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
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DEVELOPING INDIA'S HUMAN RESOURCES

This booklet has been prepared for India by the United States Agency for International Development because the people of the United States believe in developing the capacities of a country's youth through democratic self-management, scientific education and practical experience as the surest means of creating a forward looking and effective citizenry, the main strength of any nation.





INTRODUCTION

In India each year about four million young men, mostly rural, are assuming adult tasks in farming, industry, business, professions, public administration, and in family and civil life.

Probably two thirds are untrained and unskilled. A certain percentage are illiterate, unable to read instructions or to gain new ideas and improve their skills through reading.

Yet there is economic opportunity in more intensive agriculture for young farmers alert to modern farming methods. There is an unsatisfied market in urban centers for skilled labor, foremen and practical technicians, and a need for enterprising managers.

Village young people are not only in need of new skills, both technical and managerial. They are having to adopt new attitudes, disturbing to old values and relationships.

They have been bound by narrow family and caste obligations and a deep veneration of the traditional. They are emerging now into an economy and civil society requiring more individual freedom and initiative, but also wider cooperation, civic consciousness, and community responsibility. They need analytical zest, adaptability, and a knack for innovation.

India's youth are its greatest underdeveloped resource. Developing the potential in India's rural human resources may depend more on the rural elementary and secondary schools than on the family, caste, and other institutions.

But half the boys reaching high school age may not continue through secondary school. Most of India's next generation of 50 million farmers will probably not have had a high school education, partly for lack of schools but chiefly because those who attend school, not realizing the potential of intensive agriculture, see little prospect of adequate income on small farms.

Supporting the educational system in the village is the rural youth club, with heavy vocational emphasis. When properly developed it can provide much of the training in vocational skills and qualities of citizenship which the millions of future farmers will not yet acquire through formal schooling. In it young people acquire confidence, not only in themselves but in agriculture, other occupations, and village life.

The following photos of actual cases illustrate how the rural youth club functions successfully. These photos are of clubs in the Pilot Rural Development Project in Mahewa, Ajitmal, and Bhaggianagar Blocks of Etawah District, Uttar Pradesh, where the oldest clubs have accumulated ten years of experience and have already produced a crop of young leaders alert to new farming methods, enterprising, and experienced in democratic community action.







STEPS IN ORGANIZING GLUBS

Informal contact with village adults and youth.

Selection of interested youth and potential volunteer club counselors.

Visits of prospective counselors and members to well-functioning clubs in other areas.

Initial educational program with aid of films, film-strips and printed literature.

Training camp for prospective members and counselors.

Designation of club counselor.

Selection of nucleus.

Preliminary meeting.

Formation of club and election of office bearers.

Selection and adoption of projects.

Other meetings.

SOUND PROJECTS

Projects are the core of the club work:

They provide on-the-job training in adult occupations, community action, and citizenship.

They develop the individual; they develop the community.

They develop knowledge and skills — organizational, technical, and managerial.

Essentials for a sound Project:

The project must provide an incentive by responding to a felt need. There must be a firm, strong desire for the project; voluntary participation is essential.

It must be practical and realistic. It must offer an opportunity for learning and applying new ideas and skills.

Technical information and advice must be readily available through technicians and literature.

Adequate material resources including equipment and funds, must be at hand.

Projects must be

Selected properly — by the members

Planned thoroughly — by the members

Started correctly — by the members

Carried through step-by-step — by the members

Their inputs and results measured and recorded — by the members

Their results made known — by the members

Follow-up is vital.

There must be follow-up — guidance and supervision — by the adult counselor and by the technician, a use of extension methods on a continuing basis from start to finish.

Demonstrate what youth can do if they work together.

Create group unity, pride, and loyalty to the club and the community through common achievement.

Develop the enthusiasm and support of the village.

Foster a spirit of self-reliance, initiative, and confidence in youth's ability to achieve a better life through their own efforts.



Can teach how to organize and run a cooperative business democratically and efficiently.


Can support individual projects by cooperative group projects, such as processing and marketing of an individually produced commodity.




