However, as we may always calculate with more safety on the folly than on the wisdom of nations, we may be less on this; but we consider the present point of military as really important. France has not the same faith...

These considerations we must add the modern spirit of the age, the science of politics, by the discovery of Government, the general idea of which was never conceived, for influence by the ANTONINI, who actually were not deficient in fervent desires for the liberty of Rome...

Rome was really an enlightener and civilizer of the world. The free Greeks had done something, and not much, by their colonies...

The difficulty is, indeed, much more readily solved in the one than in the other. For all the republics of Greece were, as we saw, as fit not very large cities. Of course, we saw no apparent necessity for representation; they would be as little likely to fall upon, or to approve, the idea, as the inhabitants of Westminster...

In the neighbouring nations of Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Germany, Switzerland, and Great Britain, it finds a race of men more moral, and better informed, than its own people...

Under the Empire, when the popular Assemblies ceased altogether, this objection of course no longer existed; but now the other Provinces of the Empire were nearly on an equality with the Italian States...

To all the grand purposes of civilization and science, Europe, and European America, are already one people, beyond the most distant dream of Roman pride...

Imperfect as our representation is, we still have become a great and flourishing people under the auspicious influence. In America, where the commands a much more extensive right of suffrage, than any other nation...

Neither has France the same excuse with Rome for the despotism of her Government. In those feudal institutions, which her shallow monarchs have continued to be the objects of...

FRANCE therefore cannot justify her despotism by the same excuse as Rome could; and if this be true, Frenchmen will, and do, feel it to be justly;—CANNOT AS PERMANENT.

But these circumstances are wholly foreign to France, considering the high and happy position of Frenchmen. Her Empire exists in herself; it is, indeed, one and indivisible, because it is composed of men, who have the same manners, the same language; and is not, like the Roman Empire, a gorgeous robe of patch-work...

be charged by his enemy with a capital offence in the most convincing manner; or a man of great talents, who has been guilty of a crime against the State, a violent and arbitrary man (if ever late prisoners in those countries be suffered to come before a jury), yet both these persons are by this law to be classed among the suspected, and to be placed under a peculiar jurisdiction of the law.

The law of police authorizes the arrest and imprisonment of a man upon a formal demand being made by his father. A preter verbal is to be drawn up in presence of two fathers of known probity, one to be chosen by the father, the other by the son. When one or two fathers cannot be found, one or two persons of integrity in the neighbourhood are to be chosen by the Police, which is to endeavour to select such as are agreeable, or at least not odious, to the parties. The two persons are to give their opinion, and the police is to pronounce the sentence, which cannot exceed six months imprisonment. It does not appear to us that this regulation, which bears a resemblance to the old system of *Letras de Cachet*, is at all calculated to contribute to the happiness of families, or to strengthen the principle of filial duty and affection.

Fifteen thousand French troops are stated to have perished in the Expedition to St. Domingo; almost the whole of whom have fallen to the fever, and the constant exposure to the influence of an insupportable climate. General Leclerc has recovered from the effects which he had been afflicted with. The Blacks continue to burn and destroy plantations, even in the neighbourhood of the Cape.

The French Government do not treat all the British agents in this country, with the same indifference as we treat the colonies of abuse and ill will, which issue from the *Paris* press against the English Government and Constitution; but the latter being rancorous or ridiculous falsehoods, are treated with contempt; while the former, speaking for many *bona fides*, excite the greatest indignation.

Perhaps it has escaped the attention of some of our readers, that Russia is at this moment at war with Persia, and that the has actually occupied Georgia. — Georgia and Mingreila had been the protection of Russia against the Sovereign of Georgia. After his death, Russia continued to grant assistance to Georgia to maintain her in a state of complete independence of Persia. The successor of *Masoud* was, in consequence of the measures adopted by Russia, and some circumstances had established in the province of Gilian, and the Russians to retire. A Russian army immediately proceeded to Adranca, passed the Derhent and entered the province of Ghilan. The Persian Monarch has raised a large army, and is resolved to meet the Russians in battle. The Porte is extremely alarmed at the late operations of Russia, should be able to render Persia tributary to her, the Empire of Constantinople would be furnished by that immense power.

Sixty thousand soldiers is the *Peace Establishment* of the British Republic, which does not contain two millions of inhabitants. Upon the same basis, the Peace Establishment of Great Britain and Ireland should be about half a million! *Bonaparte* may call this *giving peace*, but we think it is much calculated to excite suspicions of giving war.

NOTICES.—15th. October.

The Confess of the Republic, on the report of the Minister of Marine and Colonies, and with the advice of the Council, has decreed: Art. 1. All foreign vessels prohibited from bringing into the continental territory of the Republic any *Mulle* of other Sex, not in the service of the state, are equally prohibited from leaving the continental territory of the Republic, upon any cause or pretence whatever, unless they are provided with the special authorisation of the Magistrate of the Colony from which they have departed. Art. 2. The same prohibition shall apply to the Colonies with the authority of the Minister of Marine and Colonies. Art. 3. All Blacks or Mulattoes entering the continental territory of the Republic after the publication of the present law, shall be liable to the authority specified in preceding article, with the exception and detained until they can be transported.
