HIS MATESTY'S MESSAGE.

THE attention of the public, within thefe few Weeks, has been called to the important Message of the King to Parliament, and as yet continues fuspended in impatient expectation of its refult. The Daily Journals wander through their usual circle of conjecture, but none of them appear to have considered it in a right point of view; some confine the purpose of the Message to precaution, whilst others affert, in a tone of more decision, that an immediate renewal of the War is in contemplation of the Minifter.

It will be remembered, that in the interval between the figuring of the Preliminaries and the Treaty of Amiens, a fimiliar alarm, and from a cause exactly fimiliar, was excited in the pub-lic mind. The coalt of France resounded with warlike preparation; a fleet was equipped, and failed towards the West, nobody knew whither. The clamour of Opposition was immediately excited; their general cry was, that the Mini-fler was unworthy of his feat who could be thus lulled into fecurity under the pretext of negociation, and futter the escape of so powerful an armament, to the probable danger of our West Indian Colonies. The language of the Minister can never be forgotten: " If we negochate for Peace, we negociate with arms in our hands; we have omitted no precaution; our ficets are prepared to fail upon the notice of a moment, and it has been the care of Government to be ready upon any emergency." Such were the fentiments of the MINISTER, and as the preparation in France still continued with its former activity, it was commenced upon our own part with rival vigour. In the mean time the French fleet had reached its destination; it had been all a long avowed that its object was only St. Domingo; to the confusion of the predicting Orators of Opposition, St. Domingo was its object!

We have stated this transaction at full length because it offers a perfect parrallel to our prefent fituation. There was the same preparation in the ports of France and Heliand, and the fame p Whility of holdie defination; the lan-guage of the Minister corresponded in every thing with that of the present Message; orders to the same effect were dispatched from the Admiralty to all our ports, failors were impressed, and thips put in commission .- "I cannot fay." faid the Minister," that I apprehend any thing; but/I cannot justify it to my felf, where so much is at flake, not to be prepared for every thing.

What was the refult of all this mutual pre-Gegat commotions in the funds-a paration ! general alarm-and the PEACE OF AMIENS.

It is fearcely necessary to draw the conclusi-on form these premises. In circumstances so perfectly fimiliar, what room is there for any other than a fimiliar conclusion? The Chief Conful, with his usual vigour, is preparing for the execution of his object; it is awawedly colonial, and we have no reason to suspect that his armament has any other purpofe,

But terror is one of the paffions which is least under the command of reason; it magnifies its danger, & calls for disproportionate precautions. The Minister is compelled to comply, or at once to lofe his popularity, and give the Oppo-fition a credit with the people of being more

vigilant over their fafety than 'himfelf.

In fuch way, perhaps this Meffage only is to be understood. Precaution is necessary upon our part, not because any thing is really appreour part, not because any thing is seasily appre-sended by the Ministers, but in compliance

With respect to the American depot, the question is briefly this—The Spaniards whilst in poffession of Louisiana, allowed the Americans, by treaty, the use of the town of New Orleans, as a commercial depot, with a provifion, however, that they might refume this grant upon affigning any equivalent flation. Previous to delivering the province of Louisiana to the French, to whom it was ceded in the late Peace, the Spanish Governor has refumed the grant of the depot, and shut it against the Americans, without affigning them any other equivalent station. THE FINAL CONQUEST OF ST. DOMINGO.

With regard to the suppression of the present rebellion, some doubt has been entertained; but the opinions of the best informed upon this fubject is the same both in France and England, that it will be a work of time, but that it will be impossible for the Negro and Mulatto force, diminished equally by victory and defeat, and without any means of repairing their loffes by new fupplies, to withftand the armies of France, confident in veteran valour, and recruited with every eastern wind. We confess that the speculations of many of the public Prints, upon this head, have often excited our furprise; for it is impossible to throw an eye upon the prefent conseft, without acknowledging the impossibility of the final victory of the rebels, and the creasion of a Black Republic. Let our readers only recall to their minds the following fimple cirsumstances—that one of the parties has only a sertain stock both of men and arms, and whatover loffes it may fuffer are irreparable; that victory and defeat must equally diminish them, and that a musket or a man once loft, are finally detracted from their force. Were the parties of equal force and discipline, this single eircumstance, that the one is subject to all the wafte of war without any means of repairing its loffes, whilft the other no fooner lefes one than it receives ten, would be fufficient to decide the contest. Let us add to this the advantage of veteran discipline, and valour confirmed by long success, and, what is perhaps equally powreful, a haughty contempt of their enemy, upon the fide of the armies of the Republic, and it will be impossible to doubt the event. We cannot omit another circumstance, as the effect of it has been fo fatally felt in the late war :- It was one of the causes of the success of the French. that, by the feductive nature of their principles, their armies received all the advantages of defertion, whole regiments coming over to the republican standard, whereas fearcely a single man left the French conlours. The republican army in St. Domingo has the fame advantage; they have every thing to hope, and nothing to fear, from defertion. The flaves may return to their mafters, but the mafters cannot pass to the Randerds of their flaves.

Nothing is opposed to these arguments which can deftory their effects. It has been faid, if the Negro and Mulato power be not an equal enemy for the Republic, how was it that Touffaint fo long supported himself in the government of the Island? The reply is obvious: Tonfaint and his Negroes conquered the Planters, and doubtlefs long maintained themselves in their despite; but it must be remembered. that it was only the Planters that he thus vanquished. The armies of the Republic were engaged at the period in other and more important affair than those of St. Domingo : and where is Touffaint at this moment? and by what means was he reduced to his prefent flate? The armies of the Republic no fooner appeared, than he fubmitted; he no fooner again rebelled, than he was feized and transported from the Hland, Can there be a more fufficient argument that the event of the contest will admit of no doubt? If the predominant genius of Touffaint could not preserve either the union or maintain the courage of the Negro army, what is to be dreaded from his inferior fucceffors?

Another argument is, that the Negrose are infpired to enthufiasm in the cause of their liberty and animated with rage against their oppresfors. Liberty is indeed a powerful principle, and we have beheld in our own days the omnipotence of its enthusiafm. But liberty, in that fonse in which it can excite this justly dreaded

plication of ideas; it is intelligible to the great mals of fociety only from the gradual refinements in civil life, but is far too complex for the narrow mind of the Negro. The Negro The Negro can understand oppression only as he feels it. The effect is rage against the oppressor : but this rage is not aggravated by any of those reflections which nourish it, in minds polished by civil intercourse, into a settled hatred against the fyftem. His revenge is directed against the epprefor, and not against the oppression; he fees nothing in ordinary tyranny but the natural fruits of power, & he is confcious that under the same circumstances he would exercise the same tyranny himfelf. It was not fuch reflections which animated the late armies of France, and shook to its very base the mighty fabric of the commonwealth of Europe. It is not of fuch reflections that enthusiasm of liberty is con-

A Black Republic is indeed fearcely within the possibility of things. Should the slaves succeed in murdering the families of the Planters, and all whom they confider as their mafters the effect would only be to procure them new mafters more cruel than their former.

INDIA ACCOUNTS.

Lord Caflereagh moved the Order of the Day for the further confideration of the Report of the Refolutions of the Committee on the India Accounts.

The Refolutions were feverally read and agreed to: but on putting the quellion on the laft,

Mr. Francis rose and stated, that it was, in his opinion, the privilege of any member of the House to examine into, and canvass such account as should be laid before it for its information. If any errors existed either in the items of credit or debit, it was his duty to point them out. In afferting that an account was falle, and calculated to create a false balance, he could not have meant to impeach the character of the Gentlemen who had prepared it. If members were to be abridged of the use of general terms, there would be an end of the freedom of speech. He disclaimed any imputation personal to the Gentlemen in the East India direction. There was one point on which he wished to obtain fome information, whether the Government, as an Hon. Gentleman had afferted in a former debate, was a guarantee to the proprietors of India Rock for the fum of 12,000,000l. He defired to know whether the Honorable Gentleman had made that affertion deliberately, or only sup-posed the fact for argument?—For his own part he had never known any public government guarantee, except on parliamentary fecurity.

Sir T. Metcalf expressed his surprise that the debate should be renewed on the Report from the Committee. He admitted, that it was the privilege of Members to investigate accounts, he denied any right to bring forward a ferious charge, without any foundation. The Hon. Member had expressly frated that the account had been fabricated for the purpose of imposing on the House and the nation. He should leav the Hon. Gentleman to his own feelings on the occasion, and should only say, that if convinced of the justice of the charge, the Hon. Gentleman ought to brigh forward a formal impeachment against those concerned in the impolition. On the renewal of the Company's

The Hon. Member here admitted that there may be inaccuracies in the accounts; but he contended that they were prepared according to the best official documents, and not fabricated to impose on the House. He perhaps thought himfelf, as well as the Hon. Gentleman opposite him (Mr. Francis), that the capital flock should be inferted in the account: but there was an authority as good as either, by which it was omitted-he meant a Refolution of the House of Commons, in the Seffion of 1794, which orders the accounts to be laid before House, exclusive of capital stock. We have all along distrusted the accounts transmitted from America respecting that Colony, and we have had occasion frequently to express our opinion that the affairs of the French were not in fo difastrous a state as they have been reprefented .- Our remarks have been juftified by the last official details received from General Rochambeau, the successor of General Leclere in the chief command. This able Officer has not only placed the Cape in perfect fafery from the attacks of the Blacks, but alfo re fumed offenfive operations, and by a well-plan ned expedition recovered the important post of Fort Dauphin. The last reinforcement from France, which has arrived at St. Sr. Domingo, confifts of between two and three thoufand men, and we are informed by the official paper that fifreen thousand more have been embarked for that Colony.
