THE CHRONICLE.—12th. February.

The Civil Tribunal of Strasbourg has pronounced a sentence of confiscation with respect to a large quantity of English Merchandise lately seized at Schelestat.

The friends of Mr. Windham, at Norwich, have resolved to enter into a subscription for a defrayed expense of a whole-length portrait of that Duke.

The Duke of Saxe-Teubach has made a present to the Grand Duke Constantine of all the Manuscripts and Copper plates in his Library, as a memorial of his friendship; and the Emperor of Germany at the same time presented him with fourteek five kisses to carry them away.

The reiterated complaints against the Order of La Trappe, have induced the King of Prussia to appoint Commissioners to investigate the subject; and their report, his Majesty has ordered that the Order should be dissolved, and its members to be suffered in the Prussian dominions under certain conditions.

The reigning Prince of Esterhazy will go to Munich to Petersburg, to accompany to Vienna the Emperor of Russia, who is to bring the youngest of his daughters to the Prussian court, a lady destined, as is said for our ordinary Prince, who is entering on his tenth year.

The Government has had several conferences with the Archduke Charles. It is supposed that he will be appointed a Member of the Council of War, and will be allowed of 200,000, of the Austrian money, to hold at the Bank, which makes amount to the whole amount of 1,750,000,000, to complete the 25,000,000, of which the loan consisted.

A Mrs. Dyer, has been condemned at Paris, to five months imprisonment, for the crime of importing into the country, by pledging with them ten gaiters of copper, as being counterfeited. A paper of last week says, Mr. Chesel, of Nostok, is reckoned the best fish in England; the only mark he ever fixed at without hitting, was a scabbard.

Government appears to fear the young Emigrants who have returned, and a whole tenitude of emigrants cannot easily accommodate themselves to the despotism that weighs upon the minds of those who from their age, have made part of the old requisitions of the country. They have decided that being taken out of the ranks of others by particular laws, which deprive them of the rights of citizenship, they are not liable to the duties which it imposes.

BRITISH PRESS.—12th. February.

Letters from Brest, in the French Press, state, that on the 5th of this month, the frigates La ROMAINE and La VOLONTAIRE, entered into that port, returning from New England.

From a statement lately made of the number of Bank Notes, in circulation, there appears to be 74 in the metropolitan, and 471 in other places of the United Kingdom.

After the Confular Leave last week at Paris, many English Ladies and Gentlemen, died with the Cholera, as the head of whom were the Duchess of Devonshire and the Duchesses of Devon and Dorset. MARLBOROUGH-STREET OFFICE.

Yesterday *Jefeph Alfred Saville*, a buck of fashion, was examined before N. COGNAT, Esq. at Marlborough-street, on a charge of Felony.
Miss Renhold, a Lady of very general appearance, stated to the Magistrate, that she lived with her brother, who kept a house in Croydon-street, leading into Bond-street, and left out ready-furnished apartments. Between eleven and twelve o'clock that morning, the prisoner, accompanied by an elderly gentleman, came to her house, under pretence of wanting a lodging, and being shown up stairs, was introduced to her brother, who was accompanied with a second floor. He wished to look at it, and on seeing it, said he liked it very well, but should want it only for a short time, as he was about to leave the country. He returned down stairs into the first floor, and fastidiously examined the apartment much better, had it been to let. Miss Renhold informed him it would be empty in a few weeks, and if he thought proper he might then have it. He looked into the bedroom, and said he thought it was larger than the one on the second floor. The witness said she thought they were of the same size. On which the prisoner replied, "I can't think that you are correct; but if you are, I am wonderfully deceived; I'll ascertain the fact, however, by stepping up stairs again." He did so, and was absent little more than a minute, while the witness was engaged in conversation with the second floor. On his return, Miss Renhold observed a piece of tapeeping out from under his hat, which the lady instantly knew belonged to a muffin dress, she had put away in a drawer upon the second floor. She challenged him with having her gown in his hat, and whether she knocked his hat off, or whether he took it off, she could not tell, but it fell to the ground, and the gown rolled out. The elderly person was in his progress towards the door when the prisoner came down from the second floor, and on finding, as she supposed, his friend deserted, he ran out of the house. The prisoner would have followed instantly if the presented him for a time, but having no one to help him, and he made off. She had courage enough, however, to call out, and he was afterwards secured.

which the alarm of Miss Renhold had conjured into Felony. His character and connections would defy suspicion; he was a native of Bond, he had been in India in the Company's service, as fourth Mate in the *Asia* East Indiaman, commanded by Capt. Price; he had been home eighteen months, during which time he had been employed at first in the Princes Amalia, a ship belonging to Melles, Mellars and Wright. He resided at the Gun Tavern, Deptford, the better to accommodate himself to his business but that being nearly finished, he had slept at Mr. Scott's house, Cheney-row, Chelsea, on Sunday night, when he met the Gentleman who had accompanied him, in order to get a more suitable lodging at the West end of the town. In that pursuit he had called at a mere *bagatelle*, he had brought it down merely out of curiosity, to show his friends, observing as he entered the room—"Here, Jack, is some real India, what I have often seen in its original date." He concluded the young lady appeared alarmed, and said he hoped he did not mean to treat her. He replied, certainly, and threw it down immediately. With respect to his having his hat on, and the gown scattered, he positively denied the fact, adding, that he never could be guilty of so much ill-manners as to wear his hat in a room where a Lady was present, or to fall in with the custom, and said, he had supposed the Lady, who fell into his arms, almost fainting with fright at what her own imagination had conjured up, and might, had he pleased, have taken that opportunity to run away. He concluded by saying he was engaged to fall in the City of London Indiaman, and that if not discharged, he should disappoint several of his friends, both at the Jerusalem and Lloyd's Coffee-houses, who would be anxiously waiting for him.

The worthy Magistrate observed, that he must be under the necessity of binding the parties to prosecute, being anxious the prisoner should not escape the justice of the country. It was a lamentable thing, that men should dress themselves up, and assume the airs and character of Gentlemen; and by throwing persons of their goods, and their daily practice their deprecations. The conviction of such an offender, when guilt was clearly demonstrated, was of more use to society than that of *twenty ragged scoundrels*, who, perhaps, were induced to commit crimes, to obtain forgiveness to support a wretched and miserable existence. The parties were then bound over to prosecute, and the prisoner led from the Bar.

THE OLD BAILEY.
Jefeph Alfred Saville was tried upon the charge of leaving a muffin gown, value 20s. the property of Miss Renhold.
The prisoner, in his defence, said that he had not the smallest recollection of seeing the gown; that he meant it only as a joke; that he had got exploded it to the young Lady, to which explanation she at the time appeared to be properly reconciled.
The Jury, however, considering it to be something more than a joke, found him GUILTY—*Ten years in jail.*

AMERICA.

The American papers announce a rupture between the United States and Spain caused by the proclamation of the Governor of New Orleans. During the war the Americans carried on a great part of the commerce of the Spaniards, but since the peace, the latter wish to carry their own productions to their own country, and have re-established the old prohibitions against Importers and Foreigners. In consequence of this proclamation the Americans are deprived of a privilege and right granted them by the Treaty of 1795 to deposit their merchandise which come down the Ohio and the Mississippi in the port of New Orleans till exported to the West India or other ports.
On the 22d December Mr. Lewis, Secretary to the President of the Congress, read the following message which states the conduct of Spain towards America.
GENTLEMEN,
I have the honor of transmitting a report from the Secretary of State with the vouchers required by your resolution of the 22d instant: I believe I need not suggest to you that the interests and rights of the United States, as well as the interests of the people, will be well secured by that part of our countrymen who are more immediately affected by the irregular conduct of the Spanish Government in New Orleans, than it is to delay a moment in asserting our national rights, and to take measures for their complete conformity to our dignity.

Our Readers need know that the Mississippi receives all the navigable rivers which water the Western frontier of the United States, and flows into the Gulf of Mexico near New Orleans. Americans to deposit in that city all their cargoes on paying no more than the cost of the ships which brought them.

According to letters from Tennessee, the conduct of the Spanish Government, in shutting up the port of New Orleans, must make the Merchants of that part of the country bankrupt, and the farmers get nothing for their crops. Although threatened with the heaviest losses in this violation of treaty, the people seemed disposed to remain quiet until they see what the Governor of the United States will do.
