Sir Guthrie Russell Reiterates his Assurance

WEDGWOOD REPORT DEBATE IN COUNCIL OF STATE

Policy of State Vs. Company Management

(Associated Press)
Simla, Sept. 23. The Council of State met this morning to discuss the Wedgwood Report.
On the motion of Sir Guthrie Russell (Chief Commissioner of Railways) that the Government of India should consider the report of the Indian Railway Enquiry Committee in the light of the discussions in this Council, three amendments were moved by Opposition Members and the Council proceeded to discuss the original resolutions and amendments.
Mr. Hossain Iqbal, in his amendment, suggested the formation of a joint committee of the two houses to review the financial and economic aspects of the investigation.
Mr. Ramdas Pantula, thereafter, moved an amendment for the consideration of the Council for the following "and on consideration the Council recommends to the Governor-General-in-Council that the report of the Indian Railway Enquiry Committee be referred to the Committee on accounts for its consideration."

Sir A. P. Patro moved a lengthy resolution that the recommendations of the committee relating to economies in administration, statistics, improved railway services, and other matters should be adopted generally and that the Government should take public opinion concerned in matters relating to railway rates, that the Motor Vehicles Amendment Bill be moved forward, as far as possible, that the amalgamation of railways should take place and that the Government should take the company-managed railways under its control and that the recommendations relating to financial outlook and the Government should be referred further consideration by the Central Legislature.

Mr. Ramdas Pantula declared that the Committee's recommendations were in the nature of a Rs. 60 crore of the Depreciation Fund was not fair to the general public.

Mr. Hossain Iqbal said that Indian non-official opinion was in favour of the recommendations of the Wedgwood Committee. He suggested that the Government should take public opinion concerned in matters relating to railway rates, that the Motor Vehicles Amendment Bill be moved forward, as far as possible, that the amalgamation of railways should take place and that the Government should take the company-managed railways under its control and that the recommendations relating to financial outlook and the Government should be referred further consideration by the Central Legislature.

Businesslike Report
Sir A. P. Patro said that it was a most businesslike report. He supported the recommendations of the committee, but he said that, while the Railway Authority is to be set up, the Railway Enquiry Committee, the branches might be left to the Government, the work efficiently undertaken by private management.

Mr. Mahomed Hussain agreed that the power should be given to the Railway Authority in regard to the raising of capital and a big part of the management. He said that he had no objection to the report still there were numerous useful suggestions that should be accepted. He urged the Government to accept the recommendations of the committee should not be taken to the detriment of the railway.

Speaking out of personal experience Mr. Mahomed Hussain commended the sincerity and honesty of the Railway staff and the value of the recommendations. The committee in this respect would be better off.

Mr. Mahapatra observed that the mountain of the Wedgwood Committee was a big one, and all hopes of placing it on the basis of remunerative basis were blasted. The Chief Commissioner of the railways said that he found the report was silent on the point. He said that the recommendation in the report which the Railway Board did not know ready to accept.

Railway Member's Reply
Sir Sultan Ahmad, Railway Minister, said that the Council throughout the debate, he had been in favour of the high standard of the debate in keeping with the dignity and honour of the Council. He reiterated the assurance given to the Assembly in regard to the filling of the pledges under the report.

Regarding the policy of State versus company management, he said that he was of the opinion that there was no going back on the policy, but the Government should take public opinion concerned in matters relating to railway rates, that the Motor Vehicles Amendment Bill be moved forward, as far as possible, that the amalgamation of railways should take place and that the Government should take the company-managed railways under its control and that the recommendations relating to financial outlook and the Government should be referred further consideration by the Central Legislature.

Nationalisation of Railways
Mr. P. N. Sanyal said that, read and heard in the report, from the point of view, the Committee had travelled far beyond its powers. He said that the recommendations were based distinctly on political bias. He said that the Government should take public opinion concerned in matters relating to railway rates, that the Motor Vehicles Amendment Bill be moved forward, as far as possible, that the amalgamation of railways should take place and that the Government should take the company-managed railways under its control and that the recommendations relating to financial outlook and the Government should be referred further consideration by the Central Legislature.

Insurance Bill Debate

GOVERNMENT VOTES WITH CONGRESS

(Associated Press)
The Legislature, Simla, Sept. 23. The whole of this morning of the Insurance Bill was devoted to further consideration of the clause which provides for the payment by way of commission to the person effecting a licensed insurance agent.

The House accepted Dr. Benerji's amendment to the effect that the prohibition of the clause should be taken after six months from the commencement of the Act.

Considerable discussion arose on the subject of the amendments intended to secure among the private insurance companies the power to make payment of commission and among the persons effecting such payment is allowed to be made.

Sir Cawaji Jahanvir argued that the amendment did not fulfil the purpose intended by the clause, but he thought it left a loophole for any person to claim back the commission.

Agent's Commission
The House agreed to discuss the Insurance Bill of the following to clause 35 (2). The clause provided that any person who for purposes of insurance business employs an insurance agent shall pay to the agent licensed under Section 35, a commission of 10 per cent in the case of life insurance business 45 per cent of the initial premium in the case of fire insurance or policies effected through him.

Mr. Jahanvir said that the difference existed only in regard to the actual percentage of commission to be given to insurance companies. Ten per cent difference was not a great one.
