G. O. BY THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

The following Extracts from G. O. issued by His Excellency The Most Noble The Commander in Chief in India, are, by His Excellency's orders, published to the Army serving under this Presidency.

Extract from the Proceedings of a Native General Court Martial assembled at Mhow, in Malwa on Tuesday the 24th day of September 1822, in obedience to the orders and by virtue of a warrant under the hand and seal of Major General Sir David Ochterlony, Bart. and g. c. b. Commanding the Western Division of the Army bearing date the 14th day of September 1822, being thereunto authorized by virtue of the power and authority to him in this behalf given for the trial of Bisram Khan, Sepoy 1st Battalion 28th Regiment Native Infantry, and all such Prisoners as may be brought before it, and continued by adjournments.

Wednesday, the 9th October 1822.

FINDING.—The Court having duly weighed and considered the Evidence adduced on the part of the prosecution; together with what the Prisoner Deenah Khan, Sepoy 1st Battalion 28th Regiment Native Infantry, has urged in his defence, with the evidence in support thereof, are of opinion, that he Deenah Khan, Sepoy 1st Battalion 28th Regiment Native Infantry is guilty of the Crime exhibited against him.

SENTENCE.—The Court having found the Prisoner guilty, do sentence him Deenah Khan, Sepoy 1st Battalion 28th Regiment Native Infantry, to suffer death, by being hanged by the neck, until he is dead at such time and place as His Excellency The Most Noble The Commander in Chief, or Officer approving these proceedings may be pleased to direct.

Remarks by His Excellency The Most Noble The Commander in Chief.
The Commander in Chief has approved the sentence on Deenah Khan, who indubitably appears by the evidence to have been an accomplice in the deliberate murder of his comrade—His Excellency, however, observes that encouragement was held out to Deenah Khan of safety for himself if he would come forward with a discovery of the actual perpetrator of the murder: In reliance upon which assurance the Prisoner gave evidence against Bisram Khan. Unauthorised as was the hope so given, the Commander in Chief cannot overlook what he gathers from the proceedings on Bisram Khan's trial, namely, that there would have been little chance of bringing the crime home to Bisram Khan but for the testimony of Deenah Khan in delivering which the latter furnished proofs of his own participation of the guilt not likely to have been otherwise attainable. His Excellency therefore, cannot order the execution of Deenah Khan, but directs that he (Deenah Khan) shall be ignominiously turned out of the service and be led out of the Cantonment with a halter round his neck.

Commanding the Division, under virtue of a Warrant from His Excellency The Most Noble The Marquess of Hastings, k. g. and c. o. b. Commander in Chief, &c. for the trial of Shaikh Muddasee, Jemadar Furruckabad Provincial Battalion, and such other Prisoners as may be brought before it.

CRIME.—For gross and shameful neglect of duty in the following instances.

First.—In not taking sufficient precautions, by availing himself of the means at his disposal, to guard and secure certain notorious offenders committed to his charge, and under sentence by the civil power, in consequence of which neglect the Prisoners in question rose upon the party commanded by him on the 15th of April 1822, about 10 o'clock in the forenoon, in the neighbourhood of the village of Bhundapoor on the bank of the Ganges, in the Purgannah of Currah, and possessed themselves of the boat and arms of the guard.

Second.—For not using his utmost endeavours, to retrieve the consequences of his negligence, by taking prompt and decisive measures to re-secure the persons of the convicts who had so risen, in consequence of which nine out of the twelve Prisoners under his charge, succeeded in effecting their escape.

The conduct of Shaikh Muddafee, being in both instances highly disgraceful and unbecoming the character of an Officer.

FINDING AND SENTENCE.—The Prisoner having no evidence to call, he is directed to withdraw, and the Court having maturely weighed and deliberated upon the whole of what has appeared before them, are of opinion that he is guilty, of all, and every part of the crime laid to his charge; which being in breach of the Articles of War, they adjudge him to be dismissed from the service of the Honorable Company.

CAWPUR, October 1, 1822.

CHARGES against Shendeen Havildar Aunund and Aumeei Naicks, and Nishanund, Jowaher, Doorjunn, Rampersaud, Choteelol, Gangaram Bhowany, (son of Joyram) In-doo, Mahataub, Shew, Joora, Golgu, Konhur Sing, Jewun, Rohem Sing, Bhujro, and Bhowany 2d, Sepoys of the Farrukabad Provincial Battalion.

First.—For gross and scandalous neglect of duty, and want of courage and decision, on the 15th of April 1822, about 10 o'clock, in the forenoon, in the neighbourhood of the Village of Bhundapoor on the bank of the Ganges in the Purgannah of Currah, in allowing certain Prisoners placed under their charge to make themselves masters of their arms, and in not doing their utmost upon that occasion to repel themselves of the same.

Second.—For similar gross and scandalous neglect of duty in not using their utmost endeavours to retake the Prisoners in question when they had succeeded in making their escape from under their charge.

FINDING AND SENTENCE.—The Court having maturely deliberated upon what has appeared before them, are of opinion that the Prisoners are severally guilty of both charges preferred against them; which being in breach of the Articles of War, do sentence them as follows.—Sheadeen Havildar, and Aunund, and Auncen Naicks to be respectively reduced to the rank of Sepoy, and to be put upon the roads for the term of three years. The remaining Prisoners, viz. Mahound, Jowaher, Doorjan, Rampersaud, Choteeloll, Gungaram, Bhowany (son of Joyram), Ihundoo, Mahautaub, Shera, Joorra, Golau, Konhur Sing, Jewan, Rohem Sing, Bhujin, and Bhowany 2d, Sepoys, to be placed upon the roads for the space of two years; and the Court respectfully beg leave to recommend that they be all dismissed from the service of the Honorable Company.

Extract from the Proceedings in continuation of an European General Court Martial assembled at Fort William, in obedience to General Orders of the 30th April, 2d and 3d May, and 4th, 8th and 12th June, and 9th, 14th, 20th and 31st August 1822, and by virtue of a warrant from His Excellency The Most Noble The Marquess of Hastings, K. G. and G. C. B. &c. &c. Commander-in-Chief of all the Forces of India under date the 4th May last.

FORT WILLIAM, Tuesday, the 2d September 1822.

President.—Lieutenant Colonel Shaw, c. b. His Majesty's 27th Regiment.

CHARGE.—I charge Captain Theodore Lyons of Artillery with behaving in a scandalous infamous manner, unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in the following instances.

1st.—For having addressed three Letters (dated June 5th, 15th and July 1, 1821) to Mr. Attorney Smout of an abject and highly degrading nature.

2d.—For having most shamefully broken his word repeatedly pledged in the above mentioned Letters in most solemn and unqualified terms.

3d.—For having on or about the 14th day of November 1816 granted a Draft to Captain Scott of Artillery for one hundred pounds (in payment of a loan to that amount) on his Brother in England, on whom it would appear that he had not authority to draw; as the Bill when presented was protested with a remark to that effect.

4th.—For shamefully evading payment of the aforementioned Debt since Captain Scott's return to this country from furlough in August last.

5th.—For obtaining on false pretences from J. O. B. Taud, Esq. in the month of February 1821, two sums of money amounting together to one thousand seven hundred and fifty Rupees.

6th.—For shamefully evading payment of the above mentioned sum of 1750 Rupees even to this day, although pledged in the most solemn manner to the repayment of it within two months of the time of receiving it.

7th.—For having shortly previous to the departure for Europe of Mr. Twentyman, (Jeweller in the Town of Calcutta), in or about November 1820 granted to the said Mr. Twentyman a Draft, on his Brother in England for two hundred pounds or upwards, which on presentation was protested and the debt remains unliquidated.

8th.—For having on or about the 20th July 1820 given an order on his Mother at Lynington in favor of Messrs. Alexander and Co. of Calcutta for four hundred pounds as payment of a loan, which order was protested on or about the 27th day of April 1821 in due form and returned to Messrs. Alexander and Co. with a letter from his (Captain Lyons's) Brother, stating that had Mrs. Lyons been living, she would not have possessed funds to pay the amount of the order.

9th.—For shamefully evading the payment of the above sum although he had promised to make arrangements for the liquidation thereof in a letter dated 3d October 1821.

10th.—For having, when known to him, that reports were abroad highly prejudicial to his character, instead of repelling the charge tacitly acknowledged guilt, by writing a letter dated December 10, 1821, to Major Pollock, entreating him to use his influence to prevent a public investigation into his conduct, declaring at the same time (to induce the Officers of the Corps not to proceed to extremities) that he was taking effectual measures to quit the Regiment.

11th.—For remaining in Cantonments upwards of three weeks after rejoining the Head Quarters of the Regiment, without calling for inquiry, although perfectly aware that allegations of a most serious nature had been publicly preferred against him by me.

Additional Charges against Captain Theodore Lyons, of Artillery.

For having in the month of February 1821, obtained from Messrs. Mercer and Co. of

Calcutta an advance of several thousand Rupees on the faith of an assurance given them that he had authority to draw on his Brother in England, and on whom he did grant bills to the amount of several hundred pounds in their favor, which when presented, were regularly protested.

SENTENCE.—The Court having found the Prisoner Captain Theodore Lyons of the Regiment of Artillery, guilty, on the first, seventh, and eighth counts of the Charge, the same being "conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman," but acquit him of "scandalous and infamous conduct," and do sentence him to be dismissed, the Service.

Second.—In having at different periods subsequent to the promulgation of the General Orders above adverted to, borrowed certain sums of money, from Rajah Ram Dohy Havildar, Bowanuy Deen Havildar, Buldeo Pandy Sepoy, and Oussan Opadiyah Sepoy, Non-commissioned Officers and Sepoys of the Battalion to which he belongs.

Second.—For exhibiting himself in a shameful state of intoxication before certain Non-Commissioned Officers and Sepoys of the Corps to which he belongs on the same evening, at the same place.

Third.—For appearing in a state of disgraceful intoxication before a Court of Enquiry, ordered to investigate into this conduct, and that of the late Brevet Captain and Lieutenant Forster, of the same Corps, on the morning of the 4th of May, and then and there behaving in a highly outrageous and unbecoming manner.

It is at the same time distinctly to be understood, that the present Regulation shall not in any way interfere with the existing allowance for the maintenance of the personal Camp Equipage of Officers, which being calculated on the principle of meeting all charges for accommodation, both in the time of peace and war will not undergo any alteration.

The above allowance for official Camp Equipage will be drawn by the Staff Officers entitled to receive it upon abstracts supported by a certificate from their immediate Commanding Officer specifying the orders under which they are proceeding upon duty.

The allowance of Public Camp Equipage to the Deputy Quarter Master and Adjutant General, Assistant Quarter Master and Assistant Adjutant General of the Army, when at the head of their respective Departments in the Field, or proceeding on duty being included in Table No. 3 of the regulations for the Quarter Master General's Department which is cancelled by the present order, the allowance to those Officers, viz. one Field Officer's and two Private Tents to the Deputies and one Captain's and one Private Tent to the Assistants will be considered as forming part of Table No. 2 of the same Regulations, which exhibits the allotment of Public Camp Equipage for official duties to the General Staff of the Army.

If at any time the General Staff of the Army when proceeding to the Field or other duty cannot be provided with Camp Equipage from the Public Stores, they will be entitled to a monthly allowance in lieu of such Camp Equipage, corresponding with the number and description of Tents to which they are entitled for their official duties.

With reference to the General Order of the 6th September last, the Honorable the Governor in Council has been pleased to direct, that the option of residence therein conferred on all Native Pensioners, be confined to the Station or District which they may choose on first being transferred to the Pension List. If, in any special case a change of residence should afterwards be solicited or become expedient, an application is to be made to the Superintendent of Pensions who will give the necessary instructions on the subject, but without his previous authority no removal is to take place.

The civil authorities in whose districts Native Pensioners have taken up their residence, are required to furnish the Superintendent with a Register of the Names, Rank, Class and Residence—and with regular Monthly Returns, of the Pensioners who are mustered and paid by Collectors, &c. in their districts respectively.

Any Casualty occurring by death or removal from one district to another is to be carefully notified and, in the former case, the Pension Certificate of the deceased is to be forwarded with the first Monthly Return after such Casualty shall have taken place.

The Superintendent of Pensions is authorized to correspond with the different Civil Authorities on subjects connected with these duties.

On the death of a European Officer at any Military Station, the Commanding or Staff Officers, and in any District where there may be no Military Station, the Civil Authority will report such Casualty to the Superintendent of Family Payments and Pensions.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

In consequence of certain changes in the Uniforms, having been ordered for His Majesty's Army, the Commander in Chief, with a view to preserve the corresponding Uniformity of Dress, which as far as practicable it has always been considered desirable to observe, is pleased to publish to the Army the following Memorandums for the Dress of the General and Staff Officers, and for all Officers belonging to the Establishment of Fort Saint George.

His Excellency General Sir Alexander Campbell, Bart. and K. C. B. therefore directs, that all orders and regulations heretofore issued on the subject of Dress, and which militate against those now published, are hereby annulled.

All Officers on duty are expected to be dressed in strict conformity to the costume which has been laid down.

In order to protect Officers from incurring any immediate or unnecessary expense, while they may not be in want of new appointments; The Commander in Chief leaves them the option, of postponing the adoption of any change, specified in this order, until the 1st of January next, when none but the new Uniforms herein prescribed, will be permitted to be worn—It is at the same time to be understood, that all Officers, on coming into the Service, shall provide themselves according to the New Patterns.

When Officers wear Great Coats, they must be according to the Uniform Pattern, and always with the Sword and Sash over them—The only exception, is, when Officers are taking exercise, or engaged in sporting, or amusements in the open air.

The Commander in Chief holds General Officers, and Commanding Officers of Stations and Corps, responsible, that these orders for regulating the Dress in all its particulars, shall be punctually obeyed.

Should information be required respecting any particular parts of Dress, reference is to be made to the Adjutant General's Office.

The Undress is to be adopted for general use, is to be worn at ordinary Levees,—occasional Duties, and at private Evening Parties.

General Officers and Officers of the General Staff, are permitted at Evening Parties, and on ordinary occasions unconnected with ceremony, to appear with the plain Coat open (but the lappels of double breasted Coats are not to be buttoned back), white loose Trowsers and Shoes, or Wellington Boots, and with this costume, at Evening Parties of a private nature, a narrow Belt may be worn under the Coat, with the straight Staff Sword and leather Scabbard.

For the convenience of riding on Horseback, at Morning or Evening Exercise, when unconnected with duty, a short round Jacket, with plain blue cuffs and collar may be used.

It is to be without any embroidery or lace, to be edged all round with the colour of the Facings—and to be united in front with hooks and eyes.

Overalls of Linen or dark Blue Cloth, are to be worn with the Jacket, and for the greater comfort of Officers in taking Morning Exercise, a plain round black Hat or a plain blue cloth foraging Cap, with a black silk band, but without any lace or embroidery, may be worn.—It is to be understood, that the Cocked Hat is to be worn by Officers on the Staff, when they appear in public of an evening, either riding or driving.

Departments attached to the Army Medical Staff.

Blue, with a stripe of gold lace down the outward seams.
Field Officers of the Corps of Engineers will wear yellow metal spurs, with straight necks two inches long.
The Steel Scabbard is to be worn by Field Officers only, with the Dress and Undress Uniform.
A plain round shell Jacket without epaulette, with the established cuff and collar, united in front with hooks and eyes, a black waist belt, plain foraging cap (without lace), Overalls of blue cloth, with a stripe of scarlet cloth, one inch broad, down the outward seams, or white linen. Overalls are to be worn as a working dress, on occasions quite unconnected with parade and ceremony.

<i>Jacket, Wings, Epaulettes,</i>	As in Full Dress, Lappels buttoned over.
<i>Cap, Feather Sabre, Scabbard, Knot, Cravat, Gloves,</i>	Of white linen.
<i>Loose Trowsers,</i>	Wellington.
<i>Boots,</i>	Two and a half inches wide, with Regimental devices and badges.
<i>Plate,</i>	Crimson silk, with cords and tassels.
<i>Sash,</i>	UNDRESS.
<i>Jacket,</i>	Scarlet, round shell, with established Cuffs and Collar, and edging of cloth, all round and down the front, to be united in front with hooks and eyes no lace, but a small loop of scarlet silk twist upon each shoulder.

<i>Cap,</i>	The regulation cap quite plain as directed for Infantry.
<i>Sabre, Bell, Sash,</i>	As directed for Dress.
<i>Trowsers,</i>	White linen, or Cloth of Regulation Infantry blue grey, quite plain.
<i>Boots,</i>	Wellington.
<i>Great Coat,</i>	Dark blue, single breasted quite plain, Prussian standing collar three inches deep.

In other particulars of Dress not above defined, the Light Infantry Battalions, will conform to the General Memorandum under the head of Infantry.

<i>Jacket,</i>	Dark green cloth, with Light Infantry skirts, black velvet Prussian collar, three inches deep, with one row of black mohair braid, one inch wide, and one row of black twist, round it, also round the Cuffs, which are to be black velvet three inches broad, and slashed, single breasted, with one row of black mohair braid and one of twist down each side of the front, and to be united with hooks and eyes, with ten regimental buttons down the front, four buttons on each skirt, and two behind. The skirts trimmed with narrow black lace.
<i>Wings,</i>	Gold of the same pattern as laid down for Light Infantry Battalions.
<i>Cap,</i>	Black beaver, bell shape as that worn by Infantry, a black silk band, two and three-quarter inches wide, round the top, one inch round the bottom, and two stripes inch wide (in an angular direction) on each side, gilt bugle in the centre, surrounded by a black lace circle, communicating by a black lace loop, and button, to a rosette at the top, black lines and tassels, bronzed scales, and Lion's heads, black peak.
<i>Tuft,</i>	A round black ball.
<i>Overalls,</i>	Dark Green cloth, with a stripe of black Silk braid one inch wide down outward seams.
<i>Sabre,</i>	The same as prescribed for Officers of Infantry.
<i>Knot,</i>	Black leather.
<i>Waist Belt, Pouch, Pouch</i> <i>Belt, and Sash,</i>	As prescribed for Light Infantry Battalions.
<i>Gloves,</i>	White leather.
<i>Cravat,</i>	Black Silk.

UNDRESS.

<i>Jacket,</i>	Dark Green, plain round shell, with black cloth Cuff and Collar, having one row of black mohair braid, one inch broad round, thin black twist loops on the shoulders, and united in front with hooks and eyes.
<i>Cap,</i>	As prescribed for Infantry, quite plain, and covered with Oil Skin. Field Officers and Adjutants wear in addition to the foregoing Uniforms
<i>Tache Slings,</i>	Three, of black patent leather, half inch wide, attached to rings of waist belt, and fastening with loops and buckles to rings of tache.
<i>Tache,</i>	Plain black patent leather, pocket nine inches deep, seven and a half wide at top, nine at bottom; face twelve inches deep, eight inches wide at top, eleven at bottom; perfectly plain with three rings at top for tache slings.
<i>Spurs,</i>	Gilt Screw.
<i>Scabbard,</i>	Steel instead of leather.
<i>Great Coat,</i>	Plain, blue, single breasted, Prussian collar, and regimental buttons.
<i>Cloak,</i>	Blue, lined with scarlet, shalloon, and of walking length.

Officers of the Corps of Pioneers.

FULL DRESS.

<i>Coatee,</i>	Dark Green Cloth, double breasted, with black cloth Lappels, Cuffs, and Collar, plain loops, put on in the manner prescribed for the Infantry of the line, with one or two Silver Epulettes, according to Army Rank, cross flaps and white Kerseymere turnbacks.
<i>Cap,</i>	Infantry Regulation, with silver mountings.
<i>Sabre,</i>	The King's New Regulation Sabre and leather Scabbard.
<i>Belt,</i>	Black leather one and a half inches broad, worn round the waist under the Coatee.

All other particulars of Dress the same as Infantry.

UNDRESS.

<i>Jacket,</i>	Dark Green, round shell Jacket, black cloth Cuff and Collar, quite plain, and to be united in front with hooks and eyes, Collar three inches deep, Cuff slashed.
<i>Cap,</i>	And every other part of Dress as prescribed for Infantry of the line.
<i>Great Coat,</i>	Deep blue with stand up Collar, perfectly plain, single breasted, with regimental buttons.

European and Native Veteran Battalions.

FULL DRESS.

Coates, Scarlet, with French Grey Lappels, Cuffs and Collar, to be made plain, without lace, and to correspond with the pattern prescribed for Infantry.

UNDRESS.

A round shell Jacket perfectly plain as prescribed for Infantry.

MEMORANDUM.

The Mountings of Veteran Battalions European and Native are Silver, and they are to observe the particulars of Dress in every respect, as laid down for Infantry.

GENERAL MEMORANDUM.

The Epaulettes and Wings of all Regimental Officers are to be of the same Description with the following distinction for Field Officers.

The Epaulettes of a Colonel to have a Crown and Star on the Strap, a Lieutenant Colonel a Crown, and a Major a Star.

All Field Officers (those belonging to Rifle Corps excepted) whether by Brevet or otherwise, are to wear two Epaulettes.

Field Officers of Light Infantry Corps, and Captains of Light Infantry, who may have attained the Brevet Rank of Field Officer, are to wear wings as well as Epaulettes.

HORSE FURNITURE

FOR

MOUNTED OFFICERS OF ARTILLERY AND INFANTRY.

Saddle Cloth, The same colour as the facings of the Regiment, two feet ten inches in length, one foot ten inches in depth, with Gold or Silver lace 5-8ths of an inch wide, edged with the colour of the Coat.

Bridle, Black leather, bent branch bit with gilt bosses, having the Rose, Thistle and Shamrock in the centre, encircled with the words, "Artillery, or Infantry mounted Officers," and the Crown above.—Front and the roses to correspond in colour with the facings of the Regiment.

Collar, White.

Holsters, To be covered with black patent leather.

GENERAL MEMORANDUM.

Regimental Medical Officers wear the Uniform of their respective Corps, except that those attached to Cavalry, wear the Undress Cavalry Chako on all occasions, instead of Helmet, those attached to Infantry, single breasted Coatee, and lace on the Collar, Cuffs and Skirts only, with the Regulation Infantry Cap, without feather.

All Regimental Medical Officers wear the King's Regulation Sabre, carried in a narrow black leather Waist Belt, under the Coatee, no Sash or Epaulettes.

The Dress Uniform is to be worn at all parades (when the Corps is in Dress,) at Levees, Reviews, Guards of Honor, General Duty, and all occasions of ceremony, the Jacket buttoned over the breast, with Shoulder Belt, Trowsers, Wellington Boots, &c. &c.

The Full Dress at Evening parties of ceremony, when Officers may wear either tight Pantaloons, of white Web or Kerseymere, and Hessian Boots, or Breeches and Stockings, as prescribed regimentally—At private Evening parties, and at the Regimental Mess, the Full Dress Jacket is to be used, with waist belt and other parts of Dress as before mentioned for Full Dress.

The Undress is for common use and is to be worn with Shoulder Belt, &c. at Inspections, Drills, Regimental Duties, Undress Parades, and Regimental Mess. On ordinary occasions unconnected with Parade or Ceremony, the Waist Belt may be worn with Undress Jacket.

The Field Officers of Infantry wear a Gold Cord line encircling the Cap twice, and suspended on the right side with sliders and acorn ends; they also have slings attached to the Shoulder Belt, wear steel Scabbard in Dress and Undress. Leather Scabbard in Full Dress, straight necked screw Spurs, two inches long, (exclusive of rowels) to be made of white or yellow metal, to correspond with the Uniform of the Regiment.

Adjutants wear in addition to Epaulette a Strap similar to that of an Epaulette without bivion on the left shoulder, also Spurs of the pattern established for Field Officers, and the Regulation Sabre with leather Scabbard carried in a frog Shoulder Belt.

The Interpreter and Quarter Master, is to wear the same dress in every respect as the other Subaltern Officers attached to Battalion Company, except having a bivion loop on the left shoulder.

The lace to be used by all Infantry Gold or Silver, is half an inch broad, which is not on any account to be deviated from.

When the Climate renders it necessary the men should wear cloth Trowsers, on Parade, in Full Dress, the Officers are to wear them also.

Officers holding Staff Appointments or removed from regimental duty, for which no staff Uniform has been prescribed, are to wear the regiments of their respective Corps.

O. B. Commander in Chief, are published to the Army.

CHARGE.—Abdul Cawder, Subidar Light Company 2d Battalion 20th Regiment Native Infantry, placed in arrest by order of Captain Baker, Senior Officer in charge of the Corps, on complaint of Goorawah, Private in the same Company, on the following Charge.

1st.—For conduct disgraceful and unbecoming a Native Officer in attempting to seduce the wife of the aforesaid Sepoy.

2d.—For entering the house of the aforesaid Goorawah, Private, betwixt the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock on the night of the 30th November 1822, with the intent of cohabiting with the wife of the same Goorawah—subjecting himself to be beaten, tied up, and exposed in that situation—such conduct being disgraceful to the character of a Native Officer.

The Court are further of opinion that the Subidar Abdul Cawder, Light Company 2d Battalion 20th Regiment Native Infantry is not guilty of the second charge, and do therefore acquit him of the same.

The Court cannot close its proceedings without remarking—that the complaint instituted by the Sepoy Goorawah against his Company Subidar does not appear to have emanated from the wish to obtain redress of private wrongs, but to have originated in ill-will; and the Court cannot forbear expressing their sense of the impropriety of conduct, disrespect, and want of subordination evinced by the Sepoy Goorawah towards his immediate superior, the more to be reprehended as redress is open to all ranks.

CHARGE.—Subadar Mahomed Ally, 2d Battalion 13th Regiment, ordered to be brought to trial by His Excellency the Commander in Chief, on the following Charges.

1st.—For disgraceful conduct unbecoming the character of a Native Officer, in being frequently drunk while in command of a Party escorting Treasure from Coimbatoor to the Presidency, during the months of April and May 1822.

2d.—For detaching Sepoys under his command from the place of encampment to distant villages to procure Arrack for his use during the march of the Detachment from Trichinopoly to the Presidency in the months of April and May 1822, thereby demeaning the character of those whom he ordered on this disgraceful errand.

3d.—For frequently absenting himself from the Detachment which he commanded, during its march to the Presidency in the months of April and May 1822, and particularly in having quitted it, during a whole night on its arrival at Policonda, and proceeding to the next Stage in advance.

4th.—For endangering the safety of the Treasure placed under his charge, at Coimbatoor to convey to the Presidency by the neglect of his duty and the disgraceful example he set to those under his orders during the march of the Detachment.

The conduct of Subadar Mahomed Ally in all the above instances being highly prejudicial to good order, and military discipline and in breach of the Articles of War.

The Commander in Chief having been pleased to approve and confirm the sentence awarded Subadar Mahomed Ally of the 2d Battalion 13th Regiment by the General Court Martial assembled at Trichinopoly for his trial, has directed it to be published to the Army, in order that the Native Officers may be apprized, that no consideration of past services, will induce His Excellency to pardon an offence so injurious to the discipline of the Army, disgraceful to their character and station, repugnant to their religious principles, and setting so bad an example to the Non-commissioned Officers and Privates under their command.

General Sir Alexander Campbell, Baronet and ~~g. c. b.~~ regrets it has not been in his power to pay attention to the recommendation of the Court in favor of Subadar Mahomed Ally; and His Excellency pledges himself to the Army, that during the period he may hold the Command, he will in no instance extend his pardon to any Native Officer who may be convicted of drunkenness, before a General Court Martial, and adjudged to be cashiered.

His Excellency further directs Officers Commanding Corps will report to Head Quarters any Native Officer under their command who may be addicted to the disgraceful crime of drunkenness, that measures may be adopted if necessary, for their removal from the Service.

The foregoing crime, and sentence with the Commander in Chief's remarks, will be furnished to Corps respectively in the Native Languages; and Officers Commanding are directed to have it read, and explained to their Men at three successive Parades to be ordered for that purpose; after which the Native Officers of each Corps, are to be required to affix their signatures or marks to the translation, that no excuse may be offered for not knowing the orders now published.

After the signatures of all the Native Officers belonging to Corps are affixed to the translation (which must be done in presence of Col. Commanding Officer) it is to be returned to the Adjutant General's Office, for the information of the Commander in Chief.

The General Court Martial assembled at Trichinopoly and of which Subadar Deen Mahomed is President, is dissolved.

The Indent is to be accompanied by an order for the amount, enclosed in a letter of instructions to the Agent, pointing out, to whom the Cloth is to be delivered, and transmitted under cover to the Adjutant General of the Army, with a statement of the number of Men requiring new Turbands or Trowsers, when the Indent will be examined, and if found correct, a certificate will be affixed as per form No. 2, and then forwarded to the Agent for delivery.

The quantity of Cloth required to cover a Turband, both of Cavalry, and Infantry, is estimated at eight inches of Broad Cloth, and one yard of Broad Cloth is required to make a pair of Trowsers.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct the following modification of the Regulations of the Military Pay Department, to have effect from the 1st of May next.

Replies to Retrenchments, are to be forwarded thro' the Paymasters from whose accounts the retrenchments were made, if the Officers continue within their range of payment—otherwise thro' the Paymasters of the stations where the Officers happen to be.

When documents or explanations forwarded (as above directed) by an Officer, in reply to a retrenchment, shall be found to warrant the admission of the charge, the Military Auditor General (in lieu of passing the amount on resitutus as heretofore, to the credit of the Paymaster from whose accounts the retrenchment was made) is to direct the Paymaster, who forwards the reply, to pay the amount on a Bill, or Abstract, and receipt of the claimant; and to enter the charge in his accounts disbursements of the month in which the payment takes place.

When appeals to Government are desired, the above course is, in every respect to be observed, the periods within which both replies and appeals are to be forwarded remaining as heretofore.

It is to be fully understood that payments of charges retrenched, are never to be made without the previous authority of the Military Auditor General, and that the circumstance (should it occur) of the party not having refunded the amount, is not in any manner to affect the course of proceeding above directed.

The proceedings both of Officers and Paymasters in regard to objectionable charges, are not in any manner affected by the above provisions.

In cases when it may be necessary to recover sums that have been disbursed under special authority, (as in the case of an Officer, who after receiving passage money to proceed to Europe, declines to avail himself of his furlough,) the Military Auditor General, in place of retrenching the amount, is to direct it to be recovered by stoppages in the manner prescribed, in regard to retrenchment.

The Military Auditor General will issue such subsidiary instructions to Paymasters, as may be necessary for giving full effect to these orders.

Under the foregoing provisions the reaudits heretofore transmitted to the Accountant General in the Military Pay Department, and to Paymasters, will become unnecessary, and are to be discontinued accordingly.

It is with much regret the Commander in Chief has felt himself obliged to confirm the Sentence so justly passed upon an Officer of Lieutenant Armstrong's experience and standing in the Service, but His Excellency relying upon the sincerity of the contrition expressed by Lieutenant Armstrong for the great Crime he has been guilty of, and trusting to his solemn assurance of hereafter abstaining from conduct so incompatible with his situation as an Officer, is pleased to remit the punishment, and directs Lieutenant Armstrong to be released from arrest, and to return to his duty.

The General Court Martial of which Colonel Hawker is President, is dissolved.

SENTENCE.—The Court, having found the Prisoner Michael McGuire, Private No. 52 of the F Company, Madras European Regiment, guilty as above stated, doth sentence him to receive one thousand (1000) lashes, on his bare back, with a cat o' nine tails, at such time and place as His Excellency the Commander in Chief may be pleased to appoint, and afterwards to be drummed out of the Service.

Major F. P. Stewart, Deputy Judge Advocate General, will conduct the Proceedings of the Court, to whom the Names and Rank of the Officers ordered for this duty, is to be sent.

Prisoners and Evidences are to be warned, and are hereby ordered to attend.

The Commander in Chief has observed with considerable regret, that the Quarterly Reports of the progress of Officers in the study of the Native Languages, do not exhibit so general an attention to this important duty, as His Excellency had expected from his orders, and advice would have been manifested, therefore directs, that Officers commanding Corps in which vacancies of Regimental Staff Appointments may occur, will forward to Head Quarters, the names of such Candidates only, as may be prepared to undergo an examination in the Hindostanee language; and the Commander in Chief will appoint Officers duly qualified either at the Presidency, or Out-Station, to examine, and report upon the qualifications of such Officers.

However important, and necessary the acquirement of language may be, yet, it must be understood, that it will not form an exclusive claim, although an indispensable pretension to Regimental Staff employ general character, exemplary conduct, and attention to professional qualifications, being equally essential to the attainment of such distinction.

Officers commanding corps are enjoined to be punctual in making particular enquiries after individuals of the corps under their respective command, who may be admitted into Hospital, that their cases may be brought to the notice of the Officers commanding the Stations, at which they may remain.

Officers commanding Divisions of the Army, Subsidiary and

(77)
Field Forces are requested in performing their Annual Tours of Inspection, to ascertain that none, but Individuals labouring under such diseases as prevent them proceeding to join their respective corps, are permitted to remain in Garrison or Field Hospitals.

The particular attention of commanding and Staff Officers is required to the rules of the Service in immediately notifying to their respective corps, the admission of Soldiers into Hospitals when absent from their corps on furlough or duty.

It having been brought to the Commander in Chief's notice in frequent instances of reference to Regimental Records, that corps have during the late service, in which the Army was employed, left their Records behind them in different Garrisons. The Commander in Chief is pleased to direct, that Officers commanding corps, will adopt immediate measures for returning them to its Head Quarters, and directs General Officers will at the periodical Inspections, report when any such are deficient, and commanding Officers respectively, will be held responsible for their completion and are immediately to account for deficiencies.

There are few instances, in which it may be necessary for corps to leave their Records behind--there being an ample provision made by Government for the conveyance of them, and the practice in future is strictly forbidden, without special authority from the Commander in Chief,

The following Extracts from General Orders issued by His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, are by His Excellency's orders published to the Army serving under this Presidency.

Extract from the Proceedings in continuation of a European General Court Martial assembled at Meerut on the 24th day of September 1822 by order of Brigadier Thomas Shuldharn, Commanding the 2d Division Field Army and in virtue of a Warrant under his Hand and Seal (being thereunto authorized by a warrant from His Excellency the Most Noble the Commander in Chief under date the 23d day of December 1813 and addressed to the Officer Commanding the aforesaid Division), for the trial of Captain and Brevet Major Everard of H. M. 14th Regiment of Foot, and of all such prisoners as may be brought before it; and re-assembled by order of Major General Thomas Reynell, c. b. Commanding the said Division at Meerut on Monday the 9th day of December 1822 for the trial of Lieutenant Robert Stewart Macgregor of the 2d Battalion 17th Native Infantry.

President.—Lieutenant Colonel John Burnet, c. b. 2d Battalion 17th Native Infantry.

Judge Advocate.—Captain W. P. Cooke, Deputy Judge Advocate General 2d Division Field Army.

Interpreter.—Lieutenant G. R. Pemberton, Interpreter and Quarter Master 2d Battalion 28th Native Infantry.

CHARGES.—“ Lieutenant Robert Stuart Macgregor of the 2d Battalion 17th Regiment Native Infantry placed under an arrest on the following charges, viz.

“ 1st.—For scandalous, infamous conduct such as is unbefitting the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in appearing upon the parade of his Corps at Lodheannah on the morning of the 5th of September 1822, and thon and there mounting his picquet in a state of intoxication.”

“ 2d.—For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer, in having on the same morning, viz. the 5th of September 1822 when conducting his Picquet to its post, taking Ramdial Sing Sepoy of the 3d Battalion Company 2d Battalion 17th Regiment Native Infantry from the ranks and after causing him to be divested of his accoutrements, having unwarrantably ordered him to be severely flogged on his back with a rattan or small cane by two Non-Commissioned Officers, in succession, in front of the picquet which was halted for that purpose.”

“ 3d.—For unjustifiable conduct in having subsequently on the same morning ordered the said Ramdial Sing to be placed on extra duty for the space of four hours, and that he should not be allowed the usual leave for the purpose of going to cook his victuals, thereby shewing an unrelenting, oppressive and cruel disposition.”

“ 4th.—For conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer, in having on the same morning, viz. the 5th of September 1822 when conducting his picquet to its post, taken Sewloll Sing alias Sewah Sing Sepoy 6th Battalion Company 2d Battalion 17th Regiment Native Infantry from the ranks, and after causing him to be divested of his accoutrements, having unwarrantably ordered him to be flogged with a rattan or small cane by a Non-Commissioned Officer in front of the picquet, which was halted for that purpose.”

“ 5th.—For disobedience of station orders and neglect of duty in having on the 5th September 1822 absented himself from his picquet

" from the hour of seven in the morning till five or six o'clock in the evening of that day."

" 6th.—For scandalous and unwarrantable conduct, such as is unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in having on the morning of the 7th September 1822, on Parade, grossly insulted Ensign W. J. Phillott of the same Corps by applying to him the epithet of " Blackguard," adding that he (Ensign Phillott) was to consider himself insulted, having no other provocation for such conduct than that in the performance of an imperative duty he (Ensign Phillott) had reported the circumstance of Ramdial Sing Sepoy in the Company of which he had charge, having been maltreated by the prisoner on the morning of the 5th September 1822, such conduct being disgraceful to the character of Lieutenant Robert Stuart Macgregor, subversive of good order, and military discipline, and in breach of the Articles of War."

CHARGES — Lieutenant W. H. Weller of the 2d Battalion 2d Regiment placed in arrest by my order, and charged on complaint of Lieutenant and Brevet Captain R. M'Leod, Sub Assistant Commissary General, with conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman—first, in writing an anonymous paper or letter, intended for the aforesaid Captain M'Leod, of a low, shameful, and improper nature, evidently calculated to insult, or provoke that Officer, and which was found in his tent about the night of the 1st Instant,—and secondly, in going afterwards to the abovementioned Captain M'Leod's tent about the evening of the 2d Instant in a state of intoxication, and behaving towards him in a riotous, provoking and insulting manner.

2dly. For a breach of the Articles of War, and disobedience of orders, in being in a state of intoxication, and quitting the lines without leave on the evening of the 2d Instant, when on the duty of the Officer of the Day.

3dly. For conduct highly insubordinate in evincing a determined perseverance in misconduct in the above instances and otherwise, in spite of repeated reprimands and warnings against his irregularities and disorders, subversive of good order, and pernicious as an example to the younger Officers of the Corps.

SENTENCE.—The Court having maturely considered all that has appeared in evidence before it both on the prosecution and the defence, is of opinion—On the 1st Charge, that the Prisoner Lieutenant W. H. Weller 2d Battalion 2d Regiment is “guilty of conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and a Gentleman—first, in writing an anonymous paper or letter, intended for Captain M'Leod, Sub Assistant Commissary General of a low, shameful, and provoking nature, evidently calculated to insult and provoke that Officer, and which was found in his tent about the 1st of April last—and secondly, in going afterwards to the abovementioned Captain M'Leod's tent about the evening of the 2d April, and behaving towards him in a riotous, provoking and insulting manner”—but acquits him of being “in a state of intoxication.”

On the 2d Charge, the Court finds the Prisoner “guilty of disobedience of orders in quitting the lines without leave on the evening of

the 2d April when on the duty of the Officer of the day," but acquits him of "being in a state of intoxication."

On the 3d Charge, the Court finds the Prisoner " guilty of conduct, highly insubordinate, in the above instances, in spite of repeated reprimands and warnings, subversive of good order and pernicious as an example to the younger Officers of the Corps," but acquits him of the other parts of the Charge.

The Court finds the Prisoner guilty of the 1st Additional Charge.

The Court finds the Prisoner guilty of the 2d Additional Charge.

The Court having found the Prisoner guilty as above, sentences him, Lieutenant W. H. Weller, 2d Battalion 2d Regiment to be dismissed from the Service of the Honorable Company.

Charges preferred against Lieutenant D. Armstrong of the 2d Battalion 3d Regiment, by Lieutenant Colonel C. Bishop, Commanding the same Corps.

BELLARY, 9th May 1823.

1st.—For conduct highly derogatory to the character of an Officer and a Gentleman in using language at the public Mess of the Corps in the evening of the 8th May 1823, of a most grossly scurrilous, indecent and vulgar nature.

2d.—For unofficerlike conduct in addressing scurrilous, and pointedly insulting language to Lieutenant Richardson of the 2d Battalion 3d Regiment (who was at the time Vice President of the Mess) at the public Mess of the Corps in the evening of the 8th May 1823.

3d.—For having made use of a disrespectful expression to Lieutenant and Brevet Captain Marr of the 2d Battalion 3d Regiment, the Senior Officer present at the Mess, when Lieutenant and Brevet Captain Marr in the execution of his duty (and in obedience to the orders I had issued in presence of Lieutenant Armstrong only two days previous) ordered his Lieutenant Armstrong to consider himself under arrest.

4th.—For having in all the instances above specified acted in positive disobedience of orders addressed to him "in common with others" by me, at a meeting of the Officers of the Corps at my Quarters on so recent a date as the 6th Instant.

The Commander in Chief cannot publish the foregoing sentences to the Army, without declaring his full concurrence in the remark which the Court has attached to the proceedings on Lieutenant Weller's trial, the nature of the evidence is in many instances so glaringly contradictory, that His Excellency cannot reconcile to himself, how witnesses on their oath, and professing the principles of Officers, and Gentlemen, could in a simple matter of fact, so pervert the acts they had witnessed, at a moment they had the responsibility, and moral obligations of an oath before them.

The example which both the foregoing trials have exhibited of indecency of language, contempt of decorum, want of respect towards superiors, irregular and intemperate habits and familiarity, unrestrained by respect, are of rare occurrence in this Army; but even any such instance in a community tenacious of character, and conduct, cannot pass without animadversion and warning; and the Commander in Chief reluctantly, but compelled by a sense of duty, warns the Officers he now alludes to, that unless the examples before them, tend to reform their conduct, the fate of Lieutenants Weller and Armstrong must overtake them.

Lieutenant G. M. Annesley of the 22d Regiment Native Infantry is removed from the Pioneers, and ordered to join his Corps forthwith.

The General Court Martial of which Lieutenant Colonel Campbell, His Majesty's 46th Regiment is President, is dissolved

Assistant Surgeon R. H. England of the 1st Battalion 23d Regiment, is permitted to proceed to the Shevaroy, and Chendamungum Hills in the vicinity of Salers, and Trichinopoly; and directed to place himself under the orders of the Medical Board.

1ST JULY 1823.

The Commander in Chief has great satisfaction in publishing the annexed Extract from the Minutes of the Honorable the Governor in Council, and His Excellency requests Lieutenant Colonel Munro will accept his acknowledgments for the zealous exertions he gave in preserving the uniform good conduct of the Detachment under his command, composing the Escort of His Highness the Nuwaub of the Carnatic during his late tour.

Major Edwards, Commanding the 2d Battalion 8th Regiment, and Captain Jeffries, Commanding the Detachment of the 6th Regiment Light Cavalry (which Troops composed the Escort) are also entitled to the Commander in Chief's approbation for the unremitting attention displayed by those Officers respectively, in furtherance of the instructions given to them, on the occasion now alluded to.

From the commencement to the termination of the journey, not a single complaint was made to His Highness against any of the men either Cavalry or Infantry, while to their steady behaviour and attention to discipline he chiefly ascribes the peace and good order which at all times prevailed in his camp. These circumstances you will, he trusts, do him the favour to bring under the early notice of Government.

ORDERS OF GENERAL IMPORT.

- 7 Mark of approbation bestowed on Subadar Siad Hussain of the Honorable the Governor's Body Guard for eminent services rendered to Major General Sir J. Malcolm, while serving as Native Aid-de-Camp to that Officer.
- 9 G. O. of the 4th March 1815 republished—desiring all Letters, Reports, &c. to Head Quarters to be forwarded with the opinion of the Officer submitting them, on the subject, with other particulars of information.
- 11 Deputies Judge Advocate General allowed to indent on the Public Stores for Stationery, &c. paying for the same at prime cost—the Indent being passed in the office of the Military Board.
- 11 Commanding Officers to determine the proportion of Ball Ammunition and Flints to be carried by Escorts or Detachments sent from the Head Quarters of European and Native Corps—and when necessary, carriage to be supplied, not exceeding the proportion laid down in the Ordnance Regulations in the Tables for "Field Service."
- 12 An allowance granted for Equipments independently of their full batta, to all Subalterns and Assistant Surgeons of H. M.'s Service, on their first proceeding from Poonamallee to join their Corps after their arrival from Europe.
- 12 A money allowance in lieu of official Camp Equipage granted to all Officers on the Staff, with the exception of the Staff of the Army (who will continue to be supplied as heretofore); and Table No. 3 of the Regulations for the Quarter Master General's Department cancelled, and another placed in its stead—which is attached.
- 17 Extract of a letter from the Honorable Court of Directors to the Supreme Government under date the 22nd of March 1802—regarding the time, that Officers absent under regular permission to the Cape of Good Hope or other Settlements, being included in their length of Service in calculating the period required to entitle them to retire on full pay.
- 18 Extracts of Letters from the Honorable the Court of Directors in the Military Department under dates the 29th May, 5th and 26th June, 17th and 24th July, and 21st August 1822.
- 19 Extract of a Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors in the Military Department under date the 26th June 1822—Subaltern Officers of King's Regiments returning to England being allowed an advance of Pay at rates superior to those issued in that Country to Subalterns proceeding to India, passage money being allowed in both cases—advising that the rates authorized to them, both to and from India, when passage money is allowed, are for Lieutenants 4*s. 8d.*, and for Ensigns 3*s. 8d.* per diem.
- 20 Extract of a Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors in the Military Department under date the 13th March 1822—respecting the merits and services of Major Court, late Resident of Palambang and Banca; of Captain Forbes, 1st Assistant, and Lieutenants Jourdan and Hanson; and of Captain Dalglairns who filled the Offices of Sub Treasurer and Deputy Paymaster General at Java.
- 20 With reference to G. O. of 6th September 1822, the option of residence conferred on Native Pensioners, confined to the Station or District they may choose on first being transferred to the Pension List;—on any change of residence becoming necessary, application to be made to the Superintendent of Pensions, without whose authority no removal will take place. Civil Authorities in whose Districts Native Pensioners are residing required to furnish the Superintendent with a Register of the names, rank, class and residence, and with Monthly Returns of Pensioners mustered and paid by Collectors, &c., &c. &c.
- 27 On Dress.
- 48 Commanding Officers scrupulously to attend to the description of Men enlisted for service, &c.—Reviewing Officers to discharge or reject all who do not correspond with the Regulations.
- 45 Unclaimed shares of Prize Money for the capture of Copul Droog having been deposited in the Government Bank—Commanding Officers to institute enquiries whether any individual under their command has a claim to such Prize Money—if any, Nominal Roll to be prepared stating the Corps and Company or Troop to which he was attached at the time of Capture—Vouchers necessary to support the claim to be forwarded by Commanding Officers, to the Adjutant General prior to the 1st May 1823, in default of which, claimants excluded the benefit of the distribution in India—Officers in charge of European or Native Pensioners to explain to them the nature of the orders on this subject.
- 50 Officer Commanding a District or more Stations than one, (not being a division of the Army), being absent from Head Quarters, but not beyond the limits of his Command, the Officer left in temporary charge to draw the same allowances as authorized on account of Government Commands, when the Officer Commanding may be absent on duty,—and on such occasions the Officer Commanding report the cause of his absence.
- 50 Assistant Surgeons of His Majesty's Service in medical charge of Corps, restricted to the Batta and other allowances of their regimental rank in the same manner as Assistant Surgeons of the Honorable Company's Service.
- 51 No retrospect on the subject of rank shall be made beyond twelve months, from the date of the General Order, under which the date of rank of the Officer claiming alteration shall have been first fixed.
- 51 Allowances authorized to the different Corps of the Army for the drawing of Arms, and in lieu of materials for the repair of Arms and Accoutrements, to be drawn monthly in place of quarterly, as heretofore.
- 51 The provisions of the 47th Para. 3d Section of the Regulations for the Quarter Master General's Department under the head "Camp," authorizing Lascars to certain Officers in the Field, to

- apply to General and Officers Commanding Divisions when absent from Head Quarters on public duty. All Officers to whom reference have been made, to hire Lascars when those of the Establishment is not available—the circumstance being certified by the Quarter-Master of Brigade or Officer in charge.

O. of the 19th September 1819, Officers recommended to proceed to Europe on sick certificate to repair to the Presidency for that purpose—When the state of health of an Officer renders it necessary to embark at the nearest port, the Medical Certificate to be countersigned by the Superintending Surgeon of the Division or Senior Medical Officer on the spot.
- 57 Sashes to form the part of the Clothing of the Non-Commissioned of the Veteran Battalions, Pioneers or Gun Lascars for the future.
- 57 Modification of the rates of compensation and off-reckoning of Subadars and Jemadars of Gun Lascars.
- 63 Officers Commanding Corps of Horse Artillery and Light Cavalry authorized to Indent on the Agent for Army Clothing for Woollen Cloth for Trowsers, which is to be issued at the Invoice price, as provided for by G. O. 20th December 1814. Indent to be certified at the Adjutant-General's Office. Regulations established regarding the mode of indenting for Broad Cloth, on the Agent for Army Clothing for Turbans and Trowsers for Native Corps. Forms of Indent and Certificate are attached.
- 64 The 95th para. page 318 of the Pay Regulations under which the personal allowances of Staff Officers have been drawn in their absence by the Acting Staff Officers, rescinded. Those allowances not to be drawn until the return of the parties, under the General Regulations of the Service, by themselves or by the Heads of their Departments. Allowances for Office Establishments or Public Servants to be drawn by the Acting Staff Officer in the same manner as if the Staff Officer himself was present.
- 65 Extract from a Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors under date the 18th of September 1822.
- 65 A modification of the Regulations of the Military Pay Department—taking effect from the 1st of May 1823.
- 66 No Officer, not having served a specified number of years in the performance of Regimental or Staff duty with Corps, to be appointed to situations in the General Staff of the Army, &c.—General Orders of the 9th October 1810, and 29th October 1813 cancelled.

- 83 Establishment of Artificers, and allowances for Writers and Stationary, of the Head Quarters and Light Field Division Hyderabad Subsidiary Force in the Doab, fixed.
- 84 Statement of the proportion of Off-reckonings payable in advance to Colonels of Regiments and Shares in the General Fund on account of the year 1822.
- 85 Extracts from Letters from the Honorable the Court of Directors in the Military Department under dates the 23d October, the 6th and 29th November, and the 4th of December 1822.
- 101 Medical Officers, Sub Assistant Surgeons or First Dressers placed in charge of European Invalids on the march from one Station to another entitled to the sum of two Annas per diem and no more for each Invalid; the sum to be charged to the Surgeon of the Corps to which the Invalids belong, &c.
- 101 Para. 1, Section 12 of the Code of 1816 rescinded—No Officer holding Government Command to be ordered away on Court Martial or other duty, without the approbation of Government—Officers holding Government Commands may be ordered on Court Martial at their own Stations, without reference to Government.
- 102 One Petty Mahr of Bamboo Coolies to be attached to each Regiment of Light Cavalry or Battalion of Native Infantry, when marching from one Station to another, or when employed in the field.
- 106 Record of the report of the Board of Officers relative to the attainments of Lieutenant A. M'Farlane of the 5th Regiment Native Infantry in the Hindooostane Language.
- 110 Allowances authorized for Writer and Stationary to Commanding or Staff Officers at certain Stations of the Army, in consequence of the permission granted to Native Pensioners to reside at any Station, to be applicable to all Stations at which fifty or more individuals holding Certificates may reside—Ten Rupees to be drawn where the number of Pensioners may fall short of fifty or not less than ten.
- 110 The 32d para. of the Barrack Regulations published in G. O. under date the 24th of January 1812 applicable to Iron Barrack Cots when issued to the Troops—Table of Rates of Stoppages established for repairing Iron Cots or parts of them which may be lost or damaged.
- 122 Extract from the Minutes of the Honorable the Governor in Council dated the 20th June 1823—Letter of the Government Agent at Chepauk, expressing the satisfaction of the Nywaub with the uniform good conduct of the Troops composing his escort during his tour to the Southward.
