of discipline and in breach of the Articles of War.

SENTENCE.—The Court having duly and maturely weighed and considered the evidence on the part of the Prosecution, as well as what the Prisoner Thomas Holdrich hath urged in his defence, are of opinion that he is guilty of the following part of the first charge exhibited against him, namely, "Conduct at Meerut, on the 27th of May last, in the Barrack of the Troop to which he was attached, in having addressed grossly abusive language to Quarter Master Chick of the same Corps, in violation of good order and discipline and in breach of the Articles of War."—But the Court acquit the Prisoner of the "mutinous" conduct alleged against him in the first charge.

The Court are of opinion that the Prisoner is guilty of the second charge, namely, "Mutiny in having on the 27th of May last when in the Barrack aforesaid, presented and snapped a pistol loaded with a ball cartridge at Quarter Master Chick, he being in the execution of his duty."

The Court are of opinion that the Prisoner is guilty of the third charge, (viz) " For having subsequently to presenting and snapping the pistol as aforesaid uttered mutinous language expressive of regret that the pistol had not gone off and blown out the said Quarter Master's brains, and declaring that though he had not shot him then, he would do so on some other opportunity, such language being subversive of discipline and in breach of the Articles of War."

The Court finding the Prisoner guilty of such part of the first charge, and the whole of the second and third charges as above stated, and the same being in breach of the Articles of War, do adjudge him the said Thomas Holdrich to be shot to death in such manner and at such time and place as His Excellency the Commander in Chief of the Forces in India, may be pleased to direct.— And he the said Thomas Holdrich is hereby sentenced accordingly.

Lieutenant General Champagne will be pleased to cause the sentence of death which has been passed upon Private Thomas Holdrich or Holdrige of His Majesty's 24th Light Dragoons, to be carried into effect in the most awful and impressive manner.

Having performed this painful duty, The Commander in Chief deems it necessary to advert to the circumstances under which the Prisoner is stated to have laboured when he meditated the heinous and flagrant act for which he is about to forfeit his life.

Drunkenness—a propensity so detestable in itself, so prejudicial to discipline, so disgraceful to the Soldier, and so very frequently productive of the most lamentable consequences—has not unusually been advanced as in the present instance in palliation of an offence committed under its degrading influence; but it ought never to be absent from the recollection of the Soldier; that Drunkenness constitutes of itself a breach of military discipline, which cannot be too strictly watched and too promptly checked in its infancy, for it eventually leads

leads to almost every censurable act of which the Soldier is guilty—when then it is associated with the commission of another crime, it becomes proportionately aggravating, and can never be received in extenuation of any such offence.

The Commander in Chief in India therefore avails himself, of this occasion to claim the assiduous and persevering exertions of Officers in Command of Regiments, and all those serving under them, in suppressing in it's earliest stage a propensity of so evil and pernicious a tendency as Drunkenness, a vice which never fails to prove detrimental to the reputation and best interests of every Corps in which it unhappily prevails.

The Commander in Chief cannot dismiss this subject without expressing his earnest expectation that Commanding Officers of Regiments will feel the expediency and efficacy of meeting offences otherwise than of a serious nature by measures less hurtful to the Soldier than corporal punishment, a frequent or inconsiderate recurrence to which has ever been found greatly to weaken it's effects—solitary confinement has had the happiest results, when the infliction of corporal punishment has failed to produce amendment. The Commander in Chief strongly recommends recourse being had in all admissible cases to a mild and progressive system of punishment, before extreme severity is resorted to, and His Excellency will fail to afford all the aid in his power in furtherance thereof, by recommending the erection of solitary cells sufficient in point of number to answer this desirable end, where King's Troops are usually stationed.

You will leave it to the option of all men under 35 years of age, to re-enlist for a limited period or for life, but men who have arrived at that age, or upwards, are only to be engaged for the further limited term of seven years.

Such men in the Foreign Corps as may be re-enlisted after the expiration of a limited period of service will be allowed the bounty of four Guineas.

I have only to add that these respective bounties will be admitted by the Secretary at War, as a charge in the accounts of the different Regiments, and I am to desire that you will cause an observation to be made upon the back of each regimental monthly return, of the number of men who may extend their services, each month subsequent to the 24th of June next.

The Commander in Chief having approved and confirmed the sentence of death passed upon Appanah, Private Sepoy in the 2d Battalion 8th Regiment N. I. directs the Officer Commanding at Secunderabad to carry the sentence into execution, in the most solemn and impressive manner at as early a period of time as may be found convenient, after the receipt of this Order.

The enormity and dangerous tendency of the crime of which the Prisoner has been found guilty, leaving no opening for the exercise of mercy, the painful duty has been imposed upon the Commander in Chief of ordering the sentence of death, passed upon Appanah Private Sepoy, to be carried into execution. His Excellency however trusts, that so awful an example, will produce the effect of deterring others from abandoning the Colours under which they have voluntarily enlisted, and from acting with ingratitude and infidelity to a Service so eminent for the justice and liberality and consideration with which, Soldiers of every description are treated, while in the active performance of their duty, and are maintained when rendered unfit for further service.

This Order, with the Crime and Sentence, to be particularly explained to every Native Corps on the Establishment.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish to the Army, the following copy of a General Order issued by the Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council at Batavia.

GENERAL ORDERS BY GOVERNMENT.

The Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council avails himself of the opportunity afforded by the approaching departure of Lieutenant Colonel Colin Mackenzie, Chief Engineer on the Expedition of Java, to render to that distinguished Officer his peculiar acknowledgments, and to testify his unreserved approbation of the zeal, ability and unwearied application which he has displayed on this Island.

Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie has since the conquest of Java been employed under the sanction and authority of the Right Honorable the Governor General in collecting and arranging the Topographical and Military Reports and Surveys

Survey of the former Government, in investigating the History and Antiquities of the Island, and in ascertaining the state of the landed tenure and the general condition of the inhabitants.

The Topographical Surveys commenced under the late Government have been found to merit every attention and on the suggestion of Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie, they will be continued partly on the same plan.

On the History and Antiquities of the Island, much valuable information has been obtained, and the acknowledged qualifications and ability of Colonel Mackenzie, justify the expectation, that on his return to India many interesting results will be ascertained.

As President of the Commission on Java affairs, Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie has visited almost every part of the Island, and the considerable and important collections which have been made by the Commission, added to the interesting documents which have been procured by his personal diligence and research will form a body of most useful and interesting information, to serve as a basis for the furtherance and completion of the statistical enquiries, which have been set on foot. Enquiries of this nature, would appear to have latterly attracted the attention of the former Government of this Colony, but the state of the Island was unfavourable to their success; and it is to the unremitting and extraordinary application and zeal of Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie, that we are principally indebted for the lights which have been thrown on the subject. Under his superintendence, a General Statistical Table of the population and produce of the Island has been compiled on principles which ensure it's near approach to accuracy, and the answers which have been given to the queries, historical, literary and oeconomic, circulated through the Island at his suggestion, afford information of considerable interest and importance.

The result has justified the opinion, that the Native Inhabitants of Java are susceptible of the improvements, which a more enlightened administration in British India has dictated, and that the revenues of the Colony are of sufficient importance and consideration to bear every expense, charge and trouble attending their collection, under such an improved system.

Java must ever be considered as a great Agricultural Country, and as the Granary of the Eastern Islands — to remove every restriction on the Agriculture and Commerce of the Country, is alike conducive to the happiness of the people, and to the interests of Government, and the information and opinions

opinions furnished by Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie will enable the Government in ameliorating and improving the general condition of the Colony, to establish a more enlightened and advantageous system of internal administration.

The Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council will have much satisfaction in communicating to the Supreme Government, the favorable sentiments which he entertains of the essential benefits which have been conferred on this Colony by the exertions of Lieutenant Colonel Mackenzie, and the Lieutenant Governor requests, that he will accept his personal thanks, for the aid and advice which his talents and judgment have afforded during his stay on this Island.

G. O. BY GOVERNMENT.

1.—His Excellency the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to establish the following Regulations for the Pay Department of His Majesty's Troops.

2.—The Regimental Paymasters of His Majesty's Service are

are in future, to indent on the Station Paymasters of the Honorable Company's Service for the full amount of the subsistence and Company's allowances of each Regiment.

3.—The abstracts being prepared for each month, the Regimental Paymasters are to draw their amount from the Station Paymasters—the Company's allowances being payable at the periods fixed for the general payments of the Army and the King's subsistence on the 25th of each month—the abstracts both of Company's allowances and King's subsistence to be delivered to the Station Paymasters, for insertion in their accounts.

4.—As under His Majesty's Regulations, a regular muster takes place every month by the Regimental Paymasters, it is directed, that copies of the muster rolls attested by Commanding Officers shall uniformly accompany the regimental abstracts of King's subsistence.

5.—As the muster rolls will of course include the Officers, as well as every other description or rank in the Regiment, the transmission of lists of Officers which have hitherto accompanied the accounts of Company's allowances will be discontinued, in future.

6.—The regimental pay and allowances of Officers of His Majesty's Service absent from their Regiments on staff duty, command, or furlough, within the limits of this Government, or serving with the Subsidiary Force of Hyderabad or Poonah, are to be included in the regimental abstracts and the amount remitted to them monthly by bills on the Accountant General, but, in under any circumstances, such as Regiments being employed on Field or on Foreign Service, it should become inconvenient to make such remittances, the regimental pay and allowances of such Officers are permitted to be drawn separately from the Paymaster at the Presidency on certificate of last payment, and under instructions from the Military Auditor General, to whom application is to be made for that purpose, the Military Auditor General is however directed, not to issue such instructions unless he may be fully satisfied of the difficulties in regard to remittances, on which such application may be founded.

7.—When the pay and allowances of an Officer are permitted to be drawn separately under the provisions of the preceding paragraph, he is on the 1st of each month to transmit his abstracts, accompanied by all prescribed vouchers to the Paymaster at the Presidency, with a letter, requesting that a bill for the amount may be remitted to him—the Paymaster in such cases, is to transmit the bill by return of Post and to enter the

the abstracts in his general accounts under the head of the Regiment to which the Officer belongs — all such abstracts to be countersigned by the Commanding Officers of Stations, with exception of the Presidency, where they are to be countersigned by the Brigade Major of His Majesty's Forces.

8.—The regimental pay and allowances of Officers absent at Sea, at other Presidencies, or beyond the limits of this Government, with the exception of Hyderabad and Poonah as above stated, are not to be included in the regimental abstracts, but to be drawn for separately, under the General Regulations of the Service, if desired by such Officers, on certificates of their being alive—the abstracts being payable at the Presidency only.

9.—Officers of His Majesty's Service on staff duty under this Government, but whose Regiments may be serving at other Presidencies, are to draw their regimental allowances on abstract from the Paymaster of the Station, who is to enter the amount under the head of the Regiments to which such Officers may belong, in his accounts of Company's allowances to the King's Troops.

10.—The regimental subsistence of the Officers referred to in the preceding paragraph, is permitted to be drawn on receipt, as hitherto, on account of the Presidencies under which their Regiments may be serving—the receipts to bear the same countersignature as the abstracts for the Company's allowances of those Officers.

11.—Detachments of His Majesty's Regiments within the limits of this Government, if under Commissioned Officers, are to be included in the abstracts of their Corps and to be drawn for by Regimental Paymasters, whose duty it will be to provide by remittances for their regular payment.

12.—Non-Commissioned Rank and File, and all persons of His Majesty's Service under the rank of Commissioned Officer who may be at the Presidency on duty, otherwise and not under the command of a Commissioned Officer, are to be drawn for by the Brigade Major of His Majesty's Troops.

13.—The above pay to be drawn from the Paymaster of the Presidency, on abstracts accompanied by certificates of last pay and muster rolls regularly signed by the Brigade Major, and specifying the Rank, Names, Regiments, Troops, Companies, &c. to which the individuals belong—the amount to be entered by the Paymaster at the Presidency in his general accounts of disbursements, under the head of the respective Regiments to which the parties belong.

14.—The Paymaster of the Depot at Poonamallee will
continue

continue to draw for and pay the Detachments, Recruits, Invalids, &c. of His Majesty's Regiments who may be placed under his charge; the amount to be drawn on regular abstracts from, and to be entered in the accounts of, the Presidency Paymaster under the head of the Regiments to which the individuals respectively belong—those payments will therefore no longer appear in the accounts of Regimental Paymasters.

15.—Officers arriving from Europe are to draw the pay and allowances which may be due to them, as also the advances to which they may be entitled on regular abstracts, countersigned, if at the Presidency by the Brigade Major, or if at Poonamallee by the Officer Commanding; these abstracts are to be paid by, and entered in the disbursements of the Paymaster at the Presidency, under the head of the Regiments to which the Officers respectively belong.

16.—The Recruits, Invalids, &c. whose pay may be drawn at Poonamallee are to be mustered each month by the Paymaster (who acts also as Fort Adjutant) and the muster rolls signed by that Officer, and countersigned by the Officer Commanding, are to accompany the abstracts as the vouchers by which their correctness is to be ascertained.

17.—The medical allowances on account of the Recruits of His Majesty's Regiments at Poonamallee, will be drawn by the Medical Officers in charge and entered in the accounts of the Presidency Paymaster, under the heads of their respective Regiments.

18.—The medical allowances for the Invalids of His Majesty's Service who may be stationed at Poonamallee, to be drawn in all respects as heretofore.

19.—The same degree of responsibility for the payments made to His Majesty's Troops at Poonamallee, is to apply to the Paymaster at the Depot as now attaches to Regimental Paymasters of His Majesty's Service.

20.—The General Regulations of this Government regarding the audit, re-audit, and final audit of Paymasters' accounts as also those respecting the recovery and adjustment of retrenchments, are to be considered applicable equally to His Majesty's, as the Honorable Company's Troops.

21.—Copies of all retrenchments which may be made against Officers of His Majesty's Service, to be furnished to the Regimental Paymasters by the Station Paymasters, who are to recover the amount by stoppages from the regimental abstracts, in the proportion authorized by the Regulations—the stoppages to be brought to account by Station Paymasters in

in the same manner as those on account of retrenchments from Officers of the Company's Service.

22.—Regimental Paymasters of His Majesty's Service are not authorized to place Officers under stoppages for any retrenchments, without furnishing each Officer with a copy of the retrenchment made against him, as is customary in the Company's Service.

23.—All explanations of Regimental Paymasters and all documents or vouchers of every description which may be transmitted with their accounts for audit, readit or final audit, are to bear the countersignature of the Commanding or Senior Officer present with the Regiment.

24.—In consequence of the above Regulations regarding the payment of His Majesty's Troops, the functions of Deputy Paymaster General to the King's Troops which have hitherto attached to the Paymaster at the Presidency are to cease, and the accounts connected therewith to be discontinued, that Paymaster will therefore in future be placed with regard to the Regimental Paymasters of His Majesty's Service in precisely the same official relation as any other Station Paymaster.

25.—The establishment hitherto allowed to the Paymaster of the Presidency for the above duties, will be discontinued.

26.—The abstracts of subsistence of His Majesty's Troops are to be entered in the accounts of Station Paymasters under the head of

“ KING'S SUBSISTENCE,”

and to form one total immediately following their disbursements on account of the Company's Troops in the manner formerly observed, when the Company's allowances to His Majesty's Troops were entered in the account of Station Paymasters.

27.—The abstracts of Company's allowances are to follow those of the King's subsistence under the head of

“ COMPANY'S ALLOWANCES TO THE KING'S TROOPS,”

and to form a separate total but both; as hitherto, to form a part of the general debit in the public books under the head of “ CHARGES MILITARY.”

28.—Officers of His Majesty's Service at Out-Station being permitted to receive their pay and allowances in cash or by bills on the Presidency as may suit their convenience, the amount required to be paid by bills is to be regularly notified in the monthly indents of Regimental Paymasters.

29.—All articles such as tents, horses, wine, &c. which may be issued to Officers of His Majesty's Service on credit,

are to be debited and the amount recovered by Station Paymasters under precisely the same Regulations as apply to Officers of the Honorable Company's Service.

30.—Stop pages from the regimental abstracts of His Majesty's Troops, on account of provisions, &c. to be recovered and accounted for by Station Paymasters according to the General Regulations of the Service.

31.—The allowances of General and other Officers of His Majesty's Staff to be entered under the head of Company's allowances to the King's Troops in the accounts of the Station Paymasters by whom the amount is disbursed.

32.—The responsibility of Regimental Paymasters of His Majesty's Service in respect to the Government, and to the Station Paymasters from whom they draw the pay of their Regiments, is to continue on the same principle as heretofore.

33.—The Station Paymasters in the examination of the regimental abstracts of Corps of His Majesty's Service will be guided by the provisions of the 9th Section of the new Code of Regulations, under the head "HIS MAJESTY'S TROOPS."

34.—An additional allowance of fifteen Pounds per annum is granted to each Regimental Paymaster on account of stationary, which is to be included in the abstracts of Company's allowances to the different Regiments and to be drawn half yearly in arrear, viz. in the months of January and July.

35.—All applications on account of advances required for Individual Officers, Detachments or Recruits of His Majesty's Service, belonging to other Presidencies are to be forwarded, if at Madras, by the Brigade Major of His Majesty's Troops, at Poonamallee by the Paymaster of that Depôt, to the Secretary of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, in order that the authority of Government may be obtained for the issue of the required advances.

36.—The above Regulations are to have effect from the commencement of the month of November next, — the first abstracts of His Majesty's Regiments to be entered in the accounts disbursements of the Station Paymasters for that month will accordingly be those for Company's allowances in arrear for the month of October and King's subsistence in advance from the 25th November to the 24th December next.

HONORABLE SIR,

In obedience to the orders conveyed to us in the two letters from the Secretary to Government in the Military Department dated the 16th instant, we have the honor to report the result of our examination of the proficiency made in the Hindoostanee language by Lieutenant Poggenpohl of the Horse Artillery and by Lieutenant A. Gordon of the Madras European Regiment.

In our examination of these Gentlemen, we pursued the usual course, and we are gratified in being enabled to state that the result is satisfactory.

Lieutenant Poggenpohl in his translation into English, has failed to express correctly the sense of two or three words, which however are not of frequent occurrence; with these exceptions, which are obviously of trifling importance, this exercise is performed with sufficient accuracy. His Hindoostanee exercise also is correctly executed and displays a considerable knowledge of the idiom of the language.

Lieutenant Poggenpohl converses with great fluency; and we observed with satisfaction the attention which he appears to have given to this important acquirement.

Lieutenant Gordon also in his translation from Hindoostanee, appears not to have clearly understood the sense of a few words, but in other respects, this exercise is very correctly executed. The accuracy of his Hindoostanee exercise, both as regards the expression and the idiom, leaves us little to desire from him on these points; and he converses with sufficient fluency.

With these brief observations, we have much satisfaction in recommending, that your Excellency in Council may be pleased

pleased to bestow on Lieutenant Poggenpohl and on Lieutenant Gordon the usual honorary reward.

Lieutenant Hockley's pronunciation appears to us to be sufficiently correct; and he reads and converses with great facility.

We have therefore much satisfaction in recommending that your Excellency in Council may be pleased to bestow upon Lieutenant Hockley the usual honorary reward.

" At a General Court Martial held at Kaira on the 13th day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, by virtue of a warrant from Major General Wilkinson Commanding His Majesty's and the Honorable Company's Forces under the Presidency of Bombay, of which Major David Leighton 1st Battalion 4th Native Infantry Bombay Establishment, was President."

" Cornet Benjamin Astley His Majesty's 17th Light Dragoons, was arraigned under the following charge, viz.

" For making use of gross, scurrilous and improper language to Lieutenant Ryan on the 31st ultimo, calling him a common blackguard and infamous scoundrel, or words to that effect, finally challenging Lieutenant Ryan his Superior Officer to fight a duel, such conduct being unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman, highly subversive of Military discipline, and in breach of the Articles of War."

" On which charge the Court passed the following opinion and sentence."

" The Court having weighed and considered every part that has been produced in support and against the charges, pass the following sentence.—With respect to the first instance of the charge, viz. for making use of scurrilous and improper language to Lieutenant Ryan on the evening of the 31st of May, calling him a common blackguard or an infamous scoundrel, or words to that effect,"

" The Court are of opinion that the Prisoner Cornet Astley, is not guilty, and they do therefore acquit him thereof for want of sufficient and substantial evidence to this part of the charge.—With respect to the 2d instance of the charge, viz. For challenging Lieutenant Ryan his Superior Officer to fight a duel as set forth therein, The Court find the Prisoner guilty, which

which being a breach of the Articles of War, do

*Remarks on the Sentence by His Excellency The Commander
 in Chief.*

The above sentence is approved by the Commander in Chief, but as the punishment, tho' justly and fully applied by the Court, is heavy in a case where the misconduct was not deliberate, and where the language was so loose that Cornet Astley might not have defined the entire criminality of it's purport; The Commander in Chief will not enforce the penalty, and directs that Cornet Astley be restored to his duty. —A Letter signed by the President in the name of the Court, was laid with the proceedings before The Commander in Chief, in which Letter the Prisoner is recommended to the favorable consideration of His Excellency, because it appeared that the quarrel between the Prisoner and Lieutenant Ryan was made up on the same evening tho' Lieutenant Ryan subsequently brought forward the charge against Cornet Astley. —The circumstances thus rested upon by the Court ought not to have been pleaded. The offence for which the Prisoner was tried, was not an injury to an individual, but a breach of the Articles of War, and a procedure mischievous to the discipline of the Army, and the Commander in Chief highly approves the conduct of Major Wilson Commanding His Majesty's Seventeenth Light Dragoons, in checking by an austere intervention a laxity of tone which by what appears in evidence on the Court Martial seems to have existed among the Subalterns of that Corps. —The Commander in Chief in shewing a lenity which he adopts from believing it would be pleasing to the benignity of the Prince Regent and of His Royal Highness the Duke of York, trusts that the lesson conveyed by the just severity of the sentence will not be the less impressive on those who have to advert to it.

His Royal Highness the Commander in Chief is pleased to direct, that when a Regiment embarks for Garrison Duty on Foreign Service, the lawful Wives of Soldiers shall be permitted to embark, in the proportion of Twelve per Company, including the Wives of Non-Commissioned Officers, and Rations are to be issued for them as long as the Corps remains in a Foreign Garrison.

When a Regiment embarks for active Field Service, the number of Soldiers Wives to be permitted to accompany it, must be limited to Six per Company, or their Embarkation must be altogether forbidden, according to the nature of the service for which the Regiment may be destined.

To such Wives of Soldiers as are not permitted to embark with their Husbands, the rates of allowance, authorized by the Act of the 51st of George 3, Chap. 106, and by the Act of the 52d of Geo. 3d, Chap. 120, (Extracts from which are contained in the following pages,) will be granted to enable them to proceed to their homes, or to the Places at which they intend to reside, during the absence of their Husbands on service.

If a Regiment should embark from a Foreign Garrison for Field Service, such Soldiers Wives as are not permitted to embark with the Regiment, are to be sent by the earliest conveyance to this Country: on their arrival in Great Britain, or Ireland, they will receive the rates of allowance specified in the Acts of Parliament above alluded to.

When a Royal Veteran Battalion embarks for Foreign Garrison Duty, all Soldiers' Wives of good characters, who are desirous of accompanying their Husbands, are to be permitted to embark.

This Order is to cancel that which is contained in page 255 of the General Regulations and Orders for the Army.

Extracts from the Act of the 51st Geo. III. Ch. 106.

I. " Upon any Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment, being embarked for Foreign Service, the Commanding Officer thereof shall cause a List or Lists to be made out of all the Wives and Children of the Soldiers belonging to such Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment, to be left at the Place of Embarkation, who are desirous of claiming the Allowance authorized by this Act, for the Purpose of enabling them to return to their Homes or Places of Settlement, either in one List for the Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment, or separate Lists for each Company; and shall give to every such Wife a Duplicate of such Part of such List as shall apply to each Wife and her Family of Children respectively, certifying thereon, under his Hand, that the Person to whom such Certificate is given is the Wife or repeated Wife of a Soldier in his Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment; and he shall transmit such List or Lists so made out to the Secretary at War."

II. " Each Wife to whom any such Duplicate shall have been delivered as aforesaid shall forthwith take the same to some neighbouring Justice or Magistrate, who shall make out a Route for her, and fill up and sign a Certificate, specifying the Place to which such Woman is going, and her Route, that she may receive such Allowances as are authorized by this Act, not exceeding Two pence per Mile."

III. " Upon Production of such Certificate to any Overseer of the Poor of any Place through which such Woman shall pass, he shall, out of any Money in his Hands applicable to the Relief of the Poor, pay her an Allowance not exceeding the Rate per Mile specified in such Certificate as aforesaid for the Number of Miles to the next City, Town, or Place to which she may be going, not exceeding Eighteen Miles, and he shall endorse on such Certificate the Money so paid, and take a Receipt from the Woman, signed with her Hand or with her Mark, specifying the Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment, to which her Husband belongs, so as that the Description on the Receipt may correspond with the Description in the Certificate so produced to him as aforesaid."

IV. " The Sum so advanced by such Overseer shall, upon Production and Delivery of such Receipt to the Collector of Excise of the District within which such Overseer acts as such, or any Person officiating for such Collector, be repaid to such Overseer for the Use of the Fund for the Relief of the Poor, by such Collector of Excise or other Person, out of any Public Monies in his Hands, and the same shall be allowed

lowed in his Accounts; and such Overseer shall give a Receipt for the Money so paid to such Collector or other Person; and such Receipt of the Overseer, together with the Receipt of the Woman, shall be taken as Cash in the Payment of Duties of Excise received by such Collector, and all Sums of Money so advanced out of any Duties of Excise shall be repaid by the Agents of the Regiments to which the Soldiers belong whose Wives and Families have been so relieved, or by any other Person to be appointed for that purpose by the Secretary at War, to such Person or Persons as shall be authorized by the Commissioners of Excise in England or Scotland, respectively, to draw for or receive the same, for or on Account of the said Duties."

V. "Every such Woman shall at the last Place of her receiving any Allowance under this Act, antecedent to her Arrival at her Home or Place of Settlement, deliver up such Certificate to the Overseer of the Poor advancing such Allowance, who shall deliver the same to the Collector of Excise, and the same shall be, by such Collector of Excise, transmitted to the War-Office."

VI. "Wives of Soldiers not complying with the Regulations hereinbefore prescribed shall be treated as Vagrants, and may be passed such to their Homes, either in England, Ireland, or Scotland, respectively, as the case may be."

Extracts from the Act of the 52d Geo. III. Ch. 120.

I. "When any Wives, Widows, or Children of Soldiers employed on Foreign Service, shall return to Great Britain, the Officer Commanding the Regiment, Battalion, or Corps, to which the Husband, or Father, of any such Woman, or Child, do or did belong, shall give her a Certificate, stating that the Person to whom such Certificate is given is, or was, the Wife of, and her Child or Children is or are the Child or Children of a Soldier in his Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Detachment, in like Form and Manner as the Certificates given by Officers Commanding Corps to the Wives and Families of Soldiers embarking for Foreign Service under the Direction of the said recited Act; and if any Women, the Wives or Widows of Soldiers on Foreign Service, or their Children, shall land at any place in Great Britain without having such Certificates as are enacted by this Act, it shall be lawful for the General Officer Commanding at the nearest Place to that where they shall so land, and he is hereby required, upon Application made to him to give any such Woman applying for it, such Certificate as aforesaid, which shall

shall entitle her to the Allowance for herself and her Children (if any) granted by this Act; and every such Widow or Wife shall, upon any Certificate granted under this Act, receive such Allowances for herself and Family, as are allowed, granted, and directed by the said recited Act, upon Certificates granted by Officers Commanding Corps, in respect of Wives and Families of Soldiers embarking for Foreign Service, in like manner as if such Allowances were specially granted by this Act and all the Rules and Regulations for the giving, regulating, paying, and accounting for, and returning the same, were specially and particularly re-enacted in this Act."

11. "Every Widow or Wife of any Soldier to whom any such Certificate shall have been delivered, as is directed by the said recited Act or this Act, shall forthwith take the same to some Justice of the Peace, or Magistrate, who shall make out a Route, and fill up and sign a Certificate specifying the Place to which such Widow or Wife and Family is going, specifying the Number of Children; and it shall be lawful for such Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, in lieu and instead of the Rate of Allowance directed by the said recited Act, to direct any such Allowance as he shall deem necessary, not exceeding Three Halfpence per Mile for each such Woman, and One Penny per Mile for each of her Children; any thing in the said recited Act authorizing a Rate of Allowance to the contrary notwithstanding."

In consequence of a Letter addressed to the Editor of the Morning Chronicle, having appeared in that Paper of the 11th of March, signed "*Robert Browne, Major-General, Lieutenant-Colonel of the 12th Light Dragoons*," of which Major-General Browne, has avowed himself the Author, in which, after drawing a comparison between the former, and the present Clothing, and Equipment of the Cavalry, it is stated that from the Clothing, and Equipment, now in use, "the disadvantage to the Dragoon is considerable, and may be attended with serious consequences, and that he (Major-General Browne) was a Member of both Boards of Cavalry Officers, but disapproved of their proceedings, and stated his sentiments to the Secretary at War, to the Commander in Chief, and also to the Adjutant-General in writing, and that in conversation with Mr. Whitchbread, the subject

“ was accidentally mentioned, and he having stated it in the House of Commons, he (Major-General Browne) thought it a duty, in justice to himself and the Light Dragoon, to “ give the above.” The Commander in Chief judged it expedient, to direct that a Board, composed of General Officers of Cavalry, who were Members of the Board, whose proceedings formed the basis of the Clothing Warrant of the Cavalry, now in force, should be re-assembled, for the purpose of taking into consideration the letter before mentioned, and of affording such explanation on the several points animadverted upon by Major-General Browne, as might enable His Royal Highness to lay before the Prince Regent, the fullest, and most satisfactory proofs that the assertions of that Officer are not founded, & that the essential objects for which the Board was originally convened, as stated in the Adjutant General’s letter of the 13th June 1811, have been strictly kept in view in the alterations introduced in the Warrant, namely, “ that every article of the Soldier’s equipment should be simplified, to prepare him for active service, and consequent exposure, and that in no instance, should the expense be increased to the Colonel, or a larger deduction be made from the Soldier’s pay, than is authorized by His Majesty’s Regulations.”

Accordingly the Board composed of the General Officers named in the margin, did assemble, and in their Report, which the Commander in Chief has submitted to the Prince Regent, and the substance of which His Royal Highness has been graciously pleased to command to be thus circulated for the

general information of the Army, have stated (after a most minute and laborious investigation of every article of Cavalry equipment and necessities, that by the comparative lists of necessities, it appears, that, under the present Warrant, there will be a saving to the Dragoon upon the first supply of necessities to be provided out of his bounty and allowance of equipment, of no less a sum than £1 : 2 : 2, exclusive of the articles that undergo no alteration, and of the cost of shoes and gaiters.

The Board further add, that the change of appointments has been now so long in progress, and must both in conformity to the Order, and from the nature of the case, proceed so gradually, that the instances must be rare where an

an individual Soldier can be called upon to provide any of the new articles, before the corresponding article of necessaries, for which it is to be substituted, shall have been worn out.

The Board further state, that they cannot conclude without marking their surprize at the apparent loose manner in which Major General Browne has expressed himself, when he says "he was a Member of both Boards of Cavalry Officers, but disapproved of their proceedings, and stated his sentiments to the Secretary at War, to the Commander in Chief, and to the Adjutant General in writing;" for the Board find by their minutes, that Major-General Browne was relieved from his attendance at the Board, last year, on the 5th May, and although while he continued to attend, he certainly did take opportunities of stating, in conversation, some opinions of his own, and throwing out suggestions of alterations which he would wish to recommend, no resolution was ever proposed, or any Note taken of such suggestions, and in fact, a very great proportion of the estimates, accounts, returns, and evidence called for by the Board, and which formed the basis whereon their conclusions principally rested, were presented to them subsequent to the 5th May, and that consequently Major General Browne, had no knowledge as a Member of the Board, either of the information, by which they were guided, or of the opinions they formed; and the Board had no opportunity of profiting by the Major General's assistance, or of hearing him express his disapprobation of their proceedings, with the purport, and effect of many parts of which he appears to be still unacquainted.

The result of this investigation has been highly satisfactory to the Prince Regent, inasmuch as it has convinced His Royal Highness, that the General Officers on whose report the Clothing Warrant of the Cavalry is founded, did perform, with ability and fidelity, the important duty that was confided to them, and that the interests of the ~~Comms~~ have in every respect been duly considered and guarded with the most scrupulous attention.

The Prince Regent cannot allow this Order to go out to the Army, without at the same time expressing his highest displeasure against Major-General Browne, and his surprize that an Officer of his rank can have been so forgetful of his duty and station, so regardless of the discipline and welfare of the Service, as to circulate, through the medium of a Public Newspaper, assertions calculated to excite discontent in the Army, to mislead the Soldier, and to give an erroneous and unfounded impression to the Public, that the funds assigned

assigned for his equipment and maintenance are improvidently and injuriously expended.

The Commander in Chief directs that this Order shall be circulated throughout the Army, and be entered in the General Order Books of all Regiments of Cavalry.
