### SIMPLICITY AND SALARY

IN AN INTERESTING ARTICLE on "Congress Party in Office" published in "The Statesman" of yesterday's date, Mr. Barindra Kumar Ghose has raised a new point in regard to the question of Congress Ministers' salaries. Mr. Ghose says:

"It is easy to see how false our notion of personal sacrifice in politics is when we insist on a Minister accepting Rs. 500 per month and not more, and yet many amongst us are drawing as much as Rs. 50,000 a year as lawyers, doctors, big municipal employees, teachers, engineers and so on. How many of this rich class among members of All-India or Provincial Congress Committees and the Congress as a whole are willing to forego the big of their earnings in order to follow Mahatmaji has been living the life of a peasant before our eyes for years. How assured hearts has he been able to change by his example?"

It may be pointed out that Gandhiji is still trying to change the hearts of his followers, and to stick to a simple life. In the current issue of the "Harijan" he says:

"I have not hesitated to express my opinion that the salaries that the Congress Ministers have voted for themselves are much too high for the standard of that poor country in this the poorest country in the world."

What will Gandhiji say if he knows that some Congressmen in Bombay and Madras are drawing Rs. 4,000 or 5,000 per month, most of which is from the poor or comparatively poor? Why should they earn so much by exploiting their legal knowledge or medical skill when all their necessities and conveniences can be fulfilled within Rs. 500 or much less than that? What does it profit them if the Congressmen earn Rs. 500 but their lawyers and doctors earn thousands of rupees? The mass of the people are poor, and so lawyers and doctors, that is, those of them who follow the Congress, should earn only that much which is necessary for their needs and of their families. Whether salary or remuneration the standard is up by the Congress. Congress should be kept up by Congressmen or it should be given up.

They should not follow a policy which is neither here nor there.

### Uniformity Is the Best Policy

"THE MAHATTA," Lokmanya Tilak's paper, emphasises an important aspect of Khaddar presentation, to the effect we had already drawn attention of our readers—the need for uniformity in all provinces which have come under the Congress regime. Our temporary says: "Was this presentation sanctioned by the High Command of the Congress?" The Congress Premier also expected to follow Dr. Khare's example? What doubt is there? The Congress is an all-India organisation, and all that it does will be not on provincial lines, but on a national basis. Referring to the C. P. ## CONFLICTING REPORTS FROM THE FAR EASTERN THEATRE OF WAR

### Chinese General Claims To Have Wiped Out 5,000 Japanese Troops

### INDEPENDENT QUARTERS SAY THAT CHINESE ARE FALLING BACK

### Panic In Canton; Quantities Of Bar Silver Shipped To Hongkong

### SEVERE FIGHTING IN CHINGHAI: DOZEN NEW FIRES IN SHANGHAI

(Reuters Cable)

London, Aug. 25. That the Japanese strategy is still concentrated on leading reinforcements is indicated in the far eastern theatre of war.

General Chiang-Kai-shek's headquarters at Nanking says that in the morning announced that 5,000 troops who landed in Wooning were wiped out after a severe engagement. It adds that a Japanese Brigadier-General was killed. Major were among those killed.

Shanghai, Aug. 25. The Japanese claim that the landing was effected with only small losses. On the other hand, neutral observers put the Japanese suffered heavy casualties and the Chinese troops were well prepared to meet the attack.

The Japanese troops who penetrated the first line encountered a second line of landmines which exploded with great effect.

Among the British refugees sailed in the Empress of Canada was Atma Singh, an Indian, who was reported to have been a peace broker when being handed over to the Japanese.

Government Proclamation Nanking, Aug. 25. The Government has promulgated a law, providing summary execution for looters, ransackers, and other lawless acts of army commanders who retreat.

Cholera in Hongkong Singapore, Aug. 25. Four hundred and thirty cases of cholera were reported in Hongkong last week and 173 deaths, according to the League of Nations Health Bureau.

Panic in Canton Hongkong, Aug. 25. Owing to panic in Canton, vast quantities of dollars and bar silver are being shipped to Hongkong.

Hundreds of cases of bullion, valued at 80 million dollars, have already been packed in a warehouse under strong police guard.

The Japanese troops have been driven back to the Yangtze by river steamers.

Chinese Falling Back Shanghai, Aug. 25. Independent quarters confirm that the Japanese have effected landings in various points along the Yangtze, and that the Yangtze to Chongqing has been cut off.
