Judicial.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

THE details of judicial administration during the year 1054, now reported on are gathered from the Report of the Appeal Court given hereunder:

- 3. It will be seen from the above statement that 7,966 suits were filed during the year and this number added to 1,606 suits brought forward from last year makes a total of 9,572 which is less than the number for the preceding year by 349.
- 4. Of these the number decided amounts to 8,304 or 11 less than the number of decisions for the previous year.
- 5. Seven thousand six hundred and ninty-three of these cases were decided by the Munsiffs and the remaining 611 by the Zillah Courts.
- 6. The decisions of the Zillah Courts in contested cases amounted to 330 and those of the Munsiffs to 1,755. The per-centage of decisions in cases of this nature to the aggregate number of cases disposed of by the Zillah and Munsiffs' Courts is thus 54 and 22.8 respectively.
- 7. The total number of decisions in contested cases during the year amounted to 2,085, which are distributed among the Courts as follows:—

- 17. Of the 135 Regular Appeals which the statement in para 13 indicates as having been filed during the year, 71 were from the decisions of the Anjikaimal Zillah Court and the remaining 64 from those of the Trichoor Zillah Court. - 20. The Zillah Courts executed (partly and wholly) 650 and the Munsiffs Courts, 1,744 decrees, making a total of 2,394 on the whole, as against 3,087 in the year preceding.
- 21. At the close of the year under review 679 decrees remained unexecuted in the Zillah Courts and 1,456 in the Munsiffs' Courts making a total of 2,135; the number pending execution at the close of the previous year having been 2,278.
- 22. The Institution Fees collected during the year by the Original, and Appellate Courts amounted to Rupees 40,402—13—4 and the stamp penalties to Rs. 18,446—14—1 making a total of Rs. 58,849—11—5. The collections under these heads during the preceding year amounted to Rs. 42,738 and Rs. 18,686 respectively making a total of Rs. 61,424. The decrease in the Institution fees is due apparently to the decrease in the number of original suits instituted during the year 1054.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

24. The number of cases committed to the Criminal Courts by the Police and Magistracy amounted to 70 during the year under review or 9 more than in the previous year.

25. These cases were divided between the two Criminal Courts as follows:—

- 26. The Anjikaimal Criminal Court referred 6 cases and the Trichoor Criminal Court 13, to the Appeal Court. The remaining cases 51 in number were all disposed of by the Criminal Courts during the year under review.
- 27. These 51 cases involved 142 persons of whom the Criminal Courts acquitted 68 and convicted 74. The ratio of acquittals was thus 48 per cent during the year under review as against 61.4 per cent in the preceding year.
- 28. The 19 cases referred for the decision of the Appeal Court involved 69 persons. Of these 17 cases, involving 63 persons, were disposed of leaving a balance of 2 cases for the current year.
- 29. Of the 63 persons on whom the Appeal Court passed judgment, 43 were acquitted and the remaining 20 convicted.
- 30. The number of persons who preferred Appeals from the judgments of the lower Courts was 24. Of these the sentences on 3 were confirmed, on 2 modified and the convictions of 16 persons were reversed. The cases of the remaining 3 were left undisposed of at the end of the year.

32. The average duration of each case in the Criminal Courts was 5.5 days, which shows an improvement on the previous year in which the average duration was 8 days. In Referred Trials the time taken up by the Appeal Court averaged 15 days as against 6 days in the previous year. The average duration in the year under review is just equal to the period allowed by the practice of this Court, in cases of conviction to enable prisoners to prefer appeals against the findings of the Criminal Courts.

Jails

- 33. The aggregate number of Prisoners in the Jails at the commencement of the year was 142, and the number of admissions during the year 249 making a total of 391, which is less by 36 than in the preceding year.
- 34. Of these 391, the prisoners who were released by acquittal, expiry of sentence, payment of fines, &c., numbered 228, two died, and one was judicially executed. Deducting the total of the aforesaid items, namely 231, there remained at the close of the year under report 160 prisoners or 18 more than in the previous year.
- 35. Out of the 160 prisoners remaining as above stated 7 were under trial, 19 were civil debtors, 1 a revenue prisoner and the other 133 prisoners were convicts whose terms of sentence are given hereunder:—

- 36. The average daily number in Jail during the year was 158.18. The convicts are principally employed in the repair and maintenance of the public roads.
- 37. The charges incurred for the maintenance of the Jails exclusive of the cost of the Medical Establishment and European Medicines amounted to Rs. 24,279—0—3 or Rs. 10,219—4—9 less than the expenditure of the previous year, as will be seen from the following abstract. The decrease is chiefly under the head of repairs:—

From the annual report of the Medical Officer to this Government on the Jail Hospitals, it appears, that at Ernacollum out of 122 cases that were treated 2 died, one from small-pox and one from mania. In the previous year only 24 cases were treated and there were no deaths. Dr. Morgan observes that in 1054 every case that required a dose of medicine was entered as an admission and this accounts for the increased sick rate though in point of fact the health of prisoners was as good as in the old Jail as before, and the new Jail had been occupied for too short a time before the closing of the year for any definite conclusion to be formed regarding its effect on the health of the convicts. The prisoners moved into it in Mithunam (July) last and doubtless the occupation of a new building in a monsoon month gave rise to some cases of bowel complaint, colds and rheumatism, but as the walls and floors are dried by solar and artificial heat, exposure to draughts is prevented and attention is paid to the clothing

and bedding which the altered circumstances of the inmates suggest, there need be no apprehension of an increase in sickness.

39. In the Trichoor Jail Hospital there were 152 admissions and no deaths.

Police.

- 40. The total number of crimes reported during the year was 2,394 against 2,204 in the preceding year. There were also 26 cases of the last year brought under enquiry this year.
- 41. Out of the aggregate of 2,420 cases, 853 were summarily dismissed without calling upon the defendants, and the remaining 1,567 cases were enquired into by the Magistracy, and convictions were secured in 391 cases. The per-centage of convictions to the cases enquired into was 24.9. Eight hundred and forty cases were dismissed after trial for want of proof; 252 were compromised by the parties; 72 committed to the Courts and 12 remained undisposed of.
- 42. It will be observed that the numbers of cases and persons committed to the Courts, as exhibited in the Police Returns differ slightly from those given by the Appeal Court (see paras 24 to 28 supra). This is owing to the indictments being modified or the prisoners separately tried by the Courts.
- 43. The number of persons arrested in connection with the above cases was 3,553, as against 3,743 in the previous year. Of those 2,017 were summarily discharged, 178 acquitted after enquiry, 496 were concerned in the cases amicably settled, 210 were committed to the Criminal Courts, 628 were convicted, and 24 remained pending trial at the end of the year.

- 44. Of the persons arrested 5009 per cent. were acquitted and 17.67 per cent. were convicted. The per centage of persons committed to the Criminal Courts for trial was 5.9.

- 46. Of the greater class of crimes reported during the year there were 14 cases of murder, in which 36 persons were concerned, 7 of the accused being discharged and 29 committed to the Courts. There were 108 cases of grievous hurt involving 218 persons of whom 141 were discharged, 29 were committed, 35 punished and 10 ordered to find security, and 3 remained for the succeeding year; 283 of robbery in which 500 persons were defendants of whom 419 were discharged, 70 punished and 11 committed; 372 of theft, implicating 596 persons, of whom 438 were acquitted 136 punished, 21 committed and 1 ordered to find security; and 100 cases of house-breaking in which 210 persons were accused of whom 145 were discharged, 18 punishea, 27 committed, 5 ordered to find security and the cases of the other 15 remained undecided at the close of the year.
- 47. Six Cochin subjects in as many cases were surrendered and brought to trial in the Courts of this country during the year, under warrants issued by the British Resident, and the result of the trials was as under:—

54. The large receipts in the previous year arose In 1053 Rs. 2,26,968—9—0 from exceptional causes. In "1054 " 2,24,356—3—7 anticipation of the selling Decrease Rs. 2,612—5—5 price being raised to Rs. 3 per maund dealers had early in 1053 purchased large stocks at the old rate, and the sales were consequently far above the average of previous years. In the year under report the sales naturally fell off, being 74,766 maunds against 85,616 in 1053, leaving a deficiency of 10,849 maunds. The loss of revenue on this account has been almost wholly covered by the increased price.

55. The amount paid for the purchase of salt during In 1053 Rs. 17,322—7—1 the year was greater than the "1054 "31,548—0—9 expenditure of 1053 by Rupees Increase Rs. 14,225—9—8 14,225—9—8. This difference has been caused by the import of 30,325 maunds in excess of the quantity in the previous year.

Registration of Deeds.

- 56. The total number of documents registered during the year 1054 in the six Registry Offices of the State was 16,566 which is 712 more than in the preceding year giving an average of 1,380 per month or 45 per day.
- 57. Of these six were Wills, 16,035 documents related to immoveable property and 525 to moveable property.
- 58. The total value of the documents registered was Rs. 62,62,295—13—2 giving an average value of Rs. 378—0—5 for each.

- 60. One hundred and thirty four documents were registered under penalties according to Sections 15 and 22 of the Registration Rules showing a decrease of 49 documents over the number so registered in the previous year.
- 61. The documents registered at private residences amounted to 219 which is 24 more than in the previous year.

- 62. Forty-seven documents were refused to be admitted to registration; of these 2 were registered by the order of the Zillah Court.
- 63. The applications received at the District Registry Offices for copies of documents and for making searches were 299, showing an increase of 2 over the number given in the last report.
- 64. At the close of the year 1053 there remained 83 documents unregistered, which together with the 16,566 presented for registration during the year make a total of 16,649. Of these 16,614 were registered and returned, leaving a balance of 35 documents to be entered in the Books during the current year. This gives a daily average of nearly 45 documents entered and returned in the six Registry Offices.

- 69. There remained a surplus from the receipts over the expenditure of Rs. 13,763-1-6, against Rs. 12,992-14-4 realised in the preceding year.
- 70. Four additional Goomastahs on 7 Rupees each a month were appointed in Tallapilly, Cochin, Moogoondapuram and Trichoor Registry Offices for the year to finish the arrears which had accumulated in the above districts owing to the influx of documents presented for registration.

71. Thirty special and 65 general powers of attorney were attested by the Registrars and 12 copies of registered deeds were forwarded to other District Offices under Sec: 53 of the Regulation, in consequence of the property concerned being embraced in more than one District.

Education.

- 72. The constitution of this Department having been fully described in the Report of last year and there being no special event or extension of the work to be recorded, it is sufficient to state that the returns are encouraging and indicate steady progress.
- 73. The High School staff has been strengthened by the appointment of the Revo. H. Kendall to the post of Second Master, formerly held by Mr. D. M. Cruickshank. In the district schools several changes have occurred but none of sufficient importance to require notice here. As the more frequent inspection of these schools will, it is hoped, be productive of great advantage arrangements were contemplated towards the close of the year to afford the Director of Education additional aid for this object. These will be more appropriately referred to in the next Report.
- 74. Referring to the High School, the principal Educational Institution of the State, the work of the College Classes and that of the Matriculation Class, as tested by the result of the University Examinations have been fairly satisfactory. Of the 17 students who went up for the F. A. Examination ten were successful but only four passed out of fourteen who appeared for Matriculation. The latter results though very low was not more disastrous than that experienced by all other institutions. The failure of the Matriculation Candidates of December 1878 was, from some cause, unprecedented in the Madras Presidency,

only 356 having passed out of 2,647 or just over 13 per cent. In consequence of this result difficulties have arisen in the formation of a Junior F. A. Class for 1881 and it appears doubtful whether the High School will be able to send up any students for the F. A. of that year. For 1880 however the F. A. Class though small was encouraging.

At the close of the previous year the number of boys on the roll was 313; there were 61 new admissions and 26 re-admissions in the course of the year, showing an aggregate of 400 boys; and deducting removals or dismissals there remained 272 or 41 less than at the end of 1054. The average daily attendance was 261 being nearly 90 per cent. of the whole number on the books, a

Return which is satisfactory evincing more than ordinary regularity. The average age of the boys was 15.1 which is slightly higher than the average of the previous year.

The only peculiarity observable in the above table is the diminution in the number of the Brahmin boys.

78 For a third time scholarships at the Madras Normal School were placed at the disposal of Mr. Sealy, the Director of Education and four students were sent up from the High School partly at the Sirkar expense and partly at that of the British Government. On their return they will be provided with posts in the Educational Department as opportunities offer.

- 79. There was a deficit of Rs. 405—2—8 in the School funds at the commencement of the year under review in consequence of large purchases of books, &c; this has been reduced to Rs. 128—4—4, and will, it is hoped, disappear at the end of the current year.
- 80. The following statement shows the number of books in the Book Depôt and their value at the beginning and end of the year reported on:—

The sales show 2,584 volumes against 4,244 sold in the previous year. The stock has been somewhat reduced but is in good order.

- 81. The usual half yearly examinations were conducted as usual by the Masters of the School aided by many gentlemen outside the Department.
- 82. Two new and commodious rooms for the College Classes were finished and brought into use, and a Verandah and small rooms added at the south end of the High School. Great progress has also been made with the new buildings under construction for the Muttancherry and Kununkolum District Schools, and they are expected to be completed by the end of the present year.

- 83. All the District Schools have been inspected by the Director of Education and a closer and a more searching examination than last year has been held. Several practical suggestions for their improvement submitted by Mr. Sealy will receive the early consideration of this Government.
- 84. It is to be regretted that the Vernacular classes attached to the District Schools have not shown satisfactory results, the attendance in some having declined and in all of them having been irregular. At the end of the year there were altogether 149 boys in them against 138 at its commencement, an increase which ought to have been greater considering that there are Vernacular classes in all the District Schools which have been opened.
- 85. The five District Schools contain in all 461 boys with an average daily attendance of 15.3.
- 86. The cost of the High School Establishment in salaries paid by this Government was Rs. 17,696-2-2 of which Rs. 1,872-12-0 were realised in fees and fines. The charge borne by the State is therefore Rs. 15,823-6-2 or Rs. 60-10-0 per pupil the average daily attendance being 261. The cost of establishment of the District Schools amounted to Rs. 24,025-7-4, the receipts from fees and fines being Rs. 2,975-12-2.

Public Works.

In 1053 Rs. 2.95,763—2—11 of the Engineer's Department ,, 1054 ,, 2.61,906—9—2 amounted to Rs. 1,86,578-5-5 and works were executed Decrease Rs. 33,856—9—9 through the Tahsildars at a cost of Rs. 75,328—3—9. The aggregate expenditure, Rs. 2,61,906—9—2 is equal to 19.72 per cent on the entire revenue of the year.

- The decrease as compared with the previous year is attributable to the small expenditure required in the year under report for the new Ernacollum Jail and the Public Offices at Trichoor and Chittoor, which were in a forward state of progress, and also to many of the main lines of road communication having been completed.
- An abstract of the Report of Mr. H. W. Hudson, the Chief Engineer, is subjoined.
- 90. The following works were under progress at the beginning of the year:—

- 91. Of the above works the following were completed during the year:—

 - Extension of the Chittoor Public Office Verandahs with enclosures for the Vakeels of the Munsiff's Court, and Guard for the Taluq Treasury.
 - Panunkutty Wrought Iron Girder Bridge on Iron Screw piles.
 - Shoriar River Bridge.
 - Athumpilly Kavoo Road.
 - Vandythavalum Road.
 - Cootacadayoo Road.
 - Additions to the High School Ernacollum to form additional Class rooms &c., by the extension and enclosure of the northern and southern verandahs.
 - Durbar Hall Improvements—Ornamental Ventilators and painting only remain to be done.
 - Muttancherry School.—The plastering, tiling and fitting of the doors and windows remain to be finished.
 - Eddapilly Road.—The non-disputed portions of the road having been completed with the exception of a few culverts, &c.
 - Pullianore Road.—A small portion of the metal-(l)ling and the wood work of one of the Bridges remain to be done at the close of the year.
- (m) Kutheran Ghaut 1st Section.—The work was completed and the road opened for traffic early in the year. Carts are now able to cross the Ghaut within the hour instead of a whole day being taken up as formerly.

- 92. Reclamation Works along the Ernacollum Backwater.—The plot of ground reclaimed has extended over a length of 2,230 feet by an average breadth of 242 feet. The second basin is nearly completed which as well as the first are being largely used by boats as they afford shelter from high surf. The hard clay backing of the revetment wall not having been found to answer the purpose for which it was intended, and as the fillings were washed away to a great extent at each tide, concrete was substituted with good results. About the close of the year the Hand Dredger was obtained and has since been used to deepen the Backwater and procure mud and silt for the fillings.
- 93. Narakel Pier.—The sea having encroached and washed away the approach to the Pier it was found necessary to extend the Pier 25 feet towards the shore end. Slight damages to the Hoists &c., caused by the severe gale at the setting in of the monsoon were repaired.
- 94. Narakel Improvements.—The basin was extended northwards and a Jetty with Hoists for loading and unloading cargo boats was put up. Wooden rails were laid from it to the Pier for the purpose of rolling casks. The Tramway was replaced on a straight line from the basin to the sea, the distance being thereby shortened, admitted of the consturction of two lines of Rails.

- 96: Of these, the Eddacoony Road, the Road from Kununkolum South Bazaar to main Road leading to Anjoor, the Chenancherra Sluice, Ooloor Footpath and the Trichoor Public Office Railings were completed. The other works are more or less in an advanced state as shown below:
 - (1) Nemary Travellers' Bungalow.—This work was commenced in the month of Medom (April). The masonry has been finished and the Roof timbers put up. The building would have been tiled but for the early setting in of the South-West Monsoon.
 - (2) Kununkolum School.—This Building although commenced late in the year, has made good progress, the masonry superstructure having been carried to a height of 14 feet and the Verandah roof fitted.

- (3) Pallapilly Store and Cooly Lines.—The office and Store shed, as well as one of the Cooly Lines have been completed, and are now ready for occupation.
- (4) Durbar Hall Portico.—This work is near completion, the planking, railing, &c, only remaining to be finished.
- (5) Jail Road.—A small portion of metalling and one culvert require to be completed.
- (6) Vettical Road.—The work of this road has been suspended on account of some Boundary disputes.
- (7) Thiruvancollum Road.—This road was undertaken at the request of the Travancore Government to meet the new Moovattupoya Road. A large portion of the Earthwork has been completed.
 - (8) Ermaputty Road.—The greater portion of the Earthwork and metalling has been completed and most of the Bridges and Culverts reconstructed.
 - (9) Road from Irinjalacoday to Shalacoody through Thomanakayil.—The Earthwork on the high grounds has been completed, as well as the greater portion of the Embankments in the Thomanakayil. This embankment would have been finished had it not been for the early monsoon. The foundations of one of the Bridges have been laid.
- (10) Wadakancherry Bridge.—In consequence of the failure of the three arched Bridge, a temporary Timber Bridge on piles has been erected for the convenience of the Traffic on the Shoranore Road. Granite stone is being collected for the new Bridge and the Wrought Iron Girders of 55 feet clear span are now on their way out from England.

- 98. Maintenance.—The Kupilly Irrigation Bunds were placed under maintenance during the year. These Bunds measuring in length about three and a quarter miles had been almost destroyed, there having been several breaches 12 feet in depth caused by Floods, &c. The greater part of the Bunds had to be reconstructed, Sluices repaired and new ones provided. The Curvanoor River Bunds were also placed under maintenance and the breaches filled in. The shallow portions of the Chenanchira canal were deepened, but owing to the early setting in of the monsoon the full amount allotted for this work was not expended. One hundred and seventy-five miles of road (excluding the Trichoor Town Roads) were maintained throughout the year in fair order.

- 100. The deficiency of more than 7,000 rupees in In 1053 Rs. 38,021—10—7 the Timber Revenue is due , 1054 , 30,543—4—7 to reduced sales caused by Decrease Rs. 7,478—6—0 the unfavorable state of the market and the decrease of Rs. 4,600 and odd under Sundry goods to reduced collections, Seignorage upon wood and Forest produce during the year.
- 101. The amount paid by the Contractor of the Chittoor Teak Forest, was Rs. 9,992—10—10 against Rs. 18,303—1—8 in the previous year. In this there is a decrease of Rs. 8,310—6—10 which is owing to a smaller quantity of timber having been removed by the Contractor than in the previous year over and above the minimum specified in his contract.

- 103. The number of Teak logs sold during the year 1054 was 1,872 and Blackwood logs 126, and the amount realized is Rs. 22,466—14—2. The value of Timber supplied to the Public Works Department was Rs. 8,076-6-5 making the total income obtained from the two Depôts Rs. 30,543—4—7. The reason of the total amount of candies in 1054 appearing, so so disproportionate to the number of logs is owing to the fact of the aggregate included in the above total, as these logs were of very small sizes and belonged to the lot which had been removed from the Teak Plantation as clearings.
 - 104. The Royalties derived from Jungle wood, Bamboos, &c., amounted to Rs. 9,158—7—1 and the sale of Cardamoms, Bees' wax and other Forest produce realized Rs. 2,239—13—11 the tax collected on fuel was Rs. 1,478—12—0.
 - 105. The total revenue derived through the medium of the Forests Establishment was, therefore;

- 103. The Forest expenses were greater than in the former year by Rs. 1,092—3—10. This is mainly due to the cost of constructing a Keddah for the capture of Elephants. Enhanced rates were also paid for animals obtained on hire. But for these charges there would have been a saving in the expenditure as compared with the previous year. The charges of the Forest Establishment were also enhanced owing to increased salaries granted to some of the Officers of the department in 1053 having been drawn for only a part of that year, while they were paid for the entire year under review. A few minor servants were also employed during the latter period.
- 107. Five Elephants were caught during the year in the Pits, viz: 3 males and 2 females. Of these one female died in the pit from injuries received. There were sixteen working Elephants, nine untrained, and four newly caught. Eight are stationed at Pagodas and Palaces making a total of 37. Two males and four females died during the year, leaving twenty males and eleven females.
- 108. Teak Plantations.—The Officer in charge reports that during the year 38 acres of Forest land were cleared, 934 acres weeded, 304 pruned and 34 planted. Considering the scarcity of labour that has prevailed in the locality, a fair amount of progress appears to have been accomplished.
- 109. Cardamom Cultivation.—From the report received from Mr. Kohlhoff the Superintendent it appears that about 146 acres of forest land have been under cultivation at a cost of Rs. 4,346-8-4, and that the collections were 1070½ lbs., of an approximate market value of Rs. 1,551. He suggests that the establishment of a permanent building for the superintendent and cooly lines on the hills would lessen the annual expenditure under that head. This will receive early consideration.

Mediral.

- 110. The following details in regard to the Sirkar Hospitals have been furnished by Dr. Morgan the Medical Officer of this Government:—
- 111. There have been no changes in the department since the last report was submitted.
- 112. Condition of Hospitals.—All the minor repairs that were necessary during the year were taken in hand and completed. The Jail Hospital at Ernacollum requires shutters to the lower section of the ventilators and a few additions in furniture and fittings to the dispensary as reported in November last. The foundation of the new Hospital has been laid and the work is in progress.
- 113. Civil Hospital Ernacollum.—Two hundred and sixty-five cases were treated as in-patients during the year against 284 in the preceding. Seventy-two patients dieted themselves and the rest were maintained at the expense of the Sirkar. There were 18 deaths. The out patients exceeded those of 1053 by 397; 3,526 having been treated against 3,129 in 1053. The following surgical operations (which do not appear in the Return submitted with this Report) have been performed by the MESSES. Gunther and have terminated satisfactorily. Amputations of the Arm 2, of the thigh 2, and of the leg 1 among in-patients; and among externs amputations of the thumb 4, fingers 16, toes 11, 26 operations were performed for the removal of tumours, 53 hydrocelles were tapped and there were besides 2 amputations of the penis and 50 circumcisions,

in Ernacollum and at Trichoor, but the disease was not of any duration nor as virulent as in the preceding year. Small-pox prevailed throughout the year in various parts of the country, and as this disease, and the allied topic of vaccination were dwelt on at some length in the last report it is needless to enter into them here. The removal of the small-pox shed from Ernacollum is a retrogade step, and it will be for the Sirkar to decide whether the yearly ravages of a fatal disease are to be arrested or suffered to contiune quieta non inovere principle. The experience

of another year confirms me in the belief that until the vaccinators are brought under some thing more than the nominal control of the Medical Department, that the connection between the two will consist in the transmission of returns which do not stand the simple test that was proposed in the course of the year.

- 116. From the beginning of 1055 the nomenclature of diseases which was introduced into all British Hospitals since 1869 will be substituted for the one that has been hitherto adopted in the Sirkar Hospitals.
- 117. Concurrently with other improvements at Ernacollum the Medical Officer has reported that the latrine accommodation on the backwater and in the vicinity of the public buildings should be increased. The reclaimed ground, for want of sufficient provision of this description, appears to be gradually becoming a nuisance, and steps will be promptly taken to prevent the evil.
- Il 8. It has been intimated that the want of a Hospital for the use of the Planters on the Nelliampathies is very much felt, and that in the event of this Government constructing one at Wallunghy, the Planters would be willing to contribute towards its support. The Nelliampathy Coffee Company and the Oriental Company appear to be disposed to bear a part of the cost of maintaining an efficient Apothecary. Should the views of the Planting Community connected with the Coffee industry be favorable to such an establishment, this Government will be prepared to render every assistance towards that object.
- 119. Vaccination.—The number of persons Vaccinated during the year throughout the Cochin territory, was 8,880 of which 7,714 cases proved successful while the remaining 1,166 were considered unsuccessful.

Ports.

- 120. The total number of Vessels of all descriptions which arrived at the Ports of Mallipoorom and Narakel during the year under review was 115, or 30 more than the previous year.
- 121. The aggregate tonnage of Vessels which called at the above Ports was 65,245 against 51,033.8 tons in the previous year.
- 122. The total amount of Port dues collected was Rs. 5,074—7—0, which is greater than the receipts of the previous year by Rs. 1,494—14—0.
- limited compared with the two previous seasons, however, Narakel was generally busy and the Sirkar ware-housing sheds were consequently in great requisition. The South West Monsoon set in most unexpectedly; the Vessels in the Cochin roads encountered great danger, and one was wrecked, but those that were able to make to Narakel found a safe anchorage. The mud bank that caused such great inconvenience to the shipping and landing of cargo in 1052 has completely disappeared. The Narakel Sirkar Bungalow was repaired and it is in contemplation to have certain additions and improvements made to the building next year.

- 134. The changes in the chief source of revenue having been already noticed in the first portion of this report under their proper heads, it only remains now to explain the variations in the disbursements.
- Rs. 6,100-0-0 owing to the allowances settled on the 8th and 9th Princes having been paid for only one month in 1053, whereas they were disbursed for the whole of the year under report. The allowances to these Princes as well as to the 7th Prince were also raised from Rs. 250 to Rs. 350 a month with effect during the last two months of the year.
- 136. The expenses on account of Religious and Charitable Institutions was greater than in the previous year by Rs. 2,720—12—6. This is due to the ordinary fluctuations in the prices of provisions and in the numbers resorting to those charities.
- 137. The Administrative Establishment shows an increase of Rs. 10,949-4-6. The principal causes of this increase are the appointment of a Deputy Peishkar with his Establishment in the course of the year and enhancement to the salaries of the Chief Enginear, Dewan Peishkar, Huzoor Sheristadar, and some subordinate public servants. Three new Salt Bankshalls were also established, and increases of salary to the officers in charge.
- 138. The small difference of Rs. 911—10—7 in the cost of the Judicial Establishment does not call for any particular remark, and the same may be observed of the Educational Department which has undergone little or no variation.
- 139. The Police expenses have remained stationary, and in the Military force, no perceptible change has occurred.

- A small decrease under the head of Pensions of Rs. 742-8-8 is due to the demise of the Ex-Dewan Vencata Row towards the close of the year and to some minor pensions having lapsed.
- The reduction of Rs. 33,856-9-9 in the expenditure on Public Works is owing to some undertaking having been postponed for another year, and to other reasons which have been already explained in para 88 of this report.
- The charges under the head of Miscellaneous expenditure were unusually high last year owing to the hospitalities to the Maharajah of Travancore on his way to and return from the Presidency, and also to the purchase of furniture, crockery, &c., for the Durbar Hall at Ernacollum.
- The total receipts of the year under review have been less by Rs. 12-9-1 than in the previous year. The total disbursements were in excess of the previous year by Rs. 6,791—15—7.
