





BATTLE OF FLEURUS.

The following fanginary, ridiculous, and improbable account of the late BATTLE OF FLEURUS, is taken from the BOMBAY COURIER of the 20th ultimo, (and as the Editor of that Paper, informs his Readers was copied by him, from the Calcutta Gazette—) and if the DECADE of BARRER is not in this, the first instance, executed as described—the French have seized far beyond the highest flights of Cruelty and of Insanity, which the historic page records, and avow the truth of what their Countrymen, Voltaire, long since observed, respecting them—That to the fantastic Whimsers of the MONK, they added, the thirst of Blood, and the Cruelty of the TIGER.

PARIS.—1st of July.

We have just received from the banks of the Sambre the following details.—A ROYAL ARMY, numbering 100,000 men, was ordered to re-embark the Republican Army of the Sambre and to succour or retake Charleroi, which the Allies looked upon as an essential point in the present campaign; they had united their forces from Valenciennes, Landrevy, Quenoy, and the neighbourhood, leaving gunners and making other arrangements just sufficient to avoid a total defeat from the army of the Rhine, 20,000 Prussians had arrived the evening before the battle; the whole artillery was collected, and cavalry brought together doubly equal to our force. With this army, the allies marched towards Charleroi; their object was to surround the French army by beating down upon their flanks, and seizing Marchiennes au Pont and Ghent. They advanced upon the banks of the Sambre, hoping that the noise of their cross-fires would acquiesce the garrison of Charleroi with their coming to their relief.

On our side we did not look to the number of our enemies, we had engaged to each other to fight and to subdue the foe.

The battle of Fleurus began before day, at three o'clock in the morning, of the 6th of June, (26th June) the enemy's army was commanded on the right, by the Prince of Orange, by Beauvais on the left, and by the Princes Cobourg, and Lambec in chief.

The battle began: three times our army were compelled by the fire of their numerous artillery, to retire to the entrenchments, but throughout the French lines, was to be heard, no retreat to cry, no retreat!

The Van-guard composed of 10,000 men and 100 cannons, was the first to engage the enemy's army, the frequent attacks of the enemy's cavalry; the battle continued for 12 hours—victory appeared upon our side.

General Lescaux retakes the city of Charleroi, sends an order to General D'Alton, to march with the cavalry, he directs the attack of the city, he reinforces the batteries, and makes a charge on the right flank.

A cannon is heard, the light infantry on the left flank, which had already been repulsed by the publicans, had at a distance a red uniform, the DECADE.

General Dubois, charges the enemy upon the red Coats, instead of taking their prisoners. It was about 6 o'clock in the evening, when Bourcier, the French, and his artillery, were already victorious, they made an unanimous effort to the cry of Vive La Republique!

From 8 to 10 o'clock, the French army of Battle, all the red Coats, had been repulsed, now breathless, now many Prussians do you think we have made, only the result of this glorious day.

GENEVA.—June 2.

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ADDRESS TO THE KING, JUNE 18.

At three o'clock, the Lord Chancellor, attended by several Peers, and the Speaker of the House of Commons, accompanied by several Members, went to St. James's and presented the following Address of both Houses of Parliament to the King:

Most GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN, We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in Parliament assembled, having taken into our most serious consideration the communications which Your Majesty has been pleased to make us, respecting designs against the public peace and safety, carried on within this Realm, think it our bounden duty, at this period, humbly to lay before Your Majesty those sentiments to which we are led by result of that examination.

We have seen, with the utmost concern and indignation, that there has existed within this Realm a seditious and traitorous Conspiracy, directed to the subversion of the established Constitution and Government of these Your Majesty's Kingdoms, and that for the execution of those wicked and detestable designs, means of open violence were preparing, and acts meditated, leading to all the horrors of Insurrection, Anarchy, and Rebellion.

That, with the fullest conviction of these things, thus deliberately entertained, openly avowed, and on every point of being attempted to be executed, we feel our felices bound to express to your Majesty, our gratitude for the paternal care which your Majesty has shewn for the dearest Interests of your people, in having taken such measures as might best tend to defeat all such purposes and to bring the authors and abettors of them to public justice.

On our part, we proceeded without delay after the example of our ancestors and in the full impression of the exigencies of a situation, to such measures as we deem best calculated to secure the public peace, tranquillity, and the safety of the Realm, and to bring the authors and abettors of these designs to public justice.

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NAVAL ACTION.

A letter from Quebec, dated June 9, says, I have the satisfaction of acquainting you with the safe arrival in this road of the Crescent, of 30 guns, Sir James Sanzarez, Druid of 28 guns, Capt. Ellison, Eurycide, of 24 guns, Capt. Cole.—At day-break, on Sunday they lay to windward five sail of the enemy three of them mounting 50 guns, the Thames frigate of 32 guns, and another frigate nearly of the same class. The French ships formed a line and edged down upon ours, but the British being a bad filler and a small Ship was ordered to make sail, while the Crescent and Druid lay to waiting for the enemy who engaged as they came up. The two squadrons were by this time close to the island, and all the spectators on shore were distressed to see the apparent impossibility of the escape of our ships. The whole French line were come up and in action, the Eurycide on the point of being cut off—and the Druid in great danger. At this critical moment, Sir James Sanzarez by a most able and spirited manœuvre, not only saved them, but extricated himself, in the midst of the action. Sir James halted his wind, giving the Druid and Eurycide an opportunity to get to head, while he covered their retreat by receiving the fire of the whole French force. The Druid and Eurycide got safe to the Road by the fourth ward, and the Crescent came round by the north of the island, owing to the great experience of a good pilot. It is impossible to do justice to the spirit and promititude displayed by the Captains Ellison and Cole, and the respective officers and men of the three ships on this critical occasion.

By letter from Quebec, dated March 1, we learn that the Indians had fallen upon the American army, and slaughtered 3 or 400 men.
