EXTENSIVE ALTERATION

"A University For The Masses"

Simla, Sept. 12. A Press Note issued by the Geological Survey of India says:

Extensive alterations designed to make the Museum what it might be termed "A University for the masses" are now being made in the various galleries of the Indian Museum in Calcutta.

The geological galleries of the Museum, for instance, maintained by the Geological Survey of India are now being thoroughly overhauled and it is hoped that within the reorganised scheme, the galleries will not merely be more attractive but also more educative to the layman.

There are two main galleries in the Museum where fossils are exhibited: The Sivallik group, which contains only vertebrate fossils, and the invertebrate gallery which contains both plant and animal fossils from India and other countries.

As a result of the rearrangement made, a number of large vertebrate specimens have been placed in the space, were formerly in the "University gallery" may now be called the "Sivallik gallery."

Of these, Megatherium "cuvieri," the giant ground sloth, Oryzomys, the large extinct animal from America, and Dinobirds from the Cretaceous of New Zealand, which come extinct in comparison with modern birds.

Interest cannot fail to attract attention. Of the Indian fossils, the most recent are a collection of Indian anthropoid apes which include the remains of Sivapithecus which lived about 20 million years ago in the Siwalik hills.

He said that the Indian journalist will never allow itself to be imprisoned by the Government. The great majority of the masses are not yet educated and do not naturally draw inspiration from every political subject from the "times" of the day.

Indian newspapers, therefore, have to be more political in nature than those of independent countries.

He cannot forget that it is their principal duty to educate their countrymen along right lines. He said that he would pace with the onward march of their political freedom.
