## —FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1721-22—

The Essay Master Paymaster & Surveyor to examine further the Condition & report y<sup>e</sup>. same.

ORDER'D that the Essay Master, Paymaster, and M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Way Surveyor of the Buildings do examine more thoroughly the condition of the Silver Mint, House and Warehouse and report the same to the Board.

[The] Warehousek<sup>r</sup>. delivers [in a] state of y<sup>e</sup>. running [contracts] & there appearing [a] great number of [bales] yet to be deliver'd [which] with a small [addition] would be [sufficient] for the expected [Shipping] It was not [deemed] necessary to enter upon a new Contract.

The Warehousek<sup>r</sup>. pursuant to order of last Consul[t<sup>n</sup>.] delivers in a state of the running Contracts which being [taken] into Consideration and it appearing thereby that there [are] 47367 $\frac{7}{12}$ <sup>th</sup>. Bales valued at Pag<sup>s</sup>. 300552: —: — yet to be deliv[er'd] in at this Settlement by the Company's Merchants;

It was AGREED that the foremention'd Quantity [of] Goods with a very small Addition will be as much as shall be able to get cured in the year ensuing and that there is no necessity for entering upon a new Contract till the running Contracts be nearer comply'd with;

The State of the Contracts at Fort St. David to be [wrote] for.

It is also AGREED that we write to Fort St. David and order them to send us up a particular state of their Contracts, the Sorts and quantities of cloth contracted for and what brought in and cured, as also what still remains to be brought in on said Contracts.

The President reads the Cash Acco<sup>t</sup>. for last month Ballance remaining Pag<sup>s</sup>. 37216 : 3 : 35 And

The Mint Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the same month Ballance Pag<sup>s</sup>. 1 : 6 : 40 which he now pays in.

[Mr.] Hubbard advising [that] the George Brigant would be ready in a few days

A Generall Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. James Hubbard read acquainting us that the Brigantine would be ready by the time her dispatches could arrive,

[Their] dispatches to be sent.

AGREED that the West Coast Papers & dispatch[es] be sent away forthwith.

Metchleptam<sup>m</sup>. Generall Lett<sup>r</sup>. read.

Generall Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. Humphry Holcombe at Metchleptam read inclosing his Acco<sup>ts</sup>. for Oct<sup>r</sup>. & Nov<sup>r</sup>. [w<sup>ch</sup>.] are deliver'd the Accomptant to examine.

Acco<sup>t</sup>. Sale of Sundrys found in the Sea Gate Godowns deliver'd in and the Amo<sup>t</sup>. paid.

Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Richard Benyon & Catesby Oadham deli[ver] in an Acco<sup>t</sup>. of sale of the Goods that were found in the [Sea] Gate Godowns belonging to unknown Owners amounting to Pag<sup>s</sup>. 57-33-54 which is now paid in and the Acco<sup>t</sup>. enter'd hereafter.

Our Letter of the 28<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David not reaching that Place time enough to prevent the Heathcote taking the opportunity of a Slatch of Wind to get away She arriv'd here yesterday at noon and as we beleive it improper to send either of the Europe Ships to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David least she should be retarded and loose the opportunity of keeping Company in their Voyage home and the Monmouth not being yet arriv'd from Bengall, neither are [we] able to judge what detains her, and the Lusitania being now in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's Service and fallen to Leeward as far as Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David, we think fit to order her to take in what [bales] are or can be got ready there in five or six days after the receipt of our Letter and proceed so soon as [y<sup>e</sup> wind] will permit for Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George beleiving she cannot miss an opportunity time enough for the dispatch of the Europe Ships.

The Heathcote having left Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David before the Letter of the 28<sup>th</sup> Ult<sup>o</sup>. [was] arriv'd. & not thinking it proper to send any of the Comp<sup>ys</sup>. Ships thither least they should be retarded & be hinder'd from keeping Company home, But y<sup>e</sup>. Lusitania being fell down thither She is order'd to take in what Bales they [can send] & proceed hither as soon as the wind will permit.

M<sup>r</sup>. Stephen Newcome delivers in a report of the [state] of the three Villages now under his inspection which is [enter'd] after this Consultation and the purport thereof being taken into consideration, it was

M<sup>r</sup>. Newcome delivers in a state of Egmore & 4<sup>th</sup>. villages.

AGREED that the Villages be let out and that the President do make a tender of them to the Companys Merchants and that the allowances mentioned in y<sup>e</sup>. Re[port] be made if upon due examination they appear to be reasonable.

The Villages to be let to farm y<sup>e</sup>. allowances to be made if reasonable.

ORDER'D that three thousand Pagodas be advan[c'd] John Emmerson Paymaster to defray Charges Garrison.

Paymastr. advanced 3000, Pagodas.

ORDER'D that the Chest of Silver w<sup>th</sup>. Meah Sah[ib] deliver'd Cap<sup>t</sup>. Joseph Tolson at the Camp which belong'd to the Dartmouth be sent for ashore and that the Warehousekeeper and M<sup>r</sup>. Oadham examine the same & give a rep[ort] thereof to the Board.

The warehousekepr. and Mr. Oadham to examine the chest of silver sav'd out of the Dartm<sup>os</sup>. Wreck which is order'd to be sent from on board the Heathcote.

ORDER'D that the Warehousekepr. do load Sa[lt] Petre and redwood aboard the Heathcote.

The Warehousekr. to load Salt Petre & redwood ab<sup>d</sup>. the Heathcote.

The last years produce of the three Villages of Egmore, Persiawaack and Tonderwood being all [Sow'd] but about nine Garse of Paddy which is disputed by the Inhabitants as acquainted this Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Board last [Month] a List of said allowances is enter'd in the Consultation Book M<sup>r</sup>. Emmerson and M<sup>r</sup>. Draper were order'd to enquire into it and on their report I was order'd to take those allowances away, but the Inhabitants complaining to M<sup>r</sup>. Horden and acquainting him more fully

about it, he promised to get those allowances continued to them but thro': the hurry of business it has been put off from time to time which occasions last years Acco<sup>ns</sup>. stand open, the time of Harvest now coming on I desire the favour your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to give me orders what I shall do as to those allowances, I beleive M<sup>r</sup>. Emmerson and M<sup>r</sup>. Draper did not know when they made their report that the Inhabitants pay near that value in money and in consideration of these allowances as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

The Inhabitants seem very uneasy to part with so ancient a Custom w<sup>ch</sup>: they say is allow'd of in and about all this Country & was allow'd when M<sup>r</sup>. Harris had the Charge of these Villages Paupa Braminy kept the Acco<sup>ns</sup>. at that time & can inform your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. about it.

The Inhabitants have been very diligent this year & have sow'd a great deal more Land than they did last year which promised an extraordinary produce but the late Storm spoild them a great deal of Paddy, particularly Tonderwood Village the sea having flow'd in at Cattawaack Village so run through Trivitore Sattangoord Tanderwood & so to this place which has kill'd the paddy and made the Ground Salt wherever it came and has occasion'd this second time of sowing to come up very thin, & will afford but a small produce w<sup>ch</sup>: damages we compute to be about two or three hundred Pagodas notwithstanding said loss we hope this years produce will come out better than the last & I assure your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. my care shall not be wanting therein.

M<sup>r</sup>. Harris informs me he had a little ground in each of those Villages allow'd him as a perquisite by w<sup>ch</sup>: he the better could judge what the rest of the Paddy Feilds would produce and in some measure could prevent the Inhabitants cheating of him for w<sup>ch</sup>. reason I humbly request your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to grant me the same & it will very much oblige,

By what has been said your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>o</sup>. will readily observe the late Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Council did in Dec<sup>r</sup>. 1720 take sufficient care there should be no want of brown Cloth for three years reckoning from that time and allowing the Washers to cure 2000 bales @ annum w<sup>ch</sup>. is 20 bales more than were sent [home] the last year on the eight Ships from this Place for of 5798 Bales that completed their Cargoes 3429 were Fort St. David bales & 389 Vizagapatam.

Since it appears they have made so large a provision for Brown Cloth I wish I cou'd tell your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>o</sup>. care had been taken to cure any tolerable part of it but for what reason I shall not take upon me to say the Washers have been so much neglected that from the dispatch of the Hartford in Feby to the arrivall of the Marlbrô: & Heathcote in Oct<sup>r</sup>. there were no more than 717 bales sorted notwithstanding that Intervall of time is much the finest season of the year.

The Dep<sup>y</sup>. Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Council of Fort St. David have already sent from thence 2030 bales and they expect to have 1000 more ready by the middle of this month, so that if your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>o</sup>. please to order them to send a State of their Contracts I beleave you will find them pretty near completed & that only there you will think it necessary to enter into new ones.

October last that my business requir'd my presence in England then pray'd you would permit me to go on the King George with design to return in the Service you were pleas'd [to grant] the same and I accordingly embarked my effects [there] But that Ship being unfortunately lost whereby I was a great sufferer as well loosing my Books and Papers as other Concerns which has much alter'd the State of my [Affairs] and not being under the same necessity for going home at that time as desirous of Staying longer in India wherefore I humbly pray you will permit me to take my [former] Standing in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's Service as Jun<sup>r</sup>. Merch<sup>t</sup>. I am induc'd to hope you will comply with this request as I have reason to believe my behaviour therein has [been] hitherto acceptable and when I further assure you my [duty] to my Employers shall be my study how to act for their Interest & your satisfaction.

You having been pleas'd to give me the liberty of laying before you the state of my affairs in relation to the business of Materials w<sup>ch</sup>. I was concern'd in one third with Elisha Ellill and James Rawlings as [well] as in respect of a debt due to me from the Estate of [Elisha] Ellill afores<sup>d</sup>. w<sup>ch</sup>. I never had any Credit for I make bo[ld] to proceed therein as follows.

On Cap<sup>t</sup>. Irving and Nicolo's laying down the [bu]siness aforesaid of providing materials for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company buildings there was a new contract made with two Malay men under the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Council's hands the Companys [seal] which was afterwards transferr'd to James Rawlins by [M<sup>r</sup>.] Shyllinge for the Consideration of Rawlins giving him [as] under his hand due at severall payments to the amount of near 8000 Dollars, it being for debts due to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Irving [&] Nicolo from the Malays as for an advance for cutting Timbers in the Woods, as these Notes were payable [in] time one of them became due in a small time after M<sup>r</sup>. Shillings [suspension and the] Deputy Governour accordingly demanded payment thereof which Rawlins being unable at that time to comply with his money being out of his hands he apply'd himself to me for assistance offering to concern me one third in said affair If I would advance a proportionable sum to discharge the said note which I did and to all the rest of them till the whole was paid except one for about 700 Dollars. Thus I became concern'd in this business and as I enter'd into it on the Security of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company Contract and having laid out the Major part of what I had in the world especially my ready money I humbly hope your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. will be of the opinion that its no more than just and right that I ought to have enjoy'd my said one third of the Benefits arising from y<sup>e</sup>. said Contract but a small time after M<sup>r</sup>. Cooke's arrivall he refus'd to take any materials of us notwithstanding the s<sup>d</sup>. Contract and the great Sum of money we had out amongst y<sup>e</sup>. Malays on that acco<sup>t</sup>. which it was impossible to get in any other ways but he made an advance to M<sup>r</sup>. Stephen White out of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's Cash to provide materials and tho M<sup>r</sup>. Rawlins went severall times from me to M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Cooke & s<sup>d</sup>. White with proposalls of transferring our joint right to the same on very reasonable terms yet the said M<sup>r</sup>. White continually trifled with us and fell from his proposalls when ever we came up to them on complaint to M<sup>r</sup>. Cooke of his unfair way of dealing by the said James Rawlins he positively told him that he would take no more of us by which unjust tyrannical Proceedings we lost all our money for as we could not go from our

agreement with the Malays and must either take the materials they brought or get nothing we was oblig'd to take a piece of ground to put them in where they lay and rotted (as Mr. Farmers affidavit will testify) and when Mr. Cooke deserted the Settlement of Marlbrô : I suppose they were burnt and destroy'd as well as the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's effects at said Place, the joynt Books we kept will prove my concern therein were they produc'd which I humbly beg your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will oblige Mr. Cook to do or put him to his oath that he has not nor never had them nor knows what is become of them Mr. Jarvis's attestation will prove their being taken from James Rawlins after I was sent off of the Coast which attestation I humbly present as well as Farmer's affidavit.

Whilst I was at Bental Mr. Elisha Ellill dy'd & a small time after my return to Marlbrô : Mr. Cooke issued out an [order] for every person who had demands on Mr. Ellill's [estate] should deliver them in to Sec<sup>ry</sup>. William Palmer which accordingly did one part of the debt being a note under hand which I had paid Mr. Hugonin for him and the [other] part an Acco<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. according to the best of my remembrance for piece Goods the just amount of which I cannot be [positive] in but beleive it to be about 83 Pagodas these Papers [I am] well assured are in the Place for Sec<sup>ry</sup>. Palmer inform<sup>d</sup> [me] a little before he dy'd that they were amongst his [here at] Madrass therefore humbly hope Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will [be pleased] to oblige Mr. Cook to find them Mr. Palmer's affairs (as [I] have been inform'd) being left to Mr. Cooke's management.

A few days before I was sent off from the West Coast Mr. Cooke thought fit to issue out an attachment [on] all the Goods and effects belonging to Mr. Richard Farmer and my self whereby we were incapacitated for recovering of any debts of what kind soever due to us as by copy [of] said attachment which makes them all the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>y</sup> which was the reason I did not make any demand for [my] debt when the Dividend was made of Mr. Ellill's estate but expected as it was seiz'd for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company to have had credit in their General Books for it which I humbly conceive your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will think but reason[able] and hope Mr. Palmers insufficiency will not be thought a reason for my losing any part thereof for Mr. Cooke as he ought to have done might very easily have call'd that money out of the Secretary's hands into the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Cash in due time and as for Mr. Ellill's estate [it] is said to be in debt it arrives from his Loss in y<sup>e</sup>. mate[ri]al Business which to my knowledge he was concern'd in [by] 700 Dollars which I beleive would have been sufficient [to] satisfy every body.

Thus I have laid before your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. a just and true state of the case and humbly submit to your Considerations and Goodness for my hardship is very [great] therein to have the small means I was master off [taken] from me with all the injustice and violence imagi[nable] and not have satisfaction on the Person who has so [vi]sibly injur'd me but as by experience I can so entirely [depend] on your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. wisdom and justice I humbly [lay] my sufferings before you for determination [wherefore] shall not trouble you with any further enlargement hereon but only to urge one reason more to prove that if your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. does not think Mr. Cooke on the Acco<sup>t</sup>. of his being Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. and acting for the Company they must and I ought to have credit in their Books accordingly for if Mr. Cooke had power to stop the Payment of all debts and effects due or belonging to me from all Persons whatsoever in the Company's Jurisdiction it would be very unreasonable the loss should ly on my side these Malay men that were my debtors on Accounts of Materials liv'd within the said jurisdiction wherefore as Payment was stopt to me if Mr. Cooke did not call in these debts of Materials for the Company's use (which could have set aside the occasion of any further advance []) I cant see why in justice or reason my estate should suffer for his default as this is a point very material as well as of importance I humbly beg it may be duely consider'd and that I may have credit in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company's Books for both these particulars accordingly.

Nath<sup>l</sup>. Elwick Esq<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. Council or the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Catesby Oadham Esq<sup>r</sup>. Mayor of the said Place as accessory to the death of the s<sup>d</sup>. Francis Hastings Esq<sup>r</sup>. by arrest and imprisonment. It appears by practising with me to the best of my judgment that He himself was the designer of that paper and not the afores<sup>d</sup>. Francis Hastings Esq<sup>r</sup>. About ten or fifteen days before his decease he did sign & Seal a paper w<sup>ch</sup>. my self & severall others were desired to be witness to, but some of the Company being unwilling to witt[ness] it made me endeavour to learn the Contents of it which I co[uld] not discover but being inquisitive of M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy about it [he] told me there was nothing in it would hurt me but one [thing] or other might tend to all our advantage or words to this effect I understood it was not a Will and did not conceive any [pre]judice to my self or others by my being a Witness if I saw him write his name I then went into the Chamber to see him sign it where was present M<sup>r</sup>. Draper M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy M<sup>rs</sup>. Johnson, three or four of his English servants, & some others whose names I have forgot what I chiefly observ'd [in] his discourse was that he suspected the paper which he [was] going to sign related to M<sup>rs</sup>. Johnson at which he seem'd to [be] very much out of humour and angry that she should come her self about it upon which She and M<sup>r</sup>. Draper told him it was a Letter to his Brother which M<sup>r</sup>. Draper had read [to] him but just before, and did no ways relate to her which [when] he was satisfy'd of he answer'd now I understand what it [is] but what has M<sup>rs</sup>. Johnson to do with it and immediately [he] sign'd it in my presence to which I am a Witness but I do [not] remember all the rest that sign'd it; I can give your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. no further Acco<sup>t</sup>. of it being with Respect.

You having been pleas'd yesterday in Council to demand of me a declaration of what I knew concerning a paper sign'd by M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings I must in justice to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. give the following relation.

As M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings's Indisposition was the occasion of my frequent Visits to him, It happen'd one evening that M<sup>r</sup>. Draper desir'd I would walk into the room to be a Witness to a paper M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings was then going to sign accordingly I went in when I heard M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy express himself to M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings thus.

“ Sr. You having now heard what has been read and approv'd it, you do desire these Gentlemen present to be a Witness thereto.”

To which M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings instead of making a direct answer (as might have been expected) said “ What has M<sup>r</sup>. Johnson to do with it, and other expressions very inconsequent ; [ where ] upon I retir'd & M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy follow'd : M<sup>r</sup>. Horden also (who I suppose had been desir'd to be a Witness) left the room and coming to M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy ask'd him if he would sign that Paper [ after ] having heard M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings talk in such a manner M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy said he had his particular reasons for not signing it and [ then ] went back into the Room.

In a short time M<sup>r</sup>. Draper came out and having said the Paper was sign'd in a very arrogant air demanded of me why I would not be a witness to the paper my answer was I did not think M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings in his senses at the same time repeating M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings's expressions which occasioned that opinion, M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy replyd that If I had tarried I [ mi ] ght perhaps have been convinc'd, to which I answerd I might as well waite for the lucid Intervalls of a Madman.

I then observ'd no small uneasiness in M<sup>r</sup>. Draper [ and ] ask'd M<sup>r</sup>. Horden the contents of the Paper but he excus'd himself from that resolve by saying M<sup>r</sup>. Wendy had desird him [ not ] to tell me.

This I must confess led me to a further enquiry & then I heard that the Paper was directed to M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings (Brother of the Dec<sup>d</sup>.) and the Executors Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Draper and Wendy containing a heavy charge against the Govern<sup>r</sup>. & Council of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. Geo[ rge ] and an order for the Heir & Executors to prosecute.

Plaintiff of Pag<sup>s</sup>. 821 Interest included the principal being Pag<sup>s</sup>. 281 which as soon as Chinnina Chitty saw he snatch'd the Cajan out of his hand and tore it.

JONAH COMPANY PEON declares that He was by Juggoo's ord<sup>r</sup>. a watching these arbitrators that he particularly stood near unto Chinnina Chitty Virago y<sup>e</sup>. Company propos'd to cure a larger Quantity of Cloth here than usual and that if they should take those Villages they must neglect the Company's business for which reasons they desir'd to be excus'd the President further observes one impediment is the Tank at Persiawalk being so much out of repair that it will cost one thousand Pagodas to make it fit for a Tenant's use tho: it hath been reported before to be done for 500 Pagodas as enter'd after Consultation of the 15<sup>th</sup>. June 1721 and therein propos'd that the Inhabitants do the laborious part gratis, which cannot be expected from a needy People that have not more than the rice they daily work for, the President further reports that He cannot find any one will bid more than 1200 Pagodas for a term of years and repair the Tank for his time and proposeth that this be refer'd home to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Emmerson & Draper were order'd to Scrutinize into the said allowances & report the Same to the Board which was accordingly comply'd with the 15<sup>th</sup>. June last and they then reported there was always an allowance of 55  $\text{P}$  Cent to the Inhabitants upon the produce of the grain for their tillage and looking after it and the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company had the remaining 45  $\text{P}$  C<sup>t</sup>. clear of all Charges, they also report that it never was customary for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company to repair y<sup>e</sup>. Tanks but the Inhabitants who being reduc'd very low by the late Famine cannot be at so great a Charge except the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>ns</sup>. would be at the Charge of building a few Sluices from the great Tank The Renters pretend that by the grant of ground to People for Gardens part of the paddy ground is thereby taken fro<sup>m</sup> them and of course depreciates the rent of it if this be as they say We remember that when those grants were made the renters were first consulted about them and Should then have declar'd the prejudice to the Farm of the villages.

Upon enquiry of M<sup>r</sup>. Newcome into the Charges of y<sup>e</sup>. Villages & Income for these two years since the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. I am sorry any Person living will be Wittness to so apparent a falsehood because the said Geary never was any otherways than a private Soldier in my Company the whole time I had it as will appear to your Hon<sup>R</sup>. & C<sup>A</sup>. from the Muster rolls and Paymaster's Books, As to my confining him in the Cockhouse 'tis very well known no Officer in this Garrison can do so but by the Govern<sup>RS</sup>. ord<sup>R</sup>. which is always for capital faults but that the s<sup>d</sup>. Geary was confin'd and afterwards sent to Moco Moco by the late Govern<sup>R</sup>. I very well remember for so great a degree of mutiny as could not consist with the safety of the Garrison to let him be any longer in it. As for his demanding his discharge I think it was in July 1720 and he was promised to have liberty of going home by the next January Shipping.

In our Letter design'd  $\Phi$  Ship King George but forwarded by the Monmouth we acquainted the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Court of Directors y<sup>t</sup>. we had secured Mar Kisna M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings Dubash and one Vincatty Putty whom we had severe Complaints against for large debts owing to sundry Persons and other indireet management the latter hath since satisfy'd all his Creditors and being much indispos'd upon his giving security of two Persons had his liberty and is since gone out of the Bounds his Security promise to produce him in few days the former hath either made full satisfaction or given Security for all the demands that have appear'd against him except a debt to Amerash Tacca a Company's Merchant and to the Estate of his Master Hastings, his Crimes are so enormous (some few of which are order'd to be enter'd after this Consultation) that they eall for publick punishment that He may be an example to future Dubashes how they make use of their Master's power in an unwarrantable manner he at present complains of a lameness in his limbs how real we cannot determine but shall leave the determination of his Case till the Europe Ships are gone, He always had a lodging in the Fort and a Sentry upon him and had the liberty of his acquaintance till the Comp<sup>as</sup>. Merchant reported that he liv'd so jocular with his singing Mast<sup>r</sup>. attending him that he would never think of paying him his money which was above two months since when the President order'd him into the Ensign's room upon the Main Guard and the door to be shut thro: He observes a constant levee at his window every morning.

I Tomboo Chitty do hereby declare that one Tillah Chitty was indebted to me a considerable Sum w<sup>ch</sup>. he refus'd to pay upon w<sup>ch</sup>. I made my Complaint to M<sup>r</sup>. Benyon who advis'd me to take out a warrant against him w<sup>ch</sup>. I accordingly did as soon as I reach'd Mar Kisna's ears he immediately sent his Servant Pom Venkittee Putty to give security for the said Tillah Chitty's appearing sometime before judgment was to be given in Court the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna sent for me & demanded how I dare take warrant ag<sup>st</sup>. Tillah Chitty when he had given him his word that he should not be molested if He would return into the Bounds and then order'd me to be confin'd that night at the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company's Garden, adding that Englishmen did not understand that affair therefore that I should have it decided by Jentue Arbitrators and then he releas'd me but still order'd two Peons to follow me upon which I told the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna that Tillah Chitty ow'd me money and ask'd him why he set Peons over me he reply'd that He would not release me unless I would put the Case to Jentue Arbitration finding no other way would do I accordingly chus'd my Arbitrators sometime after the said Pom Venkittee Putty went to the

Arbitrators and told them that Mar Kisna order'd them to let them know that they need not trouble themselves about it any more than but to find out something against me and in such like errands he went to them every day even the Arbitrators that Tillah Chitty chus'd told my Arbitrators that in their opinions such proceedings were unjust asking what business they had with it when it appear'd so plain by bonds that the said Tillah Chitty was indebted to me, further adding that if they were to decide the Case agreeable to justice that then Mar Kisna would entirely ruin them, then they told me if I would go and be reconcil'd to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Mar Kisna that then they should be promoted otherwise ruin'd, The said Arbitrators were troubled with the affair both day and night and scarce had time en<sup>b</sup>: allow'd them to eat their victuals for the term of six months which made the Arbitrators ask me whether I would have them loose their lives and Estates about my business when if I would give Mar Kisna some money and be reconcil'd to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. that all their trouble w<sup>d</sup>. then be over, Then Gongaram and Gruapa Naigue came and told me that the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Mar Kisna were resolv'd to have me cast whether in the right or wrong therefore It was better offer them something and get into their favour, I answer'd and ask'd why I should give them money when I owe them none, then the said Mar Kisna put me with the Arbitrators into the Jentue Pagoda Garden and kept us there night and Day without Sustenance w<sup>th</sup>. orders not to stir from thence without making an end of that business neither would He allow us a bed or Cushion to ly upon, if such a thing was brought the Peons would throw it out in this manner we was put to great trouble, I being concern'd that the Arbitrators should suffer so much upon my Acco<sup>t</sup>. gave them orders to give the Award agreeable to the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna's desire they answer'd that unless I would go and settle the matter with Mar Kisna they would not give an award accordingly I went to the said Mar Kisna and ask'd him why he gave the Arbitrators and my self so much trouble he then ask'd me how I dare take a warrant against Tillah Chitty when the Gov<sup>r</sup>. had sent for him for which the Gov<sup>r</sup>. was very angry with me and that He design'd to put me in the Choultry therefore that I should give the Gov<sup>r</sup>. something to make him easy then I ask'd him for what reason I should offer the Gov<sup>r</sup>. money and then went away, the next morning the said Mar Kisna sent two Peons to my House who told me that the Gov<sup>r</sup>. had order'd me to be confin'd in the Choultry upon which I went to the said Mar Kisna accompany'd by Gruapa Naigue immediately the s<sup>d</sup>. ## A DECLARATION OF TOMBEE CHITTY AND MOOTA VENKITTY CHITTY.

We Tombee Chitty and Moota Venkitty Chitty do hereby declare that Mar Kisna sent for and told us, that as we had enter'd into a Contract with the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company we ought to give the Gov<sup>r</sup>. five thousand Pagodas which he then demanded upon our refusin<sup>g</sup> to give the said money he went and told the Gov<sup>r</sup>. some false Storys which occasion'd us to be confin'd one day at the Gardens about 12 a clock that night the Peons carried us to Mar Kisna's house when we ask'd why he put us to so much trouble without any reason he answer'd that if we would lay down five thousand Pagodas we may go free or else we should be confin'd in the Choultry, notwithstanding those threats we still refus'd to give any money then he sent us to the Choultry and put us in a close prison where two men can scarce stand and order'd the Peons not to let us go out without the door upon any acco<sup>t</sup>. whatsoever but made us eat drink and ease ourselves in that little place about four or five days after he gave orders y<sup>t</sup>. we should not any provisions whatsoever but once in 4 days and then only a little rice and water and of that not half en<sup>o</sup>. to satisfy our appetites One day we lighted a lamp in the s<sup>d</sup>. Godown w<sup>ch</sup>. Mar Kisna saw & order'd it immediately to

be put out sometime after we sent a Man to the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna to ask him how he could be so barbarous to us, he answer'd that we should not be releas'd unless we would give the s<sup>d</sup>. 5000 Pagodas telling the s<sup>d</sup>. Serv<sup>t</sup>. that if we would give the said money. to come and tell him if not, not to come him again and then order'd the Peon to push the said Man out of his house sometime after he sent a Man to us to tell us that if we would give 3000 Pagodas we should be free which we refused sometime after 2000 then we should be releas'd for 1500 Pagodas lastly he sent word if we would directly lay down 1000 we should be set at liberty but finding he could not get any thing from us he increas'd his barbarity to the utmost of his power and then releas'd us all w<sup>ch</sup>. was by the persuasion of Mar Kisna therefore we hope this Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Board will examine this affair.

## THE DECLARATION OF VISKANADOO BADRIAH DIAMOND MERCHANT.

I Viskanadoo Budriah do hereby declare that Mar Kisna demanded of me my Garden w<sup>ch</sup>. I refus'd to give him saying that I bought it honestly of Woodanda for which I had bill of Sale and that I had put it to a Charity use whereupon he sent 4 Talliars over me who were a great terrour to me he also threatned me very much and then ask'd me again for my Garden at which time I answer'd him much to the same purpose as before then he accus'd me for what I never did and procur'd some false witnesses to it then he sent some of the Comp<sup>ss</sup>. Peons and Talliars who shut up my doors and kept me in close prison in my House at which time I sent word that I was satisfi'd with my own Character in the whole Town and that I never meddled with other people's affairs, The said Mar Kisna hearing that I design'd to acquaint the Gov<sup>r</sup>. of his proceedings order'd me to be confin'd in the Choultry in a Godown amongst some Pariars where the Prisoners ease themselves not allowing me necessary's of life but crd<sup>d</sup>. that the Peons should not open the Door upon any Account what soever and to see his orders put in force he kept ten of his own Peons there and threatned me from time to time that I should be put in Irons ty'd to the Wheels, whipp'd, put in the Pillory ride the wooden horse and that my ears should be cut of and several other things the truth of which the whole Town knows, What hardships I endured by the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna's orders only God knows it being beyond the power of Man to express, I was necessitated to give the said Mar Kisna's Peons who look'd after me ten Pagodas every day for water to drink about which time my whole family went and fell upon the Ground before him telling him that it would be a great scandle to the whole Cast if I should dye in the Godown offering him 2000 Pagodas for my freedom desiring that I might be let free to get it in saying that they would [be] bound for the payment which he would not agree to, then they shew'd him the money upon which he immediately order'd me to be releas'd, then I went accompanyd by Gopallu and the said Mar Kisna to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. with 2000 Pagodas in two bags one of which was Pullicat Pagodas the other Madrass which I gave to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. desiring that the Madrass might be return'd me upon my bringing Pulicat upon which the Gov<sup>r</sup>. called me several names and Mar Kisna took the bags and laid them before him, sometime after the said Mar Kisna sent for me and told me that he wanted some Diamonds and to borrow some moncy I seeing no possibility of living here in peace by reason of Mar Kisna und<sup>r</sup>. pretence of going to a feast at Conjeveram I went with all my family into the Country upon which Mar Kisna wrote to me that unless I would return to Madrass he would dispose of my House Gardens and all my effects; then he confin'd my Companions Wonelah Naranah and Maucah Nauganah and fin'd y<sup>m</sup>. 500 Pagodas, then I went to S<sup>t</sup>. Thoma where he sent Peons to watch me I being apprehensive that they design'd to take an opportunity to carry me by force to Madrass went again into the Country, sometime after the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna return'd my Companions the said 500 Pagodas I bribing the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna's brother with a diamond worth 30 Pagodas upon my hearing of the late happy Change of Government and knowing your Hon<sup>r</sup>. to be a Man of a General good Character

TOMBEE CHITTY.

We do hereby declare that Mar Kisna sent a Peon to call Us to his house where as soon as we went he confin'd us in his Choultry for that day for what we could not understand till 12 a Clock that night about two a Clock one Ramanapah a Goldsmith & Mar Kisnas brother Venkatee Naigue convey'd us to the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna who was then in an upper room as soon as we appear'd before him he told us that a woman had laid violent hands on her self by reason of our barbarous usage to her and that thereby he was guilty of an heinous Crime, We reply'd that she dy'd a natural death then he threatned to have us whipt in his house and make us Prisoners in the necessary house & several other things and then in Govern<sup>r</sup>. Hasting's name demanded of us two thousand Pagodas which because we refus'd to give he ord<sup>d</sup>. the Peons to push us out of his house and carry us to the Choultry Prison when we had got about half way thither being very much afraid desir'd the Peons to let us return to the said Mar Kisna which they did then we offer'd to give two thousand Pagodas within nine days for our freedom which he agreed to at which time we by the s<sup>d</sup>. Mar Kisna's orders drew up a bond in the abovesaid Ramapah's name and deliver'd it to him which he accepted of and then set us at liberty and sent the said Ramapah and a Talliar to convey us safe to our homes at the expiration of the abovemention'd time we being accompany'd by the said Ramapah about three a Clock in the afternoon went and deliver'd the s<sup>d</sup>. two thousand Pagodas to the said Mar Kisna who then return'd us the abovesaid bond telling us that he would the first opportunity send for us to appear before the Gov<sup>r</sup>. accordingly the next morning he sent a Peon named Rajah to call us to the Fort where when we came the said Mar Kisna told us that he would keep one thousand Pagodas then he gave us the other thousand to present to the Govern<sup>r</sup>. which we accordingly did and then gave a Salam and went away he not speaking one word to us therefore we humbly hope your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will examine this affair.

Dec<sup>d</sup>. in the hands of the Rev<sup>d</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas his Executor for Pagodas six thousand which y<sup>e</sup>. Testator in his life time did forcibly extort from the Plaintiff y<sup>r</sup>. Petitioner on or about the 9<sup>th</sup>. of October following; Your Petitioner made a second Motion by way of Petition when all Partys attended his Worship as well in behalf of the defendant M<sup>r</sup>. Hastings as your Petitioner, at which time there happen'd a debate which held till the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Court adjourn'd, so that it was deferr'd to a Rehearing which came on before the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Bench on the 30<sup>th</sup>. following when the Rev<sup>d</sup>. Thomas Wendy Execut<sup>r</sup>. to the Dec<sup>d</sup>. as well as Defendant in the Cause deliver'd in his answer and likewise produc'd an Affidavit which was sworn too in Court by Mar Kisna an Evidence in behalf of the Dec<sup>d</sup>. upon which ensued a long debate and the Court adjourn'd witho<sup>t</sup>. making any decree the 23<sup>d</sup>. of November last being appointed for a Rehearing the Plaintiff your Petitioner prepar'd a true and authentick Narration of the whole state of his Case, as likewise his Replication to the defendants answer which your petitioners solicitor made a motion to have preferr'd which was unfortunately rejected by some of the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Bench He declar'd that he remember'd there were four bags bro<sup>t</sup>. to the Garden House by the Plaintiff your Petitioner and his People but that he did not see what was within the said bags but did beleive they might be Pagodas, He further declar'd that that he left the Chamber immediately upon the Plaintiff and Mar Kisna's coming in upon which M<sup>r</sup>. Franks one of the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Bench reply'd there was great probability to beleive that the said two thousand Pagodas Note might then be deliver'd as Mar Kisna had depos'd upon which as well as after a long & tedious debate the Court proceeded to Judgment which was pronounc'd from the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Bench in behalf of the Defendant which judgment your Petitioner does humbly beleive might be founded upon the aforesaid Supposition.

Your Petitioner does not so much except against the Worsp<sup>l</sup>. Courts over caution as their refusal of his Case by way of Replication ; he being inform'd that all Courts of Judicature are very cautious and tender in such points as these where there is mortality in the Case for which Reasons your Petitioner does humbly presume he has Cause to beleive his Case went somewhat hard, Wherefore he appeals to this Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Y<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>.: has caused to be delivered to me an Acco<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. wherein I am charged Debt<sup>r</sup>. about 25000 Sp<sup>a</sup>. Dollars whereas in truth there is due to me above 2300 Sp<sup>a</sup>. Dollars.

I was much Concerned to find my self charged so deeply in Debt but on perusal of that Paper it proved to be only an Acco<sup>t</sup>. of M<sup>r</sup>. Tho<sup>s</sup>. Dunster's who is now Yo<sup>r</sup>. Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>.: on the West Coast, & I hope to make it very plainly appear that his whole pretended Charge how formidable soever he has drest it up is insignificant, trifling & unjust, which when done I doubt not from Yo<sup>r</sup>. Companys Pepper is bought with Cloth, & were the People are so well satisfied with the price of Cloth that they buy it all the same rates, and pay in Gold dust of 22 Carracts fine one Chorinehia Tale which is equal to

 01.   6.   16 Troy w<sup>t</sup>. for 4 p's Long Cloth, Ord. White and then (admitting this for truth as most certainly it is) four Sp<sup>a</sup>. Dollars and a half the price, that is charged for materials paid for w<sup>th</sup>. one such Piece of Long Cloth ord: White cant be said to be an unreasonable price.

When I was att M: Moco I wrote many Circular Letters to the Sultan, Pangarans & other Great Men, such as I thought wo<sup>d</sup>. best conduce to Create & preserve a good Harmony between the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company and them, and the Success was answerable but in those Letters I promised that all things that were of Advantage to them should be as formerly upon that they were induced to fitt up the Hospitall and some part of the Old Fort & they brought in many materials ag<sup>st</sup>. my Arrivall so that we had Stakes of Wood enough allmost to enclose a small Pagg<sup>r</sup>: wherein we might secure our Selves after our landing, for we went to take possession of a Country wherein the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company had many Enemys that were exasperated against them by the hard & unjust Usage of their former Depu<sup>ty</sup>. Govern<sup>rs</sup>. who exercised all manner of Cruelties among the native Mallays in as barbarous a manner as was practised of Old Age the Primative Xtians some of their Princes some of their Princes have been Murthered, some Stab'd, some beheaded some Imprisoned and some Abdicated from their Kingdoms and their Thrones declared Vacant other Men have been Whipt to Death, some their Leggs some their Ears or Noses cutt off some chopt to pieces all sorts of Inhumanity that cou'd be practised has been used amongst them, w<sup>ch</sup>. had made the English name Odious throughtout the Country wherefore when I came among y<sup>m</sup>: I thought it my Duty to calm there enraged tempers by all mild & gentle methods so that I cou'd not then properly tell them I woud not buy the materials they were sensible we stood so much in need of them for the usuall rates, to have mentioned such a thing at that time woud have been of dangerous Consequence as I will shew if Yo<sup>e</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. please to give me leave to Continue the digression, by repeating a short Story of the Pullambangers that came down to oppose the English landing at Bancolou.

As soon as notice arrived that a new English Govern<sup>r</sup>. was come to settle Bancolou great Tumults were stirred up Sultan Guillamott rose in Arms and burnt one Town he was so exasperated by being forced out of His Kingdom and Abdicated by Govern<sup>r</sup>. Collet that he resolved to do his utmost to prevent the English ever coming into these parts again he invited the King of Pullambang who sent 1000 Men to oppose our Landing & they encamped about Benteering, Cobong Ferry &c<sup>a</sup>. which happened at that time to be dangerously infected with the small Pox, & these 1000 Men coming down all Fresh from the mountains into that sickly place, it Immediately spread among them so that the well were not sufficient to provide for the Sick, and a lucky notion spread among them, that they were bewitch'd by the English for the Mallays allways believe the small Pox [come] by Witchcraft, only and on this they sent to me for liberty to retire they did retire but out of a 1000 not quite 300 returned alive to Pullambang.

And another Raja pretending to be the King of Manoncabboo came from the So ward but he not being supported by the Pullambangers as he expected we



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dispersed him and his Followers in a very short time, the Dupatty of Benteering and Sede Brihim were afraid the English woud revenge the loss of Bencolou on them, and they were unwilling we shoud return Dattoo Marlbrô, & his party also opposed us all they could but the Sultan Blenheim being gone to Bantam they could do but little I speak of these severall Enemies who were men of great influence among the people to shew what reason we had to look about us ; with the strictest Caution ; & to Oblidge as many as we coud to come over to the Int<sup>ty</sup>. of the English Compa<sup>y</sup>. which could never have been done if we had refused to give them the same rates for their Goods that all other Govern<sup>rs</sup>. had paid before us.

We immediately made a Publick Beehar to settle the Prices of Provision & all sorts of Goods, they then demanded a Higher rate for most of their materials than formerly & woud be paid all in Money, We did pay them in Money for all Arrears of Pay & for all Materials that they had provided against my arrivall & were obliged to do the same for every thing untill the end of February w<sup>ch</sup>. was 20 Days after my arrivall it being bad Weather, We cou'd not unload our Ships, and also had no Shelter to put Goods under when ashore.

Then we made a Price for our own Goods, and indeed did ask the same Price that Govern<sup>r</sup>. Cook had sold for, but the Pangarans represented that as they were willing to take the ancient Prices for their Goods they hoped I woud not follow M<sup>r</sup>. Cooks Example who had raised all sort of Goods upon them, I left it to them to set a Price and they proposed 90 Doll<sup>rs</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Corge for Long Cloth, ord : White & 80 for blue & as they alledged they had sometimes Bought so I agreed to take it.

Thus with Submission I think I have prov'd that, what was bought and what was sold was all att the lowest usuall rates, & if so the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company could not be imposed on, But the Objection if any must be M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard and M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster did buy cheaper than M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke and therefore M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has given to much, I take the Force of their Objection if any where must lye there, but I take leave to answer that this is a very wrong way of arguing.

For when M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard arrived there was a great Stock of Materials already provided ; So that for a Month or 6 Weeks they had no need to buy anything but Bamboos, & yet att least 100 People were up the Rivers cutting & bringing down more, those People live from Hand to Mouth & when they bring Goods down must sell them, for in every place when a Markett is fill'd, the price will fall, as M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard imagined it did then when he made a new Contract with the People.

It now remains that we must look out for a price that may be called reasonable & proper & therefore by way of Complim<sup>t</sup> only we will for the present admitt M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbards & M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters to be reasonable price of their own makeing, and M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke had no Hand in it ; & those severall Prices are as follows.

Now this indeed does look a little formidable & may to the first Appearance shew as if M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke had paid 50  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. more than the Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Hubbard & Dunster did afterwards gett it for, & thô. att Madrass & all other parts goods of many kinds have sometimes fallen so much ; yett M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke designs to make no manner of Advantage of that Argument & yett hopes to shew that every thing bought by him came out at least as cheap yea rather much Cheaper than those bought by the Supervisor but he will first go through with the prices of all the rest of the Materials.

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Now the latter five Articles are att the very same Rates that Mr. Pyke allways paid & for Bamboes Mr. Pyke paid but 2 D<sup>ns</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  100 for y<sup>m</sup>. and the half Doll<sup>r</sup>. was for bringing them abo<sup>t</sup>. and landing them & the same as to the Rattans the bringing them about & landing them allways came to above  $\frac{1}{2}$  a Doll<sup>r</sup>. so that in these 5 last Articles to say nothing of Mr. Hubbards boards being 20  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. dearer than Mr. Pyke's he humbly conceives that he cant by Mr. Hubbard especially be said to have bought them to dear & if those 5 Articles w<sup>ch</sup>. make up the bulk of the Expences for Materials be not to dearly Charged, then tis no matter how he bought them; whether with his Cloth or with Money, thus every thing in the Acco<sup>ts</sup>. of Materials bought may be very justly reduced to the first 4 heads of 9 Inc. 6 Inc. & 4 Inc. Timbers & of Rafters.

Now as to them th<sup>o</sup> if the Acco<sup>t</sup>. be looked over the aggregate Sum of those 4 Articles will Amount in the whole but 10  $\text{₹}$  1800 but this Mr. Pyke scorns to alleadge by way of excuse because if he hath done wrong but in 10 Doll<sup>rs</sup>. yet that is a wrong which an Honest Man will never Justifie, & therefore does not insist on the smallness of the Sum but does & can Justifie that the Timbers bought by Mr. Hubbard were not any of them measured at the smallest end, nor on the smallest side, but those bo<sup>t</sup>. by Mr. Pyke where all measured at the smallest end, on each side of that end, and to prove that difference a small Proficiency in Geomaty is sufficient. I have myself known & measured some of Mr. Hubbards 9 Inch Timbers & found them but 7 Inches thick on the thinnest side, and  $8\frac{1}{2}$  Inch wide, and this very usual, so that this seemingly small difference amounts to just 35  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. which may be added to his Price and than the rate that timber Cost let it be charged How it will appear to be 130 Doll<sup>rs</sup>. & 100 & then 30  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. added thereto which the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company allowed the Paymaster for his Risque in advancing his Money bring it to 166 Doll<sup>rs</sup>. & 100 and the same as to the 6 and 4 Inch stuff in proportion but this is not all for Mr. Pyke received in none of these sorts of materials that were Crooked or less than 24 or 22 ff<sup>t</sup>. long, and many in Mr. Hubbards time where brought in of ab<sup>t</sup>. 17 or 18 foot Long & many of them were also Crooked too, and to this may be added if the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Orders are of any force, that many Pieces of White Wood where brought in which M. Pyke thinks they were not under any necessity to receive, but did receive them after they had been refused by him, from the Dupatty Raja Bujang & that White Wood has been often strictly forbidden to be used on any Acco<sup>t</sup>. by the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company, in their Letter, and y<sup>t</sup>. very Wood instead of being worth what Mr. Hubbard gave for it, was offered before the Supervisors Arrivall to Mr. Pyke at the rate of two P<sup>ns</sup>. to be accounted, for One; So that he hath not bought such mighty Pennyworths as he Imagined nor hath not done so well for them as Mr. Pyke has done, he may tell a Gilded Tale and put a Fine Gloss over His words & Actions too, but when they come too be look'd into as narrowly as Mr. Pykes have been; no indifferent man will pretend to say they are superfine.

As to Cooley Hire when Mr. Pyke first arrived there where but 40 in the whole who worked at labouring work & we wanted 200, so that we were forced to send for Men att above 60 miles distance both from the N<sup>o</sup>.ward & S<sup>o</sup>.ward too all who could be prevailed on to work where Employed att the usual old rate of one Suca  $\text{₹}$  Day; neither woud any Man at that time work for less, the Bugg<sup>s</sup>. Souldiers had also the same Pay as formerly 5 Doll<sup>rs</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Month the Officers paid all in Money as had allways been the Custom, but Mr. Pyke had in the Month of Oct<sup>r</sup>. last, Opportunity of reducing it from 5 to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  Dollars  $\text{₹}$  Month & he did so as may appear by the Consultations of that time, for whether Mr. Pyke profitted by it or not he allways used all prudent Opportunities to save His H<sup>ble</sup>. Mast<sup>rs</sup>. Expences, & when the Fort was quite enclosed he intended to endeavour a Reduction of the Workmens wages; to w<sup>ch</sup>. was about the tim<sup>e</sup> that Mr. Hubbard arriv'd or 3 Weeks after.

Thus I think I have taken Mr. Dunsters great Bullbaggar to pieces and fully answered his 2 first head Articles of 17700 doll<sup>rs</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. and hope will be satisfactory.

I proceed now to the Acco<sup>t</sup>. of House necessaries 2 p<sup>s</sup>. Long Cloth  $\text{₹}$  Month which are Charged to the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>ny</sup>. at  $4\frac{1}{2}$   $\text{₹}$  P<sup>s</sup>. whereas he alleddged the Compan<sup>ys</sup>. own Cloth shoud have been used and they not Charged such rates that

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Mr. Pyke owns to be both true and reasonable and says he did so, For if Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & Cr<sup>s</sup>. look over the Cash Book in June or July last, it will be found that Mr. Pyke took all the Hono<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. Long Cloth both white and blue at the highest rates he sold for, that is at 90 Doll<sup>s</sup>. for y<sup>e</sup>. White and 80 D<sup>m</sup>. for Corge for the blew Cloth, and if after that Mr. Pyke had occasion to use some on their own Acco<sup>ts</sup>., it ought then to be Charged at the rates he paid them for it, and the reason of Mr. Pykes buying those Goods is as follows, there was then but one small Room for a Ware House crouded with many other Goods so that sometimes we could not come at Cloth to Sell, and least any Officious Spy shou<sup>d</sup> pretend he Had not been so Industrious in putting there Goods off as his own; He bought them all att the Highest rates, they cou<sup>d</sup> be sold ffor, and then whether they had the Compan<sup>s</sup>. mark or His own; he sold them as they came to Hand, so that the Hono<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. in reallity paid no more for this Cloth, than the 1<sup>st</sup> Cost, therefore and Consequently were not Imposed on.

As to the Pay of the Engineer Mr Pyke presumes the Enquiry shoud a' been carried a little further & who deserved it, asked as well as who received it, and then surely no wise man woud have made such an Objection, in all places were Engineer is wanted; that Employment is usually undertaken by one, that was in some Post before on the West Coast in the late Govern<sup>rs</sup>. time, Mr. Ellill who was of Councill there acted as Engineer and had the Salary, as had Mr. Joseph Collet Himself & many others, & when a pie<sup>ce</sup>. of Military Architecture is to be erected the fittest Man to be found is allways fixed on, & he who has the Charge of such an Undertakeing, has an undoubted right to the Sallary belonging to it, be he in what other Employment so ever before, the Labourer who does his Duty is allways worthy of his Hire, when the English Army was under the Lord Peterborough in Spain a Clergyman who was Chaplin to a Man of Warr, was made cheif Engineer, & as a further Encouragement had a Commission for Cap<sup>t</sup>. of a Troop of Horse, he did his duty in those severall Stations, and receivd the Pay belonging to them all, and does every body else that officiates in such Employments.

Now no Man on the West Coast then understood anything of the rules of Fortification besides Mr. Pyke, and Mr. Pyke, now affirms that he does understand the erecting any p<sup>s</sup>. of Military Architecture as well as any other Man now in Madrass, & if that be doubted he is willing to draw any Scheme or Plan that shall be proposed to shew his Ability therein, So that if Mr. Pyke was fitt for the Employ<sup>nt</sup>. of Engineer and did Act in it in a proper manner, then Mr. Pyke deserves the usuall Allowance for it, as well as any other man.

On the 4<sup>th</sup>. of Feby. last many of the Dutch Mallays who came from Bantam, Batavia, & Rambang, having undertaking to prevent the English settling at Bancolou, found we had fully settled the place before they arrived & rather then suffer a total disappointment they began a new Game, they dealt underhand w<sup>th</sup>. one Dyamebella a Fellow that goes by the Enthusiast name of Sultan Blenheim, and he Corrupted many of the Bugg<sup>r</sup>: Souldiers (all but Collonell Crebiassa & his Party) they made a Commotion on the banks of Bancolou River, & sett up a Dutch flag, under which they made many Shott against the Old ffort, We sent down Souldiers to oppose them and there was hot firing for ab<sup>t</sup>. 2 Hours across the River; and Divers men Wounded, Mr. Pyke was to be shut up in the Factory, because he was Govern<sup>r</sup>., but thought it unbecomeing him to remain there, he went down to the river side & so to a point of the Old ffort where he viewed the Scituation of both parties, and then ordered two Faulcon Guns to be plac<sup>d</sup>., so that in 2 Hours time more, we dislodged the Enemy, and gave our own People an Opportunity of passing the River upon them, and by that means when they found themselves attack<sup>t</sup> both in Front and rear, they were so dispirited, that we gave them a total defeat Cap<sup>t</sup>. Natha<sup>l</sup>. Smith who was then Command<sup>r</sup>. of the Goodfellow Play<sup>d</sup> on them with one of the Faulcon Guns the whole time of the Engagement, and did the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company very great Service, severall Men being wounded by His side, of which some dyed, and how he has been rewar[d]ed every body knows, Mr. Pyke mentions this matter of his placing those 2 Guns so much to the publick Advantage in such

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a Juncture, to shew How necessary it is on many immergent Occasions, to have a Man at hand who understands the Duty of an Engineer, and thinks that no Man who practises that Art w<sup>th</sup>. Success, ought to have y<sup>t</sup>. small pay of 24 Doll<sup>s</sup>. Ɔ Month Scrupled, indeed when enjoyed by His Predecessors.

Indeed the Supervisor has saved for the Presid<sup>t</sup>. that small Expence, but it woud have been more profitable abundantly to the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company, if that Charge had not been spared, but the Post filled with some Man of Judgment in things of that Nature for the Foundation of the S. E. Curtain, is now laid in a Turf Wall formerly Erected by M<sup>r</sup>. ffarmer for the defence of the place, and the lower part of that Foundation is full 4 Foot higher than the Foundation of M<sup>r</sup>. Farmers Turf Wall, So that the said Turf Wall must in the S. E<sup>t</sup>. part be allways kept up, or if pull'd down, than that S. E<sup>t</sup>. Curtain will surely fall, I have no mann<sup>r</sup>. of design to reflect on M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard I shall always respect him well Enough, but when under His Governm<sup>t</sup>. he suffers unjust Charges to be made against me, that touches both my reputation and my Estate, I must defend myself, and think that this Charge of M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters is such, & therefore Hope that what I have said to prove the unreasonableness, will meet w<sup>th</sup>. Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>s</sup>. Approbation.

As to his own Pay he hopes what is said in the foregoing will shew he has deserved it, a Comm<sup>d</sup>. of any ffort is allways at least a Cap<sup>t</sup>; and most Commonly a Collonel, and receives Pay accordingly. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has done as all his Predecessors before, and notwithstanding the Disho<sup>r</sup>. & reflection he has undergone by being turned out, he is sure he hath deserved as well as any of them, and much better than some, who have had the good luck to be more Esteemed than Himself.

As to Servants Wages that also is another of M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters heavy Charges he thinks M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke ought to have no Servants allowed him for if no Wages are allow'd, the Consequence will be that no Servants must, Surely a Depu<sup>ty</sup>. Govern<sup>r</sup>. of Bencolou according to M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters regulation, must make a dismall Figure than Sanco Panco ever did, they must have no proffits by trade unless they observe His method in it, let things be Sea[ree] or plenty they must buy at his Rates, they must have no perquisites, if they fill up 2 Employ<sup>ts</sup>. they must only be paid for one, because the Hono<sup>r</sup>. of being Called a Gover<sup>r</sup>. is as he seems to think enough, they must have no Cook nor Butler but other Serv<sup>ts</sup>. he may have such as will be contended without Pay, or reward, with the Hon<sup>r</sup>. of serving a Govern<sup>r</sup>.

Yet one of M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's Black Serv<sup>ts</sup>. was proffered 30 £ Ɔ Year to stay on the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast with them, another thō he is Charg'd Ɔ 10 Ɔ Month in the Hou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. books as usuall, yet M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke paid not that but 30 Ɔ Ann<sup>m</sup> more out of His own Pockett; if M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster be a wise Man his Example must be Conformable to his Precepts, & will shew how well he becomes his Imaginary high Station, and whether Himself Observes the same rules he has prescribed.

Now as to the Article abo<sup>t</sup>. the Perry fright and Demorage the late Gover<sup>r</sup>. of Madrass on representing to him How leaky the Ship Metchlipatam was like to prove, & that she woud be of very little service, unless well repaired, w<sup>ch</sup>. could not at that time be done, he told me that the Perry woud (as expected) arrive in a short time & then Ordered me to Employ her. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke knew not at that time that the Derby was in as bad a Condition as the Metchlipatam, but so it Happened that the Derby intirely damaged all Her Lading, that Could be injured, by Salt Water, some of her Goods were sold for the Madrass Prime Cost on Accout of that damage, but the Mallays after they had bought them, finding them worse than Expected, returnd them, and M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke to prevent Discontents took them again, the Rudder Post of the Metchlipatam was loose and in some danger of breaking away, so that the Voyage was near as hazardous as was expected, for on a resolution taken to resettle the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast, M<sup>r</sup>. Draper was appointed to be Supervisor, a large Europe Ship, & 4 others were to be sent, but when M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke was ordered to go, then only the Metchlipatam and Derby were to be sent, both Vessells not being more then 130 & 90 Tuns and those badly fitted that some of M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's friends advis'd him to quit the Employment, rather than run so great a Haxard and when he arrived on the



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W<sup>t</sup>. Coast at M. Moco in a leaky Ship with a Rudder Post loose at Her Stern, he was Obliged to lye 10 Days in sight of the Factory before he was able to go ashore, tho' no time was lost to gett on shore, for the Boat M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke was in filled w<sup>th</sup>. Water, and the other Boat that went with Him had 2 Men drown'd outright & 2 more so water soak'd that did not recover but both dy'd.

Thus it may appear in what Condition these 2 Ships were yett, they were made to do such Service as they were fit for, they both went and returned severall times with Timber for the works and were neither of them fit for any thing else, but when the Europe Ships arrived there Carpent<sup>r</sup>. repaired the Derby, and we sent her to Batavia as Govern<sup>r</sup>. Hastings had advised, but she mett with a Storm that Shatter'd her so much, that she returned & cou'd not pursue Her Voyage, but lost her Mast and was more leaky than before, what then must M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke have done to gett Stores from Batavia & Teak Wood as Ordered by the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Company, in Case the Perry had not arrived with them, it was Impossible to do otherwise than to send Her, & she did all we then needed, and afterwards made a Voyage to M. Moco for Timber & 2 likewise to Sillebar, but some People have Imagined that M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke was Concerned in the Perry, which is indeed the Ground of their Objection, & so he was, an Exact 3<sup>d</sup>. part but cou'd it be more Just or unjust to Employ that Ship because M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke had a 3<sup>d</sup>. part in Her, or can it be just according to M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters Opinion, because M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke had some Concern in her, to pay no Freight for the time she was Employ'd in the Service, a man that does Justice on that manner; will never stick att any kind of Ill, & notwithstanding His Present Govern<sup>r</sup>Ship, is not fit to be trusted,

Then He proceeds to another Article in the same manner & with His usual Candour asserts a thing that is very false, alledging that the Prime Cost of all the Goods distributed in Presents am<sup>t</sup>. the Great Men of those 4 small Provinces or Kingdoms amounted to p<sup>s</sup>. 2629 when as the Curr<sup>t</sup>. selling Price for ready Money was p<sup>s</sup>. 4046 there was indeed some Gingham Charged at p<sup>s</sup>. 08-2 3/4 p<sup>s</sup>. I mention them as being most Objected against, and therefore assert that for those Ginghams when M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke bought them at the best hand, he gave 4 p<sup>s</sup>. 6 ff<sup>s</sup>. 3/4 p<sup>s</sup>. for them and the man is now living in Madrass who had that price of M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke for them, & M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard the Supervisor he also bought some of the same att that Price to sell again, So that surely M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's real proffitt on those things, cou'd be but small, & this notwithstanding what he has written down in his Charge, M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster knows very well, for he also has bought the same sort att the same rates, to sell there, and he does not use to Sell without Proffitt.

The next Article is also one that M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster calls an overcharge but tis one of His own making if M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke bought Goods at as Cheap a rate as he Cou'd, and charges the Exact price without any manner of advance not so much as one penny proffitt on them, to Himself, but sets down really and truly the price he paid, lett M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster call it by what name he will, no Wise man will call it an overcharge, The Gen<sup>t</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke bought that Pork on his now living in Madrass, and M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke did truly pay that price to a Farthing, that is there sett down, and glad to have it to, for the Provisions sent from Madrass where all perished by the leaky Ship, so that if we hadn't bought those very Provisions We cou'd never have settled Bancolou, for if the Ostend Ship had arrived there before us, they wou'd have been welcome to the Generality of the Natives, who where under some apprehension the English woud resent the loss they suffered by their Expultion in M<sup>r</sup>. Cooks time, so whatever rates M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster sets on things he has a mind to undervalue, M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke woud rather have given double the prices he did give than to have gone without it & if M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard had had such provisions with him when the People went up to Chinagarree the lives of many men woud have been saved by it.

As to the House necessaries every one of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. Serv<sup>ts</sup>: as well Factors & Writers as the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Council have each of them some, we found Bancolou without a House and Consequently Furniture so that there was a necessity to supply every body in some measure, besides a great Quantity the Hospitall took

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up, no man can go into the Compa<sup>s</sup>. Serv<sup>ts</sup>. Houses or Appartm<sup>ts</sup>. without seeing some of it, So that I wonder How he came to put that Article down, unless he did in my Favour, to make the whole look alike, & appear altogether unreasonable, If I was sure that was his design I woud return him thanks for it, As to the Plate which it seems M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard dont remember he saw ; M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has is receipt for it now in His Pockett, & is ready to produce it iff desired.

Thus M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has gone through each of M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters Articles & made his reasonable Objections to the unjust Charge, and hath not deviated from the truth in any particular, but hath stated each matter of Fact as it really happened, and hath used great Sincerty therein, M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke hath been greatly Slandered, & many things Charged on him by Imputation only,

As to some of these troubles he hath mett with he did expect them, he was told frequently before he went from Madrass y<sup>t</sup>. A Supervisor shoud be quickly sent, which caused him allways to upon his Guard, knowing that it was intended to make some Objections ag<sup>st</sup>. his proceedings let them be right or wrong, because he came out by an Order from Home & was not a Gover<sup>r</sup>. of the Presid<sup>t</sup>. of Madrass's, making I do not speak of this as a New Sort of Discovery Yo<sup>r</sup>. Honou<sup>r</sup>. and some of the Councill at least must Know that was their Intention, and they were not Shy in this sort of talk, but I allways expected fairer Play, I did not Imagie that a Supervisor or New Govern<sup>r</sup>. was to be a man that shoud only distinguish himself by finding faults, that is by giving things wrong names, as calling good or Indifferent Actions bad by suffering vexations, & trifling Complaints to be made, surely now all M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's faults must appear att once ; for some were so very industrious, that for Fear M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke shoud still retain the Character of an Honest Man, that they offered p<sup>r</sup>. 1000 at one time to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Williams to swear something ag<sup>st</sup>. him, so that one need not Wonder at M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters Industry, he was then Accomp<sup>t</sup>. and has Given M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke a Cast of his Office with a Vengeance, I doubt not but he has employed all his Skill, he hath set down a few articles on half a Sheet of Paper, that he hopes will answer his end, and destroy M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's Reputation & Estate together, but let Him carry it on never so smilingly it will never run even, the Cloven foot will appear at bottom to every unprejudiced man, that looks His Charge attentively over, & I hope when it comes to be considered seriously by Yo<sup>r</sup>. Honou<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. that all the Weight of this mighty Charge ag<sup>st</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke was designed rather to be rolled ag<sup>st</sup>. His Door, to keep him from returning back ; that so M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster might be secure in his New Governm<sup>t</sup>.

M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke thinks he is unhappy that he ever accepted of it for thô M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster's Charge amou[n]ts to p<sup>r</sup>. 27000 for Extraordinary Gain yett he never gott so much as that Sum Amo<sup>ts</sup>. too put the whole proffitt of the Goods sold by him & every thing else together.

And M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke Hopes that these present misfortunes of his will be for hence forward as a Sea mark, to prevent any Gent<sup>s</sup>. coming from London in that Employ<sup>t</sup>. of a W<sup>t</sup>. Coast Govern<sup>t</sup>. which has proved so Scandalous and destructive to others, as well as Himself ; for it appears plainly that an Honest man is most liable to the Scandalous Invectives of the dishonest and if he is not sure of Friends att Madrass the malicious reports against him may happen to meet with Credit, and then His best Services may be so represented as to Occasion him yett farther troubles, this was M<sup>r</sup>. Farmers Case, when Guillamot was frighted from Bantall the place of His Residence in the Kingdom of [Anackssonogey] & on that His Abdication pronounced and a new King Chose, w<sup>ch</sup>. Involved the whole Country in Warrs, and which was the true & real Cause of the decay of the Pepper trade, and all the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. losses afterwards, then M<sup>r</sup>. Farmer arrived and found the Country in the utmost Confusion, but He maintain'd his post honestly and was turned out to make way for Mr. Cook, Mr. Cook lost all and left the Fort on Fire, he att his return to Madrass was made Paymaster a Post reputed to be of the best proffitt Then M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke was sent and he retrieveed all the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Affairs and new settled the Country he defended it when Attack't and preserved it from falling into



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the hands of the Dutch & Osteendors, & then M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke is removed & turned out to make way for M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster, and M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster by way of Recompence to M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has framed a Charge to deprive Him as far as in Him lyes, of His Character and his whole Estate, So uncertain is every service where there are many Masters, but M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters charge ag<sup>st</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke will prove vain, as their Contrivers for M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke hath behaved Himself Worthly in all His Actions, He hath done no mean nor Scandalous thing, he hath ever kept the Honour. of His Country in view, He hath done nothing in Himself that He disallowed in another, He hath allways Consulted the Honour<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>a</sup>. Interest, not equall only to His own but beyond it, He Govern'd to the Satisfaction of the People, and was beloved by them, he found all the W<sup>t</sup>: Coast in Warr, and with a handfull of Men thro' Gods blessing, he settled them all in Peace, he did Honourable by every Man and never gave a Good man cause to Complain.

And yet thō M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke settled the Country he did not Enjoy any sort of benefitt by it, He built a House but never lived in it, He planted many Vineyards but never tasted any of the Fruit most of the things he did the benefitt was enjoyed by his Successors, & himself lookd on without regard & with less respect than a meer Stranger, so uncertain I must still say are most humane Affairs, but Especially those which relate to Bancolou & y<sup>e</sup>. W<sup>t</sup>. Coast so that M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has really found at last Experimented in Himself, that it is but lost labour to rise up Early & so late take rest & Eat the bread of Carefullness, Yet he still trusts to receive Comfortable Satisfaction for the Days he has been Plagued, & for those times wherein he hath Suffered so much Adversity, the Manner whereof he leaves to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. Wisdom & Goodness

MAY IT PLEASE YO<sup>r</sup>. HON<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>.

To give me leave to represent to You as a farther Justification of my real Integrity, the great Necessity I have been under to Sell such Cloth as was there Disposed on, these Papers, have already I think pretty plainly shewn Yo<sup>r</sup>. Honour. such reason as may prove what I did was Just & fair that no one was Imposed on that every thing was purchased at the lowest usual & Consequently proper Rates, the Goods sold at a price of price of their own making less than they had bo<sup>v</sup> for in 3 Years, before that all the Mallays were well Contented, that the Com<sup>p</sup>a were not Charged 30 ₣ C<sup>t</sup>. nor yet one Farthing ₣ C<sup>t</sup>. on the prices paid instead whereof I have had att the Supervisors Arrivall Advanced ₣ 1500 to the Pangarans & great Men for bringing in materials, but on the comeing in of a new Gov<sup>r</sup>. he received those materialls I had bespoken & let them Have more Goods, So that my p<sup>a</sup>. 1500 was as great an advantage to Him as it was a Loss to me, & the Goods I have really sold to the Honour<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>a</sup> have really stood me in that p<sup>a</sup>. 1500, more than I have ever charged for them & thus instead of gaining or overcharging anything as M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster in His good Natur'd manner is pleas'd to call it I have really lost 4 ₣ C<sup>t</sup>. of what the whole of the materials Cost me, because I am likely never to gett one Farthing of that p<sup>a</sup>. 1500, unless Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. on Consideration of my Losses, and great Hardships will please to allow it, & I hope Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. wont look on such a request as this to be trifling or unjust because if the present Paymaster be allowed 30 ₣ C<sup>t</sup>. to Compensate any accidentall Loss, he may happen to sustain by advancing His money among the Mallays, it seems to me to be full as reasonable to ask for p<sup>a</sup>. 1500 that I have really lost on that Account, but this Article I shall leave to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. Wisdom

I pray Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. to be also reminded of the small Stock I carried with me to resettle Bancolou there was no more than £ 3000 in the Ship Metchlipat<sup>m</sup>. & abo<sup>v</sup>. £ 500 of that was due to the Moco Moco Factory & this was the whole we had to depend on & knew not when we should be relieved, our Circumstances were not so good as those of the forlorn Hope of an Army who are allways Supported, but We when by a most wonderfull providence had regained Bancolou in the same manner it was lost that is without Fighting for it, We where in great Danger of wanting money to buy Provisions, much less could Wee Have any to buy materialls, w<sup>t</sup>. yett because

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no money was to be seen ab<sup>t</sup>. Bancelou on Coll. Crebiassa's delivering up the Fort, We paid him and all his Souldiers 3 months Pay in ready money, We paid the Pangarans, Duppatty and Dattues what they had due for materials provided ag<sup>t</sup>. our arrivall and for fitting up the Old Fort and Hospitall & all Workmens wages they agreed to take the rest in Goods for what shou'd be brought in afterwards, but so it happened that it blew hard from the N.W<sup>t</sup>. that we could bring no Goods on shore, insomuch that till the end of February we were Oblidged to pay in Money, for all the materials as they came in, & att this time they had so great a want of blue and White Long Cloth, that every one att the new settled rates received it with the same Satisfaction as ready Money, for the Natives were generally naked & the Cheif Men were Dutch Clouts.

Thus we Continued untill the Goodfellow arrived for till then we proposed no more than to maintain our Post & keep possession of the Country, untill we could be relieved, our only danger till then was want of Victualls or money to buy it, when the Perrys Provisions were Expended, for till we could provide the Souldiers With good Lodgings Wee found them in Rice & Buffaloo or Salted Pork one good meal every day w<sup>ch</sup>. so contributed to preserve their health that in near 4 months after our arrivall, no more than one man Dyed and that was a Serjeant who came over in the Goodfellow who gott a Flux by hard Drinking When we had more men arrived by the Addison & Dartmouth, then as our Lodgings were pretty well Advanced & as our Provisions that came by the Perry were pretty nigh expended & our men Sickned in great Numbers we could then only allow Provisions in the Hospitall & the Men found themselves as usuall in other places, the large number at that time of our Garrison run us out of a abundance of money, So that notwithstanding our supply from England our Military expence was so great, that We could not pretend to Pay money for materials indeed the Mallays did not desire it but had they desired it Wee could not possibly have done it, for money must be kept in Hand to bring the Year abo<sup>t</sup>. untill the next Shipping shoud arrive for Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. knows we could then expect no Money from Madrass and our military expence of Pay alone amounted then to p<sup>s</sup>. 2700  $\text{₹}$  Month the Wages of the People in the Metchlipatam & Derby paid also in money p<sup>s</sup>. 350  $\text{₹}$  Month, Charges of Stores &c<sup>m</sup>. bought for them out of other Ships usually p<sup>s</sup>. 100  $\text{₹}$  Month, the Charges of the Northern Settlement 2000 Dol<sup>s</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Month the expence of Diet Money & Salary to the Gen<sup>l</sup>. in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. Service p<sup>s</sup>. 900  $\text{₹}$  Month, besides Foreigne Stores which are always bo<sup>t</sup>. with ready money, so that when it pleased God to Lessen our Numbers by mortality 6000 Doll<sup>s</sup>.  $\text{₹}$  Month was the least I could bring it to in ready Money, and Yett pay most of the Cooleys & buy in materials with Cloth, so that had it been never so reasonable to have paid for the whole in Money it was Impossible to be done I am desirous the Affirmation may be Examined, by the nicest Criticisme, because I am not making Excuses but asserting true matter of Fact, so true that there is no Quirk nor no Concealed Signification, no private meaning nor Evasion Intended we had not Money sufficient to pay in Money then I paid away all the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. Cloth, by taking it myself at the rates sold for as is before Express<sup>t</sup>, and after I had sold all the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. I desire to Conceal nothing, I sold my own att the same prices so that many of these things were really bou<sup>t</sup>. with the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>s</sup>. Cloth and not all with my own as M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster has Suggested.

And as the Necessity for what I have done is so apparent & so reasonable as well as just I think any Orders that may have been formerly made to the contrary tho in themselves perhaps proper enough att the time they were made, yet the Reason for things may be so altered by Necessity w<sup>ch</sup>. hath no Law and cant always be obliged to Order [That] I think and hope Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. etc<sup>m</sup>. will think so too, that an Order when Impossible to be Observed is like an Oath unreasonable to be Imposed each of them in their Cases either Improper or unjust.

I doubt I have tired Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. etc<sup>m</sup>. with this long answer but where my Hon<sup>r</sup>. & very little Estate are both Attempted to be Dugg up by the Roots I ought to vindicate my own Integrity & therefore shall never have any regard to M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters pretended Object<sup>n</sup>., till I find the Judges in Westmin<sup>r</sup>. Hall are of the same Opinion w<sup>th</sup>. Him which I thank God is not like to be in our Days.

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If I have passed over any thing too Slightly & have not so fully Answered any of these Articles as Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. might have Expected I am very ready & willing to make any further Answer & to Explain any thing that may happen to be doubtfully Expressed.

Wherefore upon the whole I pray Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. etc<sup>m</sup>. that I may be paid p<sup>o</sup>. 2300 the ballance of my Acco<sup>t</sup>. & recompensed with some Creditable Employment here suitable to the Circumstances I have allways lived, or permitted to return to my Native Country by one of these Ships now in the Road.

And I likewise Pray Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. that Coppys of my Consultations & Acco<sup>t</sup>s. of which there are severall ready written out may go Home by these Ships that a Comparison may be made att Home who has put the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Compa<sup>y</sup>. to most Charge because I am sure my Expences are less abundantly in the main then either my Predicessors or Successors.

I Ask leave to Conclude Having made my answers as well as I could I hope Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. will please to Excuse my unguarded Expressions if any such there be that may be liable to an undutifull Construction, assuring Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. that for Yo<sup>r</sup>. own Person I have the uttmost Esteem & respect & as for the Gent<sup>l</sup>. of Council I hope I have no reason to think amiss of any of them nor to be wanting to them in any reasonable respect.

And therefore I beg Yo<sup>r</sup>. favourable Opinion of this whole representation being allways desirous to remain.

We now lay before you some remarks we have made upon the Paper delivered you by M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke the 14<sup>th</sup>. Sept<sup>r</sup>. wherein He endeavours to prove he is unjustly Charged w<sup>th</sup>. the severall articles in the Acc<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. delivered Him by Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>RA</sup>. the said Acc<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. was drawn up by M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster the present Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. of the W. Coast yet as it was formed by the Direction of Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. so agreeable with the Orders of the Honou<sup>ble</sup>. Court of Directors We cannot but think you'l be of Opinion He has expressed his Sentiments of it in a very rude & Indecent manner & How free soever he makes with M<sup>r</sup>. Dunsters name, He means nothing less than to appease Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. that You are the Persons that Endeavour to ruin His Estate & Reputation, but without giving Yo<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. or ever the Compa<sup>y</sup>. leave to Judge of the Charge refers Himself to Westminster Hall in a very peremptory manner tells you he shall never have any regard it till the Judges there allow it to be Just, immediately after this He prays Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>m</sup>. that He may recompensed with some Creditable Employ<sup>m</sup>t. here but we doubt not it will quickly appear to you, How unwhorthy He is of one, for notwithstanding we have mett with many difficulties in our Enquiry, for the want of severall books that Have either be sent to England or not remitted from the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast Yet we are enabled to lay some matters before you for Yo<sup>r</sup>. present Consideration, from which Wee doubt not it will fully appear, M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke is Justly Charged with the severall Articles in the said Acco<sup>t</sup>s. Curr<sup>t</sup>. & further that Mr. Pyke has acted in an unwarrantable manner, by disposing of the Compa<sup>y</sup>. Property contrary to their Orders as well as the Orders Receiv<sup>d</sup> from hence, & thereby laid His Successors under a Necessity to Continue an Expence to the great Detriment of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company, & that He the said M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke having Contrived the said Expence for His own benefit, has therefore most Greivously abus<sup>d</sup> the trust reposed in Him, & we cannot

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but be of Opinion he has been very Favourable dealt with in that Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>o</sup>r. &c<sup>ra</sup>. hath Charged Him w<sup>th</sup>. no more then Twenty Seven Thousand four Hundred twenty two Doll<sup>rs</sup>. 2. 77.

The two first Articles in the Acco<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. amount to Seventeen Thousand Seven Hundred & Thirty Doll<sup>rs</sup>. 2. 72. and is said to be for an Overcharge in His Acco<sup>t</sup>. by paying Cloth instead of Money at Marlbr<sup>o</sup> & Moco Moco, by this method M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke put in his Cloth at one Hind<sup>d</sup>. P. C<sup>t</sup>. and to prove by so much the Company are Sufferers we shall only instance the Payment of the Cooleys by M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke who where paid by him half in Cloth & half in Money there Hire was 100 Cash  $\text{₹}$  diem

And so much the Company are Charged with, whereas now the Cooleys are paid all Money they receive & the Company are Charged no more than 75 Cash  $\text{₹}$  diem much more do the Company Suffer by the method of paying Cloth for the materials for Building M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke owns His prices for Timbers & Rafters to be as follows:—

The prejudice to the Company in these Articles being so very apparent by this Statement, M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke to make appear that those materials bo<sup>t</sup>. by his Successor stood the Compa<sup>r</sup>. in more than those bought by Himself, is drove to the necessity of Asserting a falsity, as he certainly does when He tells you that upon the prices last mentioned the Paymast<sup>r</sup>. is allow<sup>d</sup> to add 30  $\text{₹}$  C<sup>t</sup>. for the risque in advancing his Money, to disprove this We need only refer you to the Consultations of the 2<sup>d</sup>. March, wherein you may please to observe, that the Allowance to the Paymast<sup>r</sup>. for the risque in trusting the Mallays is included in the prices abovementioned, M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke being so apparently in the wrong in this Article, gives us some reason to suspect Him, when at the same time he tells you the materials bought by his Successor were less in size and not so good as they are Charg<sup>d</sup> in the Acco<sup>t</sup>. as none of us have been at the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast, we must refer Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>o</sup>r. &c<sup>ra</sup>. to M<sup>r</sup>. Hubbard and M<sup>r</sup>. Burton who seem principally concerned to clear themselves & can only add here, that a very good order is made in the same Consultation of the 2<sup>d</sup>. March, that no materials shall be taken in till they have been Surveyd by the whole Council.

We need not repeat to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>o</sup>r. &c<sup>ra</sup>. in how many Letters the Company have forbid the Payment of Cloth to the Workmen or for materials, they well knew How mischevius it was to their Estate & therefore with a great deal of reason so often press<sup>t</sup> the observance of their Orders in their Letter of the 13<sup>th</sup>. March 1718  $\text{₹}$  the Craggs they are pleased to declare the penelty of such Offence, w<sup>ch</sup>. we take the liberty to recite in there own words, because this Letter M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke bro<sup>t</sup>. with him on the Craggs, & was at the pains to take a Copy thereof.

That no Undertaker nor any of our Servants, be permitted on any pretence to pay for Timbers, Materials or Workmanship on our Acco<sup>t</sup>. w<sup>th</sup>. Cloth, or any thing else besides p<sup>s</sup>. of eight, for we are assured that th<sup>o</sup> the Undertakers were paid in



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our hard money, yet the natives were paid by them in Cloth at Excessive prices notwithstanding our frequent Complaints of this abuse & our peremptory Orders to forbid it, so that this Fraud by which in event we are the only Sufferers is still Continued under the Covert of the Undertaker.

That if any one be found Guilty of the breach of this our Ord<sup>r</sup>. he be expelled our Service be he whom He will & that Encouragem<sup>t</sup>. be given to discover the Offenders of which give publick notice to both natives & Europeans.

But M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke tells Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ia</sup>. that the necessity for w<sup>t</sup>. he did was appa- rent & reasonable as well as just & infers upon the whole that the Order was Improper & unjust.

This is the wretched Shift he is drove to, but we shall make it appear that this Necessity, is only pretended & that he was fully supplied w<sup>th</sup>. Money from hence and from England, to Have Complied in every respect with the Orders he received which were possitive to reside at Moco Moco till the Compa<sup>s</sup>. shoud give Directions to resettle Marlbrô where in the mean time M<sup>r</sup>. Joseph Walsh was to reside as Chief these Orders are dated the 31<sup>st</sup>. August 1720 & were delivered M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke here by Presid<sup>t</sup>. Hastings & the Council the first Letter M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke receiv'd from the Hono<sup>ble</sup>. Court of Directors is dated the 14 Sept<sup>r</sup>. and was brought by the Goodfellow that arrived at the W<sup>l</sup>. Coast y<sup>e</sup>. 11 April, wherein the Company are pleased to say they will have Moco Moco lookd upon as the head Settlement which agrees with the Ord<sup>r</sup>. he received from hence & the reason they are pleased to give is to prevent any pretences for enlarging the buildings att Marlbrô but the mischeif was done before, for M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke finding He shou'd not be able to put of his Goods at Moco Moco where he had Money enough to defray the Expences of that Settlement till he might reasonable expect fresh supplys, He determined to break thro' his Orders and resolved to resettle Marlbrô, an undertakeing that he cou'd not but foresee woud involve his Masters in a prodigious expence, and at a time when he was but Ill provided for it, but he foresaw the necessity it woud bring him under to Pay Cloth instead of Money, it was a necessity he wanted to be in, & this is the necessity he talks of, we were greatly surprized when we found him urge this in his behalfe as a just reason, since it Has not appeared to us there was any immediate advantage that might accrue to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company to Compensate the great Charge they were to be at, & we not tell you How little How very little Pepper the whole Coast has produced the Company even to this time thus have we shewn how he came to be in Necessity to pay Cloth instead of money & leave it to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Honour. & c<sup>ia</sup>. to determine whether it ought to be allowed as a just Plea.

The next Article in M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's Acco<sup>t</sup>. amounts to Doll<sup>rs</sup>. Two thousand Eight Hundred Seventy five <sup>Su Ca</sup> 3. 65 & is for extraordinary Allowances to Himself more than Allowed by the Company. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke is pleased to be very merry in his Answer to this part of the Charge & spends a great deal of time in labouring to heighten and extolls his own Actions, but we have not mett with any thing Yett to perswade us that he is so good so Excellent a man has he has painted Himself that He has so many Virtues so much Sincerity and so true a Zeal for the Companys Service as he pretends, he tells Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>r</sup>. the Enquiry shoud have been Carried a little farther and who deserved those Allowances ask't as well as who receiv'd them, He tells you he deserved them, but till Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ia</sup>. can be brought to believe so we are perswaded You will not Consent to abate any thing of the said Charge of Dollars 2875—3—65.

The next Article is Two Thousand three Hundred Dol<sup>r</sup>. recharg'd in His Acco<sup>t</sup>. being the Half of 4600 he had Charged for y<sup>e</sup>. Perry Brigantines Freight & Demorage, We observe by M<sup>r</sup>. Pykes answer to this part of the Charge, he is very much puzzled to find some reasonable pretence for entertaining that Vessel in the Service but at last he bethinks himself to represent the Metehlepa<sup>ra</sup>. and Young Derby, in a very Crazy Condition & then asserts that the Derby being repaired by the Europe Carpenters he sent Her to Batavia but she met with a Storm in which she lost her mast and return'd more leaky than before, what then say's he cou'd M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke do

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otherwise than send the Perry Brigantine surely Mr. Pyke thought Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. would take every thing He said for Granted without Enquiring further as to truth or Certainly he would never so boldly assert what might so easily be proved a fallacy for by his own Consultations it very plainly appears under his own Hand that he sent the Perry Brigantine to Batavia the 15 May 1721 and that the Young Derby was not Ordered thither till the 20 June following the Perry Brigantine returned the 10 July, and the Young Derby the 11 of Sept<sup>r</sup>. following it would have lookt much better if he had stuck Close to his reasons cited in the Consultations of the 18 April when it was agreed to send the Perry to Batavia, where he tells you the Goodfellow was not unloaded. The Metchlipatam was at Sillebar taking in Pepper and the Young Derby att Moco Moco to bring away Timbers & Slaves How just these reasons were we cannot positively say, we shall only remark that thō the Goodfellow was not unloaded the 18 April she might have been the 15 May, & it no where appears upon the Consultations that the Metchlipatam brought any Pepper from Sillebar or the Young Derby Timbers and Slaves from M. Moco, We think proper to Add as a further Remark that in the said Consultation of the 18 April He says not a word of the Metchlipatam & Young Derby being in so bad a Condition, as he now thinks fitt to tell you they were, so that upon the whole we are rather inclined to be of Opinion the reasons He has given for entertaining the Perry in the Compa<sup>t</sup>. Service are not real, but pretended, & that the allowing him half of what he had Charged is more than he can Justly Demand.

The next charge in Mr. Pyke's Acco<sup>t</sup>. is Doll<sup>r</sup>. Fourteen Hundred Sixteen & 20 Cash believed to be overcharged on the Goods given away as presents, and here we think proper to tell Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. that the Company in there Letters to the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast by the Queen dated the 14 March 1717 take notice of very Extravagant Charges of Goods for Presents as Taffities, Cossaes & c<sup>ms</sup>. and particularly Taffities that are Charged att 9 Doll<sup>r</sup>. the Piece which is full 20 rup<sup>s</sup>. Value, w<sup>ch</sup>. they were assured seldom Coast so much as 7 Rup<sup>s</sup>. in Bengall & the other Goods were overcharged in the same Proportion to prevent the like for the future, they positively ordered that no such Articles should be allowed in the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast Accounts, that the Fort and bay should be wrote to Yearly for w<sup>t</sup>. was wanted, & that the presents made should only be out of those Goods & those only if it should so happen they had none of those, they were never to buy any of a private Hand, but defer the Gift till supply'd a fresh.

Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. will therefore please to Observe, w<sup>th</sup>. how much Justice Mr. Pyke is debted for the Difference in his Reply dated the 14 Sept<sup>r</sup>. the only Answers to the Overcharge of the Ginghams, but if you please to look back to the reply, he made att the W<sup>t</sup>. Coast, he says that to charge Taffities at 10 Doll<sup>r</sup>. p<sup>r</sup> piece was a mistake & ought to have been 12, Had it been a Charge that had proceeded only from Mr. Dunster or from this board we should not have been so much Surprized but that he should dare to give such an answer to the Company is very amazing & we shall leave it to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. to give a name to such behaviour.

Mr. Pyke is next charg'd with Doll<sup>r</sup>. 1795 for House necessaries Plate & c<sup>ms</sup>. purposely to Oblidge Mr. Pyke to deliver a particular Acco<sup>t</sup>. where the same was, we believe neither Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. nor the Hono<sup>ble</sup>. Company will think it any satisfactory answer to say every one of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Compan<sup>y</sup>. Servants Has some of the House Furniture, certainly it was Incumbent on Mr. Pyke to keep an Exact Acco<sup>t</sup>. of what He delivered to them in answer to the Plate, he tells you He had Mr. Hubbards receipt for it, by which no doubt he would have you understand the receipt was for the whole, but upon his producing the Receipt We find it Signed only by

 Mr. Burton & for no more than 22. 7. 5. besides 12 Knives 12 Forks & 13 Spoons this is all he has yett produced to clear Himself of 1795 Doll<sup>r</sup>. w<sup>th</sup>. we shall leave to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hono<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. to Determine whether the said be near that value.

The next & last Article in the Acco<sup>t</sup>. is 1305 Doll<sup>r</sup>. for an overcharge on Salt Pork, in answer to which Mr. Pyke tells you The Gentleman he bought that Pork of is now living in Madrass & that he did truly pay that price to a farthing we cannot



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but think it very plain He woud have it Understood, he paid the whole Sum he has charged, w<sup>ch</sup>. is 1680 Doll<sup>r</sup>. for 28 Casks, We hope Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. will put M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke upon the Proof of what He has so positively asserts for th<sup>o</sup> he might pay 60 Doll<sup>r</sup>. for one Cask, as we heard indeed he did Pay an Extravag<sup>t</sup>. price for one Cask before he left Madrass, Yet to assert the Price of that One Cask to be the price of the whole 28 is an Equivocation we leave Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. to pass such Censure on it as it deserves.

We have now finished what we have to say in answer to so much of M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke's paper, as related to the Acco<sup>t</sup>. you were pleased to deliver him, Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>ms</sup>. doubtless remember he Has taken the Liberty to touch upon some other matters no ways relating to what he was Charg'd with, and to Censure them as He thought fitt & th<sup>o</sup> we could prove Him to be much mistaken in many perticulars Yett we shall nothing thereto here, as we believe you design'd we should reply to so much only of His Paper as we have already done, reserving the rest to Yo<sup>r</sup>. Selves, So that Wee have only to add that we are.

March last where the dimensions of every timber is particularly express'd those dimensions were the same as far as I could remember as Timbers of such sizes were reckon'd at formerly, thô its true they will not then be so large as Mr. Pyke's if his 9 Inch timbers were as he says full 9 inches every way at the thinnest end w<sup>ch</sup>. assertion of his as I did not measure them I won't go about to disprove, but if any of the Materials were bro<sup>t</sup>. in short of the dimensions set down in the aforesaid Consultation or were of white or bad wood y<sup>e</sup>. fault will not lye upon me but upon those that survey'd them and took them in and I doubt not but Mr. Burton who as Paym<sup>r</sup>. was principally concern'd is able to give your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. satisfaction in this point, Thus much I can declare for myself that I agreed with the Malays for safras wood only and don't know of bad wood of any sort was Bro<sup>t</sup>. in, and had no manner of Interest or Concern in the materials, As to the insinuation that Mr. Pyke makes at the end of that Paragraph that however I may tell a guiled Tale and put a fine Gloss over my words and Actions yet when they come to be look't into as narrowly as Mr. Pyke's have been no indifferent Man will pretend to say they are superfine. I answer that I know Mr. Pyke has pry'd much more narrowly into my actions than I have done into his, that I did nothing in the dark and am willing and desirous that he should bring to light all that he conceives or imagines I have done contrary to the Comp<sup>as</sup>. orders or Inst<sup>t</sup>. that I may have an opportunity to vindicate my self before your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. w<sup>ch</sup>. I cant do to your satisfaction I will willingly take shame upon myself and ingenously own my faults.

The next place Mr. Pyke accuses me in is where he is answering that part of his charge about his taking pay as Engineer to show the reasonableness of w<sup>ch</sup>. & the great damage the Comp<sup>a</sup>. suffer'd for want of one after he was turn'd out, he asserts the foundation of the S. E. Curtain is now laid within a turf Wall formerly erected by Mr. Farmer and that the lower part of that foundation is full 4 foot higher than the foundation of Mr. Farmer's turf Wall so y<sup>t</sup>. the s<sup>d</sup>. turf Wall must in that S E Part be always kept up or if pull'd down then that S E Curtain will surely fall, In answer to this I need only refer you to the gen<sup>l</sup>. Lett<sup>r</sup>. from the W. Coast to the Drake where we say the foundation of the S E Curtain was then digging & I hope there is some difference between its being digging only & being laid, so far it was indeed from being laid that there was hardly anything else done to it than clearing away the rubbish & loose earth, the foundation of all other parts of the Fort were dug 5 foot deep but here because of the little trench without Y<sup>e</sup>. Turf Wall it was agreed with y<sup>e</sup>. Chinamen that it should be dug above 6 foot deep in the solid earth after the Rubbish was clear'd away, the turf Wall is then on the inside about four foot above the ground and on the outside to the bottom of the trench ab<sup>t</sup>. 6 so that when y<sup>e</sup>. foundation of the S E Curtain wholly dug it will be above 6 foot below the foundation of the inside of the Fort Wall w<sup>ch</sup>. surely must be reckon'd from the ground whereon it stands and 4 foot lower than the trench on the outside so that I think there will be no manner of danger of its falling especially in such stiff ground as that is. There would have been no room for this objection had not Mr. Pyke carry'd the back part of the house he was building so near the turf Wall w<sup>ch</sup>. necessitated us either to dig the foundation where it is now digging or to pull down part of the House & bring y<sup>e</sup>. foundation farther in where it was first design'd, and we th<sup>o</sup>. it less Charge to the Comp<sup>a</sup>. to make y<sup>e</sup>. foundation a foot or two deeper y<sup>n</sup>. the rest rather than pull down any of the buildings, I will only add that I did nothing of this nature on my own

head but had y<sup>e</sup>. advice of the cheif Workmen & others that I tho<sup>t</sup>. were any ways Judges and that tho I dont pretend to be so skilfull an Engineer as M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has represented himself to be, yet I do pretend to have built or designd nothing on the West Coast but what when done will be strong and lasting and I appeal to any that has lately or may shortly come from thence for the truth of what I say.

In another place M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke tells your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>e</sup>. that he was told before he went from hence that a Supravisor should be sent and accordingly he did expect one but did not imagine a Supravisor or new Gov<sup>r</sup>. was to be a Man that should only distinguish himself by finding faults and by suffering vexatious and trifling Complaints to be made ag<sup>st</sup>. him to the first I answer I have ad<sup>d</sup> nothing to the Charge you sent from hence but only fixed the Sums w<sup>ch</sup>. could not be done here so that I have found no fault w<sup>ch</sup>. your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>e</sup>. had not found before and as to the 2<sup>d</sup>. it was a duty incumbent upon me to hear all Complaints y<sup>t</sup>. were bro<sup>t</sup>. to me but I think M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has no reason to imagine I invited people to complain or y<sup>t</sup>. in the decision of any Complaints I acted partially ag<sup>st</sup>. him, he may remember I dismist some upon the credit of his word only and I am sure he cant say I straind any to his disadvantage so that I am persuaded if he will give himself the trouble to reflect he will in his own Conscience acquit me of having promoted or sought after Complaint ag<sup>st</sup>. him. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke then proceeds to say some were so very industrious that for fear M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke sh<sup>d</sup>. still retain the Character of an honest Man they offer'd 1000 Dollars at one time to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Willems to swear something ag<sup>st</sup>. him this is plain suborning Wittnesses and if M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke could prove it w<sup>d</sup>. be indeed a very heavy Crime; by what he had just said before of my finding & making faults &c<sup>e</sup>. and by what he say's immediately after that one need not wonder at M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster's industry he was then Accompl<sup>t</sup>. & had given M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke a Cast of his office w<sup>ch</sup>. a Vengeance any one would really conclude it must be either M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster or I that had made this offer, but if sh<sup>d</sup>. appear that neither nor I knew any thing of the matter till we had been inform'd of it by M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke and indeed that no much offer can be properly said to have been made at all What can M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke say for his endeavours to blacken other Peoples reputation that professes no nice a tenderness for his own. The Story is this M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke inform'd me at the West Coast that Cap<sup>t</sup>. Willems he told him, M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford & M<sup>r</sup>. Bletz the Gunner had been encouraging Cap<sup>t</sup>. Willems to swear ag<sup>st</sup>. him and told him if he did he would get 1000 Dollors and then desir'd me to give M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford a Check for so doing, I spoke both to M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford & M<sup>r</sup>. Bletz about it & they declard Cap<sup>t</sup>. Willems was in C<sup>o</sup>. complaining of M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke & said he got 1000 Dollars of his money upon w<sup>ch</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Wilford told him if He could make that out & complain'd in Consultation he did not doubt but he would recover it, I heard no more of this matter nor concern'd myself further about it, but I leave it to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>e</sup>. whether M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke has not aggravated it very much in his representation of it & especially by bringing it into that Paragraph where he is talking of none but M<sup>r</sup>. Dunster and me both of whom he knew had nothing to do in it.

M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke in some parts of his Lett<sup>r</sup>. insinuates that I p<sup>d</sup>. away Goods as well as he on w<sup>ch</sup>. I take the opportunity to declare y<sup>t</sup>. in all the disbursements I made on the Company's Acco<sup>t</sup>. I p<sup>d</sup>. nothing away but money, all the Contracts I made were made for money only and no agreement ever for taking any of my goods nor did I ever deliver out 1 p<sup>o</sup>. of Goods in payment for any thing bought for the Company & if M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke thinks otherwise I am willing to stand the proof of it. M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke in another Place complains of his usage, that he was lookt upon without regard & much less Respect than a meer stranger, I little tho<sup>t</sup>. to have heard a Comp<sup>t</sup>. of this nature because I am sure I gave no occasion for it, to slow that we treated him with some Respect I need only mention y<sup>t</sup>. we made his allowance of diet money and every thing else equal to mine except the extraordinary allowance for the Cap<sup>t</sup>. & others of the Shipping besides w<sup>ch</sup>. he may remember I told him y<sup>t</sup>. he was always welcome to my table so that I cant see how I was wanting to him in Respect, and I must needs declare for myself that should it ever fall to my Lot to be question'd on any Acco<sup>t</sup>. whatsoever I never desire any better measure to be dealt to me y<sup>n</sup>. I have dealt to M<sup>r</sup>. Pyke & sh<sup>d</sup>. really esteem it very gentle usage civil treatment &

And whereas your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. have objected against [your] Petitioner's going home because you are not assured he hath [given] Security to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Company for his faithfulness to them wh[en in] their Service, therefore to give your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. the utmost sat[isfaction] he is able altho there is sufficient security given to the said Company on his behalf in London yet he is very willing in your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. insist thereon to give his own personal Sec[urity] here not only to answer to them for all damage they have rec<sup>d</sup>. from him but also to pay all their just & lawfull due Demands in London.
