COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Introduction.—Community Development is a programme of “aided self-help” for individual and collective welfare of India’s vast rural population numbering nearly 295 millions. The programme is intended to be planned and implemented by villagers themselves, Government offering technical and financial assistance.

The objectives of the programme are to promote all-sided development of village communities, including economic, political, social, cultural and moral improvement. Emphasis is on the development of self-reliance in the individual, and initiative in the community so that the people are able to manage and run their affairs themselves, making the villages self-governing units of the larger Indian democracy.

The programme was launched on October 2, 1952 in fifty-five projects selected in different States. Each block generally comprises about 100 villages with an area of about 150 sq. miles and a population of 60 to 70 thousand. In tribal and hilly areas, where the density of population is low, a smaller coverage of 25,000 people is allowed. Entire rural India is expected to be covered by the Programme by October, 1963.

The programme is now executed in two stages of five years each. The first stage is of intensive development. On completion of stage I, the block enters into stage II when the development work is continued for another period of five years. Preceding stage I, every block undergoes a “pre-extension” phase of one year during which the work is exclusively confined to agricultural development.

Finance.—Resources for the programme are drawn from the people and the Government. When the State offers financial assistance for execution of projects, expenses are shared by Central and State Governments. For productive works like irrigation, reclamation, etc., necessary funds are advanced by the Central Government to States by way of loans. The Central Government also shares the expenditure on personnel employed by States in Blocks.

Total allotment for the programme during the First Plan was Rs. 96.5 crores. Actual expenditure incurred totalled nearly Rs. 51.9 crores (including Rs. 5 crores on Central schemes) leaving a spill over of Rs. 44.6 crores to Second Plan. Allotment under the Second Plan is Rs. 200 crores.

The Block has already been recognised as the basic unit of development. State plans, therefore, are not only framed from the block upward but funds from each Development Department are also allotted block-wise, wherever possible. A schematic budget, however, exists for the block to serve as a nucleus. A stage I block has a nucleus budget provision of Rs. 12 lakhs for five years. The provision for a stage II block, having a similar life of five years, is Rs. 5 lakhs. The amount available for pre-extension period for agricultural development is Rs. 18,000.

The programme has received some assistance from the Government of U.S.A. and the Ford Foundation.

Organisation.—The Ministry of Community Development and Cooperation has overall charge of the programme. It works under the guidance of the Central Committee with Prime Minister as the Chairman. The Central Committee, which lays down basic policies, consists of Members of Planning Commission, Minister for Food and Agriculture, and Minister for Community Development and Co-operation. Coordination with allied Ministries is maintained through special committees.

Actual execution of the programme is the responsibility of State Governments. The State Development Committee, consisting of Chief Minister as Chairman, the Ministers of Development Departments as Members and the Development Commissioner as Secretary, watches over the execution of the programme. The Collector, as Chairman of District Planning Development Committee, is responsible for implementation of the schemes in the district.

The Block Development Officer is the head of a team of experts, known as Extension Officers, in agriculture, animal husbandry, cottage industry, etc. At the village level, there is a Gram Sevak acting as a multi-purpose extension agent with 10 villages in his charge.

The base unit at the village is the Panchayat—a statutory organisation consisting of members elected by the entire adult population of the area. It collects the basic data, ascertains the needs, assesses the resources and fixes priorities for schemes for the village. It operates through functional sub-committees in which members from voluntary organisations like Youth Clubs, Farmers' Forums, and Mahila Mandals are drawn. Primary Co-operative Societies and Village schools are the other two basic institutions. The first deals with the economic side of the programme, the second acts as the hub of community life.

At the block level statutory bodies have already been set up or are being established in the States to take full charge of the programme

Pending that, Block Development Committees composed of representatives of Panchayats, Co-operative Societies, a woman representative, a few advanced cultivators and social workers are responsible for planning and executing the programme at the Block level. M.Ps. and M.L.As representing the block area are *ex-officio* members of the Committees.

At district level, there is the Statutory Zilla Parishad or the District Development Committee. It co-ordinates activities among various blocks, allocates resources, indicating priorities, and maintains general supervision.

The State Legislatures and Parliament, supreme bodies representing will of the people, provide guidance and direction at the top. Intimate vigilance is exercised by them through Informal Consultative Committees attached to the Central Ministry and the State Development Departments.

Programme.—The programme lays special emphasis on stepping up agricultural production. Schemes for minor irrigation, land reclamation, soil conservation, afforestation and development of animal husbandry, poultry and fishery are planned and executed. Provision of better communications, improvement in health and sanitation, better housing, wider education, measures for women and children's welfare, development of cottage and small scale industries and promotion of youth movement and cultural life are other aspects of the programme.

People's institutions at the village, block and district levels, which the programme promotes, are the agency to plan and operate all such schemes of development.

Training.—A comprehensive training programme is conducted by Government to meet the requirements of the programme. The personnel in various categories are selected by the State Governments. Selected candidates before taking up positions receive training in various training centres set up in different parts of the country. An institute for the training of instructors for the training institutes is run by the Ministry at Rajpur (Dehra Dun).

In addition to training of Government functionaries, an extensive programme to train up non-officials to work on the programme is in operation. To supplement the work of Gram Sevaks, who function as extension workers from the official side, Gram Sahayaks (Functional Village Leaders) are being trained in large numbers. About 50 villagers are trained through short duration camps held in every Gram Sevak's circle. On return to their respective villages, the Gram Sahayaks with their newly acquired knowledge help and inspire other villagers

to adopt modern techniques of production. More than a million and-a-half Gram Sahayaks have already been trained through these camps. Similarly, training for members of the Block Development Committees, Panchayats and Co-operative Societies is being arranged.

Periodically, Sammelans of Sarpanches and members of Panchayat Samitis are organised. Serving as an important forum for both officials and non-officials associated with the programme these meetings facilitate exchange of notes and sharing of knowledge and experience.

The village school teacher is an important person in the life of a village community. To make him familiar with the aims and objectives of development programme, camps are organised in blocks. Teachers on return from these camps acquaint school children and villagers with the broad outlines of development plans and encourage them to play their legitimate part in successful implementation of those plans.

The Central Institute on Community Development situated at Mussoorie, provides training, particularly on group methods and the sociological aspect of the programme, to key personnel, administrative as well as technical. It has a research wing for study and examination of various problems encountered in the operation of the programme in the fields.
