CEYLON GOVT. GAZETTE.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 11, 1812.

Yesterday evening anchored in the Roads His Majesty's Ship Africaine, The Honble Captain Rodney, having on Board His Excellency Lieut. General Brownrigg Governor & Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Possessions on Ceylon—The Africaine left England on the 26th Novr. and Madeira the 15th December.

PASSENGERS PER AFRICAINE.

His Excellency Lieut. General Brownrigg, Mrs. Brownrigg, —Lieut. Colonel Ross, Dep. Adjt. Genl. & Mrs. Ross, —Lieut. Col. Sewell, Capt. Brownrigg, Aid-de-Camp & Military Secretary to His Excellency Lieut. General Brownrigg, —Mr. Charles Brownrigg, —Captain Willeman, Aid-de-Camp, — Mr. Pennel, —Mr. Casamajor, for Madras—Capt. Fountain, Bengal Army, —Lieutenants Wauchope, Clifford, & Montgomery, of the Royal Navy.

HEADS OF INTELLIGENCE.

His Majesty's Health, we are sorry to say, had experienced no change for the better.

His Royal Highness The Prince Regent was well, but suffered a slight inconvenience from a sprained Foot.

Parliament were to meet on the 7th January.

Affairs in Spain were much in the same state.

Lord Wellington keeps his ground.

The French had defeated the Spaniards near Saguntum which occasioned the fall of that Town.

General Hill had obtained some successes over the French in Estremadura.

Sir Samuel Hood appointed Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Naval Forces in the Indian Seas.

Sir Samuel had left England in the Owen Glendover and touched at Madeira on his way

to this Country about three Weeks before the Africaine arrived there.

This morning Lieutenant General Brownrigg landed at the Beach with Mrs. Brownrigg and Family under a Salute of 19 Guns.—He was met on the Quay by His Honor The Lieutenant Governor, the Members of Council, the principal Civil Servants, and by the Military Staff.—He then proceeded to the Government House, the Streets and Parade through which he passed being lined with the Troops of the Garrison.

Lieutenant General Brownrigg accompanied by His Honor The Lieutenant Governor, the principal Civil Servants and the Military Staff afterwards returned to the Parade within the Fort, where the Troops of the Garrison were formed into a hollow square, and His Majesty's Commission appointing Lieutenant General Rousar Brownrigg Governor and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's possessions in the Island of Ceylon, was publicly read by the Secretary to Council.—His Majesty's Commission appointing Him Vice Admiral of the Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies was also read; the Troops presented arms during the Ceremony, and at its conclusion fired three Volleys; a Royal Salute was also fired from the Batteries.—Mrs. Brownrigg & Mrs. Ross (the General's daughter) were present and seemed much pleased with the Ceremony, which presented a fine Spectacle.

The Lieutenant General then returned to the Council Chamber, when the usual Oaths as expressed in His Majesty's instructions were administered to him by the Chief Justice, after which His Excellency took his Seat in Council as Governor and Commander in Chief of these Settlements and a Salute of 19 Guns was fired on the occasion.

A Public Breakfast was given at the Government House at which were present the principal Civil and Military Servants.
