

MALCOLM S. ADISESHIAH

April 18, 1910 - November 21, 1994.

Our Founder-Chairman, Malcolm S Adiseshiah, passed away during the early hours of November 21, 1994. From the very inception he had a vision about the direction the Institute should take. In addition to the munificence with which he and Mrs. Elizabeth Adiseshiah endowed this Institute, he toiled tirelessly to steer the Institute along the envisaged path. Many of the continuing activities of the Institute such as the annual Inter-Disciplinary Research Methodology Workshop, annual Workshop of Ph. D. Scholars and Guides, annual Meeting of the Heads of Social Science Departments of Southern Universities and annual Census of Social Science Research in Southern States were pioneered by him. He single-handedly oversaw the publication of the "Bulletin - Madras Development Seminar Series" right from its inception in 1971 in which his unique editorial was its largest and crucial component. Most important of all, he himself set an example for all others as to what a faculty member was expected to do in a research Institute. He gathered information assiduously, collated and organised them systematically, analysed them rigorously and logically, and disseminated the conclusions through every available medium so as to reach all classes of people. Every year he would regularly send his annual work report to the Academic Council of the Institute. These reports show his enormous range of interests. His hard work, punctuality, simplicity and unfailing courtesy would remain etched in the memory of all the members of the Institute who had the privilege to work in His lifelong commitment to the promotion of literacy, spread of education and removal of poverty animated him in all his activities. He maintained a fierce independence in his views and expressed them freely and fearlessly, respecting at the same time the views of others in equal measure. As a liberal democrat he never imposed his will on the governance of the Institute; but with his leadership quality, intellectual acumen, integrity and perseverance, persuaded and convinced the members about the correctness of his decisions and carried them We shall cherish his fine legacy and strive hard to preserve and follow his vision. with him.

Personnel

Sarvapalli Gopal, Emeritus Professor, Jawaharlal Nehru University, took charge as Chairman of the Institute with effect from January 23, 1995.

Many of the academic and administrative positions which remained vacant for a long time - in some cases for over four years - were filled during the year under review. Four Professors (K Nagarai, Padmini Swaminathan, P Radhakrishnan and S Subramanian). four Fellows (R Hema, S Janakarajan, Janaki Nair and D Jayaraj), and three Research Associates (Ananta K Giri, Anindita Mukherjee and Manabi Majumdar) were recruited. Two Fellows (U Kalpagam and Paul P Appasamy) were promoted as Professors by surrendering two posts of Fellows and upgrading them as Professors. K Nagarai, Padmini Swaminathan, Paul P Appasamy, P Radhakrishnan and S Subramanian, R Hema, S Janakarajan, D Jayaraj, and Manabi Majumdar joined duty on November 1, 1994; Janaki Nair on November 7, 1994; and Ananta K.Giri on January 2, 1995. In a leave vacancy, a Professor (R Thamaraiakshi) was recruited. R Thamarajakshi, U Kalpagam and Anindita Mukherjee did not join duty. Under the Faculty Evaluation Scheme, C Annadurai was promoted as Research Associate with effect from August 26, 1994.

The post of Administrative Officer was redesignated as Administrative-Cum-Accounts Officer and N M Perianayagam was appointed to the post with effect from November 1, 1994. The post of Accounts Manager was transferred from accounts side to administrative side and redesignated as Assistant Administrative Officer, J Robinson Thomas was appointed to that post with effect from November 1, 1994. V Ramalingam was promoted as Accountant by surrendering a post of Typist cum clerk and he joined duty on April 1, 1995; and M Suvakin was promoted as Record Clerk with effect from April 1, 1995 by surrendering the post of a messenger. The services of Mr. V Vasudevan, Library Attender, was terminated with effect from November 14, 1994.

K Nagaraj was at the Centre for Indian Studies, St.Antony's College, Oxford as a Visiting Fellow from May 20, 1995 to July 4, 1995.

Faculty Members and their areas of interest are shown in **Annexure III**. The composition of administration and library is given in **Annexure IV**.

Research Activities

1996 will be celebrated as the Silver Jubilee Year of the Institute. Therefore it is fitting to briefly review the progress made so far. Malcolm S Adiseshiah had listed four objectives when he founded the Institute:

To undertake studies and research pertaining to development problems with special reference to the agro-rural aspects of Tamil Nadu and the problems of the economically and socially backward sections of the population throughout the country.

- To conduct seminars and conferences on development problems and programmes of the State.
- * To foster inter-university cooperation among the social scientists of the Universities of the four southern states.
- To promote inter-disciplinary research, and bring out publications relating to the above three functions.

In the course of its functioning, the first objective has been extended to cover all aspects of the socioeconomic problems of Tamil Nadu, in addition to those of the rest of the country.

During 1976 the Government of India through the Indian Council of Social Science Research. New Delhi. sent a mission headed by Prof.D.T.Lakdawala to study the possibility of developing the Institute into a national institute of social science research. On the basis of the recommendations of the mission the Institute was reconstituted as a national institute in March 1977 under the joint sponsorship of the Indian Council of Social Science Research and the Government of Tamil Nadu, with a Governing Council comprising representatives of the ICSSR. State Government. Universities of the four southern states, original trustees of the Institute and coopted social scientists as given in Annexure I. The trust gifted to the reconstituted national institute its land and building, library, furniture, equipment, and a cash endowment.

As per the trust deed, the Institute also has an Academic Council, which meets twice a year. It consists of both external and internal members. While all the professors of the Institute serve on it as permanent members, other faculty members and the Ph.D. Scholars serve on rotation. The Director of the Institute is its exofficio Chairman. The composition of the current Academic Council is mentioned in Annexure II.

A Self-Appraisal report is being prepared for distribution in the Silver Jubilee year, and its draft is now available for comments and modification. The draft prepared by Prof. Radhakrishnan gives a summary of the major work done by the faculty of the Institute since it was reconstituted as a national institute in March 1977 under the joint sponsorship of the Indian Council of Social Science Research and the Government of Tamil Nadu. It would bear evidence to the fact that the Institute has striven hard to fulfill the goals it had set for itself and has had considerable success in achieving its objectives.

Some of the reasons for this success are listed:

- * The Institute has been able to give the faculty autonomy to pursue their research interests by minimising procedural constraints on their activities and by respecting their freedom of expression.
- * The Institute has built up a large corpus of data and analytical material relating to economy, polity and society, especially in the context of Tamil Nadu. For a vast country such as India with its variety and diversity, the collection and analysis of regional data is an essential function which the institute is able to discharge effectively. The Institute, however, has taken care not to confine itself to the study of Tamil Nadu, or to empirical studies.
- * There are not many research institutions comparable to this Institute where social scientists from diverse disciplines are able to interact freely and produce output transcending the traditional boundaries of the basic disciplines such as economics, sociology or statistics to which they originally belonged.

- The Institute has encouraged both theoretical and empirical work; and many faculty members have combined their research work both effectively and collectively. Wherever necessary the members have made their policy orientation clear and have used their research in Committees and Commissions to recommend policy.
- The faculty members have taken active part in academic debates, seminars and conferences, regional, national and international, government committees, activities of government and nongovernment organisations, government arructures of academic institutions, and evaluation procedures of state activities. This has enabled them individually, and the Institute collectively, to come into contact with a number of individuals and organisations with diverse interests. This has helped them to widen their academic space for evaluation of their competence, and broaden their outlook and output. They are not afraid of criticism and do not attempt to silence it.
- * Their multiple contacts have also given the Institute access to policy/decision makers and media. The independent opinions of the faculty have earned a degree of respect from the discerning public.
- The Institute had been and is a host to a number of Faculty and Student Affiliates (Indian and foreign), which has brought a mutually beneficial interaction to the Institute with internationally reputed research scholars.
- * The doctoral theses of the Institute have won recognition for their high quality and original research. Some of them have been published as books, while quite a few others have found their place in scholarly journals.
- * The available infrastructure and support services are shared relatively more evenly by the faculty and scholars and with a great deal of tolerance.
- * The Institute has taken a policy decision not to take up consultancy work in the sense that the sponsor agencies would have the exclusive rights to use the information; and the faculty members would be entitled to receive the whole or part of

the fees in addition to their salary from the Institute. However, members of the faculty are permitted to take up project work in the areas in which they have expertise. The Institute has taken care to see that it is not transformed into an entirely project driven institution. Aware of the fact that all areas of research might not be able to attract project funding, and that project-directors may be privileged to obtain more of perquisites and amenities, the Institute has consciously striven to equalise, within bounds, the availability of facilities to all faculty members. The faculty time charged to the projects and project surplus, if any, are used for the benefit of the Institute.

- The faculty have agreed to half-yearly evaluation of their work by the Academic Council and, a triennial evaluation by a Committee of the Academic Council.
- * The Institute has managed to build up a fine library, which is a basic necessity for the success of any social science research organisation. Recognising its importance, the Tamil Nadu Government has sanctioned an annual grant to cover part of its expenditure on books and journals which has saved it from the possibility of discontinuing journal subscriptions in the years of financial stringency.

While the Institute can thus feel proud of its achievements within a short span of time, it is not free from inadequacies. I list below the chief among them:

- * There have been excellent products of team-work from the Institute such as the "Tamil Nadu Economy: Performance and Issues". Even now very good work is going on through joint efforts. Still, there is much greater scope for improvement in this direction.
- * The fond hope of the ICSSR in the seventies that there would be continuous movement of faculty and scholars from the Universities to the Institutes and vice versa has not materialised. Though the Institute has fairly good contacts with other ICSSR Institutes and Universities in the region, there is great scope for improvement.
- * There are inherent difficulties in comparing the academic output of the faculty. Still, there is

considerable unevenness in the nature of output. More efforts are needed by the faculty to fulfill their academic obligations.

- In the past few years, the doctoral programme of the Institute has not been able to attract enough scholars who have passed the UGC/NET, who alone are eligible for ICSSR doctoral fellowships. So we have a situation in which there are fellowships to grant but not scholars to grant them to. The RBI has relaxed that eligibility condition for the award of its fellowships, but the total RBI fellowships at any given time cannot exceed four. Hence, the need for rethinking about the eligibility criteria by ICSSR for admission to the Ph.D. Programme is a matter for serious consideration.
- The Institute has not been able to structure its doctoral programme in a satisfactory manner. Though all those who have obtained their doctoral degree from the Institute have received high praise for their work, among the existing scholars, there is a certain feeling of dissatisfaction regarding the course work. The scholars from rural background have real difficulties in expressing their ideas in English. These matters have been repeatedly discussed in the Academic Council. But no satisfactory solution has emerged so far.
- The Intern's Programme of the Institute provided a good testing ground for potential doctoral scholars. The common entrance test for the award of the ICSSR fellowship made it impossible for interns directly to be selected as doctoral scholars. There is need for revival of this programme to encourage capable scholars to pursue serious research in selected areas.
 - The Institute has given its staff/faculty Tamil Nadu Government/UGC pay scales. But it has not been able to match the other service conditions including allowances, leave encashment etc. The incentive structure thus is becoming unattractive to the newcomers and to the existing members to remain.
- Being a small Institute, the avenues for promotion for the administrative and library staff are practically nil. This has dampened their motivation and enthusiasm.

The infra-structural facilities of the Institute are still grossly inadequate. The library needs to be computerised urgently. There is need for more telephone connections. The other computational facilities needs improvement. A Documentation Division has to be added to the Library. A databank has to be established. There is need for more office automation. Additional transport facilities is an urgent requirement. More importantly, there is need for additional space. Due to want of finances, the vacancies for class IV posts remain unfilled. While the number of faculty has increased since 1985, the number of administrative staff has remained constant or diminished.

The ratio of administrative staff to faculty is one of the lowest among all ICSSR Institutes. All these have an impact on efficiency.

The most troublesome part is the finances of the Institute.

The Institute constantly faces financial insecurity. This is true of most of the ICSSR institutions. When the Institute came under the joint-sponsorship of the ICSSR and Government of Tamil Nadu, it was agreed in principle that the recurring expenditure would be shared by them. Since 1992, the ICSSR is urging the Institutes to find their own sources of funding and has nearly frozen its grants. So the Institute faces a deficit every year, which is getting accumulated over the years.

Whereas the receipts of income for the Institute are at discreet intervals, the expenditure stream is continuous. The lack of a buffer is a cause of anxiety to the administration.

There is no certainty about the quantum of ICSSR grants now. In such a situation, it is difficult to plan ahead; and much of the efforts of the administration is devoted to make both ends meet.

Whenever the UGC and the Tamil Nadu Government revise the scales of pay or allowances, the grant from the funding agencies are not increased to cover the additional costs involved. This forces the institute to reallocate the funds among various heads of expenditure to meet the

additional expenditure under this head, leading to inadequate infrastructural facilities and to drying up of the funds for library.

- ** The procedural delays in getting the sanctioned funds released are a cause for grave concern. The ICSSR could very well set the dates of: (a) sanction for the entire year; and (b) releases of the sanctioned amount in three or four equal instalments. The last instalment must be released giving the Institute adequate time to get the matching grant released from the State government before the end of the financial year.
- The costs of conducting the IDRM Workshop, Ph.D. Scholars and Guides Workshop, the Meeting of the Heads of Social Science Departments in Southern States and the Census of Social Science Research in Southern States, all the annual features of this institute, are rising. The printing costs of journals and publications are also skyrocketing. But the grants from the funding agencies are not increasing proportionately.
- In the past few years, many of the faculty and administrative positions were kept vacant deliberately to keep the expenditure of the Institute within manageable limits given the fact that the income did not increase commensurate with the increase in expenditure. This can only be a short-term solution to the problems of finances. In the long-run such a policy would lead to decadence.

Turning to the activities in the year under review, the recruitment of new faculty to the institute has added to the spectrum of issues studied in the Institute. Given the fact that the faculty generally set their own research agenda, the institute has a regional focus, the research embraces both empirical and theoretical work and the research of many of the members are not confined to traditional single disciplines such as economics, history and sociology, any attempt at classifying the studies would be arbitrary. So what is attempted below is only to indicate the topics under broad subject sets covered by the rese ruch studies.

In the major area of agriculture and rural development, the Institute's faculty have focused more on irrigation and water management. Studies

in the area include trading in groundwater, aquifer over-exploitation, river basin studies, land records and irrigation rights, composite measure of performance for irrigation systems, issues of project design of multi-purpose projects, sharing of water resources between rural and urban users, integration of land and water management, and role of bureaucracy in water management. Land transfers in villages and growth of non-agricultural employment, labour force participation of women in rural India, trends in public expenditure in Tamil Nadu on agriculture, village studies by resurvey of villages are some of the other important topics of research.

In industrial economics, the issues explored include public sector in the context of new economic policy, privatisation of banks, and factors that influence the making of an industrial district.

Education is the research concern of a few faculty members. Topics researched include: Pre-British, British and Post-British access to education in India, the role of private sector in education, rural literacy scene in different states, study of variations in educational participation, and relative educational backwardness of significant population groups.

Environment and common property resources are important areas of research. Environmental lessons from traditional water management systems, urban environmental issues, environmental sustainability of technologies, approaches to environmental impact assessment, impact of interventions on common pool resources and solid waste management could be classified under this category.

Some faculty members are developing historical perspectives on a range of issues related to South India, notably the successive transformation of Dravidian ideology, notions of territoriality and the development of a regional identity in Tamil Nadu and Karnataka. Historical studies on the labouring poor, the economy, and the legal structure of South India also form part of faculty research interests.

Gender is an important category of analysis for some research done at the Institute. These include gender analysis of the development experience in India, of

population and development policies, and of the impact of globalisation and its impacts differently on men and women.

Understanding the dynamics of contemporary transformation and ethnographic enquiry into the vision and picture of critical social and cultural movements as well as new movements of ideas constitute an area of research and reflection in the Institute. Critical interrogation of the current terms of discourse such as democracy, welfare state, globalisation, critical pedagogy, universal morality, communicative action, quality of life, social criticism, self-criticism, and institutional transformation of culture are studied within this framework.

In health economics, health care access and health financing and survey of morbidity are topics of study. Specific issues in public distribution system of Tamil Nadu have been examined within the overall context of the problems of the food economy of India. Poverty studies include issues in the measurement of inequality, poverty and discrimination, poverty and social security, impact of caste on rural poverty, and demographic characteristics of deprived sections. Urbanisation and migration forms a separate category of study.

Issues of federalism in relation to the reform process, finance commissions and devolution of resources, decentralisation, and budgetary analysis of centre and states is another major category of studies.

In the area of institutions and economic performance, the role of institutional reforms in agriculture, and the institutional impact on education and management of environment are topics of research. Feasibility and sustainability of alternative institutional frameworks for electric power supply focusses attention on a major aspect of infrastructural development.

In relation to social policy, backward classes and reservations at the national level and in the context of Tamil Nadu continues to be an important area of research. Rural poverty and caste discrimination, caste discrimination in the distribution of consumption expenditure are related topics of study. Social exclusion with respect to basic needs in India in terms of education, health, nutrition, housing, water supply, sanitation, and social security are all being explored.

Situating the Indian Economic Reforms in the liberalisation/globalisation process, its implications on agriculture, industry and financial system formed part of the enquiries to many faculty members. The role of State intervention in economic development and the impact of structural adjustment programme on the economy especially in relation to employment and equity are related areas of research. The Indian economic experience is being reviewed in the light of the experience of its East Asian neighbours and in the light of its own past history by a few faculty members.

Depending on the area and focus the faculty members decide the media in which to publish their findings. They range from MIDS publications, books and monographs, edited books, articles in journals and newspapers, seminar presentations, lectures and book reviews. These are listed in Annexures V to XII.

Related Activities

The Institute has encouraged the participation of faculty and scholars in public activities. They have served in important Committees set up by the Government. They have also been active in academic evaluation and participation in governance structures of academic institutions. They have acted as referees/examiners/members of editorial committees of journals. The public activities of the faculty members are given in **Annexure XIII.**

Projects

During the year under review, the Institute had undertaken projects for Central and State Planning Commissions, Central Ministries of Environment and Rural Development and Ministry of Human Resource Centre, Swedish International Development Agency,

Ford Foundation, Linkoping University, International Institute of Labour Studies, Overseas Development Administration and Overseas Development Institute.

The details of projects undertaken are listed in Annexure XIV.

RBI Chair

The Reserve Bank of India established a Chair in applied research in regional economics in the Institute in 1985 for a five year period. In 1991, the RBI has decided to extend support of the RBI Unit on a continuing basis subject to periodic review. The RBI Unit comprises a Professor, a Research Associate and a Steno-typist.

During the year under review, Padmini Swaminathan was seconded to the RBI Chair as Professor, and Manabi Majumdar as Research Associate.

Since 1993, the RBI has been granting fellowships to Ph.D. scholars. It has stipulated a condition that at any given point of time, there should not be more than four RBI doctoral fellows in the Institute. As there are already three RBI doctoral fellows, we have decided to select the fourth candidate during the academic year 1995-96. After that, till one of the existing candidates completes and leaves the Institute, we will not be able to select another RBI doctoral fellow.

Seminars and Visitors

Malcolm S. Adiseshiah started the monthly seminar series in the Institute in 1970 itself. After presentation, the revised version of the seminar papers were published in the subsequent issue of "Bulletin". The monthly seminar series provided a very useful interface between the academics and the public. Except for a brief interval, the monthly seminars were held till his demise in Nov. 1994. After the stoppage of the publication of the "Bulletin - Madras Development Seminar Series", it may not be possible to publish the seminar papers. However, there is need for a link where the informed public can have a dialogue with the members of the Institute. So the seminar series is being restructured to continue in a modified form. Anexure XV gives the list of monthly seminars held during the period under review.

There were special seminars arranged in the Institute for specific purposes. There were also other seminars where faculty of the Institute and outside scholars had presented papers. The list of special seminars and other seminars are given in **Annexure XVI**.

The list of visitors to the Institute during the year under review is given in Annexure XVII.

Inter-University and Inter-Institutional Co-operation

Workshop on Ph D Scholars and Guides

As a measure to foster academic co-operation between the Institute and the Universities of Tamil Nadu. the Annual Workshop of Ph. D. Scholars and Guides is envisaged. It is sponsored by the ICSSR and the Institute. For the past three years it is being held in different Universities of Tamil Nadu. Universities also bear a portion of the cost. In the year under review, the workshop was held at Bharathiar University, Coimbatore between April 19 to 22, 1995. The participants belonged to nine universities and several affiliated and autonomous colleges in Tamil Nadu. Twentysix research scholars presented abstracts of the doctoral research work and received critical comments and suggestions from the resource personnel, nine doctoral supervisors and fellow students. Most students were from the field of economics, but papers from other social sciences such as sociology, political science and futurology were also discussed. The resource persons were Koilpillai J Charles from Centre for Research in Economic and Social Development, Madras; P H Royappa from The Institute of Social and Economic Change, Bangalore; M Lakshmana Singh, Department of Sociology, Bharathiar University; S Varadarajan, Head of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, Coimbatore; and Dr.S Neelakantan and Paul P Appasamy from the Institute. Dr.S Perumalswamy, Head of the Department of Economics, Bharathiar University acted as Local Coordinator

Meeting of Heads of Social Science Departments in Southern Universities

The twenty-fourth annual Meeting of the Heads of Social Science Departments, jointly sponsored by the Southern Regional Centre of the ICSSR and MIDS was held at the Institute on December 21 and 22, 1994. The topic for discussion was "New Economic Policy and Higher Education" Prof. A. M. Nallagounden, Head, Adult Education Evaluation Programme Unit and Prof. J.B.G. Tilak of the National Institute of Educational Planning and Administration, New Delhi presented theme papers.

Census of Social-Science Research in South India

The twenty-fifth Census of Social Science Research in South India was conducted during January-February 1995. There has been a marginal increase in the listing of disciplines this year - 11 against 9 last year. The response from the Universities and Institutions was slightly better since 13 universities/Institutes responded when compared to 12 last year. The total number of entries received also showed a marginal increase - 151 against last years 137. Rural Development and Law have found their entry this year. There is also a marginal increase in Ph.D. entries received from 82 against 72 last year. The overall response from the Universities and Institutions however has not been very encouraging.

The Census data were published in the "Bulletin-Madras Development Series" till last year. This year they will be published separately and will be sent to all respondents.

Inter-Disciplinary Research Methodology Workshop

The twenty-fifth Inter-Disciplinary Research Methodology Workshop was held in Mahatma Gandhi University in Kottayam in August, 1995. Usually the Workshop was held in June every year; taking into consideration the fact that there is a possibility for heavy rains in Kerala, the host institution requested that it would be better to hold it in August and the request was conceded. The topic for discussion was the fourth in the series on "Human Resources Development" and this year it focussed on 'Social Exclusion'.

Doctoral Programme

The Doctoral candidates of the Institute are registered with the Madras University. No eligible candidate was available for the award of ICSSR Fellowship this year. The list of doctoral candidates, their research supervisors and their topics of research is given in Annexure XVIII.

In the year under review, Ms. Rukmani Ramani, research scholar under the supervision of K.Nagaraj, and Mr.J.Jeyaranjan, research scholar under the supervision of C.T.Kurien, have been awarded the Doctoral Degrees.

Affiliates and Post-Doctoral Fellows

The Institute grants affiliation to students and faculty members of sister institutions in India and abroad. It also admits ICSSR Post-Doctoral Fellows. The list of affiliates and post-doctoral fellows during the year under review is given in Annexure XIX.

Library

In the period from July 1994 to June 1995, the library added 1,777 volumes which includes books acquired by payment, books acquired as gratis, bound volumes of journals and books got through Dr.M.S.Adiseshiah's personnel collections (82 books). Dr.Adiseshiah also donated the complete set of the International

Encyclopaedia of Education (12 volumes) brought out by Pergamon Press costing nearly Rs.1,22,000/-

The library continues to receive 183 journals by subscriptions, exchange and gratis and the library is being extensively used by scholars within and outside Madras.

Finance

The audit report for the year under review Annexure XX presents the financial position of the Institute. It would be seen that the net expenditure was Rs.44,81,059.85 against a grant in aid of Rs.44,53,500 (Rs.20.15 lakhs from ICSSR, and Rs.24.53 lakhs from the Tamil Nadu Government) leaving a deficit of Rs.27,560.

The study of productivity impact and cost of Irrigation has been completed and the project report has also been published. The second phase of the study focussed on the ground water irrigation in Vaigai and Palar basins. The draft reports on these are ready. Part I of both reports describes the specific agro-climatic and hydro-geological characteristics, groundwater and surface water status and agricultural practices in the region: Part II gives a overall picture of the groundwater situation in the respective basins, using village level data obtained from village records and rapid surveys to check the reliability of the records and obtain data on age, depth, costs, area irrigated and characteristics of owners of selected wells. The Vaigai report in addition reports results of a sample survey of farmers in the selected villages of the basin giving more details on ground water levels, water use patterns, crop patterns and productivity, as well as of the lowering of the water table, increasing costs, and implications for sustainability.

2 Project on Social Exclusion, IILS, Geneva

Paul Appasamy, S Guhan, R Hema, Manabi Majumdar and A Vaidyanathan

The study on Exclusion from Basic Needs in India was sponsored by the United Nations Development Programme and the International Institute for Labour Studies (of the II.O), as a part of their research project on Social Exclusion. The report, prepared jointly by Paul Appasamy, S. Guhan, R. Hema, Manabi Majumdar and A. Vaidyanathan, examines the various social, economic and political forces and processes that have caused exclusion from fulfilment of basic needs with respect to nutrition, health, education, housing, sanitation and social security and evaluates the efficacy or otherwise of various interventions by the state.

A summary version of this report has been published in Gerry Rodgers, Charles Gore and Jose B. Figueirdo (eds.) <u>Social Exclusion: Rhetoric, Reality, Responses</u>, ILO, 1995. Subsequently, at the request of the IILS, the authors are currently engaged in elaborating the paper to discuss the characteristics of the disadvantaged, the persistent and entrenched nature of their misfortunes and the impact of economic restructuring on the process of social integration for publication as a monograph. The final version of the report is expected to be completed by September, 1995.

3 Small Water Bodies Project Ministry of Environment and Forests, Govt. of India

A Vaidyanathan et.al

The draft report on the ecological aspects of selected tanks in Tamil Nadu Commission from Prof CBR Sharma of the Central University, Pondicherry was reviewed. It is now being finalised by the author in the light of our comments and suggestions.

An expanded study on tanks, which has been approved by the Ministry of Environment, is under way. Available secondary data on tanks (capacity, ayacut, fillings etc) in Palar and Vaigai basins has been compiled and analysed. In the next phase, to be done in the coming six months, we propose to select some 30-40 tanks in each basin on the basis of a typological classification by tank characteristics and conduct a rapid appraisal of their present condition, effective irrigation, extent of well irrigation and crop pattern as well as the main features of the local institutional arrangements for managing tank water.

4 Financing of Irrigation Sector: An Integrated View Ford Foundation

Project Director: Nirmal Sengupta

Project Deputy Director: M Thangaraj

The first part of the Report is on building the proposed Decision Support System. Its first draft is nearing completion which will be discussed with the concerned experts. Works on the second part, application of the D.S.S., has begun. Part of this will be written by the project team. Some outsiders too will be commissioned to use the D.S.S. for drawing policy prescriptions.

5 "Sharing of Common Water Resources", The Swedish International Development Agency (SIDA), Linkoping University, Sweden, and TNAU, Coimbatore.

Paul P Appasamy

This project was sponsored by the Swedish International Development Authority (SIDA) and Linkoping University, Sweden.

The focus of the project is on urban water use in Coimbatore and Tiruppur primarily the existing public system and the private water market. A study of "Willingness to pay" for water by households was conducted in Thudiyalur town panchayat, a suburban town outside Coimbatore city. The project also addressed the impact of industrial pollution in Tiruppur and along the Bhavani river. The final report is expected to be complèted by December 1995.

6 Environment Action Programme; Urban Environment of Tamil Nadu II Phase, Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India.

The project "Urban Environment of Tamil Nadu" was approved for the Second Phase study by the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India and UNDP. The study involves creation of environmental database for nine cities in Tamil Nadu, in continuation of Phase I studies undertaken for Madras, Tuticorin, Thanjavur and Madurai. Tiruchirapalli, Coimbatore, Tiruppur, Kodaikanal, and Chidambaram will be studied in the II Phase and a consolidated report will be prepared and submitted by December 1995.

Paul P Appasamy

The project is sponsored by the Overseas Development Institute. The study included a couple of field surveys and focussed on water management, water availability and projected demand, urban growth and landuse, private water supply in the Madras Metropolitan Area (MMA). It also dealt with the institutional framework for water management in MMA, based on the Dublin Principles. The draft report was submitted to the sponsors and the final report is expected to be ready by the end of September 1995.

10 Project on "Elementary Education in Tamil Nadu and Rajasthan UNDP.

Manabi Majumdar

Manabi Majumdar and her research assistants are currently working on a Project on "Elementary Education in Tamil Nadu and Rajasthan under the auspices of the United Nations Development Programme. The basic

objective of the project is to examine whether and to what extent states within the same country, districts within the same state and villages within the same district differ in educational terms. In precise terms, the project staff has conducted a fairly detailed household as well as school survey in a few selected villages in the two states. These parallel surveys are expected to illuminate both demand and supply side variables influencing elementary schooling. The concluding phase of the field investigation is in progress. The final report, drawing on both secondary statistics and the field survey, is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

11 Evaluation of Total Literacy Campaign by 10 Voluntary Agencies in Tamil Nadu, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India

A M Nalla Gounden (Head of the Unit)

The Total Literacy Campaign by ten Voluntary Agencies were requested to be evaluated by Dept. of Education, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India.

The learning centres are distributed across the districts Trichy, Chengai-M.G.R. and Madras.

Survey instruments were prepared modifying marginally the previous questionnaires. About 5 months field work covered a sample of 3686.

Serious problems were encountered in identifying and getting access to the learners because of the time lag, as the project was sanctioned quite a few months after the TLC was completed. As a result there was dependence on the officials of Voluntary Agencies for information.

The data analysis has been completed agencywise. The mean scores with S.D were calculated for each Voluntary Agency by levels of primers, by literacy and numeracy and total marks. A multiple regression of the marks against a set of demographic variables had been fitted.

The Final report for an evaluation of Total Literacy Campaign by 10 Voluntary agencies in Tamil Nadu was completed in August 21, 1995. The project report has been submitted to the sponsors for comments.
