

What has been achieved so far through the work of Thy servants during 250 years is far too small a fruit to place before Thy feet. Thou art able to achieve still greater things. For the sake of Thy Holy name pour out Thy Spirit upon all our workers and all Thy scattered children on earth so that we may be true witnesses of Thy salvation in our Lord Jesus Christ. IT BEGAN AT TRANQUEBAR

The History of the First Protestant Church in India

by E. Arno Lehmann

To understand the Church one must know its history. No Christian in India can afford not to know at least something about the beginnings of the great missionary movement in India which has led to the Protestant churches in India today.

This scholarly yet readable book gives the wonderful story of Tranquebar 'the Mother of all Evangelical Missions in India'. Based on source studies it contains hitherto unpublished information about the pioneers and the far-reaching principles and results of their work which spread from Tranquebar to Tirunelvelli in the south and Calcutta in the north. Many problems of caste, Bible translation, the writing of hymn books, language study and the study of Hinduism as well as the founding of congregations and the education of the young were tackled with almost superhuman energy and enthusiasm. This book shows how well the foundations were laid and deals with the first ecumenical quadrilateral Denmark-Germany-England-Tranquebar as it transcended national and denominational barriers.

The reader is brought into intimate contact with Ziegenbalg, Francke, the great Schwartz of Tanjore, the scholar Fabricius and the sweet singer Vedanayagam Sastriar. This is a standard work of reference and moving account of a great beginning.

The Author: Professor Dr. E. Arno Lehmann is Dean of the Martin Luther University, Halle-Wittenberg, Eastern Germany, and a former missionary in India. He has translated Tamil hymns into German and is the author of The Arts of the Younger Churches, about to be published in Berlin.

BARTHOLOMAEUS ZIEGENBALG

A Biography by ERICH BEYREUTHER

Missions are not the work of men but of God who calls men into His service in order to build His Kingdom on earth. The human agents of a mission are not important for their own sake but as instruments and servants of a greater cause. This is how the pioneer missionary of the mission at Tranquebar, Bartholomaeus Ziegenbalg, looked upon his own life and work and also how we remember him on the occasion of the 250th anniversary of his landing at Tranquebar to begin his work.

The early chapters of the book deal with the preparation of Ziegenbalg for his work and are followed by an excellent description of the mission at Tranquebar, its growth and the reactions in India and abroad. The reader not only gets a comprehensive picture of a personality but also a full account of his pioneer efforts up to the time of his death in 1719 at the early age of 36. Missionary methods have greatly changed and all may be tempted to criticise the early efforts and yet how much more is there for which we must be thankful! Ziegenbalg's spirit lives on and this book will help us to keep his spirit alive for the benefit of the whole church.

The Author: Dr. Erich Beyruether is well qualified to be the author of this book. His thesis for his doctorate was also based on Ziegenbalg. Dr. Beyruether has had unique opportunities for research and this book contains many new facts presented in a lively and popular style backed by sound scholarship.

THE SONG OF TRANQUEBAR

This well-produced, attractive booklet gives a brief history of the Tranquebar mission. The waves of Tranquebar sing a song of courage, for the work of the mission was often like the waves which beat on the Coromandal coast. Sometimes the work was quiet and peaceful, at other times troublesome and difficult, sometimes the flood tide of success was followed by periods of bitter disappointment and tragedy, yet always there was movement—the movement of the Spirit of God. The Song of Tranquebar will make an excellent souvenir and those who read it will be able to take part in the celebrations with a greater thankfulness to God for His wonderful guidance.

The Author: Bishop Sandegren's long term of service as Bishop of Tranquebar qualifies him to write with authority and feeling. It is fitting that the first Indian Bishop of Tranquebar will be consecrated at the celebrations which will also be a climax to Bishop Sandegren's work in India.

FROM TRANQUEBAR TO SERAMPORE

The Carey lectures 1955 by the Rt. Rev. J. SANDEGREN

The Serampore College has resolved to institute 'Carey lectures' to deal with the history of Carey or subjects connected with his work. Bishop Sandegren was asked to deliver the first of these lectures. He chose as his subject the connection between Tranquebar and Serampore, or the development from Ziegenbalg, who came to Tranquebar in 1706, to Carey, who came to Serampore in 1793. He shows that without Tranquebar, there would not have been any Serampore in our mission history, and without Ziegenbalg's work the work of Carey would have been impossible. Both places were Danish colonies. And the Kings of Denmark have had much to do with the starting and maintenance of mission work in both places. Three times on her way from Tranquebar to Serampore the muse of History stopped breathlessly in Copenhagen to watch the encounter between the King who had the power to open the doors to mission work and the devoted workers who were willing to give their lives in order to enter through the doors opened by the King. The first of these encounters took place 1705 when King Frederick IV invited Ziegenbalg and Pluetschau to appear before him and called them to go to Tranquebar as 'Royal Danish Missionaries'. Thus began the Danish-Halle Mission. In the year 1737 Zinzendorf met King Christian VI in Copenhagen. This encounter became the beginning of the mission work of the Moravian Brethren, in Greenland, West Indies, East India and other Danish colonies and in further inaccessible countries. third historic encounter between King and Missionaries was 1816 when Carey's Moravian co-worker met King Frederick VI in Copenhagen and obtained the Royal Charter for the Serampore University.

The time between Ziegenbalg and Carey witnesses the constant struggle between collectivism and individualism. Only step by step individualism developed so that in Carey's day the time was ripe for a private society sending out individual missionaries unconnected with King or state church. The lecture shows Carey's right place in this development, whether we consider that the modern missionary era, now ending, began in 1706 with Ziegenbalg or nearly 100 years later with Carey.

DR C. J. SANDEGREN

Many school children in Sweden know that the name Sandegren is connected with foreign missions. The teaching of mission history is obligatory in the schools, and the handbooks naturally mention the name of Bishop Johannes Sandegren. Even more important than his name for the spread of knowledge about foreign missions in Sweden probably is the name of his father, Carl Jacob Sandegren, who came to India in 1869 and died here in 1929, thus giving 60 years of his long life to India. His life and work had a strong influence on the growth of mission interest in Sweden. For the western part of the country in his home diocese of Gothenburg he may be called the apostle of missions. In India he will be remembered by many as the old and saintly white bearded veteran and wise leader of the Lutheran enterprise in Tamilnad.

His first call to this work he received through a sermon which he did not hear. And the final assurance as to the field to which he was to give 60 years of his life came to him through a letter which was not addressed to him. How that came about the reader of the book will find out.

The book tells us of the growth of mission interest in Sweden and the growth of mission work in India, of the many problems to be solved, of Carl's wife, Theodore Kremmer, of his seven children who all came out to India to join in the work, of the Indian Church which grew up under his wise leadership. Like his father-in-law and his wife he was buried in Tranquebar.

FILMS

A film on the life of Ziegenbalg

This film has been produced under the supervision of the Lutheran World Federation in co-operation with the F.E.L.C. Field Committee in India and the U.S.A. National Committee for Lutheran World Federation arranged by Film Productions International, Hollywood, California. The film was actually shot in the familiar surroundings of Tranquebar. The second part of it was taken at the Vauhini Studios at Kodambakkam, Madras, under the direction of Mr. Kenn Carmichel of the Film Productions International, California. It will be released and shown in South India before the end of 1955. A Tamil sound track is also to be produced on the tape-recorder for the sake of the village congregations in South India. The film will be available for loan from the Tamil Evangelical Lutheran Church Evangelical Band after the celebrations are over in Tranquebar and Madras.

A Documentary Film

A documentary film in technicolour depicts the activities of the various Lutheran Churches that are affiliated with the F.E.L.C. It will be first shown at the time of the Jubilee celebrations and later released for public use. The tail-end of the documentary film will be shot at the consecration of the fourth Bishop of Tranquebar Dr. R. B. Manikam, Secretary of the World Council of Churches and International Missionary Council for South-East Asia, on 14th January 1956.

SEALS

The Swedish and Danish Bible Societies through their generous grants have made possible the printing of a special Jubilee Edition of 30,000 copies of the new Tamil version of the Bible issued by the Bible Society of India, Pakistan and Ceylon. Part of the edition will be issued at the time of the Celebrations with a special Jubilee cover.

A HISTORICAL NOTE OF INTEREST

This folder and several of the Jubilee publications are being printed at the Diocesan Press, Madras, a press very closely connected with the history of the Tranquebar Mission. The Press was founded on its present site in 1760 by the Rev. J. P. Fabricius after the Mission had extended its work to Madras. For many years it was known as the S.P.C.K. Press—a witness to that close co-operation between the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and the Danish Mission. Later the Press was taken over by the Anglican Diocese of Madras and the name changed to Diocesan Press. But in 1930 the Press became the property of the Christian Literature Society.

The Old Vepery Mission House in which Fabricius lived and which was for many years the centre of Protestant mission work in Madras, still forms part of the Press premises.
