Giving cover to a letter from Lieutenant Colonel Forbes' Commanding Arcot enclosing an original inflammatory Persian Letter, instigating the Troops at 1 Cons. 12th. April 1822 352 Arcot to use and to join on a particular day (the 17th March) with those at Arcot and Vellore in the distribution of all European; stating further that this letter, which had been thrown into the lines of the 6th. Native Cavalry had been brought to the Commanding Officer by the Soobadar Major to whom it was addressed; and expressing himself perfectly satisfied with the conduct and fidelity of the 6th and 7th and 8th Regiment Light Cavalry composing the Cantonment of Arcot. # PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOR—THE HONORABLE MAJOR GENERAL SIR THOMAS MUNRO K.C.B.

His Minute—. Proposing the Presidency Cantonment to be formed about 3 Miles beyond the Mount, between the Palaveram Hills and Marmalong River, for 4 Battalions inconsequence of the present inconvenience of the present system of having the troops composing the Garrison of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George hutted in the environs of Madras.

Resolutions and orders thereon.

His Minute .. Details the original Grant and subsequent resumptions at different times of Allungha Grant to Assuir Khan and after his death to his eldest son Kuleem Ulla Khan. Details also the attempts of the brothers of Kulleem Ulla Khan to put aside of the Will of the Father in 1813 without success on the grounds of insanity, states that the Brothers obtained a decision of the personal property by a decree of Court, but twice failed in their claim to a share in the Jaghire; Details the proceedings again instituted in the Court, by which the Honorable Company were included as Defendants and in which the Defendant were cast, and the Brothers entitled to a share in the Jaghire, states the grounds on which he thinks this decree (appealed to England) is wrong, combats the opinions; points out, that by the Charter the Supreme Court is not to interfere in cases of Revenue, and that Altungha Grants are not permanent, remarks on the propriety of the Court being
