Charles the Second by the grace of god King of Ingland Scotland [France and] Ireland Defender of ye faith &c to our trusty & well beLoved Wm. Gyfford [ye Agent for our East India Company on the Coast of Cormondell Bay of Bengalla and Governour of Fort St. George to our trusty & well be Loved Matthias Vincent, Cheif factor for our Said Company at Hugly, to our Trusty & well Beloved Christopher Hatton Cheif factor for our Said Company at Metchlapatam, and to the Agent & Cheifs for our Said Company at ye. Said places for ye. time Being or any other place In India, and to all Commanders Officers Souldiers Mariners and all others Serving our Said Company on Shoare or at Sea unto whom thesse presents or ye Authenticque Coppies thereof Shall come or be made known Greeting whereas by our Letter of ye Second of December in you one & thertith yeare of Reign under our signett and Sign manuall directed to our Trusty & well beloved Streynsham Master Esq" the Agent for our East India Company on the Coast of Corromandell and Bay of Bengala & Governour of Fort St. George and to other Psons before named (upon Information given to us that William Alley Commander of an Inglish Ship Called ye Expectation of the Burthen of four hundred Tonn or thereabouts in Confederacy with John Smith James Harrington and others of our Inglish Subjects, not regarding our Loyall [sie] Charter given and granted to our East India Company in ye Thertenth year of our Reign, and In probability to defraud us of our Customs, was designed on a Voyage from Cadiz to Some Ports or places in y. East Indies, & there to Lade India Commodities and to discharge them In forreign Countries In Europe.) we did require them and every of them [not?] to give any assistance Countenance or Incouragement whatsoever unto ye-Said William Ally John Smith James Harrinton and all other our Subjects in Confederacy with them or any of them, or that Should in any kind then or hereafter trade or attempt to trade in any ports or places in ye. East Indies without ye. Licence or Pmission of our Said East India Company according to ye purport of our Said Charter granted to them. And whereas our Said East India Compla | have Since thought good to discharge the Said Streynsham Master from yo Said Imployment and to ordain and Constitute you ye Said William Gyfford their Agent on ye Coast of Choromendell and Bay of Bengalla and Governour of Fort St. George, Thesse are therefore to will & require you & every of you to Looke upon ye. Said W'm. Gifford as the Pson Imployed and Intrusted by our Said East India Company in ye Command [and] Charge above Said, and that you Be aiding and assisting to him [in all] Things, that may be for the welfaire and Benefitt of our Said East India Company according to Law, and Pticularly that you give no assistance Countenance or Incouragement to the Psons before named, acting or concerned in yes Said Ship Expectation or to any others that Shall trade into Those parts Contrary to ye Intent and purport of our Said Charter and so we bid you farewell, Given at our Court at Whitehall ye 12th: day of Janury 1680 in ye two and therteth year of our Reign, By his Majesties Comand.

To All, to whom thesse presents Shall come greeting, Know ye that by vertue of ye Charter of our Soverreign Lord Charles ye Second, by the grace of god of Ingland Scottland France and Ireland King Defender of ye faith &c given and granted to us ye Said Governour and Company bearing Date ye third Day of Aprill, anno Dom: one thousand Six hundred Sixty and one and in you therteenth year of his Said Majesties Reign, Wee said Governour & Company reposeing Speciall trust and Confidence in you fidelity prudence Justice and provident Circumspection of Wm. Gyfford of London Esqr. have made constituted and ordeined, and by thesse pressents doe make constitute and ordein y3 Said Wm Gyfford to be Agent of and for all our Affaires on the Coast of Choromandell and Bay of Bengalla in the East Indies, and also to be our Governor and Commander In Cheife of our fort of St. George and Town of Maderasapatam in the East Indies and of all and Singular the Forts Territories and Jurisdictions thereof, and of all the forces that now are, or hereafter Shall be Imployed for the Service of us, the us Said Governor and Company in ye Said Fort and Town and the Jurisdiction thereof, The said Will: Gyfford to enter upon y. Agency and Government immediately at his arrivall at Fort St. George aforesaid, and to execute all and every y° powers and authorities thereunto appertaining, and to Continue in y° Exercise of y° Same dureing our pleasure, and untill y° Contrary Thereof shall be Signified under y's Seall of the Said Governour & Company and to the End the Said Wm. Gyfford may be the better enabled to order & manage all our affaires, we doe by thesse presents constitute and ordein, that Jos Hynmers John Bridger Tymothy Wilkes John Bigrig Elihu Yale Merchants or any Three or more of them Shall from time to time be a Standing Councell to The said Wm. Gyfford our Agent and Governour, for the manageing all our affaires on yo Coast of Choromondell and Bay of Bengalla, and governing yo Said Fort St. George and Town of Madrasapatam, and we doe hereby give and grant unto our Said Agent and Governour William Gyfford and to our Said Councill aforenamed or you more part of them, whereof our Said Agent to be alwais one. (The whole Councill being duly Sommoned) full power and authority from time to time to rule and govern all and every our factors and Servants under ye Said Agency, and all the Souldiers and Inhabitants of our Said Fort St. George and Town of Madraspatam, and to administer Lawfull Oaths as occasion shall require, and to doe and Pform all Such other actions and Things, and to use and exercise all Such other powers and authorities as by his Majesties Royall Charter aforesaid, our Agent Governour and his Councill in their Severall respective places, where wee the Said Governour and Company have any factors or places of Trade, are authorized to doe according to Such Instructions and directions as he the Said William Gyfford our

Agent and Governour and Councill aforesaid shall from time to time receive under the hands of therteen or more of the Court of Committee of ye Said Company for the time being, whereof the Said Governour or his deputy for the time being to be one, And Wee the Said Governour and Company doe order and require all our factors Servants Officers and Souldiers within the Said Agency and all ye people and Inhabitants of our Said Fort St. George and Town of Madrasapatam to conform submitt and yeild obedience to him the Said Wm. Gyfford our Said Agent and Governour accordingly, and for as much as it is all togeather necessary that in Case of the death or removeall of ye Said Wm. Gyfford before or after his arrivall at Fort St. George, the said Fort and the affaires of our Agency Should be provided for the defence and Government Sooner then at so great a distance wee can be advertised thereof, wee doe therefore by these presents ordain and appoint that in Such Case the fornamed Joseph Hynmers Shall Immediately be and Succeed in ye place and Charge of Agent and Governour upon the arrivall of this years Shipping or any of them at the Fort of S^t. George aforesaid, and In case of the death or removeall as well of yet said Wm. Gyfford as of ye Said Joseph Hynmers, then wee doe constitute and appoint Mr. John Bridger to be Agent and Governour and in Case of his death or removeall the next of degree In Councill, in ye order hereinbefore named to Succeed in ye Said Agency and Government in as full and ample manner and with as Large and Ample powers priviledges and Authorities as are hereby granted to ye Said Wm Gyfford, and we doe hereby revoak annull and repeall and make [void] The Commission by us formerly granted under our Large Sealle unto Streynsham Master Esq. bearing date the Sixteenth day of December one Thousand Six hundred Seaventy five to all Intents and purposes whatsoever. And also wee doe hereby revoak annull and make void all other powers and authorities Then and Since granted to him the Said Streynsham Master as our Agent and Governour or by him granted to any other of our Commission Officers or Servants untill the Same Shall be renewed or Confirmed by us or our new constituted Agent W^m. Gyfford Esq^r. or in Case of y². Said W^m. Gyffords death or absence by Such other Pson as by vertue of this our Commission ought of right to succeed him as aforesaid, In Wittnesse whereof we have hereunto caused the Larger Sealle of ye Said Governour and Company to be put the nine and Twentith day of December in the two and Thertith year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord Charles the Second by the grace of god of Ingland ScotLand France and Ireland King defender of ye faith &ce. annoq Dni: 1680.

Commission and Instructions given by us the Governour and Company of Merchants of London tradeing into ye East Indies unto William Gyfford Esqreonstitud and appointed Governour of Fort St. George and Town of Madraspatam and for Management of all our Affaires on ye Coast of Choromandell and Bay of Bengalla in ye East Indies.

Wee the Said Governour and Company reposeing Speciall Trust and Confidence in you Will. Gyfford Esq^{r.} have Chosen and constituted you according to a commission under our Common Sealle bearing even date with thesse presents to be Agent of & for all our affaires on the Coast of Choromondell and Bay of Bengalla in ye East Indies, and Also to be our Governour and Commander in Cheife of our Fort S^{t.} George and Town of Madrasapatam in the East Indies, and to enter upon the Saide Imployment Immediately upon your arrivall at Fort S^{t.} George afforesaid—

1. First you are Carefully your Selfe to observe all Such orders rules and directions as have Been heretofore or Shall hereafter from time to time transmitted from us under the hands of therteen of or more of y° Court of Committees of y° East India Company, whereof the Governour or his Deputy for y° time Being to be one, or to your Selfe in perticular, or to our Agent and Councill, and you are also to take Care that all others in their Severall places doe observe and Conforme to y° Same, and In management of all our affaires and the government and dispensation of all our factors and Servants you are to mind observe and Act Impartially according to our

directions in our generall Letters and as may be most for our Service without favour fear or other respect on accompt of any private or Pticular recommendation or advises from any whomsoever #ticularly recommended to your Selfe.

- That the printed directions made the 18th: December 1667 herewith delivered you for the Christian and sober Comportment of all our Factors and Servants may Be carefully observed and that whosoever shall contemn or refuse to conforme to ye Said orders may be notified to us.
- That the printed rulles and orders for the management of our affaires and Keeping our Bookes, herewith also delivered unto you, as also all other our rules and directions Since That time made and Sent to our Agents and Councills at fort St. George be Carefully observed and In case of ye neglect or refusall of any Persons in our Service you are to proceed against them according to our former orders in our Letters sent to ye Fort, the Last 3 yeares to our Agent and Councill Then in being and according to thosse rules made in the Bay ye 12 Decembr. at Maddapollam & Metchlapatam ye 10th and 14th January 1679 which wee have ratified & confirmed to you our Agent and Councill by our Shipping now upon departure.
- As soon as it shall please god to arrive you at our Fort St. George weewould have you Immediately to demand and receive from Streynsham Master Esqr. all our ready mony Bookes and papers and with all convenient Speed all the rest of our Concernes and goods in ye godownes houshold goods &c by Inventory whereof Send us a Coppy.
- You are to take care that all our Merchants Factors writers and Apprentices That are within the Severall factories doe Live in ye Companys house or Factory Safe only at the Fort, where wee have a Garrison and the Town under our Government you our Agent and Councill there may Pmit Such as you and they shall think fitt to reside in our Town of Madraspatam and not elswhere.
- That no Inglish men but Such as are in the Companys service are to be Pmitted to reside in any part of India under your Agency but onely at our Fort St. George and Town of Madrasapatam.
- That all possible care be taken to prevent any Inglish out of our shipps or otherwise from entring into ye Service of ye. King of Gulcandagh or any other Prince. in those Countries in regard when They are once Entered it is difficult for them to get of & hereby they become Lost as to ye nation.
- That noe Inglish men whether free or in our Service are to be mitted to [build] houses but where wee have a garrison and ye Sole government.
- When you shall make any Contract for Callicoes which is alwais to be done by Councill the following rulles are to be observed—
- (1) That two peices be taken for musters of every Sort of goods contracted. for & that ye same be Sealled with the companys Sealle, and that one of thesse peices so sealled be annually sent for Ingland with Labells annexed expressing ye price contracted for and ye quantity of peices bought and what number ye Balles are wherein Each Sort are packed.
- (2) That when the Callicoes that are brought into ye Companys wharehouse are to Be passed according to musters and contract that there be three of ye Councill. present or as many as can be Spared, whereof the Agent or Cheife or warehousekeeper to be one to veiw that they be according to Samples and that under their hands that a return be made to ye bookekeeper for his Justification in entring the same; that is what price to enter them, whether ye price contracted for if they be as good or better then he Samples or at a Lower price in proportion to what they are worse then the Samples.
- (3) That the Agent or Cheife take care that at such time of generall veiw all our merchants ffactors as well as Writers or as many as can with conveniency be called to veiw ye goods bought that thereby they may gain knowledge in ye Companys concerns and Skill in ye goods, you are Also to endeavour by all means so to order it, that our Callicoe be carefully packed and that all in a Balle of one Sort be as-

near of a goodnesse as is possible.

You are Pticularly to take care that Such fitt and portable goods be sent for Bantam as shall from time to time be advised you from our Agent & Councill there and that ye said goods be well bought & not over rated.

- 10. In order to $y^{\rm e}$ advance of the trade of our town of Madraspatam wee recommend unto you
- 1. To cause Justice Impartially to be Administrated to all thereby to Induce people to inhabit in our Said Town.
- 2. To Countenance & encourage all Merchants that shall come thither to trade from other parts of India by Pmitting them a free markett and civill Treatment They paying ye Customes and duties established, it hath been a verry great hindrance to ye Trade of our Said Town, that some have heretofore Ingrossed the trade to themselfes and not Pmitted any but what hath possed through their own hands.
- 3. To consider whether the trade of our Said Town may not be further advanced by Looseing the Customes and yet the revenew maintained and Increased by Laying some Small or moderate Impositions on Liquors Tobacco or other Commodities on the consumtion or otherwise as may not be Burthensome to ye people.
- 4. To Examine the title by which we hold ye said Town and whether all the houses there in ought not to pay some Small rent by way of acknowledgment to us as Lords of ye place and If so that you our Agent and Councill doe upon Serious Consideration set such a small quit rent as may not disgust or discontent ye Inhabitants thereof.
- 5. To take care that the Customes & duties setled there be duly and Indifferently Levid and a due account and Rigester be kept thereof in which accompt is to be expressed at what rate and vallue the same is taken.
- 6. To make a perticular Inspection into ye mint to find out any abuses therein and to settle the same in such a way as may be most for our advantage and so as we may have a just accompt thereof, you may examine If there be not a greater advantage in Coining fanams then in Coining Pagodes and If so that as many of that sort that is agreable to justice and Equantity [sic] be Coined keepeing a due proportion with others.
- 7. To consider whether it would not be a great advantage to us and our said Town If a Phyrmaund could be procured from the King of Golcondah to authorize us to Coine Rup's and pice, and in case it shall by you our Agent and Councill on Examination be judged so and that it may be obtained without to great a Charge, we would have you our Agent and Councill endeavour to effect ye same.
- 8. To inquire what the revenew of the Town has been to us for thesse last seaven yeares, and what it is now and send us a perticular thereof, and you may propose to us what other ways and means may be used to Increase ye same.
- 9. Touching private trade which we grant to our Factors and servants we deliver you herewith our printed paper of Pmission of ye 17: October 1679 and moreover we have further enlarged the same giveing Liberty to all our factors and servants at ye Fort and under your Agency to trade in any Commodities to or from Fort St. George to any port or places in the East Indies to the norward of the Equator except to Tonqueen & Formosa They conforming in other matters to ye rules and direction appointed by our printed Indulgence of the 17 October afforesaid registring their goods from time to time accordingly.

Wee haveing thus given so great a Liberty we hope that all our factors and servants will keep within the rulles, and not be so disingenious and unfaithfull, as to Intermeddle with any Trade we have prohibited, we Expect from you and all our servants that you use all endeavours to prevent & discover any private trade that is beyond or contrary to ye Indulgence by us granted and to advise us the Pticulars of what you shall discover with ye names of ye Psons so tradeing contrary to our rulles.

Wee herewith also deliver you the printed Indulgence made ye 25th of August 1680 granted to such of ye owners Commanders and Seamen of the Shipps that are entertained in our Service and doe require you as much as in you Lies to hinder

prevent and discourage all private Trade by them contrary to our said Indulgence & to advise us from time to time what you discover, & to send us ye best proofes you can thereof.

Though the Cheifs and Councills at ye Bay are ordered to Correspond with us directly yet Wee have required them to send duplicates of all to you our Agent and Councill at ye Fort, and we doe expect from & require you carefully from time to time to Puse and examin ye same and to write to us what they doe observe therein to be transacted prejudiciall to our service, and how they conceive our affaires might have been acted more to our advantage, our Agent and Councill are also to write to them their Thoughts thereupon for their better proceedings in future.

- 11. You will understand by our Letters to you our Agent and Councill which you now take with you, that we have taken ye Diamond Trade into ye stock and ye constitutions that we have made concerning that trade, which may prove If well cultivated not only a great profitt to ye Company, but to you our Agent and Councill likewise, it must be your especiall care to prevent all Clandestine and private trade in that Commodity, which doth not only endamage us but our Agent and Councill Likewise, since all Clandestine trade therein, must of necessity not only Lesson ours but your own Commissions, & your share of ye Surplusage profitt thereof likewise.
- Wee have on the Apprehension of your abilities & confidence of your Sincere actings for our Service, given you the encouragement to settle your Sallery at 200 \$\psi\$ annum to commence from your arrivall at fort St George and also of a gratuity of 100 \$\psi\$ an\tilde{n}\$. If you shall be found (as we hope you will) to deserve it but you are to take notice that according to our generall rulles you are to receive but one halfe of your Sallery in \$y^e\$ Country.

And we have entertained John Bevit in degree of a writer for seaven years at y. Sallery of 10 Panú, whom we design to be under you for your assistance in your Pticular Concerns

13. Tho, wee have dismissed M¹. Master from being our Agent & Governour immediately upon y^e arrivall of thesse Shipps, yet it is not our purpose that any disparadgment should be put upon him in y^e Country he behaveing himselfe uprightly and civilly without doeing or causing to be done, Anything to y^e prejudice or Impeding of our Service, & while he shall so Carry himself in your Judgment, it is our expresse orders that in all places wherein there is occasion of his encountring or meeting you or any of our Councill, he shall dureing y^e years time, wee have given him Liberty to stay there retain y^e honour in point of place & precedency of being next your selfe & before M^r. Hynmers our Second, or any other that shall happen to be Second in his stead, and in Case y^e said M^r. Master shall in all things to our Intrest behave himselfe as aforesaid, we would futher have you to gratifie him with his diet for himselfe and Two servants at our Table, and the best Lodging you can accommodate him with in our fort next unto y^r. selfe.

And this our Commission and Instructions you are to produce upon your arrivall at ye fort and cause ye same to be publiquely read at ye said ffort according as we have written in our generall Letter to your selfe & Councill herewith delivered you, dated at ye East India [House?] ye 29th day of December 1680 Will: Thomson Gover: Tho: Papillon Deput., James Edwards, Chandiz, Josia: Child, John Clerk, Rich: Hutchinson, Chris. Boone, John Moore, Sam: Moyer, Ja: Houblon, Tho: Canham, Edward Rudge, Jere: Sambrook, Mathe: Letten.

Finding by your Indentures bearing date ye 16: December 1675, that your five years service for us will be expired by ye: 7: of July next we have after serious debate found expedient for our Service and resolved by ye Ballot, that upon ye arrivall

of this years Shipping at ye Fort you be dismist our Imployment and sent for home by this Shipping, notwithstanding which If it fall out so that by reason of your own businesse you cannot without Damage to your Selfe come home by this years Shipping, in such case we are content That you doe stay within our Town of Madraspatam, and under our government there at your own Charge or otherwise as we have directed by our comission one year Longer to dispatch your own affaires, and If it should so happen that our ships should arrive at our Fort sometime before ye said 7: of July next by which our present Agent Mr. Willi: Gyfford comes to take place, before your fores^d time by Indenture is fully out, we shall however pay you your full Sallery, and gratuity as If you had served us your full time of five years. our now elected Agent Mr. Gyffords arrivall we require you Immediately to resign to him ye place of our Agent and governour and to deliver To him all our mony in Cash all our Bookes writeings and papers and with all Convenient Speed all other our remaines whatsoever, togeather with our fort St. George all ammunition and Artillery and other things whatsoever ibelonging to us according to our Commission and Instructions sent with him, which he will cause to be read to you and ye rest of our Councill Factors Officers and Servants, whereunto we require you and every of them to give due & Intire obedience and If it should please god, that our said new appointed Agent M^{r.} Gyfford Should not arrive with our Shipps we doe then order you to resign ye place of Agent & Governour Immediately to M^{r.} Hynmers and in Case of his death or absence to Mr. John Bridger, whom we have appointed to succeed in that Agency, so we commend you & our affaires to gods protection & rest Your Loveing freinds, Will. Observations made by ye Committee of ye Committee of ye Treasurie about ye affaires of ye Mint at Fort St. George.

The 5 new pagodes Ψ ye golden fleece of ye fort Coine with a Coppy of ye mint bookes and also ye essay of 43 Ingotts of ye Companys gold taken out of nine Severall Chests were recd.

The 5 Pagds: togeather weiged 11 dwt. 1 gr. which is one graine more then They should doe, but weiging them severally one against another they doe all differ a Little one from another, whereby it appears they are not yet so exact in that part, as they ought to be, the Pagds must not be heavier nor finer nor Lighter nor Courser then its Just allowance. The one would prejudice ye Company ye other decry ye Coine in ye Country you need not as wee advised you Last year return us any more Essays of ye Ingotts sent from hence unlesse, you find some verry great mistake or abuse in any one or more Ingotts, for they serve us for no other purpose then what we may be satisfied in, by reserving ye first essays taken here at home, and compareing them with the account and produce of yr Mint Bookes, of which it is necessary we should have a Coppy every yeare, Wee have reessayed good many of ye 43 essays before mentioned which for ye most part, are reported better then when they went out, only one Ingott vizt. No. 4: in Chest No. K, that was then reported but $2\frac{1}{2}$ gr. worse. Is now by double essayings found to be 2 dwt: $1\frac{1}{2}$ gr. worse, so as it appears here is some faults here, as well as with you, which we have often endeavoured but cannot wholy prevent, however we find ye product of ye gold sent out anno 1678: of which this Mint booke gives account to render Better then any former yeare except a few Pticular Chests that were Coined anno: 1677, which was advanced by extraordinary If you looke over ye Companys instructions and reduce ye occasion as then advised. allay of every Ingott, with ye pen by ye Invoice as you have been often desired you would Certainly prevent any great abuse to ye Company, and also verry much advantage yourselfes in knowledge by such experience or experim¹⁸. The medium of 9 Chests that were Coined 1679 as appears by your Mint booke produces 9583 pagds for every 100 Oz: Standard gold 958: 3. You have rightly Credited ye account of Profitt and Losse with 858: 26 for ye over plus of what ye Coinage of Pagodes and Copper Cash produced more then that years Charge of fortifications repaires & erections.

The Court takeing into Consideration how the trade of Diamonds may for ye future be managed for the honour proffitt and advantage of ye Kingdom in generall and Pticularly for ye Intrest of this Company upon serious debate had of ye said affaire have thought fitt & resolved that The sole trade of Diamonds be henceforth appropriated to ye Company and to be prohibited to all other Psons whatsoever.

It is ordered that yo Accomptant generall doe keep an account of yo Diamodal Trade either in bookes a part or in yo generall bookes in such manner and form as That once a year an account of yo Clear proffitt thereof may be made up and perfected.

That ye Commanders and owners of Shipping that shall bring home Diamonds Diamond Bort or synall, be allowed 3 \$\overline{Q}\$ Ct. freight on ye first Cost of ye said goods one Moity of which freight the Commanders shall have as a gratuity for their Care and faithfullnesse in preventing private Trade & Traders in diamonds &ce, and for their encouragement in ye punctuall performance of ye other Covenants in their Charter parties, ye other Moity of ye said freight to be pd. to ye owners to be divided amongst them with ye rest of the ships freight.

As soone as any Pcell of Diamonds &c: is bought & paid for ye president or Agent in ye presence of ye Councell or ye Major part of them is to make up ye Pcell or bulse be it of more or Lesse vallue, & to Sealle it up with ye Companys Smallest Sealle, numbering of it with ye figure of one ye next Pcell with ye figure of 2: and so successively for that whole years Investment begining again in following years at ye first number and upon ye verry Bulse sett ye figures of ye number of Stones.

And for y' further Incouragement of y' Comp', president Agent and Factors being of y^e Councill in any of y^e factories, where Investments for Dyamonds &c. In your Consultation or visitation booke at Hugly dated ye 22: Octobr. 1679 you mention to have found a strange errour of Rupies 36186:5:9 for 39 Chests of Taffitees &c: sent from Cassumbazar to Hughley, whereof 19 Chests were sent us by ye Johanna not Invoyced, which you say doth not appear by ye Invoice or bill of Loading, nor ye Accomptant-Generalls advices, but If you had had ye sight of my papers which I wrote to ye Cheife and Councill in ye Bay in January 167% you would have found that I advised them of this their omission in not Crediting Cassumbezar for that verry article of 36186:5:9 and also for not Chargeing ye according the control of the control o

Currant with ye 19 Chests of Taffitees rec^a by ye Johanna besides in my paper dated in December 1676 I acquainted them of those 3 errours committed to ye Companys prejudice in all 11909: 4:—which now you have Charged to Mr. Clavells accordand likewise of ye 8000 Rups which you say (by Mr. Vincents intimation) is due to ye Executors of Mr. March. But I then guessed it was due to Mr. John Smith who was at That time in Decca—and of many more of their grosse errours I have yearly given them Information, with advise how to prevent Them for time to come but they did not rectifie ye old nor prevent ye new for they grow worse and worse in their accounts, so that I was hope Lesse to have that factorie rectified, but your visitation.

hath settled it, Though I doubt they will not Long continue so.

But to return to ye grosse omission of ye 36186 Rups. you note it to be for 39 Chests and one Case of Taffitees with 4 Balles of Silk but I find by Cassumbuzar Journall L folio 9: That it is for 36 Chests and Two balles of Taffities, 1 Balle raw ditto, 1 Chest or Balle of Europe dy'd Silk, 1 Balle of fflorett yarn and one percell of severall Silkmasters.

You note That Mr. Bugden Saith from one of Ballasore wast bookes that 19 Chests of Taffitees were Shipped on ye Johanna 20 on ye Eagle, and 3 Bales of Silk on ye Surratt merchant, That ye 19 were rece by ye Johanna is true but none by ye Eagle or any silk or floretta varn by ye Surratt Merchant nor by any other Ship more then Invoyet & charged in Their Bookes. But upon Examination I find These following Chests of Taffaties to be more rece then That account is Credited in their Bookes, though ye full number was mentioned in Their Invoices vizt by ye Anne which Shere out of ye two Sloopes 2 Chests fine Taffities, & 2 Bales raw, by ye falcon 10 Chests fine The Johanna 19 and by ye Bengall London and Caesar about 8 Chests.

but how many by Each Ship I cannot know, for in their Journall V. folio 23^d. They mention to have sent by Those 3 Shipps in generall 22016 peices whereas their Invoice is Charged with 23136 and we recd just so many differs with their bookes 1120 ps is above 7 & not full 8 Chests and makes Togeather 40 or 41 Chests or bales, and may answare ye omitted Invoice In vallew, though not in every cell of goods, and by all these mistakes you may Clearly see that at Hughly and Ballasore they have managed the Companies affaires as rediculously negligent as possibly can be done in any factorie.

Since their departure we have concerted y° businesse with Sr. W^m. Langhorne touching y° mony which contrary to our Rulles and practice he tooke out of our Cash before his comeing from y° fort, which he hath undertaken to pay unto you for our use being 3234 pag^{ds}: togeather with y° usuall intrest of the Country till y° time of payment, as by his obligation under his hand [and?] Sealle (coppy whereof is here inclosed) appeares, wee therefore require you to take care that y° mony both for principle and

Intrest according to ye rate of Intrest in your parts of India from ye time it was taken out of our Cash there till ye time of its repayment be received into our Cash and brought to Our Creditt in account and advise us Pticularly thereof that so we may deliver him up his bond.

Wee observe that Mr. Edward Littleton our Cheife at Cassambuzar hath sent home for his own Account by ye Last Shipping, some quantities of Bengall Taffities, the same as ours and verry good Coulours, 30 yards Long only they were made of a different breadth on design to elude our orders, wherein he hath mistaken himselfe, we had a verry good opinion of Mr. Littleton for his carefull management of our affaires, but this action of his doth give us cause to doubt of his Integrity and faithfullnesse to our service, and in case he shall after this admonition, set on foote this or any such like method of private makeing and Tradeing in Commodities of ye nature with those we reserve to our Selfes, we shall not only change our opinion of him, but be necessitated to send for him, for we cannot suffer those we Imploy and committ our affaires to thus to undermine our Trade, of this we require you to give him notice, & transmitt his ausware to us by ye next shipping. Haveing had a saille of ye raw Silk wee recd. this Last year from you, wee think fitt to give you this following advise vizt.

That ye white raw Silk No. G being 8 bales by ye Nathaniell which cost 1 Rup: 4 ann. \$\Psi\$ seer proved well therefore procure us 100 bales of ye same or what more you can get and be carefull it be even and Cleane.

Of ye white Silk h being 9 bales \$\P\$ do ship which cost 1 Rupe. \$\P\$ Seer send us 100 bales thereof, of ye white Silk I. being 13 bales \$\P\$ do ship which cost 12 ann \$\P\$ Seer, proves not so advantagious to us as ye other sorts, therefore send us not above 40 bales of it unlesse it may be had a little finer, but what you provide thereof must be even, and as near as you can of one & ye same goodnesse all other sorts of silk by ye Nathaniell prove good.

We have not els to adde but committing you to ye protection of ye Almighty we remaine.

2. With this we send you Coppies of all our Letters wrote to our former Agent Coppies of and Councill at ye fort, since our generall Letter wrote by our Last yeares shipping and now we shall proceed to answare ye Last Letter we had from Agent Master and our Councill there by this yeares Shipping bearing date ye 27: of January and Second of february Last.

3. The first Paragraph we encounter is your scornfull Excuse of your unmannerly A check to passages of your former Letters wherein you say you crave our pardon for your Mr. Master for his soon. plainnesse, and conclude that you usually write as you ought with obsequiousnesse full method in which you betray your own weaknesse, first in supposeing we cannot judge between of writeing. plainesse and Insolence, 214. in running yourselfe upon ye same rock on which your Predecessour splitt, which If our Agent had been as well versed in history as he is in ye vain ostentatious pomp of India, he would never have been guilty of whatever errour he might have fallen into your pride in thinking yourselves too good or too bigg to acknowledge a fault so obvious & notorious that no Indefferrent man can read your lres, nor ye best freind you have though not of ye Committee, without wondring at your intollerable presumtion & indiscretion.

4. Wee would have you forthwith sell or pull down Mr. Fleetwoods house Mr. fleetbringing ye proceed of ye materialls to his Creditt, for ye rest we shall sue his security

small hopes of freeing ye but yet no endeavours to be wanting.

5. Upon frequent discourse with Mr. Knox here lately come from Zeilon wee are of freeing ye satisfied nothing can be done by you at present for ye redemtion of those English researt Zeilon that remain upon that Island, but we have it under consideration to force a Trade there hereafter, but in ye mean time if you should have an oppertunity of doeing any thing for your Countrymen omitt it not.

6. Wee are of your opinion that it may be best to have a power to execute notorious Malefactors there where they are sentenced, and such power upon application will be readily granted, but in regard that probably ye Pliament may take into deliberation ye trade of India, now it is grown so considerable and nationall wee think fitt to desire no new additions to our Charter at present.

8. Wee have read over all your consultation booke and considered well of our Losse and gaine by Agent Masters progresse (as wee may call it) being attended with such a princely Traine and Charge, as we would be unwilling not to acknowledge what was well done, so we must reprove what we think was a misse, and to be plaine with you (not in that ironicall sence you used that word as is before menconed) but in truth and reality, wee doe think our Losse and Expense thereby doth much over Ballance any advantage we have or may hereafter reap by it, for 1st. we doe observe ye expence was veary great ye retrenchments of Charge in ye sever'l factories are verry slight, your orders concerning that being mostly in generall Termes, and reduced to no kind of certainty, and If you shall say yo Pticulars could not be ascertained, as you doe in some of your said orders, sure ye annuall disbursment, might have been stinted within some certain bounds as it is at Surratt and Lately at Bombay.

9. Next we observe yt you doe profusely give order at all places for great Inlargm's. in Brick buildings some probably there might have been absolute necessity for but that there should be such great need in every place on a sudden seemes strange and extravagant, and not withstanding what you say of ye Dutch reassuming their Drums and Pipes we are satisfied, and better informed from others. though they doe use their Drums & Pipes still, yet they have prudently retrenched verry much of their Charge, in all places of India, besides as we have told you formerly our Case is not theirs and we hope never will be in that respect we goe to ye markett with ready mony in our hands, those that must be trusted have need to make ye finer outside.

10. Next wee doe utterly dislike your rejecting ye Pettepolee Merchants and worse your makeing us pay 500 Pagds for ye Losse wee had by that indiscretion if you answare that mony was well given, for by it we got yo abatement of 8: p. Co: upon all ye Metchlepatam Investments, we must tell you we would gladly force ourselves to hope you Intended it so, but whether you did or no, god allmighty (who is ye searcher of hearts) only knows, but in fact, it proves fraud upon us, and all our goods (generally speaking) from thence doe come dearer this yeare then ever they did since we had a trade in that place, and worse sorted esspecially Long cloath and Sallampores, ye fault probably might be in ye poons intrusted with ye sorting of ye goods, and If you be of opinion, as wee are that so it was, wee doe require you without sorters out of further examination to send down one or two trusty \$\Psi\$ sons from ye Fort to be of Councill, and to do that businesse there and turn those unfaithfull servants forthwith out of our service with shame and disgrace.

Had you dealt with ye pettopollee merchants as well as with thos of Maddapollam, and packd yo goods of each of those three places by themselves (which for y' future we enjoyn you to give directions to be continually observed) wee should have been able at all times to observe by ye goods here, which of those sort of Merchants served us best, and which of our factors sorted our goods best according to musters, and accordingly have ordered ye restraint or enlargement of our Investments with any of them of which wee shall write you more in an after Paragraph.

12. Wee observe all you write of ve advantages of stocks before hand, concerning which we wrote you our opinions Last yeare, which wee doe now confirm your argueing concerning that matter wee doe not dislike and ye Method of sending consultations and consultations, and accounts of Cash Monthly to ye head factory, wee doe he sent to ye so well approve of, we doe enjoyn you without favour or forbearance, to turn out any beat to two from our service of what quality or degree so ever they be that you shall find every month. remisse in that Pticular, the like wee say of any that shall make a private use, of ye Least part of our Stock in any place, both being crimes wee will admitt of no excuse for, esspecially since we have so generously allowed to all our servants a free Trade to all places within our Charter, except to and from Europe which ye Dutch never did, nor will as wee suppose.

13. Wee observe what you write in that paragraph concerning buildings y' you will consider our Intrest therein as if they were your own Pticular concern so farre as a Pticular can bear proportion with a nationall, which words though they are fairly exprest doe seem to carry a meaning in them which wee cannot approve in you, concern about and doe believe is a notion Agent Masters carried too farre to our damage in his Late progresse, ye Company is nationall but you are our servants, Live in grandure and doe greatly augment your estates by our favour, and you must (if you will be honest) observe our commands without respect to futurities, which we are ye proper Judges of are resolved in our own businesse, notwithstanding we shall never think amisse of any modest advice you shall give us for our present benefitt or y" future advantage, of ye Inglish East India Trade but wee are possitively resolved yt wee will be obeyed by all that serve us there; whatever Losse wee may sustaine by repeated change of them.

14. Wee are in your Letters troubled with Long Sections concerning y" method Mr. Masters of Succession, you make y' Doctrine more intricate then y' text, and at Last a use shamefully contradictory to either of them as you did in ye case of our old and good servant Mr. Job Charnock, who had ye right indisputably of succession as you call it, besides our expresse order to be cheife of Cassambuzar a Pson that hath served us faithfully above 20 yeares, and has never as wee understand been a proller for himselfe beyond what was just and modest who therefore wee are resolved shall not Live unrewarded by us, our Letters were plaine enough that he should be Cheife of Cassambuzar, and at ye same Time Second of ye Bay in degree, and to succeed Mr. Vincent as Cheife of ye Bay in case of his death or removeall, his staying at Pattana to dispatch ye Peter boats was his care and duty to our service, that being a matter of such concernment as he verry well knew to ye dispatch of our Shipps, and therefore Agent Master did verry ill and contrary to his duty and ye trust reposed in him in takeing hold of that pretence to dispossesse an honest man, of ye Just reward of his fidelity due to him by all right, wee doe therefore require our Agent Gyfford and Gouncill that upon your arrivall at y' Fort, you doe immediately dispatch an Expresse to Mr. Charnock, with ye contents of so much of this Letter as concernes him and our affaires at Pattana, ordering him therein with all possible expedition to settle all our affaires there and Leave them in a regular and due method and from thence presently repaire to Cassambuzar to take veremaines from Mr. Littleton and ye possession of our factory and affaires as Cheife at Cassambuzar and that M. As to ye querees you make concerning succession of our Cheifes at Madapollam & Metchlepatam and ye systemn you give us for a new Settlement you have puzled yourselfe and us so long with that kind of grammar, that we are weary of it and doe resolve, that except what hath been said before in ye case of Mr. Charnock and Mr. Littleton and except what our Selves may hereafter direct, that all Psons shall hold ye same Stations and be at ye same Salleries they were by ye List now sent if Agent home, other then such as our Agent Gyfford and Councill shall find cause to Expell out any Pson our Service for unfaithfullnesse, misdemeanors or neglects, and in such case we would for misdemean have those, next below in degree if they be disserving, to supply y" roomes of those succeed. that shall be deceased or soe rejected till our further order be known,

- 17. If any Pson beside those six first named in y title or front of this Letter should be removed into y Councill no such Pson (not named as aforesaid, shall have vote or suffrage, therein after y arrivall of these shipps, or any other be reed into councill but in ease of y decease of any of y is before named without our own expresse order, notwithstanding wee doe direct and order you our Agent Gyfford, and Councill so constituted as aforesaid to preferre M John Davis and M Vincent Sayon to some of y Councell in y Bay or Matchlepatam upon y next vacancy or occasion, and if there should be occasion for y Cheife of y Bay at any time to be at Fort S George he may take his place between y third and fourth in Councill but that his more honoris gratia Then for businesse.
- 18. Wee do agree with you that neglecting to Ballance and Coppy y bookes of Accounts within a month after y day prefixed in which they ought to be ballanced May be of greater prejudice to us, then a Cheife not sending y Dyary and Accompts of Cash monthly, but neither of them is tollerable and both may be cured if you doe execute without partiallity y orders made in y Bay y 12 of December, and at Maddapallam and Metchlepatam y 10: & 14: of Janu; Last which we doe hereby confirme, and require you to forbeare none of our servants neglect of y execution of them, to which purpose wee shall send you 6: or 3: adult \$\psi\$sons this yeare who shall reside at y fort & there be verst in our businesse, and from thence shall be sent as occasion offers or as you our Agent and Councell shall judge them fitting to be of Inferiour Councills in y Bay Metchlep and other places in y roome of others deceased or displaced where you shall find any of our servants to neglect their duties our orders or other orders made by you for our service.
- 19. Wee shall allow nothing to M' Nurse or any such disorderly \$\poldsymbol{\psi}\$ sons and wee expect your care to prevent their being in our houses or at our tables to be an ill example to others or any Charge to us.
- 20. Wee are informed y^t y^e delay of y^e dispatch of our Shipps in y^e Bay & at Metchlepa^m was occasioned by abundance of private trade; that went and returned up with them, wherefore for y^e future wee doe enjoyn you absolutely to prohibit our Commanders from takeing in any kind of goods to carry from fort S^t George to Metchlepatam or y^e Bay or any other place or to bring any goods from thenee except for y^e Compa for we vallue not those pittifull freights with respect to y^e speedy dispatch of our Shipps.
- 21. You guessed at many reasons that slacked and Lessend our Investments in y^e Bay and probably there may be somewhat in each of them, but we are assured that y^e great quantity of private trade, that went down and up w^{th} Agent Master was likewise no small hindrance which were order to be avoided for y^e future, that we may have cause to continue that boundlesse indulgence were give to our Servants to trade with their own estates to all parts of India.
- 22. How well Mr Hatton Mr Tivill and Mr Wynn have acquitted themselfes this yeare you will understand by y quality of y goods reed from them, If they had not done better formerly, and wee hope they will doe better in y next wee should not trust them to a further experiment.
- Merchants by which wee suppose you mean Verona and his partners makeing their Cloth so bad viz^t dearnesse of Cotton, they cannot Live by y^e price &c. whereas wee know they gaine vast estates by us, and live accordingly & might yet Live Better, if they had not many hard Bargaines forced upon them, on others accounts, not ours, which wee require to be redressed and that M^r Bridger y^e Warehouse-keeper, and y^e \$\Psi\$ son wee design for his assistant be required to hold them strictly to y^e goodnesse of their musters, without that all your contracts how wisely so ever they be made, signific not two farthings, pretending to buy our Cloath 10 \$\Psi\$ C^o. Cheaper then formerly and being in thinnesse and sorting 20 \$\Psi\$ C^o worse.

24. Wee doe not dislike ye manner of your application to us for a further Ye Inventing enlargment of our Indulgences for new Invented Stuffes but y' matter of it we doe of new totally reject haveing found by experience that new stuffes work upon ye old ones stuffes proves as dried spratts doe upon red herrings, the former pull downe ye Price of ye Latter though they be not directly the same.

fashion'd ye [Sale of] ve old.

25. Wee take notice of 2: or 3 Paragraphs you write about our Shipping wherein wee observe nothing considerable, but ye proposall, that all ye owners shall take ye oath of a freeman, which wee shall consider of in due time In ye meanwhile, all ye Commanders Mates pursers and Cherurgeons have taken that oath ye rest will keep cold to be further thought of.

26. You cannot two often inculcate our orders that none of our Servants be persons ye Pmitted to have more Sallery paid them then is by our rules Limitted, & in case any doe receive more turn out ye payer and receiver upon ye first knowledge thereof and put more orderly Psons in their places.

Wee shall encrease no Salleries nor make any further allowance to our Dislike of Servants then wee have done, ye late Agent Master haveing so burthened us with motion of that kind, that he hath turned our Stomacks against ym to bee free with you it Lookes like a design of an espousing endearing and setting up a seperate Intrest against your Imployers att home which is as vaine in ye attempt as it would allowances. prove monstruous and detestible in ye event, it is enough that for one \$\psi\$ son wee have occasion to send abroad wee have a hundred Solicitors here, and for any that are abroad if they like not our service and allowances, free liberty they have to Leave them and come home when they will.

29. Tuching intestate Psons not in our service wee shall give no order about Ye Compa their estates, it being not with our good likeing, though it be by our connivance, yt some of them stay there after they are out of our Imployment.

Your dealing with Mr. Chomley Lookes more like a practice to bring him of, then a purpose to discover ye frauds and abuses done to ourselfes and others in ye former years investment of Diamonds, you know well enough that in such a publique way of examination, nothing was like to be discovered and that ye Surer way had been, to have made private enquiries of those abuses, in such cases hereafter we hope you will be more Cordiall to our Intrest, & y' own, knowing y' men y' goe about to deceive us doe but dance in a net wen every body sees through, whilst themselfes think they are under Covering.

31. Wee have retracted ye payment of ye arrears of Sallary at Bombay which no arrears of Sallary to be wee formerly allowed to bee Laid out in Buildings there, and therefore wee shall give no way to ye payment of such arrears for that or any other ends at Fort St. George or ellse where neither doe we yet see cause sufficient to direct all Inglishmens vessells to touch at Fort St. George; or Bombay; notwithstanding all your arguments upon that point seem to have some Shew of reason in them, and something ellse of Touchag at private Intrest.

Your Contracts for Treasure or Comutation of Bullion at Cassambuzar wee Dislike of hope may be for our Service, but Length of time must determine that all your other -Ppetual Contracts wee doe utterly dislike, there being many holes Left for ye Merchants to Creep out at, esspecially while our goods are so ill sorted, but wee should be indispensibly tied, if we should approve of Their perpetuity which wee never will, though for order sake you may goe on in ye same method for your next years investment, and so forward as wee shall see cause and not otherwise.

33. Wee have well considered what you write concerning Decca and Malda concerning factories and upon ye whole matter wee doe resolve to continue Decca factory in ye same hands as formerly or so mony [sic] of them as shall be Liveing when this comes o tories.

to your hands, wee know Mr. Harvey hath parts good enough to do our businesse, as well as his own, and wee hope our kindnesse to him in this resolution will cause him to Exert his utmost diligence in our service and render himselfe in our opinions, a diligent faithfull and gratefull Serv. Besides in regard you say ye same goods may be provided at Maulda as at Decca wee doe rather incline to keep both factories, that wee may judge. By ye goods when they come home, who serves us best in ye price and quality of ye goods, besides which we have an other advantage that by ye said two factories, wee can enlarge our Investments in those kind of Commodities to what degree wee please, whereas we find by experience we pay for it in the quality of our goods, whatever price you accompt upon or agree for.

You give us a relation at Length of y Damage done by y Tempest at Metchlepa^m and y Demand of y merchants for an allowance in consideration of that damage which you put of with good words &c but wee find to our Losse that did not serve their Turn, through y neglect of our store keeper or sorter, for in y quality of y goods they have sufficiently reprised themselfes for that Losse.

Abuse of ye sortment of Longcloth & Sallumpores for Bantam, Agent Gyfford & desired to overlocke ye godownes at yt Leasure.

36. Wee observe what you say in excuse for ye Longcloth sallampoores &c sent by ye Tywan to Bantam, and notwithstanding all that is alledged we have yet too much cause to fear there was an abuse in that sortment, ye rather, because wee see ye same with our own eyes in ye Like goods reed from your place this year, and wee have no cause to think that those for Battam should be better but rather worse, wherefore we doe desire that our Agent Gyfford and all others of ye Councill, as their other businesse will give Leasure, would Looke into the goodownes and Inspect ye sortments of our goods, which is ye maine thing on web our businesse depends as much as upon ye contract it selfe.

Wee wrote you Last yeare verry earnestly to make us full returnes from all 14 full Places, which wee hope you have effected and, wee then promised you that ye Larger returnes been made then our returnes were ye greater Increase wee intended to make of our Stock in Bullion a promise to to you which you will find by our Invoyces that wee have fully # formed and now stocke. we must say ye same thing if ye return of this Stock Doth fully answare our outsett, wee shall goe on in enlargeing proportionably, there being in ye Bay esspecially so many new Sorts of goods and such vent for them here, that ye trade of that place may in a few yeares bee exceedingly enlarged if ye Seed that wee sow (vizt our Stock in ready mony) bee as well cultivated by our people there.

44. The not sending us ye Bay Letters Invoyces &c by this years Shipping The greatgives us too great confirmation of what wee have heard, that they were nesse of your overmuch Crowded and Incumbered with you Burthen of private trade and your frameing the reason Co-partnershipps Indentures &c, which we hope you will take care to prevent ye why ye Bay Damage of hereafter, at that season of ye year when our Shipps are there at other not sent. times when it may not hurt us we wish our Servants as good luck in Tradeing with their own Stocks as they can desire; but if they trade with ours they shall be forthwith dismissed our Service.

45. Though wee have mentioned before wee doe again commend to y' esspeciall order that care ye provideing for us to come by this Shipping 100 tons pegu Sticklack, not so Stick Lacke much for ye account it will Turn to here, as for ye Increase of our Tonage it being be sent home. our endeavour to encrease as much ye navigation of ye Kingdom as our own estates Two bemp and upon that reason wee shall endeavour to send you by these Shipps for ye Bay 2 dressers sent to ye Bay for hemp dressers, and one or 2 Spinners & a Weavor That may put them into a way makeing of of makeing such hempen Saille Cloth as this Kingdom is usually supplied with from sail cloth. France and Holland comonly called Noyles Canvas and Hollands Duck.

46. With this you will receive our generall List of goods to be provided at all places within your Agency, in ye Composeing whereof wee found ourselves at a great Losse, for want of ye Bay Invoices, and were forced to supply that defect as well as wee could by conjecture, and ye account of our Sales here, of which wee have given Agent Gyfford one Coppy and sent another to M' Vincent for your and his Government. You will see by ye List that wee have given you and him great Liberty to enlarge in ye new Sort of goods of which we have had musters this yeare, and if there be as we know there are, many other kinds of which we never had Samples in England, which you may reasonably conjecture, will turn to account, you may send us 6 or 8 Bales of each Sort for ye enlargment of our investment, & makeing our returnes & Tonnage Compleat.

Our late Agent Master his takeing of his whole Salary and gratuity in India was such a Bare faced presumtion as we have never met with ye Like, Sr. Wm. Langhorn had some coulor for his doeing it, vizt his haveing Left in our hands Above ye vallue of his gratuity and halfe Sallery being his ⊕mission mony for Dyamonds, so that we doe require ye said Mr. Master to pay back ye said whole gratuity and halfe Sallary by him extraordinary charged to accomt and see that wee bee satisfied for ye Same with East India Intrest as we ordered in ye case of Sr. Wm. Langhorn.

no posons to be made of Council but by ye Companorder except upon ye Death or removeall of posons.

49. Wee observe in our Late Agent Masters progresse to ye Bay, that he often tooke in some of those which he accounts as Senior Merchants to be of ye extraordinary Councill (as he calls it) which is a practice we doe not like, nor will Pmitt in any case for ye future, which wee would have you to observe, notwithstanding any thing we have formerly writ or any rules we have formerly made or ye construction of them, our Expresse order is, that no Pson be added to any of our Councills without our own order except only in ye case of Death or removeall, and in such case ye Pson so added to be only account'd probationall till he be confirmed by ourselfes.

In ye consultation booke reed this year from ye fort page 185 we take notice yt at Elore a Town were our late Agent went through there are made a Sort of Persia Carpetts, which we have cause to doubt they will not make a gainfull Commodity here, yet being willing to try all Experiments for ye enlargment of our trade, we would have you send us 100 Carpitts in all, whereof some of ye Better Sorts 2 yards wide, & 3 to $4\frac{1}{2}$ yards in Length, some about 3 yards Long and $2\frac{1}{2}$ broad some about $2\frac{1}{2}y^{ds}$. Long & 2 y^{ds} broad, & some about 2 y^{ds} Long and $1\frac{1}{2}$ y^d Broad.

Grder ye old debt be got in. 52. Give order to our Cheife and Councill at Metchlepatam and y° Bay to be verry diligent & carefull to get in all our old debts at Verrasherron & Ballasore and all other places within either of those Cheifeshipps.

Superfluous buildings to be prevented. 53. Our late Agent ordered much building in Cassambuzar and other places when he went down into y^e Bay last, as wee suppose more then was necessary wee doe therefore recommend it to your care so farre as you can to prevent any superfluous buildings which you shall come time enough to hinder, either at fort S^t. George or ells where, and in all places retrench our Charge as much as possibly you can.

54. Wee likewise recommend to you yo Improvement of yo revenue of our Town and THe revenue Mint, what hath already been done therein you will see, and wee hope your Ingenuity and Mint to and Zealle for our Intrest will make yet a farre greater Improvement, it being but be Improved. reasonable in our Judgments, that those y' Live under so mild a government as ours is should some way or other contribute so much towards yo Government as may defray ye Charge thereof.

Wee have said before that we did approve and ratify y' orders made by our The Compa Late Agent Master at his being in ye Bay, but wee observe in ye Settlement at merchts that Hughly page 328 that he orders no new merchants to be Imployed without order in are respon-Consultation and ye reason expressed therein, which whole passage is unpleasing to imployed. us for we would have new men Imployed & Incouraged when any such being responsible Psons shall present, and for ye qualifying words, vizt without order in Consultation &c., wee Looke upon them as superfluous in that case, for that our constant mind and order is, that every thing in our affaires should be done by consultation whether it concernes old merchants or new ones or any other matter.

56. Wee had so ill Successe with our Late Agents goeing down with so great a The Agent trade to ye Bay by which we suppose we came to want our Letters and Invoices from not to remove from ye fort thence, and had like to had lost ye monsoones for our Shipps and suffered many other But if prejudices in our Cargo) that we doe now forbid our now elected Agent Mr Gyfford require to to make any such voyage or removeall for ye future, at our Charge without expresse send some order for so doeing, notwithstanding if you think it advisable, we shall not think it over looke ye amisse if you send over Mr. John Stables or some other Pson Skillfull in Linnens to assist in this yeares investment at Metchlepatam or Maddapollam, to take care that yo goods be kept up to yo goodnesse of their muster, wee being verry ill served in that respect there ye Last yeare, and if upon consideration you find it for our Intrest to send him or any other merchants thither, for that purpose we would have him be last of councill there whilst he stayes upon ye place, but to return back to you with our Shipps to give you account of his proceedings.

57. Wee have mentioned before our resolution to have no goods sent or retured by our Shipps, to or from ye Bay but our own goods, and although wee are not willing to withdraw that Liberty of trade, wee have given our Servants in India so Long as it is used with any kind of moderation yet wee doe obsolutely forbid ye Imploying, any of our Sloopes, Budgrowes or other vessells upon any businesse except our own, and that ye Loading of any goods upon any of our said vessells except ye Companys own goods, or also ye useing ye Least part of our Stock or mony in your own trades we shall Looke upon as an inexpiable crime, which we will never pardon in ye best of our Servants, and we have given absolute order to all ye Commanders to take in no goods upon any private account another Caution wee must likewise enjoyn you to be observant of which is that you doe not dealle in any of ye Commodities, which usually ve Company write for for Europe, untill such time as ye Compa. Shipps are dispatched for Europe, this Caution is grounded upon Information wee have Lately had, that a private trade Shipp was dispatched from Cassambuzar last yeare wth 100 or 150 bales of Silk, which was one great cause why our Silk Investment Last year fell so exceeding short of what was ordered by us.

58. Wee send you herewith a List of all ye goods we would have you provide & cause to be provided against ye ensuing yeare, what we doe expect home this yeare Laden with you will find by ye Coppy of our former Letters at ye fort and now because we would have all our five Shipps returned with their full and compleat Loadings and for fear you should be necessitated to fall short in ye quantity of some of ye ticular kind of discretion of goods that wee have formerly writ for, being confident of your Integrity and care for ye Agent to Lade others. our Intrest wee shall give you Leave in case of such necessary failure in ye quantity of any kind of goods this yeare, to supply such a defect by an increase in some other sort of goods which you can easilyer procure on a Sudden, and which you shall judge may turne us best to account, but against ye next yeare wee expect you should be provided exactly to Load ye Severall Sorts and quantities mentioned in our List

59. The most prejudiciall faults in our this years Cargo were as followeth, Long faults in years Cloth from ye fort No. 1, 2, 3, were Shortner narrower and Thinner then ever formerly Cargo. and Likewise verry unequally sorted.

faults in the Long cloth from Metchlepatam. 60. The Long Cloth from Metchlepatam N° 2:3:4: were thin Short and dear and wanted three yards of their Length, ye Neck cloths, (those of halfe Bettelees) were much worse then formerly but must be brought up to ye goodnesse, of 40 Coved Bettelees, ye Blew Long Cloth must be dyed out of ye thickest brown Long Cloth and ye Congee water not to be too thick and after ye Beating of them they must be fully dried before packed to prevent ye Spotts which usually come in y^m.

all goods to be kept up to their ancient musters in Agent foxerofts time. 61. All Sorts of goods at ye fort must be brought and kept to ye full goodnesse of ye musters that were in Agent Foxerofts time, ye Like care to return to ye ancient goodnesse you must provide for in ye Bay and at Metchlepatam.

62. Wee have wrote this two years that no Cotton Romolls should be sent us from thence except they might be brought 40 or 50 \$\psi\$ Co. Cheaper, notwithstanding contrary to our said order you have sent us 20000 ps this yeare by which wee Loose intollerably, we require you to examine how this come to be done for we shall expect satisfaction from them that have so directly acted contrary to our orders.

63. There is a baile of Percallis M Nº 9 wanting for which ye Capt of ye George gave a Bill of Loading Let inquiry be made after it and return us an account thereof.

64. There are severall goods wanting in y° Bay according to a list inclosed to our great damage and prejudice to our buyers Let all Imaginable care be taken to prevent it hereafter.

65. Both this year and y° Last severall Taffities have fallen Short in their Lengths by means whereof we have been necessitated to make severall allowances of 40: or 50: yards in a Chest, Let esspeciall care be taken hereafter that each Single peice be made full 10 yards Long, double and Treble peices proportionable.

Goods of one sort to be packed in a baille & not to be intermixt. 66. They have from ye Bay packed severall Bailles with different Sort of goods and Packed severall sorts of goods in one baille, which we would have alwaise forbourn hereafter, except in Bailles of Musters, but that each sort of goods be singly Imbayeled by themselfes, and that they doe Looke better hereafter to ye equall Sorting of their goods, which was shamefully neglected this yeare, esspecially ye Mullmulls, many of which were much freyed and some of Them finer and some Courser in a Baile by 10° in a peice, advise them constantly that all goods of ye same marke and Number, be of an equall goodnesse advise them likewise to continue to send patterns of each Chest of Taffaties as they have Lately done, and put them into ye Chest that we may ye easier know, what coullors and how many peicees of each there is in a Chest.

67. The wax cloth made at ye fort hath too much oyle in it, and by reason of ye heat in ye Shipps hold runns and damages our goods, take great care yt ye said wax cloth be well dried before used, and that Cotton enough be put Between ye wax cloth and ye goods.

no passengers to goe upon ye Compa Shipps. 68. As we wrote you before that we would have no goods but our own sent on our Shipps to or from Metchlepatam or ye Bay, so we doe absolutely enjoyn you and all our Commanders not to Suffer any passengers, to goe upon our Shipps to or from those places and that you give this in Charge to our Commanders and advise us Pticularly if any of them presume to break our orders therein.

if ye full quantity of red Saunders cannot be got send wt you can. 69. If you cannot provide on good terms ye full quantity of red Saunders wood to be sent us by this yeares Shipping, send us but 50: or 60 tonns now & provide 100 tonns more against next years Shipping.

Wee did in ye time of Sr. Tho: Chambers Agency receive verry good & cheap Long Cloth, that was provided for our account at porta nova and we are assured that Since, Long Cloth brown hath been bought there in ye best season for about 17 pagds P Corge; therefore upon ye arrivall of our Shipping wee doe order, that you send one of ye Councill decently accompanied with one of our factors to buy up &

Contract for what Long Cloth and other Sorts of Callicoes you shall think most for our Service, and after some Short Stay there to return back to ye fort, and for such goods that shall be bought there let them be numbred distinctly from those you send us which are bought at ye fort and let ye \$\psi\$ sons that goe thither give us a perticular account of their proceedings in your pacquitt by ye return of these Shipps, we likewise think it for our service, that they contract with ye merchants of that place to goe on to provide a good parcell of Long cloth and other Callicoes against ve arrivall of ye next years Shipping, that so #ticuler #sons in our Service or otherwise may not reap ye advantage of buying cheap at that place to our detriment which we have cause to fear hath been too often practised formerly.

71. The badnesse and ill Sortment of our goods this year both from ye fort and Perticular Metchlepatam doth necessitate us to revive to you an order which we have long since given, and which we did hope our late Agent Master would have reduced into use vizt to give encouragement to severall other merchants in and about ye fort to make contracts with you for Callicoes, besides Verona and his partners who buy of others to his great profitt, which you might have of themselfes on better termes, and this arom &ca. wee doe think is necessary for our Service, notwithstanding all ye plausible objections, that have been wrote us against it by y. Last or other Agents before nim, and would have you make a begining therein upon these additionall Callicoes, that wee have ordered to be sent us by this years Shipping, but you must give ye new men you propose to deale with full assurance to protect them against ye threats of Verona, who is grown so petent by our Indulging him, that he menaces and affrighteth Psons from offering to deale with you, or any but himselfe, but you must be sure that you trust none with Stock before hand but pay upon ye delivery of ye goods.

73. As we have ordered ye Shipps George and Anne to saille from hence The order & directly to ye Bay of Bengall for ye more quick dispatch of our affaires and ye sooner to supply you with Stock for ye Bay, in Like manner we doe positively enorder you that upon ye arrivall of ye other three Shipps with you at ye fort. OUR CHEIF AND COUNCILL AT HUGHLY.

London 5: January $16_{\overline{81}}^{80}$

- 1. The want of our Letters and Invoices this year hath been great damage to us, certainly you could never have been guilty of so great an omission, but that you were overburthened with ye Load of private trade sent from and to ye fort, by our Shipping, and your Indentures and Settlements, and so great a Copartnership for your own private trade, we are willing our Servants should honestly get mony by their own estates, while we maintaine them in so splendid a condition, and we are glad to heare when they thrive by any good meanes, but it is against reason and our Intent that our Indulgence to them of universall trade in India, (which ye Dutch never did and wee suppose never will allow their people) should turn to our excessive hurt and damage, as we have Just cause to fear it lately did, and also to ye great hazard of our returned Shipps to Loose ye monsoones home which would have been, an Ireparable Losse to us, and greatly to ye prejudice of Commanders and owners of Shipps, we doe therefore earnestly commend to your care ye prevention of this growing evill, if you have commissions or businesse for any other, dispatch ye Companys businesse first, for which there is as you know but a Limited time, after ye Shipps are dispatched you have Leasure enough to attend your own affaires, but we will never admitt hereafter any goods but our own to be Loaded on our Shipps or Sloopes, to or from any place upon any pretence or freight whatsoever, and if any of our Servants after this admonition shall transgresse in that respect, we will call them to an accompt for it.
- 2. Wee send this year for ye Coast and Bay 5 three deck shipps vizt ye. Bengalla Merchant Capt: John Gouldsbrough 570: tons, ye George Capt Nehem: Earning 570 tonns, ye golden fleece Capt. James Cooke 565 tonns, ye Cæsar Capt: Jonathan Andrewes 530: tonns, ye Anne Capt. Leonard Brown 460 tonns two whereof vizt: ye George and ye Anne we have ordered to Saille directly for Ballasore and upon them we have sent such goods and treasure as you will perceive by yo Inclosed Invoices and Bills of Loading, so much whereof as is designed for Cazzambuzar, we doe hereby enorder you to send up to our Cheif Mr. Job Charnock, and Councill at Cassambuzar, it being our resolution that he ye said Mr: Charnock shall be our Cheif in that factory as we formerly ordered Second of ye Bay in degree, and to succeed you Cheif in ye Bay in case of your death or return to Ingland, and that he wth. ye Councill at Cazsambuzar, shall manage our affaires and Investments there, for this years Shipping for which purpose we enjoyn you to send away our Pticular Letter to him by an expresse, ye same day this come to your hands, if he be not at Hughly and write to him, forthwith to repaire to Cassambuzar to take possession of that factory, accordingly, we have a good opinion of Mr. Littleton, but we haveing ordered him thither ourselfes, wee expect complyance to our orders, Mr. Littleton if he continues in our Service we design shall be third of ye Bay second of Hughly and shall succeed Mr. Charnock in case of his death as Cheif of Cassambuzar.
- 3. Upon consideration of ye great disorder that hath frequently been complained of in ye keeping of our Bookes in all factories almost in ye Bay, we have thought it requisite to entertain Mr. Mountage Bred a merchant, and a verry good Accomptant to reside at Hughly at ye Sallary of 40 P annum & to have place at present next below those that are of Councill, and to be employed in keeping our Bookes, and Puseing and examining all our Bookes and Accompts from other subordinate factories, and doeing any other businesse that our Cheif and Councill shall think fitt to employ him about, and yet our meaning is not, by offording you so able an Assistant to take of ye Charge of ye Bookes from ye second, but that as formerly he shall remaine with ye Charge of them and Mr. Mountage only to be assistant to him.
- 4. Wee have Likewise sent to y° Fort this year severall adult \$\psi\$sons which wee have entertained into our Service, under faire Characters of their Sobriety ability and diligence in businesse which we have ordered to reside at y° Fort and be assistant in what businesse they can be usefull in there till such time there shall be occasion to remove them to supply y° vacansies and wants there may be in any of y° Councills

of our subordinate factories under that Agency, so that from thence if you find occasion, you may upon your desire to ye Agent and Councill have further Assistance whereever it shall be wanting.

5. Wee observe by y° Diarie or Consultation booke of Agent Master &c at y° fort and y° Narrative of his voyage and proceeding at y° Bay, that many Sorts of y° same goods which you usually doe buy and provide at Hughly, may Likewise be bought and provided better at Ballasore and Places adjacent, but that he did Thinke it for our advantage that all those Sorts of goods which could bee Bought at Hughly should be bought there and not elswhere, but that is not agreeable to our mind we design as you may Peeive by y° Stock sent out y° yeare a great enlargment of our Trade in y° Bay and yearly to encrease therein, and Therefore whereever we have a factory we would have all sorts of goods bought that can be provided in that place without Limitting our Investments in y° same sorts of goods only to Hughly, to

which purpose we have order 20000 of ye Stock now sent out to ye Bay, or so much as you shall find they can Invest there, to be Left with our Cheife and Councill at Ballasore, to be Invested in proper goods to be returned us by these Shipps, as you shall think most to our advantage concerning which we desire you to give them all speedy and fitting Instructions from time to time, & to y's we require y' observance & exact Conformity.

- 6. Upon ye same reason we are not only for ye continuance of our factory at Decca as well as at Maulda, but Likewise for buying in equall proportion ye same Sort of goods there yearly as we doe at Maulda, to which purpose we enjoyn you not to faille of Speedily sending to both those places equall and Suitable proportions of Stock, which may answare our Intentions plainly before expressed.
- 7. Wee are likewise informed that great quantities of severall Sorts of raw Silk may be bought at Hughly, but we are not fully satisfied that it is of ye same Sorts yt are proper for Europe, without it be such as is made at Cassambuzar & places adjacent and from thence brought to Hughly, however after you have used your best endeavours to Compleat our Investments at Cassambuzar, as to ye full quantities of Silk That we write for, and that upon advise from thence you shall find that they cannot for this year fully effect ye same, we would then have you at Hughly endeavour to buy up so much raw Silk as they shall want, provided what you doe there buy be of ye same Sorts of raw Silk proper for Europe, and doe not exceede in ye Price of what it can be or is bought at Cassambuzar about 2: or 3: anns. Peer, and buy ye Least proportion or none at all of ye extraordinary finest Sort but of ye middle and ordinary Sorts which turnes best to acct here if it be clear wrought, and Clean wound of, however that we may know what Sorts of Silk are procureable at hughly or other places other then what is provided at Cassambuzar, and parts adjacent wee would have you to send us 100 Balles for a tryall in all Some of each Sort.
- 8. Wee have caused a List to be drawn out of all ye advices to ye fort ye Last year by our Shipping and Since by over land and other conveyances of all goods enordered to be provided in all parts of ye Bay and returned us by this years Shipping, of weh: we send you enclosed a coppy, and also another List of all ye goods we would have you provide for us against ye next years Shipping, that which we principally expect from you is, that next to ye well buying of our goods you be carefull to send us Large and full returnes, which will oblige us yearly as you see we doe to send you back a greater encrease of Stock, what we have now sent you in goods and Bullion you will Pecive by ye Invoices, and Bills of Loading sent you herewith, which is a farre greater Stock, then ever went from England into those parts.
- 9. Wee have sent a Coppy of y^s Letter to our new Agent & Councill at y^e fort and have ordered y^w to give you w^t further Instruction they shall think needfull for our service.
- 10. Wee have read over ye rules & orders made by Agent Master &c. when he was in ye Bay, for ye well ordering our severall factories there, ye method of keeping and Ballanceing our Bookes, and ye monthly return of Diaries Consultations & Accors of Cash to ye head factories all which we doe well approve, and doe hereby

confirm and have ordered our new Agent and Councill at y° fort to see that all Those rules and orders be constantly & Impartially executed by all those whom it doth concern and by themselfes esspecially, in Spareing no man in our Imployment for favour or Affection, that shall be found to transgresse those rules, but that upon failure of any \$\Psi\sin \text{son}\$, they doe according to y° said rules expell y° offender out of our service, and send some other \$\Psi\sin \text{form y°}\$ Fort or Otherwise out of y° factories in y° Bay according to our usuall method of advanceing \$\Psi\sin \text{sons in our Service, as they in their Judgments or discretion shall think fitt, and most agreeable to our Intrest, which was our principall end of sending such a number of able \$\Psi\sin \text{sons to y° fort this yeare as aforesaid, and we doe earnestly desire that you our Cheife and Councill there would for your parts, with your good example advise and otherwise assist, our said Agent & Councill in keeping all our subordinate factories strictly to those just rationall and methodicall and orderly rules, unto which they are reduced by y° constitutions made at Agent Master being in y° Bay.

- 11. Thus you see we are willing to own what was well done by that Agent, but yo disobeying us in his settlement of that Cheifship at Cassambuzar was verry dissatisfactory as also his reasons alledged for it vizt for our Better Service and Speedier dispatch of our Shipps, whereas on yo contrary our Service at the Bay and Cassambuzar was never worse Formed, never were we more disappointed in yo quantities of raw Silk and Taffaties, we expected and wrote for, never had we worse sorted goods from yo Bay, never were all our Invoices and bills of Loading Left behind before, our Shipps never dispatched with greater danger of Looseing monsoones, upon yo whole matter things were greatly amisse from all Places within your Cheifshippe, which we hope you will take care to amend for yo future and doe expect you should.
- 12. And though as we have said before we are not willing to withdraw our Liberty of trade granted to our Servants in India, yet we must admonish you to use your Liberty so moderately, that we doe not Suffer by it as we have cause to bleive [*ic] we did in that Shipp, which was dispatched from ye Bay with raw Silk for Surrat, if any such Shipp come to you againe, or any of our Cheifs or factors within yr Cheife ship, dispatch her with some other goods or Let her stay for her Loading till you have dispatched all our Europe Shipps, with their full quantities of Silk and Taffaties, of all Sorts in order to be sent by them, to this we doe require your Intire and absolute obedience.
- 13. Wee doe Likewise enjoyn you and all in our Service not to make use of any of our Stock or goods provided for us, or with our mony, nor to trade in any Silk Black or Coulered or Taffaties died, by our own Dyers or at our Charge, any failure herein or Loading your own goods or others then the Companys for ye future on our Shipps we shall Looke upon as Crimes.
- 14. Mr. Master his five years service to us being out ye 7th of July next, we have altered ye constitution of our Councill at ye fort, and have appointed Mr. Wm. Gyfford Agent Mr. Hynmers Second, Mr. Bridger third, Mr. Wilkes fourth, Mr. Bigrig that goes now hence with Agent Gyfford fifth, Mr. Elihu Yale Sixth, whose orders from time to time we would have you observe.
- 15. Breifly the things we expect principally your Pformance in this next yeare are, 1st punctual Diares accounts of Cash and Consultations to ye fort according to ye Late rules, 2ly our full quantities of Silk and taffaties to be sent us this yeare & next 3dy that you send an equal and full Stock To Decca as well as Maulda in mony 4thy that you make Ballasore a buying factory as we have ordered as well as a shiping factory, 5ly that you doe not forestall or Interrupt our Silk investments by your own Trade nor thereby retard our businesse in Any kind, 6ly that you doe keep up all Psons to their Musters, & looke to ye Better sorting of our goods, 7thy that you make us full returnes and dispatch our Shipps early, your well Pformance of these things will not only make us your freinds, but think you Psons of meritt.
- 16. Besides what is contained in our List of goods sent you herewith, we would have you provide for us at Decca 4000 Romalls yearly and Let as many of them as can be sent us this yeare.

- 17. And if M^{r.} Harvey should be displaced from being Cheife at Decca our possitive order is that he be forthwith resetled Cheife of that factory and that he does carry on this years investment, at y^t place, & so continue till our further order.
- 18. There were severall goods wanting in ye Bales this yeare according to a list sent you inclosed, our damage therein you must prevent hereafter, about which Agent Master wrote us that he had taken some order when he was there of which we wish we find ye good effects.
- 19. Many of y° Taffaties did want of their Length, in so much that we have allowed 40: or 50 yards for short measure in some Chests, take speciall care for y° future y* every single peice be full 10 yards Long, double and Treble proportionable.
- 20. You have Likewise this year packed up severall bales in which you have put severall Sorts of goods in one bale, which is a verry ill way & we would have totally forborne, for ye future. except it be in Bales of musters.
- 21. Generally all your goods this year were verry ill and unequally sorted, but esspecially ye mull mulls many whereof were frayed & some Bales finer in one part of ye Bale then in another by 10 in a peice, these things we expect you would effectually remedy, and see carefully that all our goods of ye same marke and number be of an equall goodnesse.
- 22. Continue to send pattorns [sic] of each Chest of Taffaties as you have done to be put into ye chests, yt we may know wt coulors & how many peices of each coulor are in a Chest.
- 23. When our Cheif or any of our Councill have occasion for our Service to goe between Cassambuzar and Hughly or Ballasore, we would have them (if may be) to goe by water and not put us to ye Charge of vaine pompious Journeys by Land.
- 24. Bee verry frugall in all your expences and hereafter if you doe take out Phirmand Neshawnes or Phyrwannas, Let them alwais be taken out in ye name of ye English East India Company & not otherwise, any former Phission or order from ourselfes or ye Agent and Councill at ye fort to ye Contrary notwithstanding.
- 25. Agent Master wrote us in his Letters of our Shipps, that good hempen Saile cloth might be made Cheap in ye Bay, such as holland Duck, & french Noyles Canvas & we have been since told by another that ye Dutch make much of their saille Clothes in those parts, upon which we have endeavoured to get some hemp dressers and weavers to goe thither to Instruct our Black Servants in that manyfacture, but those kind of People here are not willing to travell so farre as East India, so that we send you none of them by this years Shipping but in regard ye Dutch have so much made there, we cannot think it an Impossible thing for you, to get some of those people that make it for them to furnish you with 10: or 15: Bales, of a Sort, to send us by this Shipping and hereafter much more if we find it will turn to account which trade we would ye rather Introduce and Incourage, because we apprehend it would be of great nationall advantage to England, 1st in ye Imployment of [more] great Shipps for India, that Commodity being Bulkey, next in saveing a great dealle of mony to England which the Dutch and french Draw out of our purses every yeare for that Commodity, whereas if you can have our supply thereof from India, ye first cost will be verry Little, the rest onely for Custom & Charges, which is all Clear profitt to ye kingdome.
- 26. Mr. Nayler our Dyer at Cassambuzar hath petitioned us here by his Attarney to be our Cheif Dyer, we know he is our oldest Dyer there, but we know of no Precedency in yt Trade, but he that can doe and does doe ye Best to be best Looked upon, & countenanced, and where they are equall in their Pformances, ye first comer to be respected accordingly, but for any other preferment in our factory, at which he seemes to hint, he must not expect it from us, we send men of trades thither to follow their Trades, neither will we give way to his, or any mans sending prohibited goods home, upon accompt of his sonne here above 5 peices in one yeare, for other goods prementioned by our printed Indulgence, he hath ye same liberty as all our other Servants.

- 27. Wee are desired by y father of M. John Billingsly deceased, that he may have Leave to sell and dispose of a house built By his said Sonne at Ballasore, we doe order that you give such as shall be authorized by him Leave to sell y same, provided it be not disposed of to any one of any other nation, whereby it may become prejudiciall to our factory there, or an hindrance to y carrying on our affairs there.
- 28. Wee did in our Letter of ye 3d January 1678 to ye fort, give directions for your proceedings in case of ye decease of any \$\Phi\$sons in our Service, and expected before now according to ye said directions, that you would have sent us an Inventory & acce of ye estate of Mr. Walter Clavell our late Cheife and that you had in ye first place, as then ordered, discharged what Debts he owed to us in ye Bookes, and given us a \$\Phi\$ticuler of what was further remayning, but this yeare we haveing rece no Letters from you and Sr. Tho: Monpesson and Mr. Trenchard members of Perliament & \$\Phi\$sons of quality desireing our \$\Phi\$ticuler recommendation; that Mr. Clavells Bookes, & a \$\Phi\$fect Inventory of all his estate, might be sent home and that ye overplus of his estate, our Debt being first discharged, might be paid into our Cash there which we have promised to make them good here at 2: 6: ye Ropey, we doe
- there which we have promised to make them good here at 2:6: y' Ropey, we doe require you without faile by these Shipps, (if it be not already done) to give us a perfect account of y' said M'. Clavells estate and to send home his bookes and Accounts to be deliver'd to y' said gentlemen, who are y' Executors in trust.
- 29. Wee are informed y^t y^e Course Silk or yarn y^t y^r Erva Stuffs are made of, if it were properly wound of, as y^t Silkes y^t come from Europe, would turn to acc° here we would therefore have you to send us 10 or 20 bales for a tryall, & if there shall be wth you any Stuffs Silkes yarn or Silk more then w^t we have had already sent us from y^t parts wee would have you enquire about it & send us a bale or two for a Sample, being desirous to enlarge our Trade to your parts as much as may be.
- 30. Whereas by our last yeares Shipping and by our advices since sent to you over land, wee then ordered you to goe on in ye providing of ye goods, we then writ for to be sent us by ye following Shipps and have to that Effect (besides ye great remaines of Stock with you) now sent you out a much larger Stock then usuall, not doubting but that if you have done your endeavours in provideing the full quantities we ordered you, but that our Shipps will all of them be fully Laden (besides a surplussage of Petre alwais before hand, for ye next year) & not to return to us in ye Least dead freighted, but that we may provide for unseen accidents, and Least you should fall short in ye full Loading of all our Shipps, by wt Loaden on them from ye Bay and ye Coast) we would then have you enlarge our Investments of what we advised you by our Last yeares Shipps vizt in Turmerick from 100 tonus to 200 or 250 tonns, in Sticklack from 50 to 100 tons, & 100 tons in Cowries, and in case after you have done your utmost endeavours to provide ye severall sorts of goods, and that you should want any Tonnage to ye full Loading of ye Shipps, and cannot procure a surplussage in ye afore specified Commodities, whereby to fill up our Shipps vizt. In Turmerick Sticklack and Cowries, we would then have you send 100 Bales of Cotton yarn more then already ordered, and if it be a plentifull year of Sugar and that it be Cheap you may send 50: or 60 tonns of that sort usually sent to Persia, but this we would have to be yo Last remedy, notwithstanding what we have above writ we hope your care will have so prevented our feares that you will have (with ye goods provided on y' Coast) a proper Cargo of goods with y' Saltpetre fully to Load them, and a Surplussage of Saltpetre behind for ye next yeare, which we would have you to Lade on ye first Shipps that goe from your port To ye Coast, it being our desire alwais to have a Stock of Saltpetre to Lie ready at ye fort upon all occasions.
 - 31. Wee have entertained M' Rich: Barker who was bred a mercer, & have design'd him for your parts and Pticularly to be Imployed at Cassambuzar, whom you are to advise with in ye Dying ordering sorting and receaving [sic] of our died and raw Silk, and therefore doe order him to be sent thither and to Take place there next after those factors that are upon ye place, and if there shall be further occasion at Cassambuzar, wee doe think M' W''. Prickman (who hath also skill in Silk may be fitt for that place.

- 32. Wee had a drought of ye River Ganges presented us by Capt Stafford who went up wth his Ship ye faulcon unto Hughly, and have caused three draughts of ye same to be delivered vizt unto Capt John Gouldsbrough in ye Bengall to Capt Earning in ye George, and Capt Brown in ye Anne, hopeing they will make such use of them as to endeavour to carry up their Shipps into ye river how so ever wee advise you of This that before ye departure of ye said Shipps for England, you doe demand from ye Commanders ye said 3 Draughts, which we intend shall be Left on shore with our Cheife and Councill at Ballasore, to be made use of by our Shipps as further occasion shall present, with wt further observations they shall make therein.
- 33. If S^r John Leithelieurs Correspondants shall supply you with any Summes of mony to y° vallue of 40: or 50000 Rupees, at y° rate not exceeding 2: 6: a rupee you are to give them bills of Ex² for y° same to be drawn on us at 30: daye sight which wee shall accept and pay, so as it be supplied as timely and on as reasonable terms as others shall doe, it.
- 34. On these 2 Shipps we have Loaden to ye amount of 143495: 19: 1 according to ye Pticular Invoices sent herewith vizt.

Wee reed yours by Last Shipping and do Judge That you had not right done you in not being placed our Cheif at Cassambuzar according to our order which we doe not allow of, as you will perceive by that part of ye generall Letter which concernes this businesse, which we have ordered to be transcribed and sent to you Inclosed, attested by our Secretary and we doe accordingly constitute and confirm you our Cheif of that factory and all our affaires managed therein, and we hereby require M. Littleton & all Psons of our Councill and all other Psons in our Service there to yeild you assistance & due obedience according to this our order and if any of our Councill or Servants shall Impede or obstruct you in yo due execution of this order, or otherwise faille in their duty we doe hereby order you to advise our Cheif and Councill at Hughly thereof, that so they may expell Such refrectory Servants out of our Said Imployment and we doe order that they shall not againe be restored unto any other Imploymet in our Service, without our own Speciall order in writeing, and we doe hereby appoint Mr. Littleton to proceed Second at hughly and third of ye Bay in degree, yourselfe to be Cheife of Cassambuzar and Second of ye Bay in degree, and in case of Mr: Vincents death or Comeing home you are to succeed Cheife of ye Bay, and in Such case Mr. Littleton if he continue in our Service is to Succeed you as Cheife of Cassambuzar.

This we have ordered to be sent to you by expresse as soone as our Shipps Shall arrive in ye Bay and to desire you forthwith if this find you at Pattona, to take order with those that Shall Succeed as Cheif and Councill at Pattona to provide &

send down to Hughly in due time yo quantity of Petre which we have ordered for yo years Shipping (which is one thousand tonns) as we suppose has already been ordered to you from Agent Master and Councill at yo fort, unto whom we gave our orders for this purpose some months past over Land which we hope came to their hands.

Haveing Settled our affaires at Pattana if you be there when you receive this and settled all things in due method which we hope you may doe in a few dayes it is our order you forthwith repaire to Cassambuzar to take present possession of our affaires there, and to manage all our businesse for this yeares Shipping for which you will receive our more Pticular directions from our Agent Gyfford and Councill at ye fort.

But in regard we doe send two of our 5:3 deck Shipps designed for ye Coast & Bay this yeare directly for ye Bay, and yt consequently this Letter may probably arrive with you Some weekes sooner, then with our Agent and Councill at ye fort to give some Light to our affaires beforehand as we have done to Mt. Vincent our Cheife and our Councill at hughly, we have sent you enclosed a List of ye goods we Intend this year to have sent us from Cassambuzar, and a List of what we would have provided against ye ensueing yeare, with an Invoice of ye Stock in amounting to about 80000 pound which we have ordered our Cheif and Councill at Hughly forthwith to send up to Cassambuzar which is farre greater then ever yet was sent to yt place and so are Likewise our demands of goods from [there,] it being a trade we can with more advantage expatiate in, esspecially in raw Silk and Black and coulored Taffaties, ye in any other trade of India whatever.

Wee doe therefore desire you as we doubt not but you will to enlarge our Investments this yeare all that possibly you can in all Sorts of Commodities of that Place esspecially those beforementioned.

Your experience is great in those Countries, our opinion you will see is great of you & our expectations proportionable which we doubt not but you will fully answare.

Wee are well informed one reason why our Silk and Taffaties Investment came so extraordinary Short of our orders and expectations ys year, was there sending a way a Ship with Silk from ye Bay to Surrat that yeare, a great abuse it [was?] of our Large Indulgence to our Servants in allowing them so generall a trade in India and which if we should have any further disappointment of yt nature would soone cause us to repent and it may be retract our great kindnesse to them. Wee require therefore that no such thing be done nor any thing like it for ye future but that our Europe Shipps be dispatched and with no Lesse then ye full quantities ordered of all Sorts of Silkes wrought and raw and that Pticular care bee taken that all our Silkes be wrought of Cleane, so we commend you and all our affaires to ye Blessing of ye Almighty god and rest.

COUNCILL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

Wee are not willing to Let our Surratt Shipps depart without a Letter to you, although we have Little to add to what we wrote you by our Agent W^m· Gyfford Esq^r· who went on y° Ship Bengall Merchant in Comp^a· of y° golden fleece George Cæsar and Anne, that which most materiall is, that we Intend y° ensueing year to Send you full as much Tonnage, as we did this, therefore you must be sure in time to make provission for a Suitable Cargo esspecially of Bulky goods, and Silk concerning which we wrote Sufficiently by our Said Shipps.

You must Likewise importunately and Incessantly presse our Cheife Servants in ye Bay to mend their management of our affaires in thosse factories which were intollerably bad ye Last yeare in many respects mentioned in our former Letters, and which, (if not very much amended by the Shipps we now expect,) wee cannot bear with them any Longer but Shall be necessitated to make a great Change.

Faille not to give us ye names of Such as you shall understand to have abused that great Indulgence we give of a generall trade, in India to our prejudice esspecially of those vile Psons that Sent away the Silk from Cassambuzar last year, & thereby hindred our own Investments in that Commodity.

Take all oppertunities to retrench ye Extravigancie of our Charge at ye ffort and in all places within your Agency, and know that it is our Constant Maxim grounded upon a Long experience, that a wastefull haughty or prodigall \$\Psi\sigma\sigma\text{on}\$, can pever be a good Servant for us, Let him be otherwise never so Crafty plausible or methodicall: Bee never without a Store of Turmerick & Saltpetre, at ye fort, to answare all emergencies, and defects of other goods and then were may reasonably hope never more to pay any dead freight.

Keep all \$\P\$ sons to our rules of sending constantly Diaries & monthly acc^{ts} of Cash and Spare none of y^e Defaulters, upon any pretence whatsoever, otherwise then our rules doe allow, till you make examples of some, wee can never hope any regularity to be observed, but in doeing publick right to us, be sure you never exercise private revenge or prejudice.

Looke sharply to y° Diamond businesse, & Spare no transgressours for favour or fear of any \$\Psi\$son, & if you rightly consider it, as y° Scheme of that businesse, is Laid its more y° own Intrest then ours \$\Psi\$sonally, & if you doe your parts Ingeniously we may probably double our Stock in that commodity in a Short time.

There is one Mr. Tho. Davis a Linnen Draper who has Lately given over his trade and is gone in Company with one Salvadore a Jew for India over land (as it is said) though Some suggest they are gone in some of our Shipps under disguise, of which we thought good to advise you that in case they come into your parts you may keep a watchfull eye over them, that they act nothing prejudiciall to our Trade, and that

all our Factors and Servants be admonished to afford them no assistance or Incouragement in their proceedings, and you are to give us advise what you can Learn concerning them, both of their way of comeing over and of their transactions in ye Country, we have not els to adde but commending you and our affaires to ye protection of ye almighty we remaine

The Shipps have had their dispatch Exceeding late this year notwithstanding our uttermost Endeavours to further it, never any year was the Saltpetre got on board sooner then it was this, respecting the great quantity thereof, nor did never Sloopes make more turnes into Ballasore road hence in one year, the Small Sloope of 20 tonns, being also timely appointed to Carry of ye goods at Ballasore on board the Shipps, to prevent ye Theivery of ye Purgomen, but we haveing no vessells at ffraught this yeare, as formerly was usuall here, and haveing no other Deckt vessells but these two sloopes, both makeing but 130 tunns, two small ones of 20 Tunns a peice being lost in a Storm, in September last comeing from Madapollam, your bale

goods which we had no order, nor could think convenient without order to Adventure on open Country boates, could [not?] be sent down any faster then those Sloopes could Carry them, and we failed not to have them well Laden every time as will appear by our severall respective orders, to ye son appointed to that businesse in Ballasore roade for their unloading on board the Europe Shipps.

CAPT. JOHN GOULDSBROUGH

LONDON: 5 JANUBY. 1680

Wee have freighted your Shipp ye Bengall Mercht. whereof you are Commander as also ye golden ffleece, Capt. James Cooke ye. George Capt. Nehemihah Earning ye Cæsar Capt. Jonathan Andrewes and ye Anne Capt. Leond. Brown, which we have designed for ye Coast of Choromandell and Bay of Bengall as Likewise ye Ship new London Capt. John Daniell and ye Persia Mercht. Capt. John Bowers Comanders whoh are bound for ye port of Bantam in ye East Indies, we therefore order that you use your utmost Endeavours for getting your Shipp into ye Downes and from thence with ye first oppertunity as wind and weather will mitt of sailing and keeping Company togeather as farre as ye Island St. Jago Steering at least 30 or 40 Leagues. to ye Westward of Maderas, to Avoyd ye Danger of Turkes men of warre, you must therefore be verry Cautious how you fall in with that or any other ye Cape deverd Islands Least any Turkesmen of warre or other Pirates (knowing it to be a place we usually refresh at) should Lie there in waite to Surprize any Shipps that come thither and if you shall with yo other 4 first named Shipps obtaine a quick passage to St. Jago, so as you judge you may timely gaine the Coast of Choromandell, that then you keep Compa. togeather from thence. And if it shall be so early as that you think it safe, to goe within Madagazear and through ye 8 degree Channell, that then you sayle tegeather toward ye Coast; but ye George and Anne when they shall arrive at ye Eastward of Ceylon are to sayle directly to ye Bay without touching upon ye Coast, of Choromandell according to our orders given in that behalfe,

But in Case you shall be detayned by contrary winds on ye Coast of Englands soe as you judge your Sayleing togeather may retard your Voyage, and hinder your timely arrivall at ye ffort, then you are to make ye best of your way from St. Jago although you sayle by yourselfe, and if you find when you are beyond ye Cape of good hope, that ye time of ye yeare is so farre spent, that it will be too late to goe within St. Lawrence, that then you doe sayle without, all which we have observed in such cases at that Season to be ye most Certaine & shortest passage and so by ye best of your Endeavours to gaine ye Coast as soone as you can, And being arrived at ffort St. George (wee haveing discharged our former Agent Mr. Streynsham Master) you are to follow ye orders & directions of our new Agent Mr: Wm: Gyfford (who proceeds with [you?] in your voyage) and his councill, and in his absence, of such Agent and Councill as shall succeed him, for your further proceedings in your Voyage,

And for your better defence in thesse troublesome times, in case you should be Attacqued by an enemy, we doe Acquaint you Cap^t. John Gouldsbrough to wear y^e fflag as Admirall, Cap^t. James Cocke in the golden ffleece to be vice Admirall, and Cap^t. Nehemiah Farning in the George to be Reer Admirall, and therefore you are to consult togeather, how you may best keep Company for your mutuall defence and take notice that though we have given you direction to sayle singly if belated for gaining your passage, yet we would much rather have you keep Comp^a togeather. Wee understand our Agent Gifford hath chosen to take passage on your Ship therefore we would have you shew him all due respects as becomes his place, and when you Sett Sayle out of the Downes you are to take care a Sufficient number of Cartereges be filled with powder to be in readinesse in case of any sudden Assault in your passage outwards for India, and to have y^e like provision alwaies ready dureing y^e whole voyage.

Wee have of late given liberty for y° ladeing of goods in our shipps from y° Coast and Metchlepatam, and from both to y° Bay, and from thence back to y° said places, but understanding it was y° occasion y° last year of retarding our Shipps from goeing down into y° Bay and of their return back in due time, to our verry great Charge, and y° hazarding y° Looseing of their Monzoones, besides y° danger & damage in comeing about y° Cape, so late, we have therefore made an order that noe goods either goeing down to y° Bay, or comeing up, shall hence forth be Pmitted to be Loaden on board our Shipps but what is for our own proper Accompt, on any pretence whatsoever, and therefore as you will have notice thereof from our Agent and Councill so we give you a Speciall Charge, that you Pmitt none to be Loaden on board y° Shipp upon any pretence whatsoever, that soe our Shipps may by y° blessing of god be despeeded to us in due time.

Wee desire you to keep up ye Worship of god aboard yr Ship and good orders amongst your men and take care of their healths & that our rules be observed by you and yr Company, and that you use your utmost endeavours as to yr Speedy passage, passage outward bound so for yr quick return for England, and when you Sett Saile from Fort St. George you are to keep Compa. with Such Shipps as shall be dispatched at ye same time with you, untill you come to St. Helena and being there arrived, we require you to keep Company with as many of our Shipps as you find there at yr arrivall and which shall come in dureing your Stay, and Consult togeather how you may best associate, in case you should Meet wthen an enemy in order to which in regard wee know not what Commanders may be upon ye place, we cannot appoint your Stations, but require you, laying aside all occasions of misunderstanding, you ranke your Selfes according to your Seniority in Command, and be alwaise on your Guard, and keep yr Ship in a good posture of defence, Esspecially when you Come near our Coast, and not to part Company in ye Channell untill yr arrivall in ye downes, and neither to trust ye Turkes (there being now warre with them,) nor any Europian nation, for that we know not how affaires may stand between his Majesty and other nations before yr Return.

You are to take notice that when you come on this side S^t helena in y^r homeward bound voyage as also outward thither you must in obedience to his Majesties proclamation, we are only y^e usuall English fflagg and Ensign and no other viz^t, y^e white fflagg with y^e red Crosse, and a red ensign with a white Crosse, in y^e upper Corner.

The Draught of ye River Ganges that was delivered you here you are to leave with our Cheife and Councill at Ballasore, upon your Comeing from thence with Such observations, as you shall make thereon.

And so Commending you to ye protection of ye Almighty praying for your prosperous voyage and happy return we remaine

OUR CHEIFE AND COUNCELL AT HUGHLY.

LONDON 22d. APRILL 1681.

Wee have thought fitt to hasten this Expresse so Soone to you after our Shipps to reinforce your through Compliance with our late orders by our Shipping, Esspecially in that most Important affaire of raw Silke, wherein our Expectations were so vilely frustrated last yeare that you may verry well admire, how we could satisfie ourselfes after so great provocation, with y^t Single Instance of our just resentment in onely Changeing our Agent.

Wee would have you Send us yo full quantities of every Sort of raw Silke wrote for and if you doe Exceed our orders in those kinds, that you buy from 4 Rupees and under to one Rupee and under & Seer, wee Shall Esteem it acceptable Service and vallue you accordingly, but we can never Expect you Should doe that if you content your Merchants natives, to goe in an old dull Insipid inactive method without Imploying new men of better Stocks, or more Ingenuity, that will not faile of Supplying you punctually and in good Season for yo dispatch of our Shipps, with you full quantities of with ever we write for.

And for that reason we have ordered you contrary to our late Agents Politicks, to buy at all our factories whatever ye places doe affaord although Still ye greatest quantities of every sort of goods where they may be had Cheapest, And notwithstanding we doe lay on you ye greatest Charge to Enlarge our Investments, in all ye Coursest kind of raw Silke because we Judge it [not?] ye most gainefull, but ye most nationall Commodity, we can bring for England, being a Commodity to be manufactured which setts our poore on worke, greatly augments our navigation. & workes upon ye trade of our emulous Neigbours, yet we doe not Intend hereby you Should Lessen our Investments, or fall Short of our orders in any other kind of goods, and that ye want of mony may be no excuse or obstruction to your full Effecting all our orders, we doe hereby give you Pmission to take up ye vallue of 30 or 40000 £ Sterling at Interest, so as ye whole Surmounting what we Sent you by our Shipps be returned by ye same Shipping, otherwise doe not charge us with ye burthen of Interest.

And in regard we doe intend to Enlarge our trade in all places & noe lesse in y^e Bay then in any other part of India, we doe resolve (god willing) to Send you full as much Shipping and a much larger Stock, this ensuing winter then we did last.

Wee could give our Selves no rationall Satisfaction concerning y° Losse or gaine by thosse Commodities, you sent us musters of y° Last yeare, by reason of that strange neglect of your not Sending us Invoices but in generall we observed that they sold well at our Candle as lately all new things of any kind have done, and therefore wee would have you goe on in provideing thosse Sorts according to Musters returned you by our last Shipps and y° full quantities then wrote for, and Send us instead of 2 as we advised you by our last Letters 10 or 12 bales of any other new kind of goods, which you think proper for Europe, and can meet with, in y° variety whereof wee are sure your parts of India doe abound.

Wee have Seen Some Attlasses and other Silkes which formerly came over in yemissive trade much Stronger, and cont: halfe as much more Silk in a peice of ye same Length, as we have usually had in ours, gett as many of thosse Stronger Silkes made and Send us, as you can between ye time, you will receive this Letter at ye Season of your Imbarcation and to that end hasten an Expresse with a Coppy of this letter to our Cheife and Councill att Cassambuzar as soone as it comes to your hands.

Sett your Weavors Inventions at Work to make Plushes Velvetts and Sattins as fine, rich, and as Strong as y° best usually worn here; and of y° same breadth, there is nothing so difficult but may be Effected where y° materiall Silk and midwife Labour are so Cheap, as with you Let y° Coulors that you Send us first for a triall, be Crimson, blew, yellow and of good greens, if you can dye that Coulour well with you, but any Colours in new goods rather then faille,—Encourage the Ingenious and first Imitators of such Staple Commodities, of y° usuall production of Italy & ffrance which pick our pocketts, while they come from thence, but would fill his Majesties and Subjects purses if we could bring them from India.

Send us some peices for Experiment of every such kind of Strong fabricks, as soone as you can though they cost us so deare att first, that we gaine nothing by them, by which directions as you may See our Indulgence to our Country, we Expect by your diligent pursuance of them, to have a testemony of yours as well as of your Zealle for our Service. It is not necessary we Should give you your reason of our orders, but your duty to obey them Simply, because they are ours, yet seeing our motives are of such a generous nature, as must needs provoke your activity of any Englishman, that Lodges in his brest your Love of his Country, wee shall tell you that our purpose is, (with gods assistance) to Encrease our navigation as much as our trade that as our ffleets grow yearly richer, they may proportionably grow Stronger, In which wee find ourselves upon this Dilemma, If we bring over great quantities of Turmerick Lacks or other grosse goods, wee Soone Clogg your market to that degree, that they will not return us our freight, on 'youther hand, if we Enlarge our trade altogeather in fine goods, which are most profitable, our tonnage will be so Little that you force of our ffleets will be [to] weak for your treasure of their Loading.

Upon ye Same grounds mentioned in ye foregoeing paragraph, we would have you Send us yearly 30 or 40 or more Tonns of Bees wax if you can shipp it So as it may be afforded here for 12^d \$\forall 'pound, and let it be of ye best, and hardest Sort, that you can gett, and you must be fully Assured that there is no mixture of rice-fflower, or any thing els mixed with if, whereby to make it looke white and Cheate you in ye weigt, without which assurance we would have you to remelt all you buy, and to Clear it from all filth that nothing but pure wax may remaine, and to cast it into Cakes Embaleing it over with gunny, and to take Esspeciall care that it be Stowed at ye Bottom of ye hold, not near any of our Silk or fine goods, it beeing apt with Lying to breed a Weevell in it, which may prejudice our other goods, and for an Experiment Send us, 4 or 6 bales of ye finest Stuffe, of which you make your best ropes for your bales, we doe not Expect it should pay freight, but are willing our manufacturers about this Citty should try some Experiment upon it.

Ramalls at Dacca. Wee have heard of an Excellent Sort of Silk romalls to be bought Cheap att Decca. order some from thence and some from Maulda to bee Sent us by our next Shipping (if it be possible) that we may see ye Sorts and Compare them and ye prizes togeather with Such as we Shall receive from other places according as we directed both in our Letter and in our List of goods to be provided by you & Sent you on our last Shipps.

Wee have Sent you in this packett 4 patterns of thin Silks ye blew & yellow are Such as we call here Sarsnetts, of each gett us 5000 peices made against ye return of our Shipping in 1682 of ye same breadth and 30 or 40 yards Long at Least, and if you can let some of them bee a good grasse green & some Crimson & Scarlett. if you can arrive att those Coloures.

The black and white are called alamode Sarcenetts, and are commonly used here for hoods, of which 50000 p^s of each would Sell in a yeare therefore without Limitation gett us made what quantity of them you can, provided y^e black be good and both glossy, however Send us 10,000 peices of each, as good and neat as you can.

Wee have thought fitt to appropriate into ye generall Joint Stock exclusive to all others ye Comodities following vizitiall Musk in Codd and out of Codd, Persia wrought Silkes, Achmadabad Taffities Herba Taffities Silk Longees & Chercollees, which wee have left out of Indulgences this yeare; both to factors officers and Seamen, and doe give you ye early advise thereof to prevent all Excuses, that may be pleaded of not haveing timely notice thereof, this prohibition takes place upon all Ships, that shall after this day goe out from hence, for India, and so commending you and our affaires to ye guidance and blessing of ye Almighty wee remaine

Robt Knox, which wee Intend shall all saile togeather from Gravesend ye 14th of August next, and may arrive at Bantam in March following, and depart thence all in comparabout ye 20th of May ensueing, one of them for Tonqueen & thence to Bantam and from Bantam home with pepper, ye other 3 all for Amoy. Thence one to your place, one to ye ffort and one to Surratt, and from each of thesse places directly for Europe with rough goods.

Wee have seldome observed such Premptoriness in Servants, but at length wee finde it accompanied with infidelity, as lately in Mr. John Bridger, whome Wee have discovered to hold corrispondency with the late Interloper Alley & also to send over great quantities of Diamonds, Pearles &c*, in the Shipp Sampson, unregistred, contrary not only to his trust but y* Oath he took of a freeman, before his going to India, and therefore we do hereby require you upon first Sight of this our order forthwith to Seize all his bookes papers money and effects that you can meet with in India and send him and all his bookes and papers home to us, (leaving him Copies of them) by this years Shipping, and to dispose of his money and effects in the Country to his best advantage, but bring the proceed of them into our Cash, wch: shal be duely accompted, [to bring] upon cleering of his Acco*: with us here.

all his bookes papers &ca to be seized upon he to be sent home with them.

3. Wee do likewise enjoyn you (all excuses set apart) to send home by this yeares Shipping M^r: Streynsham Master, M^r: Nattⁿ Cholmley and M^r: William Jerzey, except he do forthwith clear his Acco^t with us, and pay y^e Ballauce into our Cash there, upon which you may lett him continue longer & give him a generall release under our seale, & take the like discharge from him to the Company, in order whereunto take such light from the Papers formerly sent over for that purpose, and otherwise, as you can by Persons living y^t understand those transaccions.

the improvement of ye revenues by ye late Agt not see much as he Intimates. more effectuall means recomended to ye new Agent &ca. concerning writing and

Wee have great intimations from our [Late Agent of his] improvement of our Towne Revenues but considering our great expences before the late troubles, we find little difference on the Ballance, more than what ariseth from the naturall encrease of our people in that Towne the encrease of trade in the Place, and coynage of our Gold weh: Latter is onely an imaginary profitt: We hope you will find out more effectuall meanes to advance our said Revenue and particularly we enjoyne yn to pass no more Leases under our Seal to any Persons for a longer time than 99 yeares that of 999 lately granted, is unreasonable.
- 5. For sorting and packing of our Cloth, we referr you to w': we wrote in our Last years Letters, and the former, we': we would have you Peruse diligently and conform yo': Selves thereunto accordingly, remembring alwaies that ye holding of our Merchants strictly to their Musters & well sorting, is a matter of immense concernment to us, and wherein we have been exceedingly abused of late years.
- 6. For warehouse roome, if you really want, build what are sufficient & of dureable materialls: but see that our Warehouses have no goods put into them of your

leave for to build warehouses. owne or others, but onely such as do properly belong unto the Comp^a. & see that like rules be kept in all Subordinate Factories to your Agency But ostentatious & all unnecessary buildings not of absolute necessity we do utterly dislike & forbid in all Places.

- 7. You will see what wee have writt in former yeares, concerning you being reference to provided constantly wth. Petre & Turmerick, as also in or: Letters overland take concerning care never to faile us in that Respect.
- 8. We do yet require all English to live at the Fort, that we permit to stay & Trade there, but every man, that you judge hath had, or may have any Correspond ency with Interlopers, We require you to send home without favour or affection and for those that stay with yo': leave & not in our Service, compell them to pay two # Cent at least towards the Compa: former and latter Charge of procuring Phyrmaunds and priviledges and giving them protection except they live at our [town?] of Madras that old scare crow of their runing under the Moores Governors, if they may not trade licentiously at their owne pleasure wth out contributing to the Compa vast expence Wee Looke upon as an idle suggestion, used onely to serve Private ends well knowing the difference between living under the Moores governmt and ours, is as wide as that between Slaves and ffreemen.
- 9. Our late Agents giving comissions to the Officers of our Garrison, wee looke upon as a vaine Ostentatious thing and to no good purpose we do therefore hereby re- Comissions voke and annull all Comissions given them before receipt of this letter, and order given to the expresly that no Comission be given any officer in our Garrison of Fort St. George, aproved of or at least that new ones be given them under the hands of all or four at least of our Councell there, our Agent for the time being to be one, and that no other Comission given formerly, or to be given to any Officer in or Garrison shall be of any force or validity.

12. The unworthy Slight offered to his Maties. & Councells orders touching ye Intr. Lopr. Alley by the late Agent & Councill & all others that neglected their duty therein is so unpardonable an offence, that as we have dismissed Mr. Bridger & Mr. Vincent on that accompt among others, So we are resolved no man shall abide in our Service, that was directly, or indirectly of any connivance therein; To web purpose we desire you by secret informations upon ye Oathes of credible persons & by all other meanes to gaine wir evidence you can touching that affair (without formall all effectuall mimick pedantique trialls such as were in the case of Mr: Mohun and Mr Mainwareing formerly) & whoever you find any way to have been guilty of connivance correspondence aid, privity or consent wth: any Interloper, discharg them our Service & send them home forthwith without fail favour or frindship, concerning which Interlop we shall write you more largely in some after clauses of this Letter.

13. We observe by the list sent us home what goods we had in or: Godown of all sorts undisposed of such a list we would have you not faile of sending us every yeare. And that you do not let any of ours lye unsold, whilst any of the same kind are sold or forced upon our Merchats there, weh: we have to much cause to suspect hath been too often practiced For prevention whereof for future Wee desire you every year upon contracting wth: our Merchants to oblige them to clear our Warehouses of all goods we have Unsold at certain prices & terms of paymant & delivery wth: our money such as in yor discreccons yu. shall judge for our advantage & not intollerable y manner of disposing to them By woh. you will do us a reall [sic] judge for our advantage by rendring all our ye Mercis: Stock, quick, active & usefull to us, web: otherwise would lye dead till our servants & shall be in ye other mens turnes are served, who in equity as well as good manners ought to give no Godowns. leave to go before them and if this be not duely & faithfully done, we shal be forced at length against our wills to revoke that boundless liberty we have given of an universall trade in India.

- 14. The way of making a joynt Stock of 100 Merchants, we like very well and desire it may be continued, as also that you never deal with any that are ffarmers of the Kings Townes or Revenues.

We formerly recomended it to our Agent & Councel to settle a Factory at Porto Nova which since the last Mutiny at the Fort Seemes to be more necessary as well as by reason of the late Interlopers nesting there so we hope before this, you have Orders for the effected that busines if not we would have it done by the first convenient opportunity, or else in some other port of the Chengy Country, but we think Porto Nova may be best however we shall leave that to your choyce, because you may probably being nearer see what is most expedient for our Service then we can at such a distance but if good Investments can be made there We think the forwardest of our Ships from the fort, may in her passage home fill up there without any loss of time in her way home.

- 22. Upon all the foregoing considerations, and a resolution we have taken by all meanes within our Charter to assert our Right, & Subdue all Interlopers their wth Agent & furtherers, Aiders or abettors, We have dispatched this Shipp the Defence early with a Corporall & some Soldiers to be a Guard & assistance to William Hedges Esq. one of our present Comittee here, whom for this extraordinary occasion and in confi-Defence with dence of the many promises he hath made us and ye Great assurances wee have had from his Relacons, being also of our Comittee. Wee have graced with the Title of Agent & Governor of all our affaires and Factories in the Bay of Bengall, independent upon our Agency of Fort St. George, or any other of our Agencyes, otherwise than as is hereafter menconed in this letter or as we shall in time to come direct.

35. You will finde the quantity of cloth now sent out, much larger than formerly weh: we do, to improve the Staple trade of England, as well as to secure our consider'd of. owne station, it being a most acceptable thing to all English Gentlemen to see us encrease our exportacon of that comodity. It wilbs your parts so to putt it of, that it may not lye a dead stock upon our hands & you may press it upon your native Merchants, as a duty incumbent upon them for we think ye sending of so much of that comodity supports us and in consequence them & yor: selves, it's as good and well sorted, as any ever went out of England.

- 43. Touching Interlopers or any English Ships or Men you shall suspect for such in India, We give you these positive orders in plaine words which we require you to observe & do; for woh: we shall fully clearly and absolutely acquit and indemnify you in all times and places and against all persons whatsoever.
- (1) Seize the persons of all English you shall find concerned with any of them and keep and send them home by the first ships for England whatever it cost us, to surprize them by force or otherwise 2^{ndly}: Seize or other wise secure, as you can most conveniently and effectually all their Books Papers monies & effects whatsoever and bring the same to our Credit upon a particular Acco^t: for that purpose 3^{dly}: Comand any of the Comanders of our ships to seize their ships in any Parts of India and sell and dispose them to our Credit in Acco^t: as aforesaid.
- (4) To prevent Bloodshed beforehand promise all the Officers & seamen (except the Comander & Purser) aboard any interlopeing shipp or other English shipp in India (that hath not a Pass or Permission from us) there full pay due to that time all their owne Goods and double wages in our Service, in case they will quietly resigne the shipp and Merchants goods on board to his Maties: and the Companies use.
- (5) If any English that shall have to do with interloping ships fly to the Moores or other Governors: send letters & Presents after them requireing them to be delivered to you to be sent to England according to his Maties: Charter & this our Order.

- (7) Send Copies of these Instructions, and of all others we have or shall give you touching these matters of Interlopers or other English that trade in India without our permission, to all Factories under yo^r Agency And if you find any of our Factors or servants slack or remiss in the promoting or executing these our Orders turn them out of service and send them for England by the first Shipps.
- (8) If you can invent or contrive any other waies or meanes not now enumerated to you by us to enervate frustrate or destroy the Voyages of any English trading in India as Interlopers or without our Agents, Chiefs and Councels permission, saving ye Persons lives or limbs wen shalbe concerned therein, We require & impower you hereby to doe it, wherein & for wen: we shall justify you in all times & places being resolved, that while the management rests in our hands we will not suffer his Ma^{ties}: Charter to be Villified or affronted by any persons whatsover.

Wee have alwayes declined, as you will find by former yeares letters Throwne Silke, Although there be now [sic] law in England against the importation of it, but now being to vye with the Dutch in or owne way of trade web we were never before putt to Wee would have you provide for us, & send us home every year, as well as this, what you can procure thereof (not exceeding 100 bales) soe as it lessens not or provision of Raw silk, web wee would have keept full to the utmost we't notwithstanding wee doe not intend to sell it in England but after wee have it here wee export it again for France or Holland web wee know is a good & nationall service; by which his Maty will gaine half Custome, our Shipping Double Freight, and ourselves # adventure as much, as by most other Comodities yt wee sell at home.

Wee send you with this packquet 30 of his Maties: Proclamations which we would have you cause to be proclamied or published in all our Factories, with greatest ffactores wth Solemnity you can, and for the future to suffer no English persons Ships or Vessells to trade without our passes nor any Natives that have usually had our passes to our owne Factors and servants that wee have given a liberty of Trade (so as they use that persons or Vessells trade liberty not to our detriment) and also to Natives you may give our passes at the accustomary fees but not any that are not Natives or in our Service, without paying for them a duty to us, as in your discretions you can agree not exceeding 2 #Cent of the value of Ship & goods. In which at first we desire not that you should be rigorous but bring them by degrees to Comply with what is reasonable towards our vast charge of procuring & maintaining our Priviledges in India as well as here.

And to the intent you may be the fuller impowered to condemn all English An addi-Ships and goods that shalbe traded in or for in India contrary to his Maties: Charter We tionall Charter to have procured an additionall Charter impowering us to Judge and condemn in India condemn &ca &ca. A copy of which Charter you shall have herewith if we can get it pass the seals Judge In India. time enough to go by this ship otherwise you shall have it by our Coast Ships that are to saile after Christmas, We shall likewise endeavowr to procure some blanck Comissions for the Comanders of our small Vessells from his Maty: of the tenour of those granted to Capt Heath and Capt Wilshaw.

We hear of no Privateer yet set out from hence but onely the Head ffrigot, noe privateer which being got as farr as the Downes, the Owners & ffreighters have since the but head frigot since coming forth of his Ma^{ties}: Said Proclamation sold us the whole ship and goods, and his Majis we have put in one Mr Thomas Raynes to be Comander of her and ordered her to sold us ye saile with the Defence and to remaine in the Country for our Service there and if whol ship & same with the Defence and to remaine in the Country for our Service there and it is assessible sail well may be imployed to pick up any small vessells that saile without our goods. Passes, for bigger Privateers you must employ our Europe Ships and if any of them the kings refuse to obey therein the Kings Comission Proclamation and our Orders, protest Comission protest them and load no goods on board them have used for any Access. against them and load no goods on board them homewards for our Accots. If you can against them by other Ships send us home all our fine goods which we alwaies do most desire.

We have taken our Now Patent for all Interlopers &ca: to be condemned and Patent for sold for his Maties: use, which if we had desired we might as easily have had to our be Condemna owne use, but we are not covetous of any mans goods but our owne, but resolved to & sold for Majys use bring all persons in India to a conformity to his Maties: Charter and in order there-reward to be unto if there be occasion, We hereby impower you to reward the Comand and Sea-made. men of any of our ships that shall seiz any Interloper within the limits of our seamen take Charter with one third part of the reall proceed of any Interloper that they shall Interlopers seiz and bring in to you to be condemned according to his Maties: Charter now granted us and proclamation, Which third part given as a reward to such of our Comanders and Seamen We doubt not but to procure his Maties: allowance of, the other thirds you are to bring to an accot: apart for his Maties: use.

Till we know hou our head frigot shall prove, or what occasion you may have never keep for her there, we can give you no limitted order concerning her use, but in generall idle upon our take this for a Standing rule, never to keep any Vessell idle upon our charge nor Charge. to send them up to the ffort if there be roome enough in our Europe ships to carry up so much salt petre & Turmerick to the ffort as we have ordered The consequence whereof is if you employ her in Hughly River while our ships are there you may send her after such employment to Mr Gibbs our Agent in Persia with proper Sugars for that place.

And if you cannot contrive a more gainfull employment for her fail not to bespeake and contract for her Sugars in due time that she may be instantly dispatched for Persia as soone as you have done with her at Hughly.
