To M<sup>r</sup>: JOHN NICKS  
CHIEFE & C<sup>a</sup>: COUNCILL.

Wee are well satisfied to hear of your success with your wilfull unreasonable Merchants as to the prices of the Silver [Corral] & Aurora 27 y<sup>o</sup> half peece but the Corral is not yett agreed upon they desiering our forbearance in that for some time when shall expect noe more from your Merchants then they pay which they cannot in reason dispute considering the many advantages & conveniences they have beyound ours, as we formerly wrott you; therefore lett these matters occasion noe difference or delay in their business but on the Contrary hasten the performance of their Contract both in quallety & tyme having two shippes allready in our Road & but small Supplyes of goods from the bay which must press your greater dilligence as also att Portonova hearing they are very backward there we would have the Chiefe visit them when occasion will p<sup>r</sup>mitt to forward them therein but it must be with as little charge as possible & his stay as short he must also endeavor to Compose differences there with the Government & rather Compose it by a reasonable present (the want whereof makes them troublesome) then lett our business be obstructed at a tyme when we are in great want of goods & to encourage those & the Conomeer Merchants you may assure them of a more favourable Contract after their due Compliance with this M<sup>r</sup>: Bett writes the President of [many errors?] in the Cudduloor & Portonova books which lett be [strictly enquired] into & Corrected sending us the state thereof that [we] may adjust our Acc<sup>ts</sup>: with them by the Pearl friggatt we shall suddainly send you some Bengall packing stuff & ffactors provisions for both places which is all presents from

The arrivall of Mons<sup>r</sup>: Bruant & c<sup>a</sup>: will fully acquaint yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: of the affair you wrott me about & of their usage here; The shipp our admirall att Bengall sent hither he writes me that shée belonged to the King of Syam which is known to many here as also by y<sup>e</sup> confession of severall of her ffrench Seamen: but if your Hon<sup>r</sup>: can evidence the Contrary & prove her to belong to the French

Royall Comp<sup>a</sup>: she shall readily be surrenderd with all that belongs to her; Therefore desier yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: will send some discreet person to argue the case in our Court [of] Admiralty where it shall be tryed with great care & Justice, I being very desierous to preserve & improve amity & a good & friendly Correspondance betwixt us hoping likewise you will endeavor it on your part and not upon any pretence or covert whatever protect or srowd [*sic*] our Enemyes or their Shippis from Justice His Majestie the King of Great Brittain having out his Comissions against them for the unsufferable wrongs & abuses we have Rec<sup>d</sup>: from them. I have & shall make the best search I can for those three frenchmen of Mons<sup>r</sup>: Bruants escaped from our shippis but as yett can hear no news of them so soon as I doe shall advise it & secure them for your service, tho the greatest care, and watchfullness of our Europe Commanders cannot prevent their seamens running from them as by too many unhappy examples however the greatest diligence shall be used for the recovery of yo<sup>r</sup>s: which is whatt presents from

The Pearl being out of repair we have sent her to Porto Nova to fitt which you must assist & hasten her in all you can possibly that shee may bring those & Conomeer goods for the Rochester wherein use your utmost endeavors & rather [than] disapoynt us, You may oblige the Governm<sup>t</sup>: by a small Present not to impend yo<sup>r</sup>: business. This Shipp also gives us oportunity to Supply you with Packing stuff & provisions which you must Crd<sup>t</sup>: us for as a Present we shall Crd<sup>t</sup>: you for what you expend upon the Pearle which send as a perticular acco<sup>t</sup>: of & be very frugall therein One of the pipes of Canary you are to send to Portonova or so much as may be Comfortably proportionable to their Comp<sup>a</sup>: which is all Presents from

To M<sup>r</sup>: JOHN STABLES CHEIFE & C<sup>a</sup>:  
COUNCILL ATT VIZIAGAPATAM.

We are with yours of the 11 & 15 October 22 Decem[ber] and 2 of January, you had sooner hard from us had there be[en] anything materiall to have advised or orderd you we were also in great hopes of the much wanted Supply of your Investment to furnish a lading for Europe but yours by the Williamson has unhappely disapoynted our expectations but we hope tis not occasioned from any fault or remisness but an unavoydable necessity of a poor & troubleed Country & Merch<sup>ts</sup>: and will be safe tho tedious; but we must blame you much if you had any goods in readiness that you did not [take] the oportunity of sending them by the francis tho a free shipp; yett the season groing late & irretrivable

& noe hopes of any more shippes from the bay which you might have Learnt by the Williamson or Francis & the Cheif cannot but remember that 'tis the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Lyeence & order to lade their goods upon & employ Country vessels, when there is none of their own to serve such necessary occasions & not to lett their goods lye dead & in danger whilst their shippes returne empty home, and since you seem to excuse yourselves upon the want of a perticular order from us for itt; We doe by vertue of y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: P<sup>r</sup>mission to us in thatt case P<sup>r</sup>mitt you to send your goods hither upon such vessells as you shall thinke safe & Convenient when there is none of the Companies, and the season can nott wait longer in expectation of one. Butt this can be of little service now since we doubt tis to late in the Monsoon; soe that we design to send a vessell to you suddainly with a Considerable stock in mony & goods as we formerly advised therefore P<sup>r</sup>pare yo<sup>r</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: for it. You surely might have ventured to have sent the packing stuff we writt you so pressingly about being in great want of them but you mention nothing of it nor the Ebony & sticklack which we are equally desierous of & pray lett be yo<sup>r</sup>: utmost endeavors to procure by next oportunity they being bulkey Com<sup>o</sup>: that will help towards the filling our great tonnage Striped betelaes & ordinary neckcloths would be acceptable to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: since best & Cheapest from yo<sup>r</sup>: parts. We are in great want of boats as also of materials to make them so that we must rather expect a Supply from you then [you] from us & tis nott possible any misfortune or alteration can make those things scarce with you since 'twas a place lately eminent for plenty & cheapness Shipp building & most necessaryes for itt being att half the rate as in other parts; therefore we doubt not but your next endeavors will be more successfull & to supply us too with mango boards to make mussolaes which we are in great want of they having also disapoynted us from the Bay.

You misaprehend M<sup>r</sup>: Dubois, his Complaint was for want of convenient accomodation & not against you which now you all agreeing in, & that yo<sup>r</sup>: house lodgings are much out of repair & too streight for your Conveniency or the Comp<sup>a</sup>: business we permitt yo<sup>r</sup>: building what may be absolutely necessary, but that you exceed not 500 Pag<sup>s</sup>: therein and manage that with discrestion & frugallity: wherein as to the design of your building take M<sup>r</sup>: Halls advice together about it & consider well the Conveniences of your ground; by a draft he sent the President thereof. Our frinds in the bay were too narrow in their advise about the Williamsons stay & dispatch att your Port, the season was yearly enough to have spared her the more time to have brought us more bales which we doubt we shall be greatly wanting of for the Rochester Loading whose dispatch we haste & hope will be the end of this month. You shall have due Crd<sup>s</sup>: for the amount of yo<sup>r</sup>: Invoyce & the Cost of your flux Phisick which we would have you provide yearly for the hospitall.

We rejoyce att the good news of peace & plenty in your parts that have been lately pressed with the Contraries. We thanck God he has [blest] us with some alteration too. Tho grain is still dear yett its plenty has Ceased the miseries of a famin & since it is so very cheap in yo<sup>r</sup>: parts we would have you keep a store by you, as also of Packing stuff (which is very scarce & dear with us) to lye ready for any ship that shall fall into your Port & be sure to fill all that comes there being noe proffitt in emptyness.

We are nott att all fond of renting Viziagapatam town except you can take it so as it may be advantageous to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: att least no charge; hitherto they have lost greatly by itt without any benefit to their affairs that we could ever yett apprehend; therefore be very Considerate what you resolve & doe therein but if you can doe itt without loss we approve itt for y<sup>e</sup>: reputation & Conveniency as likewise that it may be a means to oblige the Seer Lascar & Continue his freindshipp. You give us a farr different acco<sup>t</sup>: from M<sup>r</sup>: Browns of the vallue & Currantness of Rup<sup>s</sup>: he made them much better then Pag<sup>s</sup>: but you worse, the Bengall shippis may possibly bring us some when we shall furnish you for the experiment & if more advantageous then Pag<sup>s</sup>: for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: trade shall Supply you accordingly.

We have Rec<sup>d</sup>: your severall books & acco<sup>s</sup>: which after Pusal shall give you our opinions of them & yo<sup>r</sup> management & frugality. And you must manage yo<sup>r</sup>: troubles with the little Governors with as great prudence & as little charge as possible but you know the occasion & ends is for their proffitt, however give them noe just occasion of Complaint & lett nott differences run too farr.

We are well satisfied in yo<sup>r</sup>: good Correspondance with the Seer Lascar & assurance of his favour & encouragem<sup>t</sup>: approving those passes you have given those boats but we shall send you ours by next oportunity & you may assure him his business shall rather finde respect & assistance then any opposition or prejudice from us as also those belonging to him & his Governm<sup>t</sup>: provided they be equally civill to you & your affairs there. We shall call James Wheeler to acco<sup>t</sup>: for the freight of his goods from Bengall on the Loretta which he was unreasonably impertinent to deny you was it not a sufficient kindness for him & his famely to live upon the Comp<sup>a</sup>: bread att your ffactory (which you had no reason to allow) but that he must employ their shipping gratis too which can't approve.

We shall Crd<sup>t</sup>: you for the pag<sup>a</sup>: 33 : 21 paid the Lorettaes Lascars & bring M<sup>r</sup>: Brown to an acco<sup>t</sup>: for the stores aud Cordage made use of by him & his own Shipping.

FORT S<sup>t</sup>: GEORGE THE 20<sup>th</sup> JANUARY 1683<sup>o</sup>.

Honorable

I received & perused yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: letter of the 1<sup>o</sup> Ins<sup>t</sup>: which being a poynt of Law I recommended it to S<sup>r</sup>: John Biggs Judge of our Court of Admiralty; whose studdy & business it is more then mine; who now gives yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: his answer & opinion which I hope will fully satisfy you in that case if not I have advised him to defer his proceedings in Court about that Shipp till he Receives yo<sup>r</sup>: farther answer or that some person is authorized from yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: to dispute the matter here as for the Protest you mention to be given by Mons<sup>r</sup>: De Laudrees in Bengall they have given me notice of itt however that imports not much since the truth of the case is as well known to you as him.

ffor yo<sup>r</sup>: resentment of o<sup>r</sup>: admirall examining your Shippes I cannot but think all the world would Judge it just & reasonable to enquier into the title of such shippes as are known to have lately been the Enemyes as also that 'tis

necessary for such shippes to carry the testimonials of their alienation with them, especially when they are commanded & man'd by that nation of whome many have protected & seemed o<sup>r</sup>: Enemies & taken their Comission & fought their battles against us, & is not this reason enough to suspect & enquier into such doubtfull Shippes; since no Law does authorize such actions & protections from nations (as ours) in amity otherwise what imports our warr against enemies so secured, & which way can we hope for Justice from them for their insufferable wrongs & injuries; make the case but your own & undoubtedly your Hon<sup>r</sup>: will Judge the more favourable of us. I strictly forbade our Cheif at Conomeer not to entertain any of your Soldiers & that if any were so to dismiss them to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: but they write me there is no such person in service there but if the Duas they are out of my power. Yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: may remember I wrott you last year about too soldiers that fledd from Conomeer & were protected at Pullicherry whose passage & charge from England Cost the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: 30 pagodaes each: but the men were never yett return'd nor any satisfaction for them.

I assure yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: I have & shall make strickt enquier after those 3 french soldiers that were aboard o<sup>r</sup>: shipp Williamson, but cannot yett find them when I doe they shall most Certainly be return'd yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: as obliged being

I acknowledg the Civillity of your letters and Congratulate yo<sup>r</sup>: safety att Pollicherry where I wish you happy. I have strictfully used my best indeavors for the recovery of those three Soldiers that left you here but as yett can here no news of them when I doe you may be assured of their returne. I have also forbade of Cheife att Conomeer to entertain any of yo<sup>r</sup>: soldiers who writes me there is noue in their service but passible they may be in the Duas as many of ours and out of my reach but be assur'd I shall protect none of them from you being

TO THE WOR<sup>sh</sup>: BENJAMIN BLOOM ESQ<sup>r</sup>:

GOVERNOR & C<sup>o</sup>: COUNCILL AT BENCOOLEN.

The occation of the long delay of these advices aud Supplyes was from a late storme that forced the Bencoolen so farr to Leeward that she could not recover the Road till 2 days past & the Dorrothy was also hinderd by her own repairs; by each we have sent you twenty Soldiers with treasure, stores, Supplyes, liquor, Cattle presents as <sup>th</sup> particulars of lists & Invoice which Crd<sup>r</sup>: us for & all other necessaryes we can thinck may be acceptable & Couvenient for you & providable here: We have also double maned the Bencoolen; to furnish you with hands for the Priaman or any other vessell with you that shall want them whereof M<sup>r</sup>: John Kiddall comes master who we have entertain'd att 10 pag<sup>a</sup>: a month till his taking possession of such shipp as you shall order him upon and then to Receive the usall pay of Pag<sup>a</sup>: 12 <sup>th</sup> month both him the people & the vesell to be att yo<sup>r</sup>: dispose as occasion shall requier. By reason y<sup>e</sup>: Dorrothy is a more safe & secure shipp in many respects we have therefore sent you the greatest part of your treasure by her & but one chest for yo<sup>r</sup>: presant occasion by this hoping the other will soon follow her from Atchein. We have only now with us Shippes Rochester & Williamson the first we are dispatching for England & the other for Persia the Defence Resolution Princess &c<sup>a</sup>: continuing still in Bengall at difference with the Governm<sup>t</sup>: but we expect them soou here when must dispatch them to you there being noe possibillity of lading them hence goods being not procurable in the Country by reason of the distruction of the late famin & the Ruine of the Continued warr so that the little trade our merchants were prest to engage in

proves to their great loss & trouble; you must therefore use all Contrivances & endeavours possible to procure sufficient pepper for their ladings, wherein we hope you will be successfull through yo<sup>r</sup>: own Interest & industry and the mighty influence & power of Jenapatwan who can never better signalize himself to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: nor oblige them more then in this exegency; the hopes of his kindness herein has made us greaten our present to him beyond o<sup>r</sup>: intentions which we doubt not will have its design'd effect by your ingenious management of it.

By the following Shipp we shall send you bricks chinam & more timbers but you have all procurable att present which with what you have from Europe we hope will make a good accommodation.

Your Shipp being now repaired and fitted & we having laden aboard her what we intend for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Acco<sup>t</sup>: or what we can procure upon freight these are to order your imedeate repair aboard Shipp sayling so soon as possibly for the Port of Atchein where you are hansomly to dd the Presidents letter & present to the Queen & to endeavor to excuse and Compose the late differences there occasioned by the french Siamers faults & provocations we also recoñend to yo<sup>r</sup>: care & dispose the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: provisions &c<sup>a</sup>: aboard you as also to receive the freight of the goods you Carry bringing the proceed thereof with you in Gold but you manage this as yo<sup>r</sup>: own it being to inconsiderable a Concern to were the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: name, & whilest you are there you are by vertue of yo<sup>r</sup>: Comission to seiz all mores or Siam Shipp that have not the Generalls or English pass bringing such prizes with you hither to be tryed and adjudged by o<sup>r</sup>: Court of Admiralty according to order and Law; and the Concluding yo<sup>r</sup>: business at Atchein which must be with all expedition possibly; you are to proceed to Bencoolen on the West Coast of Sumatra, where you goe consigned to the Worp<sup>l</sup>: Benjamin Bloom Governor &c<sup>a</sup> Council for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: whose orders you are to follow in the dispose of yo<sup>r</sup>: Shipp upon any affairs or voyage they shall Judg necessary for their occasions & the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: interest in the settling that important & much desierd place and trade wherein pray give them yo<sup>r</sup>: best assistance yo<sup>r</sup>: former voyages having given you experience in those parts but we hope according to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: advice their occasions will not detain you on the Coast longer then two months & then dispatch you hither full loaden with pepper and good news of their success & prosperity in those parts which we have great hopes of from the powerfull frindshipp & assistance of the great Manacobbo Jenapatwan to whome be very obliging & respectfull. For the 20 soldiers sent aboard you, you are to receive six pence a head  $\Psi$  diem till you arrive att Bencoolen where you are to deliver them & their necessaryes with what else consigned them to the Govern<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: so wishing you a good & healthy voyage we date these at fort S<sup>t</sup>: George in the City of Madrass this 27 day of January 1688.

May it please yo<sup>r</sup>: Excellency  
 R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>:

TO HIS EXCELLENCY JEHAN BAUDER  
CAWN NABOB OF BENGALL.

I was honoured with yo<sup>r</sup>: Excellency's letter of the [lacuna] which came to my receipt but the [sic] yo<sup>r</sup>: servant falling sick by the way who had sooner return'd but that I waited for this Conveighance of shipping to give him the quicker & better transport.

As to what yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell writes about M<sup>r</sup>: Charnock & our peoples actions in yo<sup>r</sup>: parts, I am sorry to here that there has been that occasion given by the former Navob & his Sub Governors whose unreasonable injuries, & exactions, yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: cannot be a stranger to, and how long we patiently sufferd under them in hopes of Justice & satisfaction Complaining also to the king to but o<sup>r</sup>: addresses were either intercepted or suppress by o<sup>r</sup>: Enemyes so that we could have no redress there nither which sufferings & misfortunes groing intollorable they were forced to leave their ffactories & habitations with many goods & debts behind them to their infinite loss & disapoyntment, intending quietly to have left the Countrey, till the Mogull should be sensible of our great wrongs & doe us right therein, & recall us to o<sup>r</sup>: settlements & trade which have been of long & great advantage to the king & Countrey; we bringing yearly more treasure then the Dutch & all other nations together, but our peaceable departure was also obstructed & many of our people plunderd abused & killd without any offence or provocation given to any soe cruell & unjust was those Governors against us but our shippes having past many troubles in coming down the River they were necessitated to come to an Anchor at a very unhealthfull small Island caled Hudgely & there to secure themselves against the Rage & violence of their persecutors till the Monsoons would permitt them to come hither but they could not rest there nither their cruell mallice still prosecuted them by force of armes which they were forced to defend themselves against which y<sup>e</sup> Almighty so protected & favoured them in that their Enemyes voluntary desired a treaty & cessation of Armes which tho our people had the advantage of & might have destroyed many of them yett for peace & quietness sake they Consented & agreed to be friends & deliver up the place to them & the Shippes they had taken upon Articles of agreement rattefyed by y<sup>e</sup>: Gen<sup>l</sup>: of their Armye & other of the Kings servants & Confirmd & sign'd also by our people who on their parts imediately & faithfully perform'd it but the Nabob against all Laws of Hon<sup>r</sup>: faith or armes notwithstanding his promises & obligations delays & at last refusd the performance of the Articles after our people had discharged theirs, & by their too easy faith & Compliance brought themselves again under his power & tyranny notwithstanding which they still waited patiently a whole year in boats & upon the River side with great loss inconveniency hardshipp to their persons famelyes & Concernes being still deluded by their fair promises to hope & expect a just Compliance with their Articles but finding all to be but pretences & deceptions they at last resolved again to leave the Countrey & for that purpose paid every person their due & so embarked upon their Shippes & parted in great peace & friendship with all without the least Complaint or injury from any & Coming with their Shippes to the road of Ballasore they intended the same there sending for their people & goods off but Contrary to their expectations they were denyed & detained by the Govern<sup>r</sup>: And their many after friendly messages & desiers still rejected which made them resonably resolve to fetch them of in which they also obstructed them all they could fiering severall great Guns wounding & killing many of our people leaving the place at last to them & when they came to Ballasore found our ffactory & goods in flames to our very great loss & prejudice and our people carried Captives up in the Countrey refusing to returne or deliver them whereupon our Comanders went back to their shippes without any injury to the people or place tho they might have done what they pleased either to destroy the people or Consume their towns & shippes there being none to resist or oppose them but did noe other injure then the burning one of our own shippes in the River & so parted. This notwithstanding what senister reports yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: has had, is the whole state & truth of the matter which yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: being a person of great

Judgment & equity I leave you to Judg where the fault & wrong lyes and to act accordingly but I know well from your vertuous faime that you preffer the Gen<sup>l</sup>: good of the King and Countrey before any private interest or advantage which I am sorry to say yo<sup>r</sup>: predecessor too much studded to the great prejudice & almost ruine of a good Countrey but now your Excellency has an oportunity to eternalize yo<sup>r</sup>: memory & honour bye Resettling the English which I shall also indeavour to Comply with provided you will assure me of rightning our many injuries confirming our farmer priviledges granted us by Sultan Suja & long quietlye enjoyed under this present King his Nabobs and Governors till of late years unjustly altered by Shasta Cawn & his avaritious ministers to the Countrey & our unhappy trouble, and if yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: will also allow us a strong secure place to protect our people & the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>a</sup>: Estates, and trade from the Rage & rapine of ill minded people we shall returne & carry on our trade as formerly, to the employing the poore & enriching the Countrey desiering nothing more then peace & Justice which God grant may flourish in yo<sup>r</sup>: time & your Excellencye to live long & happely.

We have waited thus long in hopes to have sent you certain advices of the designe & actions of our forces in Bengal but to this time we have only their doubtfull resolutions & noe other news of their proceedings then what the enclosed Generall letter will enforme you to which we referr your Excell: & C<sup>a</sup>: for that & all other occurranceys in & state of our affairs in those parts to this time which after you have perused please to forward to o<sup>r</sup>: right Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters by the safest & soonest oportunity that presents.

We also send your Excell: & C<sup>a</sup>: Copy of our last by sloop Princess which accompanied the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Companyes Pacquets & many P<sup>t</sup>icular letters which we hope arrived you safely takeing the best Cource for it we could propose to meet with.

The Rochester was dispatcht the 21 Ins<sup>t</sup>: & saild the next night (with her tonnage or very near it in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & permissive goods) which we hope will returne her home in season & a welcome shipp to their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: and owners. The Dutch having been very kind & assisting in her repair & fitting att Zealone. We are dispatching the Williamson in few dayes to the West Coast with stock stores & necessaryes where we doubt not she will find a loadinge of pepper to send her thence yearly home 'twould be a great service to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: if you could spare them some assistance from yo<sup>r</sup>: parts as ffactors soldiers & black labouring handicrafts since we cannot provide sufficient here the loss of the many we formerly sent discouraginge others to adventure thither, but the place is now more healthy by the Convenient buildings they have made there, which if neglected or deserted or that the pepper trade fails us shall be att an irrecoverable loss that being the Cheif dependance for the loadinge most of our Shippis now in Bengall little being to be expected from these parts the war or famine has destroyd or removed most of the weavors in the Countrey so that cloth is soe scarce that we cannot expect to procure more then to lade one shipp haveing had great trouble in procuring what we have done for the Rochester. If the Generall comes not

himself (as we hope he will) pray send us your advice & direction about the dispose of Europe Shipping being the Resolution Princess and Defence & Persia Merch<sup>t</sup> expected from the west Coast with 7 or 8 Country Shipp<sup>s</sup> & little or noe employment for them, except for grain which will not half beare their charges groweing plentifull & cheap in all parts. Pray advise if you can provide for any more then you have already upon your hands, & how much tonnage we may send you if we cannot well lade or employ them here, since the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: writes us we must expect their mindes & orders from you, which when we Receive shall be duly observed to o<sup>r</sup>: power. The last we Rec<sup>d</sup>: from his Excellency & c<sup>a</sup>: were of the [*lacuna*] which is so long since that we cannot but doubt his letters are miscarried or Intercepted since advices are of such great importance to the present state of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: affairs from M<sup>r</sup>: Harris & c<sup>a</sup>: att Surratt we Rec<sup>d</sup>: severall short letters the last of which was of y<sup>e</sup> [*lacuna*] advising his Excellenceys arrivall att Swally to treat with y<sup>e</sup> Navob about a Gen<sup>l</sup>: peace & Phirmaund which we earnestly hope & pray may be succesfully effected since our whole relyance is thereon.

We have severall Complaints from M<sup>r</sup>: Styleman and M<sup>r</sup>: Alvarees & ffactors of the free & permissive China shipping of the great unkindness & discouragement of one M<sup>r</sup>: Salway accidentale Supra cargo of shipp Cæsar both att Malacca & Amoy that he was very Rigorous with them notwithstanding their severall Comissions for warfair Instructions for trade & order for their department & to assist the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: servant whereever they mett them two of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: ffactors were also on board with Considerable adventures of theirs Consign'd to them as p<sup>r</sup> their Instruct<sup>s</sup>: & Invoyses, but it seems all would not doe, they must be prisoners, & prohibited trade, & be led Captive with them, or give bonds for we know not what which to save their voyages was consented to, nor was he less impudent to forbid the deliverye of the Presidents Letter to the Gen<sup>l</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: of Amoy, which might be concluded were dictated with as great sence & Considerations of the good of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company, & with as great experience as his wisdom could have framed, but it seemes they Complied with that too which we are extreemly sorry for being letters of great import satisfying their many doubts, & demandes about an adventure of Tea; Burton Carryed for some of the China Officers also their many Scruples about M<sup>r</sup>: Barron, and his unfortunate voyage & miscarriage on the China Junck, & a greater Subject then both was, the excusing that wicked inhumane action of the English Pyrats takeing & destroying their Junck near Malacca the Cheif of which Comp<sup>a</sup>: came thence hither demanding satisfaction for their losses who were treated with great Civility & charge returning them upon these Shipp<sup>s</sup> well satisfied that, were noe occasion of their misfortune detesting & punishing such horred actions, three sad examples thereof they were spectators of & these things were urged to him to be the Contents of the letter, notwithstanding they must be silenced & his own unexperienced products preferd wherein we thinck he did much amiss in accepting a list of their losses which M<sup>r</sup>: Barron upon y<sup>e</sup> Junck giving them encouragement in his Letter, to hope a satisfaction which most Certainly they will expect & may sometime fall heavey upon the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: or perticular traders thither which we doubt so ill a Government & people will improve to their advantage then his takeing the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Company mony from M<sup>r</sup>: Wilcox, to pay some unreasonable Chinee demands on Cap<sup>t</sup>: Burton for Thea sold here by him for some Chinee Acco<sup>t</sup>: the real product whereof was paid but they being not contented with the produce preses for more which M<sup>r</sup>: Salway thought fitt to grant out of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Cash which will be difficult to recover by Justice from Cap<sup>t</sup>: Burton with the advance thereon from China which shall be legally indeavoured but if not procureable we leave it to yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: & c<sup>a</sup>: to consider whether M<sup>r</sup>: Salway ought to endemnifye their hon<sup>rs</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Wilcox telling us twas his sole advice & act there are many other Complaints which we omitt, but could not these from the importunity of our friends believing such actions Contrary to the orders & desiers, therefore we doubt not you will prevent them for the future otherways it may prove a great discouragement to our trade, which their hon<sup>rs</sup>: pressingly desiers, and Comands us to promote all we can which has been our indeavors it redounding to their great advantage by improving

the Revenues & Customes of y<sup>e</sup>: Cittye and strengthing & enriching it, with men mony shipping the want whereof will soon Reduce it to a chargable inconsiderable place which we know you wish & designe better to.

The last shipp from China & Malacca arriving here yesterday can tell us noe news of our Tonqueen shipping which make us doubt their safety or that the troubles of those parts detain them there, which with our respects is what offers from

I am extreamly satisfied with the Kind assurance of yo<sup>r</sup>: friendship & Correspondance which I am very ambitious of from the great Charracter of yo<sup>r</sup>: wisdom & goodness & shall studdy always to preserve & promote it; & therefore upon

yo<sup>r</sup>: desier & advice I have sent you our last years rent mony Pag<sup>s</sup>: 1200 notwithstanding that by our Phirmaund we are to pay only to the King but I belive your friendship & justice is to great to lett us suffer any ways for the not observing that poynt of our Phirmaund desiering that you will pleas to send me a Rec<sup>t</sup>: & full discharge for the same, that may satisfye all others that may demand it hereafter. I also begg your acceptance of a small token of my freindly respects which I hope may be acceptable, till something better offers that may be more worthy yo<sup>r</sup>: esteem soe requesting yo<sup>r</sup>: Continuance of yo<sup>r</sup>: freindshipp & kind & frequent Correspondence I wish you all happiness.

Since our severall letters to you by the Dorrothy & Success frigats, is arrived from you y<sup>e</sup>: Madrass frigatt with yo<sup>r</sup>: of the 10 16 20 & 24 of Dec<sup>r</sup>: last wherein we were greatly surpris'd & disapoynted to find a return without a loading of pepper or anything elce to compensate her great charge, besides such defects are agravated by y<sup>e</sup> want our Tonnage has of them, & at home also, but we beleive M<sup>r</sup>: Blooms care is to great to lett anything but an absolute necessetye occation it which we hope your better Supplyes will prevent for the future.

We are extreamely satisfi'd at yo<sup>r</sup>: loadeing & dispatching of the Royall James but very sorry that Cap<sup>t</sup>: Cooks kind stay should prove the fatal occ[a]tion of his end, but hope the Almighty will protect the rest of her Crew safely to England where she will undoubtedly be welcome to her R<sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters; we shall duly Crd<sup>r</sup>: you for her Cargo as also the Success frigots who at last is arrived with her short Cargo of pepper but very oportunely for the Rochesters lately dispatched home.</sup>

The servisableness of y<sup>e</sup> Mussolas sent you formely encouraged us to send you more but since the Mallayos will not be perswaded to use them nor we able to furnish you with Muckwaes you had best returne the boats we haveing great occasion for them here.

As we have to our power Supplied you with all things by former shipp & this so we shall Continue for the future as much as possible & wherein we are defective the sad Consideration that we now live in a Calamituos Country & times burthened with necessetye & troubles but we hope we have not been wanting & that our late Comefortable Supplyes have given you vigorous encouragem<sup>nt</sup>: for the discharge of your duties & promoteing the Interest of the Nation & Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: by the settlement & encreasing y<sup>e</sup> pepper trade which the Dutch will omitt noe treachery to disapoynt you in, but our formers haveing spoke largely on this Subject we shall here say noe more of it referring you to those directions for the improveing & securing your trade.

We have also largely wrott & presented Jonapatwan that we hope will engage his frindshipp, & power for our Interest for our best rich presant intented by the Bencoolen friggatt was by mistake unhappely loaden aboard the Dorrothy which we doubt will occation some delay in the obligation but you have a duplicate of our Letters & c<sup>o</sup>: whereby you may assure & satisfye him of the particulars therein mentioned using all means & argum<sup>ts</sup>: that may engage & oblige him since we beleive our fortunes in those parts next to devine providence cheifly depend upon him.

We are sorry for the ill acco<sup>t</sup>: you give us of M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons managem<sup>nt</sup>: of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: affairs at Indrapore we have long endeavourd to procure fitting persons to change him & [eas] M<sup>r</sup>: Bloom according to his often & importunate desiers but we must desier his patience and M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbon's amendment that he would [be] more Just and active for the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: in preserving their Concern & settling their Acco<sup>ts</sup>: and doe hope the Resolution w<sup>ch</sup>: will soon follow this shipp will Supplye you with suitable persons for the Carrying on your business till when make the best shift you can with those who were formerly & are now sent you.

We also see you have strictly acquainted the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: therewith whome we hope will redress & Supply you sooner.

Upon Examination of the James's Invoyce we finde as you doe an error about the Chest of Silver B which should Contain noe more then what you found D<sup>r</sup>: 3000 which mistake shall be rectefyed here & soe you may accordingly charge it.

Yo<sup>r</sup>: accidental Supplyes of the Loyall Merch<sup>t</sup>: & little James of pepper we doubt will be some disapoyntment to our Tonnage from hence & doe wish you had loaden that pepper on the Madrass frigott which you reserved for y<sup>e</sup> Loyall Merch<sup>ts</sup>: returne from China since we here she was lately att Malacca & Atchein and intends not for your Port, but directly for England, but being according to

orders sent you we cannot blame [your] obedience but will Crd<sup>t</sup>: you to the Amo<sup>t</sup>: of the little James's Cargoe as also for the Loyall Merchants when we receive her Invoyce which was omitted to be sent us in your packett You should also send us Coppeys of all Invoyses you receive from England that we may charge you therewith & bring our books, and acco<sup>ts</sup>: to agreement.

We are glad to here of Cap<sup>t</sup>: Barbers safe arrivall upon the Mary but not of his going to Batavia since it proves a disapoyntment to his Owners, & their other Shipp James lately arrived here from Atchein in expectation to have mett the Mary to have accompanied her for China w<sup>ch</sup>: now they are very doubtfull off.

You doe not well so to load us with your damaged remaines of Europe goods haveing more here at present then we can possibly dispose of so that for the future you had better dispose of them at the best rates you can y<sup>m</sup>: to fill up your [returned] shipp with damage instead of Pepper. We shall according to your desier Suddainly Supply you with 2 or 3 sloops well fitted & maned for your service there which we would have you keep in employm<sup>t</sup>: as well for the mens healths as to Compensate their charges.

We have perused yo<sup>r</sup>: protest, and the severall accusations, & Complaints with your Commentations thereon against Cap<sup>t</sup>: Spencer which we believe you had too much reason for & therefore have dismiss him from the charge of the shipp & the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: service, & shall bring him to a farther Acco<sup>t</sup>: for his misdemeanours & doe the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: what right we can therein tho we desier you for y<sup>e</sup> future that you would not putt such troubles upon us you haveing sufficient power for itt even to the Comanders & officers of Europe shipp where they are proved to be guilty of such offences as may deserve a dismission which they doe Consent & oblige themselves, to submitt to, by Charterpartye & till you use yo<sup>r</sup>: Authority in such matters, you cannot expect yo<sup>r</sup>: Govern<sup>t</sup>: to be so respected and obeyed as it ought to be.

We are glad to here of those severall revolted Princess that are return'd to their fidellity whome you would doe well to encourage & employ but still to be carefull of trusting y<sup>m</sup> to far least they relaps into their former Error or be employed by the Dutch to carry on their treacherous designes against us, by the next shipp according to your advice we shall send them the things that you mention for y<sup>m</sup> which we hope may engage them faithfully to our Interest, the President has also wrote y<sup>m</sup> & s<sup>d</sup> Rayas a letter of thancks for the kind assistance of their people to y<sup>e</sup> Madraes frigott in her voyage hither who have been entertain'd very Kindely by us gratefying them with Tashereifs & the lone of Pag<sup>s</sup>: 100 for which we send you a bill to receive it of them 100  $\Psi$  in pepper soon after their arrivall, we have also given them Pag<sup>s</sup>: 50 for provisions for their voyage that they may please themselves therein, & we doubt not their entertainm<sup>t</sup>: here will encourage them or others to serve the Comp<sup>a</sup>: on the same occations but we would have you avoyd employing them except there be an absolute necessity since they are less servisable & more chargeable then Lascars or European Seamen.

The next letter of the 16 December advises us of the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: arrivall with you from England whose fresh Supplies which we are sorry to here so ill an Acco<sup>t</sup>: of but we hope yo<sup>r</sup>: care & Industry with the Almighytes blessing will make the place much more healthy for the future which good accomodations & provisions will much conduce to which pray lett noe ways be wanting to your power y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: putting no limitts upon such necessary charges wherein you have also our best advice & assistance but artificers & labourers will not be perswaded to go hence upon any reasonable termes being discouraged by y<sup>e</sup> loss of those formerly sent there therefore you must employ the natives till we can supply you from other parts which shall be our Continuall endeavors & that yo<sup>r</sup>: fortification may be the sooner & more easely rais'd we thinck twill be Convenient that you lessen yo<sup>r</sup>: ffort from its former design which will be the better maintaind & defended & sufficiently secure yo<sup>r</sup>: Inhabitants under favour of yo<sup>r</sup>: guns or elce by building a small bulwork of 8 or 10 Guns at some distance, for the better securing the town but to be under reach & Command of the ffort which we hope

with bricks & stores already by you & what now sent you will goe a great way in the assisting we have also sent you Carriages &c<sup>a</sup>: stores & necessaries for yo<sup>r</sup>: fortification also a quantity of chalk to burn into lime which you have plenty of wood for but this Country Chinam is so dear & scarce here that we cannot procure sufficient for our own occasions; if you have more salt provisions then you can well spend amongst yo<sup>r</sup>: factors & soldiers you will doe well either to furnish our shipping therewith that returne hither or spare it to Europe shippes that goe from that to England who we beleive by their long stay in the Country may have great occasions for it & since salt meats is not so proper for yo<sup>r</sup>: Climate, and Constitutions, we shall by every Shipp supply you with live Cattle of all sorts till their breed yeild you sufficient for yo<sup>r</sup>: occasions.

When you are wanting of factors & writers you must employ the best & soberest of yo<sup>r</sup>: Soldiers in such business of the Comp<sup>a</sup>: as they may be fit for.

By our last shippes we sent you another Supply of Copper cash which if not sufficient for yo<sup>r</sup>: Exchange & trade we shall furnish you with more upon yo<sup>r</sup>: next advice.

We observe depattes Invitation of you to a settlem<sup>t</sup>: att Sillabar which in Consideration of y<sup>e</sup> unhealthiess of the place we would rather have you excuse it & perswade him to bring his pepper to yo<sup>r</sup>: Port which you may Contract for accordingly, however we leave the matter to you to act what you shall Judg most advantageous for the Comp<sup>a</sup>: therein since he gives you his promise & encouragement<sup>t</sup>: to clear those grounds from such woods & waters as make it unhealthy & also the Conveniency of y<sup>e</sup>: Port, for the safeguard of yo<sup>r</sup>: shipping is a great encouragement<sup>t</sup>: We should have sent you noe Arrack by this opportunity since we find you are supplied with such a great quantity of Brandy by the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: which we suppose is intended as well for sale as service. We hope if you send the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: hither she will bring us [a loading] of Pepper since y<sup>e</sup> Loyall Merch<sup>t</sup>: has no occasion for it being past you for England, and Considering the great charges that all the Comp<sup>a</sup>: shippes are at it must be your Cheif endeavours to lade them to us otherwise their expence will be insupportable. Pray lett us have bye all oportunities, an Acco<sup>t</sup>. of your Cash & stock that we may Supply you accordingly w<sup>ch</sup>: the want of makes us ignorant of your occasions however we should have sent you more now had we more dollers, but these are all & ingotts it seems are not Curr<sup>t</sup>: with you, but hope to procure you more by next shipp as also some small Coynes of silver which our people have been long in making stamps for but they have often miscarryed in but we hope they will Suddainly perfect them. We cannot possibly find fitting a person to Supply M<sup>r</sup>: Blooms place but hope to doe it by next shipping in the meantime we appoynt M<sup>r</sup>: Knipe to succeed in the Governm<sup>t</sup> in case of M<sup>r</sup>: Blooms absence or mortality for the good Charracter you give of M<sup>r</sup>: Rylyes ability & dilligence we order him youngest of Council but you must take notice according to the R<sup>t</sup>. Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: late order your Sallaries are to be the same that the President & Council formerly appoynted you; since the advancement<sup>t</sup>: was only in Consideration of the Military Service the Council were appoynted to.

By this Shipp we send you 40 Soldiers under Com<sup>and</sup> of Lein<sup>t</sup>: Konida & intend 40 more by the Resolution which with those formerly sent you by the Dorrothy & Bencoolen friggatt we hope will be a sufficient & lasting force for you, they are paid here according to list but you must pay them with you as their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: have appoynted. w<sup>ch</sup>: is all from

I doubt not yo<sup>r</sup>: Excellency is long since satisfied there was noe reason of Complaint of the delaying yo<sup>r</sup>: Soldiers they & theirs being imeadeatly upon their landing deliverd to their Officerr, & before the arrivall of yo<sup>r</sup>: Letter, nor shall I att any time employ or protect any of them Contrary to yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: approbation not doubting of the same just favour from you. As for our late warfair in Bengall under the Conduct of Cap<sup>t</sup>: William Heath it has noe other success then the return of all the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: shipp<sup>s</sup> servants & Stock from thence where they acted little of consequence more then the rash assalting Ballasore with the loss of ab<sup>t</sup>: 20: men designing to fetch of a few people and goods there w<sup>ch</sup>: they affected as to part of the goods much of them being burnt upon the Allarm of their Landing but the men were all but two Carryed prisners up the Countrey beyond their reach or power hom since we here are Carryed Captives up to Dacca where with M<sup>r</sup>: Braddill & M<sup>r</sup>: Eyres they remain under confinem<sup>t</sup>:

Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath with his fleet ab<sup>t</sup>: 12 Sall & 300 Soldiers sayled from Ballasore to Chittagawm where they attempted nothing but a vissit & Surveigh, & findeing it to forceable & unteanable for them they peaceably [sayled] thence for Arrackan where after refresheing their [force] & some short treatyes with the King & c<sup>a</sup>: they returned hither the 4 March who we have since disposed the best way our Condition & Circumstances would ¶mit but for yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: fuller Satisfaction we have sent you the best acc<sup>t</sup>: we can gett from Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath & c<sup>a</sup>: of that negotiation, also our Gen<sup>l</sup>: to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: wherein we have ¶ticularly recounted all transactions worthy their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: notice to w<sup>ch</sup>: we humbly referr yon desiering after yo<sup>r</sup>: ¶ussall you pleas to forward them to their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: by the

first opportunity w<sup>ch</sup>: probably may arrive them before the Williamson via West Coast.

The greatest troubles we at present labour under is the scarcety of goods w<sup>ch</sup>: are not procurable on this Coast the Country being soe much desolated by the late famine and continued warrs that it cannot be expected to replenish in some years soe that will be a great difficulty to procure lading for the Shipping home but we shall doe what is possible to be done but we hope to pick up a lading to dispatch one shipp in August or September & possibly another in January but for the rest there's little hopes but from the West Coast if your Excellency &c<sup>a</sup>: can thinck of any better course pray give us yo<sup>r</sup>: orders for it.

The Princess Cap<sup>t</sup>: Haddock we have lett to the Jews for pag<sup>s</sup>: 15000 freight for Amoy & send the Defence Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath upon the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Acc<sup>t</sup>: (if they approve it) to lade Sugars Tunage at Macan for Persia the Williamson & Resolution for the West Coast the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: we designed for England had she not most unhappely blown up in the Road y<sup>e</sup>: [lacuna] Justly what accident we can<sup>t</sup>: Learn all the men aboard w<sup>ch</sup>: were ab<sup>t</sup>: 47: souls were Sadly lost in the fallall misfortune Cap<sup>t</sup>: Brangwing & 10 of his men were saved by being a shoare & tho twas a dreadfull loss yett it hapned there were only 20 piggs of Lead of their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: aboard & but little elce of others.

the Ruin of our Peace freindshipp & trade to the great prejudice of the Duan & thousands of poore Inhabitants our yearly great importation of treasure employed & enrich'd whereas other Europe Nations import & manage their trade with little elcæ then foreign goods to their great advantage but little to the Countrey as your old experienced Merchants can truly inform yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell: as also how much the trade & revennues of Bengall are improved since our settlement & trade there w<sup>ch</sup>: we were encouraged to encreas by that happy illustrious Prince Sultan Sujee his Cowl to trade custome free with many other Priviledges & favors he was gratuitously pleased to confer on our nation from the freindshipp & Coyness he had for us & his Countrey w<sup>ch</sup>: imunetyes were a long time confirm'd to us by severall of his Successors in that Government till towards the conclusions of Navob Shasta Cawns whose age or averice gave his Subb Governers oportunity or authority to act as they pleased & upon all occations to abuse exact & robb our people & after destroy them too w<sup>ch</sup>: our many chargable addresses to the Nabob & the King would never receive the least justice or satisfaction for w<sup>ch</sup>: made us resolve to leave the Countrey & trade till we could have some redress of our rongs & losses; & have assurance of a better & securer settlement, but in this we were also obstructed & our people & concerns stopt from coming away w<sup>ch</sup>: occasioned the dreadfull loss of much innocent blood on both sides w<sup>ch</sup>: I wish to God had been saved & may be prevented for the future God has given your Excellency an oportunity for it, & peace making is certainly most pleasing to the Almighty & therefore the most blessed & hon<sup>ble</sup>: employment under heaven twill make you happy there & famous here to eternety all we desier is the enjoym<sup>t</sup>: of our former priviledges in a secure settlement w<sup>ch</sup>: as soon as you grant & procure for us we shall return to the comfort & prosperity of your Governm<sup>t</sup>: in the meantime in the name of our good & mercifull Creator I pray that you would be kinde to our poor harmless detained people now under your power & posession & give them their liberty to return to their Native Countrey & poor sorrowful freinds & distresed families since we have been favourable to & freed all your people not one person remains w<sup>th</sup>: us & what satisfaction will the sufferings or innocent blood of a few men be twill but more anger heaven & fetch down y<sup>e</sup>: vengeance upon the cruell actors but I beleive your Excell: is a person of more hon<sup>r</sup>: & humanity then to Pmitt or approve such base actions; for my own part tis my greatest satisfaction that I never had a hand in these unhappy differences & should be glad to be instrumentall in composing them that we may live as we doe & ever have done here in peace & freindshipp w<sup>ch</sup>: I hope will be also your Excellency enclinations & indeavours praying for your long & happy life & great increas of hon<sup>r</sup>: desiering the hon<sup>r</sup>: of yo<sup>r</sup>: freinshipp & Comands I conclude.

We have charged M<sup>r</sup>: Brown w<sup>th</sup>: your Acc<sup>t</sup>: of Cordage since you again confirm it soe you may cleer it to us as charged also approve your buying his vessell w<sup>ch</sup>: we hope will repair the comp<sup>a</sup>: to be dispatch yearly to us with your goods amongst w<sup>ch</sup>: forgett not packing Stuff & c<sup>a</sup>: formerly orderd we being in great want of it through its Scarcity here, but as for grain you need not provide any more then what engaged for allready rice being now 3½  $\mathcal{P}$  fanam & a plentiful harvest expected however lett none of the Comp<sup>a</sup>: Shippes come unladen from you.

We have dispatcht the Defence for China we now send in her room the Dyamond & Maddapollam to bring away the wood in readiness with you as also what Chinā & Cotton yeare you can procure with w<sup>ch</sup>: you may also lade the Thomas but Sloop Samuell we doubt is so much out of repair she will first requier fitting att Porto Nova w<sup>ch</sup>: we would have you order to be done with as much haest & frugality as possibly. By the Dyamond we send you Gunpouder Sherash wine & c<sup>a</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: Crd<sup>t</sup>: us for & being advised by Cap<sup>t</sup>: Lacye at Porto Nova that Tothanague bears a good price there we would have you sell the 2116: p<sup>s</sup>: aboard him at the best rates you can for the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Acc<sup>t</sup>: he also writes us there Sprung a dangerous leak w<sup>ch</sup>: enquier into & if you finde it to be so give order for her goeing into the River & repair her.

We are also Sorry to hear the backwardness of your Merch<sup>ts</sup>: that should fail us now in our necessetyes & in soe small an Investment w<sup>ch</sup>: we doubt proceeds more from their Averice then the Country troubles they being less profitable then formerly however we shall expect their due discharge of their engagement otherwise to Satisfye the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>ts</sup>: for their disapoyntment but we are Still in hopes you will p<sup>er</sup>swade them to end, and engage for more or we shall not be able to procure a ladeing for our January Shipp.

Our last was of April past by Shipp Williamson w<sup>ch</sup>: gave answer to all your former letters w<sup>th</sup>: what orders & advice we had to give you to that time w<sup>ch</sup>: the time since has afforded little more of any Considerable import noe Shipp being yett arrived to us either from England or Bombay to our great astonishm<sup>t</sup>: both places being in troubles as P<sup>t</sup>icular news enforms us, & Bombay by our warr against the Mogull in great danger to be lost to his forces who are very numerous upon the Island & plundered & destroyed great part thereof but we hope the Castle will hold [out] against them till English recruits come to their defence, & recovery of the rest. The truth is it has proved a very fatall unfortunate chargeable warr to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & we doubt will cost more before we are well settled again: Since things look cloudy every where; we are in great admiration that we here nothing from you since we expresly ordered you early advices by some of your small Vessels but more P<sup>t</sup>icularly by the Dorrothy friggott whose ill advised Com<sup>mander</sup> lost much time we doubt for his own occations in rounding Malacca & Batavia to you att a Season that admitted a nearer passage: but by a Dutch shipp to Pollicatt we here of his arrivall, & departure from Batavia to you, w<sup>ch</sup>: is time enough to See her here to w<sup>ch</sup>: would have been most welcome to us that She might be laden hence home an early shipp w<sup>th</sup>: advices the want whereof putts us to a great loss the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: being unhappely blown up in this road; the S<sup>t</sup>: Dutch Shipp also brought us the Surprising bad news of the Royall James being sone after her departure from you by an unfortunate leak forced back to Batavia for releif, but feindeing none they landed the pepper & falsly sold the Shipp for 1100 Rix dollers w<sup>ch</sup>: they excuse & pretend to be upon Necessety they having noe mony or meterials to repair her nor any thing to Subsist w<sup>th</sup>: but they had much better have lett her rott there than Sold her soe hasely.

But the P<sup>er</sup>sant business of this Shipp Resolution is to fetch away her Pepper & Saltpeter &c<sup>a</sup>: from Batavia as you will See by our Instructions to Cap<sup>t</sup>: Sharp &c<sup>a</sup>: papers w<sup>ch</sup>: we would have you P<sup>ro</sup>use & C<sup>o</sup>ppy & advise w<sup>th</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Sharp what more necessary therein delivering him the James her Invoyce & bill of loadeing for S<sup>t</sup>: pepper w<sup>th</sup>: what other Certificates you can give to clear its being the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: they seemeing to Scruple it.

We have also sent you a Pipe of Canary 4: chests sherash & one of frenit for your refreshm<sup>t</sup>: but for Stores you are Sufficiently ffurnished from Europe, only we have sent you the great Guns & Carriages you wrott for, there also comes upon this shipp M<sup>r</sup>: Sowdon who being a good Accomptant we order to be Second to M<sup>r</sup>: Bloom & we hope his dilligence will recover the delays & disorder of yo<sup>r</sup>: Books & therefore doe order him the same Sallary & allowances as his predecessor had formely in that employment also M<sup>r</sup>: LeNeve a factor: Sallary att 15<sup>lb</sup>:  $\varphi$  Annum who are all we can att presant perswade to that service soe that if you want assistance in your business you must employ such Soldiers as you shall finde fitting. There also comes thre English Soldiers whose future dilligence & fidelity hope will deserve your kindness, tho they have been remitt & faulty in their duty here however give them such encouragem<sup>t</sup>: as you finde they shall deserve.

We wrott you formerly to send us what small Vessels that wanted repair that we might fitt them here & tis our wonder that none yett appears w<sup>th</sup>: us nor that you sent us noe advices of the James's being att Batavia by the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: Since she has been many months there before her departure.

You would doe well for the future to keepe a Correspondance w<sup>th</sup>: those parts & to advise us what you meet Materiall to our business. If you have any safe & Sooner Conveighance for England then the Resolution, we would then have you demande our packett, & bagg of Letters to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: from Cap<sup>t</sup>: Sharp, & send y<sup>m</sup> by it, that they arrive as Soon as possibly in England we being uncertain of Conveighance hence so wishing you health & prosperity in the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: affairs we remain

And whereas your Excellency &c<sup>a</sup>: were pleased to p<sup>r</sup>mitt the unladeing & housing the S<sup>d</sup>: Cargo of Pepper upon the Island of Onrest, giveing the charge & keeping thereof to three English men Viz<sup>t</sup>: R: R: G belonging to the S<sup>d</sup>: Shipp who duly paid y<sup>e</sup>: charge of its housing upon notice whereof we the President & Councill of ffort S<sup>t</sup>: George for acco<sup>t</sup>: of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: English East India Comp<sup>a</sup> according to our duties; have sent Cap<sup>t</sup>: William Sharp or his Successor Commander of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Shipp Resolution to receive & lade the S<sup>d</sup>: Pepper aboard her for Engl<sup>d</sup>:. But your Excellency &c<sup>a</sup>: haveing Contrary to all reason & justice refused the delivery thereof on pretence of demands upon our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: from the King of Bantam w<sup>ch</sup>: has not the least Colour or shaddow of right on them, since your Excellency and Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Councill well know how much our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Sufferd & lost, in goods, debts & trade by their being dispossed of their ffactory & Rightfull posessions in Bantam, tho they had been the raising & enriching of that King, & Kingdome, besides the King of Bantams p<sup>r</sup>ticular Large debt to them w<sup>ch</sup>: Still remains

By severall English men your Excellency &c<sup>a</sup>: were pleas<sup>d</sup>: lately to send us on your ship from Batavia to Pollicatt we are enformed that our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Shipp Royall James laden & dispatcht by their Governer & Council in York ffort att Bencoolen for England y<sup>e</sup>: November 1688 was by the distres of an accidental leak forced into the Port of Bantam for releif, & from thence by your Excellencyes Command brought into your Port of Batavia where for want of many necessaryes & Credit to repair her & maintain themselves they were necessitated to make sale of the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Shippes for eleven hundred Rix dollers.

Butt that your Excellency &c<sup>a</sup>: were favourably pleased to permitt the unladeing & housing the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Pepper & to order three English



places, & from Metchlepatam we have the Surprising news of the Governours Seizing our factory, &c<sup>a</sup>: there, & imprisoning Dubass & Brameny left there in charge of the factory to this we have reason to beleive proceeds from the miscarriage of some free English men that went lately to those parts, but we shall endeavour right understanding of the matter, & accomodate it the best way we can as to other transactions we refer you to the accompanying gen<sup>l</sup>: advices to our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters, wherein we have been very just & P<sup>t</sup>icular, Yesterday dispatching the Resolution to the West Coast, & Batavia for the Royall James's pepper for the enclosed reasons w<sup>ch</sup>: we have Judged absolutely necessary for the Hon<sup>r</sup>: & interest of our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters not doubting 'twill meet theirs, & your Excell: approbation & good Success, besides we were under an unavoidable necessity of sendeing her not haveing goods enough by us nor procurable to lade her hence for England nor is the Country capable of it, made so by great mortality, war & troubles that all these parts have, & doe Suffer by w<sup>ch</sup>: we cannot expect to be recovered in some years of w<sup>ch</sup>: have faithfully advised our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters, & hope they will order their affairs accordingly, & to agrivate our misfortunes we have this day arrived w<sup>th</sup>: us the Dorrothy frigott without Pepper or any other loadeing they keep all for the Williamson there w<sup>ch</sup>: comes in so Slowly as we doubt will send her a weak Shipp home the Dorrothy we intend to lade & dispatch home for England w<sup>th</sup>in 12: days att farthest, & by her send advices of affairs in these parts, & what we hear of yours.

We here strange astonishing news by the Dutch from Europe & much wonder we have noe advices of it from the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: either by Shipping or overland but to this here not one Syllable either way God send it good att last, the Dutch also tell us of their taking two french East India Ships att the Cape in their returne home, & that the Nathaniell was also there in great distress most of her men Sick & the Shipp very leaky.

must also enforme you w<sup>ch</sup>: we would have you be very private in that our differences & troubles w<sup>th</sup>: the Mogull Continue still att Bombay, as also that our ffactory at Viziagapatam was lately Seized upon & sever<sup>n</sup>: of the Comp<sup>a</sup> Servants destroyed there, so notwithstanding the fair promises & aspects of affairs now in Bengall you must be very Cautious of your Selves that you be not also Surprised with their Cruelty.

In a few days we shall write att large to the Nabob, & as kindly & respectfully as his obligeing P<sup>w</sup>anna deserves hoping that his wisdom & goodness will soe favourably represent our troubles to the King as may appeas & direct his displeasure we have also thought that as soon as the Season will P<sup>m</sup>itt to send a Shipp & some persons to treat w<sup>th</sup>: him ab<sup>t</sup>: our resettlement in the meantime you may assure him of our peaciable & freindly carriage to his Subjects & that we have due sence & esteem of his kindenes to you & the Comp<sup>a</sup>: affairs w<sup>ch</sup>: God Almighty restore to their former good Condition. Omitt no oportunity to advise of all news & occurances in your parts by your peons.

We shall write more large by your Pattamarr so shall add noe more att present but to wish you safe & well being.

Our last was P<sup>w</sup> Shipp Resolution w<sup>th</sup>: a Short acknowledgment of your letters & c<sup>a</sup>: P<sup>w</sup> Shipp Dorothy since w<sup>ch</sup>: is arrived w<sup>th</sup>: us the Bencoolen friggott from Indriapore w<sup>th</sup>: a large Acc<sup>t</sup>: of M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons proceedings there w<sup>ch</sup>: tho She is welcome to us for her Safety & Cargo of Pepper yett we are doubtfull both hers, & the Priamans will soe delay the Williamsons dispatch for England w<sup>ch</sup>: is off greater consequence to the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: then the sendeing it hither since she lyes att great demorage & in great danger of loosing her men if not the Shipp by her long detention upon that unhappy Coast soe pray for the future follow the Comp<sup>as</sup>: & our orders in ladeing & hastening all the Europe Shippes designed home, you cannot doe the Comp<sup>a</sup>: or the owners a greater peice of Service since the place is so fatal to them & except upon an extraordinary occation keep noe Shipp w<sup>th</sup>: you above 2 months, & P<sup>t</sup>icularly this Shipp tho you returne her only w<sup>th</sup>: advices she being too crasy for her longer stay & for her & her peoples safe returne will encourage others more chearfully to undertake it w<sup>ch</sup>: we finde very difficult to P<sup>w</sup>ade them too.

M<sup>r</sup>: Sowdon comes to you upon this Shipp as Second who after he has assisted in the bringing up & settleling [*sic*] your Acc<sup>ts</sup>: we order him to be sent Cheif of Indriapoore M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbins desiering a discharge from it, & that he rightly & duly examin the past managem<sup>t</sup>: of that ffactory giveng us & you a P<sup>t</sup>icular Acc<sup>t</sup>: how the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Cash & c<sup>a</sup>: has been disposed & expended there where pray give him the best advice & instructions you can we haveing hitherto Rec<sup>d</sup>: noe Acc<sup>t</sup>: of the great Quantety of Dollers remitted them nor from yourselves neither therefore if you cannot Compleat the books to be sent us by the first oportunity lett us at least have a P<sup>t</sup>icular acc<sup>t</sup>: of the Comp<sup>as</sup>: Cash since your first Settlem<sup>t</sup>: since we much wanted it, as well to adjust our acc<sup>ts</sup>: by, as to know whatt Stock you have by [you] which supposing it to be large we shall send noe more till we here from you therefore if possible lett us have the Acc<sup>t</sup>: Currant of both ffactoryes that we may duly charge & C<sup>t</sup>: you for what we

have Rec<sup>d</sup> & sent, M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons has drawn a bill upon us for 2,300 : Dollers att 15 : P<sup>r</sup>C<sup>t</sup> : advance w<sup>th</sup>: we much wonder att since you must needs have a great cash by you he also acknowledging to have a Considerable quantety of dollers by him but that the people refuse to take them but for what reasons we know not therefore pray enquier into it, & [if] you finde any just one lett them be either exchanged or returned to us, it being very hard to take up mony att such Heigh advance whilset you have Suffitient by you to Supply them.

We hope the Resolution long before the arrivall of this be dispatcht to Batavia & laded w<sup>th</sup>: the James's pepper there for England; the James's Officers who Committed the Illegall vile action of makeing away with the Shipp for little or nothing we are now sendeing home upon the Dorrothy to answer for their crimes therefore we would have you P<sup>t</sup>icularlly advise the Comp<sup>a</sup>: about the bad business & also to write us thereof & what elce you can learne of their proceedings w<sup>th</sup>: the Resolution att Batavia [and] least M<sup>r</sup>: Gibbons should not have sent you Copy of his advices to us we herewith remitt you as also the Emperors Letter to us that you may direct the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: of affairs there as you Judge most Convenient.

Your importunenate desiers of a Supply of Cofferyes to Carry & serve your fortification has P<sup>r</sup>swaded us to send the Pearle ffriggott to Mallagascar for the procury of them & to proceed from thence directly to you w<sup>th</sup>: we hope She will be Successfull in & pray send us a P<sup>t</sup>icular Acc<sup>t</sup>: of whatt & how many you receive by them as also what elce you may want for the encourgmont of your Settlement which the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: are desierous to promote; & therefore must desier M<sup>r</sup>: Bloom his patience, & Continuance a little longer till he has Substantially irradiated our Interest there that he may have the sole reputation of so great & nationall a Service by perfecting whatt he has so ingeniously began tho we are so far from thought of Confining him to y<sup>e</sup> place that we hereby P<sup>r</sup>mitt his returne as soon as things are well Settled there.

Noe news yett off the Pryaman w<sup>th</sup>: makes us doubtfull of her Safety we wish the want of hers & the Bencoolens pepper may not detain the Williamson to the endaigering the loss of her passage or att least the weakning of the Shipp by the mortallity or weakness of her men.

This day Sayles the Dorrothy ffriggott for England & Carryes a good Cargo w<sup>th</sup>: advices of all the Comp<sup>as</sup>: affairs w<sup>th</sup>: in our knowledge more P<sup>t</sup>icularly the welcome news of a probable accomodation of our troubles at Bombay the Gen<sup>l</sup>: having sent three English to Daman to treat w<sup>th</sup>: the Moors about them & tis beleived they will agree good [Sic] grant it may be to the Hon<sup>r</sup>: & interest of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: but if they doe not make a peace we doubt their Continued troubles may draw some upon us to the disturbance of our long enjoyed peace on these parts.

We must repeat our orders w<sup>th</sup>: a Strict injunction that you keep noe vessel except upon exterordinary, & unavoydable occation above 2 : months w<sup>th</sup>: you, their longer stay there, haveing proved a destruction to our men & Shipping.

We will not trouble you with Europe news since what we have is uncertain noe Shipp being arrived to us this year from England only we doubt Europe will be the Stage of long & dangerous troubles God grant all things may end w<sup>th</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & the good of our Nation to whose divine protection we Committ you & your affairs remaying

We shall duly C<sup>r</sup>: you for the Bencoolens Invoyce tho we wish the Williamson may not want her pepper to lade & dispatch her for England but M<sup>r</sup>: Chiswell enforms us there is great quanteties att Mandata w<sup>ch</sup>: we hope you have procured for her pray att all times use all possible expedition for the Speedy dispatch of our Shippes since their detention on that Coast prove so fatal to y<sup>m</sup>: Amongst your papers, & Acco<sup>ts</sup>: we finde none of your Cash w<sup>ch</sup>: would have been most Materiall & w<sup>ch</sup>: we are chiefly wanting off to know the Stock & its dispose & therefore pray fail not to send us that & an Acco<sup>t</sup>: Curr<sup>t</sup>: till you can bring up your Books.

The Pryaman is not arrived w<sup>th</sup>: us w<sup>ch</sup>: makes us very doubtfull of her Safety God send she may appear att last you must be cautious of sending such weak Ships upon such voyages before they are well fitted.

We have paid the bill of Exchainge to M<sup>r</sup>: ffelding w<sup>ch</sup>: Crd<sup>t</sup>: us for tho we cannot but admier off your drawing it since the Comp<sup>r</sup>: have so great a Stock upon your Coast but there can be no reason of any advancem<sup>t</sup>: upon it since you had noe ways of improveing it better & this w<sup>th</sup>: out hassard too.

If the burning be only an objection against your dollers w<sup>ch</sup>: there is little reason for you would have done well to have send them to us, & not keep them there being inservisable & in danger.

The bearer M<sup>r</sup>: Sowdon is ordered for Bencolen but dureing his stay there we would have you & him Consult togather & to Satisfye & acquaint him w<sup>th</sup>: all things concerning them more p<sup>t</sup>icularly of your Stock & its dispose.

This Shipp is Suddainly dispatcht hence by reason of the danger of the approcheing Monsoon that we cannot assist & Supply you w<sup>th</sup>: those necessaries we designed w<sup>ch</sup>: our next shall repair.

The Presidents letter to the Emperour comes herew<sup>th</sup>: to w<sup>ch</sup>: you may read or ad what necessary so Committing you & your affairs to the divine protection we remain

The past month we rec<sup>d</sup>: the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & your severall advices by your Cossetts wherein we are extream Sorry to read the Continued troubles but hope your brave Defence, & resistance will wary the Enemy to a peace or departure from the Island to w<sup>ch</sup>: the forces & Supplyes by the Kempthorne & Diana may Contribute much & we shall gladly here that your trefy att Daman may conclude in a firme & honourable peace w<sup>ch</sup>: our poor afflicted freinds att Surratt give us great hopes off; yesterday receiving letters from them by a french Conveighance w<sup>ch</sup>: came very oportunely to advise the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: of by Shipp Darrothy who this day Sailed with a Considerable Cargo for England, God send her a safe arrivall, We herewith send Duplicates of our Letters to our R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters w<sup>ch</sup>: after the p<sup>ro</sup>usall of them pleas to forward .by first oportunity wherein we have given their Hon<sup>rs</sup>: a faithfull, & p<sup>ar</sup>ticular Acc<sup>t</sup>: of the State of their affairs to this instant under o<sup>r</sup>: directions w<sup>ch</sup>: we wish were in a happier posture we will not trouble you w<sup>th</sup>: reputation thereof humbly referring you thereto wishing all things in a more prosperous Condition to w<sup>ch</sup>: we shall Contribute all Indeavour in our power, & tho we are often threatend & allarmd w<sup>th</sup>: the nois of assaults, & Seiges, yett we thanck God weare yett safe, & free, & in all apperance have as freindely & amicable Correspondance from the severall Camps & Country Governments as ever; but we cannot beleive we shall remain long so, if yo<sup>r</sup>: Excell<sup>ll</sup> Continues the Warr att Bombay, however we shall endeavour to avoyd a breach yett we are so well provid<sup>d</sup>: for it as we doubt not to Defend the placle [place] & our rights against all oppositions, and tho the Moguls forces has done or attempted noe injuries against us here yett your Excellency will read a Sad Acc<sup>t</sup>: of the Seizure of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: factoryes & Concerns att Metchlepatam & Viziagapatam & of the Cutting of the Cheif & severall others there w<sup>ch</sup>: we beleive was occasioned by their vain opposition of their fforces but we have yett noe Certain advice thereof or the reason of it what we are informed thereof we herew<sup>th</sup>: send the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & your Excell<sup>ll</sup>, & we shall endeavour to releas, & recover our people and Concerns there.

We have much better news from Bengall as you will read in the new Nabobs Ebrahim Cawns p<sup>ro</sup> wanna inviteing us thither to a welcome & Secure Settlement, & trade upon our former priviledges w<sup>ch</sup>: we cheiffy send this Shipp to advise you of desiering your Excellencies & c<sup>a</sup>: Suddain order therein since of ourselves we have noe power to act that weighty affair, nor if we had could we safely doe it till we know your Condition & resolutions about the warr therefore we pray your Excell<sup>ll</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: as soon as possible to send full instructions, & directions how to proceed therein w<sup>ch</sup>: we shall await for.

By this Shipp the Saphir friggott Cap<sup>t</sup>: Tuers Commander we send what Supplyes of Powder Shott & c<sup>a</sup>: we can Conveniently spare w<sup>ch</sup>: tho your Excell<sup>ll</sup> & c<sup>a</sup>: were not pleased to write us for yett we finde in the letter to the Agent of

Bengall that you are in want off them w<sup>ch</sup>: if soe, & that the warr Continues will be A Seasonable Supply; if otherwise that you are in peace then we shall have noe occasion for them therefore we hope the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & you will approve the Service, we have noe shels I order peices however it may be very Servisable in Slinging off Stones.

The President has also by her Consigned to his Excellency 30: Pipes of Canary for Acc<sup>t</sup>: of the Owners of Shipp Dorrothy the ffreight of w<sup>ch</sup>: we ferrer to you to make, and receive, & we hope they will be welcome, & Servisable to you reserving a Sufficiency of them for this place.

Our greatest trouble att presant is the Scarcity & dearness of all Sorts of bale goods soe that we are not able to Invest the Comp<sup>a</sup>: Stock our Southerne ffactoryes Merchants haveing relinquisht their Contracts for those sorts of goods the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: require by reason of the wars & troubles in those parts; our merchants here are also very backward in their old Investment, & very averse & fearfull to undertake a new, soe that we are att a great loss whatt Cource to take to employ the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Stock & lade their Shippis if we doe not resettle in Bengall, w<sup>ch</sup>: is now our greatest dependance.

To our wonder we have yett noe Shipp or or [*sic*] news from England more then what we receive from the Dutch advises to the: 5: of January last w<sup>ch</sup>: we herew<sup>th</sup>: send your Excell<sup>t</sup> God grant the troubles in England, & Europe may soon Conclude to his glory, & the good off the Nation; we shall take all due care to receive what we can upon Hagartons sev<sup>l</sup>: demands tho some of the P<sup>ersons</sup> are absent.

Upon M<sup>r</sup>: John Beards request & the vacation of business we have P<sup>romitted</sup> him to take his passage upon this Shipp to looke after some Concerns that requiers his care to whome we intreat your kindness, & assistance, he being one of the Bengall Council & a Sober young man well recommended to us from the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: as also for the memory of their faithfull Serv<sup>t</sup>: his worthy good father.

We can say noe more to the list of the Chinesees losses [ . . . ] their Junck w<sup>th</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Barron only that we beleive it to be mostly true but that it noe ways Concerns the Comp<sup>a</sup>: it being their vulluntary & P<sup>articlar</sup> adventures, the we doubt M<sup>r</sup>: Sallaways unadvised rec<sup>t</sup>: thereoff, & inconsiderate promises ab<sup>t</sup>: it may create some trouble to our Shippis w<sup>ch</sup>: otherwise they could have noe pretence for however we thincke the best way now will be to take notice thereof to the Gen<sup>l</sup>: of Amoy except he give us farther trouble therein, & then there will be a necessity to defend the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & our Selves from his unreasonable Demands.

I was lately surpris'd & astonished with the straing sad new [s] we rec<sup>d</sup>: from our people in your parts that our Cheife & Second & Severall others of the Comp<sup>as</sup>: Servants were barbarously murdered in our Factory by your forces and that the rest of our people who were saved from there Cruelty were carryd Captives up the Country and the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: factory Treasure goods & Concern's seizd upon but by whos order or for what reason I cannot yet be Informed nor can I imagine it to be occasioned by you Since twas by your encouragement & Invitation I sent people and y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: estate theither who have allways departed themselves peacably & quietly to all never haveing given the least occasion of offence or Complaint against & much less for Such cruell & unhumane usage & one y<sup>e</sup> Contrary it has bin our & there Cheifes Study and endavours to oblige you by supplying you with all necessarys both for Conveniency & warr and at all times ready and willing to give you all y<sup>e</sup> assistance in our pouer which your Excell: have formerly often owned and acknowledg'd but what Should make soe grate [an] alteration now is a matter of great wonder to me since [our] money and trade was so beneficiall to your Country [poor] people In maintaining and employing many thousands of [them] with very little advantage to y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: it being greater charges then profit to y<sup>m</sup> but the hops we had that time would better that trade encouraged our Continuance there nor can our difference & troubles at Surrat or Bengall be any just reason or pretence for this Voyolent breach of peace since there variance can no wayes be imputed a fault in me Since I neither have bin nor am concernd therein but always maintaind an Inviolable amity & frindship with all y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>ts</sup> on y<sup>e</sup> Coast whereever our people or trade were Settled nor have we wronged any person of any thing whatever nor impeded or obstructed any of your vessells boats or any other trade whatsoever but rather encourag'd and assisted you and y<sup>e</sup> people therein frely giving our passports to all that desired them and can any of these kindnesses and servises deserve [?] such cruell useage as we have rec<sup>d</sup>: from your people but I beleve you good and wise I must desire you to make y<sup>e</sup> case your own & consider well y<sup>e</sup> unreasonableness & cruelty of theas actions & to [lacuna] rest and repaire them as much as possible since I doe hereby require and expect a just and full satisfaction for all the Injuries done us and the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & that our people under confinem<sup>t</sup>: with you be restored to there libertyes and our treasure and goods be freely and punctualey delivered to them & that they have freedome either to continue at our factory or returne (I haveing released your boat men brought by our People thence) heither with what belongs to them which if you refuse I must endavour to gett what satisfaction & reparation I can & I beleive it I want neither force of pouer to take it tho I had much rather continue our frindship & trade in peace & quiettness & it must be a great provocation that forces me to y<sup>e</sup> Contrary therefore Consider well upon it timely to prevent the Mischeifes that may insue to you and y<sup>e</sup> people by the denyall of these our reasonable demands & Justice upon those bloody Villaines that so barbourously murdered our people unarmed and in Cold blood without the least offence or provocation to you or your Govern<sup>t</sup>: nor can Difference in other parts be any [just] reason for it since it is not in your power nor [mine] to prevent y<sup>e</sup> troubles or mischeifs of other Govern<sup>t</sup>: nor dose it concerne you or me what they doe at Surrat or Bengall Since we are only acceptable for our own Govern<sup>t</sup>: & charge & while we discharge that well there can be noe more expected from us, all which I leave to y<sup>e</sup> wise and prudent Consideration desiring to heare from you & know your Resolution herein Wishing you health and happiness I conclude.

By the Saphir Frigatt lately dispatched [since] for Bombay We fully advised the state of y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup> : affairs here & at Bengall concluding they have reached you long before this We excuse y<sup>e</sup> repetition nor is there more to add we being still in the saim quiett posture we then advised of we hope to continue so and that the arrivall of Rama Raja in Chengee may divert if not prevent the Mogulls troubling us here tho we rather wish Generall has concluded & settled all by an Hon<sup>ble</sup> : peace with him without which we cannot reasonable expect a seure trade or settlem<sup>t</sup> : any where in his dominion nor that your dear libertys which y<sup>e</sup> Allmighty grant may be soon & lasting.

The 5 Ins<sup>t</sup> : arrived y<sup>e</sup> Chandos from England with a small Stock but with such great and strange news as surpriz'd and astonished us y<sup>e</sup> Prince and Prince's of Orange being Proclaimed King and Queen of England and the late King James & c<sup>a</sup> in France with other Various alterations which are to numerous to insert here but for your further satisfaction of the weightiest we hear with send you a Proclamation which according to order has been published here with the usuall solemnities. The Chandos sailed from England y<sup>e</sup> 7 of March and brings us y<sup>e</sup> advice of y<sup>e</sup> wellcome arrivall of the Modena there and that y<sup>e</sup> Herbert & y<sup>e</sup> Benjamin were disign'd out for Bombay if y<sup>e</sup> troubles in England & Scasity of Seamen does not prevent them the Severall packetts letters for Bombay & c<sup>a</sup> : we shall Suddainly Send by a Sea conveyance if procureable if not Via Goa recommending them to be forwarded by the Governour this comes by a french Conveyance which we doe desier you will also make use of to advise us y<sup>e</sup> accurances in your parts and Bombay it being of great consequence to us here So wishing you health liberty & happiness wee remaine

I lately rec<sup>d</sup>: a letter from y<sup>e</sup> Avaldore of Maddapollam & c<sup>a</sup> wherein he acquaints me of his kindness to you and your factory notwithstanding y<sup>e</sup> Mogulls severall orderss for [?] w<sup>ch</sup>: I have made him a present which I doubt not will also engage his future frindship and assistance for which I doubt not you will be also greatfull and deport yourselves with that Justice and prudence that I may have noe complaints against you which is all from

We have rece<sup>d</sup>: and perused your severall letters and advices wherein we are very sory to read the continued backwardness of your Merchants in concluding their antient Investm<sup>t</sup>: and undertakings another, We doubt they to much magnify their troubles of the Country to excuse their remi[ssness] which you must not easily allow of but importa[n]tely press them as far as possibly for the discharge of [their] Contract otherwise we shall be at a great loss to lade a ship home in January next the disappointm<sup>t</sup>: of Vizagapatam and this place being so great that we doubt we shall not be able to make up half her Cargo therefore it behooves you to take the more care herein [n]or must you forget to better your sortments and observe our orders in receiveing no brown long cloth N<sup>o</sup> 1, it being as we rought formerly to ordinary for Europe Marketts therefore let that sort be washt better then formerly and sort to its N<sup>o</sup>: umber white Continue still your treaty with the french Merchants and Cuddolor but if yours will not engage upon another Investm<sup>t</sup>: we may soe secure of them to manage the large stock we have by us which otherwiss will unavoidable lye dead but if [n] this we are obliged to keep strictly to y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup> orders which are to buy them no bettelas or any other fine goods but there hole Investm<sup>t</sup>: to be in ordinary and Course goods which both we and you are to endaver to doe y<sup>m</sup> the best we can for from y<sup>e</sup> severall letters and other advices about Rama Raja Coming to Chengee we now believe to be untoutably true since the french and Duch have already made their addresses and presents but their Circumstances and y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup> being very different and disproportionably in that Govern<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> french their Chief residence and fortification being in that Govern<sup>t</sup>: & also the Dutch much more factorys and trade then we therefore it cannot be expected that we should be equal in that Charge however in consideration of y<sup>e</sup> Kings favourable assistance to y<sup>e</sup> General of Bombay and y<sup>e</sup> occasion we may have for his friendship here obleges us to advance more then other ways which we hope will be an acceptable present being in a very good sort & furniture Broad cloth fine and ordinary with armes and other Curiositys which will [be so] servisable and pleasing that we hope you will [thereby] procure more advantagios priveledges for [y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup>:] Settlem<sup>ts</sup> and trad with a confirmation of y<sup>e</sup> old & his royall Phirmaund and by reason we cannot appear soe well from hence since it may be misconstrated offend & exasperate y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>t</sup>: against us to belive that we send supplys to y<sup>e</sup> Morattas against the Mogull We therefore order the Chief to goe from thence with a handsome Equipage and

Retinnue with Cap<sup>t</sup>: Lasly 8 soldiers and at least 40 Peons with all there Neces<sup>r</sup> and Accustomary attendance and formalities where upon your arrivall you must deport yourself with that gravity and prudence as may pleas and oblige the King but by all means avoid all discourses of the Mogull as much as possibly also [the helping] them either with men Aminnition or money which if they press you to you must excuse your Selves upon your being subordinary to this place & that you cannot promiss or act anything without our advice and order.

The President also sends you a congratulatory letter to y<sup>e</sup> King which if you find Necessary to be delivered do so with all respect and Compliment but if it can be handsomely excused we think it will be better and engage us less on a correspondence that can be noe wayes advantagious to y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup>: and one the other hand y<sup>e</sup> King may possibly resent y<sup>e</sup> disrespect if he receives not y<sup>e</sup> Presidents addressis Since there is to many of his attendance will mind him of it but this we leave it holy to your discretion and managm<sup>t</sup>: We are very Sorry to read y<sup>e</sup> bad acco<sup>t</sup>: you give us of y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Shiping at Porto Novo y<sup>e</sup> Bencolen not yet getting into y<sup>e</sup> River and y<sup>e</sup> beaufert Sloop her worthless condition for y<sup>e</sup> first you must use all endeavors for her gitting into repair her Condition not rendering her capable of going into any other port and if y<sup>e</sup> Sloop is to bad as is resented [*sic*] we order you to breake her up to repair the rest employing y<sup>e</sup> Stors where there may occasion but that you first dispatch y<sup>e</sup> Samuell hither we haveing great occasion to send her to Bombay for the troubles at Porto Novo they are but w<sup>t</sup>: is usuall and must be cleared by a small present as accustomary which pray lett not our buisness be delay'd for whatever Vessell you dispatch to us if you have not [bale] goods to lade them fill them up with timber fire[Works Chinam] hand Spik's or Palmera trees which we are [greatly] wanting of for y<sup>e</sup> Stockading of our fortifications.

Pray wright to them at Porto Novo to be care[full and] frugall [in therē] repair and expences and that [the] Comp<sup>a</sup>: have materials & work for their money all [nesasarys] be bought as cheap as possible & every man be kept to their buisness.

Your Cash runs away apace but we hope you will be good husbands therein and keep a part acco<sup>t</sup> thereof so intend to furnish you by y<sup>e</sup> first opportunity with 2,000 Pag<sup>t</sup>: for y<sup>e</sup> supply of y<sup>e</sup> Garrison but y<sup>e</sup> wayes being troublesom we judg it saifer to Send that and y<sup>e</sup> present or a great part thereof by sea then we shall also send you all necessarys factors provision as paper Quills Lequor &c<sup>o</sup> of which you must be very spairing this Shipp bringing us but a very small supply thereof.

We Commend M<sup>r</sup> Kings marsiall Inclinations but first he must well understand y<sup>e</sup> duty of a Sentinall before he climes to an officer as those Gentlemen here did the Governour advanced in that Employ who served severall months as reformadoe daely performeing there duty which when M<sup>r</sup> King has well discharged y<sup>e</sup> Governour will encourage him to his Meritts but in this you must also have a regard not to discourage our officers whose only hopes is there due succession and preferment which ought duly to be observed to all that deserve which with our respects it is what presents from
