THE ARMY.

MA. EDITOR, I congratulate my fellow-subjects, on the general spirit of Enquiry that is excited, respecting the expenditure of the Public Supplies through all the Departments of the State. The corrupt practices in the *Martins*, have been sufficiently developed, to urge a continuation of that Parliamentary Enquiry. The Country are given to expect that the *Military* will become the next, and immediate branch of National Investigation.

Sir, I must here predict, that nothing short of a fair, and open tribune of enquiry, will either satisfy the just claims of the Country, or appease the general resentment of a plundered People! Their National Inquiries must be selected out of independent Senators, men of business, and superior to all Staff, or other military influence whatever. It will require, that they be not only men of inflexible patriotism, but of affiduity and unconquerable temper also; for, I affirm, that they will have to pass mountains, and labyrinths of figures, drawn up for years in great martial array, and to explore denials of subtleties, which nothing but patience, and perseverance can possibly pass through! Their Commission must be rendered nugatory by no fifth clause, justifying a contentious silence in examiners, lest any acknowledgment on their part should tend to their own criminality!—Having thus briefly stated, what will be required of Parliament in the outset of this important measure, I shall, in my next, point out the military objects, which will demand the first investigation. BELISARIUS.

THE ARMY—LETTER II.

I feel but little hope of thorough Enquiry into the gross abuses which are daily encreasing throughout our *Military Establishments*. In my introductory Letter, I pointed out, that the proposed investigation could prove nugatory, and illusive, if the Commissioners delegated were to be restrained, by any *saving fifth clause*, such as that which has recently, and notoriously obstructed the *Naval Inquiry*. And yet, Sir, I find that the strong holds of *Military Examiners*, are to have this also in addition, as appears by the following clause in the Bill for rectifying the abuses in the *Army*, viz.—

"Provided always, and be it further enacted, that no person shall be compellable to answer any questions, or to produce any account, book, paper, or writing, the answer to which, or the production of which may criminate, or tend to criminate, such person, or to expose such person to any pains or penalties."

I pay great deference to the talents of the Learned Lord, who introduced this fatal clause in the first instance; but I am at a loss to discover, on what principle of constitutional jurisprudence such a loop-hole could have been left open for the free accommodation of public delinquents. Indeed not state what must be the natural conclusion, formed on this occasion by a country roused to a proper sense of its injuries, and indignant at any interposition to deprive them of justice; Suppose, Sir, among the numerous iniquities, the following were to be thus put, and answered:—

Q. "Has any Public Money, imprest for the Ordnances, or Extraordinaries, of His Majesty's Army, been lent, or otherwise applied by you to any use, public or private, whatever?"—A. "I decline making any answer to this question, by virtue of the fifth clause of the King."

Q. "Have you ever known any Commission, signed by His Majesty, sold, exchanged, or betrayed for, or for which any gratuity, or compensation, has been given, directly or indirectly, or been applied to the furtherance of any female or other establishments contrary to the King's regulations—and whereby any difference of Officers have had corrupt purchases put over their heads, to the fraudulent advantage of any person, and the disgrace of His Majesty's Militia?"—A. "I decline answering this question, by virtue of the fifth clause of the King."

Q. "God God, Sir, would it be endured, that the course of National Enquiry be thus consummatedly interrupted."

I have deviated from my intended pursuit of the important subject (but which I shall not fail to resume) in the hope, that these happy observations may direct the attention of Parliament to the clause in this Bill, which I protest against on the ground of fatal experience, and trusting that no Member will be seduced by the Legislature, which may prove in its nature a buffoon, and in its event a mockery of justice." BELISARIUS.

THE ARMY—LETTER III.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF MILITARY ENQUIRY &c.

GENTLEMEN,

By a special act of the Legislature, you are delegated to an important inquisition. Although you may not find yourselves invested with powers adequate to a perfect enquiry, you have at least, an ample field before you for useful exertions.

You have been selected in equal numbers, from professions affording talents best fitted for the service to be performed. It may not, however be improper to remind you, that authorities so constituted, are frequently in danger of an undue preponderance, in one or other of their component parts.

Under the peculiar exigencies that demanded your appointment, it may, probably, require more than an ordinary exercise of public virtue on your part, and vigilance on that of the country, to prevent a paramount ascendancy of the military, over the civil branches of your Board. I mean nothing personal by this observation.

Your federal characters in private life, have fairly entitled you to the mark of public confidence by which you are distinguished. But I must be allowed distinctly to observe, that it will be required of *Soldiers*, to enter upon this arduous duty, with a firmness not to be shaken.

The real business which you are called upon to execute, will be best performed without the aid of any military measures whatever. You are primarily to enquire into the *Commissariat*, *Baracks*, *Agency* and *Chaplain General* Departments. The data for each, must, of course be sought for originally in the War Office. Your various objects of investigation will be traceable from thence by figures only, through all the *debris* of office, however close, and intricate.

Your movements, in advance, may occasionally be interrupted, by *covert ways*, and other petty works thrown up by the fraudulent, but which will be more readily overthrown by the pen of the accountant, than the Truncheon of the tactician! Though, in this progress, you must unavoidably discover how an *official Clerk*, has drawn four times the annual income beyond that of a *Chancellor of England*, you will not be displeased to learn, that this species of extortion has been found too monstrous to be left for your correction!

It will be the first time before you come to investigate that new anomalous system, which draws every thing that is military within its devouring vortex. On the consequences of this violent change of system I shall call your particular attention to due time; but be assured I shall never solicit you to over-step the fair line of your duty, or confuse you for any thing short of a manifest dereliction of it.

The Statute, Gentlemen, does not require that you should become moral censors of the British Army. You will have but little to do with the vices, or follies of military men, unless you find them to be nurtured by the public treasure, or by levies not less fraudulently drawn from the pockets of individuals.

It will not be needful, that you should wound the feelings of a discarded mistress by financial interrogatories, nor pry into the *amorous passions* of a triumphant rival, unless you discover, that their voluptuous orgies have been corruptly interwoven with the calamities of the Country.

Nor will it be required of you, to descend on the luxurious tables of the British Staff, although the great *Frederick of Prussia* has told us of an Emperor, who ascribed "the ignominious defeats of his armies to the super-excellent Ragouts of his General Officers!" The influence of these base, and debilitating habits, will cease of course, as soon as you have placed the *Military Chest of England* under a regular master-key!

I could even wish, that it may not be found necessary for you, painfully to retrace the movements of our armies through their *flimsy campaigns* from 1792, to ascertain on which side the woful balance lies, between the prodigal expenditure of British blood, and British treasure. I know of no public good to be drawn from the revival of past difformities before the lines of *Ofand*, and *Dunkirk*.

Although the mortal carnage of these scenes cannot soon be forgotten, I trust that *Commissary Brook Watson* has not left the pecuniary accounts still open, because the minds of Englishmen, liberal even in their indignation, have long since closed them, without the usual reservation of "errors excepted!"

On looking straight before you, like plain, honest men, you will perceive the whole line of your duty very simply, and clearly delineated. As you will receive multifarious information, as you proceed, from different quarters. The whole country is alive to the true object of the Enquiry, and will, I have no doubt, yield you confidential communications through various channels. I have, individually, some interesting materials for your consideration; but these

I must be allowed to lay before you publicly as the fater means, in my opinion, of promoting the public service. BELISARIUS.
