Extract of a General Letter to England, dated 18th February, 1794.

PARA. 48. WE have the honor to send in the Packet, a List of Ordnance and Military Stores captured at Pondicherry, deemed eligible to be retained on the account of the Company, and an Account of the same with the Causes. As it is the King's Property, in all cases where the King's Forces are acting in the Contest of the Army and Plunder in the King, we request that your Court will be pleased to obtain a Certificate to us, His Majesty's Ambassador, in relation to the Property captured in India, that we may certify the same.

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 4th, 1795.

IT has been reported, that DESPATCHES OVERLAND, of 10 late date—the 26th of June, were received at the Presidency on Monday last; the contents of which are said to be of a most important and interesting nature. THE LOAN for the EMPEROR, mentioned as having been completed, and that his IMPERIAL MAJESTY had taken the Field, near Meuzet, and commenced Hostilities with every appearance of ultimate success—that ANARCHY and CONFUSION pervaded every part of the devoted REPUBLIC of FRANCE, and that it was generally believed throughout Europe, that MADRID would ultimately be Established, under the restrictions of the Constitution, proposed in 1793.—ENGLAND is mentioned as in the enjoyment of internal tranquillity, increasing Commerce, and indeed, in the enjoyment of all the Blessings which are insured to the most favored of Nations, by the best of CONSTITUTIONS, and by the best of KINGS.

On the 17th ultimo, arrived at Calcutta, the American ship, Major Pinkey, from England, which the 11th of June. The heads of Intelligence received by this conveyance are as follows.

The Grand Fleet, at Spithead; the second Fleet of Indiamen to leave England in July, with a Convoy to the Cape of Good Hope—General Vaughan had received St. Barbara, and affairs in the West Indies, were the most favorable aspect. Five Thousand Pounds per Annum, and Seventy five Thousand Pounds, to defray the expenses of the Trial, had been voted to Warren Hastings Esq. at a meeting of Proprietors of East India Stock, on the 29th of May. The British Funds very high. Three per Cent, at 67 on the 8th of June. Mr. Wilberforce's motion for Peace, on the 27th of May, negatived by a Majority of 115. War formally Declared against England, by H. Hand, on the 21st of May. To the above accounts we have to add, that the following Ships sailed from St. Helena, for England, under Convoy of the Sea-tre, on the 10th of July. The Wycombe, Africa, Edix, Goddard, Hawkchurch, Airly, Castle, Manhip and Bulbridge. The Comet, H Idemets, Lauffington, and Pitt, Sugar Ships, and Eight L.

The 3d Battalion of Native Infantry, commanded by CAPTAIN McLEANE the PRESIDENCY, from GUNTOO Instant, the appearance of the Bay to long a march, and during the halcyon one day only; was much more on the Commanded attack it to it.

On Saturday last arrived the Cavalry in Robertson, from Trincom in the 17th Ultimo. We understand, that DESPATCHES from the PRESIDENTY, arrived at the Court of Directors, on the 17th Ultimo. ACTEON.

In the List of Civil Servants annofated for Bengal, and taking rank from the year 1793, we observe the name of EDWARD HALL, AUDELEY, Esquire, Secretary to the RIGHT HONORABLE LORD HOBART.

We are sorry to learn that the 15th Battalion of Bengal Sepoys, ordered on Foreign Service, had refused to embark. The consequences resulting from this refusal, are detailed in the following Paragraphs copied from the ORIENTAL STAR of the 17th ultimo.

Extract of a letter from Madras, dated the 7th October, 1795.

When the mutinous disposition of the 15th Battalion of native infantry, at this station, made its appearance, the Situation of the European Officers, became extremely painful and distressing; their authority, and the subordination of the Sepoys, both at an end; not only were the Officers deprived, but for some time almost of their lives.

On the 27th of September, the Company's order in perambulation was executed for the first time, all the Sepoys, who were employed in the Battalion, were ordered to assemble at the Barracks, without arms, and to be taken possession of by the European Officers.

At 10 o'clock the European Officers assembled, and the nine artillery men came in without arms, three at a time, and the 29th Battalion in 10 parties.

All the Officers were then called in; the two Sepoys were called out, and Captain Grant's European officers, falling in with the 29th Battalion, were marched to the parade of the 15th Battalion, where the mutineers were all drawn up ready to receive them. They were neatly double in number, and formed in two lines, with the muskets to their cause and the recruits between the

When we were opposite to them. Mr. Rahn rode up and spoke to their leaders; but they refused to come to any terms: we then advanced a little nearer, and Captain Bradley went up to them, but they still persisted in their refusal; shouting and firing, and the Battalion, for aiding against them.

On Captain Bradley's return, perceiving there was no likelihood of quelling the mutiny by fair means, two six pounders were opened against them; which they answered by a very wild irregular fire, but which however did not give them generally going over our heads.

In the course of about five minutes, the mutineers broke—one half taking shelter in the Jungles—the other going to the lines, from whence they fired at a distance, and then went off with their arms; many of them however ran off, and threw them down.

We have had six men of our party wounded; one of them not expected to live.—The mutineers had two killed, but we know not how many have been wounded; our men have been bringing them in constantly since, as they had them in the Jungles.—They have also brought in many of the firelocks; some of which they found regularly piled up.

The Officers of the 15th Battalion, were sent for, and their arms and the Battalion's Arms, were taken from them, and they were sent to the Barracks, where they were kept in the Barracks, where they were kept in the Barracks.

We have heard, that several of the native officers and Sepoys concerned in the mutiny mentioned in the foregoing letter, were brought to the Presidency yesterday, (under a strong guard from Madras); and that they will, no doubt be brought to a General Court Martial.

ASTATIC MIRROR—October 15th.

On Monday last, the American Ship Henry, Captain CROWNINGHILL, arrived in the river from America, but left from the Mauritius.

The Henry left the Mauritius on the 16th September. By this Ship Captain STEAKES, formerly Commander of the Luffini, and captured in June last by the French Frigates *La Prudente* and *Cybele*, has arrived from the Mauritius, whether he was carried prisoner on board one of the above frigates.

During the first time Captain STEAKES remained at the Mauritius, a British Frigate, the *Minerva*, of 36 guns, and the *Arcturion*, of 18 guns, arrived at the Island from Port L'Orient.

It was reported at the Island, that the *Minerva* brought intelligence of an armament of six ships of the line, having sailed from France for the Mauritius, in the month of August; but this intelligence was entirely the result of conjecture. The fleet alluded to failed from *Le Cap* in April. Its destination was unknown, though generally supposed to have been for India; but from its non arrival there is no doubt the West Indies having been the quarter to which it was destined.

The *Minerva* after deliverg her dispatches, took her departure; her destination was secret, but imagined to be for Madagascar.

When the Henry left the Island, the Frigate *La Prudente* was ready for sea; *La Sable*, and the *Minerva* Corvettes were undergoing repairs. The *Minerva*, contrary to the orders of the Governor, slipped out to sea on the 6th of September, supposed to have gone on a cruise to theeward.

The Luffini had not reached the Island on the 6th of September, the date of the Henry's departure; which renders it probable that she has either been captured, or lost on the passage thither.

Accounts by the Henry state the return of order and good Government in the Mauritius. The cry of the Mob, which had formerly prevailed, was at an end; and the authority of the Colonial Assembly fully recognized. The Guillotine, which the will of the wary multitude, had caused to be erected before the house of M. Malartic, the Governor, was removed. The principle of terror, that had obtained at the Island, during the Absence of R. Bellinier in France, had been abolished; and conformity to the extra-legal measures of the Government, had been happily succeeded by fasten of justice and moderation.

The Genevise ship, *Le Kanizis*, for Europe, failed in the course of the present week. The Company's extra ship *Surprise*, Captain SMITH, is expected to be dispatched about the 15th instant.

INDIA GAZETTE—12th October.

We have been favored by a friend, with Major Brown's detachment, with the following particulars, dated the 3d September, respecting the capture of M. JACQUES.—His Majesty's ships *Orpheus*, Captain NEWCOMBE, and *Revenge*, Captain PAKENHAM, and the *Ever* and *Prosper*; with the Troops on board, under command of Major Brown, arrived here on the 15th ultimo.—Major Macdonald, recently arrived from England, landed next morning, with detachments from the *Stadholder*, for the Governor's use; Mr. CAYPHERS; but these it seems differed to witely from the instructions Mr. BROWN had received at Madras, which two days were thrown away in negotiation, which ended in the Governor's refusing to treat with us, but as enemies.—The Troops were in consequence landed on the 17th September, in the evening, within 200 yards of the Fort; but we had hardly time to mount two six pounders

upon their carriages, when Captain NEWCOMBE landed, and informed Major BROWN, that the Governor had thought better of the matter, and was now willing to deliver up the Garrison upon any terms.—We therefore marched into it without further ceremony.—A few days after, *Mylord Cayper's* was installed in the appointment of *Civil Governor*; the *Members of the Council*, and all other persons previously employed under Government, were also sworn in their respective Quarters. With the Military only, our Commandant has interfered materially—I understand, he proposes sending part of them to Madras, and part to Prince of Wales's Island.

The *Ship Phoenix*, of Bombay, arrived in the Roads this morning.

BOMBAY GAZETTE—14th October.

Letters from Hyderabad mention that on the 17th ultimo; the Nizam's Troops under Monsieur Raymond, having crossed the Manzorah river, left in a party of Ali Jah's force, which it is said they repulsed after a smart skirmish; from the tenor of these advices, we should conclude that at Hyderabad, the Infurrection is still rated very high; the leader is thought to be destitute of energy, his partisans without enterprise, and his acquisition of Bales treated with contempt.
