LATE last Night, and after the Courier was in the Press, the Rodney, Captain Chatfield—the Prince William Henry, Capt. Dundas—the Woodcot, Capt. Lowis—the Earl of Oxford, Capt. White, and the Hilsborough, Capt. Brown, the Indiamen expected from Bengal, arrived and anchored in the Roads:

The above Ships left the Pilot on the twenty fecond of January.—They bring not any Intelligence, further than what we have before noticed, except, that it was reported generally in Calcutta, and believed, that ADMIRAL CORNWALLIS, as foon as he had received the necessary Repairs and Provisions at Bombay, had intentions to proceed direct to Europe.

The above report, it is faid; was grounded on a notification, forwarded to SIR JOHN SHORE by the ADMIRAL from Bombay; received at Calcutta on the 19th or 20th Inftant.
