CEYLON GAZETTE, — 21st. June.

On Sunday MAJOR GENERAL MACDONALD attended by Capt. M. CROWLEY at his Camp, arrived at Colombo, on his return from Rangoon.

By Accounts from Trincomalee, we hear of the arrival there on the 18th. instant of the Ship GENERAL BATES from Batavia. She was bound for Bombay but at Latitude 7° N. and Longitude 68° East. They experienced a heavy Gale, of Wind which they felt their Main Mast, Sprung the Main Yard and split both of their Sails.—Ending it not practicable to proceed to Bombay, they were obliged to Trincomalee to rest.—The Cargo consisted of 4000 Sacks of Pepper and Benjamin.

On Saturday last, at the present Session of the Supreme Court, four Natives were charged of the Murder of one under *Woolan*, at the Village of *Woolan* in the Province of Jaffnapatt.

The Prisoners received Sentence of Death to be executed on two of them at *Woolan* on the 18th. of July, and on the remaining two at Jaffnapatt on the 21st.

PARISIAN FASHIONS.

Some women of fashion have now begun to deck their hair in that mode which is called *la Aigle*. It divides the hair on the middle of the forehead. On the very front a fine curl. A large *laval* falls down on each side to the shoulders. On the neck behind, the hair is partly in loose curled locks. In those districts which are the most common, the hair is in many curls over the brow, but in places on the neck. Flaxen hair no longer is in fashion.

The velvet caps have been lately of a dark green colour. The hats are still turned up behind. The *tegu* caps are of three or four folds over the brow, with a plain feather. They are often all of one piece, particularly those of white satin. In the caps and hats, the fur and velvet are both colours of red, orange, or crimson; many feathers are worn, and few or no flowers. Diamonds are much worn—in garlands, on hooks of gold suspending the medallions from the necklaces.

In passing through the gardens of the Luxembourg, far from Paris, a little black, checked, ordinary man, meanly dressed, was pointed out to me, sitting in a solitary corner, and apparently melancholy; to which was La REVELLE LEPREUX, the Ex-Director, sitting in the place where his guards used formerly to parade, meditating on his departed grandeur.

Thursday Mr. NEWLAND communicated to the Bank respecting the application of the Omnium Holders for dividing the Feb. installment into two parts, of 20 per cent. each and postponing one of them till April. The Bank have agreed to the request, in consequence of which the funds experienced an advance.

Since the attack of the Jews on the opera of *Family Quarrels*, we are informed, that the *Travellers* of Bernadotte mean to come in a body, to drive the tragedy of *Hamlet* off the stage, in revenge for the allusion to their *kins* in the grave-digging scene.

LONGEVITY.

Lately died, at Bristol, in Penryn, a female slave named Alice, aged 126 years. She was born where Philadelphia now stands, and remembered the ground which the city covers when it was a wilderness, and when Indians (its chief inhabitants) hunted wild game in the woods, while the panther, the wolf, and the beards of the forest, were prowling about the wigwags and cabins in which they lived. Being a sensible intelligent woman, and having a good memory, which she retained to the last, she would often make judicious remarks on the population and improvement of the city and country. In observing the increase of the city, she pointed out the house next to the Episcopal Church to the southward, in Second-floor, as the first brick building that was erected in it. The first church, she said, was a small frame, that lay where the present building stands, the ceiling of which she could reach with her hand from the floor. This woman retained her hearing to the end of her life, but her sight began to fail gradually, in her ninety-sixth year, without any other visible cause than from age. At one hundred she became blind, so that she could not see for a full moon day. Her master, exiled from labour, but being habituated from her childhood to constant employment, she could not be idle, for she afterwards devoted her time to fishing at which she was very expert, and even at this late period, before her sight had so entirely left her, she would frequently row herself out into the middle of the stream, from which the feldom returned with a large supply of fish for her master's table. About the 102d. year of her age, her sight gradually returned, and improved so far that she could perceive objects moving before her, though she could not distinguish persons. Before the death her hair became perfectly white, and the last of her teeth dropped from her head at the age of 120 years.

OBSERVER, — 12th. February.

A letter from Paris of the 1st. inst. says—A young man, who had been drafted among the Conscripts, wished to find a substitute. This produced some altercation between him and one of the Sergeants; the latter, in a rage, thrust him through the body. The rest of the Conscripts instantly diffused the Sergeant. A conflict ensued between the Conscripts and the Military. The guard were called, who fell upon the Conscripts and cut them down. *Five-and-thirty were killed*, and several wounded. Two-thirds of the Guards likewise lost their lives. This took place in la Rue St. Martin.—Bells Melfinger has since notified the circumstances with the statement of only one man having been killed, and two or three wounded.

Among the pamphlets published against Bonaparte's, the one which has made most noise, is *Le Manuel des Esclaves*. This little work commiserates, in the most humorous manner, all the absurd laws and frivolous practices which the pride and folly of tyrants have from time to time imposed on men.—It concludes with some dialogues, in which all the adulations heaped on Bonaparte, are collected in a very ingenious form.

The new Ambassador, General ALEXANDRI, having sent over his wines in large quantity, Lord BELLEVILLE (now Lord GROSVENOR) is in contemplation to bring the matter before the House. His Lordship has asked the advice of Council, who have given him his *dro* opinion, that it comes under the *Trading Act*.

Navigators from Havre and Rouen in Paris—Among the projects of amelioration that now occupy the attention of the French Government, is that of facilitating the transport of Goods, by multiplying the number of inland navigations. This consists in establishing more regular modes of conveyance on rivers already navigable, or in digging canals. For accomplishing in part the former of these objects, a company has been formed in Paris, who propose to keep vessels regularly employed in transporting goods from Havre and Rouen to Paris.

But, to effect this purpose, they require a capital of 300,000 francs, with which they engage, by the beginning of autumn, 1803, to put at least twenty vessels, of from 100 to 120 tons, in regular activity. To establish the necessary funds, they have obtained a subscription, dividing the whole into sixtieth shares of 5000 francs each, of which they themselves are to take ten. The First Consul has subscribed as an individual.

The 21st. creditors on the French Funds, held yesterday a general meeting at the London Tavern. William LAGBING, Esq. James SIBBALD, Esq. and the other Members of their Committee, reported the result of their communications with Government upon the subject of the meeting; and received its thanks for their exertions. By their report, the meeting was induced to come to a resolution to appoint an Agent to negotiate immediately with the French Government at Paris for the recovery of the debts in question. That Agent will, of course, act under the protection of the British Ambassador.

Str Charles Holloway, who received the honor of Knighthood on Wednesday at the Levee, succeeded the late Gen. Kehler upon the death of that Officer by the plague, in the command of the Turkish Mission in Egypt. He is to have a pension of 4000. per annum, and 1000. per annum for his loss, in consideration of his having given services on that mission, and besides is appointed Commanding Engineer in the District of Cork.

The daughter of General DAMPIERRE, who has lately been married to General DEBOLLE, has a considerable fortune, which she derived from her maternal relatives.

The balance of trade with France is beginning to lengthen to our favour. In the last fortnight 402 passengers were landed at Calais, and 842 have been landed at Dover in return. This is a very different result from what has become former. The number of English *gold* *geys* that have *shipped* to Paris, is estimated at 50,000. Rating their expenses only at 50s. each, an estimate much too low, this would constitute an export of two millions and a half of sterling money.

The great and meritorious work of reformation accomplished by Earl St. VINCENT, during his late visit to the Dock Yards, it is supposed will produce a saving of a million per annum to the State.

Count MONTENOT, the Russian Plenipotentiary at Calais, has notified the French Plenipotentiary exhorting the inhabitants to good order, in which he observes he has the means of searching every corner in the Seven Islands; and in leaving the management of affairs to those who are charged with them, he says, they will be put in a situation to bear the heavy burden of a *Republican* *tyranny*.

On the 19th. ult. the Senate of Frankfurt took provisional possession of all the Ecclesiastical Chapters, Cloisters, &c. assigned it by the indemnifications, during which the guards were doubled.

The Directors of the India Company have lately agreed that diploma from the College of Surgeons at Dublin, shall be considered as a sufficient qualification for Assistant Surgeons in the Company's service.

LONDON, — 20th. February.

The Duke of Clarence has offered his services to the Admiralty, in case it be necessary to send a fleet to sea.

The resignation of Davin SCOTT, Esq. of his command as Colonel of the 1st Regiment of Royal East India Volunteers, has been accepted by His MAJESTY, and communicated to the Brigade.

Yesterday a Court of Directors was held at the East India House, when it appearing, that the Ships *Lord Capgrave*, *Harry Ingle*, and *Calcutta*, were not wanted to carry troops from the Cape to India; they were permitted to remain in the Swinefleet, in order to transport the new ship building by Mr. Melly, destined to St. Helena and Bengal, was fitted out to *Madras and Bengal*; and the *Lo* & *Coffers* to Coast and Bay, instead of Bengal, as was the *Weyford*, for Coast and China, instead of China direct. The *Delap*, 1200 tons, Capt. Alexander Gray, and *Alger*, 1100 tons, Capt. James Farquharson, were taken up for China direct.

The Electoral dignity which has been conferred upon the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, is to pass to the House of Danneberg, upon the extinction of the House of Cassel.

The crisis of Rastatt and Weimar are future to enjoy a perfect neutrality in all wars of the Empire. Some of the small towns given by the first plan to Bavaria, are to be ceded by the Grand Master of the Teutonic Order.

An Austrian Minister has published a *W* upon the consequences and operation of the *W* man indemnities. The Catholic States, who have hitherto the majority of votes, will in future have a minority. By the cession of the left bank of the Rhine, twenty-one Catholic votes, and one Protestant vote, are entirely extinguished. The affected Catholic votes at *pl* Diet, which was formerly 64, is reduced to 41, whilst the number of Protestants, which was increased to 59, so that the Protestant *st* of the Empire will in future have at their disposal two thirds of all the votes.
