MADRAS INSTITUTE OF DEVELOPMENT STUDIES

Dr.Malcolm S.Adisehiah and his wife Elizabeth founded the Madras Institute of Development Studies (MIDS) in 1971 with the following objectives:

- * To undertake studies and research pertaining to development problems with special reference to the agro-rural aspects of Tamil Nadu and the problems of the economically and socially backward sections of the population throughout the country.
- * To conduct seminars and conferences on development problems and programmes of the State.
- * To foster inter-university cooperation among the social scientists of the Universities of the four southern states.
- * To promote interdisciplinary research, and bring out publications relating to the above three functions.

In 1977, it was reconstituted as a national institute jointly sponsored by the Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi and the Government of Tamil Nadu.

The research concerns of the faculty are wide ranging from the concerns of development economics such as agriculture, rural development, industry, urbanisation and labour, to emerging interdisciplinary areas such as gender, environment, human development, social and political movements, and social criticism.

Through its seminars and workshops, MIDS has become a centre for critical thinking on development issues, particularly relating to Tamil Nadu. The service of faculty members are increasingly sought by State and Central government departments, autonomous agencies, universities and colleges, non-government and international organisations. In 1996, MIDS celebrated its Silver Jubilee with a number of programmes and workshops, and by improving the quality of its library and computer infrastructure.

Introduction

Our entry into the new century has been marked by some significant developments. Possibly the foremost among them is an attempt to introspect and redefine our goals so as to be more in tune with the emerging trends in the economy, polity, and society. Every research centre needs to engage in introspection from time to time. In our case this exercise, apart from being academically necessary, has had an edge imparted to it through recurring strain on our resources. Consequently we have had to examine alternatives for strengthening our resource base without compromising on the essential ingredients which make MIDS what it is, such as academic freedom and a culture of research which accords pride of place to the spirit of inquiry. Our efforts in this direction have produced several interesting ideas, some of which are being implemented and are described later in this report. The composition of the Governing and Academic Councils of the Institute is given in Annexures I & II.

Personnel

A major change with respect to personnel relates to the resignation of Prof.Paul Appasamy as Director from January 1, 2000. He has since taken up the position of Director, Madras School of Economics. Chennai.

He was succeeded as Director by Prof.V.K.Natraj who assumed office on February 1, 2000. Dr.Janaki Nair returned to her position as Fellow in February after being on the SEPHIS fellowship for two years. Having been awarded a fellowship by the Prince Claus Foundation for two years to pursue her work on Bangalore city, she resigned with effect from June 1, 2000. The list of faculty members and their areas of research is provided in *Annexure III*. The composition of administration, research support staff and library is given in *Annexure IV*.

Prof.Partha Shome has accepted our invitation to be an Honorary Professor.

Research

In the recent past there has emerged the feeling both within MIDS and in academic circles outside that the Institute should once again focus collectively on Tamil Nadu economy and society. There might well be a case for more co-ordinated work, focused and visible, on Tamil Nadu. In the eighties this resulted in a major publication on the Tamil Nadu economy which has come to be recognised as a landmark in its genre. An updated replication of that work does not appear feasible but there are attractive and practicable alternatives available. One of them is to concentrate on a particular sector in Tamil Nadu. We have chosen the social sector as the pivot around which. initially at least, our work on Tamil Nadu will turn. During the course of the year we plan to bring out a series of papers/monographs on different segments in the social sector. Many of the papers will be from our faculty but in some areas we shall have to look to experts from outside who are being approached. The diverse work of the faculty and their detailed work is furnished in Annexures V to XIII.

At the same time several members of the faculty continue to work on Tamil Nadu.

New Initiatives

As part of the Institute's Silver Jubilee some farreaching proposals were made and accepted. Two of these come under the promotion of Tamil Nadu Studies. As a way of paying tribute to the memory of our founder Dr.Adiseshiah and to acknowledge his committed interest in the development of Tamil Nadu, the Institute has instituted two fellowships - the Malcolm Adiseshiah Promotional Fellowship and the Ph.D. Merit Scholarship. The former is of one year duration and meant for a scholar, preferably at post-doctoral level, to utilise the opportunity to work on a theme related to Tamil Nadu. A suitable person has been selected and hopefully he should take up the fellowship shortly. The second one is of four years' duration and aims to provide an opportunity to a young and promising student to pursue doctoral studies. It is expected that the first selection will be made by October.

MIDS has taken the lead in fostering closer institutional linkages among ICSSR institutes in the southern region. As a first step a meeting of the directors of the five institutes in the region was held in MIDS in April 2000. Apart from discussions on how to put in place schemes for exchange of visits by faculty and research scholars a concrete outcome was the decision to hold an annual convention on development. This will be organised by each of the institutes in turn. The first one, dedicated to the memory of Dr.Adiseshiah will be organised by MIDS in September 2001.

Also on the anvil are two seminars - one on caste enumeration in the census (July 2000) and the other on devolution of finances to local bodies (September 2000).

We have come to believe that our research efforts should reach a wider audience. Therefore we plan to translate, sometimes in an abridged form, several of our reports. The first in this series is the translation of the selected papers of late Thiru S.Guhan. Drs.Jayaraj and Janakarajan are overseeing this project which is well under way.

RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

The principal areas of research pursued by the faculty may be grouped as follows: education, health, gender, demography, water management, poverty and inequality, cultural studies and social movements. There is a visible trend in terms of responding to new social, economic and political issues. It will also be seen that there is evidence of fresh explorations into the relatively more abstract spheres in development studies.

Theoretical Perspectives

Ananta Giri has continued to contribute at the theoretical level. His work includes examination of the Swadhyaya movement as also attempts to couch thinking on development within fresh

frameworks. Some of his work has been published in the working paper series. S.Subramanian has completed a paper on deprivation and poverty and plans to revise his earlier work on this and related area.

Educaton

P.Radhakrishnan (with R.Akila) has completed his report on Education for All which is part of a project sponsored by MHRD and NIEPA.

Manabi Majumdar's recent work focuses sharply on the social dimensions of education and the constitutional imperatives underlying educational policy. Both she and Ananta Giri have given seminars and delivered lectures at well-known centres of development research abroad. Manabi Majumdar hopes to continue her efforts in analysing educational decentralisation. Given present trends in this direction the effort should prove beneficial to MIDS.

On a related phase S.Subramanian has examined the concept of proximate literacy (i.e. as joint author of a paper). The paper has interesting insights and charts out new directions for research and policy.

Gender and Health

Padmini Swaminathan has sought to combine in her work the issues of gender and health and to relate these two to a critique of development. In addition to papers and a book in progress she has engaged herself in several organisations actively involved in gender and health issues. Initiatives such as these have the potential to build meaningful conduits between academic research, policy prescriptions and practical action.

K.Nagaraj has interested himself in examining the nexus between liberalisation and health care.

Demography

K.Nagaraj is taking up revision of unpublished papers related to demographic transition in Tamil Nadu. Some of these should, hopefully, form part of the planned publications on the social sector in Tamil Nadu.

D.Jayaraj has devoted himself almost exclusively to an analysis of the sex ratio. He is examining the determinants of the sex ratio with a view to explaining its observed decline in India. He has encountered problems with regard to availability of data. He and S.Subramanian have published a paper on assessing the femaleness of a population. Jayaraj's work should open up new frontiers, particularly in relation to the sex ratio.

Irrigation and Water Management

Two members of the faculty are busily engaged in this sphere - Nirmal Sengupta and S.Janakarajan.

Nirmal Sengupta has completed a major study for the World Commission on Dams. In addition he has published, individually and as co-author, books and papers on traditional water management and on negotiating water rights.

S.Janakarajan is about to complete the final report of his IDRC project. It deals with the threats to ecology emanating from conflicts over water. Further, the IDRC has funded Phase II of the project. It will be an extension of Phase I and will continue to study the Palar and Noyyal basins.

The areas engaging the attention of Nirmal Sengupta and Janakarajan are highly relevant in the present context.

Social Movements/Cultural Studies

M.S.S.Pandian centres his work on the factors which lie, not always overtly and visibly, beneath emerging socio-political trends. Within an overall framework which aims to capture subaltern perceptions he has been publishing papers on social movements and on the intricacies of positive discrimination. Pandian will teach in the University of Wisconsin during January - May 2001. He will offer a course on 'Colonialism and Culture in South Asia'.

M.Thangaraj's work, related in some ways to Pandian's, focuses on Dalits - their perception of the State and the impact of land reforms on them. He is editing a volume on Land Reforms in Tamil Nadu

The contemporary relevance of the above mentioned studies hardly requires any elaboration.

Agriculture

Chandrasekara Naidu is resurveying two villages in Tiruvallore district for the Kerala Village Studies Programme. Simultaneously he is also processing data on agricultural transformation in Tamil Nadu.

Annadurai is working on the issue of food and fertiliser subsidy cuts and on the public distribution system.

Over and above all the members of the faculty serve on several committees and boards, act as referees for journals and participate in dissemination processes through lectures. The public activities of the members of the Faculty are given in *Annexure XIV*. As the individual reports illustrate there is considerable joint work among the faculty. The work currently in progress covers a fairly broad spectrum but most importantly it centres on the issues which are at the core of the development problematique.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES

The seminar series has retained its momentum. Apart from seminars by members of the faculty there were presentations by visiting scholars and experts such as Dr. Venugopal (All-India Save Education Committee), Dr. Des Gasper (Institute of Social Studies, The Hague), Dr. Narasinga Raja Naidu (Bangalore University), Ms. T. Jayashree (Maryland Public Television, USA), Prof. Dehua (Shanghai Academy, China), Prof. Gopal Guru (Pune University), Prof. Robert Cassen (LSE), Prof. Bjorn Hettne (Goteborg University, Sweden), Thiru. Gnani and P. Sainath (Journalists). The seminars by visitors/faculty are given in Annexure XVIII and visitors to the Institute are furnished in Annexure XIX.

Symposium, Seminars, Conferences

- a) A symposium on 'Science, Technology and the Quest for Human Freedom' was sponsored by MIDS with the assistance from Tamii Nadu State Council of Science and Technology on August 30, 1999. The list of Papers presented are furnished in Annexure XVII.
- A one-day workshop was held on December 8, 1999 at the request of the Finance Department, Government of Tamil Nadu to assist the State Government to formulate its

case for devolution to the Eleventh Finance Commission. Experts in the area of public finance were invited to present their views in the morning session. Working groups on specific issues such as the social sector, local bodies, and natural calamities met in the afternoon to frame recommendations. The workshop was attended by representatives from Government departments, academic organisations and experts.

c) The Ph.D. Scholars and Guides Workshop organised by MIDS and sponsored by ICSSR was held at the Dept. of Rural Industries and Management, Gandhigram Rural Institute, (GRI), Gandhigram from Jan.25-28, 2000. Out of the total of 77 applications received 69 Ph. D. scholars were selected to attend the Workshop from six disciplines, apart from the eight resource persons and guides from various universities of South India.

The special lectures were by Prof.Rajalakshmi of the Dept. of Economics, University of Madras on, 'Evaluation Techniques and Environmental Economics'; Prof.K.Nagaraj, MIDS on: Village Survey Methods; Prof.R.N.Chidambaram, Dept. of Management, Alagappa University on, 'Privatisation of Banking Sector'; Dr.V.Chandrasekara Naidu, MIDS on, 'Case Study Approach to Thesis Making and Social Sciences; and Dr. M.Somasundaram, Dept. of Computer Science, GRI on, 'Computer Application in Social Sciences'. Dr.M.Soundara Pandian, Dept. of Rural Industries and Dr.V.Chandrasekara Naidu, MIDS were the coordinators of the Workshop.

The Institute's Ph.D. Programme is currently being reviewed in order to improve its performance in respect of selection and monitoring of the progress of the students. However, during the period under review three students have submitted their theses for Ph.D. through the Institute to the University of Madras. Five scholars are currently working in the Institute for their Ph.D. In addition, we have also advertised two fellowships for the year 2000-2001, one of them a post-doctoral fellowship. The list of doctoral candidates is given in Annexure XV and the list of affiliates/post-doctroal fellows is furnished in Annexure XVI.

This report concludes, as it must, with an expression of appreciation to the Faculty for their efforts.

Journal

The Institute journal, Review of Development and Change has entered the fifth year of its existence. Two issues were brought out last year. Currently, there are Indian and foreign subscribers. An effort is underway to increase the subscriptions to the journal to around 200 in the coming year. The academic activities of programme/project staff are given in *Annexure XX*.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Library

The Institute now houses a collection of about 43250 volumes. 863 volumes were added during the period July 1999-June 2000. Around 181 Indian and foreign journals are received either through subscription or on a complimentary basis. There were 2294 visitors to the library. Computerisation of library records is nearing completion. A software package, RILISAR has been purchased after which library records will be available for on-line use.

Computer Facilities

There were no major changes during the course of the year in respect of hardware. Internet browsing has now been made available in the computer room.

Finance

The audit report for the year under review as per Annexure XXI presents the financial position of the Institute. A sum of Rs. 59.56 lakhs is the recurring expenditure for the year 1999-2000. Against the recurring expenditure the ICSSR sanctioned and released by March 31, 2000 a sum of Rs.24.74 lakhs. The Tamil Nadu Government had released Rs. 4.05 lakhs till the end of March 31, 2000 and another Rs. 11.67 lakhs was released in December 2000 and the balance of Rs.9.02 lakhs is expected shortly. Taking into account all receipts and expenditures, the uncovered deficit for the year 1999-2000 amounts to Rs.3.26 lakhs. The Tamil Nadu Government is yet to sanction and release the grant of Rs.6.82 lakhs for the library.

The Union Planning Commission through the Government of Tamil Nadu endowed a sum of Rs.1 crore to the Institute in April 2000. Out of this, the interest accrued onRs.50 lakhs is earmarked for the library. The interest on the balance of Rs.50 lakhs is to be utilised for maintenance and ungradation of facilities.
