The Baring, as we formerly stated, sailed from England on the 27th of July, she touched at Madras and sailed thence about the 20th of 1st August. While there, a Portuguese Brig arrived at the Island from Madras after a passage of eight days. By this vessel accounts were received from Portugal of an late attack on the 10th of August, but they were so indistinctly related as to be almost wholly uninteresting. Some of the gentlemen who were passengers on the Baring, questioned the Master of the Portuguese vessel, that they could not ascertain of their store there but the nature of the engagements set on foot by the Portuguese in consequence of the retreat of Madras did not exceed 30,000 men, which was not one third of the number that had been required by Marshal Soulé.

It further appeared, as far as could be collected from the accounts brought to Madras by the Portuguese Brig, that an account of a very late event of moment had elapsed in Lisbon from any part of the Peninsula, at the date at which she sailed.
