#### Introduction

The Madras Institute of Development Studies was founded in January 1971 as a trust by Dr. Malcolm S. Adiseshiah and Mrs. Elizabeth Adiseshiah with a four-fold objective:

- To undertake studies and research pertaining to development problems with special reference to the agro-rural aspects of Tamil Nadu and the problems of the economically and socially backward sections of the population throughout the country;
- To conduct seminars and conferences on development problems and programmes of the state;
- To foster inter-university co-operation among the social scientists of the Universities of the four Southern States;
- To promote interdisciplinary research; and bring out publications relating to the above three functions.

During 1976 the Government of India through the Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi, sent a mission headed by Prof. D. T. Lakdawala to study the possibility of developing the Institute into a National Institute of Social Science Research. On the basis of the recommendations of the mission the Institute was reconstituted as a National Institute in March 1977 under the joint sponsorship of the Government of India through the Indian Council of Social Science Research and the Government of Tamil Nadu with a Governing Council comprising representatives of the ICSSR and the State Government and of the Universities of the four southern states, the original trustees of the Institute and co-opted social scientists as given in Annexure 1. The trustees gifted to the reconstituted National Institute its land and building, its library, furniture and equipment and a cash endowment. An Academic Council has been constituted to discuss and review the annual academic programme of the Institute. The members of the Academic Council are listed in Annexure II.

Dr. Malcolm S. Adiseshiah served as the Director of the Institute from its inception till June 1978. Dr. C. T. Kurien took up charge as Director of the reconstituted Institute in July 1978. Dr. A. Vaidyanathan served as Director during 1988-89; Dr. Nirmal Sengupta acted as Director during 1990 and Dr. S. Neelakantan took over as Director on July 2, 1990.

With the reconstitution, the scope of the Institute's activities has widened. Besides conducting research on various aspects of development (both generally and with special reference to Tamil Nadu), organising seminars and conferences, and fostering inter-university cooperation, the Institute's charter now provides for the conduct of teaching-cum-research programmes leading to Ph. D. degrees, expansion of the library and strengthening the social science documentation activities.

The Institute has completed twentyone years of service this year. It has engaged itself in continuing research in the social sciences, especially in relation to the issues pertaining to the Tamil Nadu Economy.

During the year under review, there is continuation of the trend noticed earlier of the faculty publications in books, journals, periodicals and newspapers predominating over institute publications. Because of the severe financial constraint, the Institute has not recruited new members even to existing vacancies in faculty positions. The library acquisition have also dwindled. In spite of this, the activities of the Institute are continuing vigorously as could be seen from this report. We are happy that our younger members have been selected for award of international fellowship for research/post doctoral work. This review highlights the various facets of the Institute's functioning for the period July 1991 to June 1992.

#### Personnel

Dr. Malcolm S. Adiseshiah, Chairman of the Institute has remained active in academic and public life.

(Dr. C. T. Kurien retired on 31st July, 1991 and Dr. A. Vaidyanathan on 31st October 1991. The Governing Council extended invitations to both of them to serve as Emeritus Professors of the Institute. Both of them have accepted the Governing Council's invitations to continue as Emeritus Professors.)

Dr. M.S.S. Pandian availed the Common-Wealth Research Fellowship to pursue post doctoral studies at the School of Oriental and African Studies, London for a year and returned back at the end of April 1992. Dr. Hema accepted a Ford Foundation Fellowship to pursue research for one year from September 1991 at the University of California, Berkeley. The list of members of the Institute and their areas of specialisation is listed in *Annexure* III.

### **Research Activities and Projects**

The research interests of the faculty of

our Institute cover a wide range. Depending on the theme, focus and the target audience, the individual members selected the medium for communication which included Institute publications, full length books, papers in edited books, articles in scholarly journals, newspaper articles, book reviews, seminar presentation and lectures. *Annexure IV* gives the list of MIDS publication; *Annexure V* contains the list of books and contributions to books; *Annexure VI* lists the articles to journals, newspapers; and book reviews, seminars presented and lectures delivered are given in *Annexure VII*.

In the Institute, the interest of the faculty member determines the range and scope of his / her research activities. It is their direct concern over the areas to be studied which impels them to undertake research projects. In the year under review the Institute had undertaken projects for the Planning Commission, Goyernment of India, ICSSR, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, The Tamil Nadu Electricity Board, Madras Metropolitan Development Authority and Times Research Foundation, Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology, Madras Chamber of Commerce and Industry and French Institute, Pondicherry. The list of projects undertaken is given in Annexure VIII.

#### **Other Activities**

The faculty members have participated in several academic and public activities. *Annexure IX* gives a brief list of the public activities of the members. In addition, faculty members served in other capacities also. They were called upon to lead group discussions, preside over seminars, act as examiners for research degrees, serve as referees/members of the editorial committees of journals, and as members of academic bodies for preparation of syllabi.

#### Seminars and Visitors

The practice of holding Monthly Seminars regularly continued during the period under review. In addition, there were special seminars and seminars by visitors. The list of Visitors is given in *Annexure X*. The list of Monthly Seminars is reported in *Annexure XI*. The report on special seminars and the seminars by visitors is listed in *Annexure XII*.

## **RBI** Chair

The Reserve Bank of India established a unit in our Institute for undertaking applied

research in regional economics in 1985 for a five year period. In 1991, the Reserve Bank of India extended the support to the unit on a continuing basis, subject to comprehensive review in 1996. The unit comprises of a Professor, one Research Associate and one Steno-Typist. Dr. Nasir Tyabji has been seconded to the RBI Chair and Dr. S. Janakarajan has been seconded as the Research Associate in the RBI Unit. The report of the RBI Unit is appended separately as *Annexure XIII*.

### Inter-University Co-operation

The Institute had always taken active interest in promoting inter-university cooperation. Every year, generally in the month of December, a meeting of the Social Scientists of the Southern Universities would be held in the Institute for which the Southern Regional Centre of the ICSSR, Hyderabad provides financial support.

In the month of April, the Annual Workshop of Ph. D. Scholars and Guides is held for four days for which the participants are drawn mainly from the different universities of Tamil Nadu. The ICSSR provides grants towards the expenses of this meeting. In collaboration with ICSSR, the Institute annually conducts Interdisciplinary Research Methodology Workshop whose venue is rotated among various universities/institutes. The Institute also conducts an annual Census of the Social Science Research undertaken in the different universities of South India. The reports on these activities of inter-university cooperation are separately given as *Annexure XIV*.

## **Doctoral Programme**

The Institute's doctoral programme is now well established. The ICSSR and RBI have instituted fellowships for award of doctoral scholars in the Institute. The Ph. D. Scholars of the Institute are registered with the University of Madras. During the year under review Mrs. Asha Krishnakumar and Mr. V. Chandrasekara Naidu have submitted their thesis to the University for evaluation. The Institute also had a full time post-doctoral fellow and a Faculty Affiliate. The list of Doctoral candidates, full time Fellows and faculty Affiliates of the Institute is given in *Annexure XV*.

### Library

The Institute has laid special emphasis on building up its library. The library is very intensely used by the research scholars of Tamil Nadu. It receives 194 Indian and foreign journals. It has over 33,000 volumes in the shelves. In the year under review the library could purchase only an additional 161 titles because of the paucity of grants. The grants of the funding agencies was not enough to meet the regular recurring expenditure of the Institute. So there had been a drastic cut in the allotment of funds to the library during this year. Efforts are being made to obtain adequate funding for the Library at least from next year.

#### **Building Programme**

During 1989 the ICSSR sanctioned Rs. 12.5 lakhs towards the construction of the additional block to the existing building and the Tamil Nadu Government, in principle, agreed to sanction a matching grant of the same amount. Plans were drawn for a four floor block in the plot behind the existing building. where the Director's residence was located. As the sanctioned amount would be adequate to cover the construction cost of the first two floors only, it was decided that the actual construction would be taken up in two stages. In the first stage the ground and first floors were to be constructed. Actual construction commenced in September 1991 after the Director's residence standing in the plot was demolished. While the construction was progressing, the plan was modified to include more space for faculty use. In order to optimally use the existing space and to enlarge the facilities in the library, alterations are proposed in the existing building also.

The construction work is progressing satisfactorily. The new building is expected to be ready for occupation by the end of January 1993. Immediately afterwards it is proposed to take up the alterations to the existing building.

#### Finance

The ICSSR and Tamil Nadu Government have fully released the grants for recurring expenditure for the year 1991-92 by the end of March 1992 and for the year 1992-93 has sanctioned a sum of Rs. 16.3 lakhs. This reports an increase of Rs.50,000 only for 1992-93 over the grant of 1991-92. This will not be sufficient to alter the current situation of insufficiency of funds. The ICSSR has intimated the Institute that the existing vacancies need not be filled. Under these circumstances the Institute is forced to function without the full complement of the faculty staff. The library has become a major victim of the financial crunch. Financial statements are in Annexure XVI.

The Tamil Nadu Electricity Board sponsored this project which investigated the policy on giving power supply to new high tension industries in Tamil Nadu.

b) Metropolitan Economy of Madras: Project Directors: Dr. K. Nagaraj and Dr. P. Paul P. Appasamy

Sponsored by the Madras Metropolitan Development Authority and Times Research Foundation the project dealt with the overview of the metropolitan economy, growth of Madras Metropolitan Area and the employment aspects of MMA.

c) Management of Renewable Resources in Tamil Nadu - Project Directors: Dr. Paul P. Appasamy & Dr. S. Sivarajasingham.

Sponsored by Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology the project

deals with an action plan on the Management of Renewable Natural Resources in Tamil Nadu State.

### 2. Ongoing Projects

The survey work is going on.

#### Union Budget

A special seminar on "Union Budget and the Economy" jointly sponsored by Madras Institute of Development Studies and Madras University School of Economics was held on Saturday, 10th August, 1991 in the Seminar room, Dr. Malcolm S Adiseshiah chaired the session and Mr. S. Guhan presented an Overview. In the first session Mr. K. R. Ramamani, Tax Expert initiated discussions about new tax proposals and second session impact. In the their Dr. S. V. Bokil of Institute for Financial Management and Research initiated discussion about external economic transactions and budget.

In the post lunch third session Dr. U. Sankar of Uuiversity of Madras initiated discussions about fiscal deficit and macro economic implications. In the valedictory session, Dr. C. T. Kurein initiated discussion on the general impact of the budget.

#### World Development Report 1991

A seminar on "World Development Report 1991" jointly Organised by MIDS and Institute for Financial Management and Research was held on 11th September and attended by over 25 Participants at the IFMR Premises. The World Bank's World Development Report 1991 sets the agenda for development, brings together the various separate aspects of development dealt within its past Development Reports. #### **Report on RBI Chair**

Dr. Nasir Tyabji continues his work in the areas of industry and technology. The final manuscript of the book "Colonialism, Chemical Technology and Industry in Madras 1880-1937", to be published by Oxford University Press, has been sent to the publishers. Current work is on more specific and recent aspects of technology absorption and industrial growth. The first is with reference to the transport sector in Tamil Nadu during the First and Second Plan periods, based on Archival data; the second concerns the period from 1975 to 1990, based on a survey of firms which have undertaken foreign collaboration in Tamil Nadu. Results of the second study will be presented to a Seminar at the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library in September 1992.

Dr. S. Janakarajan, Research Associate, main focus is on irrigation and water management studies. For the Union Planning Commission, he has undertaken the project on "Aspects of Groundwater Irrigation in the Vaigai Basin". In collaboration with Dr. Paul Seabright, the study on "Government Intervention and Agrarian Transformation in Trichy district : A case study of wet and dry villages" is in Progress.

#### Inter-University Cooperation

# 1. Twentyfirst Meeting of Social Scientists Of Southern States

The Twenty—first Meeting of Social Southern Universities Scientists of the was held at the Institute on December Scholars from Mangalore, 21-22, 1991. Kottayam, Madras, Tirupathur, Hyderabad, Mysore and Tiruchirapalli Visakapatnam. attended the meeting. (Two theme papers on autonomy were discussed at the meeting. Dr. Madhusudan Reddy, Principal, University College of Arts and Science and Honorary Director, ICSSR, SRC, Hyderabad discussed the general issues of autonomy based on his paper on "Curriculum Development in (Issues and Universities and Colleges' The second paper by Dr. C. Problems). Economics. Thangamuthu, professor of Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli was on "Autonomy for Colleges - The Vision and the Reality". There was also a presentation by Dr. Masood Ali Khan of ICSSR, SRC, Hyderabad on the features of the Andhra Pradesh commissionerate of Higher Education Act. 1987. The functioning of the autonomy in three city based colleges viz. Women's Christian College, Madras, Christian College and Ethiraj College for Women were also discussed, apart from the various presentation by Heads of Southern Universities.

## 2. Twentysecond Census of Social Science Research in Southern States

The Twenty-Second Census of Social The Science Research records 409 entries. entries are not only on a rise since 1987 but well ahead of last year's 369 entries. Twentyfive institutions responded to the request for information. (Of the total 409 entries, Economics leads with 305, which is a sharp rise from last year's 278 entries.) History takes the second place with 26 entries followed by Education with 22 entries and Adult Education with 16 and Sociology with 13. Commerce, Demography, Law, Philosophy and Political Science have not found their entries this year although Agriculture, Psychology and Social Work recorded negligible entries similar to last year. The figures for the remaining subjects are : Agriculture 3, Anthropology 8, Geography 11, Psychology 2 and Social Work 3.

# Meeting of Ph.D. Scholars and Guides

(The Institute had its annual Workshop of Ph.D. Scholars and Guides from 22nd to 25th April, 1992, About 40 Ph.D. Scholars and 15 Guides, drawn from different parts of Tamil Nadu, from the disciplines of Economics, Sociology, History and Criminology participated.

(The orientation lectures were by Professor B. G. Halbar, Karnatak University, Dharwad, on "Economy and Society", and "Field-worker and the Field" on April 22 and 23 respectively; by Dr. S V. Bokil from the Institute for Financial Management and Research, Madras, on "Use and Misuse of Statistics in Research with Special Reference to India's Data-Base" on April 23; and by Prof. T. Prabha, from the Lady Doak College, Madurai, on "Research Methods in Social Sciences", on April 24.

In the afternoon sessions from April 22 to 24, as many as 30 research proposals covering a wide range of topics in the broad areas of industry, agriculture, irrigation, health, environment, education, social policy, women's issues and urbanisation, were presented by the Ph.D. Scholars for discussion by the entire group of participants. On April 25, the workshop began with a brief presentation of the overall assessment of the proceedings of the preceding three days by Dr. P. Radhakrishnan. The valedictory address was given by the Institute's Director.

### Twenty Second Meeting of Interdisciplinary Research Methodology Workshop.

The Institute had its Twenty second Interdisciplinary Research Methodology Workshop (in collaboration with ICSSR) from 3rd to 6th June, 1992, at Institute of Development Studies, University of Mysore. There were in all 42 participants drawn from various disciplines and institutes.) Nine papers were presented. From the Institute, Dr. S. Neelakantan, Paul P. Appasamy, P. Radhakrishnan and Ms. R. Akila Participated. Dr. P. Radhakrishnan and Ms. R. Akila Presented a paper on India's Educational Efforts : Rhetoric and Reality. Dr. Paul P. Appasamy and Ms. R. Akila were discussants for two of the papers. Dr. Neelakantan and Dr. Paul P. Appasamy chaired one session each. The papers and proceedings will be published in due course in the Bulletin.
