


joiced at the feast, Sarah saw this bold boy mocking her son. She was so much vexed, that she asked Abraham to turn the boy out of the house as well as his mother.

of the baby Moses in the ark, and of Elijah fed by ravens.



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In this country the ass is despised, being chiefly used by washermen to carry their clothes. It does useful work, and is contented with the coarsest grass.

In some parts of the world, asses are large and fine animals, and are much used for riding. In early times among the Jews, rich men rode on asses, as there were then no horses kept in the country. White asses, which were scarce and valuable, were considered fit for judges. When Saul was met by the prophet Samuel, and told he was to be king, he

was searching for his father's asses, which had strayed. After his time, however, many fine horses were brought into the country, and the kings and nobles chose them for riding; and the ass was left to be used by the poorer people. The horse was also specially used in war. When Jesus Christ rode into Jerusalem, it was upon a young ass, as foretold by the prophet. Thus He showed His meekness even when the people shouted His praises, and spread their garments to do Him honour. Jesus loves the

humble, "but the proud He knoweth afar off."

Though the ass seems dull and slow, he knows his master, and will sometimes find him out among a crowd of men. God says, "The ox knoweth his owner, and the ass his master's crib; but Israel doth not know, my people doth not consider." Even this dull beast seems more grateful and obedient to its master than men are to God. We often forget our kind Father, who has fed and kept us all our days.

The Bible says that God hates "a lying tongue;" that the devil is "a liar, and the father of it;"

and that those who are guilty of lying, if they die unpardoned, shall be cast into hell.

It is hard for the young to say, "I have done wrong;" but it is the next best thing to doing right.

While lying is soon found out, "the lip of truth shall be established for ever." God is a "God of truth." Try to be like Him.

We should confess the sins of our tongue and all our other sins to God, seeking forgiveness through Jesus Christ. We should also pray, "O Lord, keep the door of my lips."



THE ROSE.
